The next annual session will be held with Ebenezer Baptist Church, Wilmington, N. C., on Tuesday after the third Lord's day in October, 1890.

### PROCEEDINGS.

ROANOKE SALEM BAPTIST CHURCH, October 22, 1889.

The Baptist State Convention convened with Roanoke-Salem Baptist Church, near Garysburg, on Tuesday, October 22d, 1889.

The first hour was devoted to prayer and praise service, in which

many brethren took part.

At 10.30 a. m. the President of the Convention, Rev. J. J. Worlds, called the assembly to order, and requested Dr. A. W. Pegues and Rev. C. Johnson to conduct the opening service. The Secretary being absent, Dr. N. F. Roberts was requested to offi-

ciate as Secretary pro tem.

Hymn 674 was read by Bro. Johnson and sung by the congregation. Dr. Pegues read the 13th chapter of I Corinthians and led in prayer.

Rev. A. Shepard, the acting pastor of the church, extended to the brethren and visitors the address of welcome. He greeted the Convention with a hearty welcome, and referred to the earnest struggle which the church had put forth in order to have a suitable house for the reception of the Convention.

Prof. S. N. Vass responded to the address of welcome in well chosen

words, and represented the feeling of all the brethren present.

The President, before announcing the house ready for business,

addressed the Convention as follows:

DEAR BRETHREN: Through the kindness and mercy of God we are permitted to meet in another annual session of the Convention. Let us, in the very beginning, return thanks to God for past blessings, and implore his guidance and protection in our deliberations, that the work may proceed harmoniously. We have met in the 23d session of the Convention for the purpose of executing such business as we trust shall tend to advance the work of Christ among the people. If we have made blunders in the past, let us strive to improve. God has wonderfully blessed our labors during the recess of the Convention, and cheering reports from all quarters come, bearing the blessed information that large numbers of precious souls have been gathered into the fold. The necessity of permanently organizing all our forces in the State grows, and we should, with the greatest zeal, strive to have all our churches tributaries to the Convention The representation fee is light. The Constitution allows Associations to represent at fifty cents per church. There are several Associations in the State supporting local schools, which somewhat hinder them from representing. It would be wise to ask each church to send to the Association fifty cents annually, in addition to its regular contribution, to enable the Association to represent in this Convention. If this system is adopted, all Associations can unite with us, and still carry on their local work.

Again, the statistical work of each Association ought to be reported

to this body annually.

Again, a missionary ought to be employed by this Convention to bring before the Baptists of the State the importance of uniting with this Convention.

And now, brethren, I appeal to you in behalf of the mission work, both Home and Foreign, and beseech you to provide some way to induce our churches to make it a part of their work. The millions of heathen, who worship not the true God, seek help from us. We ought to go to their rescue.

I would also remind you of our duty to ministerial education. This is a duty upon us and our churches. We must do what we can to help educate indigent young men called of God to the ministry and approved by our churches. We must teach the people to give more liberally for these great objects—teach them religion and charity.

We already see the rosy tints of a better day, and we pray God to

hasten on its brightness.

I recently visited the Rowan and Johnston District Associations in behalf of the Convention, and I urged the brethren to help us make a strong and united effort to bring our Baptist strength together. In conclusion, permit me to admonish you to "let your light shine" that we may lead our forces on to victory.

At the conclusion of these remarks, the house was pronounced ready

for business.

The pastor and deacons were appointed a Committee on Hours of Meeting.

Revs. P. F. Maloy, T. B. Edwards and J. A. Whitted were appointed

a Committee on Credentials.

The Committee on Hours of Meeting reported, regulating the meetings as follows: Morning session, begin at 9:30. recess at 1 p. m.; afternoon, begin at 2 p. m., close at 5 p. m.; night, begin at 7 p. m., close at pleasure.

The appointment of Committee on Permanent Officers was postponed

until the afternoon.

Brethren S. N. Vass, H. Pare and J. C. Pool were appointed on the Committee on Finance.

On motion, a committee of three was appointed on Programme for

the joint meetings.

