CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

Preamble

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the gospel, and to co-operate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following

articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section I. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Missionary Baptist Churches which shall support the causes fostered by the Southern Baptist Convention, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and this Association.

Section II. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of

- (1) Three messengers from each co-operating church with one hunired members or less, and one for each additional fifty members;
- (2) all pastors of member churches; (3) however, no church may have more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger who is not a member of a church co-operating with the Association, and messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A co-operating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Section III. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership shall be referred to a committee which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith, and practice. Upon a favorable report of the committee, the church may be admitted as a constituent member by a majority vote of the messengers at the annual meeting, or, if application is made between sessions of the annual meeting, by a majority vote of the Executive Committee. The church so received shall agree to come under watch-care of the association for a period of one year. The church shall have all privileges of the association except that of voting for the first year.

Section IV. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a majority of the churches.

Section V. Voting in the Associational meeting shall be limited to the duly elected messengers or their alternates.

Section VI. The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

ARTICLE III. CONSTITUTION

Section I. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational Woman's Missionary Superintendent. These officers shall be elected at the annual meeting. However, the WMU Superintendent shall be elected by the women of the Association at the annual WMU meeting. They shall assume their duties upon adjournment and continue in office until their successors are installed.

Section II. The Moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than two one-year terms in succession.

Section III. There shall be the following standing committees:

- (1) Committee on Committees. This committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of the committee to place in nomination personnel of such standing committees as are herein provided or deemed necessary from time to time; it shall also name committees on resolutions, reception of churches, place and preacher.
- (2) Committee on Ordinations. This committee shall examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate.
- (3) Missions Committee. It shall be the duty of the Missions Committee to sponsor a program of missionary education in the churches and to sponsor and supervise the work of an Associational Missionary.
- (4) Program Committee. The program Committee shall plan the program for the annual meeting of the Association well in advance.
- (5) Executive Committee. The Executive committee shall be composed of the active pastors and two members elected by each church who shall act for the association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding upon the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. This committee shall meet on Monday after the first Sunday in each quarter at time and place determined by the committee. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of this committee. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the churches.

(6) Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall present a list of nominations to each office of the association to the annual meeting of the association.

ARTICLE IV. RULES OF ORDER

- Section I. The Moderator, or in his absence the Vice-Moderator, shall preside at all regular meetings.
- Section II. All business shall be conducted and all discussion shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.
- Section III. The method of voting shall be by the will of the body.
- Section IV. A simple majority shall prevail in all cases, provided, however, that any member may at any time call for secret ballot on a doubtful issue.
- Section V. A ruling by the presiding officer shall be final unless appeal be made to the entire body present.
- Section VI. A question having been decided twice by vote in the same attitude at regular session of the Association shall not be reintroduced except by consent of the body, expressed by a majority vote.

ARTICLE V. ADOPTION

This constitution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

ARTICLE VI. REVISION

This constitution may be immediately revised at any session of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present or by a simple majority provided notice of such revision shall have been given at a previous annual session.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

ARTICLE VIII. TIME OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

Tuesday and Wednesday after first Sunday in October. Amended to Thursday and Friday after second Sunday in October.

PROCEEDINGS

MORNING SESSION Tuesday, October 3, 1950

- 1. The first session of the first annual meeting for the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association met in the First Baptist Church of Robbins. Moderator Ottis J. Hagler called the Association to order at 10:00 o'clock. Rev. Doric Sullivan read scripture and led in the opening prayer.. Mr. E. D. Hicks led the singing of the opening hymn.
- 2. Rev Claude Gaddy of the State Baptist Convention, Raleigh, N. C. and Dr. W. K. McGee of the Baptist Hospital, Winston-Salem, N. C. were recognized as visitors at this session.
- 3. Rev. Reid Harris, Robbins, presented the order of the program and explained the program. Program Committee report adopted.
- 4. The Clerk called the roll of the churches and a total of 106 messengers were counted from 19 churches.
- 5. The Moderator appointed the Committee on Committees at this time as follows: Rev. W. M. Holland, Chairman, Rev. B. L. Maness, Rev. Ray Gosnell, Mr. Alex Flinchum, Mrs. William Dale, Mr. F. H. Brown.
- 6. The Moderator recognized the Pastors present at this session: Rev. George Davis, Rev. J. T. Wood, Rev. W. M. Wallace, Rev. W. C. Holland, Rev. B. A. McGary, Rev. Doric Sullivan, Rev. B. L. Maness, Rev. L. M. Dixon, Rev. William Hancock, Rev. Ray Gosnell, Rev. Zeb. A. Caudle and Rev. Clyde P. Stinson.
- 7. Rev. L. M. Dixon presented the Report on State Missions.

STATE MISSIONS

For nearly one hundred years our State Mission Board has been calling on our Sunday Schools and churches for special offerings for missions in North Carolina. State Missions has not accomplished and is not accomplishing what many of us would like. Our state mission program is limited in the extent of its activity by the paucity of funds received.

We have in North Carolina more than four million people. More than half of this number make no claim to be Christian. About half of the church members are members of some Baptist Church. That being true, we, as Baptists, have a much greater responsibility than most of us realize. Since there are more than two million non-Christian people in our state and Baptists make up half the Christian people, surely we should set our goal for winning the lost in our state to Christ. We are our "brother's keeper". Woe be unto us if we fail. We need, for our own sake, to win them to Christ.

God has richly blessed us materially. He is ready to bless us spiritually. Surely every church in our association will want to enter into

the Simultaneous Crusade for Christ planned for March 25th to April 8th of 1951. The hope for the world is in Christ. The hope for our state is Christ. Our only hope of eternal life is in Christ. Our hearts should go out in loving compassion for the salvation of the lost in our midst and in our world.

We should not be content with giving anything less than our best to help bring in God's Kingdom.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

The Woman's Missionary Union of the South Sandy Creek Association is concluding its first year of work with an enviable record of achievement. Of the 17 churches in the Association 11 have well organized and functioning missionary unions. The group has been commended by the State Office for efficiency in reports and holding all recommended and scheduled meetings. Failure on one point of rating kept the group from being recognized at A-1.

Beginning the year's work a leadership conference was held at the Carthage Baptist Church with the Associational Officers in charge and Miss Ruth Provence and Mr. Bill Jackson of the Woman's Missionary Union, Raleigh as guest speakers. Eight of the 11 societies were represented.

A Stewardship Emphasis Day was held at Aberdeen under the direction of Mrs. John Parrish, Stewardship Chairman. Classes were provided for the women, members of the Young Women's Auxiliary, Girls Auxiliary, Royal Ambassadors and Sunbeams. There were 95 attending.

A Mission Study Institute was arranged at Southern Pines by Mrs. W. C. Holland, Mission Study Chairman.

A Community Mission Institute directed by Mrs. Fredrick Taylor, Chairman, was held at Vass.

Mrs. Ferrell Brown, Associational Young People's Leader, provided a splendid program and delicious banquet honoring the Young Women's Auxiliary during their Focus Week in February. Mrs. Brown also conducted a beautiful Coronation Service for the Girl's Auxiliary. Sixteen members took part and received recognition for their work.

The stewardship of the women has been exemplified in their gifts to the Co-operative program of \$1,349.14 and \$1,024.49 in special offerings.

Taken as a whole for a very young organization and a new general Association the women of the South Sandy Creek Missionary Union have had a busy and profitable year. Surely, they have been blessed and are providing a blessing in the world-wide program of the denomination as they "Labor together with God."

TEMPERANCE AND PUBLIC MORALS

This question should be of vital concern to every Christian. I am going to say more about temperance than public morals.

There are many evils which have caused the moral condition of our people, none have lowered the standard of morals more than strong drink. God's word teaches us that "wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging, and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise." Prov. 20:21.

Too long we have been deceived by this enemy and now we are reaping what we have sown. J. Edgar Hoover of the F. B. I. reports that "80% of all crime is caused by strong drink." It kills more of our people than does war, it has broken more hearts, wrecked more homes, dug more graves, caused more tears and brought more suffering than any other sin.

To legalize strong drink is to legalize murder and all the other evils that go with it. The great question is how are we going to handle this great problem. The wise writer tells us, "at the last it biteth like a serpent, and stingeth like an adder." Prov. 23:32. How do we deal with serpents? We don't legalize them and say the more we have, the less people will be bitten by them do we? No, we use better judgement than that. We do away with them and then our loved ones are safe. Why not do the same in this case, and save our young people from this great curse.

We cannot build school and characters out of blood money. How can we say we are Christians as a nation when we are spending far more for strong drink than we are giving to support our churches and schools. If the Lord be God, let us serve Him.

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

Paul, in his letters to young Timothy, made reference to study and reading several times. In his first letter he said "Give attention to reading." As Paul was referring primarily to the Scriptures, so we too, should put the Bible at the head of our reading list. May we not only read it daily, but study it, love it and live by it, remembering always, that we, ourselves are the only Bible many of our neighbors will read.

As Baptists, we are fortunate and blessed with the religious literature available to us through our mission boards, Home and Foreign. In the Commission and the Home Mission Magazine there is not only information, but vitally interesting information which should be read by every member of the family. In our many W. M. U. magazines—Royal Service, The Window, Ambassador Life and World Comrades there is clean, interesting reading for every one, from the adults to our little ones. The Great Commission was given to all of Christ's followers, and I would like to recommend these Magazines to the man of the house. Let's not leave all the Missionary reading to the women.

All of our Training Union and Sunday School Literature is above average, not only in helping us in our planning and teaching, but in helpful spiritual inspiration and council—and when we just place these on the table under our Bible we are the losers. Let's "Give attention to reading." Let's give attention to reading Charity and Children our orphanage paper, and certainly our State Paper, The Biblical Recorder. I would that the Biblical Recorder might be included in the budget of every Church in South Sandy Creek Association. This is our State denominational paper and it is truly a wholesome family weekly, and should be a vital part of the reading program of every North Carolina Baptist family. Home Life, published by the Sunday School Board is among our newer periodicals and is just what the name implies, good reading for the home. The Church Musician is our newest, the first issue coming out this month, published by the Sunday School Board. Serving a dual purpose this magazine will carry feature articles and also special choir music each month.

As I close this report, may I quote from the annual report of our State W. M. U. Mission Study Chairman, Mrs. Gordon Maddrey, as she quoted the challenge given to North Carolina women more than twenty-five years ago by Mrs. Wesley N. Jones. "We must inform ourselves—our people must be informed." For when we know, we Pray, when we Pray, we Give, when we Give, we Go."

REPORT ON RELIEF AND ANNUITY

The South Sandy Creek is a new Association and very few pastors being in the Annuity and very few churches participating in the Annuity plan. We feel that this report should come in the form of a recommendation to the churches of our Association.

- We recommend that each pastor study the Annuity plan, call his church officers and workers together with some pastor invited to explain the Annuity plan to the officers and workers of this church.
- 2. We recommend that pastors, officers, and workers of this Association be called together in one of the churches of this Association with one of our State Missionaries or State Secretaries to speak on the Annuity plan.
- 3. We recommend that pastors then call all officers and workers of his church for a meeting to take up the Annuity plan, then after study of plan with church all together, then table the Annuity plan one month then take a vote to go in the Annuity plan with their pastor. I believe if we get this information before our churches that they will be glad to make it possible for every pastor in this Association to have this Annuity.

28. Rev. O. J. Hagler presented the following amendment to the Constitution of the N. C. Baptist Convention.

A PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST CONVENTION.

With reference to Article VII of the Constitution of the North Carolina Baptist Convention it is proposed that the said article VII be changed to read as follows:

"The General Board shall consist of the President, the Recording Secretary, and the General Secretary-Treasurer of the Convention, ex-officio, and one member selected from the territory of each cooperating Association of the State, and one additional member for each 10,000 church members or major fraction thereof, above the first 20,000; based on the records of the latest published annual of the Convention.

The General Board shall be divided into four groups serving fouryear terms after terms of 1, 2, and 3 years have been set up necessary and incidental to proper rotation and equal division.

It is further provided and stipulated that no member may succeed himself to membership on the Board until one year has elapsed after his term of office has expired.

Further, no one in the employment for pay of any institution of the Convention shall be eligible for membership on the Board. The General Board shall have the power of the Convention in the interim between sessions of the Convention, and, it shall have general supervision of all agencies and institutions fostered and supported by the Convention The General Board shall have the power to fill vacancies in its membership, occuring between sessions; however, the balance of Associational representation shall not be disturbed in so doing.

It is further proposed that Article V—Convention Procedure of the By-Laws of the Constitution of the North Carolina Baptist Convention be amended by the addition of a section titled—Section D—Eligibility for membership on Boards.

Any member having just completed a term of office on any board of this Convention shall not be eligible for election to membership on any other until one year has elapsed.

- 29. Motion made, Seconded and passed that the South Sandy Creek Association endorse this proposed amendment.
- 30. Moderator Hagler introduced Dean R. M. Lee of Mars Hill College, who spoke on the activities of Mars Hill College. This was a very inspiring message on the activities of this Baptist college.
- 31. Dr. W. C. Holland presented the Foreign Mission report.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

Southern Baptists today are making a valiant effort to put missions at the center of their program. For years Southern Baptist churches have lagged far behind most of the other denominations in per capita giving to missions and in per capita missionary personnel. Several years ago the Foreign Mission Board launched its Program of Advance in order to guide and inspire us to overcome our deficiences in all areas of missionary endeavor. The Program of Advance has proven to be one of the most effective means ever devised for the promotion of Foreign Missions. Although still far from being the kind of "missionary" Baptist that we should be, Southern Baptists have come a long way because of this far-reaching program.

In 1949 the total receipts of the Foreign Mission Board represented an increase of \$465,313.63 over receipts for the same purposes in 1948. Exclusive of world relief funds amounting to \$120,354.15, the Board received a grand total of \$5,319,261.04. Receipts in 1950 will exceed this figure.

The number of missionary personnel has likewise shown an increase. In 1943 Southern Baptists had a total of 462 active missionaries,

but by 1947 the number had increased to 619. In 1948, 67 additional missionaries were appointed, and these additions brought the total number of active missionaries to just over 700. Of these 67 missionaries, 19 went to Africa, Europe, and the Near East, 16 went to Japan and Hawaii, and 32 went to Latin America. The missions have made requests for 241 additional missionaries. Southern Baptists have authorized the Foreign Mission Board to appoint 100 missionaries in 1950. The Board is hoping that each year the number of appointments may be increased by 25 in order that it may be able to appoint 200 missionaries in 1954.

The most rapid advance has been made in Japan where we now have 40 missionaries. The highest number of missionaries which Southern Baptists ever had in Japan at one time prior to World War II was 20.

New work is being established each year throughout the world, and old work is being expanded. At the present time surveys are being made concerning the possibility of opening work in India, a rich and fertile field which has been totally neglected by Southern Baptists. Costa Rica has been opened to Southern Baptist work, and the Board has authorized the beginning of new work in Ecuador and Peru. During the year Nigerian Baptists celebrated the first centennial of Baptist work there.

Perhaps the most outstanding event of all during the present advance was the opening of the European Baptist Seminary in Zurich, Switzerland. Europe needs God, and through the ministry of this great institution untold numbers of people who otherwise would never have a chance to hear the Gospel, will come to know and trust Him.

This great program is entirely dependent upon the interest and support of every local church and every member. May God help all of us not to fail Him and ou rfellow man.

HISTORICAL SKETCH SOUTH SANDY CREEK ASSOCIATION

For many years it was felt by leaders in the old, historic Sandy Creek Association that the Association, covering parts of Moore, Lee, Chatham, Hoke, and other adjacent counties, was too large to make up an efficient organization. Several separate attempts had been made to divide the Association along the line marked by Deep River. These all ended in failure.

During the year 1948, after consultation with many of the brethren, Ottis J. Hagler, Pastor of the Carthage First Baptist Church, conceived the idea of contacting all the churches in Moore County and asking them to decide in Church Conference if they would like to form a new, smaller and more efficient Baptist Association. After much correspondence and personal contact the following Missionary Baptist Churches in Moore County agreed individually and separately to ask to be dismissed from the mother Association in order to form the South Sandy Creek Missionary Baptist Association: Aberdeen First Church, Ashley Heights, Calvary, Cameron, Carthage First Church, Ephesus, Flint Hill, Ives Memorial, Lemon Springs, Pine Grove, Pines Wood, Red Branch, Robbins First Church, Southern Pines First Church, Summer Hill, Taylors Memorial and Vass.

When the Annual Session of the Sandy Creek met at Hickory Mountain Church a resolution was presented embodying the request of the Churches of Moore County. On motion the request was granted with only one negative vote.

On the 25th, of October 1949 representatives of the churches met with the First Church of Carthage for perfecting an organization. At this time a constitution was adopted, the preliminary draft being presented by W. C. Holland, Pastor of the First Church, Southern Pines, N. C. The following officers were elected: Ottis J. Hagler, Moderator, Reid R. Harris, Vice-Moderator, J. D. Arey, Jr., Clerk, and L. M. Dixon, Pastor of the Cameron Church was elected Chairman of the Committee on Committees. Dr. Holland was selected to preach the Annual Associational Sermon and Reid R. Harris, Pastor of Robbins Church was selected as Alternate.. The dates set for the First Annual Meeting were October 3rd. and 4th at Robbins and Carthage.

During the year the Promotion-Executive Committee composed of two members from each Church has met quarterly and carried on the work of the Association in a splendid way. With the meeting of the Annual Session for the first time two additional Churches are awaiting admission into the South Sandy Creek, Niagara and Rosendale making a total of nineteen churches at the end of the first year.

Report of the Sunday School Department of the South Sandy Creek Association

The Seventeen churches in our association are having Sunday School each Sunday. There has been a substantial increase in the Sunday School enrollment this year. Most of the churches showing an increase while few show a small decrease.

There were two associational meetings held this year for Sunday School work. The first one was our Daily Vacation Bible School clinic held in the Carthage church. We had ten churches represented at this meeting with fifty two present. The meeting was very helpful to Vacation Bible School workers.

There were eleven vacation Bible Schools conducted in our Association this year with an enrollment of 921 pupils and faculty. These schools had an average attendance of 772. Most of the schools had professions of faith, a total of 57 and 43 joining the churches.

The next Associational meeting was held in Vass, September 26th. This meeting was held to plan our work for next year. We had ten churches represented at this meeting with an attendance of 43. We set our goal, at this meeting for this year. We hope to show a net gain in Sunday School enrollment of 843. With every church having one or more study courses and a Vacation Bible School.

REPORT OF BAPTIST ORPHANAGES

The Baptist own two orphanages, Mills Home at Thomasville, N. C. and Kennedy Home at Kinston, N. C.

The financial situation of the orphanages is much better in the 1950 report than in 1949. In 1949 the homes were in debt \$56,000.00 but the Baptist came to their rescue and last year gave \$32,000.00 more than was spent—gave more than any one year.

Gifts from estates of friends of the Orphan Homes are always welcomed. In March, 1950, the Robert M. Idol Estate of \$586,000.00 was turned over to the orphanage to be used in building a church at Mills Home in memory of his mother; and infirmary in memory of his sister, and a vocational building in memory of Mr. Idol himself. Plans are in the making to start these buildings. This is the largest donation ever received by the orphanage.

There has been a change in personnel as our Dr. Zeno Wall on reaching the retirement age of 68 on August 20th left for his home in Shelby. Supt. W. C. Reed has filled the vacancy. He is a man of culture, experience and consecration and will be a tireless worker and safe leader. Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Smith of Boone, take over the work at Kennedy Home and are persons with excellent training and good records. They are loyal Baptists.

Mr. Riman Muth is new treasurer and his wife, Frances Bandy Muth, a Caseworker. Mr. J. Marse Grant was again elected editor of Charity and Children.

Last year the homes cared for 781 children and the health of the children was excellent and they did well in school, fourteen graduating from Mills Home.

Spiritual work was also done at Kennedy Home.

There are many applications on hand for admission of children but no room for them except as some may be discharged.

Church services are conducted just as in any other church, with various organizations. For instance—there are 7 G. A.'s and 7 R. A.'s with 4 sunbeams and the pastor lives in the center of the campus.

The South Sandy Creek Association has had a part in making possible these homes for homeless children, but the contributions should be greater. During the first six months; 9 churches contributed \$409.83; 6 churches take 155 copies of Charity and Children. How can we as an association do more for our orphans? By having an Orphanage Representative appointed by the association who will keep in touch with the churches in the association and urge every church regardless of how small to set aside a certain Sunday for Orphanage Day; or to make plans in the church budget to remember our children who are in need of our protection. This plan plus our Thanksgiving remembrance will make it possible to accept many more of those little boys and girls who are now on the pending list. We are proud of our orphanages and they are rendering a much needed and most worthy service to the "least of these"—our children.



CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

Preamble

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the gospel, and to co-operate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section I. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Missionary Baptist Churches which shall support the causes fostered by the Southern Baptist Convention, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and this Association.

Section II. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of (1) Three messengers from each co-operating church with one hundred members or less, and one for each additional fifty members; (2) all pastors of member churches; (3) however, no church may have more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger who is not a member of a church co-operating with the Association, and messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A co-operating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Section III. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership shall be referred to a committee which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith, and practice. Upon a favorable report of the committee, the church may be admitted as a constituent member by a majority vote of the messengers at the annual meeting, or, if application is made between sessions of the annual meeting, by a majority vote of the Executive Committee. The church so received shall agree to come under watch-care of the association for a period of one year. The church shall have all privileges of the association except that of voting for the first year.

Section IV. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a majority of the churches.

Section V. Voting in the Associational meeting shall be limited to the duly elected messengers or their alternates.

Section VI. The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

ARTICLE III. CONSTITUTION

Section I. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational Woman's Missionary Superintendent. These officers shall be elected at the annual meeting. However, the WMU Superintendent shall be elected by the women of the Association at the annual WMU meeting. They shall assume their duties upon adjournment and continue in office until their successors are installed.

Section II. The Moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than two one-year terms in succession.

Section III. There shall be the following standing committees:

- (1) Committee on Committees. This committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of the committee to place in nomination personnel of such standing committees as are herein provided or deemed necessary from time to time; it shall also name committees on resolutions, reception of churches, place and preacher.
- (2) Committee on Ordinations. This committee shall examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate.
- (3) Missions Committee. It shall be the duty of the Missions Committee to sponsor a program of missionary education in the churches and to sponsor and supervise the work of an Associational Missionary.
- (4) Program Committee. The program Committee shall plan the program for the annual meeting of the Association well in advance.
- (5) Executive Committee. The Executive committee shall be composed of the active pastors and two members elected by each church who shall act for the association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding upon the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. This committee shall meet on Monday after the first Sunday in each quarter at time and place determined by the committee. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of this committee. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the churches.

(6) Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall present a list of nominations to each office of the association to the annual meeting of the association.

ARTICLE IV. RULES OF ORDER

Section I. The Moderator, or in his absence the Vice-Moderator, shall preside at all regular meetings.

Section II. All business shall be conducted and all discussion shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law. Section III. The method of voting shall be by the will of the body.

Section IV. A simple majority shall prevail in all cases, provided, however, that any member may at any time call for secret ballot on a doubtful issue.

Section V. A ruling by the presiding officer shall be final unless appeal be made to the entire body present.

Section VI. A question having been decided twice by vote in the same attitude at regular session of the Association shall not be reintroduced except by consent of the body, expressed by a majority vote.

ARTICLE V. ADOPTION

This constitution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

ARTICLE VI. REVISION

This constitution may be immediately revised at any session of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present or by a simple majority provided notice of such revision shall have been given at a previous annual session.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

ARTICLE VIII. TIME OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

PROCEEDINGS

MORNING SESSION

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 18, 1951

The first session of the second annual meeting of the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association met in the First Baptist Church of Southern Pines, N. C. Moderator O. J. Hagler called the meeting to order at 10:00 o'clock. Rev. B. L. Maness, Pastor of Flint Hill Baptist Church, led the devotion, with Mr. E. D. Hicks leading the singing of the opening hymn.

The clerk called the roll of churches and a total of 104 messengers were counted from 18 out of 21 churches.

Rev. Reid Harris, chairman of the Program Committee, was recognized to present the order of program. He in turn asked the clerk to present the order of program. The program was adopted as read.

The Moderator appointed the Committee on Committees as follows: E. D. Hicks, Chairman, W. C. Holland, Reid R. Harris, J. H. Abernathy, and Mrs. J. D. McCaskill.

The Moderator introduced the new pastors in the Association, Rev. W. D. Hudson, Pastor of Piney Woods and Red Branch churches being the only one present.

The Moderator called for any business that should be attended to at this time. There being none, he recognized Dr. W. C. Holland, Pastor of the host church, who welcomed the Association to the church.

Mr. E. D. Hicks presented the Sunday School report.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The Sunday schools of our Association have shown a sizeable increase in enrollment and a definite increase in the number of baptisms from the various Sunday schools. We believe the Sunday schools in our Association have had a most successful year and we feel there is even greater heights to be reached this year.

We have held two associational meetings this year. The first one was held in Aberdeen the latter part of May. The theme for this meeting was, "Conserving the Results," there were ten churches represented with a total of fifty-eight members present. The program consisted of testimonies from different people of the churches represented. They were very inspiring. The meeting closed with an address by Brother Holland from Southern Pines. He spoke on the subject, "Feed My Sheep," which was very timely and interesting. This meeting was a follow up of the simultaneous revivals.

The second associational meeting was held September 18, in Carthage. This was our associational Sunday School planning meeting. We had eight churches represented with thirty-seven members present. Brother Sankey presented plans for our Sunday School work for this year. He explained the plans for 1951 and 1952 in a very interesting way and challenged us to do our best this year.

There were ten Vacation Bible Schools reported in the Associa-

tion, with an enrollment of 974 pupils. The average attendance for all the Vacation Bible Schools was 686. The average per school was 69. There were twelve Baptisms and the offerings going to mission causes was \$96.68.

We are looking forward to a greater year in Sunday School work this year and we are going to strive to gain at least fifteen new members per one hundred church members enrolled. We hope to reach this goal.

Rev. L. M. Dixon presented the Report on Christian Education.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Baptists of North Carolina are helping in the support of the following educational institutions: Meredith and Wake Forest, senior colleges; Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, and Wingate, junior colleges, and the School of Nursing at the Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem. Last year these colleges had an enrollment of about 5,000. Wake Forest and Meredith conferred degrees on a total of 654. There were about 800 completing the two-year course in our junior colleges, many of which transferred to a senior college for the next two years of study.

There are, in our colleges, about 400 who are studying for the ministry, and about 300 others who are classified as "student volunteers" expecting to serve in some other phase of religious work. Several hundred are preparing themselves for other professions, such as business, teaching, the practice of law, medicine, dentistry, etc.

Our great need in all our churches today is for consecrated laymen and women who will lead out in a progressive way, in all the programs of work committed to us by the Lord Jesus Himself. The progress of our churches is dependent upon the vision, consecration and training of leaders who have a will to obey the commands of Christ.

The great need of all people is Christ, and with young men and young women studying at the feet of teachers who have Christ in the heart and who properly relate all learning to the program and teaching of Jesus, the churches of the future will be stronger in every way than they are today. So may we pray much for our leaders and teachers who have in their power the great privilege of shaping the destiny of so many boys and girls who are intrusted to them for a period of one, two, or more years.

Dr. W. C. Holland gave the following report on the Cooperative Program.

REPORT ON THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Cooperative Program of the Southern Baptist Convention is

a method or agency of distrib ution through which Baptist churches give to all the regular work of the denomination. During the twenty-six years of its existence it has proven itself to be the best method yet devised for the support of the whole program. It has not only provided for the needs of the various agencies of the Convention and reduced the number of direct financial appeals to the churches, but it has guaranteed a healthy balance among all Southern Baptist agencies. Funds are distributed upon a percentage basis among the agencies according to their relative needs and importance, not according to their popularity. These percentages were not fixed for all time. As needs vary the percentages are changed. All agencies prosper or suffer in the same proportion according to the gifts of Eaptist people.

There are those who object to the Cooperative Program because they believe it prohibits making special contributions to special causes. However, it is in no way designed to take away this well-recognized privilege. All are urged to make regular offerings through the Cooperative Program to be divided among all the causes and then, where possible, to designate special offerings in addition to the regular cooperative offerings. It would be well for all to note that designated offerings are not to be counted as gifts through the Cooperative Program.

If all Baptist people would tithe, and if all churches would give generously and regularly through the Cooperative Program, every phase of Southern Eaptist work would make glorious strides toward making the name of Jesus Christ known throughout the Southland and the world. Through the Cooperative Program everybody gives to everything.

