#### Explanations and Remarks.

The calculations of this Almanac, except for the predictions of the Tides, are made in mean solar time. This is the time indicated by a well-regulated watch or clock, which has been set to agree with the sun on four days of the year, viz, April 15, June 14, September 1, and December 24. On all other days in the year the sun will come to the meridian before or after noon by the clock; and this difference, called Equation of Time, is given for each day in the column marked "sun fast" or "sun slow," The predictions of the Tides are given in Eastern Standard Time (75th meridian, W.), which is the time now in general use in towns and on railroads, and which is faster than mean time at Raleigh by 14 minutes 32.4 seconds, and at Wilmington by 12 minutes All calculations involving latitude and longitude are made for Raleigh, the dome of the Capitol being in latitude 35° 46.75, and longitude 78° 38′ 6.71; but the times, phases, etc., will vary only a few minutes for any part of North Carolina and the adjacent States.

#### Rising and Setting of the Sun.

The Almanacs generally used have made the rising and setting together equal 12 hours. This is incorrect. During some portions of the year the sun changes so rapidly in Right Ascension and Declination, that it makes a material change in the Diurnal Arc during the day. The times here given have been rigorously calculated and compared with the best authority, and are true to the nearest whole minute.



Morning and Evening Stars.

The Planet Venus (Q) begins as Evening Star and continues as such until July 8 h: then Morning Star to the end of the year.

The Planet Mars (d) is Evening S.ar until January 16th; then Morning Star the rest of the year.

The Planet Jupiter (91) will be Morning Star until May 27th, then Evening Star till December 14th, after which he is Morning Star to the end of the year.

The Planet Saturn (h) is Morning Star until June 23d, after which it is Evening Star until December 29th, and then Morning Star the rest of the year,

Eclipses in 1900.

In the year 1900 there will be three Eclipses—two of the Sun and one of the Moon.

I. A total Eclipse of the Sun May 28th. This eclipse is generally visible in Western Europe, in Northern Africa, the North Atlantic and Arctic Oceans, Greenland, North America and the extreme northern part of South America. The path of total eclipse begins in Egypt, and passing over the Mediterranea Sea, crosses Spain and Portugal; thence across the Atlantic it enters North America at Norfolk, Va., and bearing to the Southwest, reaches the Gulf Coast near New Orleans; continuing its course; across the Gulf of Mexico and Mexico, it encounters the Pacific Ocean at a point near Cape Corrientes; visible eisewhere in regions mentioned as a partial eclipse. Begins in local mean time as follows; At B. ton, 8.12 a. m.; New York 7.51 a. m.; Philadelphia, 7.46 a. m.; Washington, 7.37 a. m.; Charleston, 7.43 a. m.; New Orleans, 6.23 a. m.; Ends at Boston, 10.44 a. m.; New York, 10 22 a. m.; Philadelphia; 10.17 a. m.; Washington, 10.9 a. m.; Charleston, 9.56 a. m.; New York, 10 22 a. m.; Philadelphia; 10.17 a. m.; Washington, 10.9 a. m.; Charleston, 9.56 a. m.; New Orleans, 9.5 a. m.; Galveston, 8.47 a. m. II. A partial Eclipse of the Moon June 12th; visible here, but quite small and unimportant.

III. A partial Eclipse of the Moon June 12th; visible here, Visible to Sumatra, Borneo and some other East India Islands, Australia, Southern Africa and portions of the South Atlantic and Indian Oceans.

#### Tides.

Local time of high water can be found approximately for the following places by adding the corresponding intervals to the local time of the Moon's transit over the local meridian. The time of the next corresponding tide can be found approximately by adding 12 hours and 25 minutes to the tide already found. In this almanac the tides for Southport, N. C., are given in Standard Time, and have been derived from data furnished by the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey.

#### Observations.

1. The nearer the time of the Moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter are to midnight, the

1. The nearer the time of the Moon's change, have quarter, full and last quarter are to mininght, the fairer will be the weather during the next seven days.

2. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

3. The nearer midday or noon the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the Summer, though they affect Spring and Autumn nearly in the

same ratio.

5. The Moon's change first quarter, full and last quarter happening during six of the afternoon hours. e., from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather, but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table.

# Garden Calendar for January.

Prepare hotbeds. Asparagus beds give heavy dressing with compost and salt. Radishes sow sparsely from time to time. Horseradish cuttings put out. Onions may still be planted, also Garlic and Shallots. Lettuce plants from fall sowing transplant. Spinach may be sown for early spring use. Onions hoe and all other hardy crops planted in autumn. Peas sow at intervals; some may be fcosted, but try again. Turnips for early crop sow. Trees and Shrubbery may be transplanted and pruned. Early Flat Dutch Cabbage seed sow in hotbeds. Collect plenty of manure.

# Baptism and the Lord's Supper, not the Lord's Sunner and Bantism.\*

Solomon's temple had two monumental pillars—Jachin, "He shall establish," and Boaz, "In it is strength." In Z-chariah's vision were two olive trees, on either side of the Golden Candlestick which stood beside the Lord of the whole earth.

In like manner Christ has left two monumental witnesses to testify concerning Him-They are Baptism and the Lord's Supper. Both are witnesses of His death. Baptism, the first witness, testifies concerning His death, burial, and resurrection. The Lord's Supper, the second witness, takes up and continues the testimony showing forth the Lord's death till He come.

2. The churches of Christ, called also the churches of God, are the custodians of those two monumental witnesses. Unto them were the ordinances delivered. Each church for itself is responsible for the proper observance within itself of these witnessing ordinances according to the most conscientious conviction itself entertains.

In holding this principle all churches without distinction agree—Presbyterians, Congregationalists, Methodists, Episcopali-

ans, and finally the Baptists.

3. There is an order to be observed in these two ordinances. Baptism goes first;

the Lord's Supper follows.

Persons who become disciples must enter the church by the door; after they have entered by the door, they partake of the supper that is within the door. This order is in accord with reason, and is taught in the Word of God. It is not allowable to reverse it.

The children of Israel were first baptized into Moses; afterward they did all eat the same spiritual meat and did all drink the same spiritual drink. The disciples were

first baptized into Christ; afterward they partook of the bread and the wine. In our own day converts do not come to the Lord's table first and to baptism afterward. They are to be baptized first and then come to the Supper. This is the rule in all the denominations. Persons, though known to be converted, but not yet baptized, are not invited to the communion in any orderly church of any denomination. Baptism first,

the Lord's Supper afterward.

4. Every church decides for itself what shall be considered baptism. Having so decided, it will require it as a prerequisite to membership and as a condition of access to the privileges of its own particular household of faith. In deciding thus for itself it is only exercising a right essential to its existence, the right to open and shut its own door and to retain control of its own latchkey. The right is exercised without reserve by Presbyterian, Congregational, Methodist, and Episcopal churches, and also by Baptist churches.

5. Of the five churches just named, four—Presbyterian, Congregational, Methodist, and Episcopalian—have decided for themselves that baptism may be administered by immersion, by pcuring, or by sprinkling. Accordingly, if an applicant has received any one of these three, they consider he has entered the visible church by a recognized door, and removing the fence they will invite him to the Lord's Supper along with themselves. But if he has not been baptized in some one of these three ways they will decline to invite him.

He may appeal to the fact that he has been converted and is now recognized by themselves as a Christian, and that being such he should not be debarred access to his Lord's table. But they will not change their decision. They will say that even though he has become a Christian he must wait-till he has been baptized, for the reason that the

he has been baptized, for the reason that the Lord's Supper is restricted to those who have been baptized, and that they practise invariably strict communion toward all converts alike till they have been baptized.