The order of business, recommended by the above committee and approved by the Convention. designated Tuesday and Wednesday to be devoted to the work of the Convention, Thursday for the Sunday-school work, Friday for the Ministerial Union, and Saturday for the Hayes-Fleming Foreign Mission work.

A few pleasant moments previous to recess were spent hearing remarks of reminiscences from our venerable brethren, A. B. Williams and G. W. Perry. These brethren were among the originators of the

Convention about twenty-five years ago. Invocation was offered by Rev. J. A. Whitted, after which the meeting closed with the benediction, pronounced by Rev. P. F. Maloy.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Convention reassembled at 2 p. m., and devotional exercises were conducted by Revs. F. R. Howell and G. L. Stith.

"Once more we meet to pray," was sung, and Rev. Howell read the 10th chapter of Romans and offered prayer.

The proceedings of the forenoon were read and approved.

Mr. Daniel Cabel, deacon of the white Baptist Church near Garysburg, was introduced to the Convention.

The President announced the following brethren to compose the Committee on Officers: G. W. Perry, F. R. Howell, P. F. Maloy, J. A. Whitted and R. Shepard.

On motion, the special schedule of business was suspended to hear the report from the Committee on Revision of the Constitution.

The Constitution, as elsewhere published, was read and adopted.

Five minutes were given to each member to express his opinion concerning the proposed alterations offered to each article.

A motion prevailed setting apart one hour of the night session for the discussion of the "Race Question," and Hon. H. P. Cheatham was invited to make the introductory speech.

On motion, Bros. R. I. Walden, J. A. Whitted and O. Mills were appointed to draft resolutions expressing the opinion of the Convention

on the treatment and condition of our race in the South.

Rev. Thomas Parker was chosen to preach a special sermon to the

Convention to-night.

Prayer was offered by Rev. W. R. Shaw, music was rendered by the choir and Rev. G. L. Stith closed the meeting with the benediction.

#### EVENING SESSION.

At seven o'clock the meeting opened with devotional exercises led by "Nearer, my God, to Thee," was sung: a portion of Rev. S. N. Vass. the 25th chapter of Matthew was read, and prayer was offered by Rev. Thomas Parker. The choir sang, "Shall we meet beyond the river?"

Rev. T. Parker announced as his text, II Peter i: 1, "Lay aside all malice," &c. The sermon was replete with sound religious instruction,

and was warmly received by the assemblage.

Prayer was offered by Prof. Vass; after which a collection, amounting to \$5.04, was taken for the Foreign Mission work.

Business was resumed, and the following series of resolutions were read:

Whereas, Many outrages have been recently perpetrated upon many members of our race in various States of the South; and whereas, among others, some of the most intellectual and progressive men and preachers and Christian women of our own denomination have recently innocently suffered: therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Baptist Educational and Missionary Convention of North Carolina do most severely condemn those cruel outrages, and call upon the authorities of the different States to use every possible

effort to bring the perpetrators to justice;

Further resolved, That we most cordially commend the action of the recent Baptist Convention at Indianapolis in setting apart a day of

prayer to God in behalf of the oppressed of our race;

Further, That we shall use our influence in trying to establish peace and mutual understanding between the races, and to impress upon our people the necessity of avoiding by word or action anything that will

produce race conflict and strife;

Further, That we appreciate the manly action of Gov. Fowle in trying to bring to justice the lynchers of two of the citizens of the State, but we do not agree with him in recommending the emigration of our race in great numbers from one part of the South to another, or to any other land, since we feel that we should share the privileges and benefits of this our native land.

Resolved lastly, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to each of the following papers: Buptist Pilot, Biblical Recorder, The National Baptist, Independent, Richmond Planet, Washington Bee, African

Expositor.