State Missions

The three divisions of the work of North Carolina Baptists—State Missions, Hospital, and Christian Education in the colleges—are all supported through the Cooperatve Program. At the present time, however, the department of State Missions is not receiving enough funds through the Cooperative Program to support its work. A recent report in the Biblical Recorder has revealed that as of June 30, 1951, State Missions owed a total of \$477,749.76. Of this amount \$302,710.34 represents operating costs in excess of income. The additional \$175,039.42 represents the following obligations: Mars Hill Baptist Church, \$46,400; Student House at East Carolina Teachers College, \$11,099.42; Greenville Memorial Church, \$4,500; Charlotte Book Store Building, \$73,000; Headquarters Building on Hillsboro Street, \$40,000; Noah Biggs Church Building Fund, \$40.00. Under the present program the income for State Missions is dependent on the 13 per cent which it receives from the state's part of the Cooperative Program and the special State Missions offering in the fall. To relieve State Missions of this indebtedness and to insure State Missions an ever expanding program, it is necessary for all churches to enlarge their giving through the Cooperative Program and to go all out for a big State Missions offering in the fall.

Home Missions

In Southern Baptist Convention territory there are 27,000 churches

and 16,000 preachers, but millions of unsaved people are out of the reach of these churches and preachers in cities, towns, and country. It is the task of the Home Mission Board in cooperation with State Mission Boards to evangelize this great unevangelized group which totals in excess of 25 millions. From the very beginning the fields of service and the task of the Home Mission Board have continually expanded. The Convention in the past ten years has added 988.642 square miles of territory to the Home Board field. This is an addition of 78 per cent and constitutes a greatly increased task. The Home Mission Board is worthy of any and all assistance which our churches can give it through the Cooperative Program, the Annie Armstrong Offering, and the special offering once a year in the Sunday school. This is shown by the interesting and startling fact that there has been one profession of faith for every \$34.97 expended by the Board. Therefore, every time any church gives \$34.97 to the Home Mission Board for its work, the gift makes possible the salvation of a soul.

Foreign Missions

During the past year the Foreign Mission Board has continued its Advance Program in spite of increased opposition in the Orient. A series of new high records has been established again. Appointment of 111 missionaries as over against a previous record of 35 is an accomplishment worthy of high commendation. The number of active Southern Baptist missionaries now totals over 800. Additional work has been established in Ecuador and Peru in South America and Southern Rhodesia in Africa. As a result of this additional expansion Southern Baptist missionaries are now serving twenty-seven national areas of the world. The Foreign Mission Board also reached a new high in receipts. The total receipts for 1950, exclusive of relief funds, amounted to \$6,014,909.49—an increase of \$695,644.45 over 1949. All of this increase, except approximately \$20,000, came from Cooperative Program receipts in excess of the budget of \$6,500,000 for all Convention agencies. The 1951 budget for Convention agencies has been raised to \$7,000,000 Since the Foreign Mission Board will once again receive all Cooperative Program funds in excess of the Convention budget, the Foreign Mission Board receipts will drop down in 1951 from the high record of 1950 unless our churches provide considerably more than \$7,500,000 for the Cooperative Program in 1951. The largest advance during 1950 has been in Japan, and it now appears that the largest advance of 1951 will also be registered in Japan.

Minister's Retirement

The Minister's Retirement Plan was designed by the Southern Baptist Convention to provide an income for pastors who reach the age of retirement or who become disabled. It is designed to help all participating pastors whose regular salaries have been discontinued because of disability or old age. All churches and all pastors should participate in the plan. The churches owe it to their pastors, and the pastors owe it to themselves and to their families. No church is too small or too large to contribute to this benevolent undertaking. One enrolled church pays at the rate of 15 cents per month, or \$1.80 per year. The funds which a church contributes to the Ministers Retirement Plan are not credited to its own pastor,

but they go into a state group fund which is used for all pastors who retire under the Plan. Pastorless churches should therefore contribute while the pulpit is temporarily vacant, just as they continue their contributions to missions. For the same reason churches should contribute even though their pastors may not be members of the Plan. This is the Lord's work, and all Cooperative Program gifts support it.

REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOME FOR AGING

The North Carolina Baptist State Convention in its November, 1950, session authorized the committee on the Home for the Aging to make plans for the opening and operation of our Home as soon as the committee might find a way to meet the cost of equipping and operating. Because of the drive to raise money for the construction of the new wing to the Baptist Hospital, the Convention instructed the committee for the Home not to expect direct help from the Baptist State Convention during the year 1951.

On January 9 the committee on the Home elected Rev. James M. Hayes, pastor of North Winston Baptist Church, Winston-Salem, superintendent of the Home, and Miss Edna Heinzerling, director of Nurses of the Baptist Hospital, to serve as supervisor of our Home. The committee decided to open the Home for residents when sufficient funds became available to begin.

There are many evidences of the Lord's favor upon the Home thus far. In the first place, He led in making a home immediately available. Ten years ago the trustees of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest College leased a three-story, brick constructed fireproof building, with an elevator, for a period of 25 years for \$1.00 a year. The committee on the Home was able to secure this building for 15 years at the same rental price. The building accommodates 20 residents at present. The top floor, if completed, would give space for 16 additional residents. The completion of this floor would cost approximately \$23,000. With more than 100 applications for admission already received, and inquiries coming almost daily, one can easily see the pressing need of more space.

The Home has been greatly helped by the gifts received—furniture, office equipment, heating system, blankets, linens, towels, and many other items, as well as discounts on supplies necessary to be purchased. Although the Home has been operating only since March 16, it now has assets approximating \$75,000, and is not operating in the red.

Our residents range in age from 67 to 91 years, and come from widely scattered sections of North Carolina—from Franklin to Elizabeth City—the mountains to the sea. Regardless of the sections from which they come, they are a happy, congenial family, all rejoicing in the opportunity to live in the Home. The attitude of all the residents is well expressed in the brief statements of Miss Bertha Callaway, former matron of Mills Home Orphanage: "I like this good Christian home;" and of Mrs. Carroll: "I wouldn't ex-

change it for any other."

The Home offers four things to those who come to live there: security, comfort, congeniality, and a Christian ministry. With this sort of program, North Carolina Eaptists can add years to life, and life to years for those who reside in our Baptist Home for the Aging.

One donor said when he sent his check to the Home: "I believe in this practical kind of Christianity. North Carolina Baptists have waited too long to begin it." Surely it is practical, for Jesus said: "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

The committee on the Home has challenged North Carolina Baptists to build a home adequate to meet the need of the increasing number of old people from 65 years up. Their program calls for a million dollar plant, which would accommodate 270 residents. With the Lord leading and North Carolina Baptists cooperating, such a plant should be built and in operation within a few years.

"Now also when I am old and gray headed, O God, forsake me

not." — (Psalm 71:18.)

WHEREAS, the Cooperative Program has been adopted as the method through which all of the agencies of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina are to receive their support, and

WHEREAS, we are seeking to enlist all Baptist churches to support the several agencies of the Convention with regular gifts through the Cooperative Program instead of through special offerings, and

WHEREAS, the Cooperative Program, if adequately supported by all Baptist churches, will guarantee adequate support to all

Baptist agencies, and

WHEREAS, the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina, a Convention agency, has not been supported through the Cooperative Pro-

gram, and

WHEREAS, we believe the best interests of both the Baptist Orphanage and the work of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina would be greatly abetted by including the Orphanage in a proportionate share of Cooperative Program receipts. Be it therefore resolved:

THAT, the South Sandy Creek Association go on record as favoring the inclusion of the Baptist Orphanage in the Cooperative Program as soon as it is practicable, and THAT, the Revised Report of the Committee of 19 be given serious

consideration by the Baptist State Convention, and THAT, a copy of this resolution be sent to Dr. E. Norfleet Gardner, Chairman of the Committee of 19, and to Dr. W. C. Reid, Superintendent of the Baptist Orphanage.

MORNING SESSION

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 19, 1951

The Association met for the second day with the First Baptist Church, Aberdeen. Moderator O J. Hagler called the meeting to order at 10:00.

In the absence of Rev. W. D. Hudson, Rev. W. Ray Gosnell led the opening devotion.

Rev. Zeb A. Caudle, pastor of the host church welcomed the people to the church.

Mrs. F. H. Brown made the following Report on Religious Literature:

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE "CHRISTIAN LITERATURE"

Jesus in the Great Commission commands his disciples, "Go ye therefore and teach all nations," and in the carrying out of our Lord's program for the salvation of the world; Christian literature is of vital importance and is closely linked with Christian Education as we strive for intelligence, culture, and enlightenment.

It is our sacred duty as followers of Christ, not only to be good, but to use every opportunity to be well informed. Jesus in His teaching used the phrase, "Have ye not read?" thus putting to a test the intelligence of His hearers. Paul writes Timothy, "Till I come, give attendance to reading." The winning of people to Christ and the training and the development of our people must be carried on primarily through preaching, teaching, and the use of good religious literature. The record begun in "The Acts of the Apostles," is continued in our religious literature. When we place in the hands of the people religious publications we get this "continued record" and are refreshed in the original truths of the gospel. The Bible occupies the chief place in our list of literature.

The immense volume of literature produced by Southern Baptists covers the field of Bible Study. Sunday School and Training Union Work, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Home and Foreign Missions. We must encourage the reading and study of these because these will help us to understand and teach the Bible better. From the reading of the good literature we gain inspiration and guidance for our Christian living and service. These periodicals should be

coming regularly into every Baptist home. The Biblical Recorder—the organ of our Baptist State Convention, the Charity and Children—our orphanage paper, the Commission—our Foreign Mission Journal, and our Home Mission Magazine. Our Biblical Recorder seeks to promote and support all phases of our Baptist work at home and abroad. Its contents are appealing to our Church membership in such a way that they are demanding it more and more. The present circulation is nearly 46,000. This paper informs, it indoctrinates, it enlists, it inspires, and it unifies our people as they work and witness and have fellowship together in every cause worthy of the Lord's name. The best and most practical way to get these papers in the homes of our church members is to put them in the Church budget.

All our magazines and papers together with the study course books available makes it possible for anyone who can read to become a well informed person. Yet it is surprising how many Baptist homes have a daily paper coming into them and yet they feel they cannot afford to pay for even a part of their own Baptist literature. Can we afford to make such a mistake? So in our efforts to promote the reading of Christian literature we are carrying out the plain instructions of the Word of God.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

The Woman's Missionary Union of the Southern Baptist Convention has made two great changes in their program to co-operate and work more advantageously with the general church programs. First, the W.M.U. year has been changed from the calendar year to the October to October year so that officers may be elected and records kept in accordance with the church administration.

The second change has been to omit the reporting of monies given by the women through the Co-operative Program. The women are not weakening their program in refraining from making this report but instead making it possible for the women to co-operate better with those churches on a Unified Budget. To assure the greater dedication of gifts through the Co-operative Program stress has been placed on the regularity of contributing.

In order to get our records functioning with the church the W.M.U. has made a "nine month year." Even though the time has been shortened we have had all of the required Associational meetings.

A Mission Study Institute was held at Vass under the capable direction of our Mission Study Chairman. Mrs. Ferrell Brown.

The Community Missions Chairman, Mrs. John Morgan, led an Institute at the Ives Memorial Church.

Dr. M. A. Huggins was the guest speaker for our Stewardship

Emphasis program as planned and executed by Mrs. John Parrish, the Stewardship Chairman, at the Carthage Baptist Church.

Our Young People were recognized and honored by a Rally directed by Mrs. Fred Flinchum at the Carthage Church.

In the local societies, in most cases, gains were seen in membership.

Twenty-seven women have been enlisted as tithers making a total of 152 for the Association.

Twenty-five Mission Study Classes have been held with 282 women reading 358 books.

Two hundred ninety-seven women have had compassion upon their neighbors in their own community and served them through Community Missions. One hundred fifty-nine have been conscious of the great task of soul-winning and have made a definite effort to win the lost.

While the women have worked our Young People have also been active. Twenty-one organizations have an enrollment of 283. They have been learning the meaning and the benefits of tithing and have contributed through the Co-operative Frogram as well as the Special Seasons of Prayer. Our Girl's Auxiliaries deserve special mention for the work they are doing in their Forward Steps. Woman's Missionary Union will never falter nor fail as long as her young people study and grow in Christian knowledge and faith.

With such a splendid record of our "nine months year" we feel we would have made remarkable progress had we had the full twelve months.

With the new plans made and the new year beginning we realize more than ever before we are "Laborers together with God" and are ready to proclaim "Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world."

And, the plan, and opportunity on Mother's Day to make a free will offering to help the most needy, is one which should and does appeal to a great host of our Baptist people.

This new Association made an outstanding record last year in a very important undertaking: Every church in the Association met its quota in raising funds to build the new South Wing at the

hospital.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

As your Historian we make the following report:

Since our organization two years ago three new churches have been organized in the South Sandy Creek Association, one additional church from the Sandy Creek Association has been received and application for membership for another is pending; making a total of twenty-two churches.

During the year the following information has been received concerning the individual churches:

Aberdeen has added a piano to their equipment.

Ashley Heights during the year ordained Zeb V. Moss to the ministry and Pastor Ray Gosnell has moved on the field. A new well has been drilled for the Parsonage at a cost of \$400 and plans are under way for replacing the present heating plant.

Calvary Church has called Brother Charlie Comer of Steeds as Pastor and built a new stove flue at a cost of \$50.00.

Cameron has painted some of the Sunday School rooms. New hymn books are being purchased and a long-range building program is in the planning stage.

Carthage has painted the outside of the church at a cost of \$300 and is now in the midst of a remodeling and renovation program on the present Pastor's home at an approximate cost of \$10,000. During the southwide simultaneous revival this church experienced the greatest revival in its history with nearly 50 additions to the church.

Flint Hill Church has remodeled and added to the church house, the amount expended being \$6,000.

Lemon Springs Church has painted the church building.

The New Home Church has built a new church plant. Hymn books and opera-type seats have been bought.

Pine Grove Church has added to the building and installed pews expending some \$700.00.

Piney Wood Church called Rev. W. D. Hudson as Pastor and he has moved on the new field. In co-operation with the Red Branch Church he is being provided with a new Pastor's home valued at \$10,000. This church is now in the process of applying asbestos siding in the form of shingles to the building.

As noted above Red Branch and Piney Wood have formed a field with Rev. W. D. Hudson as Pastor and is now in the process of making an addition to the present building which will provide five new Sunday School rooms. A new heating plant is also to be installed.

Rev. H. R. White has been called to the Rosendale Church. This church has spent \$3,000 on building and is now in a program to add pews and a heating plant.

Robbins Church has provided furniture in the form of chairs and bought a house adjoining the church property for use as Sunday School rooms. Two extra lots adjoining were also purchased at a cost of \$4,500. The auditorium and Sunday School rooms have been provided with ventilating fans in which the church invested \$240.

Southern Pines has completed their educational building valued at \$40,000. An additional piano, 225 hymnals and furnishings for the educational building and Pastors study have been purchased.

Taylor's Memorial has called Rev. J. C. McQueen, Jr., as Pastor. Stone steps and basement floor have been laid. New hymnals have been provided, also an oil heater.

The Vass Church has called Rev. Lewis Beal as Pastor and he is now living on the field and commuting to the new Southeastern Seminary at Wake Forest. New equipment in the form of Communion furniture has been added.

The Bethlehem Church has landscaped the church grounds. Pastor Walker resigned during the year and this church is, at present, without a pastor.

Ives Memorial Church, Pinebluff, painted and redecorated the inside of the church and sanded the floors at a cost of \$869.00. Also Harvey White was ordained to the ministry.

The past year seems to have been one of great progress in all the churches. A great spiritual uplift was felt throughout the Association during the simultaneous revivals. The future is as bright as the promises of God.

A receptive faith in Christ will bring about a profession and an expression of that faith in the daily living of the Christian. Which will raise the moral standard in any Church or community. Jesus said, "Ye are the salt of the earth: but if the salt have lost his savour wherewith shall it be salted?" (Matt. 5:13.) Salt symbolized hospitality, durability, purity, and fidelity. Jesus said, "If ye love me, keep my commandments." (John 14:15.) "He that loveth me not keepeth not my sayings." (John 14:24.) By their fruits ye shall know them.

We are prone to forget in this day in which we live with all of its hurry that sin is a reality. Sin consists of whatever separates an individual from God or his fellow man. "The wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." (Romans 6:23.)

Right living is always temperate living. Many who never indulge in intoxicating liquor are anything but temperate. There are many evils that should claim the concern of Christian peoples everywhere. Home life, parental failure, juvenile delinquency and divorce, Sabbath desecrations, and many are legitimate concerns of the Church.

The liquor traffic can be labeled as Public Enemy No. 1. It constitutes the greatest problem confronting the church, the home, our schools, and nation. No individual or nation has stood very long after having become slaves to the liquor evil. God's woe is pronounced upon all who put the bottle to his neighbors lips. Shall we as Baptists of the South Sandy Creek Association take our stand with God or against God in this matter. Ye cannot serve two masters. There are seven and one-half times more money spent for alcoholic beverages in the United States than is spent for education and religious purposes combined, not counting the souls that are lost, and homes broken up.

We recommend that our Baptist people gathered in this ance for the social and economic sins that are in our midst.

We recommend that that our Baptist people gathered in this Association reaffirm their faith in the course of evangelism as of primary importance in helping to solve our moral problems.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the gospel, and to co-operate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section I. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Missionary Baptist Churches which shall support the causes fostered by the Southern Baptist Convention, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and this Association.

Section II. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of (1) all officers of the Association, including the Executive Committee; (2) all pastors of member churches: (3) three messengers from each co-operating church with a membership up to one hundred and one additional messenger for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger who is not a member of a church co-operating with the Association, and messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A co-operating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Section III. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership shall be referred to a committee which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith, and practice. Upon a favorable report of the committee, the church may be admitted as a constituent member by a majority vote of the messengers at the annual meeting, or, if application is made between sessions of the annual meeting, by a majority vote of the Executive Committee. The church so received shall agree to come under watch-care of the association for a period of one year. The church shall have all privileges of the association except that of voting for the first year.

Section IV. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a majority of the churches.

Section V. Voting in the Associational meeting shall be limited to the duly elected messengers or their alternates.

Section VI. The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

ARTICLE III. CONSTITUTION

Section I. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational Woman's Missionary Superintendent. These officers shall be elected at the annual meeting. However, the WMU Superintendent shall be elected by the women of the Association at the annual WMU meeting. They shall assume their duties upon adjournment and continue in office until their successors are installed.

Section II. The Moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than two one-year terms in succession.

Section III. There shall be the following standing committees:

- (1) Committee on Committees. This committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of the committee to place in nomination personnel of such standing committees as are herein provided or deemed necessary from time to time; it shall also name committees on resolutions, reception of churches, place and preacher.
- (2) Committee on Ordinations. This committee shall examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate.
- (3) Missions Committee. It shall be the duty of the Missions Committee to sponsor a program of missionary education in the churches and to sponsor and supervise the work of an Associational Missionary.
- (4) Program Committee. The program Committee shall plan the program for the annual meeting of the Association well in advance.
- (5) Executive Committee. The Executive committee shall be composed of the active pastors and two members elected by each church who shall act for the association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding upon the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. This committee shall meet on Monday after the first Sunday in each quarter at time and place determined by the committee. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of this committee. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the churches.

(6) Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall present a list of nominations to each office of the association to the annual meeting of the association.

ARTICLE IV. RULES OF ORDER

- Section I. The Moderator, or in his absence the Vice-Moderator, shall preside at all regular meetings.
- Section II. All business shall be conducted and all discussion shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.
- Section III. The method of voting shall be by the will of the body.
- Section IV. A simple majority shall prevail in all cases, provided, however, that any member may at any time call for secret ballot on a doubtful issue.
- Section V. A ruling by the presiding officer shall be final unless appeal be made to the entire body present.
- Section VI. A question having been decided twice by vote in the same attitude at regular session of the Association shall not be reintroduced except by consent of the body, expressed by a majority vote.

ARTICLE V. ADOPTION

This constitution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

ARTICLE VI. REVISION

This constitution may be immediately revised at any session of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present or by a simple majority provided notice of such revision shall have been given at a previous annual session.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

ARTICLE VIII. TIME OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

Tuesday and Wednesday after first Sunday in October.

Amended to Thursday and Friday after second Sunday in October.

RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

THIRD ANNUAL MEETING

OF THE

SOUTH SANDY CREEK BAPTIST ASSOCIATION Morning Session

Thursday, October 16, 1952

- 1. The first session of the third annual meeting of the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association met in the New Home Baptist Church, Vass, N. C. The Moderator, Dr. W. C. Holland called the meeting to order at 10:00 o'clock. Rev. John Weatherman, pastor of the host church led in the singing of two hymns. Rev. E. T. Parham, pastor of Robbins Church led the devotion.
- 2. The clerk called the roll of churches and a total of 128 was counted. All 22 churches were represented.
- 3. Rev. O. J. Hagler, chairman of the Program Committee, read the program. This was adopted with the provision that some changes might be made as needed.
- 4. The Moderator appointed the Committee on Committees as follows: Rev. L. M. Dixon, Chairman, Rev. Zeb. A. Caudle, Mrs. J. D. McCaskill, Mr. Ed. Calcutt, and Mr. S. E. Hannon.
- 5. Dr. Holland recognized the new pastors in the Association. There were four: Rev. E. T. Parham, Robbins; Rev. M. D. Chrisco, Flint Hill; Rev. C. W. Walker, Bethlehem; and Rev. K. C. Ferree, Garners Chapel.
- 6. A count of the pastors was made and there were 12 present. Also there were three visitors.
 - 7. Rev. Zeb. A. Caudle gave the report on Cooperative Program.

REPORT ON THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

Southern Baptists have made remarkable progress in teaching and training, in evangelism. in education and benevolence, in missions, and in stewardship. We have, for example, given more for all missionary, educational and benevolent causes through the Cooperative Program during the past year than ever before in our history. But we have only "touched the hem of the garment."

We need to make still further advance in all fields. But the most urgent need for advance today is in stewardship. How else shall we answer the calls of need in the home mission and foreign mission fields? How else shall we meet the pressing needs in Christian education, hospitals, children's homes, provide for the aged, and state missions generally? The average per capita gift among Southern Baptists amounts to less than ten cents per week for missionary and benevolent causes, and less than sixty cents per week for all causes. There is room for improvement.

All Christians need training in stewardship. We have reached the point where we must make advance in stewardship or we shall go backward. For several years Baptist leaders from the twenty-two states and from the Southern Baptist Convention agencies have felt this urgency. Together they have been studying and praying. We feel that the Lord has led in the development of plans for Southern Baptist Advance in Stewardship, 1953, as adopted by the

Southern Baptist Convention. The central feature in the plan is this:

A School of Stewardship in Every Church in the Southern Baptist Convention October 18-25, 1953

The plans have met with enthusiasm everywhere. Every organization and agency is cooperating actively. Every state convention has taken action to give hearty cooperation. Pastors and churches are enthusiastic. It is necessary to take steps now for the success of this Stewardship Advance in this Association. It is suggested that every pastor and committee member secure copies of the tract, Southern Baptist Advance in Stewardship, 1953 from the office of the State Executive Secretary. This tract sets forth the plans in detail.

Recommendations

- 1. That we reaffirm our conviction that the Cooperative Program of Southern Baptists is the fundamental, effective, and indispensable channel of providing for the needs of all our work; and that we continue through every means at our disposal to urge all our people to join in giving the Cooperative Program their loyal and undivided support.
- 2. That we urge each church to increase the percentage of its budget going to the Cooperative Program.
- 3. That this Association approve the plans for *Schools of Stewardship*, October 18-25, 1953; that we urge every church to make plans for such a school, and that we request every association officer and organization to give full cooperation and support.
- 4. That the Association hereby authorize the moderator to name before the close of these sessions an Associational Stewardship Committee, to be composed of seven persons, which may include two pastors, the superintendent of the Sunday School association, the president of the Women's Missionary Union association, the director of the Training Union association, or representatives of these organizations, and others. The duties of this committee will be to make overall plans for the Schools of Stewardship in the association for 1953, and to enlist each church in conducting a School of Stewardship, October 18-25, 1953.
- 5. That we urge each church to appoint a church stewardship committee before the beginning of the 1953 church year. This committee should include representatives of all church agencies. The duties of this committee are to make plans for a School of Stewardship in the church, and to enlist the membership of the church in attendance upon the school.

- 10. Rev. Hayes gave some highlights of the work that is being done for our aging people at the State home in Winston Salem.
 - 11. Mrs. D. H. Parks gave the Historians Report.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

From the replies to the questionnaire sent out by your Historian we glean the following information:
The Ashley Heights Church has added two new class rooms at

a cost of \$500.00 and also a heating plant.

Bethlehem now has a full-time Pastor living on the field. During the year a new Pastor's home has been built which is valued at \$10,000.

Calvary Church is in the process of building a new church and

class rooms.

The Cameron Church has completed a new Sanctuary and Educational Building. An interesting note on the Cameron Church taken from the old records shows that the Groves Creek Baptist Church was organized in July 1854 and moved to Cameron in 1892, the name being changed to Cameron Baptist Church in 1893.

The Carthage Church early in this year completed the remodeling and renovation of the Pastor's home which is now valued at \$25,000.

Ephesus has laid a new floor and installed heating equipment at

a cost of about \$500. Flint Hill Church ordained Rev. Doric Sullivan to the ministry. The church building has been remodeled at a cost of \$964.00.

Lemon Springs has secured new hymn books.

Piney Wood is engaged in applying asbestos siding to the church. During the year Red Branch Church called Rev. Bennie Maness as Pastor to take the place of Rev. W. D. Hudson who resigned. The auditorium has been enlarged, five Sunday School rooms provided and a heating system installed at a cost of \$4500.00.

Rev. Reid Harris resigned the Robbins Church and Rev. E. T. Parham has been called as Pastor. Two class rooms have been added at a cost of \$500.00. New hymn books have been secured and an organ installed; class room tables have also been provided.

Rosendale Church has secured pews for their auditorium.

Southern Pines Church has expended \$2,000.00 on their plant and is now in the process of remodeling the old Church basement so as to provide for six class rooms for the adult department. Choir robes, china for the kitchen, filing cabinet for the church office have been secured. The Church also has a set of silver collection

plates and a complete silver Communion Set.
Rev. Mr. Gilmore of Sanford is serving the Summer Hill Church
as assistant to Rev. W. F. Hancock who is ill. A new church build-

ing is in the process of construction.

The above would indicate that the South Sandy Creek Association is experiencing healthy growth.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

Each church in our association had an active Sunday School this year, and most of them have had a good growth in both attendance and new members. There has been a great number added to the churches through the Sunday Schools. The ministry of our churches has gone out through the Sunday Schools into numerous homes that otherwise might never have been affected by the church. By striving to enlist whole families in the Sunday School we have enriched the spiritual condition of the communities where our churches are located.

There have been reported ten Vacation Bible Schools this year with an enrollment of 1,360 pupils. From these schools were added to the churches 63 members, Given for mission causes, \$84.50. The average attendance was 88. The Vacation Bible Schools rendered to the churches and communities a very valuable service. We hope it will be possible to increase this number of schools to at least fifteen next year.

We have held two associational meetings this year. The first one was held in the Carthage Church for the purpose of completing the Sunday School Organization. The officers elected at this meeting were contacted and some could not serve in the various offices to which they were elected. Several contacts have been made but the organization is still not complete. At the meeting we had a very fine attendance. Sixteen churches were represented with 61 members present.

The second meeting was also held in the Carthage Church. The purpose of this meeting was to promote Vacation Bible School work. We had nine churches represented with 41 members present. This was an interesting meeting which featured a film on extension work and a very timely address, by Miss Josephine Eden of Troy, N. C., on the "Value of the Vacation Bible School."

There has been a considerable increase in the number of study course awards given the several churches in our Association this year, but some churches have not had a study course this year. The increase in the number of awards shows that the efficiency of the work done in those churches is much better because of study and preparation. We shall look forward to each church in the

association having at least one study course this year.

It has been the pleasure of the superintendent to visit some of the Sunday Schools in our association and observe some of the work they are doing. The various Sunday School Superintendents of the association are to be commended for the very fine work they are rendering to their churches and communities. With a fine group of workers such as our Superintendents, officers and teachers, I feel sure we shall go forward in a great way in all departments of our Sunday School work this year.

REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOME FOR THE AGING — RESTHAVEN, WINSTON-SALEM, N. C.

Operation of Resthaven was begun March 16, 1951. Soon after the opening, it was filled to capacity, twenty residents. When the news spread of the beginning, applications began to accumulate rapidly. To date, there have been close to 500 inquiries. Had there been rooms available, and all applicants could have made financial arrangement, our Home would have had 200 residents instead of only twenty at present.

