



Herod Church, Terrell Co. Ga., Oct. 29, 1895.

THE BETTEL ASSOCIATION met this day at the above named church, at the hour of 10 a.m., and spent one hour in a prayer and song service, after which the Introductory Sermon was preached by Bro. E. Z. F. Golden, from II Cor. viii: 9.

The congregation was then dismissed until 2, p. m.

FIRST DAY.—AFTERNOON SESSION.

At the appointed hour the people assembled in the new church building and, after a song and prayer, Bro. W. P. McArthur, the former Moderator, conducting the services.

1. The roll of Messengers from the churches was formed preparato-

ry to permanent organization.

2. Bro. W. P. McArthur having moved out of the bounds of this Association, Bro. E. Z. F. Golden, pastor of Cuthbert church, was elected Moderator, and W. M. Howell, clerk, Bro. T. M. Callaway, of Dawson, and Bro. W. H. Norton, of Ft. Valley, counting the ballots.

3. Omitting the reading of the letters from the churches, the Order

of Business printed in the Minutes of last year was adopted.

4. The call was made for applicants for membership in this body,

but none responded.

5. The hours fixed for meeting and adjourning were as follows: Meet at 8:30, a. m., and 1:30, p. m; adjourn at 10:50, a. m., and at

will, p. m.

8. Agents of Denominational Enterprises: J. F. Edens, representing the Christian Index; Harvey Hatcher, representing the A. B. Publication Society. The body adjourned.

SECOND DAY.—FORENOON SESSION.

The Association met according to agreement and opened with devotional services.

9. The Minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and approved. 10. The call for correspondents, agents and visitors was renewed, when Bro. J. G. Gibson, corresponding secretary of the State Mission Board, reported in that capacity and also as agent for Mercer University.

11. The Treasurer's report was read and referred to the Auditor...

REPORT ON MISSIONS.

12. The Report of Missions was read by Bro. R. B. Taylor, who requested Bro. J. G. Gibson to address the body on the subject of Missions in connection with the report. He did so with his usual ener-

gy and power. The report reads as follows:

"From the Bible standpoint it seems that no man can be born of the spirit of God and not be a missionary, nor be unwilling to cheerfully support missions. The very fact that man is made a changed being, and is rescued from an endless hell and is made an heir of God, ought to make him identified with, and be a ready and willing helper in all that concerns God's cause and glory in the earth.

But when Jesus, who bought the sinner with his own heart's blood, commands him to give and tells him, 'if ye love me, ye will keep my words,' then he who refuses to give is in one or the other of these conditions: either he has not been taught his duty, or he is still in nature's darkness. If a member of the church has not been enlightened on the great duty of missions, the fault lies greatly at the preacher's door; but if he has been taught and persistently refuses to give, then the churches have no alternative but to exclude him, for the Scriptures tell us to withdraw from the covetous. It is no credit to the churches, not does it glorify God, to have members and not actors. 'Be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only,' say the scriptures. All the glory of 32,000 soldiers vanishes in the air when it is known that only 300 men are ready for the battle. God is not dependent on numbers for the accomplishment of his purposes, but our progress and happiness and peace depend upon our obedience, and obedience will send the gospel.

To remedy the evil as far as lieth in our power we would suggest and recommend that the pastors, by personal effort or through a responsible committee, seek to enlist every member in the churches and secure a mission contribution from them; and we would also recommend that a collection be taken for missions at every monthly meeting. Duty to God and the cause and the heathen urge and demand it.

ON EDUCATION?

14. The Report on Education was read, and pending the motion to adopt, many good things were said, relative to the necessity and opportunities for higher and better education, by brethren E. Z. F. Golden, J. L. Underwood and W. N. Reeves.

Before the end of the consideration of this report, the time for

preaching service arrived and the body adjourned.

SECOND DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 1:30 p. m., the body returned to the house and, after devotional service, resumed business. Before returning to the unfinished Report, the Roll of Messengers was called and further completed.

The Educational Report was then taken up and without further

discussion was adopted as follows:

In attempting a report on education, your committee is aware that only the most prominent points can be briefly dwelt upon. Few subjects, if any, deserve and are receiving more earnest and effective consideration, from both philanthropist and christian, than is given to the training of the children of the present generation. Yet it is impossible to escape the painful consciousness that too many are shamefully and disastrously inattentive to all that is said and done in this worthy cause. Whether baneful stupidity, criminal avarice, inexcusable neglect, or galling poverty directs the course of the great majority to shut up their offspring to a life of ignorance, is not ours to determine. Be the operating causes what they may, we cannot overlook the sad fact. Every parent, every person acting for parents, and every one desiring the happiness of the present and approaching generations, or seeking the glory of God, will find in these statistics absorbing interest, should they give them intelligent consideration: The last census gives the entire population of Georgia at 1,897,353. The school population in 1893 was 604,971. Of these there were 315,040 white children, 254,940 of whom were enrolled in 5,047 schools with 5,898 teachers. The average attendance was 243,378. Of this vast army of children, only 44 per cent remains in school for the short term of 100 days in the year. Of the 315,040 white children, 60,100 were not in school during the year, 36,638 between the ages of 10 and 18 years could neither read nor write. These are appalling statements that call loudly for prompt and persevering attention. Into the 101 colleges and universities were admitted, during 1893, 2,694 pupils. smallness of this number indicating the comparative lack of attention—to higher education should also be matter of deep concern. It

is true that education in its fundamental meaning is independent of books, schools, colleges, seminaries and universities. These are little more than the selected means to accomplish a desired end-the approved tools, and the mental work-shop in which trained masters shape the youth for usefulness. It is impossible to conceive of a highly educated person who would be a stranger to places of learning, and unacquainted with books. The great school of Nature shuts her doors against no man and affords to all extensive means for "leading out" and developing whatever capacities may be possessed. As the great Alma Mater of the ages, she can point with pride to hosts of sons and daughters whom their own generations have crowned with chaplets of glery. Here the first principles are simple, the grades well chosen, and the sources of information inexhaustible. Hence he whose powers are undeveloped, and whose mind is void of useful knowledge, is to be pitied as a weakling, or censured as a sloth. But God, in his good providence for the greater happiness of man, and for his own glory through revelation has enabled the worthy students in this great common school to formulate and preserve through written language the best results of their laborious researches. Step by step advancement has been made, not only by increasing knowledge as a final possession, but, which is vastly more important, by directing the instruction of the young in such manner as to enable them to become educated with greater rapidity and ease than is possible without special training. To such extent have civilized people become concerned with this very reasonable EFFORT at training as to render the work of schools, by means of books, and other appliances, the synonim of education. While this is true, it is important that this meaning should be received with caution. A proper conception of the subject discourages no youth, however unfortunate in his surroundings, makes the parent the first teacher, and offers to the capable and ambitious, prospects the most thrilling and inviting.

It is with pleasure that we note the growing tendency of our more prosperous communities to extend the Public school term to ten months. Children have but one period of school training, say until the age of 21 years has been reached. They then pass from children to womanhood and manhood. By this time the parent has done what, in most cases, is allowed the privilege of doing. Remembering this, the parent should, as far as possible, employ these youthful years in giving their children as much thorough training as their means will afford. Whatever may be said about the public school system, it is here to stay. A community is no poorer on this account, provided the work of the state is sufficiently supplemented to extend the term to 9 or 10 months each year, under competent teachers. Having the school, let the children attend. The school will do the children who stay at

home no good.

But the state cannot with equity provide for education beyond that point which the common safety has been secured. The high school, the university, the college, under state patronage becomes class legislation and paternalism. While the christian and philanthropist should feel themselves called upon to guard with jealous care every step of any proposed plan of instruction, upon them the state should let fall the entire burden of what is generally called higher education. At this point begins our work as a denomination of christians, as a

gathering of churches by messengers for the purpose of united effort for the glory of God. In furthering this glorious enterprise, our fathers have committed to us rich legacies both in formulated and partially executed plans, and institutions of learning more or less fully equipped and endowed. From their sleeping dust, from their monuments more lasting than marble, from the memories of the past, comes an earnest appeal to us whom their patrimony has enriched, pleading that the work so nobly begun should not languish. Will we heed it?

To us, the first of these bequests is Bethel College. To this many noble brethren contributed liberally both of time and means. But the labors of Uncle Tommie Muse, so long the most prominent figure among you, have here found a most fitting expression of his interest in the children of the people whom he so much loved. May the day speedily come when we, to whom the unfinished work has been committed, may feel that abiding interest in this institution that the situation demands. If we will we can make it a means of accomplish-

ing untold good.

One of the great sources of recognized denominational power and, consequently, of christian enterprise, is Mercer University. This institution is only a step further removed from us than our own Bethel. Indeed, it is so near as to have the strongest possible hold upon us in every way. With a healthy location, a good moral and religious atmosphere, a wise board of trustees, a high standard of instruction, and a faculty excelled by none in our State, it only remains for us to do our duty, to make Mercer University in fact, what she ought always to be-the pride of every Georgia Baptist. May we not urge upon individuals and the churches to prayerfully consider her interests and give her our patronage? In the schedule adopted by the convention at Waycross it is arranged that the collection for January be given to our University. Let us take a note of this very excellent arrangement, that when that month has passed, by earnest effort, we may be able to send up to the treasurer a liberal contribution both for regular expenses and permanent endowment.

The Southern Theological Seminary at Louisville, is doing all that could be required in the special work for which it was founded. A number of our best young proachers go from Georgia to that institution to obtain training in the study of God's word and in the preparation so much needed for the arduous work to which they have given themselves. They should have our prayers, encouragement and financial aid, when that is necessary. The Institution itself deserves our steady and liberal support. There are now in attendance 250 students, 19 of whom are from Georgia.

While attending to the educational wants of our boys and young men, we should not be unmindful of the necessities of the girls and young women. From some cause, it has transpired that Georgia Baptists as a body have not acted with the same unanimity, liberality and enterprise in looking after the higher education of the females as they have in providing for the males. We have no female college under the control of our State convention. We are provided with many good schools for women, in spite of adverse circumstances, and sometimes in the face of entright opposition. As belonging in one way or another to Baptists, deserving our patronage, may be mentioned

Dr. Nunnally's college at LaGrange, Shorter Female College at Rome, Monroe Female College at Forsyth, and the magnificent institution lately moved from LaGrange to Manchester, and under the direction of the Cox-Baker family. Should this college have the patronage it deserves, it will, no doubt, afford educational facilities for the young

women of Georgia, nowhere else to be found.

The subject of co-education at Mercer University is again being agitated. We are led to expect a discussion of the subject at the next meeting of the G. B. Convention. In view of this, your committee would recommend that this Association as a constituent member of the convention do here and now enter our protest against the adoption of such a course so far as relates to the college department proper. 16. SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT.

This report was read by the chairman, Bro. J. S. Knowles, and pending the motion to adopt, brethren Knowles, Hatcher and Smith addressed the body upon the report and various topics touching Sunday schools. The following is the report:

Your committee feel that they cannot lay too much stress on the Sunday school work. It is of so much importance, that we know of

no better way of helping parents to train their children.

Every church should be engaged in this work, and every community having no church, should have a Sunday school. And yet some of our churches do not report Sunday schools, and some churches

report them for only a part of the year.

Pastors, deacons and churches should all wake up to their duties, and establish evergreen schools in all the churches. To effect this end great care should be taken in selecting superintendents and teachers, for much depends on having the right men in all such places, and they should apply themselves very closely to their work, so as to make the Sunday school instructive, especially to the children, for if we fail to train THEM somebody else will do it, and that in a wrong way. Brethren, let us all be more faithful, and do more towards keeping up the Sunday school interest. Let us all try to do more the next year than ever before. Let us pray that we may feel the responsibility more than ever before. Respectfully submitted.

17. REPORT ON DIGEST OF LETTERS.

This report was read by the chairman of the committee and contains some points that should be thoughtfully considered. It reads as follows:

We, your committee, beg leave to report that upon examination of

the letters, we find that the additions to the churches by baptism has not been as large as last year. This indicates a sad want of spiritual power and zeal in the prosecution of the glorious work of soul win-

ning.

We observe, that there has been an increase in the contributions for missions. This may be due, however, to material, rather than spiritual prosperity. God in His providence has graciously smiled on us this year and our hearts should have been filled with such gratitude as would prompt us to give liberally into the treasury of the Lord.

We find that only ten churches report prayer meetings, and only fifteen Sabbath schools. This we hope is not a true statement of the

churches, but is possibly due to neglect.

We, your Committee on Obituaries, beg leave to submit the following

report:

Since the last meeting of this body it hath pleased our heavenly Father to remove from his labors on earth to his home in heaven our aged Bro. Thomas Muse, which event occurred at his home with Bro. D. W. Hammock, in Coleman, Ga., April the 19th, 1895.

Bro. Muse was born in Middlesex county, Va., Jan. 6th, 1810. On Sept. 14th, 1832, he was baptized. Four years afterwards he moved to Blakely, Ga., where he was licensed to preach the gospel, May the

7th, 1837. He was ordained in December, 1840.

As a pastor and minister of the gospel Bro. Muse was faithful, winning many souls to Christ. He continued in the pastorate until a tew years ago, when he gave up the pastorate and accepted the work of colporteur for this association, which work he continued to time of his death.

Bro. Muse spent the whole of his ministerial life in the Bethel Association, never having served a church outside of the Bethel. He was remarkably regular in his attendance with this body, having attended about fifty-seven out of fifty-nine sessions. He was for twenty-six consecutive years Moderator of this association, and to no one else does the Bethel owe so much as to Bro. Muse.

Therefore, your committee recommends that this association erect a

suitable monument at his grave.

It is not the purpose of this committee to eulogize Bro. Muse, for his praise is in all the churches. He rests from his labors, and his

works do follow him.

Your committee would not forget to kindly mention our beloved Bro. J. W. Anglin, Sr., whom the angels carried to the glory world on the 23rd day of Oct. 1895. Bro. Anglin was a deacon of the Baptist church at Hilton. He was a true friend to his God, his church, his pastor and his friends. He lived a long and useful life, and died praising God. Surely a good man has gone to rest.

APPENDIX.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

1. This association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association, and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof, after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2. This association shall have no right to legislate for the churches, nor in

any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will be only an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them, and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be

elected annually from the body by ballot or otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the association upon motion and second.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to the ratification or

revision of the association.

7. He shall see that brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject, or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall have no voice in determining questions, ex-

cept in case of a tie.

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it, when required, and shall print and distribute the minutes among the several churches belonging to the association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall, from time to time, appropriate to that purpose.

10. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the association, give security to the chairman of the executive committee and his successors in office for the same, and pay these out as the association, through her executive committee, may order. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report

to the association for each fiscal year.

11. The association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed, unless suspended for a specific object by a majority of the association upon motion and second, and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.

12. All motions, when seconded, must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by

the mover. Substitutes and amendments shall always be in order.

13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking inless he departs from the subject or uses unbecoming or unbrotherly language.

14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of the members enrolled as

messengers are present.

15 The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all other's.

16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission

shall have his name stricken from the roll.

17. This constitution and rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the asso-

ciation, except the second, which shall be unalterable.

18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive committee, consisting of three members chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of this body, and to have general supervision over any

property or financial claims or interests of the association.

19. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual minutes the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of the Bethel Baptist Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE 1. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end and truth without any mixture of error for its matter.

ART. 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy

Ghost, equal in every divine perfection.

ART. 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary trangression fell from this holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

ART. 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace through

faith in the Son of God.

ART. 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness, and not any works of righteousness which we have done but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

ART. 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respecter of persons, but in every nation, he that feareth God and works he righteousness is ac-

cepted of Him.

ART. 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose

of God, according to which he regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.

ART. 8. We believe in "the perseverance of the saints;" that all those who are truly regenerated and born again will ultimately be saved in heaven; that a special providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

ART. 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that its only proper officers are bishops or pastors, and deacons.

ART. 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in

ART. 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and to the Lord's Supper.

ART. 11. We believe that Communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ

and have been legally baptized.

ART. 12. We believe in a general judgement and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from heaven and raise the dead from the grave to a final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

If practical, it would greatly increase the amount sent by our churches. We would also urge the deacons to co-operate with the pastors in the mission work and try to reach every member and get a contribution from each one, for that is the scriptural way to evangelize the world.

We are taught that if any man have not the spirit of Christ he is none of His and He came on a mission to earth and that was, to save the lost, and unless we are doing what we can for the salvation of the lost, we are not like Christ.

Christians that do not give something for Missions cannot have the joys of

salvation in their own hearts.

We are taught that "the liberal soul shall be made fat," so those who will not give will have leanness of soul. Again, we are taught that "it is more blessed to give than to receive;" and again, if we give it shall be given back.

There is every argument in favor of giving to Missions and none whatever against it and if any are no. willing to contribute to the cause of Missions, after they have been taught their duty, they have great reason to fear that they have not passed from death into life.

At the Annual meeting of the Board, held June 2d, last, Prof. Adoniram Judson Clark, of Barnesville, Ga., was elected President of the College, and a written contract was entered into, with him, for a period of five years, with the privilege of ten years, provided both parties are satisfied. President Clark is not a stranger to Southwest Ga. During the time the College was a Branch of the State University he was, unquestionably, its most successful President, and we have no reason to fear that his present work will be less efficient. He and all his family are Baptists, in perfect harmony and sympathy with all our denominational interests, and is entitled to your love, confidence and esteem. He is a born teacher, possessing largely the unusual qualification of imparting knowledge to his pupils. His wise management, firm but kind discipline, the marked increase in attendance, together with the latest, up to date, improved method of teaching, has convinced us fully that we have the right man in the right place. He has associated with him his two sons, Professors E. H. and A. A. Clark, who, from their thorough Normal training, experience as teachers, and their many excellent qualities of heart and mind, are thoroughly fitted for this, their life work.

The college property is in better condition than at any time since its return to us. Under our contract with Prof. Clark, it brings us sufficient revenue to

keep up the ordinary repairs.

The boarding department has also been thoroughly renovated, painted and repaired, making it neat, attractive and comfortable. It is under the personal supervision of Prof. Clark and family, who make it pleasant and homelike for

all the boys and young men entrusted to their care.

We want to call special attention to the fact that Bethel College has the advantage of a Scholarship in Mercer Univerity free, each year, to the best boy in the College. This generous gift, on their part, enables us to send annually one student to Mercer free, which advantage we are now enjoying; also, Prof. Clark offers free tuition to the sons of ministers actively engaged in ministerial work, and to young men studying for the ministry.

The cause of temperance is firm, and is steadily pressing forward. It was never more active than at the present. It has done MUCH GOOD, but there is much yet to be done. Every county in our territory is wet; with liquor shops at work in all directions, sending out destruction. Why is this so? Because so many of our voting members vote wet.

We don't think local option can relieve us. We need the Bush Bill for the State. Prohibition is the law we need. We should not vote for any man to go

to the Legislature who will not vote for such a law.

APPENDIX.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

1. This association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association, and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof, after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2. This association shall have no right to legislate for the churches, nor in

any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will be only an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them, and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be

elected annually from the body by ballot or otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the association upon motion and second.

The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to the ratification or

revision of the association.

7. He shall see that brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject, or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall have no voice in determining questions, ex-

cept in case of a tie.

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it, when required, and shall print and distribute the minutes among the several churches belonging to the association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall, from time to time, appropriate to that purpose.

10. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the association, give security to the chairman of the executive committee and his successors in office for the same, and pay these out as the association, through her executive committee, may order. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report

to the association for each fiscal year.

11. The association shall have a regular order of by tress adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly wed, unless suspended for a specific object by a majority of the association upon motion and second and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.

12. All motions, when seconded, must be put to a voto unless withdrawn by

the mover. Substitutes and amendments shall a vays le in order.

13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice or the same subject without leave of the association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the subject or uses unbecoming or unbrotherly language.

14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of the members enrolled as

messengers are present.

15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.

16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.

17. This constitution and rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the associ-

ation, except the second, which shall be unalterable.

18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive committee, consisting of three members chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, fi l any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treas

urer during the recess of this body, and to have general supervision over any

property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

19. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual minutes the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of the Bethel Baptist Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE 1. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end and truth without any inlature of error for its matter.

ART. 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy

Ghost, equal in every divine perfection.

ART. 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from this holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

ART. 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace through

faith in the Son of God.

ART. 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness, and not any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

ARW. 8. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respecter of persons, but in every nation, he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is ac-

cepted of Him.

ART. 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose

of God, according to which he regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.

ART. S. We believe in "the perseverance of the saints;" that all those who are truly regenerated and born again will ultimately be saved in heaven; that a special providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

ART. 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that its only proper officers are bishops or pastors, and deacons.

of the gospel; that its only proper officers are bishops or pastors, and deacons.

Are. 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and to the Lord's Supper.

ART. 11. We believe that Communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ

and have been legally baptized.

ART. 12. We believe in a general judgement and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from heaven and raise the dead from the grave to a final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgement will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.



REHOBETH CHURCH, Oct. 27, 1897.

To the Bethel Association: -The Board of Trustees of Bethel College beg leave

to make its annual report:

Since your last meeting another scholastic year of the college has closed and we are proud of the record that was made for the year 1896-7. Over a hundred boys and young man were enrolled, and an average of fully eighty was maintained throughout the year. President Clark with his able and efficient faculty have been alive to the interests of the college from the beginning of their management of the same to the present time, and the college, as we believe, is now in the most prosperous condition in which it has been since we have been in charge of the same.

During the summer vacation we have made repairs on the college and boarding house to the amount of about one hundred dollars, which places the same in fair condition as to repairs but many improvements are sorely needed

and are very essential to its future prosperity and success.

The Association is earnestly urged to help on this grand and glorious work

of ours, now that an abundant success seems in our grasp.

We trust you will at this sitting of your body give fearnest consideration to the necessities of the college and devise such plans for its future as the importance of the work demands.

The coffege was again opened Sept. 6, in charge of President Clark and the same faculty as last year. There is now in attendance an average of eighty, thirteen of which are boarders—eleven in the college boarding house, which is

under the immediate charge of President Clark and his family.

In comparison with last year the attendance of pupils shows, up to this time, an increase of 50% while the increase in the boarding department is 300%. This success in one year but foreshadows what the future of our Bethel may be made by an earnest pull all together.

Heard the report of the Committee on Education. After a rousing speech by Dr. Numrally took a collection of \$35,80.

Postponed the special order for 3:30 to hear further remarks from

J. W. Stanford, H. R. McLendon and Z. T. Weaver.

Adopted the report and ordered it put on the minutes, as follows:

The question of Education is one of the most important subjects before the people today. Upon the correct education of the people depends the safety of all our moral, social, political, financial and religious prosperity and liberty. No people should be more aroused to this fact than the Baptists and no people seem to be paying less attention to this great subject than they are.

The human mind, if left to itself unbiased by special education, with the light of divine revelation would naturally be Baptist. Hence, the prevailing opinion among our people, "that it does not require an education to be a Baptist." If this be true, how important it is then that the people be educated properly that they may not be turned away from the natural paths intended by divine revelation for them to walk in, and that they may be able to main-

tain themselves against the false teachings of today.

It is time we, as a denomination to whom God has committed the "faith once for all delivered to the saints," were waking up and looking about us, and seeing the great efforts being made by others in every part of the land to get hold of the elucational interests, that the rising generation may be thus guided into paths of their own choosing and held there by the strong cords of special education. This is becoming more and more alarming, for if you will but look about you, in every hamlet, and ask the question, who is educating your children, you will find that hearly all the schools are being filled by teachers of other denominations.

We feel that we cannot lay too much stress upon this important question, or urge our people too strongly to stand by their own denominational schools and know who it is teaching your children and what they are being taught.

We point with pride to our own Bethel College; owned, controlled and directed by us. It is ours; no other dare lay hands upon it to give direction, or even make suggestion as to who shall run it or how it shall be run. Its board

of trustees that direct it are elected by this body. Its teachers are selected by that board and its management is overlooked by a special prudential commit-tee appointed for that purpose by the board. Thus we see it is directly con-trolled by this Association. It is doing not only a noble and thorough educational work but a grand missionary work, almost equal to that of a missionary on foreign fields. A boy cannot come there and stay under its influence and direction and go away without being a nobler and better boy. As proof of this, six from its walls joined the church last year.

It has educated not less than fifteen boys the past year, that were too poor to pay for their education. No one is turned away from its doors because they are unable to pay. Every minister's son is given tuition free. And each year a scholarship is given the best boy there, in Mercer University, free.

This institution should have the hearty sympathy, prayers, contributions and co-operation of every Baptist in the Bethel Association.

We would call special attention to Mercer University, that noble institu-tion, planted by the sacrifices and prayers of our fathers, for the higher education of the young men of Georgia. To this institution is largely due the credit, under God's direction, of making Georgia a Baptist state. It is doing the best work it has ever done. The trustees are planning well and wisely, greater and broader things for it in the future. They are soliciting contributions now for a new library building, where the young men can go and read and hold their prayer meetings and fraternity meetings and have free bath rooms without having to leave the college grounds. Every Baptist in Georgia should contribute something to this worthy object.

We would not fail to call attention to our denominational college for young ladies, Shorter at Rome, Cox College at Manchester, Southern Female College at LaGrange, Monroe Female College at Forsyth. If you want your daughters to take a firm stand for God and His truth, among the noble Bap-

tist women of Georgia, educate them in your own colleges.

Brethren, let us labor and pray earnestly and unitedly all along the lines for the accomplishment of greater things in the future than in the past. Respectfully submitted, J. W. STANFORD, Chairman.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

1. This association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association, and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof, after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2. This association shall have no right to legislate for the churches, nor in

any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will be only an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them, and the spread of the cospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be

elected annually from the body by ballot or otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the association upon mot on and second.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all computtees, subject to the ratideation or

revision of the association.

7. He shall see that brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject, or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall have no voice in determining questions, ex-

cept in case of a tie.

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it, when required, and shall print and distribute the minutes among the several churches belonging to the association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall, from time to time, appropriate to that purpose.

10. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the association, give security to the chairman of the executive committee and his successors in office for the same, and pay these out as the association, through her executive committee, may order. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report

to the association for each fiscal year.

11. The association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed, unless suspended for a specific object by a majority of the association upon motion and second and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.

12. All motions, when seconded, must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by

the mover. Substitutes and amendments shall always be in order.

13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the subject or uses unbecoming or unbrotherly language.

14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of the members enrolled as

messengers are present.

15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.

16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission

shall have his name stricken from the roll.

17. This constitution and rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the associa-

tion, except the second, which shall be unalterable.

18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of three members chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of this body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

19. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual minutes the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of the

Bethel Baptist Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE 1. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end and truth without any mixture of error for its matter.

ART. 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy

Ghost, equal in every divine perfection.

ART. 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from this holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

Arr.4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace!through

faith in the Son of God.

ART. 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness, and not any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

Art. 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respecter of persons, but in every nation, he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted

of Him.

ART. 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of

God, according to which he regenerates, sinctifies an I saves sinners.

ART. 8. We believe in the "perseverance of the saints;" that all those who are truly regenerated and born again will ultimately be saved in heaven; that a special providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

ART. 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that its only proper officers are bishops, or pastors, and deacons.

ART. 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and to the Lord's Supper.

ART. 11. We believe that Communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ

and have been legally baptized.

ART. 12. We believe in a general judgment and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from heaven and raise the dead from the grave to a final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

WEDNESDAY-Forenoon Session.

After Scripture reading by the Moderator, the assembly was led in prayer by Brother W. W. Mabry.

Welcomed as correspondents from the Summer Hill Association, Rev. A. B. Hawkes and Rev. A. L. Blizard; from Friendship Association, Rev. R. A. Morgan, Rev. M. B. L. Binion; also, Dr. G. A. Nunnally, representing the State and Home Mission Boards, the Baptist Orphans' Home, Mercer University, and the Southern Female College of LaGrange.

Made the report of the Board of Trustees of Bethel College the spe-

cial order for 2 o'clock.

Received the report of the Committee on Missions as follows:

The word "missions" is a very broad-meaning term, but as understood by Christians, it signifies the spread of the Gospel in destitute places by the churches. The time to discuss the propriety or scripturalness of missions is past. The only thing now left us to do is to determine the best way and means of doing the work. All missions are really the same, but for convenience sake and only to facilitate the work, we, as the Baptist denomination in the South, have divided the subject into Foreign, Home and State Missions.

Each one of these departments is controlled by a Board, consisting of a Corresponding Secretary and such other officers as may be necessary to successful organization. The Foreign Mission Board is located in Richmond, Va. Dr. R. J. Willingham is the Corresponding Secretary, and has nuder his supervision the entire work of the foreign fields—that is, in China, Africa, Italy, Brazil.

Mexico and Japan.

In all these fields the work among the heathen has been blessed as far as could be expected. Papal fields are the hardest. The Board collected and disbursed about \$125,000, and for the first time in a number of years, was comparatively out of debt in May last at the Southern Baptist Convention at Norfolk,

Virginia.

The Home Board has its quarters in Atlanta, Ga. Dr. I. T. Tichenor is the Corresponding Secretary. He has under his charge the destitute sections within the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention. Some of our States are strong, but the most of them are weak; so the strong must help bear the burdens of the weak, and right heroically the strong States, such as Georgia, Virginia, Kentucky and South Carolina have done a fine work through the Home Board.

Lastly, we come to the work of the State Board. The State of Georgia is specially dear to all of us, since we are bound to her by so many ties of blood and interest. We specially commend this department of our work to the care and support of all our churches. Dr. J. G. Gibson is the Corresponding Secre-

tary, with his office in Atlanta.

Georgia Baptists are a very strong, intelligent body of Christians, and as such are amply able to care for our every interest. Under the State Board is the care of several denominational enterprises, such as the Orphan's Home, the Aged Ministers' Fund, the care of the colored people, and the supplying of

destitute places in our State with the Gospel.

The names of the employees of the Board and the amounts they receive will be found in the full report of the State Board, recently published in the Mirror and Index. Copies of said report have also been published and sent to ministers over the State. We believe in the organized agencies of our churches, and would urge the prindence of co-operating with them in the Master's work.

Our people are becoming more and more missionary in spirit, and some of the churches, despite the great stringency of money matters, have increased

their contributions during the last associational year.

The liberality of the churches can be largely increased by a zealous and consecrated ministry. The Master says go; our duty lies in obedience to his command. Let us urge the churches to the full development of their capacity to give. There never was such an open door set before Baptists as at the present day. Some one asked an English officer how long it would take to carry one of Queen Victoria's commands to every nation. His reply was, About eighteen

months." England's voice is potent to her sons. Baptists have been working now these eighteen centuries, and yet a large part of the world has never heard of us. It is high time to hustle up.

Brethren L. D. Wright, J. S. Harris and J. M. Wright were excused. Received the report of Board of Trustees of Bethel Male College, as follows:

To the Bethel Association: -The Board of Trustees of Bethel College beg leave to make the following report:

We find 1st. That there has been an increase in the number of boarders of 50%., and in the number of students 10%. There being enrolled during the last scholastic year 110 boys and young men, of which 23 were boarders.

2nd. That the health of the student body has been exceptionally good. 3rd. That the buildings are in good repair, with a few minor exceptions. That all expenses for repairs, etc., have been paid, and there are no debts of

any kind standing against the college.

4th. That the military department is in the best condition. All equipments

being taken up, and more could be profitably used.

5th. That the following new features have been added since our last report: A well equipped gymnasium, the gift of the faculty and students; a feature we commend, as one of great importance to the college, and especially to the boarders. A library for the free use of the students, which we believe will be of great benefit for them, and should receive the encouragement it deserves.

6th. That additions are needed to the boarding house, as there are now about as many boarders as can be comfortably accommodated, and should the number increase of course more room will be an absolute necessity. Also, that the college building needs some new seats in the auditorium, and some desks for the students. We hope that the Association will take such steps as will enable us to make these much needed additions and improvements.

7th That the faculty, consisting of President A. J. Clark, Professor E. H. Clark and Miss Leta Stade, have proven themselves well worthy of the confidence reposed in them, and have fully sustained themselves in the management of all the affairs of our beloved college.

Therefore, in consideration of these facts, we recommend

1st. That the library be encouraged by individual donations of books, etc., by the Baptists everywhere, and that the membership of our Association be requested to give the matter all the publicity its importance demands.

2nd. That the Association institute what shall be called Bethel College Day, at which time a collection shall be taken for the especial purpose of improving

and adding to the college property.

3rd. That our membership be especially requested to encourage the college by giving it the patronage it so justly merits, feeling, as we do, that boys and young men cannot find a safer home or better institution of learning than with our Brother Clark and his estimable family, and the present faculty.

After speeches by Brethren A. J. Clark, E. Z. F. Golden, Z. T. Weaver, J. I. D. Miller and J. W. Martin, a collection was taken of \$25.60, in cash and subscription, to buy a tellurian globe, and the report was adopted.

There being no report on Education, the following resolutions were

offered by Brother E. Z. F. Golden:

Resolved 1st. That in Mercer University we recognize the blessing and responsibility of a great heritage from our fathers.

2nd. That, under God, Mercer University is a right arm of power for the fut-

ure usefulness of Georgia Baptists.

3rd. That it is our duty to contribute regularly to the maintenance' of Mercer, believing that in this way we are carrying out the great commission.

4th. That we urge upon the churches of this Association the duty of making a contribution to the support of the institution, at least once a year, as per schedule printed in our minutes.

5th. That we send our boys to Mercer, when possible, and that we secure for

her the largest possible patronage.

6th. That we make our own Bethel a feeder to our denominational college. 7th, That we do not forget that the Mouroe Female College is now our property, and should be treated as such.

After stirring speeches by Brethren Golden, Edens and Miller, the resolutions were adopted.

Brother J. O. Morris was excused. The session was then adjourned.

Brother W. W. Arnold preached at night.

Your Committee beg leave to make the following report:

The Lord commands us to search the Scriptures, "For in them ye think ye have eternal life." We believe that the All-wise has given us the Sabbath day for the purpose of associating ourselves together and to teach and be taught. We are glad to know that most of our churches are following the example that Christ gave us, when it is said that he taught every Sabbath.

The Lord has blessed us with offspring, and, no doubt, holds us accountable for the proper training of their minds and hearts. We regard the Sunday school as being one of the greatest factors in the great work for the Master. May God hasten the day when every church will be alive to this work.

Directed that the Clerk have the minutes printed, and have as his fee the amount sent for that purpose.

Received and adopted the report of the Finance Committee and ordered it spread on the minutes.

APPENDIX.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

1. This Association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association, and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof, after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2. This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches, nor in

any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will be only an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them, and the spread of the Gospel throughout the world.
4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be

elected annually from the body by ballot or otherwise.

The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to the ratification or

revision of the Association.

7. He shall see that brethren maintain the proper courtes<mark>ies of debate, and</mark> may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject, or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall have no voice in determining questions, ex-

cept in case of a tie.

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it, when required, and shall print and distribute the minutes among the several churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall, from time to time, appropriate to that purpose.

10. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the Association, give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successors in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association, through her Executive Committee, may order. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report

to the Association for each fiscal year.

11. The Association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed, unless suspended for a specific object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.

12. All motions, when seconded, must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by

the mover. Substitutes and amendments shall always be in order.

13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject or uses unbecoming or unbrotherly langnage.

14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of the members enrolled as messengers are present.

15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.

16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission

shall have his name stricken from the roll.

17. This constitution and rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the second, which shall be unalterable.

18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of three members chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of this body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

19. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual minntes the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of the

Bethel Baptist Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE 1. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end and truth without any mixture of error for its matter.

ART. 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy

Ghost, equal in every divine perfection.

ART. 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from this holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

ART, 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace through

faith in the Son of God.

ART. 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness, and not any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

ART. 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the Gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respecter of persons, but in every nation, he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted

of Him.

ART. 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of

God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.

ART. 8. We believe in the "perseverance of the saints;" that all those who are truly regenerated and born again will ultimately be saved in heaven; that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

ART. 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; that its only proper officers are bishops, or pastors, and deacons.

the Gospel; that its only proper officers are bishops, or pastors, and deacons.

ART. 40. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and to the Lord's Supper.

ART. 11. We believe that communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ

and have been legally baptized.

ART. 12. We believe in a general jndgment and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from heaven and raise the dead from the grave to a final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

To the Bethel Association: -The Board of Trustees of Bethel College beg leave to make the following report:

We find 1st: That there were enrolled during the scholastic year ending

June 1st, 110 pupils, of whom 32 came from outside of the local patronage.

That the health of the student body has been and is exceptionally good. 3d. That during this year two large rooms have been added to the boarding house, and verandas have been built at the upper and lower stories, the entire front of the building. The same has been recovered, and a new coat of paint has been put on the entire outside of the building. These improvements and repairs cost \$450, of which \$300 has been paid, leaving a debt of \$150, which amount has been prorated among the churches, and they asked to contribute the same.

4th. The College is in splendid running condition, with the same faculty as last year, except that Mrs. E. H. Clark has succeeded Miss Leta Slade in the

The hour having arrived for the report on Missions, Dr. F. M. Bledsoe made the following report:

We, your Committee appointed to report on Missions, beg leave to make the

following report:

We congratulate the Baptists of the Southern Baptist convention on their success in securing the sorvices of three such eminent and well known men as the present Secretaries of the State, Home and Foreign Mission Boards. well know that our great improvements in missionary success within the past ten or twelve years has been largely due to the methods of the great leaders in charge of the work; and now with such men as Willingham, Kerfoot and Jameson in charge, may we not hope for a great advance all along the lines?

The opportunities for successful missionary enterprises have never been greater than now, and the great call, "come over and help us," has never been so loudly proclaimed; and the fact that what was done on Calvary, was done for the whole world, was never more constantly emphasized. The Master said on a great occasion, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." On another he said, "If you love me keep my commandments." If we believe and desire to obey, what is the great duty before us to-day?

Your committee believes that duty to be an effort to increase the efficiency of our mission enterprises, and how we of the Bethel Association may best do

our part, is the great work before us.

We desire to recommend to the consideration of the churches and pastors the organizations of the Woman's Missionary Societies and Baptist Young People's Unions, one or both in every church—one in every small church and both in every large church, especially those that have preachers in their membership.

The Woman's Missionary Society came knocking at the door of the Southern Baptist Convention nine or ten years ago, with thirty-two members. The convention let them go to work as an experiment, many members disapproving; but to-day they are a power for good, and the money raised by them is many

thousand dollars.

And the Baptist Young People's Union of America is a power in the land that proposes to educate and organize the young people and young church members into effective workers in the Master's cause, with the training that will enable them to give a reason for their faith at all times, and to meet the arguments of those Christians, half infidel and half anti-missionary, who are ready to say the "Lord's" work will be done in converting the world without our help.

Let us pray for more activity and zeal in our work, and never stop until

every church member is a contributor to missions.

After stirring speeches by Brethren S. Y. Jameson and R. A. Morgan, the report was adopted.

The report on Sabbath Schools was read as follows:

The Sunday-school has been called the "nursery of the church," If you would have strong, healthy, well developed men and women, morally, mentally and physically, look well to rules and regulations governing the nursery department of the home. To allow a child that is not sufficiently matured in mind, and therefore does not know any better, to be fed on improper food, or food improperly prepared, or at an unseasonable time, or in an unwholesome way, is but to dwarf the proper development of the child and either kill or destroy its healthfulness, happiness and nsefulness. So it is with the nursery of the church—the Sunday-school. The children that are brought into that department for proper training, for healthful, useful Christian service in the church and world, should have the greatest care and attention.