Or if the applicant is a stranger he may take a different stand. He may not consider it essential to confine himself to one of these three modes. There may be a fourth and a fifth and a sixth mode just as good. He may have had water pumped upon him or filtered upon

# Garden Calendar for February.

If not done last month, prepare heating materials for hotbeds; for which select situation protected by a fence or wall. Asparagus beds redress, grafting execute. Fruit trees and shrubbery transplant. Plant early Potatoes. Spinach sow, also Radishes, Carrots, Parsnips. Salsify, Beets. Cabbage plants from different sowings, transplant Lettuce plants, Peas plant—the extra early is the best. In hotbeds sow Cabbage, Tomato, Egg Plant, Lettuce, Radish, etc. Don't be deterred in your operations for fear of loss by change of temperature, but have at hand the means of protection against hard weather, or you will be behind your enterprising neighbor.

him, or he may believe only in spiritual baptism, in which water is not used at all, and may say that he has received one of these last three. He may contend that so long as he himself is satisfied with the new way, they ought to ask no questions, nor have any scruples; that not to allow him to set aside their prerequisite and substitute one of his own is both narrow and bigoted; and that it being the "Lord's table" they should throw it open to all comers, and leave each man to decide for himself the whole question, totally regardless of their teachings, their usage, and their conscientious convictions in the matter. Such reasoning would not move them a hair's breadth. Not so, they would say; it is true that it is the Lord's table, or so much of it as has been entrusted to their care and supervision. In this respect it is like one of many tables in a large hall. For the oversight of this particular one they are responsible to their Lord and Master. It is not for the applicant himself to settle the matter. They too must have a voice, and their voice is that pumping and filtering are not accepted by them as modes of baptism. Neither is "spiritual baptism," so called, sufficient. He will therefore be told without hesitation that the Lord's Supper is restricted to those who have been baptized in some one of the three ways recognized by them, and that they themselves practice close communion toward all until they are so baptized.

6. Baptist churches, on the other hand, hold firmly that scriptural baptism can be administered by immersion only, and that there is but one mode, and not three modes. In pursuance of exactly this same principle which influences the others, they maintain that the person coming to the Lord's table under their care must first be baptized, and that he must be baptized in accordance with usages accepted in their body. So then,

# Christian Baptism; the New Testament Teaching.

BY PROFESSOR W. R. CULLOM, OF WAKE FOREST COLLEGE.

It is with the earnest hope of helping some one that the following questions are suggested, with such answers as the New Tes tament clearly furnishes:

#### WHAT DID JESUS DO?

1. Did Jesus teach and practice such a thing as bap ism when He was on earth? (1) In Matt. 111.13-17, we have the account of His own baptism. In verse 16 we read, "And having been baptized, Jesus came up straightway from the water." (2) In Matt. xxviii.19, we have His command to His apostles after His resurrection: "Go ye therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them into the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost; teaching them to observe all things whatso ever I commanded you." (3) In Acts ii.38, we see one of these apostles carrying out the comman i of his Master: "And Peter said unto them, repent ye and be baptized, every

one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ unto the remission of your sins; and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." (4) In the Epistles to the New Testament churches the members are addressed as if they had been baptized as a matter of course, e. g., Rom. vi.3-4, "All we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into this death. We were buried, therefore, with Him through bap ism into death; that like as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, so we also might walk in newness of life." (5) The same thing appears also from the uninterrupted practice of Christian churches from the days of Christ to the present day. Every church historian teaches this.

With these five plain simple facts before us, is it not clear that Jesus did practice Himself and enjoined upon His followers something which He called baptism?

#### THE HUMAN SIDE.

2. To whom does this apply? Or who ought to be baptized? (1) In the command of Jesus they were to become disciples before they were to be baptized. Matt. xxviii. 19. (2) In the practice of the apostles we have no account of any but believers being baptized. If we wish to learn what the apostles did, let us turn to the book of the Acts (or doings) of the apostles. Read Acts ii. 37-38; viii. 12; x.47; xvi. 14-15; xvi. 29-34.