On the adoption of these resolutions, Hon. H. P. Cheatham, Congressman for the 2d district, in a great speech, said: "The emigration of our people to the far South is a serious mistake, and ought to be discouraged. We are in this country to stay. It is our birth-place; our home; our native land, and we have a right to the undisturbed enjoyment of its rich blessings." The honorable speaker, reviewing the progress and advancement of our race since the emancipation, in a grand climax, added: "We have climbed domestically; we have climbed financially; we have climbed in every avenue of worth and manhood. There is no such thing as general emigration. It is impossible. Do not be alarmed

"We must toil and labor, and make ourselves men-men of business and of brains. I have not a word of disparagement to say against the white man in this State. He has done exceedingly well, and we have suffered comparatively little from his hands. We must cultivate friendly relations towards the opposite race. Let us be respectful, courteous, honest and manly. Let us discourage mobs and riots. It does not pay for the weaker race to be forever spiking the dominant race. Consider our educational advantages and advancement, and you will conclude that it is not best to emigrate. Look at our schools and colleges. Look at our educated ministers and learned men. We figure as factors in all the great denominations in this land. At the bar we hold a high The late Judge Griffin, of the West, who died a short time ago, was a colored man.

"The unjust bloodshed of Negroes in the South is looked upon with indignation and deep regret by the better class of white people. All we want in this country, all we ask, is protection of our rights, not social rights-we have all the social rights we want-but our civil rights; we want these protected. I never felt happier over the condition than

This distinguished gentleman ended his remarks amid great applause. Speakers who followed were given five minutes each to express themselves. Dr. Roberts. Revs. Maloy, Parker, Whitted and Walden spoke. Further discussion discontinued, and the adoption was deferred until to-morrow morning at 11:30.

A committee was appointed on Place of Next Meeting, viz: William Devaughn, Luke Pierce, A. Cooper, J. C. Pool and ——— Andrews. Revs. T. B. Edwards, William Reed and A. R. Middleton were

appointed a Committee on Obituary.

The following brethren were placed on the Committee on New Churches, viz: C. J. White, C. H. Williamson and H. Lee.

The Committee on Temperance was appointed, viz: A. W. Pegues,

H. Pare, J. A. Whitted and G. L. Stith.

The evening session closed with benediction by Rev. A. W. Pegues, Ph. D.

#### SECOND DAY—Morning Session.

The Convention was called to order at 10 o'clock.

Devotional exercises were led by Rev. Thomas Parker. "There is a land of pure delight" was sung, and the first Psalm read, and prayer was offered by Rev. Whitted.

The minutes of the preceding evening and night session were read and

approved.

The Committee on Officers read the following report:

For President. Rev. J. J. Worlds; Vice Presidents, Revs. Thomas Parker, Luke Pierce, J. P. Ratliffe; Recording Secretary, C. S. Brown; Corresponding Secretary, P. F. Maloy; Statistical Secretary and Historian, S. N. Vass; Treasurer, C. Johnson; Auditor, G. W. Perry; Elective Members of the Board of Managers, J. A. Whitted, A. Shepard, A. W. Pegues, A. B. Williams.

The Board on Ministerial Education presented through Dr. Roberts their report. It showed that four ordained ministers and three young

men aspiring to the ministry had received aid from the Convention during the past session at Shaw University. (See report). It was approved.

The hour having arrived, discussion on the resolutions deferred last evening was resumed. Quite a number of brethren spoke, endorsing

the sentiments of the resolutions, after which they were approved.

The President invoked Divine blessing, and recess was given for an hour.

#### Afternoon Session.

The Convention reassembled at 2 p. m., and Dr. Roberts and Rev. L. H. Hackney conducted devotional exercises. "To the work, to the work," was sung, a portion of Matthew, 20th chapter, read, and prayer was offered by Dr. Roberts.

The minutes of the forenoon were read and approved.

On motion, it was ordered that the rules be suspended to-night, and

one hour be granted to the Hayes-Fleming Society to present its work. The Committee on Obituary submitted their report, condoling the departure of Rev. Z. Haughton. of Charlotte, N. C. The last half hour of this afternoon's session was set apart for voluntary eulogies on the life of Rev. Haughton.

The Foreign Mission Board presented their report, which showed that - dollars had been raised and turned over to the Southern Foreign

Mission Convention. (See report). It was adopted. Revs. A. W. Pegues, Ph. D., W. R. Mason, C. Johnson, R. Shepard and L. H. Hackney were appointed to prepare a pamphlet on the emigration movement, to be issued to the colored people, farmers and landlords of the State.