It is therefore necessary that the greatest care be taken, so that the spiritual food dished out Sunday after Sunday to these children and young people be properly prepared by a week's study with the best helps possible to be obtained at any cost, and seasoned with meditation and prayer by day and by night. Spiritual food thus prepared is then ready to be served on Sunday in the church nursery, giving to the "babes" the "milk" and to the "men and women in Christ" the "strong meat of the word." Some one may ask: "How can a Sunday-school be organized and conducted on this plan"? Easy enough, if the church is of one mind—to know and to do the Mister's will. The first thing to be done for the church is to select the right man for superintendent, one whom God has called to lead in such work, and not one who seeks the position or is pushed forward by some friend or relative, to secure for him the honors of the office at the sacrifice of the cause. First know that he is fully qualified in heart and mind, a success in the management of his own affairs, then you can rest assured that such a superintendent will make the Sundayschool a success. It is his duty to thoroughly prepare and present, or have presented, the leading thoughts in the lesson each Sunday, that they may be thoroughly fixed upon the minds of the children. If he is unable to do this himself and unwilling that others should do so, and attempts to cover up his inability by turning the Sunday-school into a singing school, then he should be removed, that the cause may not suffer by his incompetency. Such honor loving men never resign. It is his duty to select teachers who have been called of God to teach, and who show and prove by their daily walk and conversation, consecrated living and thorough knowledge of the Scriptures that they are the ones whom God has chosen to train the children for Him.

The pastor and deacons should not be overlooked as an important factor in the Sunday-school work. They are made, by virtue of their office, the overlookers or overseers of the flock; to them was the command, "Feed my lambs," specially given. The shepberd has not done his duty, nor does he represent honestly the interests of those that employ him or Him that called him to be a shepherd, when he goes simply to the place where the sheep and lambs are ac-

customed to being fed and dishes out the food and goes away without ever looking to see if they are all there, and each receiving his portion in due season, and if not, arranging or going himself to know why they are not there, and bring them into the fold, that they may be fed and sheltered. The excuse so often made, that they know the place and time of feeding, and if they are not there it is their fault, is not an excuse that will be acceptable at the judgment bar. The parable of the lost sheep is good study for us all, daily.

Then the deacons have much to do in this matter. They are the watchers of

the church, not only to guard its treasury, but to see that the truths of the Bible are correctly taught, both in the pulpit and in the Sunday-school. . To them was committed the high and sacred duty of "holding the mystery of the faith in a pure conscience." In order to hold they must first have. Then it is necessary that they know the mysteries of this faith, that they may hold only that which is pure. Then, having and holding that which is pure, they are not to hold like an oyster in his hard shell this truth, but are to be the medinms through which God distributes this pure faith to others.

It is their duty to overlook and see and know that the spiritual food given to the children in the church's nursery is properly prepared, properly seasoned and properly fed. Then we will have a people that are strong in His word and mighty because they know His will. Let us strive to elevate the Sunday-

school to this, its high and proper plane. Respectfully submitted,

Your Committee, conscious of the hindrances to the cause of education on account of financial depression, yet rejoice to believe that there has never been a period in the history of our country when there has been so much in-terest in the development of the minds of our young as now, and that it is no-ticeable that this interest is continuously growing. We notice with a great deal of pleasure that all of the common schools of the country are seeking the very best of teachers, and those in authority are becoming more rigid in their exactions as to the qualifications of teachers.

As Baptists we have much cause for gratitude and hope in the several institutions of learning offered our boys and girls. For Mercer University, the glory and pride of every Georgia Baptist, we turn with heartfelt gratitude to God for His blessing upon it and for perpetuating to us an institution which helps not only the rich, but lifts up the poor to positions of usefulness and honor, and feel that every Baptist in Georgia ought to give to Mercer their prayers, influence and means, until she can justly and critically stand the equal in every respect to any University in America. We feel justly proud of Mercer's President and Faculty, and we ought to encourage their hearts and uphold their hands by a generous patronage, and they will make an impress upon the lives and characters of our boys and young men whose influence must be felt upon our country for ages to come. We would urge upon all of our chargines the importance of making annual contributions to Mercer, and especially collections for the Loan Fund to Mercer, as there is at present a number of worthy young men who would be at Mercer but for the want of funds, while if we had a sufficient Loan Fund of which they could get the use, they would gladly pay back when through college, as soon as they could make it.

We rejoice to note also the improvements and superior advantages offered by the Baptist female colleges of the State to our girls, for whom, under the

providence of God, a wider field of usefulness is opening.

We have at Forsyth, Monroe Female College, at LaGrange, the Southern Female College, Shorter College, at Rome, and at College Park, the Southern

Female College.

All of these are Baptist Colleges, and need and merit our earnest support. It is also with pride that we point to the Southern Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky., which also merits our hearty support. We also call special attention to Bethel College, which is the property of Bethel Association, and which, no doubt, would be an institution of which the Association would be proud, if the churches would contribute to her and patronize her.

We feel that the cause of education is one in which we all ought to be more interested, and especially the cause of Christian education. We feel that we ought to pray for and in every way increase all our educational institutions. While we feel that the cause of missions is the one all-absorbing interest, yet we feel that we cannot do the cause of missions more good in every other way than by supporting our denominational colleges. One is our votes. Prohibition men often vote for wet legislators to make laws, and they always make wet ones. So we that vote for them place them in honor to cut our own throats. It is time for us to learn to yote as we pray, and until we do this the enemy will not be driven from us. Another stronghold is, too many are satisfied if the enemy is driven from the open saloon to the dispensary. members are keepers of dispensaries, if we are not misinformed. We think that a Christian should not keep a gate of the devil that leads to hell.

We find that Randolph and Calhoun counties, having 16 churches in this Association, are protected by law from the sale of whiskey. Bro. T. F. Moody made an appeal that the deficit on Bro. Corley's salary be raised and paid him. A collection was taken in cash and pledges amounting to sufficient to cover the deficit. Knowles moved that the Executive Committee be instructed to continue Bro. Corley as evangelist for the ensuing year at same salary, which was agreed to.

Read the letter from Mt. Zion church, and the Clerk was directed to add the amount of finances sent in a foot note to the financial

table.

Directed that the funds for Missions from Mt. Ziou and the public collection be equally divided between the three Mission Boards.

Agreed to pay Bro. Charles Hepburn one hundred dollars for next year.

Bro. I. B. Manry offered the following resolution, which was unanimously agreed to:

Resolved: That the thanks of this body be hereby tendered this church and community for the unbounded hospitality so freely offered.

Agreed to raise a loan fund of not less that \$150 for Mercer University, directed to the support of Rev. S. F. Sullivan, under the auchority of the Prudential Committee of Mercer University. W. Stanford agreed to give one-fourth of any amount raised by the Association.

Read and adopted the Minutes, and called the roll.

APPENDIX.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

1. This Association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association, and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof, after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches, nor in

any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will be only an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect nnion of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them, and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be

elected annually from the body by ballot or otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to the ratification or

revision of the Association.

7. He shall see that brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject, or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly lauguage.

8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall have no voice in determining questions,

except in case of a tie.

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it, when required, and shall print and distribute the minutes among the several churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall, from time to time, appropriate to that purpose.

10. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the Association, give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successors in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association, through her Executive Committee, may order. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report

to the Association for each fiscal year,

11. The Association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed, unless suspended tor a specific object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.

12. All motions, when seconded, must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by

the moyer. Substitutes and amendments shall always be in order.

13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject or uses unbecoming or unbrotherly language.

14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of the members enrolled as messengers are present.

15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.

16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.

17. This constitution and rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Asso-

ciation, except the second, which shall be unalterable.

18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of three members, chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

19. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual minnte the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of the

Bethel Baptist Association,

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE 1. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its anthor, salvation for its end and truth without any mixture or error for its matter.

ART. 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the

Holy Ghost, equal in every divine perfection.

ART. 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

ART, 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace through

faith in the Son of God.

ART. 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness, and not any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

ART. 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the Gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respecter of persons, but in every nation, he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is

accepted of Him.

ART. 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.

ART. 8. We believe in the "perseverace of the saints;" that all those who are truly regenerated and born again will ultimately be saved in heaven; that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

ART. 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; that its only proper officers are bishops, or pastors, and deacons. ART. 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer

ART. 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper.

ART. II We believe that communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in

Christ and have been legally baptized.

ART. 12. We believe in a general judgment and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from heaven and raise the dead from the grave to a final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

MINUTES.

LEBANON CHURCH, Sasser, Terrell County, Ga., October 30th, 1900.

The Sixty-eighth Annual Session of the Bethel Baptist Association met with Lebanon church at ten o'clock, and after a prayer service led by Dr. J. W. Stanford, listened to the introductory sermon by Rev. J. S. Knowles from the 116th Psalm, 1st verse—"I love the Lord."

TUESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association was called to order at half-past one o'clock, and after a song and the reading of the 72d Psalm by Dr. W. H. Patterson, was led in prayer by Bro. A. L. Blizzard.

The roll of Messengers was then formed.

Organization was perfected by electing as Moderator Rev. Wm. H. Patterson, D. D., and as Clerk Bro. L. A. Duggan, both by acclamation. Adopted the Order of Business as printed in the minutes of the

last session.

The letters from the churches were collected by Brethren W. O. Crumbley and E. H. Lee and read by Brethren W. W. Arnold and H. L. Crumbley. The churches at Blakely, Bluffton and Mt. Hebron invited the next session of the Association.

Received the newly constituted Baptist church, Providence, Early

county, as a member of this body.

Adopted the hours of meeting and adjourning as follows: To meet at 9 o'clock a. m. and 1:30 p. m., and to adjourn at 10:50 a. m. and at will in the afternoon.

Bro. Corley died April 2d, 1900, which leaves the Association due his estate \$44.45 for work done. We still owe Bro. Orphans' Home—Z. T. Weaver, J. B. Payne, W. J. Jordan, T. G. Pinkston, J. D. Melton, B. T. Todd. The following resolutions, offered by Bro. J. W. Stanford, were

adopted:

Whereas, The Georgia Baptist Orphans' Home is now under the fostering care of our Baptist State Convention, and is as much a part of its work as any of our denominational enterprises; therefore, resolved:

1st. That we recommend this noble institution to our churches and Sunday-schools as worthy of their loving sympathy and financial support.

2d. That hereafter a committee be annually appointed to report concerning

the condition and needs of our Orphans' Home.

The work at the Baptist Orphans' Home at Hapeville was presented by Dr. James B. Taylor, the general superintendent, after which a cash collection of \$35.01 was taken.

The report on Missions was received as follows:

The Bible on the great and important subject of Missions is too pointed and clear for doubting. The King uttered no uncertain sound or useless words when He said to His disciples in that little but glorious meeting among the mountains of Galilee: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." This command stands as a faithful signboard, pointing every child of God in the direction he or she should go, and to what God would have them do in this life. O, that His children—His agents, representatives in the world—would hear and joyfully obey him, for missionary work is a joy, a duty, a privilege, and a necessity from every reasonable standpoint. A thousand years before Christ was literally sacrificed for the sins of His people God said: "Ask of me and I shall give thee the heathen for thine inheritance and the uttermost parts of the earth for thy possessions," Missions are a prerequisite to the world's greatest and grandest event—the second coming of our Lord. "And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations, and then shall the end come."

Faith in the Son of God is essential to salvation. "How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? and how shall they hear without a preacher? and how shall they preach except they be sent?" Surely those into whose hands he has committed his unfinished work can never be free from responsibility and disobedience until they have to the very best of their ability preached the gospel everywhere. But under God His people have not all been deaf to His orders or reticent concerning His will. Our past efforts have been crowned with great and encouraging success. According to reports from our fields, there is cause for much rejoicing among the workers. We should earnestly pray that the Lord of the harvest would send more laborers into the field.

There is still much to be done. Our own state, Georgia, is not without destitute places that need our early attention. Our home and foreign fields need many faithful workers. Let us do our best for God and His cause everywhere. Let our prayers ascend for all the workers and our means be freely given for their support. Let us pray for and stand by our Boards in every righteous way, remembering that these brethren, to do well the great work that the churches are expecting them to do, are largely dependent upon us for means and encouragement. Let us go and do the Master's will earnestly and faithfully, looking forward, with happy hearts, to the bright and glorious day when the King will welcome our return home with the plaudit, "Well done, good seryant. Thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many; enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

Rev. W. O. Crumbley preached the Missionary Sermon from John 17-18. Dr. B. W. Davis, of Albany, Ga., preached at the academy.

The collection for Missions amounted to \$22.85.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The report on Missions was adopted. The regular order was suspended and the report on Obituaries was received and, after remarks by Dr. Patterson, adopted:

While we congratulate ourselves on the success and prosperity which has attended the churches of Bethel Association during the past year, while we rejoice in the social intercourse and communion one with another, yet we stand in the shadow of gloom. Death has invaded our ranks since last we met. On April 2d, 1900, Rev. J. H. Corley died at his home in Fort Gaines in full assurance of the faith. Bro. Corley was born in Edgefield District, S. C., Oct. 2d, 1824. He joined the church at Macon, Ga., in 1835, and commenced preaching in 1844, and was called to ordination by Moriah church in Coweta county.

God sustained him that he might die in the harness which he so loved to wear, having filled the pulpit of the Ft. Gaines Baptist church on the morning of April 1st, and having lectured to the Bible class in the afternoon. He served churches all over Georgia, but his greatest work was in Dawson, Ft. Gaines, Blakely, and surrounding country. God has used him as an instrument in leading many to Christ. He was popular, learned and consecrated to the work of his Heavenly Father. But he is gone, He has answered the summons, "Son, come up higher." But the good he has done is still with us and will never, never die. While we mourn the death of Bro. Corley, there are others who have crossed over the river and gone to their reward, whose lives have not been so prominent but who have filled their places well. May their lives stimulate us to higher and nobler deeds, ever striving to do our Master's will.

By unanimous consent Bro. Z. T. Weaver offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That we encourage and anthorize the ladies to establish a Woman's Missionary Society as an auxiliary and under the advise of this Association; that they hold their meetings at each session of, but separate from, and report to, this Association, annually, as the Woman's Missionary Society of the state does, which is held in connection with the State Convention.

After remarks, pro and con, the resolution was adopted.

At two o'clock the report of the Board of Trustees of Bethel College was received:

We are pleased to report the buildings properly insured, in good condition, and the school flourishing. There was matriculated last year 110 students. The student body this year is, in many respects, better than last. The discipline is good.

We should consider ourselves fortunate in securing, as President Prof. W. P. Maury, and his able corps of teachers. Prof. Maury is a cultured Christian gentleman of broad information, high scholarship, and thorough in instruction. He spent two years after graduation at West Point, thus fitting himself more thoroughly for his high calling, and life work—teaching.

The entire faculty is as follows:

W. P. Manry, A. B., President (U. S. Military Academy and Middleton College)—Mathematics and English Studies; T. A. Binford, A. B. (Richmond, Va., College and Judson College, N. C.)—Latin, Greek, French and German; B. W. Young, B. S. (Kentucky State University)—Military Tactics, Science and Commercial Branches; Mrs. W. P. Maury, L. I. (University of Nashville and Peabody Normal)—Elocution and Assistant in Primary Department; Miss Cornelia Binford, (Gradnate Luray, Va., Female College)—Primary.

All the faculty occupy and run the boarding house, thus giving oversight

and assistance to every boy sent from a distance,

We are glad to report about 20 young men being prepared for Mercer University, among them two ministerial students, Rev. S. F. Sullivan and W. D. Peak. Quite a sharp contention exists among the young men for the scholarship, so generously given Bethel College, each year, by the Trustees of Mercer. This scholarship is worth, each year, to the successful contestant, a year's tuition in Mercer, costing \$55.

The Trustees of Mercer, together with the Presidents, have been trying for years to establish in each Association in the State an Associational School, where boys could be properly prepared to enter Mercer. They have succeeded in establishing many, three new ones this year. You will remember Dr. Gib-

son spoke of these schools each year at the Association, and their wonderful help to Mercer. They are more important now than ever, as Mercer has done away with its preparatory department, thus compelling boys to prepare them-

selves before going to Mercer.

A letter from Dr. P. D. Pollock, President of Mercer University, to the President of your Board of Trustees, on the question of Associational Schools, says: "We need some organized, systematic movement among the Baptists of Georgia to come to the rescue of weak committees and weak associations that make an effort to establish and maintain secondary schools. The success of Mercer University depends largely on the success of these schools, and especially upon those under Baptist influence and direction."

The wisdom of Dr. Pollock's suggestions can readily be seen by every thoughtful person. We can remember when the State University had its branch colleges all over the state, it had a much larger attendance than Mercer. But now it is reversed. Since our Associational Schools, under Baptist influence and direction, all over the state, have been organized by our best and wisest leaders, a stream of boys have been flowing into Mercer, until now

it is ahead of anything in the state.

We hope the Association will give the proper encouragement to the two ministerial students that are studying hard to better fit themselves for useful-

ness in the Master's Kingdom.

Every Baptist in the bounds of the Association, that is loyal to the organized efforts throughout the state to build up Baptist interests, will feel proud of the fact that our forefathers planted here, in our midst, an institution for us and our children, where the poor and the rich can come and, at a small cost, get an education, or be prepared to enter any university or college in the United States, upon a certificate from Bethel College.

Let us labor, patronize, and pray for Bethel College, that it reflect increased honor year by year upon us and our forefathers that left it as a sacred trust, and a monument of their love for us.

The report on Education was received:

Education among us is a vital question—one so closely connected with our prosperity that there can be no permanent success without it. How to train our children to do their life work and to get the best results for our denomination should engage our attention to such a degree that the question of education should be kept prominent in our annual gatherings. Education is power; education is wealth; education is prestige. The power of a denomination is not so much in numbers as in the trained minds of the few. The best trained minds among us generally give direction to the whole body.

The question for us to consider in this report is where and now. As to how, we would urge the thorough and concise method as against the diffused and scattered plan. See to it that your child does not study too many things. In this age of multiplied arts and sciences there is dauger of trying to learn too many things at the expense of thorough training on a few things. We have better schools than at any time in our history, and more of them, but we do need to emphasize thoroughness. Very few of our public speakers know how to discriminate between the verbs err and sit, and also between the verbs like and Lay. The indiscriminate use of the pronouns I and we is also painful.

Where shall we educate? Of course we all say at once in our own schools, that is, in the schools that belong to the Baptists and are fostered by them. For the boys, Mercer stands prominent among us. We all love Mercer and should patronize it in preference to any other college. Moral training is not to be ignored in education, and at Mercer we get the benefit of the moral as well as the literary training. We can not afford to have our boys brought up without the best advantages for their moral development, for if they should be trained only in the intellectual then their education would be incomplete. In the last two years the endowment for Mercer has been increased about fifty thousand dollars, and we feel confident that the Baptists will make it a hundred thousand before many more years.

We would also commend Bethel Male College, situated in Cuthbert and owned by the Baptists of the Bethel Association, to the care and patronage of

the Baptists of this section. It has at present a full corps of competent teachers, and is well equipped to prepare boys for the sophomore class in Mercer.

Remember, too, the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky.; and if there be gifted young men among us whom God hath called to preach His word, let them be sought and encouraged to attend the Seminary.

With regard to female education, there are quite a number of colleges; only two of them, however, are strictly Baptist—that is, Dr. Nunnally's school at LaGrange and the Baptist Female College at Forsyth. We have for many years felt the need of a first-class college for girls. Last year the Baptist Convention of Georgia received the female college at Forsyth and are now prepared to give all the educational advantages that any other institution in the state can give, and that, too, at actual cost. Female education is an acknowledged necessity, and none should avail themselves of this great power more willingly than Baptists.

Educate the boys at Mercer and the girls at Forsyth.

Baptists are improving in all lines of Christian activities, but in none more than in education.

THURSDAY MORNING SESSION.

Opened with song. Led in prayer by Bro. J. W. Sauls. Read and corrected the minutes of previous day. The report on Temperance was received as follows:

Your Committee on Temperance begs leave to make the following report:
We observe that our associations and state conventions adopt resolutions
and make strong talks against the whiskey traffic, yet the evil continues to
stare us in the face. We could not if we would, and would not if we could,
bring forward any new arguments against this curse of humanity. It is condemned by experience, observation, science, history, the Word of God, and every important corporation in our country, as as unmitigated evil. Yet, so
complete is the control of the devil over the frailties of the body that scarcely
do our hearers reach their homes before their zeal has waned and their fervor forgotten. It is a principle of life everywhere that to continue existence
we must be active and progressive.

Your committee does not believe that anyone can acceptably serve the Lord with the fumes of whiskey on his breath, and we recommend that:

First, All of the churches of this Association discipline vigorously every

brother that habitually uses alcoholic liquors as a beverage.

Second, That a committee of one or more active, zealous friends of prohibi-

second, I hat a committee of one or more active, zealous friends of profile it in the appointed in each church, whose duty it shall be to secure and contribute literature bearing on this subject—among which we know of none better than "The Sentinel," published at Athens, Ga., by Bro. A. J. Hughes.

Third, That we earnestly urge that no opportunity be lost to strike down

the dread monster with our votes, where, after all, rests the issue.

It was moved by Bro. G. R. Bisby that the report be amended by requesting the churches not to use fermented wine in the celebration of the Lord's Supper. The motion was carried and the report adopted.

Brc. J. W. Stanford moved that the resolution on Temperance, attached to the Coleman church letter, be printed in the minutes, which was agreed to:

Whereas, The Bethel Association has repeatedly declared itself in strong reports on Temperance, positively condemning the manufacture, sale and use of intoxicating liquor as a beverage; and, whereas, the organized forces of the liquor business have persistently ignored the expressed will of the people, using all means in their power to defeat general prohibitory legislation, and the time has come when individual Christians and gospel churches must unite and work and pray to suppress this scripturally condemned eyil, Therefore be it resolved by the Coleman Baptist Church, one of the constituent members of the Association-

First, That we earnestly request the hearty co-operation of brethren and each church in our bounds in the support of temperance according to the expressed will of God, using our votes as citizens to exterminate the liquor business in our state and our influence as Christians and authority as churches in awakening men to a realization of the wrong done to home and society and the shame put on the cause of Christ in supporting whiskey in any form or

under any circumstances,
Second, That this expression of our feeling and conviction be incorporated in our letter to the Association and read as part of the same to that body, appealing to every church among us to prayerfully and promptly consider this important matter and thus secure a more perfect union among the churches and "a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them" in the great cause of temperance and prohibition.

It was ordered spread on the minutes.

Bro. D. W. Hammack, Coleman, was elected Treasurer by acclamation.

Any member visiting a sister Association is authorized to report himself as a correspondent.

The time of the next meeting was fixed, as heretofore, on Tuesday after the 4th Sunday in October. The place selected is Mt. Hebron, Randolph county.

The report on Sunday-schools was received as follows:

In Sunday-school work the Bible is the recognized text book—a book attractive with folk lore, song, story, impassioned sermon, tender idyl, philosophic meditation, dramatic poem, pious hymn, all permeated by a religious spirit, a faith ruling reason and heart, a book full of charms for all. Create a reverence for the Bible, and the love for it increases. It is not, upon the whole, hard to understand. The difficult places rarely come up in Sunday-school work, consequently even the common people can do much of the teaching and do it effectively. It is verily a message from God to man, and to every man, irrespective of condition or the time of his living. It is needful to all, and the duty of teaching falls upon the church and upon every member of every church. The Sunday-school work enables the church to so divide its congregation and field work as to reach both the saints and the outside world.

The children are recognized, in main, as the beneficiaries of the Sunday-school work. Our success with them lies much in the manner in which we present these truths to that class of us. They should not be impressed that, because, perchance, they are the children of church people or the members of the Sunday-school work, they are either hot-bed plants or the nursery of the church upon which the church is dependent for support. They should be made to feel their great need, as lost sinners, of a knowledge of God's word, of the cleansing power of the H. S. This makes it necessary for us to use that literature most appropriate for the individual field. While our Sunday-school Board furnishes a literature upon the luternational Sunday-school Book equal to any, it by no means does away with the Catechism and Bible work. In fact, we are persuaded that much more effective work could be done, and that bet-

ter results would come to us, if we did more catechetical teaching. Perhaps the greatest hindrance to the Sunday-school cause in many of our churches lies at the feet of the teaching force. We recommend that pastors urge upon this class the practice of more prayerful and close application to the study of God's word as a whole, particularly of the Sunday-school lesson. Furthermore, that no opportutity for presenting our doctrines be allowed to pass.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE:—At the last session the Association pledged itself to send Bro Sullivan to Mercer University. About January 1st he announced himself ready to go. No funds had been provided. The Executive Committee was appealed to and urged by the Moderator to move in the matter, as it was their duty to do so. His efforts were without success. In order to protect the honor and integrity of the Association until it met again, he and I volunteered to go before the churches, present the matter as it was, and ask contributions for this purpose. Bro. Sullivan was entered promptly at Bethel College, where he now is, and has been all the year, preparing for Mercer. We

are glad to report that the churches received us gladly and contributed to this noble purpose generously. We have collected and disbursed the following amounts:

Resolved 1st, That we heartily endorse the movement now being made by the President, Trustees and friends of Mercer University, all over the state, to raise fifty thousand dollars for the endowment fund of that institution.

Resolved 2d, That each paster having a church within the bounds of the

Bethel Association pledge himself to take a collection for Mercer at his EARLI-EST opportunity, not later than March 1st, 1901. And they be requested to invite some member of the Central or Associational Committee to be present, if needed, and assist, by address or any other way desired, in the taking of this collection. APPENDIX.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

1. This Association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association, and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof, after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2. This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches, nor in

any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will be only an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them, and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be

elected annually from the body by ballot or otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to the ratification or

revision of the Association.

7. He shall see that brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject, or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall have no yoice in determining questions,

except in case of a tie.

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it, when required, and shall print and distribute the minutes among the several churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall, from time to time, appropriate to that purpose,

10. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the Association, give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association, through her Executive Committee, may order. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report

to the Association for each fiscal year.

11. The Association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed, inless suspended for a specific object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.

12. All motions, when seconded, must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by

the mover. Substitutes and amendments shall always be in order.

13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject or uses unbecoming or unbrotherly language,

14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who yoted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of the members enrolled as

messengers are present.

15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.

16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.

17. This constitution and rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the second, which shall be unalterable.

18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of three members, chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

- 19. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual minute the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of the

Bethel Baptist Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE 1. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end and truth without any mixture or error for its

We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose A RT. 2. name is Jehovah, the Maker and Snpreme Ruler of the Universe, reyealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy

Ghost, equal in every divine perfection.

ART. 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

Art. 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace through

faith in the Son of God.

ART. 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteonsness, and not any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

ART. 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the Gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respecter of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is

accepted of Him.

Art. 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose

of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.

ART. 8. We believe in the "perseverance of the saints"; that all those who are truly regenerated and born again will ultimately be saved in heaven; that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation. ART. 9.

We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship

of the Gospel; that its only proper officers are bishops, or pastors, and deacous. Arr. 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper.

ART. II. We believe that communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in

Christ and have been legally baptized.

ART. 12. We believe in a general judgment and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from heaven and raise the dead from the grave to a final retribution; that a solemu separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteons to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

The report of Trustees of Bethel College was read as follows:

Fifty years ago our fathers founded Bethel College. During this half century the Bethel Association has maintained the college and directed its affairs. It has lived through all the vicissinges and dangers of war, reconstruction and poverty, because founded in

righteousness and huilt on love, "the eternal years of God are her's."

Since the last session of this body, several matters of great importance to our college have occurred. Ist. At the close of the Fall term of 1900 President Manry resigned. The Trustees elected Dr. A. E. Keese to succeed him, for the space of one year, with the privilege of five At the earnest solicitation of the Board, Dr. Keese accepted the position, and on Jan. 21st, 1901, entered upon the discharge of his duties. 2nd. On the 25th of April of the present year the college building and contents were destroyed by fire. 3rd, A meeting of the Board of Trustees was immediately called, and appointed J. W. Stanford, J. E. Paullin and A. E. Keese as a Building Committee, directing them to dispose of the old college lot and boarding house, and purchase a new site, and erect on it a building suitable to the present needs of the institution. The Committee secured the lot known as the Taylor or Gamble place, consisting of about seven acres of ground in the heart of the city of Cuthbert, and a commodions boarding house, much larger than we had before, and have erected a handsome, commodious, modern two story brick-veneer building. It is a building of which the Baptists of this Association and section of the state may feel prond. In appearance, size and equipment, it meets not only present needs, but will meet our requirements for a generation to come. The property is well worth \$12,000, and is insured

for \$6,000. Besides the four large class rooms below, that will hold easily fifty pupils each. seated with the latest improved desks, with spacious hallways, we have upstairs a library room, a laboratory room, and a main auditorium, with a seating capacity, easily, of 400, and on a squeeze 500 persons. Here the boys will gather each morning for devotional exercises, led in music by Prof. Von Hofe, on an organ, so generously donated by the Putnum Organ Co., and using song books and bible donated by the American Baptist Publication Society, to Bethel College. Also the entertainments and lectures will be given there.

Of Dr. Keese, as a teacher we need not speak. Reared among us. graduating at Mercer with distinction, he has been recognized throughout this section, for the past 25 years, as a successful teacher. At great personal sacrifice he has given his energy and time to Bethel's needs during this year. His past experience, especially in building up denominational school work, renders him most valuable in our present needs. He has associated with him, that prince of orators. Prof. Mark Bolding, who graduated from both the literary and law departments of Mercer University, and who won for that institution the oratorical medal over all the colleges in the state. Also Prof. T. H. Wilkinson of Mercer, Capt. H. D. Gurley of Dahlonega, and Miss Bessie Baldwin of the State Normal. Thee are competent, conscientious teachers. With commodious school rooms, modern equipments, large and thoroughly competent Faculty, Bethel College offers better advantages now than ever in its history

While our property is paid for and unincumbered, we need some money for repairing our boarding house and enlargement and fuller equipment. In buying our new property, and rebuilding our college, we have not asked the churches in the Association for one dellar. We bring to you, brethren, a splendid piece of property, and present to you the greatest opportunity the College has ever had. It rests with you to utilize for God's glory the

remarkable advantages that surround you. We recommend:

1st. That Bethel Association tender a half interest in Bethel College, to the Friendship Association.

2nd. That the Executive Committees pairs and equipments. Respectfully submitted.

We have an Orphans' Home, situated at Hapeville, near Atlanta, on the Central Railroad. This Home is under the control of a Board of Managers and Trustees. Rey. J. B. Taylor is the General Superinte dent. There are at present in the Home about one hundred dred inmates. No work among Baptists has had a more phenomenal success than in the care of our children

The Orphans' Home is a part of our State Work, and every church is expected to do something for its support. Pastors are requested to carry this work before their Sunday schools, as children would like to help children. There are other institutions in the State that care for children We would not discourage benevolence, but we would probably do

more-good if we would confine our gifts to our own institution

No better use of money can be made than by taking care of fatherless and motherless children. We know not what may be the fate of some of our own loved ones. James says "Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction and to keep himself unspotted from the world " Thus the care for orphans is coupled with unspottedness. The report on Education was received as follows:

The spirit of progress is in the air; every department of human effort has felt its life-ying touch. The demand therefore for the general education of our whole people is greater than ever before.

We can only he pe to keep step with the march of human eyents by the education of our children. Those that are neglected not only limit the sphere of their own usefulness, but

retard the progress of the whole country.

Too much stress cannot be placed upon our common schools. There ought to be created such a sentiment among our people that no white child, however poor, could grow to maturity without receiving, at least, the rudiments of an English education.

We are glad to note that the facilities for academic training are unusually good. Our

own Bethel high school is doing excellent work and should be liberally patronized. For the higher education of our boys, Mercer University stands without a rival.

We are gratified to learn that the effort to add \$50,000 endowment to that institution is assured success. The noble part which the churches of our Association has borne in an assured success. raising that amount should be a source of gratification to us all. Long may this glorious institution flourish, shedding its blessings upon our whole people.

We would call special attention to Monroe Female College, located at Forsyth. The

young women of our state can secure first-class training at this institution at a nominal cost.

Let us be thoroughly alive to the education of all our people, recognizing that God requires every man to make the best use of the gifts with which he is endowed.

Received the report on Sabbath Schools, as follows:

One of the most prominent characteristics of our times is an intense and seemingly increasing interest in the study of the Bible The literator, the scientist, the infidel, the devout and consecrated are all, from their several points of view, delving for its hidden treasures

As Baptists, a people who have always welcomed a reverent, prayerful and impartial study of God's Word, we have nothing to fear from such a movement. The Rock of Truth will ever stand secure, the populus of infidelity, higher criticism, Christian Science, the-

os pliv, spiritualism, and other isms to the contrary notwithstanding

But while there is no danger threatening the Word, we as believers in the Word need to be on our guard lest we be led astray. The believer can not have a better bulwark against these evils than a thorough knowledge of Divine Truth. The Sunday school offers the opportunity, through the help of the Holy Spirit, of gaining this knowledge. There the adult followers of Jesus, led by the Spirit. may get that knowledge which will help them to grow to the full stature of men and women in Christ Jesus. There, too, the little mind, while yet untaught by the Spirit, may, under the guidance of the faithful and consecrated teacher, learn at least the letter of the Scriptures, and lay the foundation of a character upon which to build when God, in His mercy, shall have taught him to see things that are spir-

itually discerned.

It is pre-eminently the business of the Sunday school to teach the Bible. The Word of God is the text book. We are fortunate in having the excellent helps published by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and by the American Baptist Publication Society, but let us be careful that these are used as helps and not as hindrances. The little child who is taught from Sunday to Sunday to answer certain questions. tions on a certain something printed in his little pamphlet may, and often does, lose sight of the fact that he is studying the Bible. The wise teacher will have the child to see that these weekly lessons are not isolated stories, but component parts of the greatest Book in the world.

A very necessary adjunct to the Sunday school is a book of spiritual songs ual, we mean such songs as come within the intent and teaching of the Scriptures. Through song we nuconsciously inbibe ideas that stay with us all our lives. Our Pedo-Baptist friends may well smile with joy when Baptist Sunday schools sing such songs as "Life is Like a Mountain Railway;" or again,

"A charge to keep I have,

"A God to skeep!"

A God to glorify. A never dying soul to save, And fit it for the sky.'

But above all, the success of a Sunday school dep nds upon its teachers The superintendent should be an efficient instrument in classifying and securing attendance of pupils, selecting teachers, etc., but after all success is not to be measured by the enrollment, but by the work done with the individual pupil. To do this work well the teacher unst he a believer. Not only so but well versed in the Scriptures and grounded in the great doctrines of grace Otherwise the pupil will become the hapless victim of blind leaders of the blind, and both at last be plunged into the ditch of error. the banner of righteousness till their Captain shall sav, "It is enough

Within the bounds of our Association we have much cause for gratification and sincere thanksgiving. Clay county, which for years has been a stench in the nostrils of her own good citizens, on account of her licensed sale of liquors, against overwhelmin, odds, has won a most glorious victory for the Master. The hideons monster is threatening every home here represented. The Lord is on our side, how can we meet defeat? What Clay county has done, it would seem that any other county in Georgia can do in the name of the Lord.

We doubt not that the most of our churches in their decorning condemn drunkenness some of us discipline brethren guilty of this disorder. Now we submit: If there were no a dram-drinking, there could be no drnnkenness. If drunkenness is wrong, dram-drinking, the cause of it, is wrong. Let us in our discipline strike at the very root of the evil. Let

us educate our members and our young men early along these lines

Received and adopted the report on Obituaries:

To the Bethel Association—Greeting: We, your committee on Obitnaries, beg leave to report that only one death has occurred in the ministerial ranks of your body during the last associational year; that of Rev. W. H. Patterson, D. D., who departed this life the 26th day of March, 1901. Bro. Patterson, besides being a former Moderator of this body, was a minister of unblemished christian character, a man of great usefulness, and whose death will be deeply felt.

APPENDIX

CONSTITUTION OF THE BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

1. This Association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association, and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the ter s of the union, and whose faith and con stitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or tractional part thereof, after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2 This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches, nor in any way in-

terfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will be only an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them, and the spread of the gospel throughout the world

4 Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected an-

nnally from the body by ballot or otherwise

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the boly, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject however to appeal to the Association upon a otion and second.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to the ratification or revision of the Association.

7. He shall see that brethren mai tain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject, or uses any indecorous or unbiotherly language.

8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall have no voice in determining questions, except in case of a tie.

9 The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body receive and read all communications addressed to it, when required, and shall print and distribute the min-utes among the several churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall, from time to time, appropriate to that purpose

10. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the Association, give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association, through her Executive Committee, may order. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report to the Association for each fiscal year.

11. The Association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed, unless suspended for a specific object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.

12. All motions, when seconded, must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by the mover.

Substitutes and amendments shall always be in order.

13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject or uses unbecoming or unbrotherly language.

14 A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of the members enrolled as messengers are present.

15 The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.

16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have

his name stricken from the roll.

17. This constitution and rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the sec-

ond, which shall be unalterable.

18 There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of three members, chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial ciaims or interests of the Association.

19. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual minute the Order of Business, the Articl's of Faith and the Constitution of the Bethel Baptist Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE 1. We believe the Ho y Bible was written by men divinely inspired and 'is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end and truth without any mixture or error for its matter.

ART 2. We believe here is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in every divine perfection.

ART. 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

ART. 4 We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace through faith in the

Son of God.

ART. 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness, and not any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteonsness.

ART 6 We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the Gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respecter of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted of Him.

ART. 7. We believe the doctrine of election, that it is the gracious purpose of God, ac-

cording to which He regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.

ART. 8 We believe in the "perseverance of the saints;" that all those who are truly regenerated and born again will ultimately be saved in heaven; that a special Providence watches over their weifare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation

ART 9 We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; that its on-

ly proper officers are bishops, or pastors, and deacons

ART 10 We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper.

ART. 11 We believe that communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ and been legally baptized.

ART 12 We believe in a general judgment and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from heaven and raise the dead from the grave to a final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

MINUTES.

Bluffton Ga., Oct. 28th, 1902.

The Seventieth Session of THE BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION met with the Bluffton church on the above date, according to appointment. After a prayer service, conducted by Rev. J. S. Knowles, the Introductory Sermon was preached by Rev. B. W. Davis; text, John 14:27.

Owing to the absence of brethren Weaver and Duggan, former Moderator and Clerk, Rev. B. W. Davis was requested to act as temporary Moderator and J. N. Stanford

Clerk pro tem.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

The report on Sabbath Schools was read, and after considerable discussion the same was amended, after which it was adopted as follows:

Your committee does not believe that too much attention can

be given the Sabbath School, as it is, or should be, a most valuable auxiliary to the church. How important it is then that the right means should be employed in the cultivation and development of these young minds. Not only should the best literature be used as helps in studying the word of God, but only the most conscientious and consecrated teachers should be selected to assist the child in grasping and retaining the truths contained in the lessons to be studied each Sunday.

Your committee has often wondered (while glancing at the empty benches in a church whose membership reaches nearly one hundred) why parents seemingly give so little thought to the advantages of the Sabbath school and the importance of having

their children attend regularly.

From what we can learn the Sabbath schools within the bounds of this Association are as well attended and have prospered as much, seemingly during the past year as any one in its history. But while this may be true, it is safe to say, if the parents, who compose the membership of the churches of the Association, would only do their duty toward their children in the matter, it would not be long before each church would be rejoicing at the steady ingathering of precious souls as the result of their labors. Let the children come to the Sabbath school, by all means, but let the parents be there, also, to encourage the children and young people, as well as the superintendent and teachers by their presence and assistance.

Your committee has no special fault to find with the literature supplied by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and the American Baptist Publication Society, but think it would be better not to depend too much upon these helps and devote more time to the study of the lesson on each one's own responsibility. We also feel called upon to note the death of Rev. J. P. Dawson, a former member of this Association, who died in Decatur county, Ga., sometime during this year.

Heard the report on Education, and, together with the report of the Board of Trustees of Bethel College, after speeches by brethren Keese, Stanford, Wellons, Bisby, W. D. Hammack, J. W. Newsome, D. W. Hammock and others, both were adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF BETHEL COLLEGE.

Fifty years ago Bethel College started on her checkered path of usefulness. During this half century her influence has been felt around many a hearthstone. Just what her life has meant to the world only eternity can tell. What she has accomplished was through the kind fidelity of godly men and women

of the past; what her present and future are to be, depend on

you and me.

