ANNUAL SESSION OF THE

United Bantist Association.

Held with the Church at New Hope, Wilkes Co., N. C., October the 14th and 15th, 1864.

> NEW-HOPE, WILKES COUNTY, N. C., Fridaz, October 14th, 1864.

The introductory sermon was preached by Elder J. Reed, according to appointment of last year, from Matthew XIII chapter and XXIII verse: "But he that received seed into the good ground is he that heareth the word, &c."

After a respite of thirty minutes, the Association convened in church house, and was called to order by Elder S. Ferguson,

Moderator of last year, by singing and prayer.

Letters from ten churches were handed in and read, from

which the annexed statistical table was made out.

The Association then proceeded to the election of officers.— Elders R. H. Moody and W. C. Parkes were appointed to take the vote. Elder S. FERGUSON was chosen Moderator, and bro. P. Eller, Clerk.

Invited corresponding messengers, when W. C. Parkes, from the Jefferson Association, with a letter, and R. H. Moode, from the Catawba Association, with a letter, were kindly received, the right hand of fellowship was given them by the Moderator and they seated with the Association.

Appointed Elder R. L. Steele and bro. Benjamin Martin a

committee on mance.

Appointed the delegates of the New Hope church, a committee on devotional exercise.

Appointed Elders S. Trivett, J. McNeil, and W. R. Gault-

nev. a committee on resolutions.

Appointed the next Association to be held with the Oak Forest hurch, Wilkes County, N. C., nine miles east from Wilkesboro, to commence on Friday before the third Sabbath in October, 1865. Elder R. L. Steele to preach the introductory sermon; Elder R. Gentry, his alternate.

The committee on devotional exercise reported for to-morrow, Elders J B. Green, I. Oxford and S. Trivett, and that they

Appointed Elders R. Gentry, L. Oxford, J. B. Green, bro. B. Martin and Elder J. Reed, with the Mo 'erator and Clerk, a committee of arrangement, and invite corresponding massengers to sit with them.

SATURDAY, October 15th, 1864.

Met according to adjournment. Prayer by Elder R. H. Moody.

1st. Called the roll of delegates and marked absentees.

2nd. Called on the committee of Arrangement who reported. Report received and the committee discharged.

3rd. Read, corrected and adopted the minutes of yesterday.

4th. Read rules of decorum.

5th. Extended the invitation of vesterday, inviting transient preachers: A. Irwin accepted the invitation; and also Elder Wm. Hall, from the Roaring River Association, accepted the invitation.

6th. The Moderator announced the following committees:

On Temperance, Elder I. Oxford. Bro. B. Martin.

" Sabbath Schools, " Periodicals, Elder S. Trivett.

J. B. Green. " Missions. " Colportage, W. R. Gaultney.

" Education,

J. Reed.

" Missions of Women, 66 S. Trivett.

7th. Elder R. L. Steele to write a circular, and have it published in the Recorder.

8th. Called on the Treasurer, who reported, and was discharged. See report, appendix, letter A.

9th. Called on corresponding messengers, who reported and

were discharged.

10th. Called on the delegates appointed to the Baptist State

Convention, who reported and were discharged.

11th. Appointed corresponding messengers: To the Catawba Association, Elders J. Reed, R. L. Steele, I. Oxford and J. H. West. To the Roan Mountain, Elder J. McNeil to write a corresponding letter to that Association. To the Yadkin, Elders W. R. Gaultney, J. McNeil and J. B. Green. To the Lebauon, Elders S. Trivett, J. McNeil, and brethren P. Eller and James Eller. To the Jefferson Association, Elders R. Gentry. S. Trivett, W. R. Gauliney, J. Reed and J. McNeil.

12th. Appointed Elders W. R. Gaultney and S. Trivett delegates to the next session of the Baptist State Convention.

13th. Called on our Missionary of the last Associational year, who reported satisfactory, and was discharged. See 16port at letter B.



14th. On motion, a committee oof THREE. employ a missionary to ride the near Missi, ear, namount: Elders R. Gentry, J.-B. oreen and R. L. Steele, who reported and were discharged. See report, at letter C.

15th. The committee on Temperance was called on, who

reported that he failed to write, and was discharged.

16th. The committee on Sabbath Schools reported, and was discharged. See appendix, letter D.

Took a recess for one-half hour, after which, the Association

took up its regular business.

17th. The committee on Periodicals reported, and was discharged. See report, at letter E.

18th. The committee on Education reported, and was dis-

charged. See report, at letter F.

19th. The committee on Devotional Exercise reported, for Sabbath, Elder W. C. Parkes, first; Elder R. H. Moody, to follow, and preach a Denominational scrnool; Elder W. R. Gaultney, third and last, and to preach a Missionary and Temperance sermon.

20th. The committee appointed to visit Fishing Creek church, reported that they failed to attend, and on motion, was discharged.
21st. Then, after the matter was investigated and discussed,

the Association withdrew from her.

22nd. The Association then advised brethren H. Curris, Harvey Pennel, and others, who had been excluded from Fishing Creek church, to join any church they may choose, by application, or to constitute a church upon the principles of this Association, based upon the principles of the New Testament.

22rd. The Association then authorized the Treasurer to hand over the books on hand to the brother Missionaries, who are

required to sell them at five times their original cost.

24th. Appointed the Clerk to superintend the printing of the Minutes, and that he be allowed twenty five dollars for his services, and the balance to be applied to the use of printing.

25th. The committee on Finance reported, and was dis-

charged. See report, at letter G.

Then, on motion, the Association adjourned to time and place appointed.

Thus closed another session of this Association, in which not a single jar occurred to mar its peace, and during the entire sorvice, peace, harmony and unanimity prevailed. [Clerk.