There is encouraging prospect of getting the top floor of the present building completed, which will provide space for fifteen additional residents. The cost of this enlargement project has been underwritten by a business man of Winston-Salem, who is not a Baptist. This same friend has already donated a television set.

and has concreted the basement of the Home.

Our residents range in age from 64 to 92 years, and come from widely scattered sections of our State—Franklin to Elizabeth City.

All rejoice in the opportunity to be in the Home.

In spite of the fact that Resthaven did not receive financial assistance last year from the Baptist State Convention (except a loan which was repaid), it was operated clear of a deficit. How did this happen? By the Lord laying our needs upon the hearts of-friends and causing them to respond. Of course, the Home was compelled to charge the cost of keep from the residents who came on the monthly-pay plan. The income from this source, together with that coming from residents giving property or cash for their maintenance, plus donations by churches and auxiliary organizations and friends, enabled the Home to pay its way and to accumulate assets in excess of \$100,000.00.

Beginning the year 1952 with the new Nine Year Program, our Home receives three-fourths of 1% of the funds to be divided. From this source has come less than \$500.00 per month since January

of this year. The Home is estimated to receive a total of approximately \$500,000.00 in NINE YEARS. It is apparent, therefore, that slow provision for enlarged facilities will be made to accommodate the hundreds of aging people who want to come to our Home, unless funds come from other sources than our denominational program as it now operates.

Our Home presents a great challenge to North Carolina Baptists to provide adequate facilities. There are probably 100,000 people in our State past 65 years of age, and a large number of these are of Baptist faith. We must make provision as time and finances permit for these aging Baptists. Since Baptists of our State now number more than 700,000 in membership, we are well able to make such provision. If every Baptist would give an average of \$1.00 to our Home in one year, we could raise \$700,000.00 and not one person would suffer hardship. As soon as a practical and adequate plan of support can be agreed upon, it is reasonable to expect that our Baptist Home will be worthily supported.

Many suggestions have been made as to the best plan of supporting our Home. Among them are: (1) Fifth Sunday offerings through the Sunday Schools, as the Virginia Baptist Home plan; (2) special day offering, as the Mother's Day plan for our Baptist Hospital; and (3) putting the Home in the local church budget, and appealing to the churches that have no budget for at least one

special offering a year.

Either of these plans, supplemented by such special gifts as may come from individuals and corporations, and provision made in wills, would enable the Home to make reasonable progress, and thus enlarge our facilities on the pay-as-you-go plan.

REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL 1952

"And He healed many that were sick" Mark 1:34. This statement refers to the ministry of Jesus when He was here in the flesh. We feel that it describes the ministry of our Baptist hospital today. As they went to Jesus, so many people go to our hospital today as a last resort when hope has all but failed. They go saying, "We have spent all our money but are still sick. Can the Baptist

Hospital help us?"

It is the business of the Baptist Hospital to say "Yes" to as many of these pleas as possible. It is because North Carolina Baptists gave generously through their Mothers' Day offerings that the Hospital could care for many of the 10,000 bed patients and of the 95,000 who came to the clinic for help and treatment, and who were unable to pay.

The construction of the new wing to the hospital is now well advanced. This will greatly enlarge our ministry to the sick, adding 150 new beds and many other greatly needed facilities. Before this year closes, it is hoped that all our churches will have given

sacrificially to this great cause.

The Baptist State Convention meets in Winston-Salem November 11-13. Our Baptist Hospital hereby extends cordial invitation to all who attend the convention to visit the Hospital while in the city.

In considering the ministry of our hospital, let each Baptist of cur Association remember the words of Jesus, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto ma." Matthew 25:40.

REPORT ON SOCIAL SERVICE AND CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS

The field in which this report deals is so wide and varied that we can only touch briefly the different items involved.

Beverage Alcohol

In 1950 a total of 2,888,929,668 gallons of alcoholic beverages were consumed by the American public according to the Alcohol Tax Unit of the Federal Treasury Department. This is an average per capita consumption of 19 1/3 gallons. According to this report the District of Columbia — the seat of our Federal Government — stood at the top of alcohol consumption with 28.20 gallons per capita. Maryland was second with 26.82 gallons per capita, and Illinois stood third with 25.21 gallons per capita. The state of Mississippi had the lowest per capita consumption of any state in the union with a 4.60 gallons. Alabama was second lowest with a per capita consumption of 5.19 gallons. North Carolina is third lowest with a per capita consumption of 5.31. Reliable estimates from carefully conducted surveys put the total number of people in America who use alcoholic beverages at 67,500,000. This is an increase of more than 25,000,000 in 10 years.

Since repeal in 1933, according to the U.S. Department of Com-

Since repeal in 1933, according to the U. S. Department of Commerce, the total expenditure for legal alcoholic beverages totals \$110,000,000,000. This is more than \$150,000 a day for the past

2,000 years.

Out of 1,882,160 crimes reported by the FBI in 1951, liquor probably was the cause of 1/3 of the total.

Bootleg Liquor

Many of us recall the oft-repeated pious and solemn promise of

the liquor forces when they were campaigning for repeal, that the one thing above all else that repeal would accomplish, would be the complete elimination of bootlegging. There is more bootlegging today however; than at the peak of bootleg whiskey production in the prohibition era. It is claimed on good authority that the illegal or bootleg traffic is producing 120,000 gallons more per day than the entire legal industry's daily output of 410,000 gallons.

Christian Responsibility and the Aged

There are more than 11,000,000 people in the United States today over 65 years of age. Some of this number have economic security. There are however, nearly 8 million with either no income or only

a meager subsistence.

Religious denominations are beginning to become aroused over this situation just as they have about homes for children, hospitals, etc. According to a survey recently made by the Social Services Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, it was found that Virginia Baptists operate a home that provides care for 100 aged persons. The Baptists of Missouri operate a home for about 70 persons. Baptists in the District of Columbia operate a home for aged ladies only, with a capacity of 28. In North Carolina, Baptists have a temporary home for the aged with a capacity of around 20. In Texas a plan is now being worked out for a home for the aged in connection with the Buckner Home.

Thus with a membership of more than 7,000,000, Southern Baptists officially operate homes that provide care for a little more than 200 ageing people. More Space, More Care. is desperately

needed.

Positive Steps Toward Peace in Our Time

Powerful forces have pushed mankind to the brink of an awful abyss. It is imperative that we take steps immediately to check these forces lest we lose the basic democratic principles upon which our way of life rests.

Here, then, are ways in which each of us can work, ways that will unite us in a world of good-will.

1. Redouble Our Efforts to Reconcile Men to God.

The peace of God is the only peace which will endure. It can come only when men know Him as a child lovingly knows its own father.

2. Do Not Tolerate Any Complacency About War.

We are witnessing today the shameful spectacle of men in national leadership who are pushing legislation which they know can only be obtained by frightening the American people. Those who do such things are following the doctrine that it is possible to get good by doing evil.

3. Reject Fatalism About War.

Some think that war is inevitable and refer to such scriptures as, "There will be wars and rumors of wars." These seem to forget that our Saviour was merely stating conditions that might be expected, without putting the stamp of His Divine approval upon them. He is the Prince of Peace and taught us to pray and labor tor, and expect the day to come when His will, will be done on earth as it is in Heaven.

Race Relations

As Southern Baptists, we take a genuine Christian attitude on the matter of race relations. We would emphasize the great fact that God has made of one blood all nations of men, and that He so loved the world — the whole world — that He gave His only son that whosoever believeth on Him should not perish but have everlasting life. We are all bound together in the love and plan and purpose of God.

Marriage and Divorce

We view with alarm the ever present evil of divorce and the constant increase of the divorce rate in our country. There are many serious and tragic aspects that always follow in the way of divorce. We recognize however, that the most serious tragedy of broken homes is the effect which it has upon children. Herein lies a tremendous challenge to ministers and teachers in our churches to stem the tide that would sweep away the very foundations of our nation. There is a crying need for education both in the home and in the church to prepare young people to assume the responsibilities of Christian home building.

REPORT ON DENOMINATIONAL LITERATURE

Southern Baptist churches can provide their members with many opportunities to co-operate in carrying out the Great Commission.

"Go Ye * * * Teach Them"

One important channel of cooperation is the educational program in each church. Through the several major educational units, Namely: the Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union and the Brotherhood, Church members may work together in helping their church to fulfill its great spiritual objectives.

Many types of Christian Literature are essential to effective educational work in a Baptist Church. Small children need stories and pictures to help them form adequate concepts of God, Jesus, the Church and friends. Bible Study helps and program materials are needed to guide others to conversion and Christian growth. Leaders with each age group need rich resource materials to inspire

and to guide them in their work.

Through the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention the literature is prepared by talented missionary minded Baptist writers, to fit the needs of all ages. They publish sixty-five periodicals and hundreds of tracts and a great many books, designed to encourage Bible Study, to lead to personal faith in Christ, to cultivate Christian character and consecration, to develop faithful workers and skillful leaders in our churches, and to motivate worthy participation in the cause of world redemption.

In like manner our State denominational papers and materials published by the Mission Boards, Woman's Missionary Union and the Brotherhood provide the Christian literature needed by the churches for a vigorous program of Bible teaching and training.

The objective of the Sunday School is to provide an aggressive program of earnest Bible study — aimed to reach and teach all ages, thus winning to Christ the lost and guiding the saved in

continuous Christian growth.

To become a good church member even sincers Christians need training. The Baptist Training Union also provides a place for each member of the family in fulfilling its responsibility of carrying out the Great Commission. "Training in Church Membership" has long been the watch word. The Nursery, Beginners and Primary Departments through especially prepared materials for the different age levels, receive helpful instructions for later Christian service in the Church. The important training in individual participation leads Juniors, Intermediates, Young People and Adults in the skills needed to become effective church members.

The Woman's Missionary Union through its women and Youth organizations places special emphasis upon Missionary education.

The Brotherhood supports all phases of work in the church and denomination, emphasizing evangelism, stewardship, and Christian

fellowship.

Words of Paul may be appropriately paraphrased in describing the important function of each unit of the church and its responsibility toward fulfilling the Great Commission. "For as in one body we have many members, and all members have not the same function, so these units, though several are parts of one body which is Christ's Church."

ORPHANAGE REPORT

In making preparation for this report I had furnished to me by Mr. W. C. Reed the General Superintendent's Annual Report of the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina, Inc. Much of my report will be quotations from this report.

During the past year there has been great activity at both homes of our orphanage. Under the leadership of Superintendents W. A. Smith of Kennedy Home and C. A. Kearns of Mills Home the affairs of these large families have been so directed as to develop among the children and employees an excellent spirit of cooperation and fair play.

Building Program — One big task this year has been to see that the terms of the Idol Will were carried out in the erection of certain memorial buildings. In keeping with the wishes of the Idols \$100,000.00 of their gift was placed in endowment. The income from this is to be used exclusively to keep the memorial buildings in repair. The remainder of their bequest is now being used as they specified: to erect a Church, an Infirmary and a Print Shop.

The Print Shop has been completed and named the Robert M. Idol Memorial Building. The Infirmary is nearing completion and will be named the Lelis M. Idol Memorial Building. The Church is nnder contract and will be built as soon as steel can be seenred and will be named the Sarah Masten Idol Memorial Building in honor of the mother of the donors.

65. Association was adjourned,

There has been completed at Mills Home a new cottage for girls, the first in twelve years. Three of the oldest cottages have been completely remodeled.

Mills Home has long felt the need of a place for the children to play. Now it is developing the I. G. Greer Recreation Center. The main unit is a Physical Education Building, which is now under construction and should be completed within the near future.

When the present building and renovation program is completed we will doubtless have the best child caring facilities in the South.

Meeting the Child's Need — During the past year a total of 775 children were cared for by our orphanages. The Social Service Staff investigated the applications of 684 children and in many instances helped to find them a home where they could be cared for. For 67 years this service has been carried on through our great Orphanage.

The financing of this child care program is by the Once-a-Month Offering by Sunday Schools and Churches and the Thanksgiving Offering. The financing of the erection of buildings has been by

special gifts.

Cost of operating the Orphanage has increased along with the increase in cost of everything else. Hence, if every Baptist will add a little extra to his Thanksgiving offering, it will enable us to continue to meet the ever increasing demands of the needy children who look to our Orphanage for their chance of life.

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Constitution and By-Laws

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the gospel, and to co-operate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section I. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Missionary Baptist Churches which shall support the causes fostered by the Southern Baptist Convention, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and this Association.

Section II. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of (1) all officers of the Association, including the Executive Committee; (2) all pastors of member churches; (3) three messengers from each co-operating church with a membership up to one hundred and one additional messenger for each edditional fifty members or fraction thereof. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger who is not a member of a church co-operating with the Association, and messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A co-operating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Section III. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership shall be referred to a committee which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith, and practice. Upon a favorable report of the committee, the church may be admitted as a constituent member by a majority vote of the messengers at the annual meeting, or, if application is made between sessions of the annual meeting, by a majority vote of the Executive Committee. The church so received shall agree to come under the watch-care of the association for a period of one year. The church shall have all privileges of the association except that of voting for the first year.

Section IV. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a ma-

jority of the churches.

Section V. Voting in the Associational meeting shall be limited to

the duly elected messengers or their alternates.

Section VI. The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

ARTICLE III. CONSTITUTION

Section I. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational Woman's Missionary Superintendent. These officers shall be elected at the annual meeting. However, the WMU Superintendent shall be elected by the women of the Association at the annual WMU meeting. They shall assume their duties upon adjournment and continue in office until their successors are installed.

Section II. The Moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than

two one-year terms in succession.

Section III. There shall be the following standing committees:

- (1) Committee on Committees. This committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of the committee to place in nomination personnel of such standing committees as are herein provided or deemed necessary from time to time; it shall also name committee on resolutions, reception of churches, place and preacher.
- (2) Committee on Ordinations. This committee shall examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate.

- (3) Missions Committee. It shall be the duty of the Missions Committee to sponsor a program of missionary education in the churches and to sponsor and supervise the work of an Associational Missionary.
- (4) Program Committee. The Program Committee shall plan the program for the annual meeting of the Association well in advance.
- (5) Executive Committe. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the active pastors and two members elected by each church who shall act for the association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding upon the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. This committee shall meet on Monday after the first Sunday in each quarter at time and place determined by the committee. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of this committee. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the churches.
- (6) Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall present a list of nominations to each office of the association to the annual meeting of the association.

ARTICLE IV. RULES OF ORDER

- **Section I.** The Moderator, or in his absence the Vice-Moderator, shall preside at all regular meetings.
- Section II. All business shall be conducted and all discussion shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.
 - Section III. The method of voting shall be by the will of the body.
- Section IV. A simple majority shall prevail in all cases, provided, however, that any member may at any time call for secret ballot on a doubtful issue.
- Section V. A ruling by the presiding officer shall be final unless appeal be made to the entire body present.
- **Section VI.** A question having been decided twice by vote in the same attitude at regular session of the Association shall not be reintroduced except by consent of the body, expressed by a majority vote.

ARTICLE V. ADOPTION

This constitution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

ARTICLE VI. REVISION

This constitution may be immediately revised at any session of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present or by a simple majority provided notice of such revision shall have been given at a previous annual session.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

ARTICLE VIII. TIME OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

Tuesday and Wednesday after first Sunday in October. Amended to Thursday and Friday after second Sunday in October.

RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS

of the

FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING

of the

SOUTH SANDY CREEK BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Morning Session

Thursday, October 15, 1953

The first session of the fourth annual meeting of the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association met in the Cameron Baptist Church. The Moderator, Rev. L. M. Dixon, called the meeting to order at 10:00 o'clock. Rev. C. V. Comer led in singing "My Faith Looks Up To Thee", and led the devotion.

2. The clerk called the roll of churches and a total of 91 was

counted representing 20 of the 22 churches. A later tally of the registrations, showed that 160 were present, representing all of the

churches.

The clerk was asked to present the program for the two-day meeting. This program was adopted, with the provision, that if necessary, changes would be made.

The Moderator introduced the new pastors in the association,

and recognized the visitors present.

5. Rev. Dixon appointed the Committee on Committees as follows: Rev. O. J. Hagler, Chairman, Mrs. Paris, Mr. H. C. Russell, and Rev. B. L. Maness.

6. Rev. O. J. Hagler gave the Stewardship & Mission Committee Report and the Evangelism Report, calling attention to these three phases of our work. He then introduced Dr. J. C. Canipe, Secretary of Evangelism of the State Convention, who brought us a very inspiring message on these phases of our work.

7. Rev. R. L. Beal gave the report on Christian Education.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

North Carolina Baptist are aiding in the support of seven different colleges, two senior: Wake Forest with an enrollment of 1714, including the schools of law and medicine; Meredith with 600 enrolled. There are five Junior Colleges with enrollments as follows: Mars Hill, 787; Gardner-Webb, 401; Campbell, 440, including 54 high school students; Wingate, 255, including 63 high school students; and Chowan, 192, making a total of 4,389. This enrollment including summer schools exceeded 5,000 for the year.

Approximately 10% or 422, of the total enrollment are ministeral students. In addition, there are some 300 student volunteers being trained for full-time Christian service.

The annual operation budget of these seven colleges is approximately \$4,000,000. North Carolina Baptist, through the cooperative program, makes available \$400.000 to aid these colleges in their operating costs, or exactly 10% of the total, a little less than \$100 per student for the year.

The most significant financial undertaking for the year 1953 is the effort to complete the raising of \$1,500,000 in the churches for the removal program of Wake Forest College. It is hoped this goal will be

reached by January 1, 1954.

One sees then, an expansion of facilities in all these institutions to provide for an increasing enrollment from year to year. Need we be reminded that these institutions and the funds for their support are only means to the end of training more capable Religious leaders and Christian citizens to take their proper place in our Churches and society? "Let it be said to the credit of Baptists that although they have been pioneers in the support of public education for all the children of the state, at the same time they have been unwilling to look to the state for the training of their spiritual leadership." Let us pray that this will ever be due to the state of course and support of course. that this will ever be, due to our love and support of every young person in the scope of our association, state, nation and world.

9. A meeting of the Committee on Committees was called at this

time by the chairman.

10. Mrs. D. H. Parks gave the Historian's Report.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

During the Associational year there have been two pastoral changes. Rev. C. W. Walker resigned at Bethlehem to accept work_at David Church near Shelby and his successor has not been called. Dr. W. C. Holland of Southern Pines and Moderator of the Association resigned last spring to become pastor of the South Highland Baptist Church of Bessemer, Alabama. Recently Southern Pines has called Rev. Hoke Coon of Salisbury to succeed Dr. Holland.

There is much evidence of material progress in the churches. It is not our purpose to assess the spiritual progress in this report though

we are sure we have gained here as well.

BETHLEHEM has installed a central heating system in the church. A piano has been added to the equipment. The pulpit furniture has been renovated, a baptistry installed and the grounds of the Pastor's home landscaped. Also a Training Union is now functioning.

CALVARY has invested \$8,000 in a new building, bought new

hymn books, class room chairs, and pulpit chairs.

CARTHAGE renovated the sanctuary, adding new wall to wall carpet, painted the entire church outside and a part of the Sunday School building, vestibule, halls, etc. New choir robes have been procured. A General Electric water fountain has been installed. church experienced a good revival. Additions this year have totaled fifty.

CAMERON has cemented the basement and finished several Sun-

day School rooms.

COMMUNITY has called Rev. Grover C. Phillips as pastor.

EPHESUS expended \$1,000 building two new class rooms and is in the process of raising runds for two more.

FLINT HILL has improved the church plant at a cost of \$1,612.45.

A piano has been added to the equipment.

IVES MEMORIAL has added a new heating plant and hot water

heater at a cost of \$1000.

LEMON SPRINGS has new hymn books and eighteen new chairs. NEW HOME has a set of new hymn books. Attic fans have been installed.

RED BRANCH continued work on Sunday School rooms, installed three gas heaters, bought new pulpit chairs, and carpet for aisles. The

cemetery has been beautified.

ROBBINS raised about \$4,500 toward construction of a Pastor's home and applied asbestos siding to the Sunday School cottage in addition to painting at a cost of \$500.

ROSENDALE has installed a heating plant.

SOUTHERN PINES' new pastor, Rev. Hoke Coon has moved into the Parsonage and begun his work. The pastor's home has been remodeled and painted.

SUMMER HILL has been constructing a new building. The auditorium is almost finished and some class rooms are not yet complete. The heating system is yet to be installed. The amount spent on the building thus far is \$14,647.25.

cost of all this is \$2,300.

THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

With every passing year the value of the Cooperative Program as a plan for supporting ALL Kingdom enterprises is more and more apparent. The great need today is for our people in all the churches to know just what the Cooperative Program is and how it functions to carry the whole program of Jesus outside the local church to all the world. After this understanding must come the adoption of a worthy budget (perhaps only half of our churches in North Carolina have workable budgets) in which there is a proper balance of local gifts

Often we hear someone speak of giving TO the Cooperative Program—we do not give to but through the Cooperative Program in order that we may carry out all the work of Christ in preaching, teaching and healing in ALL the world. Truly, this is a plan whereby every member of a Baptist church can join every Lord's Day with all others in supporting every cause fostered by our State and Southern Baptist Convention—foreign missions, home missions, and State missions. This Convention—foreign missions, nome missions, and state missions. This means—schools and colleges, hospitals, preaching stations, student work, help on church lots, aid to nationals within our borders, orphanages, promotional work through the Sunday School and Training Union, the Brotherhood and W.M.U., etc. The division of the Cooperative Program dollar, percentage wise, not only allows us to become "workers with one another for God" but also provides for each phase of our work according to its needs and our willingness to be faithful stewards of our money.

Just now North Carolina Baptists are engaged in a Nine Year

and missions.

Just now North Carolina Baptists are engaged in a Nine Year Program of Advance which by utilizing the Cooperative Program will not only meet the annual operating expenses of our institutions but will provide for capital outlay for enlargement as well. This Program of Advance anticipates that two million dollars will be given through the Cooperative Program this year. Latest available figures (end of September) show that we are exceeding this amount by about 15%. The Advance Program envisions ever increasing gifts through the Co-operative Program until by 1960 we will be giving nearly 5 million dollars annually. To achieve this goal special financial campaigns by individual institutions will be eliminated (Wake Forest Enlargement and the Hospital Expansion programs are now being completed) and a larger proportion of our gifts in more and more churches adopting budgets must be undesignated and given through the Cooperative Program.

We believe, under God, that this is our best approach to obedience to the Master's command to take the gospel to all the world and that upon our faithful obedience we can claim his promised presence to the end of time.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

Each church in our association has an active Sunday School. Many members have been added to the churches from the Sunday Schools. The Sunday School enrollment has grown. Some churches have had a Vacation Bible School for the first time this past year. We are happy for the healthy growth of our Sunday School work this year.

It is a pleasure to report one standard Sunday School. Carthage has a standard Sunday School and they are proud of the fact that they have achieved a very worthy goal. Perhaps there are more Sunday Schools that will be working toward this goal as we begin a new year's work.

In December 1952, our moderator, brother Holland, called a meeting of all associational leaders. In this meeting it was decided to begin having our Associational Sunday School meetings once each month. The first meeting the fourth Sunday in January and each

fourth Sunday evening thereafter.

The first meeting was held in the Carthage church on the fourth The first meeting was held in the Carthage church on the fourth Sunday evening in January. We had a good meeting and fourteen churches were represented. Brother E. L. Spivey from Charlotte was the speaker and he brought a wonderful message, The February meeting was held in Aberdeen with the pastors and Sunday School Superintendents. At this meeting we discussed plans for the program of "A Million More in '54". Also at this meeting we appointed a committee of which our associate Supt., brother Thad N. Frye is chairman, to promote this program of work. The meeting in March, held in the Carthage church was devoted mostly to Vacation Bible School Work. Carthage church, was devoted mostly to Vacation Bible School Work. Brother George Colgin from Mayodan brought a very inspiring message. The Fourth Sunday in April we met again in the Carthage church and this meetings was perhaps the most poorly attended meeting of the year. Only eight churches represented. Brother O. D. Moore from Salisbury gave us a very fine message.

In a meeting with the pastors of the association, we decided to postpone the monthly Associational Sunday School meetings during the summer months, due to the special all day services being held in

the various churches.

On Tuesday night Sept. 15th we had our next meeting, which was perhaps the best we have had this year. There were thirteen churches represented. His subject was "We Have The Message The World Needs". This message was the Highlight of the meeting. He gave us a challenge to start the greatest program of work ever undertaken by our denomination. His message centered around our theme for the year "A Million More In '54". We enjoyed his message very much.

It has been a very happy privilege for your Associational Supt. to work with the fine group of Associational workers we have had this year. The Associatte Supt. Mr. Thad N. Frye, Mrs. W. E. Ritter, Cradle Roll, Mrs. Earl Dowd, Primary, Mrs. O. J. Hagler, Junior, Mrs. C. C. McDonald, Intermediate and Rev. C. W. Walker, Adult, have done the biggest job and have performed the task well. May the Lord richly bless each pastor and Sunday School Superintendent and every member as we launch out into the the deep to reach "A Million More In 54" is my proper.

ORPHANAGE REPORT

Southern Baptists can look with pride upon its child care program. It has been through the efforts of Southern Baptists, to a great degree, that the commands of Jesus and the New Testament, in regard to caring for the little ones for whom there is none other to care, have been brought to bear upon the hearts of men and women of our land and especially in our Southland.

Today Southern Baptists have an investment in its child care facilities of over 21 million dollars. Twenty-four homes are maintained in the several states within the Convention. Last year over \$4,000,000 was spent meeting the needs of children who depend upon us and our

support for a home and a chance in life.

We of North Carolina, through the support of our people and under the leadership of Dr. W. C. Reed, are expressing our religion in the caring for hundreds of children each year. It is not the purpose of this report to deal in statistics because numbers never tell of the love, the heartache, the anxious moments, and the happy times of the individuals they represent. The best report to be given is that of Dr. Reed himself which is as follows:

"Again your Orphanage has moved forward in its ministry of Child Care. During the year we served a total of 728 children. In addition to this our Social Service Department helped to adjust 214 children with relatives and thus prevented them from having to be cared for by the Institution. Your program includes Mills Home of Thomasville; Kennedy Home of Kinston; Mothers' Aid, and Boarding Homes. The Baptists of North Carolina probably provide more services for children than any other similar group in the nation.

Practically all of our many children developed normally. There was verilittle sickness and none of a serious nature. In the schools at Thomasville and La Grange they were well adjusted, and their records compare favorably with the average of all other children in these schools. Twenty-four were graduated from high school in June. We believe they will make a worthy contribution to their generation.

We have been particularly pleased with the spiritual development in our two Homes. During the year fifty professed faith in Christ and were baptized. Another thirty accepted Christ as Savior, but were not baptized until early this year.

Added to our many other activities we have promoted the greatest building and renovating program in the history of the Orphanage. A new cottage, a new Print Shop, and a new Infirmary were completed in 1952. The I. G. Greer Recreational Building was finished early in 1953, and a beautiful new Church that will seat 580 people will be completed this year. Then we have completely remodeled some of the old cottages and made them into good living quarters for the children. This great building program was made possible by the money left to Mills Home in the will of the late Robert M. Idol. In my report next year I hope to be able to say that the Building and Renovating Program is finished. When this is done, I doubt if any Child Care Agency in America will have more adequate facilities than the Baptists of North Carolina.

The income for the year was good. It was slightly above the income for the previous year. Truly we can say, "God is good to us, and through North Carolina Baptists He has lifted the burdens from the shoulders of many of our fine boys and girls."

HOSPITAL REPORT

In Luke 9, 1-2, we read these words: "Then he called his twelve disciples together, and gave them power and authority over all devils, and to cure diseases, and he sent them to preach the Kingdom of God and to heal the sick". Many passages of scripture could be cited to show where Jesus engaged in ministering to the sick and afflicted, and where he gave his followers power and authority to carry on such work in his name.

Since 1923 Baptist of North Carolina have had an opportunity to help minister to the sick through the Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem. The Mother's Day offering gives to churches and individuals

an opportunity to help those who are the most needy. Every Baptist should join in this ministry to the sick. Many of the bed patients that are not able to pay, as well as those who come to the clinic, will be ministered to by your gift, whether it be large or small. Jesus only expects our best. Jesus said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, My Brethren, ye have done it unto me.'

We Baptist own the only denominationally controlled medical school and hospital in the World, Baptist Hospital and Bowman Grey Medical School, at Winston-Salem, N. C. They train around 200 doctors and about the same number of nurses each year.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR AGING

The youngest member of our Baptist family of institutions, the North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc., has had the best year since it began operating, March 16, 1951.