In her new quarters last June, she closed the most prosperous term of many years. Prosperous, not only in the larger enrollment of pupils, but also in the character of the work done.

Four young men went from Bethel's halls to Mercer University. Admitted to their respective classes upon certificates from our school, (one of whom is enjoying the benefit of the free scholarship so generously given us each year by Mercer,) these young men, we are informed, are standing well in their classes. One of them has already won distinction.

This year we have five we hope to send to Mercer.

The school building and equipment, which the building committee has turned over to us free of debt, and yet complete in its appointments, is a marvel of convenience and comfort. Each room is well lighted, well ventillated, well heated and furnished with seats, blackboards, globes, etc. We are sure that a more convenient, comfortable school building cannot be found in this section of the State. The old Gamble house, with its admirable location, large rooms and extensive verandahs was most readily converted into a very desirable home for the boarding patronage. A very convenient dining hall has been added to the main building, the comfortable beds from the old boarding hall brought down, and homelike quarters arranged for the boarders. We heartily commend Bethel to all parents desiring to give their boys educational advantages under favorable conditions.

Inasmuch as the greater part of Dr. Keese' time was required in the field, it seemed to the Board of Trustees advisable to associate with Dr. Keese, as President his brother, Rev. W. S. Keese, in order that some one with authority might be constantly on the ground. These have associated with them the same strong faculty of last year, except that W. S. Keese takes the place of Capt. Garley. We are gratified that the strength of this faculty is recognized by pupils as well as others of wider experience and observation. One of the former pupils writes thus: "I feel that to have come in contact with the force of character of one of Bethel's teachers has been worth to me all the time and money that it has cost." Dr. Pollock, with his acquaintance with the schools of Georgia, says: "I know of no secondary school in the State with stronger teaching force," These words of approval are duly appreciated, as an encouragement in our efforts to offer at Beth el advantages inferior to none in the State.

The school thus far, this term, has been progressing very harmoniously and satisfactorily. Every marning before the beginning of the day's duties, all the pupils are assembled in the chapel where, with scripture reading, song and prayer, the pupils are impressed that duty to God comes first, and religious exercises go hand in hand with the avocations of life. Once, and sometimes more, each week, some minister or pious man conducts the exercises and exhorts the young men to noble things.

The older young men have organized a debating society which

meets each week to argue the pro and con of some topic of interest. Thus independent thought and research is developed in the young men. So far as we are able to judge or hear, the spirit of the school is gratifying. The pupils as a whole are awake and interested. The spirit of co-operation between teacher and pupil pervades the whole work. We are very much gratified at present attainments and conditions but we cannot abide content here. Worthy young men, with an ambition and a purpose in life, are constantly crying to us for help. We are doing what we can, but do not wish to monopolize the opportunity.

We recommend therefore;

1. That each church in the Association be requested to raise ten or more dollars to be turned over to the Prudential Committee and LOANED by them to worthy needy applicants.

2. That the Board of Trustees be elected for a period of five

years, and empowered to fill vacancies.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Your committee beg leave to submit the following:

Created in the image of God, man was commissioned by his divine Creator to subdue the earth and have dominion over fowl and fish and beast. Carrying out this august commission, man has swept away forests, tunneled mountains, leveled hills, bridged rivers, spanued chasms, climbed peaks, sailed the seas and traversed the earth from pole to pole He has harnessed the rolling water and the blowing winds and made them his servants. Delving into Nature's secret stores, he has brought forth her hidden forces and made them subservient to his will. Again and again has he girdled the globe with his steel rails, over which speeds his locomotive drawing all the marvelous products of his inventive brain and skilled hands. He has stretched the telegraph wire over mountains, seas and valleys—he talks as face to face with his friends a thousand miles away. He has found the highways of the trackless deep; has made the nations of earth touch elbows across "old ocean's hoary main." For practical purposes he has annihilated time and space and undauntedly attempts and realizes the seemingly impossible. For the accomplishment of these herculean tasks he has needed the fullest development of his powers, both of body and mind.

Re-created in the image of the "second Adam," man is commissioned to fight against the strongholds of Satan, to storm and capture, not with sword and cannon, not with battleship and army, but with the wondrous story of the cross, the citadels of sin—to conquer and lay at Jesus' feet the kingdoms of this world. To perform this more godlike task, man needs no less than in the former work, the trained reason, the logical mind, the power of keen analysis. But added to this must be the recognition of the spiritual self, the expansion, growth and development of the faculties of the soul. The heart must be taken into partnership with the head. The motive power of this combined machinery

must be Love—the object to be attained must be the glory of God. To this end God has inspired his servants in divers places and times to erect and sustain schools, colleges, universities and seminaries. Godly men and women control and teach these schools. Daily religious services, the influence of christian characters in daily contact with pupils impress these pupils that to fear God and keep his commandments, is the supreme duty and the highest attainment of man. In this work Georgia Baptists have peculiar grounds for gratitude to God. Mercer University, the Cox Female College, LaGrange Female College, Shorter Female College, Monroe Female College, all stand with beckoning hands, a glorious past and a brilliant future, to train men and women for the great warfare under Christ Jesus. They need no commendation at our hands. The work already done is their pledge for future support. To these in the last 15 years have been added about 30 associational high schools, designed to prepare pupils for entrance into college classes. So urgent is the demand for trained men and women, so rapidly are events hastening to their final solution and consummation, that the importance, the worth of this array of denominational schools cannot be overestimated. Their equipment and support is the overshadowing question of the hour. Especially do we nrge this Association to an earnest, united support of your own school, Bethel College. Hitherto it has existed by your sufferance rather than your support. You can make it a mighty force for God. Respectfully submitted.

Our weakness is such that while we are almost on the threshold of victory over the barrooms, many are willing to accept the dispensary compromise, because its damnable spoils find

through this method a more equal division.

We are sorry that even some of our ministers are making use of expressions touching this great evil which tend to encourage the dispensary evil. Be not deceived; God is not mocked. If the whiskey traffic is wrong, brethren, we ought to stand against it with united effort, and God will give us the victory. God's

peace will not abide with us in full measure as long as we retain these damnable nurseries of evil and home despoilers in our midst. Don't quail at this giant evil as the ten spies did in their report of the heathen. Caleb's and Joshua's faithfulness did not prevent a long delay, but secured the final possession of the promised land. Respectfully, D. W. HAMMACK, Chairman.

Adopted the report on Missions:

The cause of Missions is the cause of God. We are taught from the Old Book that God, through His foreknowledge, saw man's need of a Savior; and in the councils of eternal wisdom, before man was created or the earth formed, He formulated, according to his own will, the plan for his redemption. Christ, the son of God, the express image of the Father, in that council of eternal wisdom, agreed to come to this world and make His Fathers will known to man. He said, "Lo, in the volume of the book it is written, I come to do thy will." So we have Christ, the first great Missionary, sent by His Father.

This command comes to each one of us, with just the same force it came to the disciples who heard the Savior speak it—It is our duty, individually and collectively, to do everything within our power, under the direction of the Holy Spirit, to hasten the time when the gospel of our Lord and Savior shall be preached to the uttermost parts of the earth, and not a creature be left who has not—heard the sweet old story of Jesus and His love.

Brethren, are we praying that the Lord of the harvest will send more laborers into His vineyard? Let us try and make next year the greatest year for Missions the Association has ever known.

APPENDIX.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

This Association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association, and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof, after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five mes-

2 This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches, nor

in any way interfere with their internal affairs 3 It will only be an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall

be elected annually from the body by ballot or otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject however to appeal to the Association upon motion and second. 6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to the ratification

or revision of the Association.

7 He shall see that brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate; and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject, or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8 The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by call-

ing some brother to the chair, but shall have no voice in determining ques-

tions except in case of a tie

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it, when required, and shall print and distribute the minutes among the churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall, from time to time, appropriate to that purpose

10. The Treasurer shall receive all moncy belonging to the Association, give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association, through her Executive Committee may order. He shall keep a balance sheet and

make annual report to the Association for each fiscal year.

11. The Association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed, unless suspended for a specific object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house

12. All motions, when seconded, must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by the mover. Substitutes and amendments shall always be in order.

13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association, but hall not be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject or uses unbecoming or unbrotherly language.

14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of the members enrolled are present

15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.

16 Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.

17. This constitution and rules shall be subject to alteration by twothirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of

the Association, except the second, which shall be unalterable.

18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of three members, chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, fill any vacancy that may occur either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

19. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in eyery annual minute the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of

the Bethel Baptist Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE 1. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end and truth without any mixture or error for its matter.

ART, 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose

ART, 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the

Holy Ghost, equal in every divine perfection.

ART 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

ART. 4 We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace

through faith in the Son of God

ART 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteonsness, and not any works of righteonsness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

ART, 6 We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the Gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respecter of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh

righteousness is accepted of Him.

ART. 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies and saves sin-

ners.

ART 8. We believe in the "perseverance of the saints;" that all those who are truly regenerated and born again will ultimately be saved in heaven; that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salyation.

ART. 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that its only proper officers are bishops, or pastors,

and deacons.

ART. 10 We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper.

ART. 11. We believe that communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake or it as have given a credible evidence of faith

in Christ and been legally baptized.

ART. 12. We believe in a general judgment and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from heaven and raise the dead from the grave to a final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

On motion the regular Order of Business was suspended to allow Bro. Pack to present the claims of the Index, which he did in a most able manner, being followed by Revs. R. A. Morgan, J. I. D. Miller and S. Y. Jameson with splendid speeches along the same line.

The Report of the Executive Committee was received. and after discussion, was adopted as follows:

There has been but one General Meeting this year. This was held with the Benevolence church. We regret that the churches did not ask for, and have one each fifth Sunday. We would suggest to those churches that desire, and fail to get, the Association to meet with them, that they invite and have the General Meeting instead, which under proper arrangement and execution, can be made as great a blessing to the church as the session of the Association would be.

We assisted two students at Bethel College last year, Cecil Corley and Rev. S. F. Sullivan, through the kindness of some of the brethren and a few of the churches. We would like to have done more of this kind of work, had the encouragement from the churches and brethren been greater. A number of worthy young men within the bounds of our Association desired help, to go on further with their studies, having gone as far as they could at their home schools, but we were unable to aid them. We would suggest, brethren, that each church select some ambitious young man or girl from their membership, and educate them. We can

easily do this, and we cannot spend the Lord's money He has

entrusted to us in a better way.

We have to regret that the churches have not done more for the cause of Missions. We would heartily commend them for what they have done, but like Paul, we desire that they "Abound the more." We would suggest that EACH church, thoroughly organize itself (for nothing reaches that measure of success it should, unless thoroughly organized), into one united mission band, with this for their motto: "We will raise and give more money to send the Gospel to those who have it not, than we do to keep it at home." We would suggest this plan: that each church have, once each month, a RALLY DAY for sque of the SPECIFIC OBJECTS NAMED IN THE SCHEDULE, and put their organized forces to work on every member of the church, and if properly organized and heartily executed, when the day arrives, they will be ready for and will make a liberal contribution to that specific object, in which the pastor and deacons should take the lead. Let us illustrate further: Suppose you have, the month Orphaus Home comes in the schedule, some one to represent that object and make a talk and take the collection. And so on with Missions, State, Home and Foreign, and with Education and the Index, and all the other objects we contribute to?

Each church should, by all means, have an Index day, and invite some one of its representatives to be present and speak for and represent that feature of our denominational work. And then each pastor should follow up this work by taking the Index man in his buggy and carrying him to the homes of every member of his church and see that they take it. And if he finds some who are too poor to take it, find some liberal brother-who will pay for it for them, or bring the matter before his deacons and raise the money and subscribe for it for them. It is an evidence of a live, wide awake pastor, when the Index goes to every home in his church. It is an evidence of spiritual and denominational declession for the Index not to be found in the home of

The Report of the Board of Trustees of Bethel Male College was adopted as follows, as was also the annexed

resolution:

The last session of Bethel College closed in June with another successful year to her credit. Her influence is yet strong in educating the minds and hearts of our boys and moulding their characters into characters of usefulness and honor.

The attendance for the year was good, and the quality of the

work up to the usual standard.

Five young men received certificates for entrance into their classes at Mercer University. One of these young men receives the benefit of the free scholarship given by Mercer to Bethel. Several others are now attending Bethel preparatory to entering

Mercer next year.

At the end of last session the old faculty resigned. In July W. S. Childs, A. B. (Mercer University, 1900) was elected to the presidency. Prof. Childs is a christian gentleman of high culture, and is, in every way worthy, of confidence and patronage. He has associated with him two teachers of unsurpassed ability, Mrs. Oscar Gamble and Mrs. T. J. Perry nee Miss Bessie Baldwin.

An evidence of the prosperity of the school this term is its increasing attendance. The enrollment now equals the enrollment for the entire session last year and is constantly increasing. The session bids fair to be the most prosperous that Bethel has had for several years.

The college building is in fairly good condition. Some work

of renairing has been done on the dormitory

The dormitory is in charge of an excellent family, and the young men boarding here are under the direct charge of the President at all hours. They are well looked after and every-

thing is made as homelike as possible for them.

We recommend that a committee be appointed who shall take under consideration the advisability of placing Bethel College in the system of Corollated Schools under the direction of the Trustees of Mercer University and the Educational Commission, and that this committee be, and are hereby empowered to act, if, in their wisdom, they think best.

RESOLUTION ON REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

Moved, That a committee of five he appointed, consisting of J. W. Stanford, I. A. White, J. W. Martin, E. W. Childs and L. A. Duggan, and that the same be authorized and empowered to carry out the precommendations in the report of the Board of Trustees of Bethel College, relating to the placing of Bethel College in the system of schools connected with Mercer University.

Rev. H. L. Crumbley was given permission to present the case of the widow and little daughter of Rev. W. A. Mabry, deceased, which he proceeded to do in a most earnest and pathetic manner. After remarks by several of the brethren, a special collection was taken for them, \$21 75 being contributed.

The discussion on Mission Report was resumed, and at its conclusion was returned to the Committee for correc-

tion.

The Report on Orphans Home was read, and after an earnest talk by Dr. Beck, the same was adopted, and a collection was taken, amounting to \$24 12:

We want to help the Orphan because of his individual needs; because of social demands, and because of the spiritual exercise

incident to such help.

The Orphan is helpless, and in want of every good thing. He is in want of physical necessities; he is in want of intellectual stimulation; he is in want of spiritual inspiration and development.

This is all largely accounted for by the fact that he is in want of parental care and guidance. An Orphan known to us was permitted to go for the winter shoeless and without other proper clothing. This was through the thoughtlessness and heartlessness of the guardian, though the estate was ample for provision.

Society demands protection from the Orphan grown to manhood. He is ever a menace to its institutions. A boy entered a Mission Station in one of our cities. He wore a tattered coat, and this covered a shirtless back. It is not surprising that this child of the street tried soon to further cover his nakedness with a pistol in his hip pocket.

But for our own spiritual exercise, most of all, we should support the Orphans. It is more blessed to give than to receive. No tear of sympathy is ever shed that is not used to soften our own stony heart, and at length every tear must be taken up by the

sunshine of God's love to the highest heavens.

We Baptists of Georgia have an Orphanage at Hapeville. We should all feel especially grateful to the noble women who have given of their prayers, of their money, and of their time to its support.

Brother Taylor, who is just severing his connection with the

Orphanage, is wor hy of a vote of thanks.

Your committee to Submit the annual report for this session of Bethel Association, feel it will be more conducive to the ends sought by the cause of Missions to lay before the body the needs of the field covered by our work than to discuss at length the subject with which we are acquainted, and to the support of which many of our people contribute in proportion to their knowledge of the immediate need of some deserving field. We suggest first, that Bethel Association take immediate and active steps to co-operate with the pastors of the weaker churches in the Southern part of the Association, with the churches without pastors, with the Bowen and the Southwestern Associations in conducting a strong and continuous effort for a thorough and safe presentation of the Word to the needy congregations, and at such other stations as our representatives feel authorized to open.

That we may accomplish the greatest ends possible, we suggest that the Executive Committee be authorized to co-operate with the Associational Mission Committees of the Bowen and Southwestern Associations, of which Dr. S Y. Jameson is the recognized chairman. Respectfully submitted.

THIRD DAY-MORNING SESSION.

The body met at 9 o'clock. After song and prayer service, the minutes of previous session were read and confirmed.

The report on Sabbath Schools was read, and after being discussed by brethren D. W. Hammack, H. B. Humphrey, J. W. Stanford, H. L. Keese, J. H. Manry, J. S. Knowles and others, the report was adopted as follows:

The commandment to "Teach the children" is a God-given command. It comes down to us through the ages, and is just as

computsory today, as at any time during the past.

For this purpose the Sunday School was organized by consecrated men, that the way of the Lord might be more perfectly taught. Then the Sunday school is the organized way of teaching the bible to the children. Each church, then, should thoroughly organize itself into a Sunday School, by selecting broadminded, consecrated, competent Superintendents and Teachers, who are peculiarly fitted for this work, and are willing to lay aside everything else that would hinder, and give this work their best preparation, prayers and service.

The Sunday School is not a Singing School. While we would not discourage singing at the proper time and place, still the Superintendent or Teacher, who has no higher conception or broader capacity than to make this the important feature of the Sunday School hour, advertises their incapacity, and ought to realize that they have gotten into a place they are not fitted to fill, and

to which God has not called them.

We want to emphasize the necessity for a LIBRARY IN EVERY SCHOOL, where good books can be had by the children, and where they are encouraged by the Superintendent, whose official duty it is, to do this, to read them instead of the dime novel trash that is fast flooding each community. Our religious press and denominational book stores are giving us more and better books than ever before, and make the prices so cheap that any School, no matter how poor, can have a library.

If more attention is not paid to the kind of books the children read, we will discover, when it is too late to remedy it, that the rising generation will be largely given to scoffing at, and unbelief in the Scriptures. Let each Superintendent and Pastor, see to it, that the literature is of the right kind and abundant in quantity. Respectfully submitted, J. W. STANFORD,

The report on Temperance was read, and after discussion, adopted, as follows:

We wish to express our great satisfaction with the present workings of prohibition in our State, praying that the work so nobly done thus far, may be greatly blessed of God, and that no backward step be taken. That we are unalterably opposed to the sale of spirituous and malt liquors it any and all forms and ways: that we are especially opposed to the dispensary system as adopted by some counties, and believe all christian voters ought to work and vote against the evil whenever an opportunity presents itself. That it is the sense of this body that no christian can use alcoholic liquors in any form as a beverage, without gross sin in the sight of God. Respectfully submitted.

The report on Education was submitted, and pending the discussion, a resolution was adopted requesting the pastors of the Association at the earliest opportunity after returning home to ask their churches to make a contribution for the support of Monroe Female College. Dr. Stanford and Bro. D. W. Hammack also made pleas for the support of Mercer University. The report was adopted:

Your committee on Education, beg to submit the following report: Since we last met at Bluffton, the denomination of Baptists, as a body of o gamzed christian believers, has spoken in no doubtful language upon the great question of christian education. In our State Convention this question was enough to occupy a most conspicuous part in their deliberations. Some of the best brain-power, the greatest heart-power and most earnest prayers have been back of the educationa: movement from brethren throughout the State.

Nor has their abor and their prayers been noheeded. We have evidence that God has heard their prayers, for better equipment along educational needs, and money has piled into the places needing it from consecrated Baptist men and women, who gladly received the call for help and then provided the means to equip our Baptist institutions for larger and better work than ever before in the history of our denomination. We are glad to report the Baptist schools, adopted by the State Convention, enjoying the largest patronage in their experience, having better equipment to teach, in the brains back of them, as well as the material comfort provided for the student hody.

And brethren—heed and ponder what we say now: If the Baptists shall continue to lead the christian hosts of Georgia, and teach the doctrines of the New Testament, as we believe them, convincing and persuading our friends who are out of the fold, to believe and accept the teachings of Christ as we believe them, we must realize and wake up to the fact that we are just beginning to learn what we must do and determine, God helping and guiding us, to do better things for His cause along this line than we have ever done. The advancement of Monroe College, at Forsyth, and Mercer University, at Macon, is sufficient cause for congratulation, but it eloquently calls to every loyal Baptist, telling us that the field is still "white up to harvest." Our christian brethren of the other denominations are making great strides along educational lines in Georgia; their ministry is being elevated and their influence broadened by the best educational advantages money can buy, and brains can build. Let their worthy endeavor but urge us on to greater zeal unto this good work in our own ranks. As touching the work and needs of our own school, Bethel College, the report of your Board of Trustees will fully advise you.

We further submit, that as a part of the organized body of Georgia Baptists, we believe it to be the duty, if we would be consistent, to recommend that the Board of Trustees decline to accept the public school fund after the current year, which has been to been received and applied to the maintenance of Bethel College. Fraternally submitted JNO D. Gunn, Ch'm'n.

Benevolence and Morris churches asked for letters of dismission from the body, and after expressions of regret on the part of several brethren, the same were granted.

The clerk was instructed to print and distribute the min-

utes, using the funds sent up for that purpose.

Under the head of Miscellaneous Business, Rev. Jno. W. Martin made a plea for the re-establishment of the colportage work within the bounds of the Association. He was ably seconded by Revs. I. A. White, H. B. Humphrey, Dr. J. W. Stanford, G. R. Bisby, J. D. Gunn and others. As a result of these talks, the following amounts were pledged by individuals and churches, and the Executive Committee was instructed to employ a colporteur as soon as sufficient funds were in hand to warrant the same: J. APPENDIX.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BETHEL BAPLIST ASSOCIATION.

This association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the mnion, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messenger, and one additional messenger for every twenty live members, or fractional part thereof, after the first fifty, provided that no church—hall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2 This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches, nor

in any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3 At will only be an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them and the spread of the gospel throughout the world

4 Its officers shall consist of no ferator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall

be elected annually from the body by bailot or otherwise

5 The Moderator shall p eside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to the ratification

or revision of the Association

i. He shall see that brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order it he departs from the subject or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language

8 The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall have no voice in determining ques-

tions except in case of a tie

9 The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it, when required, and shall print and distribute the minutes among the churches belonging to the Association, at dishall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall, from time to time appropriate to that purpose

10 The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the Association, give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association, through her Executive Committee, may order. He shall keep a balance sheet and

make annual report to the Association for each fiscal year.

11 The Association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed, nuless suspended for a specific object by a majority of the Association inponingtion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.

12. All motions, when seconded, must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by the mover. Substitutes and amendments shall always be in order.

13 No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking nuless he departs from the subject or uses unbecoming or un brotherly language.

14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of the members enrolled are present.

15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of allfothers.16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.

17. This constitution and rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the second, which shall be unalterable.

18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of three members, chosen from the membership of the churches com-posing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

19. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual minute the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of

the Bethel Baptist Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE 1. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end and truth without any mixture or error for its matter.

ART. 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the

Holy Ghost, equal in every divine perfection.

ART. 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his boly and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

ART. 4 We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, through faith in the Son of God.

ART. 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness, and not any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

ART. 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the Gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respecter of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh right-

consuess is accepted of Him.

ART. 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.

ART. 8. We believe in "perseveance of the saints;" that all those who are truly regenerated and born again will ultimately be saved in heaven that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

ART. 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that its only proper officers are bishops, or pastors,

and deacons.

ART. 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper.

ART 11. We believe that communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith

in Christ and been legally baptized.

ART, 12. We believe in a general judgment and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from heaven and raise the dead from the grave to a final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

MINUTES.

ORPHAN'S HOME

Was received and read. "Beckoning Hands" was sung, and after an appeal from Bro. Brown, on behalf the little ones represented by him, a special collection of \$33 83 was taken up. The report was then adopted as follows:

The Saviour said, "The poor always ye have with you" and "He that giveth to the poor lendeth to the Lord." Then that which we contribute to the orphans is not given, but loaned to the Lord. Surely none would object to loaning his money to such a person, and with such collateral as He has at His command. The orphans can rightly be called the poorest of Gods children. Brought into existence without their consent, and thrown upon the cold charities of the world before they are able to provide for themselves, surely God does not leave these helpless creatures unprovided for Let us see what He says and where the responsibility of caring for them rests. As evidence that He does not forget them He says, "My ear is ever open to the cry of the widow and the orphan." Then hearing their cries for help, He places the responsibility of caring for them clearly in Psalms 10, 14, when He says, "Thou art the helper of the fatherless." He then has plainly placed the responsibility on us, His children. Let us see how faithful we are to this trust. Some thirty

years ago the organized work began of caring for the orphans by the Baptists of Georgia. The start was small with only four children in the city of Atlanta under the care of good christian women. But under God's kind protection and wise management and benevolent gifts, it has steadily grown until we now have nearly a hundred children being cared for at the home at Hapeville, nine miles this side of Atlanta, on the Central Road. There we have a 50 acre farm, two mules, six cows, and farm wagons and implements where the boys are taught agricultural and industrial pursuits, and the girls are taught to be useful

WHAT ARE SOME OF THEIR NEEDS? The Infirmary, started some time ago is finished, but the baby department needs enlarged quarters; they are too crowded for confort and health. They need six more cows to give healthful milk for the children, and a continual donation of supplies of food and clothing. Once each week, twelve christian women leave their homes and go out on the cars and spend three hours there overlooking each department, suggesting and planning for the comfort and care of the children. They have 'wo teachers to teach those old enough Will not every church in the Asto receive instruction socia ion take a special collection for the completion of this main building, and will not some brother send a cow, which the Railroad will probably deliver free? Let us lend some of that which the Lord has so abundantly given us this year, to Him in gifts to this wor hy and dependent cause of His. He will return it in large measure. Respectfully submitted,

Your committee report as follows: Next to the living voice, the printed page is the most potent agency for distributing information, awakening interest and increasing the average of general intelligence. Merchants, politicians, public enterprises, fairs, shows and even quacks and cranks realize the value of printers' ink." "The sons of this world are for their own generation wiser than the sons of the light."

As churches and individual workers, we have not commanded anything like the full power of the press, nor realized more than a tithe or what we should upon the rich investment in this de-

partment of our Denominational activity.

Never before in the history of the world was there such abundance of reading matter and never as now such splendid facilities for obtaining it. Books, periodicals and papers, leaflets and tracts of every kind, description and quality are brought to our doors day by day—some of them with our knowledge, some without our consent—and dressed in all the grace and blandishment of modern art, find a place within our homes. Our children, unable to discriminate between the good and the bad, devour whatever is in reach. It is as much the duty of parents and guardians to protect their children agains flimsy and immoral literature, as against improper, adulterated or pois mous food.

To crowd out improper reading matter, to supply our homes with wholesome mental pabulum and to build up our young people into strong, loyal, aggressive advocates of our Denominational principles and agencies, we must liberally supply and use our Denominational. Literature. Baptists have a long and glorious history. Our young people ought to be familiar with it. Baptists are grounded upon the most vital and yet the simplest, safest and soundest principles and practices of the New Testament. Our young people must be taught them. In the great work of evangelizing the world Bap ists are conspicuous—they have achieved much our young people must know of and be in-

spired to support this work.

For home and fireside reading we recommend the Christian Index—the nestor in modern Baptist journalism. It merits and should have the first place in every home in the state. For our Sunday schools, we heartily commend "Kind Words," and our series of helps, published by our Sunday School Beard, as Nashville. Let teachers and superintendents secure copies and pursue a course in "Normal Studies," by Rev. B. W. Spilman, Nashville. For Ladies' Missionary Societies and all our church members, we urge the reading of "Our Home Field," Atlanta, and "The Foreign Mission Journal," Richmond, Va. And all our people, young and old, we would urgently persuade to faithfully, reverently read and prayerfully meditate upon the Word of God Respectfully submitted,

Mark 1:4: "The beginning of the gospel of Jesus Christ, the son of God, as it is written in the prophets, behold I send my messenger before thy face to prepare the way, and to make his paths straight." In Luke, we are told that John's father, on account of unbelief, was speechless, and in six months the great Missionary of heaven and earth came, and soon after He commissioned others ic the work, which increased through the apostles until we come to Paul, that great man of God. ON EDUCATION,

E. W. CHILDS.

Was received, and after a splendid tribute, by Rev. B. W. Davis to the educational institutions of Georgia, fostered by Baptists, the same was adopted:

This is emphatically a day of education. Never, perhaps, has more attention been paid to it than now. Great strides have been made in recent years, both in the equipment of teachers and in the perfection of schools. All the states, and especially the Southern states, have made visible advances along educational lines. Efforts to reach the masses have been fairly successful; the recent adoption of the constitutional amendment, makes it possible for still more to be done. All of which facts go to show that the trend of our time is to educate, and the children who are neglected will find themselves relegated to the rear. They cannot keep abreast of the foremost.

But the drill of text books alone, is not the only need. This will produce culture, but only mental culture. The true education seeks the development of both the mental and moral nature, yea, and the still higher religious nature. Hence the necessity of schools under christian auspices. If our boys and girls are educated under state auspices alone, they will be educated indeed, but the danger is, that they may become educated infidels

or agnostics.

This is especially true of higher education, and God's people are alive to this danger. Hence the establishment of high schools and colleges under christian auspices. Every christian denomination of any importance has them. We have our share. Grand old Mercer! Who does not love her, and appreciate her magnificent work and influence? Then come Monroe and Shorter, magnificent institutions of learning, now the property of the Baptists of Georgia. Then the Southern Female College at LaGrange, and Cox College at College Park, both grand Baptist institutions, under the control of consecrated Baptist men and women.

Besides these, we have a large number of high schools under Associational control, representing thousands of dollars invest-

ment, and most of them reported in flourishing condition.

Brethren, these are a power. If we grasp and use them, patronize and sustain them, eternity alone can tell their power. We commend these institutions without exception. Let us, as far as we are able, educate our children under our own auspices, invoking God's blessing upon our efforts. Let us do it for Christ's sake, and expect God's blessing.

APPENDIX.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION....

This association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and one additional messenger to every twenty five members or fractional part thereof, after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

This A sociation shall have no right to legislate for the churches, nor

in any way interfere with their internal affairs

3 It will only be an advisory body, having for it object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them and the spread of the gospel throughouf the world.

Its officere shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall

be elected annually from the body by ballot or otherwise,

5 The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give
general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.

6 The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to the ratifica-

tion or revision of the Association.

He shall see that brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8 The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by

calling some brother to the chair, but shall have no voice in determining

questions except in case of a tie.

9 The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it, when required, and should print and distribute the minutes among the churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall from time to time appropriate to that purpose

10 The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the Association, give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association, through her Executive Committee may order. He shall keep a balance sheet and

make annual report to the Association for each fiscal year.

11 The Association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session and it shall be implicitly followed, unless suspended for a specific object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second, and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.

12 All motions, when seconded, must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by the mover. Substitutes and amendments shall always be in

order.

13 No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the subject or uses unbecoming or unbrotherly language.

14 A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of the members en-

rolled are present

15 The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others

16 Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without pern ission shall have his name stricken from the roll

17 This constitution and rules shall be subject to alteration by two-

thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the second, which shall be unalterable.

18 There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of three members, chosen from the members of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this hody in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the hody, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

19 It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual minute the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution

of the Bethel Bantist Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its anthor, salvation for its end and trnth without any mixture or error for its matter

ART. 2 We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the

Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in every divine perfection.

ART 3 We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal rain, without defense or excuse.

We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace,

through faith in the son of God

ART 5 We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteon-ness, and not any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's

redemption and righteousness. ART 6 We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all

people by the Gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respecter of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted of Him

ART 7 We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies and saves sin-

ners

We believe in the "perseye ance of the saints." that all those who are truly regeverated and born again will nitimately be saved in heaven; that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation

We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that its only proper officers are bishops, or pastors

and deacons

ART. 10 We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a be liever in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is pre-requisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper

Art, 11 We believe that communion is a church ordina ce; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of fanh

in Christ and been legally baptized

ART. 12 We believe in a general judgment and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the las day Christ will descend from heaven and raise the dead from the grave to a final retribution that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteousness to endless joy, and that this judgment will be forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

The report on Education was adopted as follows:

The fundamentals of a complete education are literature, science, art, history, and religion, or Christianity. The most fundamental element is the religious, which alone has to do with the heart, out of which are the issues of life. State colleges and universities, where the Jew and Gentile, Romanist and Protestant, Infidel and Christian, have equal legal rights, cannot utilize the religious field, or teach the essentials of Christianity. Hence too often has State education been one-sided, the prolific mother of

easy-going worldliness or scholarly atheism.

Out of the necessity for heart training have come the denominational, or Christian schools. Mercer, Monroe, Shorter and other colleges under Baptist control, stand for complete education, with emphasis on the Christian element. They stand for the progress an aperpetuity of Baptist principles, for enlightenment, for character, for missions. Our denominational well-being and our duty to society demand that we give them our undivided support. The rapid growth of the South along industrial and other lines has brought new problems in the educational world. To meet these new conditions there is urgent and constant necessity for enlargement in our colleges. They must either go forward or retrograde. Let, then, no loyal Baptist turn a deaf ear to their plea for a larger usefulness.

While Baptists have an almost unlimited field in secondary and higher education, the State must of necessity assume control of elementary education. Since the public schools are practically the only hope for the education of the masses, we believe it the duty of every Christian citizen to labor to increase their

efficiency, and keep them under Christian influences.

APPENDIX.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

This Association shall be called the Bethel Bartist Association and shail consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or tractional part thereof after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2. This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches nor

in any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will only be an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall

be elected annually from the body by ballot or otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.

The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to the ratifica-

tion or revi ion of the Association.

He shall see that the brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language,

8. The Moderator may speak upon any suject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall have no voice in determining ques-

tions except in case of a tie.

The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body. receive and read all communications addressed to it when required, and shall print and distribute the Minutes among the churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall from time to time appropriate to that purpose.

10. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the Association. give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successions sor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association, through her Executive Committee, may order He shall keep a balance sheet and

make annual report to the Association for each fiscal year

The Association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed, unless suspended for a specific object by a majority of the Association upon mot on and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.

All motions, when seconded, must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by the mover. Substitutes and amendments shall always be in or-

cer

13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association but shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the subject or uses unbecoming or unbrotherly language.

A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who yoted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of the members en-

rolled are present.

The motion for a journment shall take precedence of all others

Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without per-

mission shall have his name stricken from the roll.

This Constitution and Rules shall be subject to alteration by twothirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of

the Association, except the second, which shall be malterable.

There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of three members, chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, and to fill ony vacancy that may occur, either in their own unaber or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual Minute the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution

of the Bethel Baptist Association.

ART.CLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of Heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture or error for its matter.

ART. 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the

Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in every divine perfection.

ART 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin without defense or excuse.

ART. 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace,

through faith in the Son of God.

ART. 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness, and not any work of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ, s redemption and righteousness.

tion and righteousness.

ART 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the Gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respector of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh right-

eousness is accepted of Him.

ART. 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious pnrpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.

ART 8 We believe in "perseverance of the saints;" that all those who are truly regenerated and born again, will ultimately be saved in heaven, that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are

kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

ART 9 We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that its only proper officers are bishops, or pastors, and deacous

ART 10 We believe that christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper

ART 11 We believe that communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith

in Christ and been legally baptized.

AKT 12. We believe in a general judgment and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from Heaven and raise the dead from the grave to a final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless provisionent and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness



REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ORPHAN'S HOME.

Eighteen years ago the Georgia Baptist Orphans' Home was founded in Atlanta. Twelve Baptist women, with a small gift as a nucleus, began the work in a rented five-room cottage, with five small boys. How nobly these women have toiled and faithfully wrought deserves to be told more fully than the present report will allow. In 1899 it was taken under the fostering care of the Convention, and in October of the same year, moved to the present site at Hapeville. By a recent agreement between the trustees of the Home and the State Board, the financial interests of the Home are now represented by the Board. This noble institution stands as a worthy object of pride to every Baptist of the State. Its superior location, substantial buildings, excellent farm and superb management entitle it to a warm place in our hear's and a large place in our offerings.

At present it provides an excellent home, with good school advantages, under Christian influences, for ninety orphan children of our state. With the completion of new central building capacity, has been largely increased and the number of inmates will probably be doubled in a short time. Applications are now coming in at the rate of from four to six per week. The current expenses must be met and about \$15 000 raised to complete the payment on the building. We are abundantly able to raise this in a short time. The cry of the fatherless is coming tous. It must be heard and, under God, it shall be heard.

SPECIAL REPORT ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS

There is a pressing need with in the bounds of the Bethel Association of more thorough evangelistic work.

The Baptist cause suffers because we are well nigh idle, while other denominations are alert and active, we need to adopt some system by which we can better indectrinate the churches and bring the indifferent members to a fuller sense of duty. Much good material is being lost to us as Babtists, because we neglect our privileges and fail to utilize the best of opportunities for efficient work. Too many of our churches have no organized and well regulated Sunday schools.

We need an evangelist among us.

Therefore, we recommend that this Association asking the State Board of Missions to co-operate with us, employ an educated, strong deeply spiritual, and enthusiastic working minister of the gospel as missionary and S. S. evangelist, whose duty will be to travel over the ter-itory of the Association and give all his time to distributing Baptist literature, preaching, indestributing, lecturing, and organizing Sanday Schools.

His labors must not necessarily cease with his sermons, lectures and distribution of books, but it shall be his duty to visit the sick, the destitute, and the distressed, whenever and wherever opportunity affords and open to them the scriptures; console the troubled, encourage the faithless, and hold Divir e

service in their homes.

We recommend 2nd that the Executive Committee of this Association be instructed to secure such a man, as missionary and S. S. evangelist of the Bethel Association, fixing his salary at not less than \$1000.00 per annum and call upon the churches for their proper apportionment of said salary.

We, recommend 3rd that, the executive committee prepare and send to each and all of the churches in the bounds of our Association a written notice of their appointment within one month from this date, and to employ a man as missionary and

S. S. evangelist as soon as practicable.

4th we, also recommend that, the messengers who are present in this body enter heartily into the movement and encourage their churches, which they represent, to co-oper to with them in the work.

APPENDIX.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

This Association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each of the help of the problem of the massenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messages.

2. This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches nor

in any way interfere with their iternal affairs

3. It will only be an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually from the body by ballot and otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.

6 The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to the ratifica-

tion or revision of the Association.

7. He shall see that the brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the sugject or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8 The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall no have voice in determining questions

except in a case of a tie,

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it when required, and shall print and distribute the Minutes among the churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall from time to time appropriate to that purpose.

10. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the Association give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association, through her Executive Committee, may order. He shall keep a balance sheet and

make annual report to the Association for each fiscal year.

11. The Association shall have a regular order of business ado ted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicity followed, unless suspended for a specific object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.

12. All motions, when seconded, must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by the mover. Substitutes and amendments shall always be in order.

- 13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association but shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the xubject or uses unbeconing or unbrotherly language.
- 14 A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of the members enrolled are present.
 - The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.
- 16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.
- 17. This constitution and Rules shall be subject to alteration by two thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the second, which shall be unalterable.
- 18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of three members, chosen from the membership of the churches

composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, and to fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

1). It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual Minute the Order of business, the Articles of faith and the Constitution of the Bethel Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETJEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

- ARTICLE 1. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely in spired and is a perfect treasurer of Heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture or error for its matter.
- ART. 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in every divine perfection.
- ART. 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankin tare sinuers and under just condemnation to eternal rule without defense or excuse.
- ART. 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, through faith in the Son of God.
- ART. 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness, and not any work of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.
- ART. 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the Cospel; that all are invited to Chris; that God is no respector of persons, but in every nation he that tearth God and worketh righteonsness is accepted of Him.
- ART.7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.
- ART. 8. We believe in "preseverance of the saints," that all those who are truly regenerated and born again, will ultimately be saved in heaven, that a special Providence wateres over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation
- ARE, 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in christ, associated by convenant in the fairn and fellowsmp of the gospel; that its only proper officers are bisnops, or pastors, and deacons.
- ART. 10. We believe that christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the rather, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequiste to the privileges of a church relation and the Lords Supper.
- ART. 11. We believe that communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ and been legally baptized.
- Akt. 12. We believe in a general judgement and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from Heaven and raise the deat from the grave to a final retribution; that a solemn seperation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punisament and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgement will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of richteousness.