It would certainly be very rash to say that there were infants in Lydia's household, when the Bible does not say so. Furthermore, when we consider the fact that Lydia's home was in Toyatira, away over in Asia Minor, it is extremely improbable that she was a married woman at all, but, as Meyer suggests, her household consisted probably of women who assisted her in business. As to the jailor and his house, if there were children there they were large enough for Paul and Silas to speak the Word of the Lord to them (Acts xvi 32), and to "rejoice greatly, having believed in God." Acts xvi. 34.

It is clear, then, that Christ intended this something which He called bap ism for those who repent of their sins and humbly com-

mit themselves to Him. If He intended it for others, neither His teachings nor the practice of the apostles give any account of it.

#### WHAT IS BAPTISM?

3. What is that something which Jesus called haptism, and practiced Himself, and enjoined upon all those who repent and believe in Him? (1) Let us try to get the exact meaning of the word for baptize. How can we do this? If I had never seen the word before and wanted to learn its meaning I should get the very best dictionary that I could find and consult it. But which is the best? Dr. Gross Alexander, Professor of New Testament Exegesis in Vanderbilt, the great Methodist University of the South, says. "The seventh edition of Liddell and Scott is the best Greek lexicon for general use. The very best New Testament lexicon is that of J. H. Thayer."

Here is the meaning of the word as given by Lidd-li and Scott (Episcopalians), page 274: "To dip in or under water; of snips, to sink or disable them; to draw wine by

dipping the cup in the bowl."

Dr. Thayer, in his dictionary, page 94, defines and comments on the word as follows: "To dip repeatedly, to immerge, submerge (of vessels sunk); to cleanse by dipping or submerging. In the New Testament it is used particularly of the rite of sacred ablution, first instituted by John the Baptist, afterwards by Christ's command received by Christians and adjusted to the nature and contents of their religion, viz., an immersion in water, performed as the sign of the removal of sin, and administered to those who, impelled by a desire for salvation, sought admission to the benefits of the Messiah's kingdom."

If either of these lexicons know anything about sprinkling and pouring as the meaning of this word, they do not mention it. (2) Whatever the word may mean, if we substitute its meaning for the word itself in the Bible, it ought to give good sense. Read Mark i. 9: "Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee, and was baptized of John in the Jordan. And straightway coming up out of the water," e.c. Now substitute what is known as the three meanings of the word. "Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee, and was sprinkled in the Jordan. # Garden Calendar for April.

If not done last month, plant Cabbage, Peas, Potators. Beets, Corn, Spinach, Mustard, Turnips, Cucumber, Squashes, Pumpkin, Radish, Tomato, Okra, Carrots, Parsrips, Celery, Salsify, Pepper, Lettuce, Egg Plant. Plants set out in February and March will require culture. Sow Leeks for winter use. Sow Drumhead, Flat Dutch and Drumhead Savoy Cabbage seed for plants to be set out in June. Beans may now be planted, drill Lettuce if intended to head; draw up earth to Potato vines. Turnips sowed last month should be hoed and thinned. Transplant spring sowed Cabbage and manure well if you expect fine heads. Citron and Watermelon plant. Small Oniors set out in Autumn will now be fit for use. Asparagus is now in season; hoe beds to exterminate weeds. Additional root crops may now be sown. Transplant all kinds of perennial herbs. Remember to keep down the weeds.

Make the same substitution in the account of baptism as practiced by the apostles where we have any description of it at all, and see which one is the plain, simple meaning of the word, e. g. Acts viii. 35–39; Rom. vi. 3–5. (3) The same conclusion will be reached if we leave the Scriptures and consult the most thorough and able church historians of our enlightened nineteenth century. Professor Harnock (Lutheran), the foremost church historian of the century, says: "Baptism undoubtedly signifies immersion. No proof can be found that it signifies anything else in the New Testament and in the most ancient Christian literature."