The Auditor read his report, which was adopted.

A letter from Prof. A. B. Vincent on his mission work as agent for the Home Mission Society of New York was read. The letter was refer-

red to the Home Mission Board.

Rev. L. T. Christmas presented the report of the Home Mission Board, and the State missionary, Rev. F. R. Howell, read his annual report.

These two reports were approved together. (See reports).

Owing to the inclemency of the weather, the night session was postponed.

The Committee on Place of Next Meeting recommended the Convention to hold its next annual convocation with Ebenezer Church, of Wilmington, N. C. Adopted.

The Committee on New Bodies presented their reports, and the names

of the new bodies were inserted on the roll.

It was, on motion, ordered that the Minutes of the Convention shall include the proceedings of all the organizations assembled here during this week, provided they acquiesce and pay their proportional part of the expense.

The report of the Committee on Temperance was approved. (See

reports).

Seven dollars and fifty cents indebtedness incurred by last year's

Minutes was ordered to be paid.

The hour specified to hear eulogies on the life and labors of Rev. Z. Haughton having arrived, business was suspended, and Revs. C. Johnson, F. R. Howell, P. F. Maloy, H. Lee, C. S. Brown and Hon, H. P. Cheatham spoke in excellent terms of the noble record which Rev. Haughton left as a legacy to the church.

Prayer was offered by Rev. W. R. Shaw, and the meeting was closed

with the benediction.

#### THIRD DAY-MORNING SESSION.

The Convention was called to order at 10:45, and religious exercises were led by Revs. O. Miller and P. F. Maloy. "Grace, 'tis a charming sound," was sung, 99th Psalm was read, and prayer offered.

The minutes of the previous afternoon were approved.

The business of the Convention was discontinued to allow the Haves-Fleming Foreign Mission Society one hour to present i s work.

At the expiration of one hour, business was resumed. The Conven-

tion agreed to complete its work by noon.

The Board of Managers were authorized to confer with the Boards of the various other organizations here represented to prepare a programme for the next annual meeting.

The report of the Finance Committee was received. (See reports). It was ordered that a summary of the receipts and disbursements of the different Boards be appended to the report of the Finance Committee.

Rev. S. N. Vass, special missionary for the Home Mission Society of New York, read his report, which was received.

Prof. Vass offered a resolution in favor of the Central Baptist Church

of Wilmington.

Rev. A. N. Buck stated why the Neuse River Association had failed to represent in the Convention. He stated that they were in full harmony with the Convention, but they were at present financially depressed.

Rev. Harry Cowan, of Salisbury, addressed the Convention, and gave

a review of his life in the ministry.

The committee chosen to issue a circular to the people of the State concerning emigration, read the circular, and ten thousand copies were ordered to be printed.

A resolution establishing a Ministerial Bureau was adopted, and the officers of the Convention, together with the elective members of the Board of Managers, were placed as supervisors of the Ministerial Bureau.

Rev. J. A. Taylor, of Richmond, was introduced to the brethren, and

he made a short address on the Foreign Mission work.

It was, on motion, ordered that the Secretaries of the different organizations here represented compose the Printing Committee.

The sexton was paid three dollars for his services.

Rev. J. A. Taylor was made an honorary member of the Convention. He was also received as Messenger from the Baptist State Convention of Virginia.

A vote of thanks was tendered the President for the able and impar-

tial manner in which he presided over the meeting.

The Convention adjourned with the benediction by Rev. J. A. Taylor.

## REPORT OF BOARD ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

We, the Board on Ministerial Education, beg leave to submit the following report:

This Board, according to the instructions of the Convention, organized by electing the following officers: Rev. J. J. Worlds, President; N. F.

Roberts, Secretary; Rev. C. Johnson, Treasurer.

The funds which have come into our hands were small, therefore we could not assist a large number during last session, but made a beginning.

The Board agreed to assist ordained ministers, who were unable to pay their way in the Theological Department of Shaw University, to the extent of two dollars per month, and others, preparing for the ministry,

one dollar per month.