REORT ON TEMPERANCE.

To the Bethel Association: We are in the midst of a great temperance movement. It is only a phase of the passion for civic righteousness that is everywhere sweeping the nation. That all social organization exists for the purpose of developing good men and good women—this is the new social creed. That the welfare of a single human soul can not be measured in terms of dollars and cents—this is being generally accepted as true.

This is merely applied Christianty. "All that a man has will he give for his life," said the First Citzen of the world; and since no man liveth to himself, "all that a man hath will he give for his brother's life, for his neighbor's life."

Since the last meeting of this Association, the splendid local victories for local prohibition have set the State on fire, and the last General Assembly has, as we feel, forever set the seal of legal condemnation upon a traffic that has come to be recognized as at variance with all the ends of government. And so after the first of January, 1908, the Empire

State of the South places herself where Oglethorpe and the Fathers established her nearly two hundred years ago.

More recently, the newest of the sisterhood of States, Oklahoma, has been baptised into the Union as a prohibition State, thus establishing herself upon the everlasting foundations of holiness to the Lord. Besides these victories, the movement is sweeping all the Southern States; and there seems every reason to believe that within the next 5 years the hateful traffic will be banished by legal decree from the soil of every Southern State. And it is not too much to hope that the entire Nation itself will within the present generation utterly destroy the legalized sale of liquor. In all this, our Church has fought in the forefront. Realizing that the sale of liquors is at enemity with the Kingdom of our Lord, and the most insidious enemy of his Cause, our brethren everywhere, not by any decree or eclesiastical order, but by an inevitable spiritual instinct, have arrayed themselves in unalterable opposition to it; and the wonder of posterity will be not so much that we did it, but that it was not swept away sooner.

In this we have been consistent, acting in line with the God-fearing king of old, who, before he began to restore the worship of the Lord, first totally destroyed the worship of Baal.

And now that we have won a victory, let us seek to conserve the fruits of victory; and avoiding all political and personal politics, yet insist that our public officials enforce the law, and make it more effective.

Report on Sunday Schools.

By referring to the minutes of the last session of the Association, we note with regret that only twenty-five Churches report any Sunday School and some of this number maintaining Sunday Schools only a part of the year, while nineteen Churches reported no Sunday School at all. We note also, that in the Churches maintaining Sunday Schools there is a seeming lack of interest on the part of the older people. We would recommend, therefore, that the pastors urge upon the Churches the importance of maintaining this mighty factor in our denominational life, until every Church shall report an evergreen Sunday School, using the literature published by the Sunday School board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

We are glad to report that the Sunday School Convention created at the last session of the Association met with some degree of interest and enthusiasm during its first session at Cuthbert embracing the Fifth Sunday in March.

We think that the launching of this Convention is both wise and imely and is calculated to create and develop a greater interest in the Sunday School work.

We recommend that a Committee be appointed to arrange for the

time, place and program for another session of the Convention and that the Convention be granted the authority to perpetuate itself, holding its meetings from time to time as it may appoint.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Education consists in the proper training and development of all the parts of our complex being for the greatest utility in all the relations of life with God and men. We fall far short of the true conception when we conceive the idea that an education is to fit our children merely for the purpose of making money or of making men successful in business. We are living in a day when sordid gain seems to be the goal for which men and women are bending all their energies. The world seems to be crazy to get rich. Intellectuality and spirituality are giving place to materiality. The intellectual and spiritual giants are few as compared with past generations, whereas the millionaires are abundent. Would it not be well for us to pause and ask where are we and to what are we coming? The present system of public school education is all too rapid and superficial. Our State institutions of the higher grad ; are politico-materialistic, and cannot, from the very nature of the case, be made highly moral and spiritual educational centers. Every effort is making to force the public schools to become feeders to these higher grade State institutions, and our people are contributing through taxation and otherwise for the maintenance and enlargement of these institutions which are forbidden to teach religion, and our denominational schools and colleges are straining every point to exist and try to do that highest and noblest work for the human race for which they were established in the prayers, tears, sacrifices and sufferings of Christian men and women. The State schiols are thriving as never before, whereas some of our Baptist schools are dead and others are dying for want of patronage and support from our own people. All this in the face of the fact that the Baptists of Georgia are reported as paying more than half of the taxes of the State.

Brethren, ought these things so to be? Our own Bethel college, named for this Association, is virtually dead in the face of the fact that there are enough Baptists and Baptist means within the bounds of this Association and in her contiguous territory to equip an 1 maintain a magnificent school of first class character.

Our platitudes and dissertations annually on the glories of an education are inadequate to the demands. A true education, which will withstand all tests, is to know how and best to serve God and men. To this end we believe Mercer, Bessie Tift, Shorter and our other Baptist institutions come nearer being idealistic than others. Therefore, they describe and demand our heartiest support, sympathy and patronage.

Let us endeavor to make them and demand that they be made even more worthy of our confidence and support as representative and promotive of our civic and religious views. The day is now here when we need to put some of our sentiment and pride of Baptist principles into something practicable and tangible. It is time we were realizing, that if we expect to take the world for Christ, we must put more brain-power, energy, sacrifice and material substance into our institutions, and fight for every inch of the territory to be possessed. "The kingdom of heaven suffereth violence, and the violent take it by force." All of our Baptist educational schools and colleges ought to be splendidly equipped and handsomely endowed. What we need is more love for and loyalty to Christ and the consecration of the forces with which He blesses us to His service along all evangelical and educational lines.

Let us awake and put on our strength; let us shake ourselves from the dust and loose ourselves from the bonds of our neck. To work and to give, Baptists of Georgia, and the State and the world shall be ours!

We would call special attention to the present movement to raise \$300,000.00 permanent endowment for Mercer University. The General Education Board gives us \$75,000.00, provided we raise \$225,000.00. We are generously allowed five (5) years in which to pay this amount. But the subscriptions must be obtained at once.

We, therefore, recommend that this Association pledge itself to the effort of raising \$1,000.00 for this purpose, and that a committee of five (5) be appointed to press this matter in the churches of the Association in any way they may deem best.

We have had four sessions during the year, two at Arlington and two at Cuthbert. Our first duty was to endeavor to comply with the direction of our body in its last session, viz: to employ a missionary and evangelist for the year. We conferred with Bro. Bennett, Cor. Sec. of the State Board, but were unable to secure a man for the work.

At a meeting, held in Cuthbert during the Sunday School Convertion, we employed Bro. J. F. Eden, Jr., then a student in Mercer University to labor in the field for the months of June, July, August and September on a salary of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per month and his travelling expenses, provided those expenses did not exceed Ten Dollars (\$10.00) per month. His work was very satisfactory and met with the hearty commendation of Bro. Bennett. We co-operated with the State Board, and, therefore, our employee was recognized as the Board's appointee and he was paid directly by the Board.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

This ssociation shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

- 2. This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches hor in any way interfere with their internal affairs.
- 3. It will only be an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.
- 4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually from the body by ballot and otherwise.
- 5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.
- 6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to the ratification or revision of the Association.
- 7. He shall see that the brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject or uses any any indecorous or unbrotherly language.
- 8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall not have voice in determining questions except in a case of a tie.
- 9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it when required, and shall print and distribute the Minutes among the churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall from time to time appropriate to that purpose.
- 10. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the Association give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association, through her Executive Committee, may order. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report to the Association for each fiscal year.
- 11. The Association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed undless suspended for a special object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.

- 12. All motions, when seconded, must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by the mover. Substitutes and amendments shall always be in order.
- 13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association but shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he devarts from the subject or uses unbecoming or unbrotherly language.
- 14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of the members enrolled are present.
 - 15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others
- 16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.
- 17. This Constitution and Rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the second, which shall be unalterable.
- 18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, cossisting of three members, chosen from the membership of the church s composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work: Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, and to fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.
- 19. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual Minute the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of the Bethel Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

- Article 1. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of Heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture or error for its matter.
- Article 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in every divine perfection.
- Article 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin without defense or excuse.
- Article 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, through faith in the Son of God.
 - Article 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of

sin and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness, and not any work of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

Article 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the Gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respector of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted of Him.

Article 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctified and saves sinners.

Article 8. We believe in "perseverance of the saints," that all those who are truly regenerated and born again, will ultimately be saved in heaven, that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

Article 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by convention in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that its only proper officers are bishops, or pastors, and deacons.

Article 10. We believe that christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper.

Article 11. We believe that communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ and been legally baptized.

Article 12. We believe in a general judgment and the resurrection of the dead and the enl of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from Heaven and raise the dead from the grave to a final letribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

REPORT ON MISSIONS.

We, your committee, make the following report:

Ist. What is Missions?

When should we be about our Father's business? Now,—today is the day—everyday, till God shall call us up higher. As an encouragement—remember that Christ died for our sins and for the sins of others.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OT TRUSTEES OF BETHEL COLLEGE.

We respectfully report that the College Building is in good condition and well insured. It is being used by the public school of Cuthbert, over which we have no control; but it is paying enough rental to cover the insurance and repairs on the building.

It seems that the Association can not maintain a school or college, and we deem it advisiable to sell the property to the best advantage.

The city of Cuthbert has made an offer to purchase the property for which they agree to pay forty-five hundred dollars in five annual payments of nine hundred dollars, with interest at 5% until paid. We have thereug'ily considered this proposition, and think it a fair price for the property. Therefore, with the light before us, we recommend that the trade be consummated at the price and on the terms named, and that the President and Secretary of the Poard be instructed and empowered to make the deal making the proper transfer and taking the necessary papers.

REPORT ON WOMAN'S WORK.

Your Committee on Woman's Work beg leave to submit the following report:

The work has been organized in Georgia for about 30 years. It has not received the encouragement it ought to have had, and is not now receiving the encouragement it ought to have from its confederates, the men's organizations. The work is organized in about one-fourth of the churches in the State. Out of the seventy-eight associations in the State, sixty of them have Unions. It is organized in societies in the churches, into unions in the associations and into the Woman's Missionary Union, covering the State, and each of the ladies have officers similar to the men's work in the churches, which relates the church, association and convention, and their societies and unions are auxiliary to the church, association and convention.

Of the \$200,000 given last year to the benevolences fostered by the Georgia Baptists, the women gave about one-sixth of it, or \$32,500. This year, they make it their purpose to raise \$40,000, and for the first six months over half of the amount had been received. The women of Georgia are maintaining Bro. Buchholz, one of our State Evangelists; Miss Perry as missionary on the frontier, in Oklahoma, and Dr. Ayers on the foreign fields.

The women of the Southern Baptist Convention are doing the following special work, to-wit: They are maintaining Margaret Home, the Home for the Orphans of the Missionaries, the Training School for women at Louisville, and the Tichenor Memorial Fund for building churches on the frontier and in destitute places.

God bless the noble women! They need our prayers, our help, our sympathy and our encouragement. They can not do the work without the help of the pastors. We, therefore, urge that our pastors inform themselves in the work so that they can help them.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We notice, by reference to the minutes of the last Association, that out of the 43 churches there appear to be 33 which have regularly elected Superintendents of Sunday Schools, but notwithstanding this number of Superintendents there appear to be only 27 churches having an enrollment of pupils from which we gather that there are only this number to-wit: 27, having Sunday Schools. This is an improvement of the past year, but a small one, as appears from the report

of the last committee on Sunday Schools, there appearing to have been 25 Sunday Schools in the Association from that report. We trust that the reports from the various churches at this Association will show a much greater increase and progress. We cannot stress too strongly the importance of Sunday School work in connection with the church welfare. We think it is a question which should be discussed fully and freely at the Associations and let there be an endeavor to stimulate those attending that they may return to their churches with more zeal for this kind of work.

We know of no better recommendations to make than that embodied in the report of the last committee on Sunday Schools. We trust that a Sunday School Convention will be held regularly aannually hereafter, and in this way stimulate interest in the work.

We trust that the time is near at hand when aspirants for office who favor a renewal of its traffic or who are at all compromising, will have no show whatever at elections.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

There has been no time in recent years when a greater interest has been manifested in the cause of education in general than now, and at no time have the several evangelical churches manifested a greater interest in the success of 'their schools, whether established for their sons or daughters. This interest is not only producing larger donations to existing schools, but manifests itself in provisions for new in-

stitutions, with greater facilities and larger scope. In this cause our great Baptist denomination is at the forefront. We believe that religious training of the young should not be neglected, therefore prefer to place around the education of our sons and daughters the sacred environment of the church and to give to the curriculum of instruction a religious phase and color that is not possible in a State school or institution. We do not deny that there may be some religious influence exerted by the professors in our State institutions, and there may be some religious instruction of a limited nature, although in the nature of things, this must be limited, irregular, subsidiary and subordinate to the school of secular education.

If the chief end of a man be to glorify God and to enjoy Him forever, surely it must be an important part in a young man's education to teach him all that can be learned concerning the revelation of God to man,—what man should believe concerning God, and what duty God requires of man—to the end that there may be development not only of the mental and the physical nature, but of the moral and religious as well; because observation and experience teach that only by the development of the three-fold nature of man that the highest type of genuine manhood can be produced.

If the best thing that can happen to any young man is the adaptation of the individual to the purpose of God, for his life, then surely no apology is needed for the position that young persons at a formative and impressionable period of their lives should be surrounded by proper religious influences.

Everything in the Christian school points to the students approaching the ideal of the divine man. Here we see the highest of the three ends to be obtained in an education, utility, culture, and the divine image—the so-called practical school stands for the first, the secular school stands for the second, they develop the powers of man so that he may be a more potent and effective agent in securing the good things of the world for his own personal gratification. He is exalted that he may look down upon others and make them serve him. The Christian school stands for the Divine image, it stands for nothing short of a complete development of man's moral and spiritual attributes.

Today as perhaps never before, society faces knotty problems that need to be solved in the interests of humanity and truth. It is the ideal of Christian education to develop clear minds and strong personalities, which shall be able to do a manly and effective part in serving humanity's deeper interests—and the Christian college has discovered that the men who with trained minds can do this, are those who have learned the truths men have taught, but still more the truth which is in Him who has given the world its only effective solvent of a self-centered life, and taught each man that he is his brother's keeper.

Throughout the Southern Baptist Convention our Baptist's hosts

are engaged in a great educational campaign. Are rejoicing over attaining the \$300.000 endowment fund.

Georgia Baptists have been the advocates of education from the earliest times, and now a vital and significant fact; the rate of growth of the sentiment in favor of higher education among our people is nothing short of marvelous. Our people seem to realize as never before this pregnant truth, that no denomination has ever reached great strength and fulfilled its highest mission apart from the support of a strong denominational college. We have Mercer University. for young men, Bessie Tift, and Shorter Colleges for young women, and a number of high schools under one corelated system, known as the "Mercer system." These schools are ours. They, along with the Seminary, have claim upon the gifts of us as Baptists. All of them need help in meeting their current support. In order to do this the Convention's Co-operative Committee have suggested that we raise this year \$491.00 as again \$66.00 last year; or one and one-third cents per member. How does this speak for old Bethel? President Jameson writes that the Ministerial Board at Mercer owes a debt of \$900 brought over from the past year, and \$520.00 at the Seminary.

In view of the fact that those called to the ministry are for the most part financially unable to educate themselves without some aid, and in view of a more pressing need of a competent and educated ministry today, and in view of the importance of the "Mercer system" of schools, your committee recommend the following:

Ist. That each church be urged to contribute liberally to each fund for the current support of "schools and colleges" and "ministerial education."

2nd. That we commend our Baptist schools as worthy the patronage interest and prayers of our Baptist people.

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

Your Committee on Orphans' Home beg leave to submit the following, viz: The number of children received in the past year was 67; and while 42 have been sent out during the last twelve months, there are in the home at this time 171. 140 of the above number are in school. There has been one death since our last report. We, therefore, feel that our hearts should go out in humble gratitude to our Heavenly Father for this token of His special providence.

The amount necessary to defray all expenses is about \$1,250 per month; the amount necessary to meet the board bill alone is about \$7.00 per capita per month. Only about half of the above has been

received, hence the institution is now in debt for provisions already used, and it is at the present time in pressing need of beef, pork, bacon, and lard, syrup, meal, flour. They need also clothing, for the

The Home will assign a child and send lists of needs to any church, Sunday School, society, or individual that will write for it. children, pillows, bed clothing, towels, etc.

The Helper is an eight-page paper published by the Home monthly at 50c. per annum, will give all necessary information and we most earnestly commend it to the churches.

Pure and undefiled religion is this: To visit the fatherless and the widow in their afflictions, and to keep ourselves unspotted from the world.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Your committee beg leave to submit the following:

We have held during the year four meetings of the committee. At our first meeting, which was held at the close of the Association last year, Brother Carl DeVane, of the Colomokee church, was recommended by Brother N. W. Hurst, Chairman of the committee, as a beneficiary of a Ministerial Educational Fund, to be raised by an appeal to the churches of the Association. After having been further recommended by the messengers of the Colomokee church, Brother DeVane was received as the benficiary of this fund and placed in school at Blakely Ga. An appeal was made to the churches and as a result \$66.20 was received and paid out in defraying the expenses of Brother DeVane.

By virtue of the power vested in committee, Bro. J. F. Eden was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Bro. W. W. Hurst and his removal from the bounds of the Association.

At our next meeting, held in Cuthbert, on Feb. 25th, an agreement was made with Rev. J. M. Waller, representing the State Board, that the Board co-operate with us in employing an associational missionary. Brother J. F. Eden, Jr., was employed to labor in the bounds of the Association during the summer months. His salary was fixed at \$75.00 per month and traveling expenses. His work attracted the attention of the State Board, and met with the approval of the committee. His salary was paid direct from the State Board, per agreement with the Board, to Brother Waller. We submit Bro. Eden's report:

Sermons preached 109; addresses 5; homes visited 714; miles traveled 534; expenses \$12.20; protracted meetings held 10; baptisms 84; received by letter 14; tracts distributed 1,600; religious papers distributed 150; subscriptions taken for the Foreign Mission Journal 50; subscriptions taken or the Christian Index 2; subscriptions taken for the Home Field 33.

"In most of the meetings held the pastors did part of the preaching, and much effectual personal work. Among the number were pastors Culbertson, Lyon, Pool, Moody, Martin, Hawks, Norton and Eden. And this year, as with last year, much of the credit (so far as human instruments are concerned), is due to the pastors."

The State Convention, through your Executive Committee, appealed to our Association for a definite sum of money, for benevolent, educational and missionary enterprises as fostered by the Convention. That sum for the present year amounted to \$5,672.00, that being about \$1.60 per member.

Your committee divided the amount among the various boards, according to their estimated needs, and then divided these sums, among all of our churches, as was seen in the apportionment letter, sent to the clerks. Along with this exhibit of appeal we sent a "Schedule for Baptists" as gotten out by the Co-operative Committee of the State Convention. In this way we hoped to reach every member; and every Baptist should be reached. In view of the fact that this plan of systematic work has proved somewhat successful and met with the approval of the churches, and in view of the fact that your Executive Committee has already received an appeal for a certain amount for the year before us—that amount being \$2,700, which is about 77 cents per member; divided among the various objects according to their estimated needs, we have the following:

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

- Article 1. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of Heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture or error for its matter.
- Article 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in divine perfection.
- Article 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin without defense or excuse.
- Article 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace through faith in the Son of God.
- Article 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness, and not any work of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.
- Article 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the Gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respector of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted of Him.
- Article 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.
- Article 8. We believe in "perseverance of the saints," that all those who are truly regenerated and born again, will ultimately be saved in heaven, that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.
- Article 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by convention in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that its only proper officers are bishops, or pastors, and deacons.

Article 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper.

Article 11. We believe that communion is a church ordinance;

that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ and been legally baptized.

Article 12. We believe in a general judgment and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from Heaven and raise the dead from the grave to a final retribution; that a solemn separaton will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, or principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

This Association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

- 2. This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches nor in any way interfere with their internal affairs.
- 3. It will only be an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.
- 4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually from the body by ballot and otherwise.
- 5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.
- 6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to the ratification or revision of the Association.
- 7. He shall see that the brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.
- 8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall not have voice in determining questions except in a case of a tie.
- 9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it when required, and shall print and distribute the Minutes among the

28 Minutes

churches belonging to the Association from time to time appropriate to that purpose.

- 10. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the Association give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association, through her Executive Committee, may order. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report to the Association for each fiscal year.
- II. The Association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed. Unless suspended for a special object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.
- 12. All motions, when seconded, must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by the mover. Substitutes and amendments shall always be in order.
- 13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association but shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the subject or uses unbecoming or unbrotherly language.
- 14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of the members enrolled are present.
- 15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.
- 16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.
- 17. This Constitution and Rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the second, which shall be unalterable.
- 18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of five members, chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, and to fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.
- 19. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual Minute the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of the Bethel Association.



Report on State Missions.

Your committee submits the following report: "Thou hast brought a vine out of Egypt, Thou has cast out the heathen and planted it, and Thou didst cause it to take deep root and it

It has been 137 years since the first Baptist church in Georgia was constituted by Daniel Marshal. The name of that church was Kiokey, in Columbia county. The Lord depicted a vine in the name of his son, Jesus Christ. That vineyard, though it had a small beginning, has gained by littles and littles until it covers the whole of Georgia. Churches have been built with great difficulties. Some were organized under trees, some under bush harbors, some in the poorest log houses. preachers that preached during these 137 years or the first part of them did it with great difficulties. They walked many times because they did not have any way to ride. They went at the command of the Lord, notwithstanding the hardships and yet there is a state work to do. David said that the vine took deep root and it is very necessary for the Christian vine to take deep root. Every family in Georgia needs a Bible and they need a Baptist preacher to visit them and to instruct them and to encourage them to read the Bible and to go to church. Bless God, notwithstanding the difficulties that have confronted us, Georgia is almost a network of churches throughout. How has so great a work been done? By the missionary spirit among the people and the help of the Lord.

Brethren, let us not fail to teach our children the missionary spirit. For it is the hope of success and the hope of pleasing the Lord. And may the dews of heaven continue to fall

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

To the Bethel Baptist Association:

Your Committee beg leaves to submit the following:

During the year there has been a great step taken forward in the development of the secular schools of our state by means of some very helpful laws, but possibly the greatest encouragement to education, has been through the influence which the agitation of these questions brought about in educating the people of Georgia up to an appreciation of the best interest of posterity.

Christian education has consequently been very greatly benefitted by the general enthusiasm manifested in the interest of the schools. To such an extent has this been true, that the Baptist schools of Georgia boast of the largest enrollment in their history, and the general atmosphere of the several colleges for Baptist boys and girls is felt with more enthusiastic appreciation of the development of the best that is in us to an extent unrivaled heretofore. There is no small fact for gratification in the wonderful work accomplished by the Georgia Baptists in completing the \$300,000.00 endowment fund for Mercer which was an accomplishment, that in its consummation, far exceeded the most sanguine expectation of the great hosts of Baptists, and it is natural that we should feel with due reverence, the enthusiasm attendant on the successful fruition of such a noble work.

The fields for disseminating the beneficence of a Christian education have been well sown and are being well cultivated, so that in a few years we can proudly boast of schools second to none for boys and girls, who will continue our work towards the upbuilding of the country, and the most wholesome development of the individual, into a well rounded man or woman, which is the noblest work of God.

As Baptists of Georgia, we are interested in Mercer and Bessie Tift, and as Baptists of Bethel Association, we are interested in Norman Park. Mercer is in splendid shape, and your committee is glad to be able to report that its work now being

accomplished is wonderful in its manifold results.

Bessie Tift has recently added new equipments, and under the administration of that faithful worker and revered man of God, Prof. C. H. Jackson, a new impetus has been given to Christian education for the girls who attend this institution, and a greater prestige in the educational world by reason of the enlarged curriculum and more advanced corps of teachers, and we, as Baptists, must recognize, and with enthusiastic appreciation, endorse the work that is being done at this College. And we believe we speak advisably when we say that its advantages are second to none in the State of Georgia. There has recently been organized a movement, whereby it is purposed to raise \$300,000 endowment fund for the Bessie Tift College. This movement does not meet with the discouragement that our same effort did when we started the work of the \$300,000.00 fund for Mercer two years ago, and we, as a committee, most urgently endorse the movement, which looks towards bettering the financial condition of this institution which is doing such a great work in Georgia.

Norman Park Institute has enjoyed another unparalleled year of success, and the splendid young man who is at the head of that institution, deserves our heartiest support and encouragement. The Bethel Association owns a one-sixth undivided interest in this institution, and we should feel a definite active interest in this institution, and encourage all our boys and girls within the bounds of this Association to attend this school; and

the churches should contribute liberally towards its maintainence and support; especially in view of the fact that it is here must be the place for fostering those qualities of manhood and womanhood which is the purpose of a Christian education, and especially iostering the needs of the ministerial students within our bounds. After a close investigation of the work being done by our several colleges, your committee is especially impressed with the lack of a loan fund at Mercer and Norman Park, whereby the needs of worthy young men from our Association may be assisted. It is certainly true that there are many boys and girls of sterling worth, who, by a little assistance, would secure an education if the means were just partly provided.

We urge every Baptist to be peak for the movement for the \$300,000.00 endowment fund for Bessie Tift College, their most

enthusiastic support.

We commend our Baptist schools as worthy of our patronage and financial support, and our prayers.

Report on Foreign Missions.

Concerning the work of Foreign Missions, during the past year, we have much for which to be grateful. Our God has graciously blessed the work of our devoted missionaries. We gratefully acknowledge His manifold mercies and blessings.

Southern Baptists gave last year \$460,797.00 for Foreign Missions, but they have a membership of over two and one-half millions. What they gave was something near twenty cents per member. There were 1267 Baptist churches in our Georgia Baptist Convention last year that did not give one cent to Foreign Missions. Brethren, eleven of those churches are in the Bethel Association. We are apportioned by the committee on co-operation \$2016.00. The Executive Committee divided this amount equably among the various churches, but at the end of

the year only \$985.13 had been given. This averages about 26c per member. Certainly there is nothing in these facts to tickle

Baptist pride.

The need and the opportunity which the foreign field offers must forever shame and condemn the Christian who is not doing his very best for that work. Our responsibility has been increased by the very success of the work. The work has grown so large and has been crowned with such wonderful success that we are forced to give far more to this work in order to fill the large place God has opened for us.

Our missionaries on the foreign field have increased within the last ten years nearly four-fold, baptisms have multiplied nearly four-fold, the income has increased over four times and the The figures for 1000 are as follows:

Report on Woman's Work.

We find increasing pleasure in acknowledging the helpful co-operation of the Woman's Missionary Unions. They are steadily pursuing the work of instruction and enlistment of new forces. They are training a generation of children and young women, who will constitute an intelligent, consecrated leadership for the future. The foundations now laid by our women will be crowned in the near future with a superstructure of symmetry, beauty and efficiency, which shall gladden their hearts and mightily advance our great work of taking the Southland for Christ. The Union tries to become increasingly a force in missionary education. To this end they have chosen monthly programmes and increased the literature on those subjects. The women take kindly to the Mission Study Class. Their zeal compasses all departments of our mission work.

They are doing great things by their box work for Home Missions, especially on the frontier. The boxes sent to these missionaries have aggregated in value in one year \$23,671.46. The departments of the Union now number four—the Women's Missionary Society, the Young Woman's Auxiliary, the Sunbeam Band, and the Royal Ambassadors. The last is an order for the boys. There are two special responsibilities of the Union—the Margaret Home and the Training School. The Home is a place of refuge for missionaries' children who have

been left destitute.

The training school is for the purpose of training young women, called of God, in Christian work, whether in the home land or in regions beyond the seas.

The consecrated Christian women of our South land are a mighty factor in furthering the kingdom of our Master. Their

power is encreasing all the while.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL ASSOCIATION.

Article I. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of Heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture or error for its matter.

Article 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in divine perfection.

Article 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his maker, but hy voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin without defense or excuse.

Article 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace through faith in the Son of God.

Article 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on the principles of righteousness, and not any work of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

Article 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respector of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted of Him.

Article 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.

Article 8. We believe in "perseverance of the saints," that all those who are truly regenerated and born again, will ultimately be saved in heaven, that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

Article 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by convention in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that it is only proper to have bishops, pastors and deacons.

Article 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a

church relation and the Lord's Supper.

Article 11. We believe that communion is a church ordi-

nance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ and been legally baptized.

Article 12. We believe in a general judgmnt and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from Heaven and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

This Association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2. This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches nor in any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will only be an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually from the body by ballot and

otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to

the ratification or revision of the Association.

7. He shall see that the brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall not have voice in determining questions except in a case of a tie.

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it

when required, and shall print and distribute the Minutes among the churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall from time to time appro-

priate to that purpose.

Io. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the Association, give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association may order through her Executive Committee. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report to the Association for each fiscal year.

II. The Association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed unless suspended for a special object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.

12. All motions when seconded must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by the mover. Substitutes and amendments

shall always be in order.

13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the subject or use unbecoming or unbrotherly language.

14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of

the members enrolled are present.

15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.

16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.

17. This Constitution and Rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the second, which shall be unalterable.

18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of five members, chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, and to fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual Minute the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and

the Constitution of the Bethel Association.



Document Number 1.

Report on State Missions.

It is a most hopeful sign that our people are exercising more interest in State Missions. This work is growing in importance and receiving large attention in every State in our Southern Zion. Ten years ago all the Southern convention gave only \$125,000 to State Missions. Last year Texas alone gave \$132,000. Georgia caught the spirit and gave last year about twice as much as she did five years ago.

The realization of the fundamental and prime importance in State Mission work is apparent in the fact that from Maryland to the Gulf there has been an increase of 25 per cent in gifts to this object. This is indicative of spiritual discernment and a purpose to do that for which the church exists. The spiritual results we have been glad to note, have far outstripped the enlarged gifts, which were simply tokens of Christian patriotism and concern for the lost. The call for State Missions is but the call for the evangelization of our own beloved Georgia, its cities, its towns, its villages, its country sections, yea, all points and places of need.

God has given to Georgia a commonwealth unsurpassed in all the elements of wealth and capacity to support a vast population, the population is rapidly coming, especially here in our own South Georgia. Much of it is unacquainted with the faith held by the Baptists, which we believe to be that once delivered to the Saints; for which they are exhorted earnestly to contend. It becomes us, as we love the truths of our faith, to strive earnestly to impart it to the people who are with us, and who are fast coming to us. It is estimated that there are in Georgia today over one half million of our white race who are unreached and unsaved by the gospel. As long as this condition exists no one can say that it is the spirit of the Master to neglect such an opportunity, and devote all our time, energy and money to other fields in the name of world wide evangelization; for whatever does not begin at our door is not world-wide.

Here is Christ's plan of procedure in the work of missions: "Ye shall be witnesses to me both in Jerusalem and in Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the world." We, as

Baptists, taking our place in the front ranks as to obedience, recognize and emphasize missionary work, according to these geographical lines. The latest figures for our State mission work are as follows:

Report of Committee on Education.

To the Bethel Baptist Association, convened in the Seventy-Eighth Session: Your Committee on Education beg leave

to submit the following report:

In the educational development of our State there is greater interest manifested this year than ever before-even surpassing the enthusiasm evidenced last year. In every walk of life we find Georgians exerting their best endeavors towards arranging better facilities for the education of our youth. Editors. doctors, lawyers and banks, together with the farmers, united at the polls on the 5th of this month to amend the Constitution of Georgia, which will facilitate educational advantages in the rural sections. Our General Assembly has several important bills pending before it now, that in many sections, were issues of the local campaigns, so interested are our people in obtaining the best conditions ror intellectual growth. This general and thorough awakening of the people of Georgia in these matters bespeaks the sincere zeal of every Baptist in our efforts to see that our denominational Institutions keep apace with the schools and colleges.

We rejoice to feel that Mercer University, under the able leadership of Dr. S. Y. Jameson, continues to hold a foremost front among the male colleges, opening up this September with the largest attendance in the history of the institution. large endowment fund so recently raised for Mercer has made her independent for her present needs, and it is a source of pride to every Baptist of Georgia that we have such a splendid institution

under the authority of the Baptists of Georgia.

The endowment we raised for Mercer we can and must raise for Bessie Tift. The field is open for subscriptions to the \$360,-000.00 fund to be raised for the Baptist girls of Georgia. As proug as we are of Mercer, we must not stop until we can be prouder of Bessie Tift. For as proud as we are of our boys, we are prouder of our girls. And if we will give the Baptist girls of Georgia the advantages, it will be the preparation for the richest harvest conceived in our most sanguine expectations. We, as Baptists, can not afford to do more for the boys than we have done for the girls. Bessie Tift College was organized in 1837 as an institute for the education of girls. In 1849 it was authorized by charter to confer diplomas. So we can justly point with pride to the fact that Bessie Tift is the second oldest college for women in the whole world. Then let us join with hearty zeal in the first statewide campaign that has ever been conducted by the Baptists of Georgia exclusively for our girls.

We find that the work being done at Norman Park is still

to the high standard of progressiveness that has characterized to growth since the foundation of this justitution. And we commend this school to the boys and girls of the Bethel Association who need preparation for entering college. We have also watched with appreciation the awakening of a similar school, Cyrene Institute, which heretofore has been undenominational. The Bowen Baptist Association now owns this school and under to new influence, over one hundred pupils have already been taken from the surrounding counties and are boarding in the commodious dormitories of this school.

We desire, also to commend to our brethren, Shorter College, at Rome. The institution was presented to the Convention and brought into the Mercer System at the meeting in Americus. Recent large gifts by the citizens of Rome have made it possible to greatly enlarge the institution and equip it for a greater and a higher service. Under the presidency of Dr. A. W. Van Hoose, it is expected that Shorter will hold a place in the

very front rank of Southern educational institutions.

We cannot close this report without calling on the Baptists of this Association to exert their every energy to send their boys and girls to some of these schools. In our efforts to support and maintain the schools, let us not forget that we can make a way to send the boys and girls to them. A college education is no longer the dream of the poor boy and the poor girl, but it is an actual fact that where there is a will there is a way. And this body should establish a perpetual fund at Mercer, Bessie Tift and Norman Park. The proceeds of this fund should be devoted exclusively to aid of worthy boys and girls within the bounds this Association, and the money that is tied up in Bethel College could be devoted to this purpose either by a sale of the property or by judicious management of the proceeds from it as it now stands. There is no forgiveness for a desecrated ideal. there are ideals within the minds and hearts of boys and girls all over the Bethel Association territory that should not be stifled by reason of a lack of funds that the proper disposition of this property would give them.

We commend the cause of Christian education to the Baptists of this Association and bespeak their prayers for the splendid work that is being done. Respectfully submitted,

Report on Norman Institute.

Dear Brethren: Your Committee takes pleasure in offering the following report:

During the associational year the trustees of Norman Insti-

tute have added a beautiful \$15,000 annex, which is nearing completion, and which is by far the most commanding looking build-rooms. Down stairs there are three large class rooms, two offices, one for the president and one for the trustees, and a literary room. On the second floor is a spacious auditorium, 60x80 feet, and two dressing rooms. This auditorium is one of the prettiest in this section of Georgia, and will seat about 700 people. Perhaps the features of the new building that would attract visitors most are the mosaic tiling in the hallway and porch, the pretty steel roofing, and the stately Corinthian columns at the entrance of the building. When the new building has been installed, the old auditorium will be divided into two society rooms and two recitation rooms. This additional equipment will enable us to provide for 250 pupils—50 of whom are to be local pupils.

In addition to the foregoing we wish to call attention to the new metal tank, with a capacity of 25,000 gallons, which we are now completing at a cost of \$1,560. The new tank necessitated the construction of a 55,000 gallon reservoir, which has been com-

pleted at a cost of \$1,295.

Within the next few months the power house and electric light plant will be moved off the campus. This change will add to the beauty of the campus and will cost, in pipes, valves, etc., a minimum of \$500.

During the year approximately \$750 was expended for improving our sanitation. New bath tubs and new fixtures have

been added to the toilet rooms of both dormitories.

The campus has been surrounded with an excellent fence at a cost of \$750. The front line is an iron fence and adds much to the beauty of the grounds. The garden and school furnished last year a bountiful supply of vegetables; 500 bushels of potatoes, 20 barrels of syrup and all the rice needed. The farm is one of the most valuable acquisitions to the school plant and enables us to furnish good board at \$9 per month.

The present enrollment is indeed flattering and we are confident that we will have a banner year. Among our attendants are ten ministerial pupils who are trying to prepare themselves

to meet the requirements of the call.

You will agree with the committee that the past year has been a great year for Norman Institute, and we want to thank all who in any way helped to make these improvements possible. It ought and must be said of Hon. J. B. Norman, notwithstanding he has asked that his name be withheld, has taken a great part in securing the recent equipment. Not only has he given freely of his money but he spends narly every day on the campus looking after the interests of the school.

Our endowment is not sufficient. May we not reasonably expect your help in adding to this fund that Christian education may be brought to your homes? Send us your boys and thus surround them with a Christian protection and a Baptist influence.

Sirs: I have the honor of presenting this report to you for

the term of 1909-1910.

During the past scholastic year we enrolled 263 students, as follows: Literary Department 240; Piano 61; Voice 8; Expression 35; Art 14. Of these 191 were boarders. There were 141 boys and 122 girls. Nineteen young men preparing for the ministry were in attendance. Our patronage was drawn from six different States and there were students from thirty-nine counties in Georgia.

The grade of work has been high and satisfactory and the deportment good. Each year it is a pleasure to note that the scholastic preparations of the new student is higher than the preceding year. The health of the student body has been good.

Seventeen members of the Senior Class received diplomas or certificates. The next senior class will number about the same as this year. Respectfully submitted,

Report on Orphans' Home.

There may be differences of opinion among brethren about some of our denominational enterprises, but surely there can be none about the Orphans' Home, where the fatherless find a

home and the motherless are mothered by godly women.

In our Home, located at Hapeville, nine miles from Atlanta, are gathered one hundred and eighty of the heavenly Father's wards, and, because His, ours too. The property consists of 50 acres of good land, on which are three large brick houses—the Etheridge Cottage for girls, erected by Bro. F. S. Etheridge, of Jackson, in memory of his mother; the Brown Cottage for boys, erected by Judge James R. Brown, of Canton, in memory of a beloved daughter; the main building, in which are chapel, dining room, recitation room, etc., built by the generous gifts of the Baptists generally; a large wooden house, bought with the land; another wooden house, with laundry, barn and other out buildings.

The home—for such the management, with Rev. W. A. Johnson and wife at the head, seek to make it, in fact as well as in name—seeks to train the children, not only in things pertaining to the spiritual life, but for this life as well. A good school is maintained, well graded, with excellent teachers. The boys, the ones large enough for such work, attend to the stock and run the farm, under direction of an excellent manager, and on it make no small part of the provisions used in the Home. The girls learn to cook, keep house, besides learning dressmaking and

dairving. They all work.

There is no endowment, but the Home depends, for current support and larger equipment, on the loving gifts of God's redeemed ones. The support of 188 children costs no little money, and our Convention asks for \$29,000 for this purpose of the Baptists of Georgia. There is a great need at present for a baby cottage, where the little tots can be cared for, with their own table and all the comforts they need. Enlargement of the laundry is a pressing necessity—indeed there is urgent need of general enlargement, for applications are coming in thick and fast for places in the Home for homeless children. If we could double the capacity of the Home, it would soon be filled full, and still the cry would continue: "Take us in!"

The management is always glad to have brethren come and see what the Baptists have in this Home; it is a place to make our hearts glad, and they want the brethren everywhere to feel personal interest in it—an interest that is created and deepened by nothing so much as giving to its support. Mention may be

made of the fact that coops of chickens, barrels or kegs of syrup, etc., are welcome. Especially does the Home need now two or three good milch cows.

The Laymen's Missionary Movement.

All of us are familiar with the prayer meeting of five held in 1806, which was interupted by rain. Continued under the shelter of a hay stack, it marked the beginning of American Foreign Missions. This was at Williams College, Williamstown, Mass. The names of the five men in that prayer meeting were Samuel J. Mills, James Richardson, Francis L. Robbins, Harvey Loomis, Byron Green.