Dr. Philip Schaff (Presbyterian) says of baptism in the apostoic period: "The usual form of baptism was immersion. This is inferred from the meaning of the word; from the analogy of John's baptism in the Jordan; from the apostles' comparison of the sacred rite with the miraculous passage of the Red Sea, with the escape of the ark from the flood, with a cleansing and refreshing bath, and with burial and resurrection; finally, from the general custom of the ancient church, which prevails in the East to this day." (History of the Christian Church,

Vol. I., p. 468)

way? What is it for? (1) Some say it cleanses from sin. But when I read such statements as we find in Heb. ix. 22: "Apart from shedding of blood there is no remission," and in I John i. 7: "The blood of Jesus, his Son, cleanseth us from all sin," it seems clear that baptism does not cleanse from sin at all. (2) Some say it takes the place of circumcision. But if so, why were those who had been circumcised, as Peter, Paul and the rest, required to be baptized? (3) Others say it is a mere symbolical ordinance. But a symbol must be based on some fact, else it can not be a symbol. When you ask, what does baptism symbolize? there is grea confusion. Some one will say it symboliztes the pouring out of the Holy Spirit But where is the Scripture for it? And if this be so, why not practice pouring and nothing else? Sprinkling, pouring and immersion certainly can not symbolize the same thing. (4) It is a symbolical ordinance, and symbol zes the very cap-stone of our Christian faith. Take the baptism of Jesus. He told John to "suffer it to be so now, for thus it becometh us to fulfill all righteousness." When did Jesus fulfill all righteousness? Certainly not when He was baptized in the Jordan; but all through His self-sacrificing life, in His death on the cross. and in His glorious resurcection. His baptism was but a symbol of that d ath, burial and resurrection. So now when the believer is baptized he gives the world, in this beautiful symbol, a picture of the plan of redemption by which he is saved. It is a symbol of the death, burial and resurr ction of Jesus, and all that these great facts mean to his needy soul. This seems to be Paul's view of the matter when he says, "We were buried therefore with him through taptism into death; that like as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, so we also might walk in newness of life." And again, "having been buried with him in baptism, wherein ye were also raised with him through faith in the working of God, who raised him from the dead."

Let us look to Jesus and to His inspired apostles for our information on the subject, and when we have decided what they teach, let it be ours to obey, regardless of what men may say. Butter the approval of our own conscience and of Him who is Lord of the conscience than of all the universe beside.

Attend the plantations of Cabbage, Cauliflower, etc.; hoe them frequently and draw earth to the stems; thin out early planting of Beets, Carrots, Parsnips and Salsify, and sow all kinds omitted last month. Transplant Cabbage, Beets, Lettuce, Tomato, Egg Plant from hotbeds to warm borders. Plant Beans, bush or bunch, for a succession; Lima, Carolina and other pole Beans, Cabbage plants, sow seed if not done last month, a'so Carrot, Cauliflower, Cucumber, Indian Corn crops which have failed first sowing. Repeat Melons, Mustard, Pepper, Peas, Potatoes. Pumpkin and Squash. Sow Cabbage for winter; corn plant for succession. Finsh so wing all kinds of Aromatic, Pot Sweet and Medicinal herbs.

#### NORTH CAROLINA PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The following is an analysis of the school statistics for the last fiscal year: "The State Superintendent of Public Instruction has completed the statistical portion of his report for this year. It shows that the receipts were as follows: State and county poli tax, \$303,313; general property special tax, \$433,836; special property tax under local acts, \$15,781, and poll tax, \$9,751; fines, forfeitures, etc., \$14,413; liquor license, \$71,-122; other sources, \$56,275; total, \$896.531. The balance on hand last year was \$189,681. The disbursements were: For white school teachers, \$520.415; negroes, \$216,491; Croatan Indians, \$1,426; white school houses, \$42,-237; negro school houses, \$15 031; county superintendents, \$21,175; commissions to county treasurers, \$18,444; teachers' institutes, \$2,200; boards of education, \$6,477; city schools, \$46,356; other purposes,\$40,744; total disbursements, \$936,891; balince on hand \$165,655. The apportionment to the white schools is \$575,441, and to negro schools. \$226,894. The ass seed value of white proper y i \$246,723,000, and of negro property, \$8,980,000. There are 181,548 white polls and 71 744 negro polls. The amount actually paid out for the schools by whites is \$522,803, and by negrees \$71,183. Of chilaren of school age there are 408.787 whites, and of these there are enrolled 263,217, while the average attendance is 140,162. Of negro children there are 198,600, of whom 127,-398 are enrolled, and the average attendance is 67.148. The average salary of white teachers is males, \$26.33 per month, females, \$23 65; negro teachers, males, \$22,53; females, \$19.70. The average length of school terms is for the whites a trifl; over 14 weeks, and of negroes a little under 13 weeks. There yet remain 715 log school-houses in the State. It thus appears that of the white