Resthaven, with space for twenty residents, has been filled to capacity. The number of inquiries for rooms has increased into the

hundreds.

The Home received its best financial support. The share received from the Nine Year Program (1952) was \$14.062.80; our first Special Day offering, February 15, exceeded \$52,000; and from indeviduals, churches, and auxiliary organizations we have received \$12,380.33, as of August 1st.

The response to the first Special Day offering for the Home was most encouraging. More than half of our 3055 Baptist churches responded. About seventy-five per cent of the amount came from the

smaller churches.

Considering the short time our Home has been operating (2 years), and the fact that this was the first opportunity to appeal to our churches for a special offering, all of us should be encouraged by the response. Cur next Special Day offering, February 21, 1954, should

amount to \$100,000.

On June 18, this year, property was purchased for a Branch Home at Albemarle. This property, consisting of a vacated hospital building and a nurses' home building and nearly three acres of land, was purchased for \$25,000. It will cost an equal amount to renovate the property. Even so, it is well worth twice the amount invested. Thus, we can care for 60 residents-20 at Resthaven, Winston-Salem; and 40 at the Albemarle Home.

At the time of purchase, it was hoped that the branch home would

be ready for operation by October 1, this year.

The general health of the residents has been exceptionally good, considering the range of their ages, 66 to 93. There has been only one death this year. The spirit and the general attitude of the residents have been most satsifactory.

There are many evidences of increasing interest in our Homes. Pastors, conducting worship services, have brought delegations from their churches to share the inspiration of worship with our residents. Auxiliary and Sunday school groups have frequently visited us to conduct devotional services. Gifts of supplies and cash are often received

from these various organizations.

Plans for the future enlargement are encouraging. With a general Special Day offering in February, 1954, and other special gifts from individuals and corporations, we should be ready to begin construction of our administration building, which would give us room for fifty additional residents, and making our total capacity 110 residents.

Since North Carolina Baptists new number more than 700,000 members, with thousands of our constituency now over 65 years of age, we should keep in mind the great number of our elderly brethren who need a home to provide security, comfort, congeniality, and a Christian ministry. Our North Carolina Baptists are able to meet the challenge to make adequate provision for the aging, and as "laborers together with God", we can meet it.

W. M. U. REPORT

The annual meeting of the Woman's Missionary Union of the South Sandy Creek Association was held in the Robbins Baptist Church April 17, 1953. At this meeting several new associational of-

ficers were elected.

Looking at the records for the past year, we see some gains but many needs for improvement. There are now fifteen societies with a total membership of four hundred seventy-five. Two new societies were reported, one at Piney Wood and one at Red Branch. Members who contributed through the Cooperative Program total three hundred seventy-one and the number of tithers is one hundred ninty-nine.

Young Peoples Organizations have grown and we are especially thankful for the increase in new organizations and fine work which all are doing. There are none Sunbeam Bands, ten G. A.'s, four R. A.'s and three Y. W. A.'s. Total membership is three hundred forty-two. Aberdeen G. A. is A-1.

Weak points shown by our records are, too few subscriptions to "Royal Scrvice", our own magazine, not enough members contributing to missions through the cooperative program and seven churches with no W. M. S. or Young Peoples Organizations. This is our challenge

for the coming year.

Training in different phases of our work was emphasized at scheduled meetings which were well attended. First was the leadership conference held in Southern Pines, October 30, Mission Study Institute at Cameron on November 18, Community Missions Institute, January 20 at Aberdeen and Stewardship Institute at Vass on February 5. The

Young People held two R. A. Meetings in Carthage February 23-24, Y. W. A. Banquet in Carthage and a youth rally in Robbins June 22.

The Association was hostess to the Raleigh Division of the W. M. U. at the Carthage Church on October 7, 1953. This is the first time such a meeting has been held in this association and about four hundred women from Pinebluff to near the Virginia state line were present. A most inspirational program was led by Mrs. Charles Howard, Divisional Superintendent. Guest speakers were Miss Mary Lee Earnest of Hawaii, Miss Ruth Provence and Miss Marie Epley from the state W.M. U. Office. This was a large task for our small association but the women of all the churches responded in a wonderful way and we received a special blessing from this meeting.

REPORT ON SOCIAL SERVICE AND CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS

Paul Ramsey on his recent book on BASIC CHRISTIAN ETHICS states in his opening sentence, "The first thing to be said concerning Christian Ethics is that it can not be separated from its religious foundation." There are many others who agree with this viewpoint. Robert J. McCraken of New York City writes in his recent book, "The Primary task of the churches is to preach first and foremost a gospel of moral and spiritual regeneration. It begins with the inside of the cup; it begins with the building up of character and then proceeds to the improvement of external conditions."

It is imperative to change the individual but we must not stop there. Wilberforce asks, "Shall we rescue individual slaves and leave the slavery system intact?" Another asks, "Shall we reclaim individual drunkards and do nothing about the liquor traffie?" In that graphic description of the last judgment recorded by Matthew, Jesus clearly warns us against the neglect of our social responsibilities. after he had devided the people on the basis of their spiritual relationship to him, he judged them on the basis of the social fruits of their faith. "I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and ye clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me." Shall Christian citizens have nothing to say to their government when it destroys food to enhance profits while millions of their fellowmen die of starvation? While thousands languish in prison shall we do nothing about the immoral conditions in society that placed them there?

Long enough we have lived in a guilded haven of spiritual privilege scaled off from the world because of our unholy fears that we might become a part of it. Yet there are many among us who are afraid of the very term social when used in connection with Christian teaching and practice. In fact it is too often true that when one mentions the term in this connection he is liable to be branded as a liberal or a modernist or even as an infidel. Such opinions are the result of

a very limited understanding of the full import of the gospel and of the whole message as revealed in the Bible. We have only ourselves to blame for these limitations in Christian knowledge among our people. Through the years we have given only a partial emphasis to the full gospel. We have preached with fervent urgency the NEW BIRTH, but we have not proclaimed with proportionate emphasis the moral responsibilities of the NEW LIFE.

Even in our great denomination, one that puts a strong emphasis on spiritual religion, there is a woeful lack of the social fruits or religion in the lives of our people. In spite of our growth in membership, the increase in our gifts, and the vast expansion of our material facilities. We are grieved by the moral laxity of our people on every hand. We are shamed by he parade of evil in our streets. We are appalled at the increasing number of homes broken by divorce or desertion. We stand aghast at the waste and ruin of lives by alcohol. We are indignant at the invasion of our homes by the bold and deceiving advertisements of the liquor interests. We tremble at the threatened loss of our liberties when political expediency expels justice and the constitutional privileges of our citizens are denied.

If we adopt this report may we do so with the understanding that we will begin now to more fully develop within our people an awareness of the ethical content of the gospel and the social responsibilities of the Christian life.

The frightful harvest of crime and moral delinquency is cultivated by immoral conditions within our communities. If we are ever to do anything at all to change these conditions the Christian people of our churches must get into action as responsible citizens.

The Christian approach to the subject of Race Relations must take into account three fundamental considerations. One of these is the recognition of the dignity and worth of man created in the image of God. Another is the place provided for every man in the plan of God. The third is that every man is included in the love of God. In the light of these Scriptural teachings we should examine the political, economic, and civic patterns of behaviour in our relations with people of all groups.

As a nation we are committing suicide by use of alcohol. Several years ago Samuel Zane Batten wrote a book under the title, "If America Fail." In his closing enapter were these words: "Nations are not destroyed by causes from without; They perish from causes within. Nations do not die; they commit suicide." The enemy that poses the greatest threat to the peace and security of our country is alcohol. It claims an undeserved place of honor in the economic life of our nation because it pays large revenues. But for every dollar of liquor revenue received we pay ten dollars for crime, wrecks, and liquor damage. Added to this bill is widespread moral degeneracy and ruin of life for which liquor is responsible.

There are isssues within our nation and throughout the world on which our people must be better informed and girded for action. One of these issues lies in the ominous fact that the freedom of religion in the United States is in danger of being lost to us. This danger comes from several sources. One is our failure to teach our people the Scriptural foundations of religious liberty. Another is the persistent attack by the Roman Catholic hierarchy on the American principle of the separation of church and state. A third is that frequently there are

leaders in high and responsible places who act on political expediency

instead of constitutional law and principle.

Harold E. Ingraham of our Sunday School Board often says, "It takes a long time to say hello to Southern Eaptists." This is particularly true when we are dealing with a subject on which so many of our people are not on speaking terms. Your writer would urge that we get on speaking terms with this great subject of SOCIAL SERVICE AND CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS, and that we preach and teach, from pulpit and pew, by voice and vote, the full implications of the whole gospel of Christ.

Constitution and By-Laws

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the gospel, and to co-operate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section I. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Missionary Baptist Churches which shall support the causes fostered by the Southern Baptist Convention, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and this Association.

Section II. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of (1) all officers of the Association, including the Executive Committee; (2) all pastors of member churches; (3) three messengers from each co-operating church with a membership up to one hundred and one additional messenger for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger who is not a member of a church co-operating with the Association, and messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A co-operating church shall be one that supports any object of the Eaptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Section III. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership shall be referred to a committee which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith, and practice. Upon a favorable report of the committee, the church may be admitted as a constituent member by a majority vote of the mesengers at the annual meeting, or, if application is made between sessions of the annual meeting, by a majority vote of the Executive Committee. The church so received shall agree to come under the watch-care of the association for a period of one year. The church shall have all privileges of the association except that of voting for the first year.

Section IV. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a majority of the churches.

Section V. Voting in the Associational meeting shall be limited to the duly elected messengers or their alternates.

Section VI. The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

ARTICLE III. CONSTITUTION

Section I. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational Woman's Missionary Superintendent. These officers shall be elected at the annual meeting. However, the WMU Superintendent shall be elected by the women of the Association at the annual WMU meeting. They shall assume their duties upon adjournment and continue in office until their successors are installed.

Section II. The Moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than two one-year terms in succession.

Section III. There shall be the following standing committees:

- (1) Committee on Committees. This committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of the committee to place in nomination personnel of such standing committees as are herein provided or deemed necessary from time to time; it shall also name committee on resolutions, reception of churches, place and preacher.
- (2) Committee on Ordinations. This committee shall examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate.
- (3) Missions Committee. It shall be the duty of the Missions Committee to sponsor a program of missionary education in the churches and to sponsor and supervise the work of an Associational Missionary.
- (4) Program Committee. The Program Committee shall plan the program for the annual meeting of the Association well in advance.
- (5) Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the active pastors and two members elected by each church who shall act for the association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding upon the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. This committee shall meet on Monday after the first Sunday in each quarter at time and place determined by the committee. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of this committee. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the churches.
- (6) Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall present a list of nominations to each office of the association to the annual meeting of the association.

ARTICLE IV. RULES OF ORDER

Section I. The Moderator, or in his absence the Vice-Moderator, shall preside at all regular meetings.

Section II. All business shall be conducted and all discussion shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

Section III. The method of voting shall be by the will of the body. Section IV. A simple majority shall prevail in all cases, provided, however, that any member may at any time call for secret ballot on a doubtful issue,

Section V. A ruling by the presiding officer shall be final unless

appeal be made to the entire body present.

Section VI. A question having been decided twice by vote in the same attitude at regular session of the Association shall not be reintroduced except by consent of the body, expressed by a majority vote.

ARTICLE V. ADOPTION

This constitution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

ARTICLE VI. REVISION

This constitution may be immediately revised at any session of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present or by a simple majority provided notice of such revision shall have been given at a previous annual session.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

ARTICLE VIII. TIME OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

Tuesday and Wednesday after first Sunday in October. Amended to Thursday and Friday after second Sunday in October.

RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS

of the

FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING

of the

SOUTH SANDY CREEK BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

MORNING SESSION

Thursday, October 14, 1954

- 1. The first session of the fifth annual meeting of the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association met in the Ashley Heights Baptist Church. The Moderator, Rev. O. J. Hagler called the meeting to order at 10:00 A. M.
- 2. Rev. W. Ray Gosnell, Pastor of the Host Church led the Morning devotion.
- The clerk called the roll of churches and a total of 115 was counted representing 18 out of 22 churches. Six visitors were counted at this time making a total present of 121.

4. Rev. Zeb A. Caudle, from the Home of the Aging at Albemarle was recognized to say a few words about the Home, because he could not be with us at the time allotted on the program.

5. Rev. Eugene Deese presented the report of the Program Committee. The Program that they recommended was adopted with the

provision that changes be made as needed.

6. The Moderator appointed the Committee on Committees as follows: Rev. B. L. Maness, Mr. E. D. Hicks, Mr. Vivian Green, Mrs. E. T. Parham and Mrs. Nettie Thomas.

7. The Moderator introduced the new pastors in the association.
8. Rev. Eugene Deese gave the Report on the Cooperative Pro-

gram.

THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The phrase "Cooperative Program" is one that is rapidly approaching universal use among Southern Baptist church members. We hear the term, and yet find that often we are not aware of its deep implications. This program is one that enables us to sit at home and yet play an important part in shaping world conditions. It is as a giant river with its tributaries extending into all parts of the needy world. As we give our money, we are giving "coined person", as someone has said. That means that the giver becomes a preacher, a teacher, a missionary, a doctor, and a participant in all the other areas of our work.

Exactly how do I help with my money through the Cooperative Program? The little pamphlet issued from our State Office in March 1954, sets forth nine ways in which we share through this program.

- 1. I help support 900 missionaries of the Foreign Mission Board.
- 2. About 1,000 missionaries of the Home Mission Board.
- 3. Some 100 missionaries working in various parts of North Carolina through State Missions.
- 4. The purchase of lots for new churches.
- All departments of the State Mission Program with its eighteen activities.
- 6. Helping to provide an education for some 6,000 students in our seven Baptist colleges and some 5,000 students in our six seminaries.
- Our Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem and the Southern Baptist Hospital at New Orleans.
- 8. North Carolina Baptist Homes with its two projects.
- 9. And beginning in 1955 our Orphanage with its 700 children.

There has not yet been devised a program which is so effective in channeling the offerings of the individual worshipper and church into all the world, as our Cooperative Program. Cooperation is its central theme. We bring our tithes and offerings to God, through the church; and they go out into every part of the world. No individual could handle this alone without serious complications. The offerings of all of us merged together can provide for great and effective programs of work in the Kingdom.

Last year in this association we gave \$7,429.49 through the Cooperative Program. This year we gave \$7,879.78. This is an increase but

not one of which we can be proud.

the Cooperative Program into the total budget on a percentage basis, rather than for a certain number of dollars. Once we do this, the percentage can be raised from year to year, and one day our church can achieve a fifty-fifty balance in its expenditures.

REPORT ON OUR HOMES FOR THE AGING

N. C. Baptists have two homes for the aging, Resthaven at Winston-Salem, operating since March 16, 1951, and Albemarle at Albemarle operating since Dec. 7, 1953. Resthaven has a capacity of twenty residents, Albemarle of thirty-five residents. Any person sixty-five years of age, and with favorable recommendation from the pastor and church of which he is a member is eligible for admission.

There are three plans of admission: Life basis, if applicant has sufficient assets, in the opinion of the admissions committee, to discharge his expenses for his life expectancy, and will assign these assets to the Home; monthly pay basis, the Home charges \$100 per month for applicants received on this basis, \$10 per month of which is credited to the applicant's personal expense; Old Age Assistance, any aged citizen of North Carolina, having assets of less than \$600 is eligible for aid from the Authorities up to \$55 per month, if there are no relatives able to provide for his needs. The Homes will supplement this amount from funds of the Nine Year Program and Special Day Offerings. The Special Day Offering on February 21, 1954 amounted to \$65,000 to \$70,000. \$21,000 was received as the share of the Homes from the Nine Year Program last year. Another source of support is wills.

A tract of 34 acres just outside Winston-Salem was purchased in 1953, costing \$25,000. Plans are in the making to erect buildings on this site as money and circumstances will permit. The trustees intend to proceed with one building at a time, hoping to start the first unit within a year. Buying and renovating the Albemarle Home cost approximately \$100,000. It is thought that, with the equipment donated, the property there is now worth \$300,000.

The most encouraging progress has been in the response of the churches.

It is recommended: that an Associational representative for these homes be elected at this session, and that each church of this Association be urged to plan a special offering for the homes in February.

The age range of the residents in our homes is from 67 to 94 years. Among these residents no death has occurred within the past year. In the history of these homes, not a resident has withdrawn because of dissatisfaction with the type of life in our Homes. The residents and all who are serving in the homes are deeply grateful for the help received thus far, and covet the prayers and continued support of our Baptist constituency in the days ahead.

- 10. Rev. Eugene Deese presented Dr. M. A. Huggins, who discussed the Cooperative Program and the Baptist Home for the Aging. After this very interesting and informative discussion of these phases of our work, both reports were adopted.

MINISTERS' RETIREMENT PLAN

1. Purpose

The purpose of these plans, promoted by the Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and the State Convention, is (1) to provide annuities for ministers and church employees who participate in the plans when they reach retirement age, sixty-five, or at any period they may retire after reaching that age, and an annuity to the widow; (2) to provide a disability annuity if such disability occurs at any time prior to age sixty-five.

It is so designed that each church a pastor serves during his participation in the plan has a share in providing something for his old age. If it is good to provide for pastors in their old age, it would seem good for all the churches he serves during his ministry, whether they be five or twenty-five, to have some share in providing an annuity for him. This is exactly what the Ministers Retirement Plan does. In this way the burden of caring for a minister does not fall on the last church served. Surely this is right,

2. The Cost

Dues are payable monthly or quarterly, in the middle of the period and are as follows:

The pastor pays 4% of his salary.

The church, or churches, pay 4% of his salary, or an amount equal to that paid by the pastor.

The Convention adds to that amount.

During any one year then there is laid aside to build up an annuity an amount equivalent to about 9% of what a man receives in actual salary, exclusive of any amount he may receive for a home. This means that while about 9% of the salary a pastor receives is laid aside for payment of annuities, he pays only 4%, if his churches join with him in this plan. Of course the Convention will join with him if the churches agree to do so.

Funds are handled by our own Relief and Annuity Board and nobody makes a cent of profit out of it; and all amounts earn interest.

3. BENEFITS

1. Disability: If before reaching the age of sixty-five a pastor becomes apparently and totally disabled, an annuity is paid in proportion to the salary upon which he has paid while participating in the plan, such disability not to exceed in any case more than \$500 a year. Since the disability annuity is 25% of the salary a man pays on, not to exceed \$500, a man receiving \$2,000 and paying on that amount would receive just as much as a man paying on a salary of \$3,000 or \$4,000. If after becoming disabled one should recover his health, he may reenter the plan without surrendering his age retirement benefits.

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

Christian literature does not need defending; it needs more distribution and wider reading. Never before have Baptists had such opportunities as today to magnify and promote the Lord's work through vital Christian literature. The printed page is powerful; its influence is universal. People tend to become like the things they read and absorb in their minds and hearts. The flood of bad literature has spread over our land, with almost every news stand, drug store, bus station, and even grocery stores, selling objectionable comic books, bad magazines, lurid books and periodicals that the U. S. Mails refuse to carry. This bad literature very often finds its way into Baptist homes, and its pages are filled with the seeds of evil. Wider reading of good Christian literature would soon destroy the thirst for the bad. Baptists have a great opportunity—to provide the best reading matter they can get for their homes.

Baptists have compelling reasons for securing and reading Christian literature, especially from their own presses. The aim of it all is to promote Bible study, to build Christian character, and to inform, enlist, indoctrinate, inspire and unify our people in all the great work the Lord has committed to us. Dr. M. E. Dodd said: "A non-reading Baptist is a non-informed Baptist. A non-informed Baptist is a non-interested Baptist is a non-cooperative Baptist, and a non-cooperative Baptist is not much of a Baptist."

We as Christians should sponsor the reading of religious literature. We want to read, first of all our Bible. We are glad to know that the Bible remains the best seller. Our denominational papers are invaluable in all our denomination work. To be well informed in all phases of Baptist work, we recommend three publications: "Biblical Recorder"—our state Baptist paper, "Home Missions"—our magazine on missions in the Southland, "The Commission"—which deals with Southern Baptist missions on a worldwide scale. We would advocate the reading of "Charity and Children"—our orphanage paper. Certainly we want to read and use Sunday School and Training Union literature published by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, and the W. M. U. magazines in the W. M. U. work. In this way we can help create a desire for things which stimulate the mind, strengthen the spirit, thereby diverting the things which would ruin the character and destroy the soul.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

Beginning of the year 1953 and 1954, Southern Baptist accepted the greatest program of Sunday School work ever undertaken in its history. The challenge went out to all churches in the convention to add a Million new members this year. The goal for our state was 115,000. Our goal for the Association was 751. When all reports are in we

are looking forward to a good showing from our association. However there are several churches that may not show a net gain in enrollment and some may show a loss, due to the fact that they revised their enrollment after making their associational report last year. Some churches had reached their goal two and three months before the end of the associational year. I feel sure that a large number of our churches will reach and some will exceed their goal.

Our Associational meeting held in Carthage in April, which we called our check up meeting, was a very inspiring meeting. We did not get a report from all the churches as to the number of new members enrolled the first six months of the associational year, but we did receive a report from most of them. These reports showed we had gone just a little over half way toward our goal. The reports received showed a gain of 436. This meeting was well attended, fourteen churches represented and a total of 68 members present. Brother Garland Hendricks from the Southeastern Seminary, Wake Forest, N. C., brought a wonderful message that was enjoyed by all.

According to reports received and information about some that did not send me a report, we had the largest number of vacation Bible schools in our Association this year that we have ever had. So far as we know there were sixteen schools and from the reports they were the best in quality of work we have ever had. Many of our churches are realizing what a wonderful blessing the Vacation Bible School can be, and we are expecting a new day in this phase of our work.

There has been a fine spirit in our Sunday School work this past year for which we are very grateful. Each superintendent has done a wonderful job in leading the work of the Sunday School in the churches. The pastors have been very fine in helping with the work and we pray Gods richest blessings on each of them We are laborers together with God. Our Sunday School is the right arm of our church; let us keep it active standing in the Master's use.

To say that the Training Union program has made great strides of progress would be untrue. The fact of the matter is that we have not. Progress has been noted. Not in "giant steps" as we might like, but "baby steps" which are, nonetheless, forward steps. We must learn "not to dispise the day of small things" and we must keep on keeping on. May we never forget that we are here today, In Christ, simply because 11 men did just that.

Two new Training Unions have been started this year. We trust that more of our churches will begin unions this year. The most urgent need of our association and associations throughout the Southern Baptist Convention is for churches whose members are "trained for church membership."

HOSPITAL REPORT

Teaching and Healing, two of the principal precepts of Christ's Ministry, are the main objectives of your Baptist Hospital, which together with the Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest College forms the Medical Center of North Carolina Baptists. The Hospital was incorporated in 1922 and received it's first patient on May 28, 1923. When the Hospital was first built it was an 80 bed institution, it was enlarged in 1942 to a capacity of 250 beds and 50 basinets. A Nurses Home, Out Patient Building, West Wing, Children's Wing, and laundry building have been added to the original plant. The Medical School was built adjoining the Hospital in 1941. The Hospital admitted 10,886 persons as bed patients and rendered a total of 92,476 days of patient care in 1953. The New South Wing is now being used as the construction is completed and the equipment is secured. This will increase the capacity of the Hospital to 4505 beds including basinets. The Hospital offers opportunities for professional education in other fields such as—School of X-Ray Technology, School for Nurse Anesthetists, School of Laboratory Technology and students are now enrolled in the School for Medical Records Librarians.

The Wake Forest College Medical School was expanded from a two year to a full four year Medical School in 1941 and renamed the Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest College.

The Hospital is the property of North Carolina Baptists and is the concrete expression of their desire to help people fine wholeness of life through the healing Ministry. As a religious institution the hospital provides a staff of religious workers. Patients and their families are visited daily by Chaplains. A religious program is provided for Nurses and Medical students. Sunday School is conducted on Sunday mornings for children and adult patients. Vesper services are held two nights a week.

Funds received each year in Mothers Day offerings are used to help pay hospital expenses of those patients who can pay only a part of the hospital cost and for those who can pay nothing at all. Women's Missionary Unions provide linens and funds for the purchase of linens to be used in the care of patients. The hospital provided free service in the amount of \$527,299.99 in addition to free doctors care to needy

people in 1953. Free hospitalization for regularly ordained Ministers and Missionaries who devote their full time to the ministry is provided for through the Out-Patient Department. The Out-Patient Department is operated for the benefit of persons who are not financially able to pay the total cost of the Medical service. Visits to the Out-Patient Department numbered 49,205 in 1953.

And speaking of figures you might be interested in knowing that—an average of more than 160 babies per month are born at Baptist Hospital, with a total of 1,448 new citizens last year. 65,235 diagnostic X-ray films were made and 2,425 X-ray therapy treatments were given in 1953. The mailman brings 135 pounds of mail to the Hospital and Medical School in a single day. It takes 17,000 pounds of coal per day. The Nursing School has graduated 605 nurses since it was opened in 1923. The Medical School has graduated 402 doctors since it was opened in 1941. The dietary department serves 1,793 meals per day, 654,-569 per year. It prepares approximately 80 special diets and formulas for 45 babies each day. The daily food service costs about \$1,000.00 for such items as 80 pounds of bacon, 90 dozen eggs, 575 quarts of milk, 130 leaves of bread. An average of 15 operations are performed each day or 5,403 last year. The bookmobile makes 312 trips per year and circulates 3,600 books and 12,000 magazines to the patients. The pharmacy fills 185 prescriptions and floor orders each day. The laundry finishes 3,624 pounds of laundry per day, including 300 nurses' uniforms. The emergency room receives an average of 24 visits each day or 3,748 last year. It takes 606 employees to keep the work of the Hespital going each day.

Our hospital provides this type of service for persons who cannot pay for it, as well as for those who can pay in full. This is where our churches share in this ministry of healing. Our hospital has no money except what the patients pay and what we give. On Mothers Day we have the privilege of sharing with those who are sick and need our help. Unless we give generously, some will seek in vain for help at our hospital. Let this not be true because you and I have failed.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

The South Sandy Creek Baptist Association continues to show progress in all phases of its work. We list below some of the indications of this progress as gleaned from the questionnaire returned to the Historian. We note also growth in membership in the churches and in enrollment in the Sunday School and the Woman's Missionary Union.

THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF ABERDEEN has secured a new Pastor in the person of Rev. F. E. Deese, replacing Rev. Zeb. Caudle who became Superintendent of the Baptist Home at Albemarle. The church is now in the last stages of building a new parsonage valued at \$25,000. It is expected that this home will be ready for occupancy in November. A Training Union, Royal Ambassadors, Cradle Roll, and Extension Departments have been organized.

ASHLEY HEIGHTS CHURCH has improved facilities by providing rest-rooms at a cost of \$1,200.

BETHLEHEM has secured as Pastor Rev. H. P. Chaffin who is now living on the field. Funds are being raised to install hardwood floors in the auditorium.

CALVARY CHURCH has added to its equipment in providing heating plant, hymn books, and additional chairs.

CAMERON BAPTIST CHURCH celebrated its Centennial this year, having been started on the fourth Sabbath in July, 1854 as Cranes Creek Baptist Church.

The history of the church was presented in pageant form by the

members of the church in celebrating this 100th birthday.

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF CARTHAGE has purchased an adjoining lot at a cost of \$5,000 and plans for erection of a new Educational Building are in the "talking" stage.

EPHESUS plans to add two Sunday School Class rooms in the near future. Heating equipment, pulpit furniture, and other chairs have been provided.

FLINT HILL CHURCH has added to the building, expending a little more than \$1,500.

IVES MEMORIAL is replacing the ceiling of the auditorium and have new hymn books.

LEMON SPRINGS is in the process of improving the church building and have purchased new hymn books.

PINE GROVE has had a change of pastors, J. C. Shaw having resigned. We were not informed as to who the new pastor is or if one has been called. Some improvement has been made to the church building.

PINEY WOOD has ordained two candidates for the ministry. Hymn books have been purchased.

SUMMER HILL CHURCH continues the work of erecting a complete new church plant—\$20,000 having been expended thus far.

SOUTHERN PINES redecorated the sanctuary and provided additional furniture for the Educational Building.

RED BRANCH is slowly but surely completing the building and remodeling program undertaken some time ago. A splendid revival meeting has been experienced with eleven additions to the church. The Sunday School has grown and this church exceeded its goal for the "Million More for '54" Program.

ROSENDALE CHURCH has a new Pastor—Rev. Lester English and class rooms have been added at a cost of \$2,320.44. New hymn books have been purchased.

THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH ROBBINS has built a new Pastor's home at a cost of \$16,000.

VASS has improved the heating system.