In Boston, while celebrating the one hundredth anniversary of this prayer meeting, in November, 1906, the Laymen's Missionary Movement was inaugurated. The purpose of the Movement is to educate to a sense of their duty and to inspire to an enthusiasm to perform that duty. Samuel J. Mills said in 1886, "We can do it IF we will." One hundred years later Samuel B. Capen said, "We can do it AND WE WILL."

The leaders of the movement do not contemplate any separate organization. This is refreshing in this age of superabund-

ant and sometimes superfluous organization. Recognizing the wisdom of our Lord in the establishment of the all-sufficient church, they desire to arouse the individual members of the separate churches to a sense of their duty through the churches. Every church a chapter and every member a contributor is the ideal condition. The Movement would stress three points:

1st, No church should be content to contribute less to the rest of the world than it uses for itself. "Love thy neighbor as

thyself,"

and, It would urge Laymen everywhere to adopt tithing as

the minimum standard of giving. This is scriptural.

3rd, It would urgently advocate the scriptural method in giving. "Upon the first day of the week let each of you lay by

him in store as he may prosper."

The leaders of the Movement among the Baptists of Georgia are a committee of twenty-seven members appointed by the State Convention. Bro. Frank L. Mallary, of Macon, is chairman. It is devised that one or more of this committee shall visit every Associational meeting and give the benefit of their ex-

perience and enthusiasm to advance the work.

We recommend the adoption of the following preamble and resolutions: "Whereas, the Laymen's Movement seems 'to have come to the kingdom for such a time!' for the fields are open, the nations are calling, strong and consecrated young men and women are volunteering, the mission boards understand the needs of the fields and are prepared to administer funds most wisely, the conditions are most favorable, and God in His own good time is moving mightily upon the men of Christendom, and

"Whereas, Baptists greatly predominate in this State in numerical influence and are financially able to do vastly more than they have yet done for the Missionary objects fostered by our Convention, and in view of the fact that the Georgia Baptist Convention has appointed a Laymen's Committee and such Committee is making an effort to bring the great mass of laymen face to face with their obligation to the Kingdom of God,

Resolved.

"First, That a Committee of three laymen be appointed to co-operate within our bounds with the Laymen's Committee of the Convention, and to encourage the organization of Missionary Committees in our local churches and by inspirational addresses and otherwise to promote the cause of missions generally throughout our bounds,

"Second, The Committee shall report its work in detail at each meeting of this Association, and shall hold office till its suc-

cessor is elected.

"Third, The Clerk shall immediately forward the names of

those composing the Committee to the Chairman of the Laymen's Committee of the Georgia Baptist Convention."

NOTE—In sending money to J. J. Bennett, Secty. & Treasurer, great care should be exercised. If the money is from the church, Sunday School, W. M. S., Y. W. A., Sunbeams or Royal Ambassadors, let it appear so, distinctly. Also let the object or purpose for which the money is contributed be clearly stated. And all of this is next to useless unless the name of the Association is given in the letter in which the money is remitted. Not to give the name of the Association from which the money is sent utterly destroys the plans of the book-keepers in the Board's office where the effort is being made to keep accounts with the Associations.

No funds should ever be sent to the Association, which are afterwards to be sent to the Boards.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL ASSOCIATION.

Article 1. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of Heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture or error for its matter.

Article 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in divine perfection.

Article 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin without defense or excuse.

Article 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace through faith in the Son of God.

Article 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on the principles of righteousness, and not any work of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteous-

Article 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no rspector of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted of Him.

Article 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.

Article 8. We believe in "perseverance of the saints," that all those who are truly regenerated and born again, will ultimately be saved in heaven, that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

Article 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by convention in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that it is only proper to have bishops, pastors and deacons.

Article 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper.

Article II. We believe that communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ and been legally baptized.

Article 12. We believe in a general judgmnt and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from Heaven and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

This Association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2. This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches nor in any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will only be an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually from the body by ballot and

otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to

the ratification or revision of the Association.

7. He shall see that the brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall not have voice in determining questions except in a case of a tie.

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it

when required, and shall print and distribute the Minutes among the churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall from time to time appro-

priate to that purpose.

10. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the Association, give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association may order through her Executive Committee. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report to the Association for each fiscal year.

adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed unless suspended for a special object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the

regular order of the house.

12. All motions when seconded must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by the mover. Substitutes and amendments

shall always be in order.

13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the subject or use unbecoming or unbrotherly language.

14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of

the members enrolled are present.

15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.

16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.

17. This Constitution and Rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the second,

which shall be unalterable.

18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of five members, chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, and to fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual Minute the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and

the Constitution of the Bethel Association.

Constitution and By-Laws of Woman's Missionary Union of Bethel Baptist Association.

Preamble.

We, the Women of the Churches connected with the Bethel Association, desirous of stimulating a missionary spirit and the grace of giving among the women and children of the churches, and wishing to aid in collecting funds for missionary ppurposes to be disbursed by the Boards and the W. M. U., organize and adopt the following Constitution:

Article I. Name.

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of the Bethel Baptist Association

Article II. Object.

The two-fold object of the Woman's Missionary Union shall be: Ist. To distribute missionary information and stimulate effort throughout the whole Association. 2nd, To secure the earnest, systematic co-operation of women and children in colelcting and raising money for missions.

Article III. Officers.

The officers shall be a President; two Vice Presidents; a Corresponding and Recording Secretary, and a Treasurer.

Article IV. Annual Meetings.

The Annual Meeting for the election of officers and the transaction of business shall be held each year at such time and place as may be determined at the previous Annual Meeting or by the Executive Committee.

Article V. Conduct of Meetings.

Every session of the W. M. U. shall be opened and closed with religious exercises.

BY-LAWS.

- Article 1. President.—The President shall preside at the Annual Meeting of the W. M. U. and at all meetings of the Executive Committee; shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for; and shall be ex-officio a member of all standing ocmmittees. She may call special meetings of the Executive Committee when in her judgment needful, or at the request of three members of the Committee. In her absence chairman of the Executive Committee presides at Committee meeting.
- Art. 2. Vice Presidents.—Vice Presidents shall seek to advance the interests of the Union in these communities, and preside at annual meetings in the absence of the President.
- Art. 3. Secretary—The Recording Secretary shall keep accurate records of the annual and special meetings of the Union; shall notify officers of their election and committees of their appointment and shall perform the other duties usual to her officer
- Art. 4. Treasurer—The Treasurer shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements of money, as reported to her from different churches or committees, and shall present a detailed report of all these accounts to each annual meeting. She shall perform all other duties usually pertaining to her office.
- Art. 6. Nominating Committee—The Nominating Committee shall be appointed by the President.
- Art. 7. Elections—The officers and members of the Executive Committee shall be nominated by a Nominating Committee on the afternoon of the last day of the meeting.
- Art. 8.—The Executive Committee shall hold annual, semiannual or monthly meetings for the transaction of business and shall report through its officers at each annual session of the Union.
- Art. 9.—The By-Laws may be altered or amended by a twothirds majority vote at the annual meeting.

We read the history of the Georgia Baptists from the time that the first church till now, and we find that there has been a great desire upon the part of the church to plant churches in every county and community, that the gospel might be preached to the people, and it has been eftectual and many souls have been saved in our glorious old state, and still we will have to put forth the same effort to maintain these churches and have the gospel preached in the destitute sections of the country and towns. We believe that if there could be a fund raised sufficient to put a man in the field as a colporter to sell books, and preach and visit the people in their homes, and hold up Baptist doctrine before the people, that the results would be good. We have many families who are not visited as often as they should be. Therefore, they become discouraged, and are sometimes persuaded to join other denominations, who will give them better attention than we are doing. And furthermore, we will have to be well established against the isms and heresies which come upon our territory and may capture our children, and lead them into erroneous paths. The hope of all missions is first at home. The early training and the well grounded principles of missions will fit us to go out into the world as the Master commanded us to do for the salvation of all mankind.

Document No. 2.

Report on Foreign Missions.

There is no more inspiring phase of Christian life and labor among the Baptists of the South today than the work of Foreign Missions. It is a work that appeals to the best type of Christian manhood. God has called all who love Him to the work of giving the gospel to every creature. The fact that it is a command of God is sufficient to show its importance; the fact that it is the will of Him who died for us is a sufficient incentive; and the fact that He has promised to be with us always and that His word should not return unto Him void should prompt us to the greatest endeavor. Our efforts in the past have not been a failure. Such can not be asserted except in poverty of information; or prompted by a covetousness that seeks to excuse itselt or a feeling that asserts a condition that it would be glad to see. Failure can only be seen by comparing what we have done with what we might have done. The blessings of God upon our endeavors should greatly encourage us.

Our efforts to give the gospel to the unsaved in other lands are directed by the Foreign Mission Board, located in Richmond, Va. Work is being done in China, Africa, Japan, Italy, Mexico, Brazil and Argentina. Last year the Board employed 804 missionaries—273 Americans, and 531 natives. 3,618 converts were baptized. We have on the foreign field 297 churches, 605 out-stations and 21,343 members.

Last year the Southern Baptist Convention gave \$570,008.97 for the work. Of this amount Georgia gave \$74,970.51. Our Association was asked to contribute \$1,575.00, a little more than thirty-seven cents per capita.

It would be a dereliction of duty not to mention the excellent work done by the Woman's Missionary Societies in the Southern Baptist Convention. In this report special attention is called to the fact that much of the foreign mission enthusiasm in our Association is due to the 14 Missionary Societies within its bounds. We commend them for their zeal and consecration.

We believe that it will meet with the approval of God if everary pastor in the Association will preach at least one sermon during the year, urging upon his people the duty and privilege of praying for the kingdom to come in the uttermost parts of the earth; and also urge upon them the necessity and privilege of giving liberally of their means to send the gospel to the heathen.

Document No. 4.

Report on Education.

Herbert Spencer said on one occasion that we had reached a period in the development of the human race when it was no longer possible to be entirely happy as long as there was any man unhappy; he further added that it was impossible to be entirely free as long as there was any one in bondage or entirely moral as long as there was any immorality. Much dignity was added to this statement because of the greatness of the author. He meant it to be general and as such applied to the universe. If this memorable statement is applicable to the world certainly it must apply, even with more force, to the people of Georgia where a more intimate relationship exists.

If we would have freedom, a high standard of morality, and the things that make for peace and happiness in the home, in the church, and in the State, we must educate. Carlyle said: "Lo, I call this tragedy and this alone tragedy, that a single human being should be born into the world with the capacity for knowledge and should die out of this world in ignorance."

The great Scotch prose writer was not far wrong when he said it was a tragedy to allow a person with a reasonable endowment of intelligence to go limping through the world handicap-

ped by reason of ignorance, at reason

Education is the leading out of darkness into light, out of ignorance and superstition into knowledge, out of error into truth. It is the development of all the faculties of mind and soul, thoroughly furnishing one for every good word and work, making one fit for the Master's use, fitting him for the mission life, making him a potent factor for good in the world, making him indeed the "Light of the world, the salt of the earth." Education lies at the heart of Lord's program for the conquest of the world. He who said "Evangelize" also said "Teach." Any full definition of the work of the church must therefore embrace education. The church is composed of a select membership and their training in knowledge of the world and in the use of their powers is the only guarantee of their full efficiency in bringing in the kingdom of heaven. It follows that, so far as the disciples of Christ can accomplish this, all the materials and machinery of education are to be baptized in a Christian atmosphere, and administered in the direct purpose of Christian character, and of aggressive Christian propagandism. Whatever the civil community may do in the field of education in no way releases the disciples of Christ from the obligations here laid down. It is a duty to support public education, but it is the denominational school where the voung life is trained for leadership in the church

and society and fortified against the skepticism imbibed in many

of our large colleges of the North and East.

The church is facing a critical period. Our orthodox idea of religion is being attacked by nearly all the great universities, and our only protection against these merciless attacks is an educated ministry and a strong force of educated laymen whose confidence in God can not be shaken.

The place for Baptist boys and girls seeking education is in Baptist schools, and the denomination must provide and support them from secondary to college grade. We need better schools provided by public funds—better school houses, better teachers and longer terms. And we note with satisfaction the revival of interest throughout the State in the public schools and

the increase of local taxation for their support.

But the atmosphere of these schools—whatever their grade of efficiency—can never become deeply impregnated with Baptist and Christian sentiment; and it is an atmosphere so charged that we require for our children. High schools, colleges and theological seminaries, under denominational control, are our way of creating this atmosphere and meeting these obligations; obligations, let it be repeated, imposed by the same authority and with the same imperativeness that has made it our duty to preach the gospel to every creature. Our Christian schools are as distinctly of divine authorization as our missionary organizations, and in the highest view are one with them, as all Christian enterprises; in all their complexity and variety are one.

The Georgia Baptist Education Board is nobly discharging these obligations through a chain of colleges and secondary schools. Mercer University, Bessie Tift and Shorter colleges are filled with boys and girls, many of whom have been prepared for college in one of our secondary schools of which we have fifteen in the State, i. e., Hearn Academy, Norman Institute, Cyrene Institute, Perry-Rainey Institute, Oaklawn Academy, Locust Grove Institute, Union Baptist Institute, Hiawassee High School, Cherokee High School, Gibson-Mercer Academy, Draketown Baptist Institute, Ebernezer High School, North Georgia Baptist College, Blairsville High School and Bun-Bell Institute. The last five named are owned by Baptist Associations, but are not comprised in the Mercer System.

The great need of these colleges and schools is the loyal support of every Baptist in the state. Pray and give for their support. We urge every church in the Bethel Association, at the earliest possible date, to send a contribution to Dr. G. A. Nun-

Your Committee on Laymen's Movement, offer the following report Soon after the last session, the Executive Committee arranged for a meeting of representatives from all the churches of the Association. This meeting was held with the Cuthbert church and was fairly well attended. Several visiting brethren assisted in this meeting: Drv L. R. Christie, Columbus; Bro. T. F. Mallary, Macon; R. J. Bacon, Albany. Several laymen of this Association visited and delivered addresses in some of the churches, but the interest in the movement has not been as strong as we have wished - Respectfully submitted; L. A. Report on Orphans Home.

Since the establishment of the Orphans Home we have never heard a single person object to or complain against this institution, thus proving conclusively that every one is in sympathy

with and heartily endorses it.

A year ago there were 188 children in the Home. Since that time homes have been found for 44, and 67 have been admitted, coming from all parts of the state, making at present about 211, of which 98 are boys and 113 girls. During the year there was 49 cases of mumps, 70 cases of measles, 75 cases of whooping cough and several cases of pneumonia. Is it not remarkable that not a single child died from any of these many

afflictions? Could we have stronger evidence that our heavenly

Father's protecting care is about them?

We want just here to call the special attention of our good women, who sometimes grow weary at mothering a few children at home, to Sister Johnson, who has the mothering of 211 children, and when you grow weary and complain at having to darn a few stockings and mend a few torn trousers and dresses, and tie up sore toes, remember her, with your prayers, who has 08

boys and 113 girls to do these things for.

We are glad to report that a good school is provided, with competent teachers, and all the children old enough are required. to attend. The crowded conditions, in the children's sleeping apartments, laundry and infirmary reported last year have been largely overcome by the purchase of an additional II acres of land adjoining the Home, and these enlargements made by generous donations. You will see from the above report that there are 23 more children to be few, clothed and cared for this year than there was last year. This calls for enlarged contributions from each church, Sunday school, Society and individual. See that your contributions in cash, provisions, clothing and everything needed are enlarged and that which you lend to God's poor, He will pay you back again in His own full measure.

When you pray for the Orphans, do not forget Brother and

Home Mission Report.

Home Missions is the philosophy of making real a Christian civilization in America. To accomplish its purposes is a matter. of surpassing importance in any wisely conceived mission policy.

The Old Testament prophets, whose eyes kindled with a vision of the world turning to God; in furthering this divine purpose gave their whole life to Home Missions. In the Great Commission our Lord gave commands that extend to the utmost-limits of the earth, but for all time they also include for each disciple the limits of his own community. They radiate out from that and take in every place between it and the place furthest away.

In the prosecution of the purpose of our Lord for the redemption of the world, Peter and Philip and Stephen and James preached to the Jews as Paul was when he carried the glad news to the Gentiles. Foreign Missions succeeds only when it settles down and makes itself at home. Home Missions is missions making for itself a real home in the hearts of men, and in the economic, social and civic relationships of our own land. We must insist that the gospel of grace shall rise so high in the hearts of God's people that it shall overflow and enrich the arid fields of greed and injustice and crime and wickedness in our own country. If we do not, we surely can not think that our gospel is strong enough to conquer heathen nations. Moreover, how shall we reply if the heathen nations shall say to us, Physician, heal

thyself?

Out of 92,000,000 population in America only about 20,000,000 are members of evangelical denominations. About 12,000,000 belong to the Catholics, but their faith is so foreign to the genius of American institutions and so obscures the teachings of the Savior in its idolatrous dogmas of saint worship and papal infallibility that we must regard this religious body as a spiritual liability rather than an asset.

The present growth of the South in material prosperity is marvelous. Our vast material resources are being developed with an almost greedy haste. The enormous property losses of the Civil War have been retrieved and this section now has more

wealth than the entire nation had when the war began.

Shall this material prosperity be a curse or a blessing to the South? The Christian people of the South hold the answer. If our religion is virile enough to consecrate this wealth to spiritual and moral ends, it will be a blessing. But if not—if the prosperity of our people is devoted to selfish luxury and pleasure—it will become a curse to the people and to the nation. We stamp the name of God on our minted coin, but only as that name is engraved on the living hearts of men will it avail for the nation, or for a lost soul. The greatest single threat to the power of religion in the South today is the Mammon of unconsecrated wealth.

The Home Mission Board conducts many departments of activity for saving the people and preparing them for lives of service. It has about forty-five workers among the foreigners, twenty-eight mountain mission schools, with 127 teachers and 4,500 students, eighteen trained evangelists who last year baptized about 3,000 converts, thirty-five Negro missionary evangelists working effectively among the Southern negroes, thirty-four missionaries who supply fifty-six churches and mission stations in Cuba, five missionaries and four helpers doing a successful work in the Canal Zone, a church building department which aided in building 289 churches last year, and twenty missionaries among the Indians in Oklahoma.

Besides the above, the Home Board participates co-operatively (principally with State Mission Boards) in a number of States in maintaining about 1,100 missionary pastors. This co-operative mission work is in line with the Convention's instructions to the Board to form the closest possible relationship with the existing agencies of the denomination in the various States.

To the end that our Board may enlarge its activities and do

for the denomination a work worthy of so great a Christian body and commensurate with the present urgent needs, your committee pleads for regular and large collections for Home Missions in the churches. Our Board could wisely expend a million dollars a year for it. It ought to do it, if we can only bring our churches to make a liberal response to its needs. Surely Southern Baptists must raise the \$400,000 asked, and our own State its apportionment of \$54,000, our Association its \$900.00.

Your Committee recommends:

That prayer be made in the churches for Home Missions, that God may open our eyes to see and our purses to use the rich opportunities to establish our country on the everlasting Rock of Ages.

That regular collections throughout the year be insisted on, instead of waiting, as so many do, to the end of the year

to give to this cause.

3. That our pastors be requested to make an earnest effort at least once during the year to preach a special sermon on Home Missions, and the magnitude and importance of the problems involved.

That churches and pastors be encouraged to make a large use of the Home Board's informing tracts and sample copics of The Home Field, both of which are free for the asking.

Some object to the Index because of the price, say it is too high, and yet they will give four or five dollars a year for a daily secular paper when, if they would take and read the Index and other papers, it would do them good for this life and for the life to come, while the secular paper

will bring them an account of all that is evil and tell them and their boys where they can get drams of all kinds, and thus do them harm for this world and for the world to come. So, after all, the good is the cheapest. Oh! that all of the people would read these good things and feast their souls on them, then the churches would be a power for good in the world. Document No. 13.

Report on Woman's Work.

A careful study of the history of the nations and all that has been accomplished in the way of christianizing and bettering their condition, reveals to us the fact that woman has ever been at the front in her efforts to aid and help along every effort which was for the good of humanity. Woman has ever been wide awake and alert, ready to meet every demand of the times; full of zeal and energy to be used for the service of the Master.

Do we need to search the Scriptures for authority as to Woman's Work? Both the Old and the New Testament abound with references to her work, influence, zeal, piety and consecration. The infant Savior in His lowly manger was born of woman. All through the three years of His preaching and teaching, we find noble, true, self-sacrificing women rallying around Him and His chosen disciples, rendering of their means, giving love and services gladly to aid those who were to carry the message of salvation to others. These women wept over the Crucified One, watched at the tomb and were the first to tell the news of a risen Savior. Here at the open door of the sepulchre, from the lips of her risen Lord Himself, woman received her commission to tell of the resurrected Christ.

We read in Luke, 8th chapter, 1st, 2nd and 3rd verses, that "He went throughout every city and village preaching and showing the glad tidings of the Kingdom of God; and the twelve were with Him, and certain women who ministered to Him of their substance." We find the consecrated and pious women attending the prayer meeting held before and after the Day of

Pentecost. Paul, in writing to the Philippian Christians, says: "I entreat you, help those women who labored with me in the gospel, with Clement also and with other fellow-laborers, whose names are in the Book of Life." Paul's references serve to show, in a measure, something of the activity of women in New Testament days. And Paul, in writing to the Romans, says: "I commend unto you Phoebe, our sister, who is a Servant of the church which is at Cenchrea, that ye receive her in the Lord as becometh Saints, and assist her in whatsoever business she hath need of you, for she hath been a succorer of many, and to myself, also."

Paul, sojourning at Corinth, finds lodging at the house of Aquilla, the tent-maker. Here he worked with them, teaching in the synagogue on the Sabbath. We are constrained to believe that Priscilla was a woman of superior intelligence and wisdom,

as he says, speaking of Apolllus:

"A certain Jew named Apollus, an Alexandrian by race, an eloquent man, came to Ephesus, and he was a mighty man in the Scriptures. This man had been instructed in the way of the Lord, and being fervent in the spirit, he spake and taught accurately the things concerning Jesus, knowing only the Baptism of John, and he began to speak boldly in the synagogue. But when Priscilla and Aquilla heard him, they took him unto them, and expounded unto him the way of God more accurately." Acts 18:24-26. Thus we see woman introduced in a new capacity. One she is eminently fitted to fill. It is gives to her largely as mothers and teachers the power to mold the character of the nation. "The hand that rocks the cradle rules the world." In our history of Bible workers an honored place is given to Dorcas. Here is the Divine testimony: "This woman was full of good works and almsdeeds, which she did."

The women of the Old Testament were willing and ready to give of their means and the labors of their hands to further all good work. We read that when Moses asked for contributions to build the tabernacle that "They, both men and women, as many as were willing hearted, came and brought bracelets, earrings, rings and tablets, offering an offering of gold unto the Lord." And all the women that were wise-hearted did spin with their hands, and brought that which they had spun—purple, and scarlet and fine linen." Ex. 35:22-25. Thus we see their most precious possessions were gladly given to the Lord. I know of no higher eulogium of woman's work than the gentle

words of the Savior: "She hath done what she could."

The growth in missionary interest and effort among the women in our association is very encouraging. The contributions made by the Societies during the year just closed amounts to \$1,322.00. The amount for the W. B. M. U. last year amounted to \$61,918.74.

The Union is auxiliary to the Georgia Baptist Convention, and endeavors in its work to carry out the plans adopted by the Convention. Each women's organization in this association plans to work in perfect harmony with the church of which it is a part. All contributions made by the Societies are reported through the churches as a part of the church work. Much of the success in our work as an association is due to the earnest, consecrated efforts of our women, through their respective societies. God bless the noble women! They need the prayers, sympathy, co-operation and encouragement of our brethren. They can not do their work effectively without the help of the pastors. Therefore, we would urge the pastors and brethren having no Woman's Society in encourage them in organizing and, in the language of Paul: "That you assist them in whatsoever way they may have need of you.

And all of this is next to useless unless the name of the Association is given in the letter in which the money is remitted. Not to give the name of the Association from which the money is sent utterly destroys the plans of the book-keepers in the Board's office where the effort is being made to keep accounts with the Associations.

No funds should ever be sent to the Association which are afterwards to be sent to the Boards.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL ASSOCIATION.

- Article I. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of Heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture or error for its matter.
- Article 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in divine perfection.
- Article 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin without defense or excuse.
- Article 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace through faith in the Son of God.
- Article 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on the principles of righteousness, and not any work of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.
- Article 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respector of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted of Him.
- Article 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.
- Article 8. We believe in "perseverance of the saints," that all those who are truly regenerated and born again, will ultimately be saved in heaven, that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.
- Article 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by convention in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that it is only proper to have bishops, pastors and deacons.
- Article 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper.

Article II. We believe that communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ and been legally baptized.

Article 12. We believe in a general judgmnt and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from Heaven and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

This Association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2. This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches nor in any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will only be an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually from the body by ballot and

otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to

the ratification or revision of the Association.

7. He shall see that the brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall not have

voice in determining questions except in a case of a tie.

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it when required, and shall print and distribute the Minutes among the churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for

his services such sum as the body shall from time to time appropriate to that purpose. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual Minute the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of the Bethel Association.

Association, give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association may order through her Executive Committee. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report to the As-

sociation for each fiscal year.

II. The Association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed unless suspended for a special object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.

12. All motions when seconded must be put to a vote, un-

shall always be in order.

13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the subject or use unbecoming or unbrotherly language.

14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of

the members enrolled are present.

15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.

16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.

17. This Constitution and Rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the second, which shall be unalterable.

18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of five members, chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, and to fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

Constitution and By-Laws of Woman's Missionary Union of Bethel Baptist Association.

Preamble.

We, the Women of the Church connected with the Bethel Association, desirous of stimulating a missionary spirit and the grace of giving among women and children of the churches, and wishing to aid in collecting funds for missionary purposes to be disbursed by the Boards and the W. M. U., organize and adopt the following Constitution:

Article I. Name.

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of the Bethel Baptist Association.

Article II. Object.

The two-fold object of the Woman's Missionary Union shall be: 1st. To distribute missionary information and stimulate effort throughout the whole Association. 2nd, To secure the earnest, systematic co-operation of women and children in collecting and raising money for missions.

Article III. Officers.

The officers shall be a President; two Vice Presidents; a Corresponding and Recording Secretary and a Treasurer.

Article IV. Annual Meetings.

The Annual Meeting for the election of officers and the transaction of business shall be held each year at such time and place as may be determined at the previous Annual Meeting or by the Executive Committee.

Article V. Conduct of Meetings.

Every session of the W. M. U. shall be opened and closed with religious exercises.

BY-LAWS.

- Article 1. President.—The President shall preside at the Annual Meeting of the W. M. U. and at all meetings of the Executive Committee; shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for; and shall be ex-officio a member of all standing ocmmittees. She may call special meetings of the Executive Committee when in her judgment needful, or at the request of three members of the Committee. In her absence chairman of the Executive Committee presides at Committee meeting.
- Art. 2. Vice Presidents.—Vice Presidents shall seek to advance the interests of the Union in these communities, and preside at annual meetings in the absence of the President.
- Art. 3. Secretary—The Recording Secretary shall keep accurate records of the annual and special meetings of the Union; shall notify officers of their election and committees of their appointment and shall perform the other duties usual to her office.
- Art. 4. Treasurer—The Treasurer shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements of money, as reported to her from different churches or committees, and shall present a detailed report of all these accounts to each annual meeting She shall perform all other duties usually pertaining to her office.
- Art. 6. Nominating Committee—The Nominating Committee shall be appointed by the President.
- Art. 7. Elections—The officers and members of the Executive Committee shall be nominated by a Nominating Committee on the afternoon of the last day of the meeting.
- Art. 8.—The Executive Committee shall hold annual, semiannual or monthly meetings for the transaction of business and shall report through its officers at each annual session of the Union.
- Art. 9.—The By-Laws may be altered or amended by a twothirds majority vote at the annual meeting.

Document No. 1.

Report on State Missions.

Jesus was a Missionary to a lost world. He came to bring salvation to a lost race. He commissioned His disciples to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature.

Jesus was a State Missionary. He went about over the land of His own people, preaching and teaching in the cities, towns and villages and in the country, much of his time being spent in the open air with multitudes eager to see and hear him. He began his labors for a lost world at home, and confined his earthly ministry almost exclusively to his native land, its divisions being not unlike county divisions in our own State. The command to preach the gospel anywhere is the same command that bids it to be preached everywhere. State Missions is wrapped up in the heart of world wide missions. Destroy State Missions and the life center of Foreign Missions is destroyed. Neglect State Missions and World Wide Missions suffer. The gospel of salvation for Georgia is the gospel of salvation for the whole world. Sin is as ruinous in its effects in the individual soul in our beloved State as it is in the remotest regions of heathen

China. The soul of the negro in our kitchen is as precious in the sight of God as the soul of a negro in far-off Africa. command to preach the gospel to Georgians is as binding as the command to preach the gospel to the African. Following the example of Jesus, we should cover all Georgia with the seed truths of the gospel. In this way we may hold the light and truth at home and so be able to give to them that have not. Our State is our point of depature, for all other fields of missionary labor. Our Sate line is not, however, our stopping place for the marching orders of our Lord still urge us forward to the ends of the earth. But if we refuse or neglect to do our duty at home, how can we be trusted to do it abroad? If we are disobedient and traitorous at home, how can we expected to be obedient and faithful on foreign shores? If we care not for the rescue of the perishing at our doors our fellowcitizens whose faces we see and know, if we harden ourselves against them and send them to others to be warmed and fed, faint and fruitless will be our efforts to save the perishing beyond the range of our vision in the lands of heathenism. World-wide missions is dependent upon State Missions just as the whole is dependent upon parts.

We learn from a tract sent out by Dr. Bennett that fifty out of every one hundred persons in Georgia are not church members. The population is increasing more rapidly than church membership. This means that we must increase our gifts to State Missions and redouble our efforts to reach the unsaved and bring them into the Kingdom. During the last five years Georgia Baptists have increased their contributions to Home and Foreign Missions each \$20,000; to State Missions only \$14,000. We should not give less to the former, but more to the latter. Home and Foreign Missions have sixteen states to support them; State Missions has only one—Georgia. If Georgia Baptists, therefore, fail to support State Missions, State Missions will fail. Georgia is a great state from a material and Baptistic point of view. Let us keep it so by making our contributions to State Missions increase in proportion to our ma-

The State Mission work for 1912 was laid out on a basis of \$75,000. While this is an advance over previous years it is not an advance in proportion to our needs. We must open our eyes to the stupendous changes that are taking place in our midst. "Now is the day and now the hour," for Baptists to establish churches in these villages; that are springing up and are destined to become cities. It is the only way to hold what God has given us or to discharge the obligations we owe to the Georgia of 1950. If our people are wise to see their day they

will put State Missions by the side of Foreign Missions and advance them together at he head of the benevolent column.

The State Board has asked this Association (Bethel) to contribute approximately \$4,000 for all purposes and this amount can easily be raised if the pastors will only make an earnest appeal to the members of their respective churches. That we may keep before us the schools known as those of the Mercer system we offer a list below and we would suggest that the patrons and prospective students in our acquaintance be made as thoroughly acquainted with these unsurpassed opportunities as is convenient.

Document No. 7.

Report on Foreign Missions.

A just and comprehensive view of Foreign Mission opportunities at present is the greatest inspiration in the Kingdom of God on earth. The complete transformation of China within the last few months is one of the greatest events in human history. A radical change of one-fourth of the human race intellectually and politically, and the making of them ready for the spiritual re-adjustment, in so short a time, is without parallel in the history of nations. The Foreign Mission Board, located at Richmond, Va., is a committee appointed by the Southern

Baptist Convention to carry on this our foreign mission work, by the co-operation of all our churches and in behalf of all our people. It is our work. One member of the board lives in each State and is called the State Vice President. A representative of the Board lives in every association. He is expected to confer with the Board and with the churches in the interest of the work. At the present meeting of the body this Association is expected to elect this representative of the foreign mission board.

to serve until the next meeting of the Association.

Our presen fields are Argentina, Brazil, Mexico, Italy, Africa, Japan and China. The number of Missionaries on the field at present is 271. Native workers 577. Total force 848. Native churches 342. Sunday Schools 422. Woman's Training Schools 9, with 312 students. Theological Schools 10, with 245 students and many other organizations that are doing helpful Missionary work. Also four publishing plants and sending out millions of pages of religious literature. The contributions for 1911-12 were \$580,408, a gain of \$70,400 over the previous year. Our people can reduce our expenses very much by sending their money all through the year so as to save the interest account. Then let it be remembered that we are spending a great deal of money to arouse our people and increase contributions. The Southern Baptist Convention asked the churches to raise \$618,000 for Foreign Missions this year. Every dollar of this amount is needed to meet past obligations and maintain the work on a hopeful basis.

We would not fail to record the zeal and energy of our faithful women in the work of foreign missions. The Woman's Missionary Societies in the Southern Baptist Convention have been great factors in raising money and arousing enthusiasm in foreign missions. Much of the enthusiasm in our association is due to the Woman's Missionary Societies within its bounds. We bid them God speed in the extension of the King-

dom of our Master.

We call special attention to the equipment fund in honor of the Judson Centennial. \$1,250,000 is to be raised for equipping our schools and publication work and for the building of chapels, hospitals and missionary homes. We would ask that our people make this an object of prayer and give to it liberally.

We recommend, I, That all our people help in our foreign mission work by subscribing for and reading the Foreign Mis-

sion Journal.

2. That we solemnly pledge ourselves to do our part to raise the amount of \$1,500.00, which has been asked of our Association this year. Our people need greater zeal, largeness of

soul and a larger vision of the Master's work, and of the world's crying need.

Document No. 13.

Report on Woman's Work.

Facts and figures: In 1888 the Woman's Missionary Union was organized. Today it is estimated that over 10,000 Societies are contributing through the Woman's Missionary Union. Of this number over 8,000 are woman's societies; over 1200 Y. W. A.; over 500 Sunbeams and 300 Royal Ambassadors. The W. M. U. of Bethel Association has 14 Woman's Missionary Societies, 4 Y. W. A.'s, 9 Sunbeams and 4 Royal Ambassadors.

Last year our foreign mission board asked the union and its tributaries—the Y. W. A., the Sunbeams and the Royal Ambassadors—for \$142,500. The home board asked for \$95,000. The Sunday School Board asked for \$1,500. Besides the Margaret Home at Greenville, S. C., and the training school at Louisville, Ky., and lots of other things appeal to them for support.

In the tweny-four years of its existence, the Union has contributed two million dollars to the various enterprises fostered by our denomination. The women of Georgia contributed over \$70,000 last year. Of this amount the Union in the Bethel Association contributed \$1,320.16. This year it contributed for missions \$1,461.88. So we see that the Union is well worth its place in our church life as a money raising agency. But this is not her only mission.

We note with pleasure the enlargement of its work along moral and spiritual lines. It is fast becoming a mighty factor in our church work along the lines of cottage prayer meetings, administering to the sick and the poor, Mission Sunday schools in the cities and work among the young people in the cotton

mill districts.

It belongs to the ordinary Scripture imagery to speak of the church under the figure of a woman, as Spouse, a mother. We read of the daughter of Zion in the Old Testament and Paul speaks in the New Testament of the Spiritual Jerusalem "As the mother of us all;" the Canticles show how familiar such conceptions were to the Jews; and the same kind of language is everywhere employed in one form or another in the writings of the Apostles. Woman was made of man, a deep sleep fell upon him for that purpose, and out of that sleep woman came into being. She was brought unto man and accepted and loved by him as bone of his bone and flesh of his flesh, and made one with him in the closest of all earthly relations. And to say nothing of the feminine qualities as distinguished from the masculine, the church in her relation to the second Adam, in her naming after Christ, and in her receptivity, love, maternity, trusting dependence, beauty and willing obedience is the bride of Christ, his queen, partaker of his inmost love, and all his estate and kingdom, having her joy in him and his in her. Nor is there another image known to man which more richly and truly sets forth that mystic body which we recognize and identify in every age as the church or people of God. She is a royal woman crowned with the stars of Heaven. It is sometimes decried as a woman's weakness that she is fond of beautiful attire and has an irrepressible instinct for personal adornment. It is not a weakness, but an instrument of power. It is a part of her God-given nature, as the original type and representation of the church. True she may abuse it and fall into many silly mistakes and sins by reason of it, but it becomes her and belongs to her proper womanliness to be as beautiful as possible and to be as attractive as she honestly can. She owes it to herself, to her sex, to her husband and to society. Woman, like the church, is the child and heroine of battles, sufferings and victories. Without the show of conquest, and mostly in weakness and pain, straightened betimes as if it were impossible for her to survive, she has moved on side by side with man, through blood and fire, never surrendering, never losing a jot of zeal, doing her work against all the powers arrayed against her; and still she has lived on like the burning bush of Moses, unharmed by the fire, pushing her influence to the very throne of Satan, making mighty champions of truth out of the veriest Sons of Hell, penetrating into all the nations; and today still waves aloft the Palm of ten thousand contests, singing her victory songs to her God as when Miriam struck the symbals on the further shores of the Red Sea. Sunday School Report.

The country is flooded with papers, the daily, the story papers and all kinds of papers. There are papers that are sent out that claim to be religious that are dangerous in their teachings. The best way to meet these errors is with well informed officers and teachers and students. There is no better place for training them than in the Sunday school. Therefore, let us all work for, and pray and encourage the school.

NOTE—In sending money to J. J. Bennett, Secty. & Treasurer, great care should be exercised. If the money is from the church, Sunday School, W. M. S., Y. W. A., Sunbeams or Royal Ambassadors, let it appear so, distinctly. Also let the object or purpose for which the money is contributed be clearly stated. And all of this is next to useless unless the name of the Association is given in the letter in which the money is remitted. Not to give the name of the Association from which the money is sent utterly destroys the plans of the book-keepers in the Board's office where the effort is being made to keep accounts with the Associations.

No funds should ever be sent to the Association which are afterwards to be sent to the Boards.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL ASSOCIATION.

Article 1. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of Heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture or error for its matter.

Article 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in divine perfection.

Article 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin without defense or excuse.

Article 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace through faith in the Son of God.

Article 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on the principles of righteousness, and not any work of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

Article 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respector of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted of Him.

Article 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.

Article 8. We believe in "perseverance of the saints," that all those who are truly regenerated and born again, will ultimately be saved in heaven, that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

Article 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by convention in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that it is only proper to have bishops or pastors and deacons.

Article 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper.

Article II. We believe that communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ and been legally baptized.

Article 12. We believe in a general judgmnt and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from Heaven and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

This Association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2. This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches nor in any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will only be an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually from the body by ballot and

otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to

the ratification or revision of the Association.

7. He shall see that the brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall not have

voice in determining questions except in a case of a tie.

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it when required, and shall print and distribute the Minutes among the churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for

his services such sum as the body shall from time to time appropriate to that purpose. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual Minute the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of the Bethel Association.

Association, give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association may order through her Executive Committee. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report to the As-

sociation for each fiscal year.

adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed unless suspended for a special object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.

12. All motions when seconded must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by the mover. Substitutes and amendments

shall always be in order.

14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of

the members enrolled are present.

15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.

16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.

17. This Constitution and Rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the second,

which shall be unalterable.

18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of five members, chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, and to fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

Constitution and By-Laws of Woman's Missionary Union of Bethel Baptist Association.

Preamble.

We, the Women of the Church connected with the Bethel Association, desirous of stimulating a missionary spirit and the grace of giving among women and children of the churches, and wishing to aid in collecting funds for missionary purposes to be disbursed by the Boards and the W. M. U., organize and adopt the following Constitution:

Article I. Name.

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of the Bethel Baptist Association.

Article II. Object.

The two-fold object of the Woman's Missionary Union shall be: Ist. To distribute missionary information and stimulate effort throughout the whole Association. 2nd, To secure the earnest, systematic co-operation of women and children in collecting and raising money for missions.