The following brethren have received aid: Bros. T. O. Fuller, of Oxford: Jeffrey L. James, of Wilmington; R. L. Merritt, of Anson County; W. E. Andrews and J. C. Pool, of Wake County; D. T. Best, of Clinton; and W. D. Norman, of Hamilton. Four of these are ordained ministers, and two others are preparing to go to Africa as missionaries. There are brethren all over the State who are anxious to prepare themselves for the work of the ministry, but are unable to do so. It becomes

our duty, as a denomination, to help them. By helping our pastor, and those preparing to become pastors, we strengthen the pulpits; and by strengthening the pulpits we strengthen the several congregations, and thus build up the denomination.

The Board desires to help at least thirty in the Theological Department this year. To do this, more funds must be raised for this special

work.

#### REPORT OF REV. F. R. HOWELL, MISSIONARY,

DEAR BRETHREN OF THE CONVENTION—It affords me great pleasure to meet in a grand body like this—a body that has met for twenty-three consecutive years. It is true we have had to meet a great many embarrassments in the past year. viz.: 1st, we had to meet our poverty-stricken congregations, caused by the short crops of 1888; 2d, we had to meet greatly afflicted and discouraged people—discouraged by the acts of the last Legislature in regard to landlords and tenants; the said act made it almost impossible for a farmer to live in some portions of the State; and, 3d, the great emigration fever that broke out in the State—almost like the exodus of Egypt—mostly in Eastern North Carolina, during the past year. And, brethren, as every pastor well knows, the spiritual condition of a church is soon impeded by its financial depression—and the emigration movement had such an effect that no one seemed to know what was best to do Yet through all these trials God has led us safely along, and we have many reasons to rejoice. As a denomination, we have one of the best schools in the South-Shaw University. This Institution is, or should be, the pride of our race, especially to us in North Carolina. We owe, also, a life-long gratitude to the American Baptist Home Mission Society of New York for its work among us.

Now. dear brethren, we can see the hand of God at work for us. We started out with nothing; we had no education as a race, nor any experience as a people; we had never felt any responsibility, nor never knew anything about leadership. But to-day we represent one hundred and twenty thousand communicants, and among them are men and women of nearly every calling and profession in business—intellectual and industrial—viz.: teachers. preachers. lawyers, doctors, professors, farmers,

mechanics; in fact, every practical profession in life.

Now, Mr. President. there is one thing I would advise for our development—that is unity. We hold too many separate meetings in the State. To unify our work and be a Convention indeed, we must meet at the same time and place. Having Dr. Thos. E. Skinner, one of the best Theological teachers in or out of the State, and Dr. H. M. Tupper at the head of our school, with Dr. N. F. Roberts, the Professors and leading pastors, our denomination is a power, and the Convention must be a success.

Mission Society paying the other half.

The missionary raised the amount promised by the Board on the field.

Rssolved, That intemperance can be suppressed, and ought to be sup-

pressed.

Resolved, further, That we shall give our active influence to any wise and practical movement, having for its object the suppression of this traffic.

Resolved, further, That for the good of the cause of Christ, and, as an example to their people, it is the duty of the Christian leaders of the people to strictly refrain from the use of all intoxicating liquors as a beverage.

## CONSTITUTION.

We, the ministers and delegates from various Baptist Churches in North Carolina, met in the town of Goldsboro, N. C., on the 18th of October, 1867, for the purpose of considering the propriety of entering into some general organization for our mutual improvement, and the diffusion of the principles of the Gospel, and agreed to the following rules of fundamental principles:

[Revised October 23d, 1889.]

#### ARTICLE I.

This Convention shall be known as the "Baptist Educational and Missionary Convention of North Carolina."

#### ARTICLE II.

It shall be the object of this Convention to encourage and assist Shaw University; to educate young men called of God to the ministry and approved by the church to which they belong: to encourage education among all the people of the State: to support the Gospel in all destitute sections of the State; to send the Gospel to Africa; to encourage the distribution and study of the Bible and sound religious literature; to assist Baptist Churches in the erection of suitable houses of worship; to encourage the proper care of indigent orphan children and destitute and aged ministers of the gospel, and co-operate with the Foreign Mission Convention of the United States, and the American Baptist Home Mission Society.