NEW HOME CHURCH has had a change in pastors but no information was given as to who the new Pastor is.

The report was adopted.

HISTORY OF CAMERON BAPTIST CHURCH

On the fourth Sabbath of July in the year 1854, in a small community 2½ miles southwest of Cameron, eight people were gathered together for the purpose of organizing a Missionary Baptist Church. This church was named the Crane Creek Baptist Church. There were eight charter members. The first roll records 37 members. A later record includes 73 white members and 37 colored members. The negroes then were slaves and worshipped in the churches of their masters in an area set aside for their use.

Records show that after the Civil War and the Emancipation Proclamation that there was unrest among the colored members, and some withdrew fellowship, but some remained with the church until the year of 1882, when they withdrew to organize their own church.

In December 1891, the church was called into conference, and it was unanimously voted to move the church to Cameron.

In January of 1892, the church held its first service in Cameron. There was no Baptist Sunday School at this time, and the Baptists attended the Presbyterian and Methodist Sunday Schools.

In February 1892, the church made plans to build its first meeting house in Cameron. This was a building 45 ft. long, 30 ft. wide, and 16 ft. in height, with Gothic windows and door. Sunday School rooms were added in later years.

In 1901 a Sunday School was organized. Twenty people were enrolled.

In 1901 a Woman's Missionary Society was organized. This organization has, like the Sunday School, maintained an active organization, growing steadily, now having three Circles, a Y. W. A., a G. A., R. A. Chapter, and Sunbeam Band, with a total membership of 76.

In 1903 the B. Y. P. U. was organized. This organization has at times been very active and served its purpose with great success. Some of the present church and Sunday School leaders can attribute their training in leadership to this organization.

In 1943 a fund for the construction of a new house of worship was started. Due to a change in the field it became necessary for the new field to build a parsonage, and this fund was in 1947 diverted to building a parsonage.

In January 1952, the present building was begun. The first service in our present building was Sunday School on the morning of July 6, 1952. Our first worship service was on the evening of that same day.

In looking into the past one attributes the progress made thus far in the first one hundred years to loyal and dependable members, members whose own wills often have been sublimated to the needs of the church. In their devotion they have understood its purpose. They have devoted themselves to this purpose in an untiring manner. This devotion has sustained it through difficult periods. The influence of the church for Christ has touched innumerable lives and distant countries the world over.

Many of us celebrating this occasion will not even be remembered 100 years hence. But the work that we do in the present, the training that goes on in our church now may easily foreteil the future for the young ones who follow in our footsteps. It is our task "to serve the present age, our calling to fulfill, and in it all our powers engage to do the Master's will".

THE W. M. U. REPORT

"Declare his glory among the nations, his marvelous works among all the people." This has been the guiding purpose of Womans Missionary Union of the South Sandy Creek Association for the past year. Let us remember that the object of our Union is to distribute Missionary information and to secure the earnest cooperation of women and young people in the giving of themselves and their money to the mission program. This is sought through prayer, Bible study, mission study, community missions, stewardship, and the fostering of organizations for young people.

Trained leadership is necessary and our women have responded in a wonderful way, attending the conferences planned for the year. Mrs. Ferrell Brown led the Community Missions Institute at Bethlehem, Nov. 17, with the State Chairman, Mrs. Alton Greenlaw, as guest. Mrs. James Veasey was in charge of the mission Study Institute in Southern Pines, Jan. 22. Stewardship was emphasized by Mrs. William Dale at Taylors Memorial on Feb. 15. A Y. W. A. Banquet at Cameron in February, a youth rally at Aberdeen in June, a Sunbeam Rally at Southern Pines, and a R. A. day-camp at Ellerbe led by our Young Peoples Leader and her counselors were highlights in the young peoples' activities.

We are glad to welcome Taylors Memorial into our W. M. U. Family, they also brought a G. A. and a R. A. with them. We now have sixteen W. M. U.'s, and twenty-six young peoples organizations with a total of 909 members. We have two new Sunbeam bands, three new G. A.'s one new R. A. There were 464 members giving through the cooperative program. Sixty-six are enlisted as new tithers. In mission study there were sixty-five classes held with 452 members taking part. Special offerings to missions totaled \$2,059.28.

In anticipation of the Evangelistic Crusade, we are conscious of the great number of unsaved in our communities. We seek to minister to those in need whether in body, mind or spirit, with the aim always to be soul-winning. We see six churches in our group without a W. M. U. and fourteen with no young peoples organization, and we urge them to open their doors to the women to prepare for a larger service.

Jesus saith unto him, "Have I been so long time with you, and yet hast thou not known me, Phillip?" We know Him but have we made Him known? May we each one claim our watchword for ourselves and be "Laborers together with God."

ORPHANAGE REPORT

The South Sandy Creek Association is fortunate in having the Orphanage to meet the needs of our homeless and dependent children.

Christ said, "Suffer little children to come unto me for of such is the kingdom of Heaven."

The report as given by Dr. Reed is most commendable,

"It is always a privilege to report to our people the facts concerning their Orphanage. Again, through your generosity, we were able to care for about 700 children last year. The physical plants both at Mills Home and Kennedy Home are now in good condition.

At Mills Home the Recreational Center and the beautiful new Church Building were completed during 1953. Now for the first time in its history Mills Home has adequate places for its children both to play and to worship. The Church stands in the very center of the campus with its tall spire pointing heavenward. It is by far the most beautiful building ever erected at your Orphanage. As the children are led in worship by our pastor, there is a spirit of reverence which would thrill the heart of every North Carolina Baptist.

We are now about ready to let a contract for a new Church Building at Kennedy Home. This will be equally as beautiful (though not as large) as the one at Mills Home. It will enable us to meet the spiritual needs of the children far better than ever before. North Carolina Baptist should rejoice that special friends have made these Church buildings possible. They should also thank God that every effort is being made to see that their homeless children are privileged to grow up in a spiritual atmosphere.

CHARITY AND CHILDREN, your Orphanage publications, has an all-time high in circulation. We send out more than 46,000 copies each week. The subscription price is 60c per year in clubs of 10 or more to be distributed in your Sunday Schools. Surely every Church in our state will want at least ten or twenty copies of this splendid Baptist publication. It will keep you informed about your Orphanage as well as other phases of Baptist work.

The income for 1953 was good. Our Churches through the Once-a-Month offering and the Thanksgiving offering continue to meet the challenge of the homeless children in our midst. Truly God will continue to bless our people as they minister to those who can't help themselves. Our Savior said, "Whosoever shall receive one of such children in my name, receiveth me; and whosoever shall receive me, receiveth not me, but him that sent me."

Our new plan of Orphanage support should not be very different from the present plan. The Baptist State Convention voted for the Orphanage to come into the Cooperative Program beginning January 1, 1955. This gives any Church the privilege to send all its funds except the Thanksgiving offering through the Cooperative Program if it so desires. However, the General Board and the Executive Secretary of the Convention make the following recommendations: First, that Churches that now take the Once-a-Month offering continue this plan. Second, that Churches which have the Orphanage in the Budget for a certain amount be encouraged to continue this same method during the period of transition.

The Thanksgiving offering, of course, will be continued just as before. Each Church is urged to give the people a chance to make a Thanksgiving offering. Each person is urged to give at least One Day's Pay as a "Thank Offering" for the support of the dependent children for whom Baptist are responsible. These children are wholly dependent upon North Carolina Baptist for their chance in life. We must not, we will not fail them.

"We shall not forget the least of these who are our greatest in the future carrying of the Gospel to the uttermost part of the world."

Constitution and By-Laws

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the gospel, and to co-operate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section I. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Missionary Baptist Churches which shall support the causes fostered by the Southern Baptist Convention, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and this Association.

Section II. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of (1) all officers of the Association, including the Executive Committee; (2) all pastors of member churenes; (3) three messengers from each co-operating church with a membership up to one hundred and one additional messenger for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger who is not a member of a church co-operating with the Association, and messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A co-operating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Section III. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership shall be referred to a committee which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith, and practice. Upon a favorable report of the committee, the church may be admitted as a constituent member by a majority vote of the messengers at the annual meeting, or, if application is made between sessions of the annual meeting, by a majority vote of the Executive Committee. The church so received shall agree to come under the watch-care of the Association for a period of one year. The church shall have all privileges of the Association except that of voting for the first year.

Section IV. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a majority of the churches.

Section V. Voting in the Associational meeting shall be limited to the duly elected messengers or their alternates.

Section VI. The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

ARTICLE III. CONSTITUTION

Section I. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational Woman's Missionary Superintendent. These officers shall be elected at the annual meeting. However, the WMU Superintendent shall be elected by the women of the Association at the annual WMU meeting. They shall assume their duties upon adjournment and continue in office until their successors are installed.

Section II. The Moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than two one-year terms in succession.

Section III. There shall be the following standing committees:

- (1) Committee on Committees: This committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of the committee to place in nomination personnel of such standing committees as are herein provided or deemed necessary from time to time; it shall also name committee on resolutions, reception of churches, and place and preacher.
- (2) Committee on Ordinations. This committee shall examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate.
- (3) Missions Committee. It shall be the duty of the Missions Committee to sponsor a program of missionary education in the churches and to sponsor and supervise the work of an Associational Missionary.

(4) Program Committee. The Program Committee shall plan the program for the annual meeting of the Association well in advance.

(5) Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the active pastors and two members elected by each church who shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding upon the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. This committee shall meet on Monday after the first Sunday in each quarter at time and place determined by the committee. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of this committee. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the churches.

(6) Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall present a list of nominations to each office of the Association to the

annual meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE IV. RULES OF ORDER

Section I. The Moderator, or in his absence, the Vice-Moderator, shall preside at all regular meetings.

Section II. All business shall be conducted and all discussion shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

Section III. The method of voting shall be by the will of the body.

Section IV. A simple majority shall prevail in all cases, provided, however, that any member may at any time call for secret ballot on a doubtful issue.

Section V. A ruling by the presiding officer shall be final unless appeal be made to the entire body present.

Section VI. A question having been decided twice by vote in the same attitude at regular session of the Association shall not be reintroduced except by consent of the body, expressed by a majority vote.

ARTICLE V. ADOPTION

This constitution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

ARTICLE VI. REVISION

This constitution may be immediately revised at any session of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present or by a simple majority provided notice of shch revision shall have been given at a previous session.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

ARTICLE VIII. TIME OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The time of the annual meeting shall be Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October.

Spivey, State Mission Secretary, gave an enlightening talk on the Cooperative Program and the plan of integration of the Orphanage into the Nine Year Program of Advance through the Cooperative Program. He urged all churches to send all offerings for the Orphanage, whether special or through the Cooperative Program, through the Raleigh office in order that our State Convention might receive credit for the offerings.
- 7. The Brotherhood Report was presented by W. S. Taylor and was adopted by the Association.
- 8. After the singing of a beautiful song by Mrs. F. E. Deese, D. H. Coon delivered the introductory sermon. With Scriptural background of Luke 9:1-6, he brought an inspiring message on the theme "Modern Misunderstandings."
 - 9. The meeting adjourned for lunch and fellowship.

Thursday Afternoon Session

10. Following the singing of a hymn by those assembled, Thomas Wolfe led the devotion with Scripture reading and prayer.

- 11. The Orphanage Report, as prepared by Mrs. W. B. Cole, was read by the Clerk in the absence of Mrs. Cole. Miss Lucille Reed of the Baptist Orphanage gave an interesting discussion of the work being done by the Orphanage, after which the report was adopted.
- E. T. Parham gave the Report on Christian Education which was adopted following discussions by Dr. Sylvester Green of Wake Forest College and D. W. Amburn of Campbell College. Dr. Green stated that the cost of attending Baptist Colleges is less than state and other secular schools. Mr. Ambuun reported that space was the greatest need at Campbell. With over 600 students enrolled the school is filled to capacity. Both speakers emphasized the great need of space and advancements and the enrollment of students in schools where Christian training is ever outstanding.
 - All stood and sang "In The Cross of Christ I Glory."
- 14. The Training Union Report, as prepared by Mrs. Vernon Shields, was read by Mrs. E. T. Parham. This report was adopted after a discussion by James Morgan. Mr. Morgan stated our greatest challenge was to see that spiritual growth shall never lag behind material progress. Christian training is a must and a church with a Training Union has a keener interest because of wider knowledge of the Baptist program.
- The Association adjourned with prayer to meet the next day with Taylors Memorial Baptist Church.

Carpenter, unable to be with us at the time allotted on the program, was recognized at this time for a discussion of Religous Literature. He urged all churches to use the literature prepared by our Southern Baptist Convention and stressed the importance of the use of the Biblical Recorder and other Christian literature in our homes.

19. No Sunday School Report was given but Mrs. Myra Motley, associate to the State Sunday School Secretary, spoke on the work being done by our Sunday Schools. Her points of emphasis were:

Dr. McGee stated that the best of medical service was rendered at a minimum charge, but that the Mother's Day offerings given by our Baptist Churches to the Hospital covered only one-half the cost of free service rendered by the Hospital

21. J. D. Arey, Jr., gave the Home for the Aging Report which was adopted. Zeb A. Caudle of the Home for the Aging, Albemarle, reported that construction of a new building providing additional nousing space, offices, and administration facilities would begin soon.

22. Mrs. Jack Taylor presented the Woman's Missionary Union

Report and stated that the present enrolment of the W. M. U., including the Young People, is 1039 and that the total gifts to missions through special offerings the past year was \$2515.25. The report was adopted.

23. Miss Mary Jane Martin, Carthage, sang a solo with Mrs. R. B. Moore as accompanist after which Mrs. J. D. Franks of Wake Forest

delivered an inspiring missionary message. 24. The meeting adjourned for lunch.

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Friday Afternoon Session

25. The afternoon session convened at 1:45 following a very bountiful dinner served by the members of the Taylor's Memorial Church. All stood and joined in the singing of a hymn after which James Cooper led the devotional with Scripture reading and prayer. 23. S. E. Hannon brought the Report on Christian Literature which was adopted

The Report on Evangelism was given by O. J. Hagler. In discussion he explained that true evangelism includes the teaching of those we have enrolled to observe all things in the name of the Lord. The report was adopted.

29. Mrs. D. H. Parks read the Historian's Report indicating the progress and growth in the churches. The Association adopted the report.

A motion was made, seconded and carried that the Association adopt the same budget for 1955-1956 as adopted for the preceding year and that each church's pro rata share of the budget be figured on the basis of resident membership. - 32. The Digest of Church Letters was presented by the Clerk. The totals, as compared with a year ago, showed a gain of 200 in total Church Membership and a gain of 241 in total Sunday School enrollment. The "Total Gifts for All Purposes" and the "Grand Total Expenditures" were the highest in the history of the Association but the per capita Mission Gifts decreased. For the Association the per capita Mission Gifts was \$5.40 which means that on the average each resident church member of our Association gave only a fraction more than 10c each week to Missions for all causes!

REPORT ON THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Cooperative Program was adopted in 1925 so that special objects and programs would not continuously call on churches for special offerings. The purposes of the program are:

To allow Baptists to make an offering each Sunday. To achieve cooperation of all Baptists in all Baptist work.

To have a systematic method of the division of money among all Southern Baptists causes; local, state, and world-wide. Above all to make the name Missionary Baptists a living

reality.

Southern Baptists are growing in their support of the Cooperative Program. Although many churches still have no part in support of the program of world missions through the Cooperative Program, the number of such churches is growing smaller each year. There is an increasing awareness of spiritual need beyond one's own church and community.

Last year in this association we gave \$7,879.78 through the Cooperative Program. This year we gave \$9,009.75. For 1956 the suggested goal is \$13,020.00. With each resident member of this association giving 10c per Sunday through the Cooperative Program in the year ahead we would give \$17,160!

May every church include gifts to missions through the Cooperative Program in its budget for a certain percentage of the total budget, rather than for a certain number of dollars and may every church prayerfully consider increasing the percentage going to missions through the Cooperative Program each year.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

Fellow Baptists—I would like to speak with you briefly about the Brotherhood Movement in North Carolina. First—What is a Brotherhood? It is a Service Organization which seeks to harness and utilize the manpower in the Church and to provide an outlet for men to put into action those impressions for Christian witnessing they received while attending the various services of the Church. What are some of the functions carried out by this significant organization?

- 1. The Brotherhood offers a great Christian Fellowship to all of the men.
- 2. The Sponsorship of Royal Ambassadors and Promotion of the Man and Boy Movement.
- 3. The Brotherhood offers and endeavors to give every man in the Church a Definite Responsibility and service to render in undergirding and promoting the full Church and Denominational Program.
- 4. The Brotherhood seeks to lead the men to witness for Christ and win lost souls to the Savior.

It is my purpose here today to urge the Men of the Churches in our South Sandy Creek Association who do not already have a Brotherhood, to begin this new Church Year by joining in this fine movement. It will not only mobilize our manpower behind our entire Church Program, but it will encourage us and qualify us, as Churchmen, to move up from membership to positions of leadership.

How do we begin?

- Organize. The Pastor, Deacons, leading laymen should meet together and select a slate of officers: 1—President; 2—Executive Vice President; 3—Membership Vice President; 4—Program Vice President; 5—Chorister; 6—Secretary-Treasurer. Committee Chairmen: 1—Activities; 2—Worship; 3—Education; 4—Evangelism; 5—Stewardship; 6—Benevolence; 7—Boys (RA). These nominations should be presented to the Church Body for approval and vote.
- 2. Executive Committee Meetings—Executive committee consists of the 13 men selected above. They should meet monthly in the home of one of its members, rotating so they might have fellowship together in each of the homes. Devotional—Plan meetings and programs at least three months in advance.
- 3. Brotherhood Meetings. Should meet regularly at a given time (generally monthly). Supper, Devotional Period, Business, Program, Committee Meetings. Family night—Ladies Night at least once each six months.
- 4. Good Programs. Interesting, attractive, purposeful. Outside speakers, membership participation, R. A. boys.
- 5. Activities: A successful Brotherhood always has purposeful activities. These activities are planned at the Executive Committee Meeting. The Regular Activities Committee or the Brotherhood acting as a whole may carry on the activities under the direction of the Activities Chairman.

The Brotherhood is not a money raising organization. Do not take up collections. Churchmen should give directly to the church. The meals can be paid for by voluntary contribution or by nominal charges for them. Caution should be taken not to keep men away on account of charging for the meal.

Many program suggestions may be found in the Brotherhood Guide Sheet and other literature furnished by the State Secretary, Horace Easom of Shelby, N. C.

The Men of the Church represent a great source of power and the Brotherhood Organization is the tool with which to put it to its greatest service. I would like to congratulate the Flint Hill Church and the Southern Pines Church on their newly organized Brotherhoods. The Aberdeen Church is just entering into its tenth year in Brotherhood work. This makes three Brotherhoods in the twenty-two churches in the Association which is far below the State average. Let us work and pray that when next year we meet again, that we will be able to report many fine new Brotherhood Organizations in the South Sandy Creek Association. I shall be glad to help in any way that I can in bringing this about. I particularly urge each pastor and layman here to start the ball to rolling in his home church.

I urge that each church appoint one man to a Steering Committee to help in this work throughout our Association.

REPORT ON BAPTIST ORPHANAGE

Christ said:

"Suffer little children to come unto me for of such is the Kingdom

"A little child shall lead them."

How many times has this come true for many adults who were lost in sin? A young boy, eleven years old, wanted to be baptized but mother had not accepted Christ and never darkened the church doors, but carried or sent her children to Sunday School. From the persuasion of this son and also a younger daughter, aged 9, the mother has come to Christ to be with both children. The husband and father has received his faith in God.

Surely a little child leads them.

Our Baptist Orphanage is giving our homeless children as near a home life as possible. God created the home as a place for children to live as they grow into maturity. The best of institutions is a poor substitute for a good Christian home. However, our orphanage is doing its best to make as normal a home life as possible.

The fine spirit of the children shows the efforts of our orphanage

are not in vain. During the year our orphanage has cared for 713 children and helped in placing 600 children in foster homes.

Our orphanage publication, Charity and Children, continues to reach our people all over the state in ever increasing numbers. carries the message direct from the orphanage to more than 47 thou-

sand homes each week.

Special gifts have made possible the continuation of the building program. The new church building at Kennedy Home is almost completed. It is considered one of the most beautiful in the state. This will greatly help to meet the greatest single need of the 160 children who live there.

During the year the Broyhill Swimming Pool was constructed at Mills Home. This was a gift from the Broyhills of Lenoir, N. C. It

meets a very definite need in the lives of growing children.

In 1954 our income from the Churches was at an all-time high. The Baptist State Convention voted for the orphanage to come into the Cooperative Program beginning January 1, 1955. From the Cooperative Program it is to receive "That part of its support not otherwise provided for." Under this plan the vast majority of the Churches continue to send the Orphanage the Once-A-Month offering just as in the past. Some however, have put the orphanage in their Cooperative Program budget. It now looks as if about \$60,000.00 of our income this year will be through the Cooperative Program.

Under the new plan of support the Thanksgiving offering becomes

more important than ever before. Any future expansion of your Child Care program will depend largely upon this offering. Urge each person to give at least "One Day's Pay" to help the host of

homeless children who cannot possibly help themselves.

The true greatness of any group of people is measured largely in terms of the care, the training, and the religious attitudes it gives to "Well done, thou faithful servants," we will have to continue to minister to the homeless and helpless children in our midst. Our faith in the redeeming love and power of a merciful Saviour is all that stands between these little ones and utter destruction. We never have, we never will fail them.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The five seminaries of the Southern Baptist Convention are located as follows: Louisville, Ky., Fort Worth, Texas, New Orleans, La., Wake Forest, N. C., Berkeley, Cal. In these seminaries there were enrolled last year 5,543 students. In addition Southern Baptists contribute to American Bible School for Negroes at Nashville, Tenn., and Carver School of Missions at Louisville, Ky. Southern Baptists also operate 30 senior colleges and 21 junior colleges, eight academies and four Bible Schools. In these schools were enrolled last year more than 53,000 students, over 6,000 of whom were students for the gospel ministry, and over 2,000 of whom were volunteers for mission service.

North Carolina Baptists operate two Senior Colleges, Meredith at Raleigh, and Wake Forest at Wake Forest now but to be in Winston-Salem after June 1956, and five Junior Colleges, Mars Hill at Mars Hill, Gardner-Webb at Boiling Springs, Campbell at Buies Creek, Wingate at Wingate, and Chowan at Murfreesboro. In these colleges, 5,000 students were enrolled last year, 750 of whom were studying for the ministry. Through the Cooperative Program North Carolina Baptists propose to provide in 1955 an average of \$189 per student, or a total of \$945,000 which is for both capital outlay and operating costs. It sounds big until we consider that the total amounts to only about 3 per cent of the total amount given for all causes by the Baptists of our State this year.

Southern Baptists had a total investment in property and endowment as of March 1955 of more than \$180,000,000. Endowment and property valuation increased about \$16,000,000 over the year previous.

About 18 per cent of Southern Baptist students are in our schools. The chief danger in the fact of this low proportion of students in our colleges and seminaries is to our denomination itself because such a large proportion of our leadership in years to come, without the influence of Christian schools, may be reasonably expected to result in there being fewer dedicated leaders in those professions and occupations that have most to do with the intellectual, social, moral and spiritual betterment of mankind.

This report offers two recommendations. First that we, as Baptists in this Association strive earnestly to become better acquainted with our Baptist schools. Second, that we, as parents, give most thoughtful and prayerful attention to the choice of Christian Education for the young people of our own homes.

Personal testimonies of many who attend Training Unions prove its worth, not only for leadership training but also for spiritual growth through Bible study and prayer.

REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL FOR 1955

The N. C. Baptist Hospital was incorporated in 1922 and received its first patient on May 28, 1923. It is located on an eleven acre site

in the Ardmore section of Winston-Salem.

Originally built as an 80-bed institution, the Hospital was enlarged in 1942 to a capacity of 250 beds and 50 bassinets. A nurses' home, Out-Patient Building, new West Wing, Children's Wing, and laundry building have been added to the original plant. The Medical School was built adjoining the Hospital in 1941.

The new South Wing is now completed. There are 364 beds and 50 bassinets open. When renovations in the old buildings are com-

pleted this year a total of 400 beds and 50 bassinets will be available.

The Hospital admitted 13,609 persons as bed patients and rendered a total of 107,886 days of patient care in 1954.

Our Baptist Hospital fills an important place in the life and work of North Carolina Baptists. It will serve probably 50,000 patients this year, touching every area of our state.

In addition to this great host of sick people, our hospital provides

educational program for more than 450 young people who are in training to become nurses, doctors, technicians, pastors and other Christian workers.

The Department of Pastorial Care provides Christian counseling and guidance for the patients, students, hospital staff and personnel, as well as hundreds of others who come to the hospital from over the

state for this purpose alone.

It is not easy to estimate the value of these and other services rendered by our hospital to multiplied thousands of people of all ages in the fields of health, education, and spiritual guidance.

The cost of carrying on this program for such a multitude of people is tremendous-more than two million dollars a year. One-half million dollars of this is spent in helping to care for sick people who are not able to pay for the service they need. We are grateful to God for the privilege of sharing in such a work, and we want to thank the Churches of our Association for their part in it.

Every church in our Association except three made an offering to the hospital on Mother's Day. Total contributions for this special offering was \$881.82, a gain of \$49.20 over last year. If the three churches that did not make a Mother's Day offering this year had given the same amount as they gave last year we would have exceeded last year's offering \$136.70.

The opportunities for Christian service and witness through our hospital are truly great. We need to give it a much more generous support through our Mother's Day offerings and the Cooperative Program.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR AGING Associational Year 1955

The North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging began their fifth year of operation March 16, 1955. This has been a year of encouraging progress. Both Homes—Resthaven and Albemarle—have had a continuing waiting list of applicants. As soon as a vacancy occurs there are far more applications for admission than can be accepted.

This year will be remembered as one of notable enlargement of

facilities. Construction of the Administration and Residential Building, costing \$200,000, will get under way, and it should be completed by this time next year. The new building will provide office facilities, dining room, kitchen, chapel, infirmary, recreatonal and handicraft space, and rooms for forty additional residents, thus raising the total capacity of the Homes to 95 residents.

Two-thirds of the cost of the new building is now in hand, counting the value of real estate turned over to the Homes. Personal and corporation gifts are being received which will further add to the amount on hand.

Memorial gifts may be made in the following ways: A gift of \$300.00 will furnish a room; \$1,000 will endow—furnish and maintain -a room; \$3,000 will pay cost of building a room. In either case, a memorial plaque—bearing the name of the donor and the name of the person memorialized, or honored—will be placed on the door of a room.

Miss Nettie Pearl Willis gave her homeplace at Vale, N. C., as a memorial to her mother, Mrs. Laura Elliot Goode Willis. The property will be sold and proceeds be used to erect a cottage on the permanent site of our Homes. In addition, Miss Willis made her will in

favor of the Homes.

Increasing support on the part of our churches and denomina-Special Day Offering has reached almost \$70,000. Since many of the churches put the Homes in the budget instead of taking a special offering, and some of the churches wait until the end of the calendar year to send their gifts, a complete report for the year cannot be made at this time. But it is likely that our goal of \$100.000 for the special offering will be nearly reached. In addition, the Homes will receive \$39.850 as their share of the Nine Year Program, according to the cott. \$39,850 as their share of the Nine Year Program, according to the estimated budget.

With increasing aid from denominational sources, the Homes are helping a larger number who do not have sufficient funds with which to pay the cost of keep as residents. In fact, about ninety per cent of all the residents are being helped by the Homes—some with about two-thirds of the cost of keep, and others with about one-third. Less than ten per cent of the residents in the Homes have turned over enough assets to pay their cost of keep on the life plan. Regardless of financial condition, an applicant is received into the Homes on the basis of need and room available.

All connected with the Homes—staff and residents—are most grateful for the prayers and support of our friends. "Hitherto hath the Lord helped." Surely all North Carolina Baptists should be grateful for the progress made thus far. Let us all rally to the challenge to render a greater ministry to the increasing number of aging friends who need the services of our Homes.

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

In keeping with the thought of our theme, "Lengthen Thy Cords and Strengthen Thy Stakes," Isaiah 54:2, we should at this time give some serious thought to the reading and distribution of good sound

Christian Literature. The printed page has great power. It is a mighty force for good in promoting the Lord's work in the world. On the other hand, the printed word is a mighty power for evil in the hands of the devil. At the present time a vast flood of bad literature of all kind is flooding our land, promoting paganism, and all manner of worldliness. Much of our juvenile delinquency can be traced to the reading of "smutty magazines." Some of this bad literature is finding its way into Baptist homes. This should not be!