Article III. Officers.

The officers shall be a President; two Vice Presidents; a Corresponding and Recording Secretary and a Treasurer.

Article IV. Annual Meetings.

The Annual Meeting for the election of officers and the transaction of business shall be held each year at such time and place as may be determined at the previous Annual Meeting or by the Executive Committee.

Article V. Conduct of Meetings.

Every session of the W. M. U. shall be opened and closed with religious exercises.

BY-LAWS.

- Article 1. President.—The President shall preside at the Annual Meeting of the W. M. U. and at all meetings of the Executive Committee; shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for; and shall be ex-officio a member of all standing ocmmittees. She may call special meetings of the Executive Committee when in her judgment needful, or at the request of three members of the Committee. In her absence chairman of the Executive Committee presides at Committee meeting.
- Art. 2. Vice Presidents.—Vice Presidents shall seek to advance the interests of the Union in these communities, and preside at annual meetings in the absence of the President.
- Art. 3. Secretary—The Recording Secretary shall keep accurate records of the annual and special meetings of the Union; shall notify officers of their election and committees of their appointment and shall perform the other duties usual to her office.
- Art. 4. Treasurer—The Treasurer shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements of money, as reported to her from different churches or committees, and shall present a detailed report of all these accounts to each annual meeting. She shall perform all other duties usually pertaining to her office.
- Art. 6. Nominating Committee—The Nominating Committee shall be appointed by the President.
- Art. 7. Elections—The officers and members of the Executive Committee shall be nominated by a Nominating Committee on the afternoon of the last day of the meeting.
- Art. 8.—The Executive Committee shall hold annual, semiannual or monthly meetings for the transaction of business and shall report through its officers at each annual session of the Union.
- Art. 9.—The By-Laws may be altered or amended by a twothirds majority vote at the annual meeting.

Report on State Missions.

According to the statistical report of the 1906 "Census of Religious Bodies," we find that only forty-six per cent of the population of the State of Georgia are members of any church. This means about one million, two hundred thousand non

church members in the State, or about one-half the population

above ten years of age.

Of the six counties that practically compose the Bethel Association, the following per cent are church members: Baker 24, Quitman 37, Calhoun 38, Early 43, Clay 50, Randolph 62.

Not including our cities and towns, there is only one Bap-

tist church in Georgia for every forty square miles.

There are now on the field in Georgia one hundred

forty missionaries, some for whole and some for part time.

There are in Georgia ninety-one Associations, two thousand, four hundred churches, and two hundred and eighty thousand members. Of the entire church membership in our state belonging to all denominations, fifty-seven per cent. are Baptists. The Baptists of Georgia are asked to raise sevety-five thousand dollars during the present conventional year for State Missions. Of this amount Bethel Association is asked to raise nearly one thousand dollars.

Document No. 5.

Home Mission Report.

FIRST. The task of the Home Mission Board is to elicit, combine and direct the energies of our whole denomination, in one mighty effort, for the spread of the Gospel of Christ. And while the world of God is not bound, and while the great purpose of missions is one; yet for convenience in carrying on the various departments of mission activity, the work of this Board is confined largely to the bounds of our Southern Baptist Convention.

Home Missions seeks to accomplish this stupendous task. through a series of well regulated departments; namely, Evangelism, Education, Enlistment and Co-operation, Church Building, Publicity, etc.

SECOND. What is the Home Board doing through these

various departments?

1st. Through the department of Evangelism, with twenty-four workers, we are doing a special work of saving the lost. Last year it reported four thousand, nine hundred and eighty-two baptisms; six thousand, nine hundred and seventy-eight additions to churches; and twelve hundred and two volunteers for the Ministry and Missionary service. The cost of this work for the year will be fortysix thousand dollars. But what is this small cost compared to this great work of soul saving and enlistment of forces? And in addition to this, our Board is paying half the support of about thirty-five Missionaries among the Negroes.

2nd. Through the new department of enlistment and co-operation, our Board is seeking to enlist the undeveloped churches of our Associations. This is a new work under the able and efficient leadership of Dr. Arch C. Cree, but is already producing gratifying results. The cost of this work for the year is estimated at sixteen thousand, six hundred dollars.

3rd. Through the Department of Church Building, the Board is seeking to raise a million dollar building fund. to assist the more than three thousand unhoused churches. and the more than three thousand poorly equipped churches in our Convention. Sixty-five thousand dollars has been expended in this way this year, and the demand is twice as large as the supply. Our Board is prosecuting this work in Cuba, in the Canal Zone, among the four hundred thousand Mexicans of Texas, the one hundred thousand Indians of Oklahoma, and among emigrants and foreigners in ports and cities of our Southland.

4th. Through our Educational Department our Board is maintaining thirty-four Mission Schools, with an attendance of more than five thousand students, at a cost Southern Baptists for maintenance and plants of fifty thousand dollars for this year.

5th. Through our Publicity Department, we are sending out millions of pages of tracts, to keep our people informed about the opportunities and needs of our work.

THIRD—Facts and Figures. The oppressed of every nation today looks to America, to show the way to better things. We have tried and know of a truth, "that righteousness exalteth a nation." But our best efforts have been imperfect. We also know "that sin is a reproach to a nation." Of ninety-four million people in America, only about twenty-one million are members of any evangelical religious body. Of thirty-one million people in the Southern Baptist Convention territory, than eleven million are members of evangelical bodies. all these successful efforts of Home and State Missions, scores of communities in many States do not hear the Gospel Message. We must care for the work in the slums of our cities as well as along the fashionable boulevards and in the country. are thousands of churches without resident Pastors, with only once a month preaching that are finding themselves inadequately taught and trained to meet the pressing needs of today.

FOURTH: Our Scope of Work. "We have learned by experience," as one has well expressed it, "that fraternal sentiment is good, but loyalty to Christ is better," and if Southern Baptists would accomplish their task, they would do well consecrate and concentrate and direct all their forces

the work God has assigned them, leaving other denominations

to choose their own spheres of work.

FIVE: What Our Home Board needs in order to carry on the work successfully. We need thirty-seven thousand, five hundred dollars every month in the year from our churches, in order to meet the obligations of the Board. We need that our people shall study the many problems that confront civilization which must be solved by our Home Board. We need that pastors and churches shall take regular collections for Home Misisons without which we will be embarrassed by heavy debt.

Our people should form classes for Mission study, read tracts, pastors should preach on missions, and all should "give

as the Lord has prospered."

The Home Mission apportionment for the whole South, is this year four hundred and thirty-one thousand, seven hundred and fifty dollars. The apportionment for our State is fifty-four thousand dollars. That for our Association is nine hundred dollars. Every dollar of this apportionment is needed to carry on the work successfully.

SIX: Recommendations:

1st. We recommend that the amount for our Association be apportioned among the churches, and each church requested to raise its entire amount.

2nd. The pastors and workers, urge churches to subscribe for the Home Field, the monthly home mission magazine and to make large use of our home mission tracts.

3rd. That our churches give regularly and systemat-

ically to meet the constant needs of the Board.

4th. That earnest prayer be made for the cause of Home Missions in all our churches, and that our pastors be requested to preach on the subject as often as practicable. The address of the Home Mission Board is Third National

Report on Foreign Missions.

The heart of Christianity is missions, and the soul is Christ. Jesus was the greatest Missionary, and His love for humanity was world-wide in its scope. He came to save. He died to save. The very heart throbs of His message, example and thought, was to give us a vision of a Lost World. When the

gospel fails at this point it is robbed not of its efficiency, but of its working utility. The Saviour's teaching, directing His coworkers to the ends of the inhabited earth, is so plain as doubtless to make it an insult to Divine veracity and classed as unbelief when not carried out. A true revival of religion is missionary in spirit. When we see through the Saviour's eyes and think through His mind we not only see a lost world, but we want this lost world brought to Christ. Verily, verily, Christ is our authority for a world-wide campaign. The messengers, the field and the message—all the information necessary for full equipment—has been given to us. We are without excuse and Christ will hold us responsible for a failure to carry out His instructions to the letter. He has given us the strongest encouragement by promising to go with us all the way, even to the end. Those who are GOING and those who are DOING may claim the promise of His companionship and none others. The 13th Chapter of Acts makes clear to us the position of the Holy Spirit to the Christ plan. What is your attitude? Are you with Christ and the Holy Spirit or is this one of the sins of omission in your program? Let us be careful that we do not oppose by word, thought or act the Christ plan. The church at Antioch was deeply spiritual and made rapid development because they believed the teachings of the Lord and were willing to carry out the directions of the Holy Spirit. Churches make progress in spiritual growth in proportion to a full acceptance of the Divine plan. Christ will not grant or give to us deep spiritual life unless we are willing that God's will shall be our will.

Facts and Figures—The Foreign Board is at work in seven fields strategic in location. Argentina has a population of seven million and is a country rich, growing rapidly and is ready for the gospel. Brazil has twenty millions and is one of the ripest fields in the world. Mexico has thirteen million and very great-Iv needs our help. The population of tlaly is thirty-four million and is the fountain head of Romanism. The work from this field has extended into Northern Africa and up into the continent of Europe. Africa in Southern Nigeria, with six million, the gateway to all the central part of the Dark Continent, the battle ground, between Islam or the teachings of Mohammed and Christ. We are in touch in China with one hundred and fifty-six millions of people and in this great field there are hundreds of millions more unreached by us. This field furnishes marvelous opportunities. Japan has twenty million and is the leader of the Orient. Japan is now ready for the gospel as never before. These are our fields calling, calling, for laborers and equipment. It was Christ who gave to Paul the Macedonian

cry, and verily it is Christ who is calling us through these peo-

ple. Paul heard the cry, will we?

The Forces—On account of deaths, failures in health and a lack of funds our number is less than three hundred on these fields. The native regular workers number nearly six hundred. The churches are growing in self support and in missionary endeavor. The Sunday schools are doing aggressive work. We have nine Women's Training Schools with a study body of more than three hundred. Our theological schools are well attended and splendid results are obtained. In six hospitals and thirteen dispensaries, thirteen medical missionaries treated nearly sixty. thousand patients. We have four publishing plants sending out millions of pages of religious literature.

Results—The results are far beyond that of our own country when we compare equipment and forces. The average is more than forty baptisms per worker annually. Apart from this is the work of training and organizing the forces and laying plans for larger things in the future. The work as compared

with the home work is phenomenal.

The Finances-When we think of the wealth of our denomination in the South and the interest paid by our Board to the banks on borrowed money, it is almost alarming. We can no longer pray for open doors and money with which to carry on the work. God is challenging us with open doors, with men and with women willing to go, and with means to send them. The sin is at our door if the work if not done. The Foreign Board is in debt and funds are being sent in slowly. May God wake us up, for surely our money is His and we are robbing him

The work of the Foreign Board is well organized and proper information may be obtained with little cost at any time from the educational department. Just a few dollars will obtain all necessary books and the Foreign Mission Journal which will fully equip any one, with some additional reading of the Bible, for intelligent work in the world-field. May every preacher in the Bethel Association do his full duty in preaching and teaching a full gospel and thus enlist every member in the work both in actual service and in contributions during the year. May the "every member" plan be our plan, for it is God's plan.

We feel that we be nefitted the church and know that we were benefitted by our visit there. Bros. R. J. Bacon and McDonald, of Albany, very ably assisted us in our Rally at Shellman.

We feel that we need some additional stimulous in the way of a regular missionary for the Association to forerun and lay out work for us to do. Our hearts are willing, our opportunities are great, but we need more system, and feel that a Missionary

port on our Orphan's Home, located at Hapeville, Ga.:

At present there are 240 children in the home, 205 of whom are in school under the management of four consecrated teachers. A school of telegraphy under the management of Mrs. Norman, has been organized. Fourteen are in this school, which has the approval of proper representatives of the Western Union Telegraph Co. We have a 50 acre farm cultivated by the larger boys, which furnishes fresh vegetables, etc., for the home.

There is now an effort to raise \$50,000 for the enlargement

and improvement of the home. We recommend that Bethel Association contribute its share of this amount.

Report on Education.

Your Comhittee on Education begs leave to submit the following report: No report on Education can be complete or fair that does not take cognizance of the great work that is being done by our noble public school system. We would emphasize at the outset the importance of full co-operation on the part of all loyal citizens, with those having charge of this work, that our schools may more and more become all that is possible to them, whether in their practical workings or their far-reaching influence on the life of our citizenship. But we are today especially concerned with Christian Education, and, in this connection we note that there have been three steps in Baptist progress and development in Georgia: First, there was the desultory preaching and teaching by our pioneer workers; Secondly, we had organized missionary effort. This was a step in advance of our former desultory work. After this came the crowning work—the work of Education.

The work of the fathers was foundation work, and therefore necessary but not until we launched an educational propaganda on a scale commensurate with our needs did we really begin to grow and develop as a denomination. The Christian college is a necessity. The limits of State education are such as to require denominational education. In our country there is separation between church and State. Our Constitution safeguards this truth. On this account, State Universities and schools can not teach men their highest duties—either in their relations with men or God—that is their religious duties.

President Hadley, of Yale, wisely said, "The chief source of vice is moral perverseness, not mental deficiency. If you improve a man's intellectuall capacity without correspondingly educating his moral nature you are likely to change the direction in which his vicious instincts find outlet rather than to destroy those nstincts themselves." Morality can not be successfully inculcated divorced from religion. It is here that we see the need and advantage of Christian schools and education.

The Christian school offers the broadest and most symmettical development of all the faculties of the student. It sets right

standards, and presents proper ideals. It begets a spirit nobility and develops the highest form of life. It teaches the student that his mental growth should contribute to God's glory and the uplifting and elevating of mankind.

Dr. E. M. Poteat, President of Furman University, declares that "the atmosphere of a college is comparable to the Christian atmosphere of a home, in its importance, You know the difference between a home that has it and the home that has it not."

Dr. E. W. Hunt, President of Denison University, says of our theological students that "we get the various percentages as follows: 5 per cent from Secular Universities, 6 per cent from State Universities, 12 per cent from Christian Universities, 81 per cent from Christian colleges. Of our Foreign Missionaries, we get 5 per cent from secular universities, 7 per cent from State Universities, 9 per cent from Christian Universities and 85 per cent from Christian colleges. Almost exactly the same percentage holds true of Home Missionaries. The figures emphasize the vast need of liberally supporting our own colleges. Universities and other schools.

We trust it is not needful that we urge upon our people the importance of giving their sons and daughters the best educational advantages. Nothing can take the place of real Christian culture. All the accumulations and accidents of life are as nothing beside it. What we gather and hoard may vanish, but this endures and blesses its possessor and those about throughout life. The aim of parents should be to seek, not the saving of life, but the saving of the boy. The chances are against him. The attractions of the world are fearful, and the suggestions of his heart compel him to daily combat. All things are new to him and untried. He is afraid of nothing and is anxious to test everything. To hedge him around with the very best influences, to shield him from every agency which can lead him to ruin, to place him where the air about him will be fragrant with holy teaching—all these are a part of the debt the parent owes to the child

We unreservedly commend to our people as eminently worthy of their patronage and maintenance Mercer University, Shorter College, Bessie Tift College and all our schools comprising the Mercer System. Respectfully submitted, H. M. KAIGLER, Chairman.

Our Senators and Congressmen should be men who appreciate noble manhood and womanhood to such extent that our laws should be framed in such a manner as to protect the characters of our boys and girls from this, the most

blighting curse which we have upon us, strong drink. It is only by the intelligent and conscientious use of the ballot in hands of our best people that we can get the right kind of men in our legislative halls, and every good citizen should feel the great responsibility that rests upon him at the ballot box, and should feel enough interest in these great problems to see to it that his vote is cast, and that it is cast to support the true principles of manhood. In our late and lamented Congressman the Hon. S. A. Roddenbery, we had a man who stood fearlessly for the right and your committee wishes to commend his life as an example of what we need in our legislative halls. Then let us keep up the fight, let us be ready and be on the alert at all times. Let us not be too much elated over a little victory and drop off into a placid slumber. We believe that the healthy state of the mind depends upon what we read. Denominational literature has not the place in our denominational life which belongs to it. It therefore behooves the preacher, as God's representative, to strive to make denominational literature a powerful norm in our church life.

Let us remember that the sequence of cheap literature is a cheap or weak mind. Trashy literature furnishes a similar product to the minds given to its study. For us to build up a strong denominational life and spirit, we must emphasize the place of the Christian Index, Home Field and the Foreign Mission Journal. No other Baptist or so-called Baptist papers, published within our state or beyond our bounds will serve the mission of these, our recognized religious journals. Too many of our Baptist people are not only reading inter-denominationa! literature, but are actually shaping their lives by impression received therefrom. The preacher can always number the supporters of the work fostered by our denomination by subscribers to and readers of the Christian Index, Home Field and the Foreign Mission Journal.

We recommend that the subject of denominational literature henceforth have a place in the order of business for the first or second day, so that many messengers who do not stay for the third day's session may be impressed as to their duty to subscribe to and reading religious journals supported by our State Convention.

Document No. 14.

Report on Woman's Work.

More than nineteen hundred years have passed since Mary Magdalene, standing in a garden just outside the walls of Jerusalem, heard from the lips of Jesus the story of His resurrection, and also the command, "Go tell my brethren." Swiftly she ran, exclaiming, "I have seen the Lord and He is risen indeed!" Joyfully she obeyed Him, the emancipator and loving friend who had burst asunder her bonds of degradation and had conferred upon her liberty of conscience.

In every age of the world's history, since Mary, have been found women who also longed to tell the blessed story of His death and resurrection; but for centuries they were so hedged about by prejudice that their religious activities were, to an extent, suppressed. But prophecy must be fulfilled. David cried, his eyes being touched by the finger of God. "The Lord giveth the word; the women that publish the tidings are a great host." To the women of the present day has ben opened wide the door of opportunity, and the number of those who pass its portals, "to possess the land" is ever increasing.

The first record of woman's missionary work organized in America is October, 1800, when the "Boston Female Society for Missionary Purposes" was organized by the Baptists and Congregationalists. In 1861, a Woman's Union Mission was organized in New York City. In 1881, the Baptist women of the North organized, in Boston, the Woman's Baptist Foreign Mission Society; and in 1888 the Southern Baptist women organized the Woman's Missionary Union, auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention. This organization, which has

grown and strengthened each year, recently celebrated its twen-

ty-fifth birthday.

Two special features of the work are to be emphasized—its financial efficiency and spiritual power. The Woman's Baptist Missionary Union of Georgia is not only a piece of highly organized machinery, but it is vitalized and energized by a systematic study of the word of God, as it relates to the great missionary program, and mightily re-enforced by prevailing prayer. Our women have learned to depend not alone on its organization for the accomplishment of its work, but on spiritual resources, from which have come both information and inspiration for service. Their study circles and prayer circles have been potent factors in the great and sacrificial giving which has marked the progress of their work.

And herein lies the secret of financial efficiency. No enduring system of Christian giving can be built up or maintained that is not predicated on a knowledge of God's word, and a thoroughgoing sympathy with the divine plan for the redemp-

tion of a lost world.

The showing that the W. B. M. U. has made is remarkable, when it is considered that, at present, they are organized only in about one-half of our churches. If such results can be accomplished with one-half of our churches co-operating, what could be done if all our churches were organized and at work?

And this suggests one of the problems of woman's work—how to get into all our churches? It is to be regretted that some are not in active sympathy with the W. B. M. U. that some are indifferent, and that some are openly hostile. We believe this seriously handicaps Woman's Work, and we urge the pastors of ALL our churches everywhere to earnestly heartly and sympathetically co-operate with the W. B. M. U., believing that in so doing the churches will receive a great uplift in spiritual blessing and in actual results accomplished.

All praise to the consecrated, sacrificing women of our Association! Let us, as pastors and laymen, give them help by removing difficulties when we can, and in other ways encouraging their noble work. They are doing a great work we cannot

do; a work that would not be done without them.

Report of the Executive Committee of the Bethel Association for the Year 1913.

We, the Executive Committee of the Bethel Association, beg leave to make the following report, to-wit:

We have held two Fifth Sunday Meetings, one with the church at Blakely on the fifth Sunday and Saturday before in March. The other was with the Arlington Baptist church on the Fifth Sunday and Saturday before in June. Both these meetings were a success and we recommend that they be continued during our next associational year. We have an invitation to meet with the Pine View Church on the Fifth Sunday and Saturday before in November.

We have held four meetings of the Executive Committee, one in Arlington, one in Blakely and two in Cuthbert these meetings being well attended, work outlined and various subjects and matters pertaining to our Associational work discussed.

- I. We recommend that in co-operation with the State Board we employ an Associational Evangelist for the ensuing year.
- 2. That the churches of the Association be divided into Four Districts or groups, and that a Union meeting be held on the Fifth Sunday and Saturday before in each of these districts with some church in that district.
- 3. That as far as possible the churches of our Association be grouped and pastors located.
- 4. We further recommend that you elect from nine to fifteen on the executive committee, as soon as it can be legally done, and the men placed on said committee to be brethren who are interested and willing to work. We consider this committee to be the most important one of the Association and we are anxious that there be enough members on the committee who are sufficiently interested in the work to give it the attention it needs.

To the Executive Committee and Messengers composing the

present session of the Bethel Association:

Dear Brethren: An effort has been made, in a small way, to ascertain the needs of the Association. This has been done under the direction of the Executive Committee and endorsed by Dr. J. J. Bennett, Secretary of the State Board of Missions.

These are the conditions which deserve special notice:

FIRST. Our country churches are largely handicapped by the gradual influx to the towns, and this affects more or less each country church of the ntire Association. This has brought discouragement and therefore a wane of interest in the work. These churches, one by one, need the coming of a stronger man to help at times.

SECOND. This condition makes it difficult for them to secure desirable help often in their summer meetings, and this often increases the heavy burden, and therefore the material of

the community is not gathered together.

THIRD. These good people have not been properly informed of the objects fostered by the Convention, and therefore are not alive to these needs. Their interest can only be enlisted as they are informed and devloped. These needs would be met in an e-cient field man. We are losing fast each year under these present conditions.

Norman Institute has seven modern, well equipped buildings and seventeen choice acres of land, worth something like one hundred thousand dollars. Besides it has been endowed with seven store buildings and one hotel in Moultrie equal to about sixty-eight thousand dollars, which is nearly enough to

permanently endow the Institution, making it an absolute suc-

cess from this standpoint.

This Institution has been legally deeded to the Southern Baptist Convention, the Mell, Mallory, Mercer, Tucker, Georgia Baptist and Bethel Associations, or their duly appointed Trustees. The Bethel Association has equal voice with all the others in the management and administration of affairs, just as though we had purchased and paid for our interest.

Now, this Institution is ours, and we should be duly proud of it, and should support it in every way, especially by patronage and purse. As it is, Norman Institute needs very little financial assistance from our Association, only \$125.00 to help pay taxes and insurance on the stores and hotel buildings

in Moultrie.

We therefore recommend that our Association pledge \$125.00 annually for the purpose above stated, to be raised by the pastors of each church as the pastor and church sees best. We further recommend that the Executive Committee include this amount in their apportionment.

We suggest that the pastors of the various churches on at least one Sunday during the year devote their sermon and service to Christian education and promote the interests of

Norman Institute as much as possible.

A., Sunbeams or Royal Ambassadors, let it appear so, distinctly. Also let the object or purpose for which the money is contributed be clearly stated. And all of this is next to useless unless the name of the Association is given in the letter in which the money is remitted. Not to give the name of the Association from which the money is sent utterly destroys the plans of the book-keepers in the Board's office where the effort is being made to keep accounts with the Associations.

No funds should ever be sent to the Association which are afterwards to be sent to the Boards.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL ASSOCIATION.

Article I. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of Heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture or error for its matter.

Article 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in divine perfection.

Article 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin without defense or excuse.

Article 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace through faith in the Son of God.

Article 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on the principles of righteousness, and not any work of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

Article 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no rspector of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted of Him.

Article 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.

Article 8. We believe in "perseverance of the saints," that all those who are truly regenerated and born again, will ultimately be saved in heaven, that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

Article 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by convention in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that it is only proper to have bishops or pastors and deacons.

Article 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper.

Article II. We believe that communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ and been legally baptized.

Article 12. We believe in a general judgmnt and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from Heaven and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

This Association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2. This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches nor in any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will only be an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually from the body by ballot and

otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to

the ratification or revision of the Association.

7. He shall see that the brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall not have

voice in determining questions except in a case of a tie.

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it when required, and shall print and distribute the Minutes among the churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for

his services such sum as the body shall from time to time appropriate to that purpose. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual Minute the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of the Bethel Association.

- To. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the Association, give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association may order through her Executive Committee. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report to the Association for each fiscal year.
- II. The Association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed unless suspended for a special object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.
- 12. All motions when seconded must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by the mover. Substitutes and amendments shall always be in order.
- 13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the subject or use unbecoming or unbrotherly language.
- 14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of the members enrolled are present.
- 15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.
- 16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.
- 17. This Constitution and Rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the second, which shall be unalterable.
- 18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of five members, chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, and to fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

Constitution and By-Laws of Woman's Missionary Union of Bethel Baptist Association.

Preamble.

We, the Women of the Churches connected with the Bethel Association, desirous of stimulating a missionary spirit and the grace of giving among women and children of the churches, and wishing to aid in collecting funds for missionary purposes to be disbursed by the Boards and the W. M. U., organize and adopt the following Constitution:

Article I. Name.

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of the Bethel Baptist Association.

Article II. Object.

The two-fold object of the Woman's Missionary Union shall be: 1st. To distribute missionary information and stimulate effort throughout the whole Association. 2nd, To secure the earnest, systematic co-operation of women and children in collecting and raising money for missions.

Article III. Officers.

The officers shall be a President; two Vice Presidents; a Corresponding and Recording Secretary and a Treasurer.

Article IV. Annual Meetings.


The Annual Meeting for the election of officers and the transaction of business shall be held each year at such time and place as may be determined at the previous Annual Meeting or by the Executive Committee.

Article V. Conduct of Meetings.
Every session of the W. M. U. shall be opened and closed with religious exercises.

BY-LAWS.

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- Article 1. Superintendent—The Supt. shall preside at the Annual Meeting of the W. M. U. and at all meetings of the Executive Committee; shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for; and shall be ex-officio a member of all standing committees. She may call special meetings of the Executive Committee when in her judgment needful, or at the request of three members of the Committee.
- Art. 2. District Secretary—Dist. Secretaries shall seek to advance the interests of the Union in these communities, and preside at annual meetings in the absence of the Superintendent.
- Art. 3. Secretary—The Recording Secretary shall keep accurate records of the annual and special meetings of the Union; shall notify officers of their election and committees of their appointment and shall perform the other duties usual to her office.
- Art. 4. Treasurer—The Treasurer shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements of money, as reported to her from different churches or committees, and shall present a detailed report of all these accounts to each annual meeting She shall perform all other duties usually pertaining to her office.
- Art 5. Nominating Committee—The Nominating Committee shall be appointed by a nomination from the body of one representative from each district and two from the association at large.
- Art. 6. Elections—The officers and members of the Executive Committee shall be nominated by a Nominating Committee on the afternoon of the last day of the meeting.
- Art. 7.—The Executive Committee shall hold quarterly meetings for the transaction of business and shall report through its officers at each annual session of the Union.
- Art. 8—The By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-thirds majority vote at the annual meeting.

Report of Committee on Orphan's Home.

One of the basic principles of pure and undefiled religion, as laid down by one of the inspired writers is to visit the "fatherless in their affliction." The Baptist Christians of Georgia have over two hundred of these "afflicted" ones in their institution at Hapeville, and have the opportunity of cultivating this principle to the highest degree. In our Orphanage located at Hapeville we have one of the best managed, and certainly one of the most worthy, institutions in the country, where the physical, mental, moral and spiritual elements in these "afflicted" ones' lives are cared for. Mr. Scoggins, the new manager of the Home says: "We have fourteen regular workers in the Home, and four school teachers during nine months in the year. The school carries eight grades and a kindergarten, every child having been placed in school. We have in our Home the regular church societies, such as Y. W. A., R. A., Sunbeams, Teachers' Training Classes and B. Y. P. U. We are doing all in our power to make of our boys and girls active Christian workers, that they may help those who have done so much for them. A school of telegraphy has been made possible through the courtesy of the Western Union Telegraph Co., and the Ponce de Leon Baptist church of Atlanta. Quite a number of our

boys and girls have completed this course and now have lucrative positions. The children are clothed by societies, schools and individuals. Some send clothes ready-made, others prefer to send money to cover entire expenses. It takes considcrable amount of coal to run our engines, cooking stoves, heat our building in winter. Refurnishing our household kitchen, the insurance and repair on buildings, together with the salaries of the workers, medical attention, drug bill and the many incidentals amount to about \$3,000 a month. To maintain the Home cost about \$35,000 annually. As to our needs, spreads, sheets, table cloths, napkins, etc., are always in demand. Just at present we are in need of money or shoes more than anything else." There are more than two hundred and eighty thousand Baptists in Georgia, and if each will contribute something towards the support of the Home, the management would have plenty of money for all purposes. This is one of our greatest works, and the Baptists of Georgia can not afford to neglect it. The Home is in urgent need of funds to meet current support. Can not we confidently expect he Baptist churches of Georgia to rally to this great work? Respectfully, E. T. DAWSON, Chairman.

Report on State Missions.

Your committee on State Missions begs leave to make the following report: It is said that only one-third of the people in the United States are professed Christians, and the same is true of Georgia. Jesus gave us the example of preaching the gospel and He called other men to follow Him and He would make them fishers of men. His plan has been continued ever since. There were some with unclean spirits manded them to come out of them, and it was done. If we expect our children to be saved at home, we must have the gospel preached to them. If we wish to keep out the isms of the day, must preach the gospel. The Board conducts work in Italy, Brazil, Mexico, Argentina, Japan, China and Africa. In these countries we have three hundred and eighty churches with eight hundred and thirty-three out-stations, thirty thousand church members and five hundred and forty-two Sunday schools with twenty-two thousand scholars enrolled. We have also nine thousand three hundred and seventy-six students in mission schools, four hundred and twenty of whom are in the theological seminaries and training schools seeking specific preparation for Christian work.

The present force of workers embraces just three hundred, of which number twenty are under appointment, but have not yet sailed for their respective fields of labor. In addition to these home sent missionaries we have on the combined fields

six hundred and thirty-five native workers.

The work prospers on nearly all the fields; five thousand and fifty-two converts were baptized last year, the largest number ever reported for a single year. Conditions at this hour give promise of still more abundant fruits, if we take advantage

of the opportunities opening to us everywhere.

But our successes and our opportunities have laid responsibilities upon us and to make insistent demands of us which we can not ignore without turning much of our success into failure and throwing away our God-given opportunity for still larger achievements. Multitudes have been made ready for the Word of Life; thousands are awaiting training in the Christian life and for Christian service; our schools are overflowing a score of consecrated young men and women are offering themselves to the Board for the needed work; and untouched fields invite us to the harvest. Need and opportunity never combined in such a challenge to Southern Baptists. Nothing less than immediate and immense enlargement can answer this challenge, and set us in a place of great honor, usefulness, and advantage for our gospel.

Shall we prove ourselves worthy of so signal a favor as God is ready to bestow upon us? We are sufficient in numbers, capable in talents and leadership and able in material resources. We can meet the challenge of the great opportunity if we will. Gifts to the work advanced forty-four thousand dollars last year over the previous year. But one-half our people have no part in this advance; and consequently had no part in the blessed results accomplished; and will have no part in the glorious rewards to be bestowed. Our task for the present year includes first, the completion of the Judson fund; 2, the enlistment of more than one-half of our church members who have not yet given anything for Foreign Missions; 3, the development of present gyers into larger giving; 4, the inauguration

in each church of a plan of systematic monthly giving and remitting for this cause, so that the work may be taken care of and debt and interest payment may be avoided. We commend these four objects to the thoughtful consideration of our pastors and churches.

In order to increase intelligence concerning this great work of the denomination, and to enable all our people to work together harmoniously toward the same end, we recommend and urge that the Foreign Mission Journal be taken and read by every Baptist family within our bounds; and to secure so desirable an end, we suggest that each pastor in the Association appoint a committee in each church of which he is pastor, to canvass the membership with this object in view. All our people ought to be well informed about a work so great as this of giving the gospel to the lost nations, and the Journal is the publication which the denomination uses to give this information.

A Statement About Home Missions.

Last year more than 30,000 baptisms were reported by missionaries supported wholly or n part by our Home Mission Board, and more than 56000 additions to Baptist churches. Matchless as is this record, equally promising for the future, though less adapted to being shown in figures, was the development and efficiency work accomplished through the Mission school and Enlistment activities of the Board.

With such glorious successes achieved, much larger Home Mission tasks are beckoning Southern Baptists today. There never was a time in the South when so much depended, as now depends, upon an alert, consecrated and militant missionary

program.

In 1880 the population of the South was 18,000,000. Of the 33,000,000 here today 22,000,000 make no profession of religion. If we count off 4,000,000 who. from infancy or other causes, are irresponsible, there are still in the South today a mighty host of unsaved people equal in number to the entire population in 1880.

Evangelistic effort is still more successful in the Southern Baptist Convention territory than in any other part of the country, but it is steadily becoming more difficult in our territory to win people to Christ, or to hold those who have been won to lives of service without a program for training and strengthening the life which has been implanted. This has its cause in the changing conditions of life in our day. Machinery, transportation and intercommunication have largely broken up

the old conditions of localism, independence and community spirit. Old habits and ideals are being swept away and even the churches of Christ must adjust themselves to the change and learn how to make spiritual and to direct the new life, or else lose their leadership and power. These changes cry out to us for a heroic and statesmanlike Home Mission program.

Never before in America have there been so many insidious attacks as there are today upon true religion. These attacks propose either a religion of a closed Bible, as Roman Catholics do, or a religion of a mutilated and grossly perverted Bible, as do Christian Science, Russellism and half a dozen other destructive false faiths. These modern false faiths all agree in a ceitful effort to destroy the Lordship and deity of Jesus Christ, while Romanism obscures the worship of Christ by the closed Bible and saint worship.

The South is the last great stronghold and hope of the religion of the open Bible, and both from their peculiar doctrines and their numbers Baptists have the greatest opportunity and obligation to hold this great section for Jesus Christ and make it a center from which shall go out mighty forces of world re-

demption.

The flagrant attacks upon the deity of Christ challenge every true preacher and every church to gird themselves for great tasks. They mightily challenge us to throw the whole power of our body into a mighty missionary campaign Christ, in which there shall be much study and teaching of the Word and preaching of the Lordship of Christ and of other Bible doctrines. Home Mission and State Mission churches have been and will continue to be, not only centers of strong denominational spirit and of genuine progress; they have always been and will always be dependable centers of loyalty to the Word of God. To strengthen our Home Mission work is to strengthen the things that tend mightily in a day of gainsayers wolves in sheeps' clothing to enthrone Christ and crown Him Lord of all.

Through ten separate special Departments the Home Mission Board seeks to further the Kingdom of our Lord in

South. We recommend:

That our churches be encouraged to make a larger use of the splendid free Home Mission tracts issued by the Home Board, and to form study classes in the Board's new "Baptist Home Missions."

That clubs of subscribers be gotten in the churches for THE HOME FIELD. It is an exceedingly distressing and unworthy situation that only one Baptist preacher in five in the

South gets this splendid magazine.

3. We recommend that prayer be made in our churches for this great cause and for the saving and holding of the South for our Lord Jesus Christ, and that preachers be requested to preach

frequently on Home Mission subjects.

Report on Education.

There has been no time in recent years when a greater interest has been manifested in the cause of education in general than now, and at no time have the several evangelical churches manifested a greater interest in the success of their schools, whether established for their sons or for their daughters.

If the best thing that can happen to any young man is the adaptation of the individual to the purposes of God for his life, then surely no apology is needed for the position that young persons at a formative and impressional period of their lives

should be surrounded by proper religious influences.

Today, as perhaps never before, society faces knotty problems that need to be solved in the interests of humanity and truth. It is the ideal of Christian education to develop clear minds and strong personalities, which shall be able to do a manly and effective part in serving humanity's deeper interestand the Christian college has discovered that the men who, with trained minds, can do this, are those who have learned the truths men have taught, but still more the truth which is in Him who has given the world its only effective solvent of a selfcentered life, and taught each man that he is his brother's keeper.

Georgia Baptists have been the advocates of education from the earliest times our people seem to realize as never before this pregnant truth, that no denomination has ever reached great strength and fulfilled its highest mission apart from the support

of a strong denominational college.

We have Mercer University for young men, Bessie Tift and Shorter Colleges for young women, and a number of high schools. These schools are ours. They, along with the Seminary, have claims upon the gifts of us Baptists. All of them need help in meeting their current support. In view of the fact that those called to the ministry are for the most part financially unable to educate themselves without some aid, and in view of a more pressing need of a competent and educated ministry today, and in view of the "Mercer System" of schools, your committee recommends that the churches be urged to give liberally to these objects as specified in the schedule and we also recommend our Baptist schools as worthy the patronage, interest and prayers of our Baptist people.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL ASSOCIATION.

Article 1. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of Heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and

truth without any mixture or error for its matter.

Article 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in divine perfection.

Article 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal

ruin without defense or excuse.

Article 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is whol-

ly of grace through faith in the Son of God.

Article 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on the principles of righteousness, and not any work of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

Article 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no rspector of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted of

Article 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates,

sanctifies and saves sinners.

Article 8. We believe in "perseverance of the saints," that all those who are truly regenerated and born again, will ultimately be saved in heaven, that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

Article 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by convention in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that it is only

proper to have bishops or pastors and deacons.

Article 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper.

Article 11. We believe that communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ and been legally baptized.

Article 12. We believe in a general judgmnt and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from Heaven and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

This Association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2. This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches nor in any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will only be an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually from the body by ballot and

otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to

the ratification or revision of the Association.

7. He shall see that the brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall not have

voice in determining questions except in a case of a tie.

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it when required, and shall print and distribute the Minutes among the churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall from time to time appropriate to that purpose. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual Minute the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of the Bethel Association.

Association, give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association may order through her Executive Committee.

He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report to the Association for each fiscal year.

- II. The Association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed unless suspended for a special object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.
- 12. All motions when seconded must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by the mover. Substitutes and amendments shall always be in order.
- 13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the subject or use unbecoming or unbrotherly language.
- 14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of the members enrolled are present.
- 15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.
- 16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.
- 17. This Constitution and Rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the second, which shall be unalterable.
- 18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of five members, chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, and to fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

In the time given to miscellaneous, talks were made by Mrs. Hash and Mrs. Duggen on many phases of our work, obstacles that had been

overcome and general news given of state and convention work, and some of our beloved officers.

Report of Executive Committee and Report of Enrollment Committee.

Mrs. Hash requested Mrs. Duggan to lead in prayer for Miss Fannie
E. S. Heck, who is seriously ill in a hospital in Richmond, Va.

After another song we adjourned until 7:30 o'clock, when the public was invited to hear an address by Dr. Louis B. Warren, of Atlanta. Subject, "Housing Our Homeless Churches." The young ladies of Morgan presented some scenes from Training School, which made the work seem very near to us. The body gave a rising vote of thanks to the young ladies for this enjoyable feature.

The chairmen of the committees were ready to report, and the reports were read and adopted.

Constitution and By-Laws of Woman's Missionary Union of Bethel Baptist Association.

Preamble.

We, the Women of the Churches connected with the Bethel Association, desirous of stimulating a missionary spirit and the grace of giving among women and children of the churches, and wishing to aid in collecting funds for missionary purposes to be disbursed by the Boards and the W. M. U., organize adopt the following Constitution:

Article I. Name.

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of the Bethel Baptist Association.

Article II. Object.

The two-fold object of the Woman's Missionary Union shall be: 1st. To distribute missionary information and stimulate effort throughout the whole Association. 2nd, To secure the earnest, systematic co-operation of women and children in collecting and raising money for missions.