children seven-twentieths or a little over one-third attend school, while of the negroes almost precisely one-third attend. Taking the polls as a pasis, the average wealth of the white man is \$1,359, and of a negro \$126. The negroes pay about \$1 each for schools; again taking the polls as a basis. The whites pay \$697,000 for schools, the negroes, \$71,183. In other words the negroes pay about one-seventh, while they are in proportion to the whites, according to polls, as 7 is to 18; in other words a little over one. third in numbers. The analysis of the report shows that the negroes own almost ex actly one twenty-seventh of the property in the State. It also shows that while the whites pay \$3.84 each for public schools, taking the number of polls returned as a bisis, the negroes pay \$1. The value of public school property of whites is \$826,662; that of negroes \$267,143. There are 6,670 school-houses. There are 1,551 white and 872 negro teachers who attended county institutes last year. There are 5,414 white and 2,776 negro teachers; total 8 190. There are 5,443 white school districts and 5,172 schools, and 2,515 negro school districts and 2,395 schools.

Plant Kidney Bans, Peas, Pumpkin seed. Summer Radish, Beets; thin out the latter planted; sow Tomatoes for a succession: sow Beets and Carrots; transplant Cabbage, Celery and Cucumber; Melons and Squashes may be planted for a succession, also Corn. As herbs come into flower they should be cut and put in a shady place to dry. The chief labor of the garden had better be directed to what is already in growth.

Plant Peas and Brans; prepare ground for Turnips, Spinach, Shallots, and sow Cabbage seed to head in November. Large York and Early Dwarf and Flat Dutch are excellent varieties at this season. Sow Collard seed. earth up Celery. Broccoli and Cauliflower sow, and transplant from an early sowing. Onion sets to stand winter. Carrots sow, Squash sow, Ruta Baga sow. Turnips for table use at intervals. Potatoes plant for winter use. Lettuce drill for heading, sow Lettuce for autumn use. Radishes sow from time to time. Beets may be sown for winter supply, but as the seed vegetate with difficulty at this season, repeat until successful: cut sage and other herbs, gather seed and prepare ground for late crops.

# Garden Calendar for September.

The work in the garden is again com-menced in earnest. Draw up earth to the pea vines and stick as they advance. It is not too late to plant Beans; transplant Cabbage sown last month. Early York and large York Cabbage may be sown; towards the end of this month sow Flat Dutch and Drumhead and Early Large Cabbage seed to come up in the spring, and to secure a good supply sow liberally; transplant Cauliflower and Broccoli; sow Turnips. Potatoes planted last month will require culture. Onions may be sown for a general crop, if buttons to plant are not on hand. Carrots sown will be fit for use in December. Spinach may be sown from time to time. Celery plants need tillage. Lettuce may be transplanted. Sow Radishes frequently.

WHY IS NOT 1900 A LEAP YEAR.—When the change was made from "old style" to "new style," by dropping eleven days out of the year, it was known that the exact length of the year was not 3654 days, but 365 days, five hours, forty eight minutes and fifty seconds, and this difference of eleven minutes, ten seconds, was sought to be equalized by deciding that the years ending the centuries should not be leap years excepting when they were divisible by four hundred, as other leap years are those divisible by four, Thus 1900 is not a leap year, but the years 2000 and 2400 will be.