In Romans 12:21, we find these words "Overcome evil with good." Our most urgent need now is to lengthen our tent cord of promotion and strengthen the stakes of distribution. When the North Carolina Baptist Convention was formed in 1830, its main purpose, as stated in the Constitution, was "the promotion of missions, education, social service, and the distribution of sound religious literature."

No body of people in the world has a finer array of wholesome inspiring literature for all ages than the Baptists of the South. The aim of it all is to inform the people to indoctrinate in the fundamental truths of the Bible, and to point out the great sweep of Baptist work at home and abroad. Baptist people have the printing presses and publishing houses. They have inspired writers and able editors. Good literature must be **promoted**, used and read in our homes and churches, if the whole program of our Master is to be carried out by Baptist people working together.

The American Bible Society is an active partner with Southern Baptists in their world wide mission program. Believing that every person must have the Bible in his own language, more than fifteen million volumes of Scriptures were distributed last year, and 1,360,604 were donated to the armed forces. The American Bible Society publishes the Scripture without note or comment, and distributes them to all parts of the world, without profit and usually below cost. Southern Baptists gave this worthy cause last year \$112,064.00. If the American Bible Society is to carry out their enlarged program of missions this year, more funds will be needed. How much has your church given?

By persistent work on the part of our pastors, Sunday School superintedents, Associational workers, and representatives in our local churches, the circulation of the Biblical Recorder has reached approximately 61,000 each week. At present about 15,000 churches in N. C. receive the Recorder, either in Clubs or through the Everyfamily plan. We should do all possible to encourage the Everyfamily plan, or at least a good size Recorder Club in every church.

The CHARITY AND CHILDREN ought to be read in all of our Baptist homes.

We would recommend: First—that we encourage daily Bible reading in the home. Second—that we endeavor to put our two State papers, BIBLICAL RECORDER and CHARITY AND CHILDREN, in each home. Third—that we use and introduce to our people the many fine magazines, books, and other publications by the Southern Baptist Convention and the W. M. U.

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

On every hand come encouraging reports with reference to winning the lost to Christ. The past year will likely see more souls won among Southern Baptists than any previous year in our history.

North Carolina Baptists have not been laggard in this respect. On the basis of incomplete reports only Texas among the states of our Convention exceeds North Carolina in professions of faith during our recent Convention-wide Simultaneous Revival. More than thirty-five thousand men and women and boys and girls gave their hearts to the Lord Jesus during this special effort.

The South Sandy Creek Association has been busy in obeying the Master's command to go and make disciples. Nineteen of the twenty-two churches held at least one evangelistic meeting during the year and nine of the churches held two meetings. A total of 188 have been baptized into our fellowship. Only four of the churches failed to report additions on profession of faith. It is impossible to tell how many of the 188 reported were won during the Crusade. Certain it is that a large percentage came as a direct result of our Southern Baptist Program of Evangelism.

While we can feel that we have been busy about the primary task committed by our Saviour to the Church which He loved and for which He died, much remains to be done. So long as there is one lost person in all the world ours is the great responsibility and opportunity of seeking out that person and telling the Old Old Story of Jesus and His Love.

Our marching orders never change—"Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and the Holy Ghost. Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you, and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world.

"—ye shall be my witnesses both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea,

and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth."





Constitution and By-Laws

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the gospel, and to co-operate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section I. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Missionary Baptist Churches which shall support the causes fostered by the Southern Baptist Convention, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and this Association.

Section II. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of (1) all officers of the Association, including the Executive Committee; (2) all pastors of member churches; (3) three messengers from each co-operating church with a membership up to one hundred and one additional messenger for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger who is not a member of a church co-operating with the Association, and messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A co-operating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Section III. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership shall be referred to a committee which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith, and practice. Upon a favorable report of the committee, the church may be admitted as a constituent member by a majority vote of the messengers at the annual meeting, or, if application is made between sessions of the annual meeting, by a majority vote of the Executive Committee. The church so received shall agree to come under the watch-care of the Association for a period of one year. The church shall have all privileges of the Association except that of voting for the first year.

Section IV. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a

majority of the churches.

Section V. Voting in the Associational meeting shall be limited

to the duly elected messengers or their alternates.

Section VI. The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

ARTICLE III. CONSTITUTION

Section I. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Super-intendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational Wom-an's Missionary Superintendent. These officers shall be elected at the annual meeting. However, the WMU Superintendent shall be elected by the women of the Association at the annual WMU meeting. They shall assume their duties upon adjournment and continue in office until their successors are installed.

Section II. The Moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than

two one-year terms in succession.

Section III. There shall be the following standing committees:

(1) Committee on Committees: This committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of the committee to place in nomination personnel of such standing committees as are herein provided or deemed necessary from time to time; it shall also name committee on resolutions, reception of churches, and place and preacher.

(2) Committee on Ordinations. This committee shall examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and shall make such recommendations as

it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate.
(3) Missions Committee. It shall be the duty of the Missions Committee to sponsor a program of missionary education in the churches and to sponsor and supervise the work of an Associational Missionary.

(4) Program Committee. The Program Committee shall plan the

program for the annual meeting of the Association well in advance.

(5) Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the active pastors and two members elected by each church who shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of

the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding upon the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. This committee shall meet on Monday after the first Sunday in each quarter at time and place determined by the committee. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of this committee. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the churches.

(6) Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall present a list of nominations to each office of the Association to the

annual meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE IV. RULES OF ORDER

Section I. The Moderator, or in his absence, the Vice-Moderator,

shall preside at all regular meetings.

Section II. All business shall All business shall be conducted and all discussion shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

Section III. The method of voting shall be by the will of the body.

Section IV. A simple majority shall prevail in all cases, provided, however, that any member may at any time call for secret ballot on a doubtful issue.

Section V. A ruling by the presiding officer shall be final unless

appeal be made to the entire body present.

Section VI. A question having been decided twice by vote in the same attitude at regular session of the Association shall not be reintroduced except by consent of the body, expressed by a majority vote.

ARTICLE V. ADOPTION

This constitution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

ARTICLE VI. REVISION

This constitution may be immediately revised at any session of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present or by a simple majority provided notice of such revision shall have been given at a previous session.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

ARTICLE VIII. TIME OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The time of the annual meeting shall be Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October.

6. W. R. Gosnell was asked to present the new pastors. C. A. Kirby, Jr., Carthage; John Weatherman, New Home; Paul Gales, Unity Grove; D. E. Frye, Garners Chapel were called forward and appropriately recognized.

7. The Moderator announced that Billy Metters has been called

to Flint Hill Church.

8. C. A. Kirby, Jr., read the report of the Cooperative Program as follows and moved its adoption. Motion seconded.

THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

A report to the South Sandy Creek Association, October 18, 1956. The Cooperative Program was born at a time when there was a great financial burden in the Southern Baptist Convention. During this time our leaders came to realize that the convention did not have an adequate plan for financing our denominational work. After much prayer and deliberation the plan that we know as the Cooperative Program was adopted. We might ask ourselves the question, "What is the Cooperative Program?" The Cooperative Program is a means that we Southern Baptist have devised to carry out the full program of Christ in the world. It is the means by which we heal the sick in hospitals, at home and abroad. It is the means of housing dependent children, children from broken homes. It is the means of teaching thousands of young people in more than sixty schools and colleges, and five seminaries. It is the means of reaching men, women, boys and girls with the Gospel of Christ in North Carolina, in the Southland, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth. It is a plan for pooling our financial efforts to carry out the Great Commission of our Lord. During 1955 over thirty-five million dollars was given for all Cooperative Program work, both state and Conventionwide.

We like to think and to hear others tell us how well we have done, but have we done what we ought? The inevitable answer is, NO. While there is a church in the South Sandy Creek Association, while there is a person who is a member of a church in this association that fails to exercise his privilege of Bible stewardship, we have no reason to boast. Last year this association gave \$9,009.75, through the Cooperative Program. This year we gave \$10,670.00, but we spent many

times that on ourselves. There were some churches in our association who did not channel any money through the Cooperative Program. Is lack of concern the answer? WHEN WE CARE — WE WILL SHARE!

World Missions Year began October 1, 1956, and will continue through all of 1957. It is hoped that the proper observance of World Missions Year will enlarge our concern so as to increase not only our dollar but also our percentage gifts through the Cooperative Program.

It is our prayer that each church in this association will examine what they are doing in the light of what they should be doing for missions. We also pray that when this report is made at our annual association meeting next year that it can be said that every church gave through the Cooperative Program. A lost world is waiting to hear about Christ and thousands die each year who do not know Him, many have never even heard that He came. What part will we play in making our Saviour known to the uttermost parts of the earth? Only you can answer that question.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

Fellow Baptists—Let's take a few minutes and discuss the Brotherhood Movement in N. C. We are no longer a New Department in the State Convention but have become a major component numbering more than 1200 organizations in our more than 3,000 Churches in N. C. and embracing over 60,000 men in our membership. My purpose here today is to urge you men who do not have a Brotherhood Organization in your Church, to begin now. The fall of the year, when we lay down the record of the old Church Year and start on a new leaf is the time. Statistics show that more Church Brotherhoods are organized at the beginning of the Church Year and following the Annual Associational Meeting than at any other time. I would particularly like to sell each Pastor in the South Sandy Creek Assn. on this idea so that he can carry it to his men. The Church does not have to be large nor does the membership in the Brotherhood, so long as it embraces all of the men. Ten men can make a splendid organization. Men—gone is the day when our Church participation amounted to being in our places on Sunday morning and contributing to the financial support of our Churches. If we are to be good Churchmen and true Stewards of the Master, we must not stand with one foot in the door and the other out — we must come in all the way. We must mobilize our manpower and develop our leadership and the Brotherhood Organization is the instrument with which to do it. If we will take up the Challenge that is before us in supporting our entire Church Pro-

gram, we will be greatly blessed. Not only will we be encouraged in our Church work, but we will move up from positions of Membership to Positions of Leadership. I am particularly delighted that our State Secretary, Brother Horace Easom, could appear on our program today. He has promoted the remarkable growth our Brotherhood has shown in our State in the five years that he has served as our Secretary. We think of him as "Mr. Brotherhood" in North Carolina. Let us join hands with him and catch the vision of the Unlimited Opportunities that are before us.

He has been called to Union Grove Baptist Church, Montgomery Association for full time.

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Someone has said, "Tell me what you have read and I can tell you

a great deal about your character".

In our day of radios and televisions the printed word has not lost its power. It finds its way into places where the spoken word and sermons cannot be heard.

Bad literature is flooding our country on every hand and some of these bad books and questionable periodicals and magazines are find-

ing their way into our Christian homes.

Christian literature written in the light of the Bible is the finest and most inspiring reading in the world. No body of people in the world has a finer array of good wholesome literature than the Baptist of the South. You may be a Baptist without reading the "Biblical Recorder", "The Commission", "Home Missions", "Home Life" and other splendid publications, available to us, but you will not be a well informed Baptist, and you will be robbing yourself and your family of valuable information and inspiration by the failure to avail yourself of these perfectly splendid periodicals and magazines.

In this day when so much is being said about our young people and our responsibility to them, surely a word is in order about the reading and study materials available to them. "Ambassador Life", "Tell", "Windows of Y.W.A." are especially constructed with youth in mind, and many others of our publications have sections devoted to our young people and their reading needs and interests.

We are pleased to note that the Biblical Recorder is now going

into more than 62,000 homes each week, carrying information and inspiration to each member of the family. Every Baptist family should

take the Recorder.

When thinking of Christian literature, we must encourage the reading of the Bible, around which is clustered the finest literature of the ages. The Bible is the only book containing all the wisdom and knowledge needed to diagnose and prescribe for our sin sick world. In the light of God's Holy Word, let us read all the Christian literature that we can. "Thy Word have I hid in my heart that I might not sin against Thee".

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

North Carolina Baptist Colleges last year enrolled 5,921 students. This was second only to Texas. It is reliably predicted that, in the next twelve to fifteen years, this enrollment will double if we have room

for it to take place.

Great corporations and foundations are showing keen interest, not only in Baptist Colleges but also in all Church-related schools. Surely if business men can see the worth of Christian trained citizens to the extent of investing great sums of money in Christian Education, we, as Christians, cannot fail to add our very best efforts in advancing this

so great an undertaking.

The ever-increasing shortage of well-qualified candidates for teaching positions in our Christian Colleges is now being emphasized. Last December the Ford Foundation announced grants of more than five million dollars to twenty three Southern Baptist Senior Colleges. These grants will result in about a four per cent increase of salaries in these institutions. Also, by these grants public attention has been drawn to the worth, in the minds of astute business men, of the work done by Christian teachers. However, the increase thus offered is far from enough if more and more talented teachers are to be attracted

to this great field of teaching opportunity.

Each of the seven Baptist Colleges in North Carolina is engaged in expanding its building accommodations. This must go on if we even hope to meet the needs of our increasing number of Baptist students in the years ahead. Our colleges have not been overlooked by the great business foundations because the earnest efforts of North Carolina Baptists to provide for the needs of these schools has been noted. Perhaps, it is not unreasonable to suppose that further attention from the business men of our land to our schools will be drawn in proportion to the further sacrificial efforts which we as Baptist put forth in behalf of Christian Education.

Southern Baptists now have six colleges, four Seminaries, and the Carver School of missions and Social work which have voted to admit Negro students. In addition to these, there is the jointly operated

Seminary for Negroes in Nashville, Tennessee.

country today.

There has been wonderful co-operation from all the churches in the association this year and we are sure that proves our people are interested in Training Union. At the "M Night" meeting in December we had wonderful representations from the churches and this was true of all the other meetings of the Training Union throughout the year. A new Training Union was organized at Flint Hill in March and visits were made to several of the other Churches during the year. A survey was made of most of the Churches in the Association and a good portion of literature was sent to them.

Our prayer together is for Training Union to ever go forward in the work of our Lord Jesus Christ and live up to its name "Baptist

Training Union".

SOUTH SANDY CREEK ASSOCIATION SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT — 1956

The Bible teaches, "The entrance of thy Word giveth light" and that "The scriptures which are able to make thee wise unto salvation . . . , " hence, the importance of the Bible teaching ministry of the Sunday School.

Our Sunday Schools have proven themselves to be a great teaching, evangelistic, enlistment and financial agency of our churches.

This year our Association reports 22 Sunday Schools; 4,207 Sunday School enrollment; an increase of 4% over last year, with 16 Vacation Bible Schools.

The work in the Association was done with the aim of enlisting more workers in each Sunday School and to have more unity and cooperation among the churches which we feel is needed in this as-

We had two inspirational meetings during the year. At our first meeting we had Dr. Elmo Scoggin, a missionary from Palestine as our guest speaker. He spoke on "World Wide Missions." At our next meeting Dr. Stealy, President of Southeastern Seminary, Wake Forest spoke on "Christian Education".

The Sunday School emphasized the Vacation Bible School this year. The Association had a V.B.S. clinic at the First Baptist Church, Carthage. There were 16 churches represented, with 75 people in attendance for the day. We reported two "A" Bible Schools this year—

Carthage and Bethlehem.

To provide sufficient challenge and to enable us to check progress. the following goals have been set for 1956-57, by the Sunday School Department:

1. People — an enrollment gain of 40,000.

Ministry to child life — 2,900 Vacation Bible Schools. Better trained workers — 40,000 awards in 1,300 churches. 2.

Enlargement — 125 churches moving from class Sunday Schools to Department schools.

Extending the reach — 75 new Sunday Schools and missions. Efficiency — 66 Standard Sunday Schools and 10 Standard Associations.

As we see some of the needs of our Sunday Schools such as:

More teachers with a vision for the future.
 More consecrated and dedicated teachers.

. Better prepared teachers.

4. A vision for world wide missions — "Go ye into all the world baptize . . . teach."

May the Sunday School in each church grow spiritually as well as numerically as we each do our part.

REPORT ON THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Following the completion of the new south wing and the moving of a number of departments into new quarters, much of the original building which was constructed in 1923 had to be renovated. Most of this work has been completed, as is evidenced by the new waiting rooms for visitors and many other changes. Our Hospital is not only larger now, but it has the best facilities and staff to serve our people that it has ever had.

The new x-ray department is one example of improvement. Just recently, three new type machines have been installed at a cost of over \$30,000. A small concrete building is now under construction to house a cobalt machine, which is much more safe and much more effective in the treatment of certain types of cancer. No other Hospital in North Carolina has equipment equal to these new machines.

The Hospital now has a capacity of 400 beds and 50 bassinets, with greatly enlarged departments of surgery, x-ray, kitchen and

cafeteria, and other expanded facilities.

The Hospital admitted 14,918 persons as bed patients and rendered

a total of 115,300 days of patient care in 1955.

It is impossible to estimate the value of these services and facilities that are available to the people of North Carolina. Much of the money required to give these and other services comes directly from the churches of our association and the churches of the other associations in our State Convention. Last year the Hospital provided free service in the amount of \$455,709.43, in addition to free doctor's care for all service patients. This was made possible by the Mother's Day offering of our churches. Our offering from this association was \$772.44 and one year ago \$931.82 a difference of \$159.38. Some of the churches have not sent in their offerings, may I urge these churches to do so as soon as possible.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR AGING ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR 1956

The Homes are in their sixth, and greatest, year of operation. Construction of the Administration and Dormitory Building began in February. It should be completed by the end of the year, and

ready for occupancy by February 1, 1957.

North Carolina Baptists have good reason to be proud of this new building, which, when completed and equipped, will add one-half million dollars to the total value of the Homes. What is more encouraging, there is reason to believe that the total cost of the new building will be paid for by the time it is occupied, if our 3,200 Baptist churches will respond with a generous Special Day offering on the third Sunday

of February, 1957.

The added facilities of the new building will make it possible to care for 100 residents—20 at Resthaven, 36 at Albemarle Home, and 44 in the new building. Of this number, less than 10 will be parttime helpers. Moreover, a greater ministry to our aging residents will be possible because of the extra facilities in the new building. Among these will be ample space for craft shops, sun parlors, library, infirmary, and other additional features. In fact, the new building was planned and is being constructed to provide a well rounded program with the most up-to-date facilities.

The Special Day offering this year, to date, is \$88,400.03, including personal and corporation gifts. This amount will be increased by churches late in reporting their gifts. It is encouraging to know that

the number of churches responding increases each year.
Resthaven and the Albemarle Home have been filled to capacity.

When a vacancy occurs, which is rare, there is always a waiting list.

Effort was made in Winston-Salem during June and July to raise \$100,000 for the new building. In addition to the money raised, the response on the part of a large number of splendid business men to help with the campaign was most inspiring. The aroused interest in the program of the Homes will bring increasing results for years to

There has been a larger number of building memorial gifts. They ranged from \$300 to \$3,000 — \$300 to furnish, \$1,000 to endow, and

\$3,000 to pay cost of constructing, a room.

A trustee, Mr. Don G. Matthews of Hamilton, gave, in addition to \$3,000 to construct a room in the new building, \$1,378 to pay cost of excavating a lake on the grounds of the new building.

Your Homes are putting forth their best efforts to render a min-

istry of security, comfort, congeniality, and Christian love to our resi-

dents.

North Carolina Baptists should keep in mind that their special offering and the share of the Nine Year Program received by the Homes help to make this ministry possible to all who come to the Homes, and, especially, to a large number who could not come but for such help.

There are some rooms left to be memorialized. Also, a limited number of cottages may be built on the Park Road site. If interested, contact James M. Hayes, general superintendent, N. C. Baptist Homes,

W. M. U. REPORT

Again, we come to a time of evaluation in Woman's Missionary Union. As we look back, we are definitely not satisfied with what we have done in the service of our Lord. This dissatisfaction, though, we believe, will spur us on to accomplish greater things for Him in the New Associational year ahead of us. Here are a few facts and figures of what we have done. We have one new W. M. S. at Unity Grove, our new Church in the Association, which we are very happy to welcome. Including the new society we have gained 71 new W. M. S. members making a total membership of 594. We have 24 new tithers with a total of 184. 412 women contribute to the Cooperative program regularly. We cannot report as much progress in our youth work due partly to two things. First we had a new Superintendent and Youth Director coming into office at the same time—both inexperienced. Second our R. A. Organization is in a state of transition from W. M. U. to Brotherhood. The figures I give you for our youth departments do not include R. A. We had no new organizations. Total youth membership is 303 in 28 organizations. There were 8 new tithers making a total of 68. Total offerings for all organizations (WMS and Youth) this year was \$2,482.60.

Let me say there that W. M. U. is happy that the men of our Churches are becoming "Brotherhood" conscious. Brotherhood is a definite stimulation and help to our W. M. U. and we are so happy to cooperate in any way.

Some of the "Highlights" of W. M. U. this year were a Sunbeam Rally at Taylor's Memorial in August, a G. A. Rally at Vass in May, a Mission Study Institute at Southern Pines and our Leadership Conference last October at Robbins. Also 17 or more of our youth attended State Assemblies at Fruitland and Caswell.

We have recently made some changes in our plan of work which we believe will bring us to the heart of this business of advancing God's Kingdom. We are trying to place emphasis on the part and place of each individual woman and girl rather than organization, and, we are working to the end that each woman and girl will consecrate her life in consistent Christian living and serving in His name. We are earnestly praying that "world need" and "next door need" will pull at the heartstrings of our girls and women until they can no longer resist but will respond. Until then we will not be really and seriously engaged in Missions.

BAPTIST ORPHANAGE'S REPORT TO SOUTH SANDY CREEK ASSOCIATION FOR 1956

There are many changes in child care today. Today's children are different. Once a high percentage of our children in orphanages came from homes broken by death of parents. Now they come from homes where both parents are living but separated or divorced from their families.

Many of these children in our Baptist homes are very emotionally disturbed. They have come through some sort of tragedy and have a feeling of insecurity, of being unwanted and unloved.

Why broken homes?

- 1. Statistics show in the past twenty years or 1935-1955 the child population of U. S. increased 31 percent. There were 42 million children under the age of 18 in 1935 and today there are over 55 million and the number is steadily growing.
- 2. Are we as communities providing those services and interests which will help prevent the break down of families which necessitates their children going to institutions or foster homes? If our community made studies they would find that children brought to orphanages and juvenile courts do not always come from "poor people". That many of the people's problems involve complex inter-relationships in terms of education, cultural background, spiritual influence, parental guidance, mental status and community attitudes and services.

 Baptist homes for children are becoming less institutionalized. They are sending children to school and church in the community

rather than special schools and churches on the campus.

Special garb for children living at institutions has been replaced by

normal dress for children their age.

Small cottage life as near family size as possible is being set up with a cheerful and loving house-mother or married couple. Some children are placed in foster homes. Our Baptist Orphanage, Mills Home, and Kennedy home lead the state in providing foster or boarding homes for 101 children and 60 children in their own homes, through some financial assistance.

Recognizing that it is important that every effort be made to maintain a homelike atmosphere at our orphanage has been uppermost in its planning. Small cottages, meals, and home life in each cottage with foster parents. Homes (foster) for emotionally upset

children and younger children.

Attending school in community and blending well into school and community activities and among leaders in all activities.

We are proud of our 736 children who were cared for this year by the Baptist of North Carolina.

From the churches in the South Sandy Creek Association \$1,866.65 in dollars and cents were given our orphanage. All but six churches in the association gave through the cooperative program and Thanks-giving offering. With our prayers and material support the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina will continue its Christ-ordained ministry to the dependent children as long as the need exists.

REPORT OF THE EVANGELISTIC COMMITTEE

October 19, 1956

To The Seventh Annual Meeting Of The South Sandy Creek Baptist Association

During the past Associational year the total results of our evangelistic effort has been most encouraging but far below our best. It has taken 4,079 resident members of our 22 churches to win 177 to Christ. Last year it took 3,456 resident members to win 188 persons to Christ or 17 Christians to every 1 conversion. This year it has taken 23 to win 1.

We have 17 Churches reporting as having held at least one revival during the past year. I feel sure with Gods help we can do better in the future. It is true that our entire program of evangelism throughout our State Convention suffered greatly because of the fact that we were without a State Secretary of Evangelism until the second quarter of the associational year. The influence of this office has helped the Associations throughout the state with its program of Simultaneous Revival.

The writer of Hebrews tells us that "The Word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any two edged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of the soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow, and it is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart." (Heb. 4:12)

I challenge the Churches of the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association to combine their spiritual resources and prayers to the end that we shall endevour to bring more lost people into God's house to hear his word. This may be done through a determined effort to reach more people during our revivals but let us also think in terms of providing and enlisting more workers in our Sunday Schools which represents the consistant evangelistic arm of our churches.

According to Dr. Gaines S. Dobbins, 94% of all conversions in our Southern Baptist Convention last year were won through the evangelistic contribution of the Sunday School.

We can double our conversions this associational year if every church will strive to so utilize its available workers so that for every 9 members there will be one won to Christ.

The aim of evangelism is to present Jesus Christ to the world in the power of the Holy Spirit so that men shall come to put their trust in God through Him as their Saviour and serve Him as their Lord in the fellowship of His church. Every lost person in the South Sandy Creek Association is entitled to this glorious experience and it can become a possibility if we as leaders will rededicate our own lives to the task our Lord has given us.

ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT — 1956 Allied Church League, Inc.

As this report is prepared the League is making a determined effort to secure names on the petitions which call upon the legislature to enact a bill to provide for a state-wide referendum on the manufacture and sale of beverage alcohol in North Carolina. Your representatives in the League have sought to set up an organization in every county in the state. Just how successful we will be in securing a substantial number of names signed to the petitions remains to be seen. It looks now as if most of the counties will have an effective organization for this purpose. The success or failure of the effort will be determined by the effort put forth in each county to give every person of voting age in such county an opportunity to sign. We believe a majority of our citizens are eager to do whatever they can to help rid our state of the liquor traffic. The petitions offer an opportunity in that direction.

We believe the prospects for a referendum in the 1957 session of the General Assembly are brighter than they have ever been. But it cannot be said too emphatically that much depends on the effort made to get signatures on the petitions. The employees of the League are helpless apart from the cooperation of the Christian people of our state. We urge that an effort be made to enlist every denominational group, including Negro Christians, in this worthy undertaking. If we should fail in this effort we believe our cause will be hurt for years

to come.

Conditions in North Carolina are favorable to a referendum at this time. Our people are becoming more and more alarmed at conditions produced by the beverage alcohol traffic. Those who know what is happening are beginning to say that something must be done. Figures released by the Department of Motor Vehicles indicate that 25% of the fatalities on the highways of the state resulted from drinking. Of the 45,054 accidents on the highways during 1955, 8,487 had been drinking, and 323 people were killed by drinking drivers. Prison authorities are alarmed at the high percentage of the prison population who have drinking records. This percentage is said by one official to be as high as ninety per cent. The report of the State Board of Public Welfare reveals that in June, 1956, there were 11,215 persons confined in the county jails in North Carolina and of this number 5,038 almost 50% were charged with violations involving alcohol.

It is becoming more evident all the time that we must promote a program of education in the churches which will have as its purpose a sober society and the creation of a moral climate which will eventuate in higher spiritual living. The rehabilitation of the victims of alcohol cannot longer be neglected by the churches. We must set up clinics designed to train our people in methods of working with people who have drinking problems. To this end we urge the election in each Association of a person who will help the League in promotion of these projects. Each church should elect a committee on Social Education to work with the Associational leader. We must get back to the people with a program of education on all moral issues, and civic

responsibilities.

We are now making a drive by which individuals can become members of the League and give financial help. The plan is this: Lifetime Contributing Membership — \$500; Honorary Contributing Membership—\$20. annually; Active Contributing Membership—\$5. annually; Contributing Membership—\$1. annually. Membership cards are available from the person making this report.

This report was adopted.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

Of the twenty-three Churches in the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association twelve reported as having their Pastor living on the field.

During the past year Rev. C. A. Kirby, Jr., has succeeded Rev. O. J. Hagler as Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Carthage and Rev. J. L. Weatherman has succeeded Rev. W. H. Caldwell as Pastor of the New Home Baptist Church. Rev. O. J. Hagler is now with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Both the Bethlehem and Red Branch Baptist Churches are, at this writing, without Pastors, Rev. H. P. Chaffin having resigned from the Bethlehem Baptist Church and Rev. B. L. Maness from the Red Branch Baptist Church. Rev. Maness has become the full time Pastor of the Union Grove Baptist Church.

The most outstanding addition to the church buildings of the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association is that of the First Baptist Church of Aberdeen. The ground breaking ceremonies were held Jan. 31, 1955, and the dedication service and the laying of the corner stone on September 30, 1956. The Church was built at a cost of \$240,-000.00. We feel confident that this magnificent structure is to be a great power house in the service of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Rev. Eugene Deese in his dedication sermon looked forward to having the building used by a militant, community and missionary Church. The Church has 420 members with a Sunday School enrollment of 461.