Article III. Officers.

The officers shall be a President; two Vice Presidents; a Corresponding and Recording Secretary and a Treasurer.

Article IV. Annual Meetings.

The Annual Meeting for the election of officers and the transaction of business shall be held each year at such time and place as may be determined at the previous Annual Meeting or by the Executive Committee.

Article V. Conduct of Meetings.
Every session of the W. M. U. shall be opened and closed with religious exercises.

BY-LAWS.

Article 1. Superintendent—The Supt. shall preside at the Annual Meeting of the W. M. U. and at all meetings of the Executive Committee; shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for; and shall be ex-officio a member of all standing committees. She may call special meetings of the Executive Committee when in her judgment needful, or at the request of three members of the Committee.

Art. 2. District Secretary—Dist. Secretaries shall seek to advance the interests of the Union in these communities, and preside at annual meetings in the absence of the Superintendent.

Art. 3. Secretary—The Recording Secretary shall keep accurate records of the annual and special meetings of the Union; shall notify officers of their election and committees of their appointment and shall perform the other duties usual to her office.

Art. 4. Treasurer—The Treasurer shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements of money, as reported to her from different churches or committees, and shall present a detailed report of all these accounts to each annual meeting. She shall perform all other duties usually pertaining to her office.

Art 5. Nominating Committee—The Nominating Committee shall be appointed by a nomination from the body of one representative from each district and two from the association at large.

Art. 6. Elections—The officers and members of the Executive Committee shall be nominated by a Nominating Commit-

tee on the afternoon of the last day of the meeting.

Art. 7.—The Executive Committee shall hold quarterly meetings for the transaction of business and shall report through its officers at each annual session of the Union.

Art. 8—The By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-

thirds majority vote at the annual meeting.

Report on Ministerial Relief.

Denominations besides our own in Georgia remember gratefully and generously their veterans. The time has arrived in our religious thought when our veterans must be given their rightful place. The Baptists pay beneficiaries of the relief fund

from five to ten dollars per month. We have forty-two ministers and twenty-six widows who receive aid from the State Board. Our minutes have a schedule that during the month of July a collection be taken for this cause. We recommend our pastors and churches bear in mind the importance of this July collection. Document No. 3.

Report of the Committee on Education.

Among the first attempts by Georgia Baptists toward higher education was that under the leadership of Jesse Mercer more than eighty years ago. At that time the "Old School," or Primitive Baptists, were much opposed to education of all kinds, religious or secular. This caused a division in the denomination and the branch which we now know as "Missionary Baptists" established Mercer University at Penfield in honor of a gentleman from Savannah who gave \$2,500 towards the institution. Later it was transferred to Macon and is now at the head of the Mercer system of schools. Today Mercer University has more than 300 students and property worth \$700,000. Its President is Dr. W. L. Pickard, and he and the faculty and the institution need the sympathy and cooperation of all members of the denomination in aiding this the first and greatest educational institution owned by the denomination in Georga.

Bessie Tift College, for young women, has a new President, J. H. Foster. This College has suffered for months past by reason of a large debt amounting to \$80,000. However, the building and grounds are worth three times this sum and the faculty and trustees earnestly hope that the friends of the institution will rally to its support and relieve it from embarassment.

Besides these two colleges, there are other private institutions like Shorter at Rome, Cox College at College Park Southern Female College at LaGrange, which are under Baptist auspices, although they are not the property of the Convention. These institutions are doing successful work and enjoying a large measure of prosperity.

The secondary schools which have been created under Baptist leaders are well worthy of the support of the denomination. Among these are the Norman Park Institute, Brewton-Parker Institute, Locust Grove Institute, Bunn-Belle Institute, Hia-

wassee and Blairsville and others.

Norman Park has been fostered largely through the generous kindness of Mr. J. B. Norman, for whom it is named. It

is one of the best of the high schools of South Georgia, and together with Brewton-Parker Institute, has always had a high place in the affections of the people. Many of us have patronized these two institutions and know of their value from personal experience. We need to stir up a sentiment that will give a liberal patronage to these schools and to foster a liberality that will make them the best in the South. They have nearly all gone beyond their strength through pride of leadership which induced them to stand among the highest and best.

In particular is there constant and pressing need for contributions to ministerial education. This fund should be included in the financial plans of our churches and should have the hearty

support of members everywhere.

Boys and girls trained under teachers who are not only capable intellectually, but consecrated spiritually, will be given a much better preparation for this life as well as the one to come and it is the duty of every Baptist to help, both by patronage and contribution these centers of light among us.

Report of Committee on Sunday Schools.

Your committee on Sunday Schools begs to submit the following report: A perusal of the letters sent up by the churches to this Association reveals the following facts concerning the state of our Sunday School work: Number of schools, 32 out of 41 churches reporting. In these schools 245 officers and teachers are engaged in the church's work of teaching. There is an enrollment of 2179, with an average attendance of 1552. As compared with last year, this is a gain of one school, 25 officers, 158 in enrollment and, best of all, 275 in average attendance. is encouraging when it is remembered that at least two of the non-reporting churches had schools last year. But a comparison of the two years grows more encouraging when we enter realm of finances. There has been an increase of \$234.05 in home expenditures, and of \$168.02 in benevolences. The comparison is still more encouraging in that as over against 89 baptisms from the schools last year, there have been this year 148. We note also that whereas there were no standard school last year, there are this year three A-1 and two Red Seal Schools. Schools are Arlington, Cuthbert and Shellman; the Read Seal, Morgan and Herod.

To the minds of your committee these comparisons are indeed encouraging. They reveal a growth of Sunday school thought and purpose in our Association. We would recommend that the Sunday school forces keep up their enthusiasm work constantly toward the Standard of A-I Excellence, and lay emphasis on efficient work, both in management and teaching. Document No. 5.

Report on State Missions.

State Missions had its inception in the broad co-operative plan of work. This was expressed in the associational idea: churches bound together by the spirit of love, thus increasing their workable strength and broadening their field of usefulness. Verily God led our forefathers in the democratic associational idea, broadening into the General Association of Virginia, the Tri-ennial Convention, into the present organized plan of work.

The State Mission Board is composed of twenty-five men, elected annually. They receive no pay for services rendered, but contribute very largely to the work of the State. State missions is at the base, it is fundamental and when it suffers, all other interests suffer. Many of our states are not specially emphasizing state missions and their progress and growth are not in keeping with the states that are caring for state interests.

Sunday School Work—State Missions supports Sunday School work in the state, and during the last ten years marked progress has been made. Ten years ago we had fewer than eighty thousand pupils enrolled in the state; today we have more than two hundred thousand. The increase in number of schools

for this same period have more than six hundred.

B. Y. P. U. Work—In the short period of two years we have grown from fifty to two hundred and fifty Senior Unions. In the Junior department we had only four organizations two years ago and now we have over fifty. About ten thousand young people in this department of church work are now en-

rolled preparing for church efficiency.

State Evangelism—State evangelism has a large place in our church progress and life. The State Board in fostering this work is meeting a long felt need and is reaping a rich harvest. Last year the evangelists working under the Board preached 2,500 sermons and gave us an increase in membership of 2,500. We feel that every pastor in the state ought to co-operate with the Board in putting out and keeping the best talent of our ministry in this work.

Woman's Work—Woman's Work is fostered by the State

Board and this verily is one of the live departments of our state work. To take from our state denominational work the activity prayers, sacrifices and money contributed by our noble women would very largely hinder us in our progressive lines of endeavor. This is becoming one of our livest factors in state denominational life.

We have not the space to give worthy attention to the work of the State Board as they care for the aged and infirm ministers, the training of the young preacher, both in college and the seminary, and stand between the denomination and the hungry orphan. The State is the pinnacle on which we stand and breathe the Christ love and catch the Christ vision of a lost world and see a world need. We begin at Jerusalem and travel on into a world outlook. So the State Board with argus eyes and cars unstopped see and hear the cry for help from both the Home and Foreign Boards. They are often humiliated when they can not respond to these worthy fields for lack of funds.

Assistance Given Last Year—Two hundred churches received aid last year to the amount of twenty thousand dollars. Many of these churches had waited several years because funds were not adequate to the demands. The result of this assistance, several thousand were added to the church membership. Seventy churches asked for help and to the humiliation of the Board, no assistance was given. No wonder our State Secretary has been stirred to the sowing down of our grand old State in literature, "Redcem Georgia."

The Situation—We have not the latest news from the office and can not say as to whether or not the State debt will be paid ere the coming together of the State Convention. Seventy thousand dollars in round numbers has been our task, some have been, yes many have been faithful, and we have reasons to believe that the debt will be greatly reduced.

Truly and reasonably our Secretary has said, "God's call rings clear to 2,400 Baptist churches, and in round numbers 300-000 thousand Baptists." It is not only reasonable that we should pay the debt, but we can and must place the money in his hands to begin the planning of the work in Georgia on a much larger scale. God expects it of us, it must be done. May the Christ spirit of complete co-operation travel from association to association, from church to church, from church member to church member until we shall stand as one solid phalanx, each doing his part to "Redeem" Georgia" and fully carry out the great commission of the Lord. Report of Committee on Home Missions.

Your committee begs to submit the following report: Home Missions means missions in the United States. The work is divided into two parts, known as the Northern Baptists and the Southern Baptists, which meet at the Mason and Dixon Line. The Southern Baptists have a Board located at Atlanta, Ga., which looks after the mission business in the South. They receive all mission money sent to them for that purpose and distril ute the same to such place as they see fit. Our forefathers thought that such a work would be good and it has proven to be. Paul said that he pressed towards the mark of the high calling and in like manner we have got to press our claims in the name of our Lord and Christ. There are many things to confront us; the wicked and ungodly are denying that there is a God; there are others who claim that there is a God but have endeavored to so construe the Scriptures as to make it suit their own lust and fancy. There must be some one to teach and preach the Truth as it is in Christ Jesus. We love our Home Field and if we would occupy it, we must fill it up with churches and preach and teach in them. It will take thousands of money and workers to establish the work and maintain it. We would like to see the day when every Missionary Baptist on the Home Field would be willing to sacrifice something for the Lord's cause. We are about ten thousand dollars behind last year, and may the Lord help us to educate our people to more liberal giving, that more people may be saved and that God may be more glori-Respectfully submitted, fied.

Document No. 7.

Report on Foreign Missions.

Georgia Baptists stood at the head of all the Southern States in her gifts to foreign missions for a number of years, reaching the banner year in 1912, till last year she took third place in the rank of the States.

On the other hand, the Bethel Association has continued to climb in gifts to foreign missions, the last report showing the largest contributions to this cause in its history, not including

special gifts.

Let us turn now and take the larger view of the work by making some comparisons of what has been done in the foreign field. Last year there was 67 per cent more baptisms on the foreign field than the total number of members on all the foreign fields, after Southern Baptists had been at work for fifty years. The question then may be rightly asked, why is it that greater

results were shown last year than the first fifty years of foreign mission work by Southern Baptists? This is explained in no little degree from the fact that the past two decades, following the first fifty years of mission work, witnessed the introduction of methods in the work that had not been used previously, viz: mission schools, publication plants, hospitals and medical dispensaries. Such methods of mission work referred to were not used, scarcely at all, during the first half century of foreign mission work by Southern Baptists.

Shall we not uphold and liberally support a work that can accomplish more in one year than was accomplished in fifty years? Indeed it seems that the eyes of Southern Baptists at last were opened to the fact that these are the self same methods that the Savior himself used. For did he not go about over the country teaching, healing and preaching the gospel of the

Kingdom?

In our schools the native Christians are trained for service among their own people, at the same time these schools become centers of evangelization. It is a fact that if a foreign country is ever won for Christ it must be done largely through the natives themselves. The foreign missionary therefore can multiply himself many times by giving his time to the training of the native converts for service. This holds true even in our own land.

Our hospitals, also, become a very fruitful source of evangelism. When we understand that in heathen countries the people know nothing of the modern treatment and cure of discases, then we can realize the necessity of this work in reaching the people. After pain is soothed and disease banished by modern treatment, then our medical missionaries and native Christian physicians can bring the message of the great Physician straight home to the sin sick soul, when before, this blessing of healing was brought to them they could not be reached. Did not our Master Himself find His way straight home to the hearts of the people by reaching out His hand to heal?

It might be well then for us to notice some statistics in connection with this glorious work. On the foreign fields we have 337 day schools with 34 boarding schools and 2 institutions of college grade. Also we have ten theological seminaries where the Christian men who have yielded themselves to the Lord to preach, can be equipped for their life's work. The native Christian women are also taught, in five training schools, a knowledge of the Bible, so as to become efficient "Bible women" or trained

workers for carrying the gospel to their own sex.

We have 13 medical missionaries and 8 hospitals, with 11 medical dispensaries. In these hospitals and medical dispensar-

ies there were over 56,000 patients treated the past year.

It is, therefore, a great source of regret that our Foreign Mission Board is in debt, in view of the great and glorious work being done. With over two and a half million Southern Baptists, an average of fifty cents per member per year would mean a million and a quarter dollars for this work. As it is, we only

gave last year an average of about 22 cents per member.

The Home Base—It would seem then that the great work to be done, now, is to enlist our own people at home in fully carrying out the marching orders of our Lord as laid down in the great commission. This can be done as has been attempted with no little degree of success by the Home Department of the Foreign Mission Board, and our own State Mission Board. And following out this idea of the enlistment of the churches, it has been undertaken in our Association with bright hopes of success in the future. And it might not be out of place to commend this work to our churches, as has been undertaken by the Executive Committee during the past year. And we earnestly ask the co-operation of all our churches in the church to church campaigns undertaken in the Association, the appointment of mission committees in each church for the purpose of making an every member canvass in every church.

Also as a means of quickening interest, and therefore enlisting the organization of Mission Study Classes in all our churches, the reading and study of mission literature that can be had cheaply from our Foreign Mission Board at Richmond, together with the reading of the Foreign Mission Journal.

Let's notice, in conclusion, briefly the reaction of the foreign mission enterprise on the home churches. For instance, the campaign by Southern Baptists to raise the Judson Centennial Fund of a million and a quarter dollars, with which to better equip our work on the foreign field has been rapidly followed all over the south by increased activity in raising funds to better equip and strengthen our educational and benevolent institutions. Over one million of this fund is already provided for and the goal is in sight. The campaign must close May 1, 1916. Let us all have part in these months that remain in completing this great enterprise.

New zeal and impetus has been quickened in almost every phase of the work at home by our foreign mission endeavor. Is it not then as the blessed Master has said, "Give and it shall be given unto you." "Go ye into all the world," etc. and "Lo,

I am with you always, even unto the end of the world."

If we fail to go or to give to send others who are pleading to go, we shall fail to receive, and fail to have the presence of our blessed Master with us.

Document No. 9.

Report on Laymen's Movement,

One of the hindrances to the progress of world-wide evangelization, and the ushering in of the kingdom of our Lord, is the indifference of our laymen. The larger part of them act as though they had no part in the great work. The spirit of commercialism has taken hold of them so completely that they appear more interested in chasing the dollars than in aiding the work of our Lord and Master. This may be the result of several causes, one of which is the mercenary spirit prevailing in all the departments of our church life.

The tendency of the teaching and preaching, in this day and time is too largely, that, the chief aim of Christian service is to develop more largely the spirit of giving, as though our Lord was a pauper and we were taking up a collection to keep Him and the angels from starving. The teaching that obedience is

better than giving is too largely a thing of the past.

I would not lay less stress on the grace of giving, far be it, but rather more on the grace of obedient service, which takes in and includes the grace of giving. No department of church work can prosper as it should without money. And you can easily know the spiritual condition of any church by ascertaining the condition of its treasury. When Paul's instructions "to let the grace of liberality the more to abound among you" are obeyed, then the treasury will be full and the grace of loving service will flow in every heart and life.

One of the greatest needs of the churches today is the development of its laymen to a greater and broader service. It was Paul who said "These things I commit to faithful men." It used to be that the prayer meetings were the church meetings, led by the members appointed from week to week, and in that way the laymen were developed, the pastor taking his time with the others. But now it is the preacher's meeting, who lec-

tures to a handful of the faithful, and empty benches, and the laymen are called on for often contributions and occasional prayers. This is about the extent of the opportunity given them

for developing their gifts.

We feel that there is no greater work, and none more sadly needed, within the bounds of our Association than the development of our laymen. To that end, we recommend that this matter be placed in the hands, and made a part of the duties, of the Executive Committee. And that they be requested to give this a prominent place in the coming year's work.

Document No. 10.

Report on Orphans' Home.

We your committee, beg to report the following concerning our Orphans' Home: It comprises at present about 70 acres of land (about 50 in cultivation), nice school, infirmary, laundry, barns, etc., valued at about \$250,000, all paid except about \$500.

There are about 250 children, three-fourths of them from 3 to 12 years old, the others from 12 to 17 years. Every child is either in school or doing kindergarten work. The larger boys do all the farm work under the supervision of a capable farmer, and produce various food products needed in the home's kitchen throughout the year. The girls help with the cooking and

house work in general.

For two years a class in telegraphy was conducted by a competent instructor, under whose direction about 15 graduates were turned out and were readily given employment by companies needing their services. Your committee is indeed sorry to report that this class has been discontinued by order of the Executive Board for lack of funds to support it; thus has the usefulness of the Home along the line of fitting the children, turned out as men and women, for some specific profession, been seriously impaired. The Home has cared for about 800 children

since its organization.

Its present current expenses are around \$3,000 per month, and for the past few months the usual contributions have fallen off out of all proportion to any possible reduction in the expense account, and besides causing the manager embarassment at being unable to meet his obligations when due, has caused him to call very urgently upon Georgia Baptists for some system of regular financial support; and furthermore, has caused the committee on maintenance to advise the managers to receive no more orphans until the Home is relieved of its present financial embarassment.

The committee wishes to make special mention of the manner in which the children are cared for in the Home. Every child old enough is in school under the competent supervision and guidance of four teachers. On Sunday the children all attend their Sunday school, preaching services and the various little societies for little Christians. The children are being brought up under the very best possible sanitary conditions and a physician's services are very rarely necessary.

The committee wishes to express their sincere appreciation of the way the Home is conducted, and pray that God's blessings may continue with the Superintendent and his large fam-

Document No. 12.

Report of Executive Committee of Bethel Association.

Your committee the past year, realizing that in the "Great Commission" are contained the marching orders for the Lord's people, endeavored to act upon its directions. We must evangelize and baptize, but we must not forget, also, to "educationize." These directions come in their order. And our people who have been evangelized and baptized must be taught the observance of "all things" whatsoever our Lord has commanded.

The first great duty, therefore, of the disciples of our Lord is to make disciples of the nations. Each follower of Christ is therefore to become a channel through which the knowledge of His saving grace is to be made known to the world. As an aid to the inspiration of our people in this great task, Christ laid out for His followers a knowledge of the "field" is also necessary,

the knowledge of conditions on the field, including needs and opportunities as well as successes already won. Did He not say to the disciples to "Lift up your eyes and look upon the fields

already white unto the harvest?"

Our Lord knew the importance of the "eye," through which a knowledge of the "fields" might be had. It is said by those who are supposed to know that eighty-five per cent. of all we learn comes through the eye. Realizing that our people could not personally "look upon the fields," in which Southern Baptists are doing work in the world in carrying out the great commission, but that something of this work could be seen by means of stereopticon lectures, in the use of which illustrated lectures were given, were shown at a number of our churches. These lectures were followed up by the discussion of subjects calculated to revive and quicken interest in all the work fostered by our churches. Pursuing this work a number of rallies were held in almost every district of the Association, in which undertaking the committee was greatly aided by the W. M. U. of the Association.

At a mteeting of the committee at Cuthbert on January 25th it was decided to buy a stereopticon, by which means the illustrated lectures were given as outlined above. The committee, however, found itself without means to buy the machine, or to meet the necessary expenses involved in connection with its work. The chairman of the committee, however, agreed to furnish sufficient funds to help meet initial payment on the stereopticon, as the appended financial statement will show. Also the W. M. U. agreed to help in the purchase of the machine. Having thus a start, the committee went ahead bought the stereopticon, and commenced work, depending on the churches to back them up in the work. It will be noticed, however that the amount of the loan made the committee is still due, sufficient funds having come in from several of the churches, in addition to voluntary offerings taken where tures were given, to nkeet the incidental expenses, of the tures, and meet the balance due on the machine, in addition to the amount due the chairman of the committee, which indebtedness should at once be met. See financial statement below.

An invitation was extended to Dr. Cree, our Corresponding Secretary, to meet with the committee at Arlington, on July 15, to which Dr. Cree responded. The pastors of the Association, together with the leading laymen of the Association, were invited to be present to meet with our Secretary, Dr. Cree, to which invitation a number of the pastors and laymen responded. At the above meeting with Dr. Cree a plan of work was outlined, by which it was hoped that every church in the Associa-

tion might be reached in the interest of State Missions, which

plan has been largely carried out.

The following recommendations, to the body now in session were passed at a meeting of the committee at Cuthbert on September 27th:

"First: The committee recommends the appointment of

a general Associational field worker.

"Second: That the churches be called upon for funds, in co-operation with the State Board of Missions, to provide sufficient salary to employ said Associational worker for his whole time, provided a suitable man, in the judgment of the executive committee, can be obtained for this work.

"Third: That in case such a man can not be obtained, the churches be asked to take collections for Associational missions, in order to meet the necessary expense funds of the executive committee in carrying forward mission work within our bounds."

Document No. 13.

Report on Woman's Work.

Your committee submits the following report:

The Woman's Mission Work dates back over 1900 years, when the Galilean Society of women ministered unto Christ of their substance.

The women are still engaged in the grandest and greatest undertakings, that of aiding in the ushering in of the coming of Christ's kingdom. Would that we had time and space to rehearse all the early history of woman's organized work, but we have not. We pass on to the work of the women within the bounds of this association.

About fifteen years ago the women organized societies thus preparing themselves for definite endeavor along the lines of stimulating the missionary spirit and grace of giving among the women and children of the churches and aiding in collecting funds for missionary purposes to be distributed by the Board of the Georgia Baptist Convention. The results have been marvelous—twenty-six churches out of the forty six have organizations with a total number of forty-eight societies, six of which were organized the past year. The work grows more complete each year.

As to Education—Believing that information begets inspiration, mission study classes are organized, missionary tracts and booklets are dstributed, and the Circulating Library owned by the Georgia W. B. M. U. is sent free upon application. These have proven very helpful factors in the broadening of scope of vision. We have only to use it prayerfully to get closer to

Christ in His world plan for a lost world.

As to Contributions—Six years ago the W. M. U. was asked to give one thousand dollars and this year the annual report is nineteen hundred and sixty dollars. These apportionments are met not by high pressure methods, but by systematic giving, week by week, and month by month. This they believe to be the Bible plan and God is prospering them. This apportionment is ever kept before them and during the entire year there is a striving to reach their Standard of Excellence, and to be placed on the Honor Roll. A Bible consciousness of duty and privilege, together with that of loyalty and spirit to one another, stimulates them to this high point of spiritual activity.

Besides the regular work, they have undertaken to raise quite a large amount, known as the Emma L. Amos Memorial

Church Building Fund.

As a Force of Inspiration—Behind all the organized Woman's Work must be realized the silent inspirational force. It gives encouragement to the pulpit, training to the youth pray-

erful response to the church, and denominational appeals. No plan is adopted by the women of the Bethel Association without first having sought in prayer the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Their Ideal and Aim is a W. M. U. organization in every church, and every woman and child a member of one of the five grades. This will necessitate the spending of much energy in both prayer and toil, but nothing less should be the ideal of the Bethel Association. We, as your committee, insist that the pastors and laymen of all our churches pledge to them our full co-operation and support in this one of the great works of our Master. With the co-operation of all the pastors and laymen, we fully believe that with the present energetic body of intelligent women workers at our next annual session that we will find organized effort in every church in our Association.

Report on Temperance.

Although Georgia boasts of a prohibition law, although 18 other States of the Union are nominally dry, we have by no means solved the liquor problem, which is such a menace to our civilization and a stumbling block to Christianity. When the United States has national prohibition, which is probable in the near future, we will still have another serious difficulty to overcome, that of eliminating secret distilleries and private distribution. Is this a problem of the church? Does it concern the interests of the kingdom of God? Yes, for everything which blights hope in the human breast which blasts ideals, which ruins character and destroys the physical, mental or spiritual being of man, demands the earnest attention of the forces of righteousness.

Just how to enlist in this campaign against liquor and its influence is a problem to be solved in the light of local conditions. First, know whether there is any liquor in your community, observe closely, and at the opportune time assist in every possible way the civil authorities to bring the alleged guilty party to justice. This procedure is used by all honest citizens, more or less, but unfortunately, too late. The way to work against intemperance is to never allow. Prevent it instea!

The secular papers, which to a great extent, have their part in filling the minds of their readers with hostility, should be avoided as much as possible, and their places filled with wholesome Christian literature; therefore, your committee recommends for home reading such literature as the Christian Index, the Home Field, the Foreign Mission Journal, ect. Article I. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of Heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and

truth without any mixture or error for its matter.

Article 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in divine perfection.

Article 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal

ruin without defense or excuse.

Article 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is whol-

ly of grace through faith in the Son of God.

Article 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on the principles of righteousness, and not any work of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

Article 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no rspector of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted of Him.

Article 7. We believe the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates,

sanctifies and saves sinners.

Article 8. We believe in "perseverance of the saints," that all those who are truly regenerated and born again, will ultimately be saved in heaven, that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

Article 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by convention in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that it is only

proper to have bishops or pastors and deacons.

Article 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper.

Article II. We believe that communion is a church ordinance: that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ and been legally baptized.

Article 12. We believe in a general judgmnt and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from Heaven and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

This Association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2. This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches nor in any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will only be an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually from the body by ballot and

otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to

the ratification or revision of the Association.

7. He shall see that the brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall not have

voice in determining questions except in a case of a tie.

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it when required, and shall print and distribute the Minutes among the churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall from time to time appropriate to that purpose. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual Minute the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of the Bethel Association.

To. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the Association, give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association may order through her Executive Committee. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report to the Association for each fiscal year.

adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed unless suspended for a special object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the

regular order of the house.

12. All motions when seconded must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by the mover. Substitutes and amendments

shall always be in order.

13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the subject or use unbecoming or unbrotherly language.

14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of

the members enrolled are present.

15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.

16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.

17. This Constitution and Rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the second,

which shall be unalterable.

18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of five members, chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, and to fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

Constitution and By-Laws of Woman's Missionary Union of Bethel Baptist Association.

Preamble.

We, the Women of the Churches connected with the Bethel Association, desirous of stimulating a missionary spirit and the grace of giving among women and children of the churches, and wishing to aid in collecting funds for missionary purposes to be disbursed by the Boards and the W. M. U., organize and adopt the following Constitution:

Article I. Name.

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of the Bethel Baptist Association.

Article II. Object.
The two-fold object of the Woman's Missionary Union shall be: 1st. To distribute missionary information and stimulate effort throughout the whole Association. 2nd, To secure the earnest, systematic co-operation of women and children in collecting and raising money for missions.

Article III. Officers.

The officers shall be a President; two Vice Presidents; a Corresponding and Recording Secretary and a Treasurer.

Article IV. Annual Meetings.
The Annual Meeting for the election of officers and the transaction of business shall be held each year at such time and place as may be determined at the previous Annual Meeting or by the Executive Committee.

Article V. Conduct of Meetings.

Every session of the W. M. U. shall be opened and closed with religious exercises.

BY-LAWS.

Article 1. Superintendent—The Supt. shall preside at the Annual Meeting of the W. M. U. and at all meetings of the Executive Committee; shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for; and shall be ex-officio a member of all standing committees. She may call special meetings of the Executive Committee when in her judgment needful, or at the request of three members of the Committee.

Art. 2. District Secretary—Dist. Secretaries shall seek to advance the interests of the Union in these communities, and preside at annual meetings in the absence of the Superintendent.

Art. 3. Secretary—The Recording Secretary shall keep accurate records of the annual and special meetings of the Union; shall notify officers of their election and committees of their appointment and shall perform the other duties usual to her office.

Art. 4. Treasurer—The Treasurer shall keep an accurate

account of all receipts and disbursements of money, as reported to her from different churches or committees, and shall present a detailed report of all these accounts to each annual meeting She shall perform all other duties usually pertaining to her office.

Art 5. Nominating Committee—The Nominating Committee shall be appointed by a nomination from the body of one representative from each district and two from the association

at large.

Art. 6. Elections—The officers and members of the Executive Committee shall be nominated by a Nominating Commit-

tee on the afternoon of the last day of the meeting.

Art. 7.—The Executive Committee shall hold quarterly meetings for the transaction of business and shall report through its officers at each annual session of the Union.

Art. 8—The By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-

thirds majority vote at the annual meeting.

Document No. 1.

Report on B. Y. P. U.

Young people's work in the South is comparatively new, having been begun as a definite organization in 1895. It is still newer in Bethel Association. The need that the B. Y. P. U. fills, however, has been felt for a long time, and be it said to our shame, that we have been so long in trying to fill that need.

The Baptist Young People's Union is the Baptist church at work, in, for and among its young people; or it is a Baptist church doing for its young members what the seminary does for young preachers. Is there not a great need for this among our young Baptists?

Southern Baptists can well boast of their strength numerically. 2,500,000 soldiers, but very few trained for active service. Not nearly all are able to give a reason for their being Baptists. So many are called Christians, but unable to defend Christianity.

Within our Association there are about 4,000 Baptists, every one of us needing training, more or less. It is safe to estimate that one-sixth of this number should be enlisted in B. Y. P. U. work. According to the letters sent in, there are only 12 unions in our bounds, with a membership of about 225. In our whole State there are 450 unions with a membership of 15,000.

The Bethel was organized into an Association March 24 1916, when messengers from six churches came together at Fort Gaines. For two days our State Secretary, F. H. Leavell, was with us teaching the manual. Inspirational addresses were given between class periods by local pastors and Walter Binns, of Atlanta. who is now attending Mercer.

The Associational organization is upon the same basis as the individual union idea: one president and four vice-presidents in different sections. Our organization has not been perfected as yet, as we have only two vice-presidents, Miss Opal Payne of Shellman and J. L. Claxton of Edison.

The next annual meeting will be held at Shellman on Friday and Saturday before the fourth Sunday in March, 1916. If your church has a union, be sure to send messengers.

Let us work and pray that our young people may get proper training. Respectfully submitted,

Report on Woman's Work.

When the Woman's Missionary Union was adopted as an auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention it was with a great deal of misgiving on the part of some of the brethren that this work should be so recognized. The marvelous growth of the Union, the great work that they have done and are doing is a vital answer to every objection that might have been put forward.

In the constitution of the Union of Bethel Association we find that the purpose of the organization is to stimulate interest in Missions and aid in the collection of funds to be spent in Missionary purposes by our Boards. Let us see what has been

done in the Bethel Association in carrying out this purpose.

In stimulating there are 791 members of the union, and all of these are directly interested in the cause of missions. Since the association last met there have been 172 new members enrolled into the different societies. Truly this advance should be highly gratifying to the members of the Union and should be the means of inspiration to every church in the bounds of our Association.

As to the collection of funds for missionary purposes, they have exceeded the expectations and the Woman's Missionary Union now sends more money to our Boards than the entire Boards raised when the Union was recognized by our Convention. The progress of the Union in Bethel Association can be seen from the following figures. In the year 1914 they gave the total of \$1679.24. In 1915 they reported a total of \$2555.75 and in this year's report they bring the total to \$2656.00. We see that they have fulfilled the purpose of their organization.

Our Woman's Union has done more than that for which they were organized. They have shown to Southern Baptists and to all the world a perfected organism, with every part performing its function, and have kept this organism with all its parts subject to the Father, relying on Him at all times and

also giving to Him all the praise and glory.

Let us, brethren not only give to these consecrated women our support and our prayers, but also learn from them the lesson of more system, more prayer, more subjection to divine guidance. Respectfully submitted,

Report on Religious Education.

To the Bethel Baptist Association:

Original, individual thinkers are what the church of God needs today, and there is no way of obtaining them except through religious education. We need laymen and ministers who can think, will think, and do think, for themselves, not only in their daily life but for God, and of God.

The trouble with us is, that most of us are copyists—we are eternally thinking the thoughts of some one else and doing the things which we have seen some one else do; when, in fact, we should speak out in the clean, clear brilliance of original thinkers and as servants and workers of our Master. When our Educational Systems shall turn out men and women with that qualification, then soon will the Greatness of God, and the development of His kingdom, be assured, not only to our United States, but to all the Nations of the World.

The purpose of education is to learn people how to think, when to think, and what to think. May I not ask the question, are we getting that result from the system of education we now have? Think of it our General Assembly appropriates two million, five hundred thousand dollars annually to our Public Schools, and other large sums to higher education, aside from the funds donated for Denominational Education. we getting value received, or are we just simply learning men how to make more money, or commercialize the world instead of christianizing it.

The promotion of the Kingdom of God must be accomplished through men and women trained to and with the belief that knowing the Master and recognizing Him as the source of all knowledge, is the only real education, and that there is in fact no education unless there is absolute recognition of the dependence of man upon the saving grace of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Education is the learning how to recognize and respect the rights and liberties of others without destroying or mo-lesting the good. That kind of education is what we must have and what we shall have if we determine as the servants and workers of our Master that we will make no compromise with ourselves or others, in advancing religious education.

We are already in possession of the means to advance re-

ligious education in that we have Mercer University for young men, Bessie Tift and Shorter College for young women, and numerous other high schools for both boys and girls, they together with our seminaries claim not only our patronage, but our donations. So, let's see to it that Baptists give their boys and girls to these schools and colleges that are operated and managed by Baptists for Baptists. If we expect results from our schools and colleges we have got to back them up, not by talk, but by material acts. In this day and time society is demanding men and women whose hearts shall be likewise educated as the mind, so that the best will be obtainable for humanity by individuals.

Report of Committee on Sunday Schools.

We, your Committee on Sunday Schools, beg to submit the following report: From the letters sent up by the churches we glean some interesting facts, which we contrast with last year's report: We find it impossible to make a full report, because out of the 46 churches composing the Association, we have reports at present from only 37. From these we find that there are 30 schools, having 233 officers and teachers, with an enrollment of 2126 pupils. We are sorry to note that the average attendance is only 67 per cent of the total enrollment and that the number of church members is only 45 per cent of the enrollment. Yet this is a far better report than was made last year.

We have also to regretfully note that the number of baptisms from the schools were only 126. This is a decrease of

22 as compared with last year.

We are pleased to report that the number in the Teacher's Training Classes has far outdistanced last year's report. Then there were only 8; this year there were 31. The Association has three A-1 standard schools—Cuthbert, Arlington and Shellman.

The financial statistics show that our schools have expensed for home purposes \$2215.22, an increase of \$703.79 over the last report. But in benevolences they show a decrease of \$779.36 as against \$966.41 for last year. The totals are this year \$2477.84, an increase of \$516.74.

Recommendations

t. That the Sunday School Secretaries be more careful in itemizing the data for the Associational letters.

2. That our schools stress Teacher's Training Classes.

3. That our officers and teachers give more earnest attention to teaching missions and the duty of giving to their support.

4. That each school inaugurate and persistently prosecute a campaign to enlist the church members in their work.

Document No. 7.

Report on Home Missions.

Your committee begs leave to submit the following report: Missions may be divided into four groups, Associational, State, Home and Foreign. Home Missions cover the Southern Baptist Convention territory. There is great need for Home Missions, as there is a large per cent of people in our towns and cities that never go inside of a church. These are our own people and our churches and pastors can not reach them. But when the missionary comes among them they will give him a hearing.

There is also a large number of foreigners now among us. These bring their ideas with them and this is especially true about their religion. Remember that all of them are immortal and must spend eternity somewhere, and that they are all sinners by nature and by practice and that nothing can save them but the gospel of Jesus. And for the gospel to save it must be believed, and to believe it must be heard, and to be heard it must be preached, and to be preached the preacher must be sent and those that have the gospel are the ones to send it, and there are no other people that hold the gospel as the Baptists do; and therefore it is their duty to send it. Our love for God ought to move us to do so, and when we remember how much it has done for us we ought to be glad to send it.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, located at Atlanta, Georgia, has for seventy-one years been the exponent of our united Southern Baptist body for saving our own land. The story of the achievements of its missionaries in bringing lost men to Christ surpasses that of any similar agency in America. Last year the number of baptisms reported by its workers was 43.792 and the number brought into the churches was 71.386. After the Negro baptisms are counted out, twenty per cent of the baptisms reported by Southern Baptist churches last year were by missionaries supported wholly or in part by the Home Mission Board and thir-

teen per cent by missionaries supported by no other agency than the Home Mission Board.

At the same time, our Board, through its Enlistment Department and Mission Schools and otherwise, is doing each year a larger work of developing the unplanted life in our churches—which is missions and which is today one of the most strenuous and appearing tasks that still confronts us. Baptists both count and weigh but the very largeness of our successful outreach has made for us an intensive task which may well cause us to tremble with a sense of responsibility, while it should also make us rejoice with a realization of our almost unmatched opportunity.

For the first time in many years our Board reported—at the last Convention a significant debt of \$72,000. At the same time if the \$102,000 be counted which was raised in cash and subscriptions during the year for the Church Building—Loan Fund, the record for the year was more than \$50,000 above the year preceding.

Deeply impressed with the large and crying needs which are to be met in the present year, our Board, at the Annual Meeting in May was not daunted. The debt was put in the budget of the present year. Some retrenchment was necessary where retrenchment cut to the quick, but our Board felt that it must do what it believed the churches would have to do, and is confident that the present year's work will surpass even the splendid record of the past year.

Cuba, Panama, Co-operative Missions, Evangelism, Church Building, Mountain Schools, Foreigners, Indians, Negroes, Educational Publicity, Enlistment—each of these names covers great and needed activities in the Board—some larger than others—all essential. In this report it is impossible to tell of air these tasks, but this is done in the Board's admirable traces and Annual Report, which may be had for the asking.

We recommend:

A. That our churches be encouraged and urged to order and make a larger use of the Board's free tracts on Home Missions and of its admirable Mission Study Books, suitable either for classes the general reader, or for use in prayer meeting talks and sermons. These books sound a needed note of denominational loyalty.

2. That subscribers be gotten in every church for The Home and Foreign Mission Magazine, to be published by the

Sunday School Board at Nashville, Tenn.

3. Inasmuch as our Board is not making an extra appeal

to raise the balance of the debt, we feel that each of our churches should be all the more determined to raise its full appotionment for Home Missions and that the money should be raised and sent in regularly, rather than at the close of the year.

4. To this end we recommend that the Association adopt as its apportionment \$......, the amount suggested by our State Apportionment Committee, and that our executive committee (or a special committee) be requested to apportion this among the churches.

Document No. 8.

Report on Foreign Missions.

A comparison of the Foreign Mission Report of the Southern Baptist Convention of 1916, with that of former years, shows that the past year has been one of unprecedented vance at home and one of triumphant success in the fields beyond the seas. The total amount of cash raised including the \$180,000.00 debt and \$288,401.13 on the Judson Centennial Fund of \$1,250,000.00, which was completed if we count unpaid subscriptions, was \$806,729.00; \$598,638.05 was expended for current support of the work, while only \$505,485.77 was sent in by our churches for this purpose. When we deduct the amount taken out for expenses of the State Boards only \$478,772.01 actually reached the Foreign Board for current support. the salaries of secretaries, office expenses, campaign and missionaries at home only 8.3 per cent was required. So we see that about 92c out of every dollar that reaches the Board tually gets on the foreign field. This is better than that ported by any other Board in America. The deficit of \$26,713.76 brought the current debt up to \$180,000.00, which was raised in June and July of this year. Of this amount our Association gladly contributed about \$400.00 of the \$12 294.12 sent up by the State of Georgia. In current support of the work we find Georgia has come back to second place again. Virginia leads with \$76,243.54; Georgia gave \$51.651.65; North Carolina \$51,-148.62, and Texas \$41,700.02. Of this amount Bethel Association gave last year \$1042.52, while this year the gifts amount to \$1300.32, an increase of \$356.81, which, however, includes gifts to the debt and to the Judson Fund.