WHEN DOES THE TWENTIETH CENTURY Begin?—As a century in years, as in bicycle riding, begins at the beginning of No. 1, and is finished at the end of the hundredth year or mile, the Christian era began Jan. 1, in the year 1, and the first century ended Dec. 31, A. D. 100. The nineteenth century will end at 12 p.m. Dec. 31, 1900, and the twentieth century begins at the opening of January 1901.

#### BATES OF DOMESTIC POSTAGE.

[Revised and corrected by C. T. Bailey, P. M., Raleigh, N. C.]

FIRST CLASS.-Letters, all manuscript unaccompanied with corrected proofs, all master wholly or partly in writing and all ma'ter prepared by the typewriter, two cents for each ounce or fraction thereof, except postal cards. Drop letters two cents per ounce or fraction thereof at places where there is a curier delivery.

Whenever any package is sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or contains or bears writing which is not allowed by law, such package is subject to letter postage-two cents per ounce or fraction thereof.

SECOND CLASS.—All newspapers and other periodical publications issued at stated intervals, and as frequently as four times a year from a known office of publication, one cent per pound or fraction thereof, after being admitted as second-class matter by the Postoffice Department.

THIRD CLASS .- Books and circulars, proofsheets, corrected proof-sheets and manuscript copy accompanying the same, blank or printed cards and envelopes with printed address, photographs with only name and address of sender in writing, seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions and plants, one cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof.

Transient newspapers, periodicals, etc., that are published at regular intervals, and sent by persons other than the publisher or newsdealer one cent for each four ounces or fraction thereof.

FOURTH CLASS.—Embraces all matter not in the first, second or third class, which is not in its form or nature liable to destroy, deface or otherwise damage the mail bag, and is not above four pounds, for each package, except in case of single books weighing in excess of that amount (limited to four pounds six ounces in the foreign mails), one cent for each ounce or fraction thereof.

FORWARDING .- All matter of the first class may be forwarded without additional postage. Marter of second class may be forwarded at the rate of 1 cent for each 4 ounces or fraction thereof, prepaid matter of the third and fourth class must be prepaid at the regular rate before it can be forwarded.

Note.-Lauels, patterns, playing cards, visiting cards, addresses, tags, paper sacks, wrapping paper with print dadvertisements thereon, bill-heads, letter-heads, envelopes and other matter of the same general charactor, is charged as fourth-class matter-that is, 1 cent for each ounce or fraction thereof.

The schedule on postal money orders fees

is now as follows:

Over \$3.50 and not exceeding \$5.... 7 cents

Over \$5 and not exceeding \$10 .... 10 cents Over \$10 and not exceeding \$20 .... 12 cents Over \$20 and not exceeding \$30 .... 14 cents Over \$30 and not exceeding \$40 .... 17 cents Over \$40 and not exceeding \$50 ... 20 cents Over \$50 and not exceeding \$60 ... 22 cents Over \$60 and not exceeding \$75 ... 27 cents Over \$75 and not exceeding \$100 ... 32 cents

The increase charges for money orders over last year is due to a war tax levied by Congress.

Note.—The maximum amount for which a single money order may be issued at an office designa ed as "Money Order Office" is \$100 and at an office designated as a "Limnted Money Order Office," \$5. When a larger sum is to be sent, additional orders must be obtained. But Postmasters are instructed to refuse to issue in one day to the same remitter, and in favor of the same pavee, on any one post office of the fourth class money orders amounting in the aggregate to more than \$300, as such office might not have funds sufficient for immediate payment of any large amount. Fractions of a cent are not to be introduced.

All parm ssible mail matter for Canada and Mexico passes at the same rate as in the United States, except that fourth-class matter (other than bona file trade samples) must be sent by Parcel Post of Mexico.

IMMEDIATE DELIVERY .- A ten cent special delivery stamp in addition to the regular postage, will entitle all mailable matter to immediate delivery between 7 a. m. and 11 p. m., Within carrier limits of free delivery office-, and between 7 a. m. and 7 p. m. within one mile of all other offices.

All printed matter sent out as a sample of the printing thereon, is third-class matter. If sent out as a sample of the quality or price of the paper, it is fourth-class matter.