The Ashley Heights Baptist Church has added an electric organ to

their equipment during the past year.

The Bethlehem Baptist Church has placed a carpet in their audi-

The Calvary Baptist Church has constructed a shelter for the basement entrance at a cost of \$165.00 also shrubbery has been planted to help beautify their church grounds.

The Cameron Baptist Church has repaired the plaster in their Sanctuary. They have also organized a Training Union again during

the past associational year.
The First Baptist Church of Carthage has added a furnace and an outside bulletin board to their equipment.

The Community Baptist Church sent in no report.

The Ephesus Baptist Church has secured chairs for their Sunday School rooms.

The Flint Hill Baptist Church sent in no report.

The Garners Chapel Baptist Church has resumed services, with Rev. D. E. Frye as Pastor. A piano has been added and a Sunday School has been organized this year.

The Ives Memorial Baptist Church has been given new song books by the Woman's Missionary Society, also the church grounds have been cleared and some shrubbery has been planted.

The Lemon Springs Baptist Church has made improvements on

their church grounds. The New Home Baptist Church now have their Sunday School rooms heated by electricity.

The Pine Grove Baptist Church has new song books.

The Piney Wood Baptist Church have cleared their church grounds.

The Red Branch Baptist Church has bought a new piano and has

also had a well drilled on their grounds.

The First Baptist Church of Robbins has put a new roof on their

building at a cost of \$450.00, made a driveway to their Pastorium at a cost of \$425.00, bought robes for the Choir at a cost of \$154.00, put gravel on their parking lot at a cost of \$30.00 and at a cost of \$435.00 has bought a multilith machine with which to print their Church papers. When the Church celebrated its 21st birthday on September 23, 1956 the offering amounted to \$1,225.00 which was used for debt retirement.

The Rosendale Baptist Church sent in no report.

The First Baptist Church of Southern Pines has made additions to their church building at a cost of \$402.48 and have added new equipment at a cost of \$1,936.98.

The Summer Hill Baptist Church has ordained Rev. Melvin Williamson to the ministry and has made additions to their church at a cost of \$1,150.00 and also added a piano to their equipment.

The Taylor Memorial Baptist Church sent in a brief church history.

The Unity Grove Baptist was organized on July 1, 1956 and is building a new church edifice four and one-half miles south of Robbins. Their application to become a member of the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association was brought before the Executive Committee of the Association at its summer meeting. The Pastor of this newly organized Church is Rev. Paul F. Gales.

The Vass Baptist Church has made additions to their church building at a cost of \$30,000.00 and has also added new pews to the church.

Only a few Churches of the Association have ever had their Church history printed. Brief histories of both the Bethlehem Baptist Church and the Cameron Baptist Church have been printed in Associational Minutes. Bethlehem Baptist Church in 1928 and Cameron Baptist Church in 1954. The Ephesus Baptist Church, the New Home Baptist Church, the Piney Wood Baptist Church and the Taylor Memorial Baptist Church have had Church histories printed. Several Churches are preparing histories which should be published in due time.

The Adult Training Union Quarterly states in its dicussion for Oct. 28, 1956 that "One of the most satisfying projects a congregation can undertake is the writing of a church history." Norman W. Cox, Executive Secretary of the Southern Baptist Historical Commission states that "Baptists have been disturbingly careless about their history and not one Baptist Church in twenty has all of its minutes." In his pamphlet "The History of a Baptist Church and How to Write It", states that, "He who writes the history of a Church enables the Church to keep alive its yesterdays. This opens the gates for its todays to enrich its tomorrows. It gives the light on our altars unbroken shining. Experiences of former years will profitably teach the new generation."







Constitution and By-Laws

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the gospel, and to co-operate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section I. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Missionary Baptist Churches which shall support the causes fostered by the Southern Baptist Convention, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and this Association.

Section II. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of (1) all officers of the Association, including the Executive Committee; (2) all pastors of member churches; (3) three messengers from each co-operating church with a membership up to one hundred and one additional messenger for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof. No church, however shall be entitled to more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger who is not a member of a church co-operating with the Association, and messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A co-operating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Section III. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership "NEW OR ESTABLISHED" shall be referred to a committee which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith, and practice. Upon a favorable report of the committee, the church may be admitted as a constituent member by a majority vote of the messengers at the annual meeting, or, if application is made between sessions of the annual meeting, by a majority vote of the Executive Committee. The church shall have all privileges of the Association except that of voting for the first year.

An established and cooperating church coming from another Association of like faith and practice, said church being in good standing in its own Association, and upon recommendation of that Association, and upon favorable recommendation of our Committee for Reception of Churches, and favorable vote of the Association, shall be received

immediately into full fellowship of the Association.

"Any church not previously affiliated with an Association, whether new or established, seeking admittance to this Association shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year."

Section IV. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a majority of the churches.

Section V. Voting in the Associational meeting shall be limited to the duly elected messengers or their alternates.

Section VI. The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

ARTICLE III. CONSTITUTION

Section I. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational Woman's Missionary Superintendent. These officers shall be elected at the annual meeting. However, the WMU Superintendent shall be elected by the women of the Association at the annual WMU meeting. They shall assume their duties upon adjournment and continue in office until their successors are installed.

Section II. The Moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than two one-year terms in succession.

Section III. There shall be the following standing committees:

- (1) Committee on Committees: This committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of the committee to place in nomination personnel of such standing committees as are herein provided or deemed necessary from time to time; it shall also name committee on resolutions, reception of churches, and place and preacher.
- (2) Committee on Ordinations. This committee shall examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate.
- (3) Missionary Education Committee. It shall be the duty of this Committee to sponsor a program of missionary education in all the churches of our Association.
- (4) Program Committee. The Program Committee shall plan the program for the annual meeting of the Association well in advance.
- (5) Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the active pastors and two members elected by each church who shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding upon the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. This committee shall meet on Monday after each fifth Sunday at a time and place determined by the committee. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of this committee. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the churches.
- (6) **Nominating Committee.** The Nominating Committee shall present a list of nominations to each office of the Association to the annual meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE IV. RULES OF ORDER

Section I. The Moderator, or in his absence, the Vice-Moderator, shall preside at all regular meetings.

Section II. All business shall be conducted and all discussion shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot Parliamentary Law.

Section III. The method of voting shall be by the will of the body.

Section IV. A simple majority shall prevail in all cases, provided, however, that any member may at any time call for secret ballot on a doubtful issue.

Section V. A ruling by the presiding officer shall be final unless appeal be made to the entire body present.

Section VI. A question having been decided twice by vote in the same attitude at regular sessions of the Association shall not be reintroduced except by consent of the body, expressed by a majority vote.

ARTICLE V. ADOPTION

This constitution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

ARTICLE VI. REVISION

This constitution may be immediately revised at any session of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present or by a simple majority provided notice of such revision shall have been given at a previous session.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

ARTICLE VIII. TIME OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The time of the annual meeting shall be Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October.

- 8. Moderator recognized Mr. John Gill, and offered him opportunity to say few words.
- 9. L. L. Carpenter, editor of the Biblical Recorder gave a wonderful message in a few words concerning the paper. He also stated that 9 churches had clubs, and 14 without clubs.
- 10. Eugene Deese read the report of the Cooperative Program as follows and moved its adoption. Motion seconded.

THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

Stewardship means different things to different people. To some it has no meaning at all. To others the word has been identified only with raising church budgets. To most of us, when we think of our stewardship we think also of the Cooperative Program. We are taught individually to be good stewards of our possessions. A local church or convention also wants to disburse its funds wisely. No better plan has been conceived to do this than the Cooperative Program.

In 1925 Southern Baptists seeking a plan whereby every Christian might obey the Great Commission, adopted the method called the Cooperative Program. Through this plan Southern Baptists share the gospel at home and around the world. It is a balanced plan, a unified plan, that applies to the agencies, institutions, and causes of

both the State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. As an individual, I do not have a chance to know personally the needs of various agencies and institutions. Therefore I need the guidance of representative groups and committees throughout the convention who can study problems, pray about them, determine needs and then recommend a percentage of our total giving for various works. When I give each Sunday to my local church, I know that part of my offering goes to the Cooperative Program. I know that, when the check from our Treasurer reaches Raleigh, I will share in the greatest program in the world — from missions to ministers retirement, from colleges to children's homes. I have a part in all that is being done.

The Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Chicago in May of this year approved a great Jubilee Program of advance from 1958 through 1964. This action calls for greatly increased giving through the Cooperative Program. For 1958 the goal is \$58,000,000. By 1964 we hope to reach \$189,000,000. North Carolina's part is about 10% of this, or \$5,000,000 plus next year and \$18,000,000 plus by 1964. You say how can this be done when North Carolina is giving only \$3,35,000 in 1957. It can be done by every church in our state giving a definite percentage of the total budget to the Cooperative Program and increasing by 2 percent each year. We can do it only as the local churches enter in whole-heartedly. United as a church, an Association, a state, south-wide we can do it. Let every church in the South Sandy Creek Association join its sister churches in a great advance for our Lord.

Our State Brotherhood Convention will meet in Raleigh on the evening of November 18th. This is in easy driving range of our Association and I hope we can have a good attendance.

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

History teaches that no democracy can long endure unless the people keep informed and inspired by the right kind of reading. We like to think of Baptist people living in a great spiritual democracy working together to carry out the commands of our Lord. "Give attention to reading" urged Paul to the early Christians. "Blessed is he that readeth" cried the Apostle John in his last message.

The printed page is more powerful than all the modern implements of war in conquering the minds and hearts of men. It finds its way into places where preachers are not allowed to go. Never before has so much reading matter — both good and bad — been before the eyes of the people. A constant stream of unclean books, periodicals and magazines is now flowing from many publishing houses bent on selling more and more. Their sole object is to enrich themselves. They care little for the evil effect of this stream of poison.

It is said that no denomination in America has so fine a selection of Christian literature as Southern Baptists have today. The aim of all this is to inform our people and to enlist, unify, teach and inspire for greater service in the Kingdom work.

Southern Baptists recognize the American Bible Society as an essential part of their own world-wide mission program. Our missionaries depend on the Bible Society for Scriptures they need for distribution to their people. The American Bible Society provides the word of God in many languages without profit and usually below cost. Over 15 million volumes were distributed in 1956. In 1956 Southern Baptists gave to this worthy cause \$120,732. If the American Bible Society carries out their enlarged program of missions for this year, more funds will be needed. How much has your church given?

Right here at home we have two splendid publications — The Biblical Recorder and Charity and Children. We are happy to report that the present circulation of the Recorder has now reached approximately 61,500 each week. The Charity and Children finds its way into a large per cent of our Baptist homes each week through the Sunday School.

We would recommend: First — that we, during this association year, encourage daily Bible reading in every home. Second — that we endeavor to put our two State papers, Biblical Recorder and Charity and Children in each home. Third — that we use and introduce

to our people the many fine magazines, books and other publications published by the Southern Baptist Convention and W.M.U.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO STUDY MISSIONS WITHIN THE SOUTH SANDY CREEK BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Our Lord has said, Ye shall be witnesses unto Me in Jerusalem, in Judaea, in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth. Your committee believes that all parts of this directive are equally important. However, in this report, we are concerned especially with Christ's command concerning our own Association, our Judaea.

These needs have been considered:

1. An Associational Missionary.

2. Churches or communities which need help in building.

3. Churches which need help in pastoral support.

We, as a committee, are unanimously agreed that now is the time for the people of this Association to launch a worthy program of missions in the name of Christ in our own area.

We therefore recommend:

- 1. That Article III, section 3, sub-section (3) of our Constitution be amended to read Missionary Education Committee It shall be the duty of this Committee to sponsor a program of missionary education in all the churches of our Association.
- 2. That a South Candy Creek Baptist Missions Club be approved within the churches of our Association.
 - a. Purpose The purpose of said missions club shall be to make available funds for activities of our Lord's Kingdom within the area of the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association.
 - b. Membership in the Missions Club shall be composed of members or friends of churches in our Association who agree to give \$5 or more each year to be used for the purpose stated previously in this report.
 - Organization and Procedure —
 That two additional standing committees be incorporated among the standing committees of the Constitution of our Association;
 - (1). A Promotion Committee of three members of separate churches of our Association whose responsibility shall be (a) to secure members of the Missions Club and (b) to hold in custody, and disburse upon proper recommendation the funds of the Missions Club, one member of this Promotion Committee being designated by our Association as treasurer.

(2) An Investigating Committee of three members of separate churches which are members of our Association whose duty

shall be:

(a) To receive all requests for aid from the Missions Club fund,

(b) To study the needs of churches or community groups which apply for aid from the Mission Club fund.

(c) To consider carefully the needs of any community within the area of our Association where there is no Baptist church, or interested group of Baptists to take the initiative in applying for aid,
(d) To make recommendation for aid in every specific situ-

ation where aid from the Missions Club fund is to be granted.

- (3) That these committees be elected according to our constitutional provision for the election of standing committees.
- (4) That neither committee of the Missions Club take final action on any matter unless two thirds of the members of such committee are present.
- (5) That all recommendations for aid from the Missions Club fund be approved either by the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association or the Executive Committee of said Association before the disbursement of any Missions Club funds, except as may be provided in a prescribed plan of said Association.
- (6) That aid from the Missions Club fund be extended only to churches or community groups willing to cooperate fully in the policies and practices of the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association.
- (7) That no allocation of funds from the Missions Club shall be made for any purpose unless sufficient money is on hand to meet all such commitments.
- (8) That the last Sunday in October of each year be designated as "Missions in South Sandy Creek Baptist Association Sunday", and that on this Sunday each year all churches and pastors of this Association be requested, under the direction of the Promotion Committee of the Missions Club, to put forth every possible effort to inform all our church people of the Missions Club of our Association, and to enlist every possible member in the Missions Club at this time; that the goal for October 1957 be set at one thousand members.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

There are seven Baptist Colleges in North Carolina, Wake Forest at Winston-Salem, Meredith at Raleigh, Campbell at Buies Creek, Chowan at Murfreesboro, Gardner-Webb at Boiling Springs, Mars Hill at Mars Hill, and Wingate at Wingate.

More than 6,000 students attended these colleges during the session 1956-57. Of all students registered in institutions of higher learning in the state, 26 per cent of them were in our Baptist Colleges.

These colleges have been in the business of training Christian leaders who through years of continuing growth have headed other educational institutions, served as pastors of our churches, gone as missionaries to needed places of the world, occupied positions of lay leadership in communities everywhere, and led our convention in its multiple services to the kingdom.

The urgent needs and the tremendous potentials for christian leadership through our colleges depend on every Baptist in North Carolina. North Carolina Baptists have a great training ground for christian leadership in their seven Baptist Colleges.

This training ground for leadership is also extended over our South-land. Within the Southern Baptist Convention there are fifty one Baptist Colleges. These colleges furnish our five Seminaries in the convention with many dedicated young men and women who have pledged themselves to Christ and the Christian calling. They also play a key role in our world mission program.

The most difficult task of the Christian college is to meet the need for trained christian leaders for "secular" vocations offering greatest opportunity for christian influence. It is here that our Southern Baptist world missions program is tragically weak. Percentagewise, Southern Baptists are far behind other major denominations in the production of personnel for key vocations like teaching, social work, nursing, medicine, government, Journalism, radio-television. It is more than an unfortunate coincidence that Southern Baptists also trail other major denominations in the percentage of their own college youth that they train in their own colleges.

This report offers two recommendations. First, that the Baptist youth and Baptist parents of this association be led to a fuller realization of the duty of every Christian in the choice of and preparation for a lifework. Second, that we, as parents, rediscover the supreme importance and responsibility of sending mature young men and women to our colleges who will be able to stand by the high ideals of a Christian home, uphold the Christian standards, and make the right decision in issues that affect the Baptists of our State,

This program is not just for the music leaders in our churches, but for anyone who is interested in any phase of music which might help our churches as well as lift our own souls to God, for truly nothing can better draw us from ourselves into a "closer walk with God" than the singing of the hymns we love so well.

November 10-15 is the important music event of the year. Beginning on Sunday afternoon November 10, we will have a School of Church Music, meeting each night at 7:30 at the Carthage Baptist Church. There will be classes for everyone. Mr. Stroud will tell us more about this school and of the vital role it can play in developing good church musicians.

Training is essential to success. The soldier, the doctor, the lawyer, the mechanic, the farmer must be trained for his calling if he is to achieve any success in his chosen field of service. If this is true in secular fields of service it is even more true in the greatest undertaking in the world, namely, the Kingdom enterprise. If it is to function properly there must be trained leadership.

Training is essential to spiritual growth and the development of Christian personality. Just as the physical body must have proper food, so the growing Christian must have a spiritual diet of Bible study, prayer, Christian fellowship, and service. These are provided in a proper balance in the Training Union.

For this work to be a progressive work there must be prayer, cooperation and support from every member of every church. We pray for God's blessings and for the leadership of the Holy Spirit to be upon the new Associational Training Union Director and let us all give him our cooperation and support in every way.

SOUTH SANDY CREEK ASSOCIATION SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT — 1957

Southern Baptist leaders have felt that one of the best ways to win people into God's Kingdom and to bring about spiritual growth is through the Sunday Schools of our Churches. From the visions of these men have grown a Sunday School Program which far exceeds that of any other Christian Organization. We are proud to be a part of this program which is mobilizing the people of our country and the world into a powerful militant movement for Our Lord.

Our Association this year is reporting 22 Sunday Schools showing an enrollment of 4,156. Vacation Bible Schools were held in 18 Churches with excellent results being reported.

During the year a very inspirational Sunday School Training Clinic was held at First Baptist Church, Carthage, under the direction of E. R. Echerd, Jr., promotional secretary Mecklenburg Association, Charlotte. Eleven churches were represented at this meeting with 50 persons in attendance. The Sunday School sponsored Vacation Bible School Clinic was held at First Baptist Church, Carthage, on April 12th. There were 15 churches represented with 57 persons in attendance. The Clinic was led by Mrs. Myra Motley. Also present from the State Convention was Dr. Herman Ihley, Secretary.

The Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is projecting as our theme for this year "Ye Are Witnesses." The following goals have been set to outline our programs and to check our progress.

- 1. Reach More People, 10 million members by 1964.
- 2. Teach The Bible.
- 3. Win More People.
- 4. Enlist More People In Service.

May we all be spiritually unlifted as we endeavor to make this program a reality. Let us stand as "Workmen That Needeth Not To Be Ashamed."

REPORT ON THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Last year our hospital at Winston-Salem provided 123,000 days of bed care for 15,784 patients. There were 61,000 visits to the outpatient clinic and 60,000 visits to private clinics. Service patients came from 92 of the 100 counties of North Carolina. This reveals something of the medical service which is provided by our Baptist Hospital. This service is of the highest order for our people in North Carolina, whatever their financial circumstances may be.

The new Cobalt machine providing treatment for about 35 cancer patients daily, a very fine plastic surgeon, and a heart surgeon who has performed successfully some of the newest and most difficult heart operations, are examples of the specialized service provided in our Hospital.

If a person wishes to go to the Baptist Hospital for treatment, it is necessary that an appointment be made in advance. In an emergency a local doctor should call or write the hospital to give the medical information required. In the case of patients who cannot pay their bills in part or whole, financial arrangements should be made in advance.

It appears now that the churches of the state have made their largest Mother's Day offering this year. A total of 17 churches of the South Sandy Creek Association gave \$837.84 compared to \$772 last year. Only 5 churches have not sent a hospital offering. Is it too much to hope that all our churches in 1958 will participate in the magnificent ministry of our North Carolina Baptist Hospital?

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR AGING

This, the seventh year of operation of the Baptist Homes for the Aging, has been the greatest year of expansion, thanks to our Lord for His continued favor, and the North Carolina Baptists for their increased support.

The new Administration and Residential Building was opened June 13. All rooms are now occupied, except four in the infirmary, which are reserved for residents who will need them.

The new building increased facilities to 112 residents, counting residents at Resthaven and the Albemarle Home. It also added half a million dollars to the value of the assets of the Homes for the Aging.

Another forward step was taken in July when the General Board voted unanimously to accept the offer of Don G. Matthews, Sr., Hamilton, N. C., to give \$50,000 and land on which to build a Home for the Aging in eastern Carolina. This fourth Home will probably add space for approximately forty additional residents, thus bringing the total capacity of all the Homes to 150 residents.

Two Wills have been probated in Forsyth County in which the Homes were remembered with sizeable gifts when received. Word has come of other Wills in which the Homes will share.

A total of about eighty-five thousand (\$85,000) dollars has been received from the February Special Day Offering. This represents an average gift of ten (10c) cents per Baptist — 850,000 in number.

The challenge facing the Homes for the Aging at present is to finish paying for the new building, although the Baptist State Convention authorized that the Homes might borrow up to one hundred, seventy-five thousand (\$175,000) dollars to finish paying for the construction and equipping the new building on Reynolds Park Road. Actually, it was necessary to borrow but one hundred thousand (\$100,000) dollars. Surely, with all North Carolina Baptists responding with a generous Special Day Offering on the third Sunday of February, 1958, and with continued gifts coming in from other sources as they

have been in the past, this balance of one hundred thousand (\$100,000) dollars, should be paid within the year. Accordingly, if every pastor and superintendent of the Sunday School will urge the members of each church to respond to this worthy cause, the Baptist Homes for the Aging would be free of debt by the end of the year, 1958.

The residents, and all connected with the Homes for the Aging, are deeply grateful for the support received in the past, and join with the Baptists of our state in thanking God for His favor and blessings year by year.

The state of health of the residents has been remarkably good, considering their ages 65 to 97 years.

W. M. U. REPORT

Woman's Missionary Union of South Sandy Creek Association has 557 members in Women's Missionary Society and 293 members in all the youth organizations, making a total of 350. We had a total of 56 Mission Study classes among all organizations and a total number of 194 tithers. All organizations gave to Foreign Missions \$873.01 and to other causes (including the Heck-Jones Memorial Fund and Co-operative Program) \$344.70, which makes a total of \$2,168.84. These figures are all on the low side and do not show quite a true picture, as reports from three societies have not been received. One of the three is the largest in our Association. Then the amount for State Missions is not quite correct because some societies reported giving through their Church but did not state the amount.

To get away from cold statistics and to the heart of our work, we had a Leadership Conference to prepare our leaders for service, with about 95 present; a Community Missions Institute to prepare for soul-winning in our communities; a Stewardship Institute which was very inspirational; and our Annual meeting at Vass in April. Our Annual meeting was, also, very inspirational and a "mountain-top experience" with Miss Miriam Robinson (State Executive Secretary), Mrs. Lloyd Neil (Missionary Nurse on furlough from Nigeria) and Mrs. A. D. Frazier (Superintendent of the Raleigh Region) to speak to us.

Highlights of the youth organizations were a Royal Ambassador Father-Son banquet and a Y. W. A. banquet, both at Carthage, and a G. A. Rally at Cameron. Several girls attended Summer Camp, two attended the G. A. Queen's Court at Campbell college and five attended the Y. W. A. House Party in Charlotte.

Much has been accomplished which cannot be recorded but we still hope to become more serious about our business of Missions.

The watchword this year of Southern Woman's Missionary Union is "Behold, I have set before thee an open door—" Revelation 3:8. The whole verse in the King James version reads, "I know thy works: behold, I have set before thee an open door, and no man can shut it;

for thou hast a little strength, and hast kept my word, and hast not denied my name." The Revised Standard Version says, "I know that you have but little power, and yet you have kept my word and have not denied my name.

It is true that we "have but little power" but when we turn that It is true that we "have but little power but when we turn that little power over to God it becomes great power — power to enter this "open door". This "open door" might be called the "door to missions", or the "door of service", or, perhaps, the "door of love". God has a place of service inside this door for every woman and girl—a place where we can use our time, talents and even our material possessions in advacing His Kingdom. Wo we have the "strength" or "power" to enter this open door??

REPORT OF THE EVANGELISTIC COMMITTEE

Our report for this year is encouraging in that there has been a rising interest in Evangelism in most of the churches of this Association. 292 additions were made in our Association during this Associational year, which is 45 less than the number of additions reported last year. Of these 164 came by baptism and 128 by letter.

It is the recommendation of the chairman of evangelism that our Association go on record by the vote of the messengers of the churches to this annual convention of the South Sandy Creek Missionary Baptist Association as favoring full support of and full participation in an Associational-wide Simultaneous Revival in the spring of 1953 as preparation for the World Wide Simultaneous Crusade which is scheduled for our Association for the weeks of March 15-29, 1959.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

During the past year Rev. Maynard Mangum has been called to be the Pastor of the Southern Pines Baptist Church. Rev. David Hoke Coen, the former Pastor, has become the Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Forest City, N. C. At present the Vass Baptist Church is without a pastor. Rev. J. C. Halliburton has been called to succed Rev. Robert T. Woodson as Pastor of the Taylor's Memorial Baptist Church. Rev. J. C. Halliburton is also the Pastor of the West End Baptist Church.

There were at least 12 Vacation Bible Schools held within the Association during the past summer, most of them being for one week though there were two that held them for one and one-half weeks and one that was held for two weeks.

During the past year a considerable amount of progress has been made toward having more definite missionary activities within the area of the Association. The needs considered by the Committee are (1) An Associational Missionary (2) Churches or communities which need help in building (3) Churches which need help in pastoral support.

A Pastor's Training School was held in the Carthage Baptist Church from April 9 to the 11th inclusive. The instructors were Dr. E. N. Johnson of Wagrum, N. C., and Dr. John Steeley of the Southeastern Seminary, Wake Forest, N. C.

The Executive Committee Meetings of the Association were held on Jan. 7th at the Carthage Baptist Church, April 8th, at the Bethlehem Baptist Church, July 8th, at the First Baptist of Aberdeen and Oct. 7th, 1957, at the Robbins Baptist Church. This year the Unity Grove Baptist Church came into full fellowship with the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association after having been a year under its watch-care, according to Article II, Section III of the Constitution. The West End Baptist Church, since it is not a newly organized Baptist Church was welcomed into full fellowship of the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association at its Annual Meeting, held Oct. 17 and 18th, 1957.

The First Baptist Church of Aberdeen has been very active during the past year in consolidating the numerous activities within its splendid new Church edifice.

The Bethlehem Baptist Church has added a mimeograph to their equipment.

The Calvary Baptist Church, during the past year, has ordained Rev. D. E. Frye to the Baptist Ministry. A new Sunday School room and a Secretary's desk, and chair have been added to their equipment at a cost of \$2,000.00.

The Cameron Baptist Church has added cabinets, book cases and a choir robe to their equipment.

The First Baptist Church of Carthage has remodeled and enlarged their kitchen at a cost of \$600.00.

The Ephesus Baptist Church has landscaped its church yard and cemetery, which includes a wall around the church to prevent washing and a circular drive. A large lawn mower has been bought. A bus has been purchased which is in operation every Sunday. The walks have been graveled and the church floor refinished. Lights have been erected at the steps of each walk and 50 new song books have been purchased. A Training Union has been organized, the Biblical Recorder comes to every home, and for the first time in the history of the Church prayer meetings are held each Wednesday night.

The Flint Hill Baptist Church has built a stairway and finished four Sunday School rooms at a cost of \$541.33. The church floor has been sanded and varnished and the inside of the church has been painted. Rugs have been purchased at a cost of \$307.28.

Sandy Branch Baptist Church has had its church remodeled at a cost of \$1,600.00 and their church grounds have been improved. It now has a membership of 42.

The Ives Memorial Baptist Church is in the process of building eight new Sunday School rooms and the amount expended so far on them has been \$3,682.85. The church grounds have also been sowed with lawn grass.

The Lemon Springs Baptist Church has bought 50 new song books.

The New Home Baptist Church has added some new equipment to its building.

The Piney Woods Baptist Church has had a change of Pastors during the past year, Rev. C. T. Grey having succeeded Rev. Robert T. Woodson.

The Red Branch Baptist Church has bought 50 new Broadman Hymnals, the church grounds have been improved, the church auditorium painted and a bell system has been installed in the Sunday School rooms.

The Robbins Baptist Church rejoices in having its Church completely free of debt as of Sept. 22, 1957.

The Summer Hill Baptist Church has improved its church grounds. The Taylor's Memorial Baptist Church has called Rev. J. C. Haliburton to be its Pastor to succeed Rev. Robert T. Woodson. The basement of the church has been partitioned and ceiled at a cost of \$656.81.

The Unity Grove Baptist Church has completed its auditorium at a cost of \$5,500.00. Their church grounds have been improved and lights, a pulpit, new song books and a new oil heater have been added to their church equipment.

The Vass Baptist Church has had supply Pastors during the summer months. The Church has bought new kitchen equipment at a cost of \$44.00.