Last year we had 298 missionaries: this year we have 315—133 men and 182 women. During the year 6471 converts were

baptized and 77 churches were constituted. We have 42,632 members in 459 churches, 94 of which are self-supporting. Tithing is a test of fellowship in many churches and in Brazil the gifts amounted to \$5.72 per member. These churches have their own associations and home and foreign mission boards. Twenty-two new missionaries were sent out, but the fields are calling for 156 more now. Besides the churches mentioned, we have 462 Sunday schools, with 10,490 pupils, 453 mission schools with 13,531 students. Of these six are Women's Bible Training Schools with 200 students, ten are Theological Seminaries with 191 students. We also have 19 medical missionaries, nine hospitals and ten dispensaries. These physicians treated 74,866 patients last year.

We heartily and prayerfully urge that our churches make use of the large number of free tracts published by our Board at Richmond; also that the consolidated magazine, The Home and Foreign Field be widely read, that mission study classes be organized for both men and women, that we continue observe Missionary Day in our Sunday Schools and that we teach missions in sermons and rallies. We further recommend that we enable our work to keep out of debt by having in all churches every-member canvasses and urge every member to pay his part systematically and regularly and that funds be forwarded at least monthly to our State Board of Missions in

Atlanta

Baptists were pioneers in Missionry, Bible and Sunday School Work. We have advanced; others follow. We must not lose our leadership. Respectfully submitted,

Document No. 9.

Our State Work, Including State Missions.

State Missions is fundamental in all our work. It is the base of supplies. The State Board is the means of coherency among Georgia Baptists. We need to augment the influence of the State Board in order that Baptists from every part of the State shall be brought into sympathy and helpful relation to every other part of the State.

State Missions is in obedience to Christ's commission to His disciples: "Ye shall be witnesses unto Me, both in Jerusalem and in all Judea." The churches of the State are endeav-

oring through the Mission Board to do all the work required by our Master throughout our bounds. Jesus says: "Heal the sick." We are trying to do this in a Christian way through the Georgia Baptist Hospital. As Baptists we have been slow and reluuctant to engage in this most gracious work. We recommend that the churches of our Association give more systematically and largely to the Georgia Baptist Hospital. We are told by Jesus to feed the hungry and clothe the naked. We are doing this through our Orphan's Home. Boys and girls bereft of parents and home are taken out, fed and clothed and taught to be useful citizens. Many boys and girls reared in the Orphan's Home become good citizens and they in after years will rise up and call Georgia Baptists "blessed."

We are trying to carry out the command of Jesus: "Make disciples." The evangelistic department of our work is reaching the unsaved by the hundreds every year. We pray that the Mission Board will not relax its energies in this department for next year. Many churches through this department of our work have been brought from an almost moribund condition to a place of commanding power and influence in the State.

It is the work of the Board to aid churches and pastors in strategic places and centers in our State. The Board helped the churches at Cordele, Tifton and Moultrie during the days of their infancy. These are now strong, virile churches giving largely to all the work we foster.

We do some work along the line of "Ministerial Relief." This is to aid aged and infirm ministers and their wives. A man would be cruel to work a horse hard to old age and turn him out to starve. May our denomination never let our dependent servants snivel and suffer like a dog in their old age. Many of these old men during the days of their active ministry laid the foundation for our present prosperity and progress. We have not mentioned every interest our Board fosters, but enough to refresh your pure minds by way of remembrance that our organized work is fundamental and necessary.

Our Board has had a debt for some years that has acted as an incubis. We pray that Georgia Baptists will step to the calal of our valiant secretary and free the Board from debt and that all the bells of our heart may be put to ringing.

Document No. 10.

Report on Orphan's Home.

From a standpoint of accomplishment, the past 12 months have been very successful with the orphanage. The average number of children has been about 245. The trustees have been forced to make various improvements, as the denomination has sent more children than it had room for. Among these improvements is a large brick dormitory, known as the "Hester Blalock Cottage." This building took the place of the old wooden structure. The baby boys now have a comfortable building in which to live.

The schools are doing work from the kindergarten through the eighth grade. The schools and telegraphy class are accomplishing all that could be expected.

The 50 acre farm, cultivated by the large boys, furnished all the vegetables needed during the summer.

We find that this institution is not a place where boys and girls merely eat, sleep, go to church and school. Every one above five years of age has some kind of regular duty to perform each day some doing real work.

The girls are taught housekeeping, sewing, mending, laundry, nursing, etc. The boys are taught farming, engineering, carpentering and painting. When the seventh or eighth grade is finished, they are sent out as telegraph operators or some other useful occupation.

It has not been so many years ago that there was no thought given to children. Fathers and mothers looked upon them as a kind of necessary incumbrance, thought so little of them that they were sometimes destroyed.

Never was the world interested in the child until the Man of Galilee took them up in his arms and blessed them and called attention to the fact that "of such is the Kingdom of Heaven." Our Scriptures go so far as to say that "Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father, is to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction."

We now have 250 children in the Georgia Baptist Orphanage at Hapeville. These come from every section of the State, not an unworthy one there. We as Baptists adopted them as our own, we are fathers and mothers unto these helpless children. In taking them we have taken the responsibility of rearing them unto lives of usefulness. We should not feel that this is a burden but should know that "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

During the past year the Baptists have not rallied as they

should to this, one of our most worthy enterprises. The children must eat and wear clothes every day. We have failed to send sufficient money to feed and make the necessary improvements. The trustees have been forced to go in debt several thousand dollars. The debt at this time is \$27,000.

The indebtedness is a very small one considering our ability, but our ability to do will not pay this debt, nor will it continue to feed these helpless children. We must go back to our homes and lay the condition of our Orphanage on the heart of Baptist constituency, take up cash collection and for-

ward to the Home at once.

On December 9th we will have what is known as In-Gathering-Day for the Orphanage. Every church is asked to do its very best to lift this indebtedness. We should obey the call of the Master and make this one of the greatest days in our Orphanage work. Respectfully submitted,

Report of the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee has endeavored to carry out the plans and policies of the Association since its last annual meet-

ing in Shellman.

Local Baptist churches are organized into Associations that they may do a more definite, systematic and combined work for the advancement of the Kingdom of our Master. Fortysix churches, with a membership of 4,500, are thus banded together in the Bethel Association that we all may move unitedly as a strong band to help win souls to Christ and train them for service. During the past year your committee has tried to touch and help toward duty and God as many churches and individuals as possible, by educational programs in rally and enlistment work.

The Mission of the church is to win the world for Christ. In order to do this those who bear his name should be trained and enlisted for active participation in the campaign. So long as such a large number of the Baptists of Bethel Association remain ignorant of how the Lord's work is carried on, so long as many are uninterested in the broader work of the world field and so long as there are hundreds of Christian soldiers unenlisted in actual service, our Association will not do its part in the world conquest. 4,500 men and women, boys and girls, saved from sin, to an eternal life. What an army if we were all trained and enlisted in the duties assigned us by the Captain

of our Salvation! With these facts in view, the Committee began and closes its year's work.

. The first meeting was called October 28, 1915, while the previous annual association was in session at Shellman, which time the general plans were proposed for the year's work ahead of us. With few exceptions, we have met once each month to discuss plans and outline work. The first thing done was the dividing of the Association into districts making one for each of the five members of your Committee; the duty of each Committeeman being to co-operate with the pastors and churches in every way possible for the advancement of the Kingdom; then the getting out the apportionment card and mailing one to each church. During the year, beginning Leary on Wednesday, January 5th, and closing at Damascus on October 12th, educational and enlistment rallies have been held in the following churches. Leary, Garnersville, Mt. Vernon, Providence, Sowhatchee, Enterprise, Elam, New Bethel. Herod and Damascus. These programs include two sessions, one at night, at which a stereoptican lecture on some of mission work was given and the other on the following day, when Sunday Schools, methods of financing the kingdom. evangelism, Baptist Literature, B. Y. P. Ul and Woman's Work were discussed. All of these were well attended and the churches and people were very appreciative of the efforts made in their behalf.

May 25, in many respects, was a very important day in the life of the Bethel Association, when laymen and ministers from all over our territory assembled with Edison church in a GetTogether-Meeting. On that day we had Dr. A. C. Cree, who presented the condition of the State Board; Dr. J. G. Harrison, Secretary of Board of Education of Georgia, and Dr. J. M. Long, who spoke briefly on our Hospital. After these the laymen spoke freely on their attitude toward these causes and the work of the kingdom in general. Teams from Edison and Coleman volunteered for service under the direction of the Executive Committee.

Accepting the invitation of the committee Dr. Long came into the following churches with a lecture on the Georgia Baptist Hospital—Edison Shellman, Cuthbert, Fort Gaines, Herod and Coleman.

When the campaign came on for raising the Foreign Mission debt, the members of the committee volunteered to take the task upon themselves to go into the churches of their districts and make appeals. About \$275.00 was raised.

During the year the committee recommended that the State Board give \$186.00 of its building fund to Sowhatchee church; \$67.00 to Mt. Ararat; \$800 to Blakely church and \$50 during the next year to apply on the pastor's salary at Milford. As a loan from the Bethel College Fund through our recommendation, Oscar Brewer received \$50.00 to partly defray his expenses at Mercer; J. A. Bone \$105.00 for part of Locust Grove expenses, and Miss Yarborough \$150.00 for musical training at Shorter.

Report on Temperance.

Although Georgia boasts of a prohibition law, although 18 other States of the Union are nominally dry, we have by no means solved the liquor problem, which is such a menace to our civilization and a stumbling block to Christianity. the United States has national prohibition, which is probable in the near future, we will still have another serious difficulty to overcome, that of eliminating secret distilleries and private distribution. Is this a problem of the church? Does it concern the interests of the kingdom of God? Yes, for everything which blights hope in the human breast, which blasts ideals, which ruins character and destroys the physical mental or spiritual being of man, demands the earnest attention of the forces righteousness.

Just how to enlist in this campaign against liquor and its influence is a problem to be solved in the light of local conditions. First, know whether there is any liquor in your comobserve closely, and at the opportune time assist in every possible way the civil authorities to bring the alleged cuilty parties to justice. This procedure is used by all honest citizens, more or less, but unfortunately, too late. The way work against intemperance is to never allow. Prevent it instead of trying to cure it. Have tracts distributed freely, telling the evils of alcohol, read books showing the great waste brings in every way, and make a better and larger use of the Temperance Day in the Sunday School. ARTICLES OF FAITH OF BETHEL ASSOCIATION.

Article 1. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of Heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and

truth without any mixture of error for its matter.

Article 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in divine perfection.

Article 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal

ruin without defense or excuse.

Article 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is whol-

ly of grace through faith in the Son of God.

Article 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on the principles of righteousness, and not any work of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

Article 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respector of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted of

Article 7. We believe in the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates,

sanctifies and saves sinners.

Article 8. We believe in "perseverance of the saints," that all those who are truly regenerated and born again, will ultimately be saved in heaven, that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

Article o. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by convention in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that it is only

proper to have bishops or pastors and deacons.

Article 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper.

Article 11. We believe that communion is a church ordinance; that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ and been legally baptized.

Article 12. We believe in a general judgment and the resurrection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from Heaven and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

This Association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2. This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches nor in any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will only be an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually from the body by ballot and

otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to

the ratification or revision of the Association.

7. He shall see that the brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall not have

voice in determining questions except in a case of a tie.

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it when required, and shall print and distribute the Minutes among the churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall from time to time appropriate to that purpose. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have

published in every annual Minute the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of the Bethel Association.

To. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the Association, give security to the Chairman of the Executive Committee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association may order through her Executive Committee. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report to the Association for each fiscal year.

II. The Association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed unless suspended for a special object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the

regular order of the house.

12. All motions when seconded must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by the mover. Substitutes and amendments

shall always be in order.

13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the subject or use unbecoming or unbrotherly language.

14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of

the members enrolled are present.

15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.

16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.

17. This Constitution and Rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the second, which shall be unalterable.

18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of five members, chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, and to fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.



REPORTS OF COMMITTEES. Report on Denominational Literature.

We are glad to report that it seems to us that our Christian people are more cautious as regards the kind of literature which finds its way into our homes, and hence, we hope the sentiment against evil literature may be a prophecy to the providing of real Christian books and papers. We have more subscribers to our religious papers than ever before, and yet far too few. We regret that among more than three hundred and ten thousand Baptists in Georgia, we have only nearly eleven thousand subscribers to the Christian Index, for instance. In our Association, consisting of about four thousand and six hundred Baptists, we have only about two hundred and fifty subscribers to the Christian Index.

Our women are proving more loyal to the work of our denomination, as they read more of the Mission Messenger and Home and Foreign Field.

We would recommend that all our Churches would give a larger place to the Christian Index and the Home and Foreign Field especially. We yearn for more Baptist loyalty, a more marked Baptist spirit. This will come only as we read more denominationally.

Report on Debt Paying Campaign.

Through the years our institutions, educational and benevolent, have been doing our work for us. Because of growth and increasing demands, a \$500,000 debt has accumulated. This is the debt of the Georgia Baptists and we ought to pay it.

Plans were begun at the State Convention at Fitzgerald in 1915 to liquidate this debt. Payment was not begun until this year when the campaign was put on under the direction of C. J. Hood, of Commerce. At the present time about \$300,000 has been raised.

Only a few churches in the Bethel Association, Shellman, Cuthbert, Coleman, Fort Gaines, Midway and Edison, have responded to this call. It is urged that as soon as possible every church do its part in helping to lift our debt.

Report on Food Conservation.

We are engaged in the greater war of the ages and we are informed by men who know that one of the greatest problems connected with it is that of sufficient food. Our president and his helpers are calling on each State, each county, each city, each family and each individual to aid in conserving the supply and preventing waste. I made the statement some time ago that every country and every man would pay his part of this war, whether he wished it or not. The work of conservation is being done through existing organizations, especially religious denominations. Dr. W. J. Loughlin, of Louisville, Ky., represents Southern Baptists, Dr. B. J. W. Graham Georgia Baptists, and I am appointed to act in the Bethel Association. Cards have been sent for each church, either to the pastor or church clerk. The members are requested to make reports on these weekly. Let each family reduce the amount of sugar, flour and meat used. This is supremely important as the allies are looking to the United States for supplies, and we must feed our own citizens and soldiers. The statement is made that we would have won the war for Germany six months ago had we remained neutral and by this time the whole world might have been prostrate at the feet of Germany. Report on Ministerial Relief.

In presenting this subject, we are confronted with the fact that nine-tenths of our churches consider the work of ministerial relief as of no importance. They do not feel that it is a part of denominational work. In endeavoring to elicit your support for the aged and infirm ministers of our denomination, we are not asking support for an object that is unworthy; we are asking support for God's noblemen. They were the pioneers. Before this country had grown strong and great, they preached the gospel of the kingdom. They were also the bulwark of Baptist doctrine and Baptist faith and will forever be associated with what is noble and heroic in the history of our denomination. Bretaren, we feel that we must emphasize this part of our denominational work. We are pleading for the aged and infirm ministers of God, and for their widows.

We recommend: (1) That every church take a collection for this fund in the month of November; (2) That we so increase our offerings that we may give these people from \$15 to \$20 per month instead of from \$5 to \$10, the amount we now give; (3) That we endorse the ministerial relief movement started at the Southern Baptist Convention in New Orleans last May. At that time the Convention accepted the \$100,000 offered by the Sunday School Board as a nucleus of a large endowment fund, from the income of which aged and infirm ministers and their widows are to be supported.

Says the Youth's Companion: "There is something sardonically humorous in calling a man a 'shepherd of souls and pastor of his flock' and then in his old age turning him out to a pasture that his more worldly minded sheep have cropped close to the ground."

Report on Woman's Work of Bethel Association.

A review of the minutes of the Woman's Missionary Union reveals a large number of forms of active Christian service that in the year previous to their organization most of our women did not engage in. Some of these activities are as follows: Good Will Centers, Mission Sunday Schools, Home Makers' Clubs, Cottage Prayer Meetings, Boy's Clubs, Industrial Schools, Rescue Work, Serving the Poor, Work among foreigners, work in jails and convict camps, work among ne groes, visits to sick, Bibles distributed, tracts and literature distributed, garments and baskets given to the poor, cooking and sewing schools, flowers to sick, railroad station and prisons, Christmas stockings filled kindergarten schools, support of orphans, clean up crusades, lectures on health, day nurseries, poor sent to the hospital, vacation Bible schools, linen to hospitals, visit to soldiers and other forms of active practical service.

We further find a remarkable growth in contributions. In 1889, 28 years ago, the women of the South gave for all purposes, \$30,773.69,

while this year the total offerings amounted to \$386,535.91; of this Georgia women paid \$95,935.25, while for local expenses they raised \$44,034.93, and the boxes sent to orphan's home amounted to \$8,559.69, making a total in Georgia of \$148,419.69.

A summary of the work in Bethel Association follows:

Number of Organization—W. M. S., 26; Y. W. A., 3; G. A., 3; R. A., 2; S. B., 10—total, 44.

New members enlisted, 181; present membership of all societies, 899; gifts to objects on apportionment card, \$1730.99; grand total, including \$1782.70, also Judson Centennial, Church Building and Loan Fund, Convention Debt, Local Church Aid, Personal Service and boxes to orphans, \$3184.04.

Rallies held in Association, to increase interest in missions, 4.

Number of new organizations, including some that have been recognized, 8.

Association divided into seven districts, with District Secretary over each.

This is an increase over last year's gifts. On apportionment last year, \$1606.15. Grand total last year, \$2656.00.

We recommend that our pastors and churches encourage all forms of active Christian service among our women, that do not violate the principles of God's word, nor the social custom of the communities where they live. We further recommend the reduction of the number of organizations in retaining the Sunbeams, combining the Girls' Auxiliary and Royal Ambassadors with the Junior B. Y. P. U.; and the Young Woman's Auxiliary with the Senior B. Y. P. U.

Home Mission Report.

Our Home Mission Board at Atlanta, Georgia, has the distinction of reporting yearly more converts and baptisms through the work of its missionaries than have ever been reported by another Home Mission Board in America, though several of those expend more money than our Board dos.

Our Board last year reported 37,724 baptisms, 22,945 of which were creditable directly to Home Missions, while the rest were creditable to co-operative agencies. Last year the total receipts of the Board for all objects were \$474,792. while the administrative costs were \$22,638, or only 4.7 per cent. This suggests great economy in administration. While we applaud a wise economy, we must not forget that efficiency in secular business has nearly always required considerably larger administrative costs than this.

Our Board must not only wisely expend money; it must aid in nurturing and instructing the sources of its supply, which are among nearly 3.000,000 Baptists, most of whom belong to churches with only once-a-month preaching by absentee pastors. To do this service with any real effectiveness will necessitate some expense. We would encourage our Board in incurring expenses required for efficiency.

The great world war is a challenge to every moral and spiritual resource in America. Hundreds of thousands of homes will experience a new soul-hunger, a new sense of need, in the giving of their sons to fight in the nation's armies for justice and democracy. The American farmer must feed the world. The farmer's church, already in need of inspiration and new methods, that it may serve a new rural world, must be the center from which the farmer shall gain added understanding and courage to do his part for God and for country. Southern Baptists must do their full share to save and serve the religious needs of our American boys in the camps, and to protect them from the foul birds of prey that gather in the wake of every army.

Realizing that new and heavier burdens must in this crisis be borne by Baptists of the South in the Home Mission Field, the Southern Baptist Convention at New Orleans instructed the Board to pursue its work on the basis of an apportionment of \$505,193, and the annual meeting of the Board in June planned the year's work on that basis. It is the first time Southern Baptists have undertaken to raise half a million for Home Missions, but the abounding needs and opportunities call for it. Our Baptist people are prosperous. They can enjoy their prosperity without moral deterioration only by serving God and country and men with their substance. Patriotism and true religion call us to a large support of Home Missions.

In Evangelism and Church Building and Enlistment, in Cuba and Panama and the Southern Highlands, among Foreigners and Negroes and Indians, through co-operative missions in such needy States as New Mexico and Arkansas and Oklahoma and Louisiana and Florida, in cities and towns and country-side, our Board has a great work, and the pressing needs which grow out of the war are in addition.

We recommend-

- 1. That earnest prayer be made for the work of the Home Mission Board and that our pastors be asked to preach at least once during the year upon Home Missions.
- 2. That this Association accept its apportionment for Home Missions as suggested by our State body, and that we apportion this amount among our churches, (through the executive committee or a special committee).
- 3. That our churches be encouraged to form mission study classes in "Baptist Missions in the South" and "Country Church in the South," the two unusually popular mission study books of the Home Board. Also that our churches should order and make a larger use of the full and interesting lot of tracts about each phase of the work of the Board. These tracts are free on application. The books are, each, cloth 60c,

paper 40c. All orders for literature or books should be directed to Publicity Department, Baptist Home Mission Board, Atlanta, Ga.

Report on State Missions.

The work of the Georgia Baptists in State Missions has come to be the most important phase of our work. The work of State Missions does not include all the work done in the State for our cause, but relates especially to the work known as State Missions and is one of the departments fostered by the Baptist Mission Board of the State of Georgia. This work of State Missions includes Church Aid, Pastoral Aid, Evangelism, Enlistment, expenses of W. B. M. U., Sunday School Secretary, B. Y. P. U. Secretary and the salary and expenses of our State Secretary and the office force.

The amount of money sent in for State Missions for this year will not be known until our State Convention, but Dr. Cree, our Secretary, speaks very hopeful that by the time of the Convention we will not cally have paid our expenses for the year, but will have taken a considerable amount from the debt of \$30,000 which has been such an embarassment to our work. If only we can report out of debt we will have accomplished a wonderful victory.

A great field for State Mission work has opened its doors to us because of the thousands of soldiers who are being trained in the various camps of the State. Evangelistic work has already been done by our Mission Board and as fast as possible work is to be opened in every camp within the borders of our State. The "Tent Evangel" is worthy of our best, and we should support this movement with our money and our prayers.

While not directly considered as a part of State Missions, the Debt Paying Campaign must be considered, when we think of this phase of the work. The latest reports of this great part of our work is more encouraging and we may still hope for a victory over the monster Debt.

It is a matter of gratification to your committee to notice that a large part of the work done in other states by the Home Mission Board is carried on in our State by State Missions. The report of the Home Mission Board shows that, although Georgia Baptists contributed nearly cne-tenth of the total receipts of this Board, we have used only one-one-hundredth of their receipts for Home Mission work. It is not that we are not doing the work, but that our State Mission work is covering this ground. Over sixty-five churches were given aid in their building by the Home Mission Board, and not one of these churches is listed as being in Georgia. This is cited as an illustration of how State Missions makes it possible that Home Mission money may be used where it is most needed.

State Missions is a very dear cause to the churches of Bethel Asso-

ciation, and last year we contributed over \$1100.00 to State Missions. This year our gifts will run up to \$1300.00.

May God bless the great work done by State Missions and our Sec retary and may the people of Georgia and especially Bethel Association ever be ready to rally to the support of this cause.

Report on Foreign Missions.

We are doing foreign mission work in the following countries: Africa, Argentina, Brazil. China, Italy, Japan and Mexico. The number of our churches now total 458, with a membership of 47,161. The native con tributions during 1916 were 132,371. There were 6,347 baptisms. We have 307 foreign missionaries and 809 native workers, who conducted 474 schools of all grades, which had an enrollment of 12,930 students. Our 15 medical missionaries treated 67,556 patients. God's most gracious favors seemed to have crowned the efforts of the missionaries during the year. During these stressful, trying times of war, it behooves us not to relax our efforts, but to renew our endeavors and increase our enthusiasm.

When the amount paid on the Judson Centennial is added, the grand total is \$961,947.48. We have in these figures the revelation of the fact that Southern Baptists can, and soon will be, giving one million dollars a year to foreign missions.

Last year a substantial saving in expenses over the previous year was reported. We are glad to report a saving in expenses this year over last year of \$9,939.94. Upon the basis of this year's distribution of money, 90 7-10 cents of every dollar given to Foreign Missions actually reached the foreign field, and 9 3-10 cents were required to meet all home expenditures.

The need of increased resources is imperative, if the Board is to cope with the situation already on its hands, to say nothing of enlargement, which certainly ought to be made.

We will soon have a new field, whose needs will be great and insistent, namely, Russia. Russia has been changed from a monarchy to a republic. State religion will prove inadequate to meet the needs of the new order. We should launch a propaganda to democratize and Christianize the people. The command of Jesus is still in force: "Ye shall be witnesses unto me, both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." Again: "Go ye, therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father. and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you, and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world." Jesus said, "As the Father has sent me, so send I you." These are the marching orders of the Captain. Who has the right to question His authority or to revoke His orders "Whatsoever He saith unto you, do it." J. A. J. DUMAs, Chairman.

The history of Christian Education and the needs of the hour demand the best effort of our people for our schools and colleges. Your committee asks you to consider the following facts and recommendations:

The Mercer system of schools under the direction of our Education Board is the agency through which our people should work in developing our Baptist education. Under the guidance of this Board the Colleges belonging to the Convention and the seven High Schools affiliated have arrived at a cordial understanding. This system makes provision for all the schools we ought to foster to work harmoniously. Its plan provides for all institutes to be members of the system when they desire the help of the Convention and of the churches which wish to co-operate with its plans. The institutions now in the system are Mercer University, Macon; Bessie Tift College, Forsyth; Locust Grove Institute, Locust Grove; Norman Institute, Norman Park; Brewton-Parker Institute, Mt. Vernon; Gibson-Mercer Academy, Bowman; Hearn Academy, Cave Spring; Blairsville Institute, Blairsville; Hiawassee High School, Hiawassee.

The Convention proposes to relieve every one of our institutions of embarassments by paying the debts of all. Notwithstanding the distress occasioned by war, the effort to pay these debts is on the way to success. Progress has been made since then, and wherever pastors and churches have made the effort they have secured the subscriptions. It is not possible to make a definite statement of the amount subscribed until nearer the end of the campaigns now in progress. timate aggregates about one-fourth we need. Much of this has been signed up, but also much of it is still to be rounded up put into the regular subscription form. Several thousands of dollars have been promised by those whom we owe. These good men promised to give the debts, but we can not ask them to make subscriptions nor relinquish their claims unless the debts are all paid. They will give what we owe them when we are ready to cancel other debts.

Our regular plan for schedule offering provides for keeping out of debt for emergencies and enlargements by building up the contributions for "Schools and Colleges" just like those for the other objects. Last year we increased our offerings for Schools and Colleges 48 per cent. A similar increase will soon solve the problems of our deficits. Educational Missions is taking its proper place with the other forms of benevolence.

The Southern Baptist Convention has now an Education Commission for study and suggestion. Upon its recommendation the Sunday School Board has arranged to observe Education Day for the Sunday School this year. A beginning has thus been made in getting our Chris-

tian schools on the hearts of our young people. This will mean students and support for them.

This Education Commission is stimulating Southern Baptists to raise as much as \$10,000,000 for education in three years. The three hundred and eighty thousand dollars for Georgia's schools and colleges contemplated in our debt-paying campaign for \$500,000 is counted in this. Thus the eyes of all Southern Baptists are on us. Success in freeing our schools from debt will stimulate the cause of Christian Education throughout the South.

The demands on Ministerial Education for over thirty Georgia men at Louisville, over forty at Mercer, and a number in the High Schools are large. But notwithstanding all the discouragements the offerings now about equal the expenditures. This leaves our debt varying from \$3,500 to \$4,500 to struggle with until the campaign for debts succeeds An increase in our regular offerings would soon wipe it out. The change in the schedule which makes Ministerial Education share its month with Ministerial Relief makes it necessary specially to stress the offering.

Our High Schools are doing well. Last year they had 742 students. They furnished Mercer over 60 students, or nearly one-fourth her total attendance in the literary department. They minister to hundreds who never reach college and touch their lives when it tells for most.

Bsssie Tift College now practically pays its running expenses. We need only to pay her debts to free the college for a career of great usefulness.

Mercer University continues its blessings to the world. Important features are its Bible work, the pre-medical courses, the law courses, the training of teachers, and the Summer School open to women. The total attendance last year, including the Summer School, was 363. It is this growth of the College which has made its debts necessary. To pay them off means that Georgia Baptists free their greatest asset for usefulness.

The crying needs of Georgia Baptist Education are two: to press to completion the campaign to pay off debts, and to build up the contributions for Schools and Colleges to where we can meet the needs caused by necessary losses and growth. Under the plans of the Committee of Five, we will make no more debts.

We, therefore, earnestly recommend:

First, that all the Sunday Schools be urged to observe Education Day on the same day as it is observed throughout the South. That the Committee on Co-operation and the Convention be requested to see that this day devoted to Christian Education throughout the Southern Baptist Convention has an equal opportunity with similar objects for a claim on the gifts as well as the attention of our Sunday Schools.

Second, that every church be requested to co-operate fully with the Committee of Five in carrying to completion the campaign for the payment of our debts until every dollar of debt is wiped out.

Third, that the Association endorse the suggestions of the Committee on Co-operation that the churches give as much as 5 per cent of their total benevolent offerings for Ministerial Education and 8 per cent to schools and colleges. That, while all the contributions should be sent with proper designations through the Board, so that full reports can be had and abuses avoided, the proportion suggested for schools should be extra to what the women give for their own Mary P. Willingham Industrial School at Blue Ridge, and that the amount for Ministerial Education should be extra to what is sent for special students at the Seminary, Mercer or in High Schools, as well as what the women give for the Training School for women missionaries at Louisville.

Fourth, that we urge every church which follows the schedule to ee to it that the months for Schools and Colleges and Ministerial Education do not pass without the offerings are taken. That churches using the budget plan or system of special collections for benevolence be urged to arrange that Schools and Colleges and Ministerial Education receive their share suggested by the Convention.

Report on Orphans Home.

This has been a very successful year with the orphanage. The home has not been able to take all the children who have desired to come into it. The average number of children has been about 250. The schools are doing fine work. They are not only taught in the regular course of the common school branches, but they are taught many things that we parents fail to teach our children. The farm is cultivated by the large boys. The girls are taught housekeeping, sewing, mending, laundrying and nursing. The boys are taught farming, engineering, carpentering and painting. When the seventh and eighth grade is finished they are sent out to some useful occupation.

The Christians today are very much interested in children, especially orphans. The children of today will be the men and women of tomorrow. Jesus said, "Suffer little children to come unto me, and forbid them not, for of such is the kingdom of heaven."

We now have 250 children in the Georgia Baptist Orphanage at Hapeville. These come from different sections of the state.

These are our children, and we are largely responsible for them. Let's rally to their support. Respectfully submitted.

Report on Digest of Letters.

We, your Committee on Digest of Letters, beg to submit the following report: We find that out of 43 churches reporting, there are 228 baptisms, an increase of 6 over last year, and of this number 170 came from the Sunday schools, and out of 43 churches 10 reported no Sunday Schools. We also find an increase of 407 in membership. We also find the number enrolled in Sunday school 2187, with an average of 1566. No. of A-1 Sunday Schools, 2; number of graded Sunday Schools, 6; number of W. M. U., 17, with 363 members; number of B. Y. P. U., 7, with 163 members. We notice also that more churches are giving to all of the objects fostered by our Sunday School Convention, with an increase in gifts, and some which we are proud of, and by this showing we hope that we will be able to make a better report next year, and we do most earnestly request all the churches to make a full and complete report in their church letters to the Association.

The local Baptist church is the fundamental unit by which we work in the Kingdom of God. The association is a group of these unit churches banded together in a spirit of co-operation for the best interests of the kingdom in a given section and for the enlistment of all the churches in that section in the great work of the denomination.

The Executive Committee appointed by this body last year in recognition of these facts, has endeavored to carry out the policies of the Association in advancing the interests of the various churches in co-operative efforts.

Your committee, through untiring efforts, reached as many churches as possible last December and succeeded in sending a car of provisions to our orphans home at Hapeville during Christmas week.

In January for two weeks a doctrinal campaign was held in several churches of the Association. Each minister delivered a sermon on some one of the great fundamental distinctive doctrines of Baptists. This campaign was financed by voluntary offerings in each church visited.

The committee offered its services to pastorless churches to assist them in securing pastors.

In the early summer a convention for our laymen was held with the Cuthbert church, to which men from every church were invited.

One all-day rally was held with the Bluffton church, at which time different phases of our work were presented. Secretary Henderson, of the Laymen's Missionary Movement, was with us.

J. G. Black resigned chairmanship in October, as he is leaving the Association. C. C. Davison was elected to fill the unexpired term. H. M. Melton was chosen as a member of the committee to fill out the required number.

The year's work has not been as successful as we would like for it to have been, and it is sincerely hoped that next year's work will touch every church in the bounds of the Association.

We recommend that the churches call the committee into service whenever and wherever it is needed. It is your servant and doesn't go into fields over the pastor's head.

- 2. That there be held during the coming year an associational Sunday School Convention and an institute in each district, under direction of the executive committee.
- 3. That the Constitution be so changed as to make the Moderator of the Association ex-officio member of the Executive Committee.
- 4. That the Association send a car of provisions, etc. to the orphanage at Hapeville.
- 5. That each church faithfully follow the schedule as given for our Association.



Article I. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of Heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter.

Article 2. We believe there is one true and living God, and only one, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of the Universe, revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in divine perfection.

Article 3. We believe that man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are sinners and under just condemnation to eternal ruin without defense or excuse.

Article 4. We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace through faith in the Son of God.

Article 5. We believe that justification consists in the pardon of sin and the promise of eternal life on the principles of righteousness, and not any work of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Christ's redemption and righteousness.

Article 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all people by the gospel; that all are invited to Christ; that God is no respector of persons, but in every nation he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted of Him.

Article 7. We believe in the doctrine of election; that it is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates,

sanctifies and saves sinners.

Article 8. We believe in "perseverance of the saints," that all those who are truly regenerated and born again, will ultimately be saved in heaven, that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

Article 9. We believe that a gospel church of Christ is a congregation of immersed believers in Christ, associated by convention in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; that it is only

proper to have bishops or pastors and deacons.

Article 10. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holv Spirit; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's Supper.

Article 11. We believe that communion is a church ordinance: that such only are entitled to partake of it as have given a credible evidence of faith in Christ and been legally baptized.

Article 12. We believe in a general judgment and the resur-

rection of the dead and the end of this world; that at the last day Christ will descend from Heaven and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment and the righteous to endless joy, and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION OF BETHEL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

This Association shall be called the Bethel Baptist Association and shall consist of such Baptist churches as shall agree to the terms of the union, and whose faith and constitution shall be deemed sound and satisfactory. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof after the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than five messengers.

2. This Association shall have no right to legislate for the churches nor in any way interfere with their internal affairs.

3. It will only be an advisory body, having for its object a more perfect union of the churches, a more systematic and harmonious concert of action among them and the spread of the gospel throughout the world.

4. Its officers shall consist of Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually from the body by ballot and

otherwise.

5. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of the body, give general direction to business and settle all questions of order; subject, however, to appeal to the Association upon motion and second.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to

the ratification or revision of the Association.

7. He shall see that the brethren maintain the proper courtesies of debate, and may call any speaker to order if he departs from the subject or uses any indecorous or unbrotherly language.

8. The Moderator may speak upon any subject under discussion by calling some brother to the chair, but shall not have

voice in determining questions except in a case of a tie.

9. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the body, receive and read all communications addressed to it when required, and shall print and distribute the Minutes among the churches belonging to the Association, and shall be paid for his services such sum as the body shall from time to time appropriate to that purpose. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have published in every annual Minute the Order of Business, the Articles of Faith and the Constitution of the Bethel Association.

10. The Treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the Association, give security to the Chairman of the Executive Com-

mittee and his successor in office for the same, and pay these out as the Association may order through her Executive Committee. He shall keep a balance sheet and make annual report to the As-

sociation for each fiscal year.

II. The Association shall have a regular order of business adopted at the beginning of each session, and it shall be implicitly followed unless suspended for a special object by a majority of the Association upon motion and second; and when that specific thing is disposed of, the Moderator shall return to the regular order of the house.

12. All motions when seconded must be put to a vote, unless withdrawn by the mover. Substitutes and amendments

shall always be in order.

13. No member shall be permitted to speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association, but shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the subject or use unbecoming or unbrotherly language.

14. A motion for reconsideration must be made by one who voted with the majority, and can only prevail when a majority of

the members enrolled are present.

15. The motion for adjournment shall take precedence of all others.

16. Any member leaving before the close of the meeting without permission shall have his name stricken from the roll.

17. This Constitution and Rules shall be subject to alteration by two-thirds of the members present at two annual and consecutive meetings of the Association, except the second, which shall be unalterable.

18. There shall be appointed annually an Executive Committee, consisting of five members, chosen from the membership of the churches composing the body, whose duty it shall be to obey the instructions of this body in regard to missionary work. Said committee shall have power to elect a chairman, and to fill any vacancy that may occur, either in their own number or the office of Treasurer during the recess of the body, and to have general supervision over any property or financial claims or interests of the Association.

NOTE—In sending money to A. C. Cree, Secty. and Treasurer, great care should be exercised. If the money is from the church, Sunday School, W. M. S., Y. W. A., Sunbeams or Royal Ambassadors, let it appear so, distinctly. Also let the object or purpose for which the money is contributed be clearly stated. And all of this is next to useless unless the name of the Association is given in the letter in which the money is remitted. Not to give the name of the Association from which the money is sent utterly destroys the plans of the book-keepers in the Board's office where the effort is being made to keep accounts with the Associations.

No funds should ever be sent to the Association which are afterwards to be sent to the Boards.

Constitution and By-Laws of Woman's Missionary Union of Bethel Baptist Association. Preamble.

We, the Women of the Churches connected with the Bethel Association, desirous of stimulating a missionary spirit and the grace of giving among women and children of the churches, and wishing to aid in collecting funds for missionary purposes to be disbursed by the Boards and the W. M. U., organize and adopt the following Constitution:

Article I. Name.

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of the Bethel Baptist Association.

Article II. Object.

The two-fold object of the Woman's Missionary Union shall be: 1st. To distribute missionary information and stimulate effort throughout the whole Association. 2nd, To secure the earnest, systematic co-operation of women and children in collecting and raising money for missions.

Article III. Officers.

The officers shall be a President; two Vice Presidents; a Corresponding and Recording Secretary and a Treasurer.

Article IV. Annual Meetings.

The Annual Meeting for the election of officers and the transaction of business shall be held each year at such time and place as may be determined at the previous Annual Meeting or by the Executive Committee.

Article V. Conduct of Meetings. Every session of the W. M. U. shall be opened and closed with religious exercises.

- Article 1. Superintendent—The Supt. shall preside at the Annual Meeting of the W. M. U. and at all meetings of the Executive Committee; shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for; and shall be ex-officio a member of all standing committees. She may call special meetings of the Executive Committee when in her judgment needful, or at the request of three members of the Committee.
- Art. 2. District Secretary—Dist. Secretaries shall seek to advance the interests of the Union in these communities, and preside at annual meetings in the absence of the Superintendent.
- Art. 3. Secretary—The Recording Secretary shall keep accurate records of the annual and special meetings of the Union; shall notify officers of their election and committees of their appointment and shall perform the other duties usual to her office.
- Art. 4. Treasurer—The Treasurer shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements of money, as reported to her from different churches or committees, and shall present a detailed report of all these accounts to each annual meeting She shall perform all other duties usually pertaining to her office.
- Art 5. Nominating Committee—The Nominating Committee shall be appointed by a nomination from the body of one representative from each district and two from the association at large.
- Art. 6. Elections—The officers and members of the Executive Committee shall be nominated by a Nominating Committee on the afternoon of the last day of the meeting.
- Art. 7.—The Executive Committee shall hold quarterly meetings for the transaction of business and shall report through its officers at each annual session of the Union.
- Art. 8—The By-Laws may be altered or amended by a two-thirds majority vote at the annual meeting.