Constitution and By-Laws

We, the Missionary Baptist Churches of Moore County and adjacent territory, convinced of the necessity of an association of churches in order to promote fellowship, missions, education, Christian service, the preaching of the gospel, and to co-operate with the Baptist State Convention in its work, do hereby agree and subscribe to the following articles:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this body shall be the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section I. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Missionary Baptist Churches which shall support the causes fostered by the Southern Baptist Convention, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and this Association.

Section II. The annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of (1) all officers of the Association, including the Executive Committee; (2) all pastors of member churches; (3) three messengers from each co-operating church with a membership up to one hundred and one additional messenger for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof. No church, however, shall be entitled to more than six messengers. No one shall be a messenger who is not a member of a church co-operating with the Association, and messengers must be duly elected by their churches. A co-operating church shall be one that supports any object of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Section III. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership. The application of any church for membership "NEW OR ESTABLISHED" shall be referred to a committee which shall examine its organization as to covenant, articles of faith, and practice. Upon a favorable report of the committee, the church may be admitted as a constituent member by a majority vote of the messengers at the annual meeting, or, if application is made between sessions of the annual meeting, by a majority vote of the Executive Committee. The church shall have all privileges of the Association except that of voting for the first year.

An established and co-operating church coming from another Association of like faith and practice, said church being in good standing in its own Association, and upon recommendation of that Association, and upon favorable recommendation of our Committee for Reception of Churches, and favorable vote of the Association, shall be received immediately into full fellowship of the Association.

"Any church not previously affiliated with an Association, whether new or established, seeking admittance to this Association, shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year."

Section IV. A quorum shall consist of the messengers from a majority of the churches.

Section V. Voting in the Associational meeting shall be limited to the duly elected messengers or their alternates.

Section VI. The Association may at any time withdraw fellowship from any church that ceases to abide by the spirit of this constitution.

ARTICLE III. CONSTITUTION

Section I. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational Woman's Missionary Superintendent. These officers shall be elected at the annual meeting. However, the WMU Superintendent shall be elected by the women of the Association at the annual WMU meeting. They shall assume their duties upon adjournment and continue in office until their successors are installed.

Section II. The Moderator shall be ineligible to serve more than two one-year terms in succession.

Section III. There shall be the following standing committees:

- (1) Committee on Committees: This committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of the committee to place in nomination personnel of such standing committees as are herein provided or deemed necessary from time to time; it shall also name committee on resolutions, reception of churches, and place and preacher.
- (2) Commmittee on Ordinations. This committee shall examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and shall make such recommendations as it feels led to the church requesting ordination for a candidate.
- (3) Missionary Education Committee. It shall be the duty of this Committee to sponsor a program of missionary education in all the churches of our Association.
- (4) Program Committee. The Program Committee shall plan the program for the annual meeting of the Association well in advance.
- (5) Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the active pastors and two members elected by each church who shall act for the Association in the interim between its annual sessions. The duties of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and the will of the Association as so expressed. No action shall be taken by the Executive Committee contravening the will of the Association, nor shall it initiate any new policy or practice binding the Association, unless so directed. However, in an emergency it may take such action as it deems necessary, but such action shall be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for final disposition. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the annual session. This committee shall meet on Monday after each fifth Sunday at a time and place determined by the committee. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of this committee. A quorum shall be the representatives of a majority of the churches.
- (6) Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall present a list of nominations for each office of the Association to the annual meeting of the Association.
 - (7) Missions Club Committees.
 - a. Promotion Committee whose duty shall be to promote the raising of money in the churches of our Association for Missionary objects within our Association.

- b. Investigating Committee whose duty shall be
 - (1) To receive all requests for aid from the Missions Club funds.
 - (2) To make recommendations for aid in every specific situation where aid from the Missions Club is granted.

ARTICLE IV. RULES OF ORDER

Section I. The Moderator, or in his absence the Vice-Moderator, shall preside at all regular meetings.

Section II. All business shall be conducted and all discussion shall be carried on in the manner prescribed in Kerfoot Parliamentary Law.

Section III. The method of voting shall be by the will of the body. Section IV. A simple majority shall prevail in all cases, provided, however, that any member may at any time call for secret ballot on a doubtful issue.

Section V. A ruling by the presiding officer shall be final unless appeal be made to the entire body present.

Section VI. A question having been decided twice by vote in the same attitude at regular sessions of the Association shall not be re-introduced except by consent of the body, expressed by a majority vote.

ARTICLE V. ADOPTION

This constitution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

ARTICLE VI. REVISION

This constitution may be immediately revised at any session of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present or by a simple majority provided notice of such revision shall have been given at a previous session.

ARTICLE VII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin on the first of October and close on the thirtieth day of September of the following year.

ARTICLE VII. TIME OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The time of the annual meeting shall be Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October.

THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

God commanded Christians to reap a world wide harvest of human souls, and then He gave them the money that is needed to finance the work.

We know that God keeps an account of how much we give, but He also keeps an account of where we give. Therefore, we must be very careful as to how we use His gifts.

The wisest plan for sharing would be for us to join our gifts, pool our resources, and get the advice of someone who knows where our gifts are needed most. Such a plan for sharing God's Kingdom by sharing our gifts is the Cooperative Program. The Cooperative Program is the way we work together in giving where our money is needed most of all about the world.

Every church owes it to its members to invest their gifts wisely. Every church owes it to its members to let them share in a world-wide harvest. And no one pastor or one layman is capable of knowing the needs of the whole world.

As a pastor I am thankful for a plan such as this which permits my people to share on a world-wide scale. As a Christian I am thankful for the privilege of giving wisely.

Last year the churches of the South Sandy Creek Association gave \$9,824.00 through the Cooperative Program. The goal for the whole state convention is \$3,750,000. How can we raise our giving for next year?

You and I benefited from our giving mainly because we had this privilege of working with God. The rest of the world benefited because we shared wisely. Your tithe is worthwhile only when you spend it wisely. The Cooperative Program is a means of making your tithe do its most for God.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Between the years from 1834 to 1907 our Baptist Forebears of North Carolina, with rare insight into the summons of and guidance by the Holy Spirit, founded our seven Baptist Colleges. Through the years since their beginnings—Wake Forest in 1834, Chowan in 1848, Mars Hill in 1856, Campbell in 1887, Wingate in 1896, Meredith in 1899, and Gardner-Webb in 1907—these Institutions of learning have progressively arisen to meet the growing needs for Church-centered education among our students.

Beyond the facts that these Colleges are fully accredited by our North Carolina College Conference and the Southern Association of Colleges, and maintain a high academic standard of liberal arts education, they are also Christian in purpose and motivation. "We believe these colleges embody the 'Seven Marks of a Christian College' as follows:

- **"1. Christian Ownership.** These seven colleges are owned by the 844,689 Baptists of North Carolina who delegate their operation to trustees elected by the Baptist State Convention.
- "2. Christian Administration. The Christian men and women who are elected as trustees select others as administrators who are dedicated to the advance of the Kingdom through the training of young men and women for Christian leadership. We believe our seven Baptist Colleges have Christian administrators.
- "3. A Christian Faculty. More than 400 competent Christian men and women are employed as teachers. They are chosen for their personal Christian dedication, their intellectual honesty, their educational preparation, and their ability to teach.
- "4. Christian Students. A Christian College campus provides the finest educational environment for young people coming from a Christian background. In such a climate young Christians develop more completely and non-Christians are more readily helped educationally and personally.
- **"5. Christian Ideals.** Christian education takes total knowledge and translates it into the practical, workable, durable pattern of personal living for a purpose: service to God and mankind.
- "6. Christian Teachings. The basic interpretation that flows from Christian truth enhances every subject taught in our seven Baptist Colleges. The content of these academic subjects is alike in all good colleges. The basic differences lie in the application of the dynamic faith of the Christian religion; thereby adding new light and new truth to the mind of the student.
- "7. Christian Service. The end product of a Christian College will be found in Christians at work for the Kingdom as teachers, preachers, missionaries, housewives, business and professional people, politics, etc."

During the last academic year — 1957-1958 — there were 7,634 students enrolled in our seven Baptist Colleges. This number represents one-eighth of all students in North Carolina's 61 colleges and universities. This was an increase of above 1,000 from the previous academic year. This increase was in keeping with the record enrollment noted in the seventy Southern Baptist educational institutions which reported enrollment increases at 5.4 per cent in the seminaries, 3.0 per cent in the senior colleges, 5.1 per cent in the junior colleges, and 7.7 per cent in the academies.

Think of what this means. As more and more students enter our schools more and more eventually will enter the main currents of life with a Church-centered educational background. Their leadership will extend in all vocational directions, and their influence of Christian leadership will help desecularize our world and make it more in harmony with Christian ideals.

For this reason we must and we will stand with our colleges in North Carolina to strengthen and to undergird them in every way.

Thus this report recommends: (1) that the advantages of a Christ-

centered education in our colleges be encouraged by parents, pastors, and teachers of this association; (2) that the churches of this association keep in close contact with their students by sharing with them the problems and diffficulties that every college student faces; (3) that on Father's Day. Christian Education Day be observed with a special offering for providing financial assistance for hundreds of fine students unable to attend college without such help.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT FOR 1958

Facts do not tell the whole story but they tell some of it. Our hospital last year provided bed care for 16.000 patients, and for 120,000 visits to the clinics and offices of the medical staff and chaplains. The hospital spent more than \$500,000 in providing free care beyond the means of its patients. The primary source for meeting this expense was the Mother's Day offering. This offering has increased by twenty per cent in the last five years.

In our Association this year twenty one churches gave \$891 through the Mother's Day offering. This was \$49 more than the total amount given last year, or a gain of about five per cent. We have reason to be encouraged that twenty-one of our twenty-four churches responded to this great opportunity. Our earnest hope is that the time will come soon when every church in our Association will have a part in this great Christian service.

Baptists are growing in members. This means that there are more

Baptists to share our great cooperative enterprises. It also means that there are more sick people who are unable to pay for hospital care. It is again true that hospital costs have increased more than twenty per cent during the past five years. If we who have been giving, and others who join us, not only continue to do as much as we have been doing, but also increase our gifts as we can, we shall be able to meet the most urgent needs. If we do not do our best, there must be those, who are God's people, left to suffer because we did not love Him and them with big enough hearts.

We recommend:

- 1. That each church of our Association, and every member of our churches, resolve now to share in the Mother's Day offering on the Second Sunday in May, 1959.
- 2. That as we have opportunity each one of us shall visit our hospital at Winston-Salem that we may see the great tasks we are doing together.
- 3. That we shall remember to pray earnestly that God will show us what to do about our hospital, and give us grace and determination to do what He shows.

REPORT ON BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA

The year 1958 has brought many changes in our Baptist Children's Homes. In June our Supt. W. C. Reed after 15 years of progressive leadership resigned. Under his supervision the Children's Homes experienced one of its greatest periods of building, growth and service.

Dr. W. R. Wagoner of North Wilkesboro was elected as Supt. and took over his duties July 1, 1958.

Since January 1958 the Odum Home for Indian children at Pembroke has been under the care and support of our Baptist Homes. Here 16 children have a Baptist Home. We now have Mills Home, Kennedy Home and Odum Home where we directly served a total of 753 children. 200 children through our social workers resourcefulness have been re-established with family or relatives in a clean wholesome family life. 19 children served from South Sandy Creek Association.

Lets us give our Baptist children who cannot give anything to us but their love, gratitude and every effort, regardless of emotional disturbances and heavy burdens, to make a good christian citizen in our society tomorrow. How? Once a month offering and the Cooperative program and the Thanksgiving Offering. Increased from 10% to 15%.

As we look to the future of our children let us give of our offering

but most important give of our prayers for the children and for the staff who serve them.

"God looks most where man looks least—at the heart. The deepest problem is not to add years to our lives but to add Life to our lives and life to our children. Hem your blessings with praise for your children lest they unravel. To say one has no time for God's children is like saying one has no time for breathing".

TRAINING UNION REPORT

Training Union has made some progress in our Association this year, but so far short of the desired goal.

There have been two training unions organized this year, one at the West End Baptist Church and one at the Pine Grove Baptist Church. There are eleven churches with training unions in our Association with a combined enrollment of 883. Average attendance during the year was 527. There were 139 training union awards given to three participating churches.

On December 8th "M" night was held at the Bethlehem Baptist Church with 179 present. There were 16 churches represented

There are 13 churches without a training union in our Assocation. This should sound a note of alarm among the leaders of our churches. With so many distracting elements in our society today that lead people to feel that the spiritual life is dull and boring surely we should realize the importance of training in our churches. The word "Training" came into existence through the teaching of Jesus Christ. Before he sends forth he desires real training. This should be the key word in our churches "Training for Service".

The ingredients for a good training union in any church are these:

- 1. Consecrated christians
- 2. Willing workers
- 3. Love for Christ and obedience to his commands
- 4. Zeal and determination
- 5. Patience and understanding
- 6. And most of all the desire to grow spiritually

Yes, the challenge is before us to organize and train, not for a statistical table to be completed with great figures, but to fulfill a need in the South Sandy Creek Association.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

"Ye have not chosen me, but I have chosen you, and ordained you, that ye should go and bring fruit, and that your fruit should remain: that whatsoever ye shall ask of the Father in my name, he may give it to you". (John 15: 16.)

It is the responsibility of every Christian to win others to Christ. Jesus called men, and commissioned men to the essential task of soul-winning. This program has, in a large measure, been left to the women of the churches. Nevertheless, the kingdom task is primarily a job for the men. This is so because the man is by divine right the head of the house, as Christ is head of the Church. That being true, the responsibility for both the temporal and the Spiritual welfare of the church rests primarily upon the man.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC DIRECTOR

This marks the second year of the music ministry within the South Sandy Creek Association. Not only is it a young organization in our Association, it is also one of the youngest organizations of our State Convention. It is under the capable leadership of Bro. Joe Stroud, Secretary of the Music Department for our North Carolina Baptist Convention.

The music ministry of our State Convention and Association is designed for everyone in the church and not for just the music leaders. We hope that everyone will take advantage of this ministry whenever the opportunity presents itself.

The week November 11-15, 1957, marked the first Association Music School for our Association. It was held in the First Baptist Church, Carthage. The school was directed by Bro. Stroud and your Associational Music Director. Four courses were offered. They were: Practical Music Lessons, The Church Music Manual, Technique of Conducting, and Gospel Song and Hymn Playing. The faculty consisted of Mrs. Eugene Deese, Mr. Haskel Duncan, Mr. Jack Clinard and Mr. Joe Stroud. We had 119 enrolled in the school with an average attendance of 74. 17 churches of the Association were represented. There were 49 awards given. We feel that this first school was in every way successful and look forward to another one this year.

Let us all pledge our full cooperation and prayers to the music ministry in our Association.

W. M. U. REPORT

Woman's Missionary Union has an increase in membership this year of a little more than 20% (185 new members—45 WMS, 140 youth) making a total for all organizations of 1,041. We have 12 new youth organizations. Over 80% of WMS members give through the co-operative program. The percentage is not nearly so good in our youth organizations. We are not proud of our percentage of tithers, which is less than 40% for WMS and lower in the youth organizations.

There were 45 Mission Study classes in all organizations which is lower than our 56 of last year. 15 of 18 societies contributed to the church-wide offering for state missions. Our Lotte Moon Christmas offering amounted to \$3,114.97. Association-wide, we had one Mission

Study Institute (in January), one Community Mission Institute (in Febuary), one Stewardship Institute (in April) and a Leadership Conference last October with 95 leaders attending. We also had four quarterly Executive Committee meetings with a good percentage of local Presidents attending. I must not forget our Annual meeting in March, with inspirational messages from Mrs. Charles Maddry, our Regional Superintendent, Miss Beverly Neilson, State Sunbeam Band Director and one of our missionaries, Miss Ernelle Brooks, from Nigeria.

The watchword of Southern W. M. U. this year is "Sing unto the Lord, bless His Name; shew forth His salvation from day to day." (Psalm 96:2).

The setting for this Psalm, as you know, is a typical one in Jewish tradition, a congregation in the temple for the celebration of one of the Jewish festivals. On such occasions in Jewish history, music played a tremendous part in the worship experience, just as it does for us today. Our watchword was taken from this song of praise. His followers are admonished to "shew forth His salvation" so that their heathen neighbors might come to know God. The meaning of this Psalm parallels the purpose of Women's Missionary Union. Motivated by a glorious experience with Christ, let us praise Him for all His blessings by "shewing forth His salvation" in a deeper prayer life, personal witnessing, service to him in giving of self, time, tithes, and offerings. Our fullest expression of gratitude is the "shewing forth of His salvation from day to day" in any way that we are called.

Claude Connell will preach the sermon with Rev. Charles T. Dorman as alternate. Motion to accept was made and adopted.

- 44. Report was made by the investigating Committee concerning the calling of an Associational Missionary. Brief talks were made from the floor concerning this matter.
- 45. S. E. Hannon read the report on Christian Literature and moved its adoption. Motion was seconded.

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

How much sound christian literature comes into your home each week? How about your reading table? Is it a silent witness to your Baptist faith and practice, or is it cluttered with much that carries the seeds of evil? Never before has there been so much to read. Profithungry publishers continue to pour their steady stream of bad literature into our news stands and even into our mail-boxes. On the other hand we have at our command the finest and most inspiring literature of any age. May we keep in mind the words of the Apostle Paul in Romans. 12:21, "Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good".

We have here in our own state two splendid publications, the Charty & Children and the Biblical Recorder. The Recorder circulation has now reached approximately 61,000. This paper ought to go into every Baptist home. We are happy to report that seven of our churches are now receiving the Recorder. The following are working through the Every Family Plan: First Church Aberdeen, Cameron, First Church Carthage, Lemon Springs, and the First Church of Southern Pines. Bethlehem, Calvary, Ephesus, Robbins and Vass are using the Club Plan.

A bundle of Charity & Children should go into each Baptist Church each week. We regret to report that only seven churches in our Association are receiving this attractive and informative paper. The price is still 60c per year, when ordered in bundles of 10 or more. All pas-

tors and Sunday School Superintendents will receive complimentary copies if they will send their names to the editor.

Southern Baptist recognize the American Bible Society as an essential part of their own world wide mission program. If the people of the world are to know Jesus Christ, the one hope of men and nations, they must have the Bible. During 1956 the American Bible Society distributed throughout the world more than 15 million volumes of Scripture. Supplied more than 13,000 Bible and Scripture to Hungarian refugees coming to the U.S.A. The Bible was also translated into more than 1100 languages.

Because The American Bible Society serves Missions—and because Southern Baptist Missionaries depend to a great extent on the Society for the Scripture they need for distribution, a large per cent of our churches try to make at least one worthwhile offering each year to this worthy cause. How much has your church given?

We would recommend: First, that we encourage daily Bible reading in each home during this associational year. Second, that we endeavor to put our two state papers, Biblical Recorder and Charity & Children in each home. Third, That we take at least one offering for the American Bible Society. Fourth, we use and introduce to our people the many fine magazines, books and other publications published by the Southern Baptist Convention and W.M.U.

EVANGELISM REPORT

Evangelism is the heart of God's work on earth. It must ever bein the foreground of all our endeavors in the churches and in the association if we follow the New Testament pattern. Every Christian's greatest privilege and responsibility is to let Jesus Christ work in and through us to evangelize the world. This is the Great Commission and to carry out the Great Commission is to do the work of evangelism.

What are we doing in response to this high call from God? Let us look briefly at the record.

All churches in the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina last year had a ratio of baptisms to membership of 1 to 25. This means that on an average last year it took 25 church members a whole year to win one person to Christ. This record isn't what it should be, but it does represent an increase in baptisms of 4% over the preceding year. Total baptisms reported in the state in 1956 were 32,468, and in 1957 they were 33,796.

In the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association last year the ratio of baptisms to membership was 1 to 20. Total baptisms reported in our association in 1957 were 183. This year the churches reported 214 baptisms. This represents a gain of 31 over 1957.

The number of people won to Christ and baptized into the fellowship of the churches gives only a partial picture of the work of evangelism in the churches. The remainder of the picture is seen in what happens to the converts after baptism. Here statistics are not so easily compiled, but the number who will be won to Christ and baptized in the future is dependent upon the maturing of those being baptized now. A Christian grows only as he participates in witnessing for Christ. Thus the program of evangelism in a church consists of winning people to Christ and keeping them enlisted in the total work of redemption.

Next year we face an unparalleled opportunity to lead all people in the churches to engage in the total work of redemption by going all the way in cooperation in the continent-wide Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade. This Crusade will be the biggest concerted effort ever made to win the North American continent to Christ and to experience new depths of dedication to Christ on the part of all church members. Seven major Baptist conventions in the United States and Canada are cooperating in this Crusade. These conventions are composed of 75,000 churches which have 19,000,000 members. Here is an opportunity like we have never faced before to get into the stream of God's redeeming purpose. Surly every church in this association will want to be a part of this great effort!

ALLIED CHURCH LEAGUE

As far back as history is recorded, the issue of morals and temperance have been in the limelight as one of our greatest concerns, as a church and as a nation. We are reminded daily through our newspapers of the moral conditions which exist in our state and nation. Whatever conditions exist in our state do so by the permission of the good people.

How long shall we permit such conditions to exist as were revealed by the recent expose of free liquor being delivered to the rooms of certain legislators in Raleigh? The remedy for these conditions is at the ballot box. To have good government we as Christians must take advantage of our right to vote and vote for men who are not for sale at any price. We should be sure that the men we vote for are of good character and Christian principles.

Since March 1, 1957, three county ABC elections (Currituck, Lee, & Jones) and two ABC city elections (Southport and Clinton) were held. The Drys won Currituck and Lee but lost by a close vote in Jones county. The Wets won both city elections. If the Christians of Moore County would rise up against liquor as those people of Currituck and Lee Counties did, Moore County would also be dry.

Another condition that needs the attention of the Christians is the gambling issue. Legal gambling had a surprising amount of support in the recent general assembly. It is because of such evil forces as these

which are trying to corrupt our land that the Allied Church League was organized.

The purpose of the Allied Church League is:

- 1. To unite all who believe in total abstinence in a cooperative effort against beverage alcohol in its every form;
- 2. To provide an efficient agency through which all evangelical churches can work in opposing beverage alcohol and promoting civic righteousness.
- 3. To work for good government by seeking to elect men of highest character to public office and by encouraging the making of laws that will further civic and social righteousness;
- 4. To enlighten the public and educate youth concerning the dangers of beverage alcohol and allied social evils;
- 5. To promote programs for the rehabilitation of the victims of alcoholic beverages; such programs to be in keeping with the other purposes stated above.

Several denominations affiliated with the Allied Church League are promoting active programs of temperance education. The Methodist Church, through their district workshops and Southern Baptists through the promotion of alcohol education work, have done splendid jobs. More than 50% of our Baptist churches cooperated in the program and the Methodists of the Western North Carolina Conference, under the leadership of Dr. James Stokes, received national recognition for its outstanding work. Through the work of these Churches we believe that other denominations will be encouraged to put on a more aggressive program.

Through the efforts of the League plans are under way for a course on alcohol education instruction to be given at Appalachian State Teachers College for the summer session of 1959. This will be primarily for teachers of alcohol education in the high schools of the state.

Temperance Sunday and Commitment Day was observed on Sunday, December 1, 1957. The churches responded well in observance of this day and there were many pledges to total abstinence signed. Each year additional churches join in this observance and the League is recommending that Sunday, December 7, 1958 he set aside for Temperance Sunday and Commitment Day this year.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

There are now twenty-five Churches that are members of the Association. The Robbins Cross Roads Baptist Church being its latest member. In 1950, when the South Sandy Creek Baptist Association was organized, there were only seventeen Churches in the Association.

On May 18th of this year, the Carthage First Baptist Church held its 100th Anniversary. The Church was first organized in May 1858 with twenty-two members.

The Executive Committee Meetings of the Association were held on Dec. 30, 1957 at the Ives Memorial Baptist Church, March 31, 1958 at the West End Baptist Church, June 30, 1958 at the Pine Grove Baptist Church, Sept. 8, 1958 at the Unity Grove Baptist Church.

The First Baptist Church, Aberdeen, N. C. has called Rev. R. D. Spear, Jr., to be its Pastor. Rev. F. E. Deese having been its former Pastor. During the past summer a ten-day Vacation Bible School was held in its adequate church building.

During the past year the Ashley Heights Baptist Church has improved its church grounds and a lot adjoining the church property has been donated to the Church by Mrs. E. R. Pickler

The Bethlehem Baptist Church held a two-weeks Vacation Bible School during the past summer.

The Calvary Baptist Church has added to their equipment tables for the little children at a cost of \$45.00, song books at a cost of \$85.00, pulpit furniture and pews at a cost of \$2,287.32, a carpet at a cost of \$289.90, refinished the floor at a cost of \$45.00, bought a vacuum cleaner at a cost of \$40.00. The church grounds have also been improved with shubbery, at a cost of \$4.50.

The Cameron Baptist Church has called Rev. Charles Dorman to be their Pastor. Rev. James B. Cooper was their former Pastor. The basement in the church building has been completed and a furnace has been installed in the parsonage.

The Carthage First Baptist Church has remodeled their kitchen and during the summer they held a two-weeks Vacation Bible School. The Church held their 100th. Anniversary on May 18th, of this year. The Church was organized in May 1858 with 22 members, and since that time the membership has greatly increased. Plans are well under way for the construction of a new educational building. Also an illustrated Historical Sketch of the Church has been printed.

The Ephesus Baptist Church has called Rev. Bernard Fallin of Wake Forest, N. C. to be their Pastor. Rev. James Cooper was their former Pastor. Class rooms for their Sunday School Department have been added to their church building at an estimated cost of \$10,000. The Dedication Services were held on April 20, 1958. A furnace and chairs have been added to their equipment. The Church has organized a Training Union and the Sunbeams and G. A.'s have been organized and leaders have been elected for the R. A.'s.

The Flint Hill Baptist Church has added pulpit furniture and pews for two Sunday School rooms to their equipment.

The Ladies Circle No. 1, of the Ives Memorial Baptist Church are going to present a pulpit screen to the Church. The Church has their new Sunday School rooms well towards completion. The lights and the pipes from the furnace have already been installed. A \$700.00 piano has been given to the church. The cost so far of the new Sunday School Educational Building is \$6,187.88.

The Lemon Springs Baptist Church has called Rev. Bernard Fallin to be their pastor. Rev. James Cooper was their former pastor. Over ten years ago the Women of the Church were instrumental in starting a building fund which by the beginning of 1958 had reached the sum of \$7,500. In June 1958 work was begun on an Educational Building and now the building is debt free having spent so far \$6,000 towards its construction. The Church now has Services every Sunday instead of twice a month as heretofore, and also has Prayer Meetings every Wednesday night.

The New Home Baptist Church has Rev. John Weatherman as their Pastor and a Vacation Bible School was held during the past summer.

On Dec. 29, 1957, the Pine Grove Baptist Church ordained one of their members to the Ministry. The Church has also organized a Training Union.

The Red Branch Baptist Church has added a vestibule and steeple to their church building, provided outside lights, painted eleven Sunday School rooms, leveled the church grounds, made cement walks and sowed the lawn with grass seed. A marble plaque with the name of the Church and their date of organization has been put over the church door. Also 50 new song books and a lawn mower have been added to their equipment. The total cost of the added improvements and equipment was \$1,640.87.

The First Baptist Church, Robbins, N. C. has had painting and repairs done on their church building at a cost of \$500.00. New song books have been bought at a cost of \$50.00. Also during the past summer an eight-day Vacation Bible School was conducted by the Church.

The Robbins Cross Roads Baptist Church has for their Pastor Rev. M. D. Chrisco. The Church is working on new Sunday School rooms but as yet they have not been completed.

The Rosendale Baptist Church has called Rev. James L. Clayton to be their Pastor.

The First Baptist Church, Southern Pines, N. C. has air conditioned the upstairs of their Educational Building. The church grounds have been improved by the construction of brick retaining walls and the building of new walks. All of the church buildings have been painted and repaired both inside and out. 189 new Baptist Hymnals have been bought. Also a well illustrated Church History has been published.

The Taylor's Memorial Baptist Church has bought pews for the wings of the church at a cost of \$941.60.

Rev. Bruce Christopher is the new Pastor of the Unity Grove Baptist Church. Rev. Paul A. Gailes was their former Pastor. Improvement of the church grounds has been made and some new equipment has been obtained for the church building.

The Vass Baptist Church has built a Pastorium at a cost of \$11,000.00.

The West End Baptist Church has ordained one man to the Ministry during the past year. A Training Union has been organized and the church grounds have been improved. The Church was organized on April 23, 1939, with 13 members. Now the Church has 145 members and they moved into their new brick building in 1956.