#### ARTICLE III.

SECTION 1. This Convention shall be composed of Baptist Associations of North Carolina, regular Baptist Churches, all societies of a religious character, and members of good standing in regular Baptist Churches.

SEC. 2. Any person may become a life-member by the payment of five dollars and an annual member by the payment of one dollar. Any Association may be represented by the payment of fifty cents per church, and may send one delegate for every ten churches or fraction thereof. Any single church in good standing may be represented by the payment of one dollar. Ministers in charge of regular Baptist Churches in the State will be considered honorary members.

#### ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The officers of this Convention shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Auditor and four Managers who shall constitute a Board of Managers.

SEC. 2. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Convention and sign all orders upon the Treasurer. One of the Vice-Presidents

shall perform the same duties in the absence of the President.

SEC. 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the Convention. He shall prepare intelligence for the press; making appeals and statements in behalf of the Convention. He shall prepare the Minutes for the press; his stationery and postage must be furnished by the Board of Managers.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer shall hold all moneys and valuable bonds and notes belonging to the Convention, and shall pay all orders for money signed by the President and Recording Secretary. His books shall be open for inspection by any member of the Board of Managers. He shall

keep an accurate account of all donations, and shall give such bond as the Board of Managers may determine. He shall present quarterly

reports to the Board and annual reports to the Convention.

Sec. 5. The Corresponding Secretary shall take charge of the correspondence of the Convention with other bodies and corporations. He shall report to the Board of Managers, at their meetings, and report all contributions received. The money from all churches, associations and societies must be sent to him.

Sec. 6. The Auditor shall, before each annual meeting of the Convention, examine carefully the receipts, disbursements, vouchers, papers and books of the Treasurer, and his certificate to the facts in the case

shall be attached to the Treasurer's report.

#### ARTICLE V.

Section 1. The Board of Managers shall secure and hold the title to any and all property belonging to or which may be acquired by the Convention, and take a sufficient bond of the Treasurer. They shall have full power to carry out the objects of the Convention. They shall employ missionaries, appoint their field of labor and fix their salaries. They shall prepare a programme and appoint speakers for the annual sermons on the objects of the Convention.

SEC. 2. The officers of the Convention shall be officers of the Board of

Managers.

SEC. 3. Seven members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 4. The Board shall make an annual report to the Convention, giving a full account of its transactions during the year.

SEC. 5. The actual travelling expenses of the Board to and from quarterly meetings shall be taken out of the general fund.

#### ARTICLE VI.

All officers, managers and missionaries of the Convention must be members in good standing in regular Baptist churches.

#### ARTICLLE VII.

The funds of this Convention shall be educational and general. The first is to provide for Ministerial Education; the second, for the payment of missionaries, home and foreign, and general expenses. These funds shall be kept distinct, and the money contributed to either must be applied to it. Unless otherwise directed, all money collected shall pass into the general fund.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

The officers of this Convention, except the managers, who shall serve during the pleasure of the Convention, shall be elected annually.

#### ARTICLE IX.

The Convention shall meet annually, on Tuesday after the third Sunday in October.

#### ARTICLE X.

This Convention may change this Constitution at any annual meeting by the vote of two-thirds of the delegates present.

## RULES OF DECORUM.

1. The President shall take the chair each session, at the hour appointed at the adjournment, and call the members to order, and on the appearance of a quorum, cause the minutes of the preceding session to be read.

2. He shall preserve order, and decide questions of order, subject to

an appeal to the Convention by any member.

3. He shall rise to put a question, but may state it sitting. He shall have the right to call any brother to perform the duties temporarily.

4. The President shall not vote, only in case of a tie; and if he refuses

to vote in a tie, the matter is decided in the negative.

5. He shall not speak in debate while occupying the chair, but may call another brother to the chair, and he shall have the same rights in debate as any other member.

6. When any member wishes to speak or deliver any matter to the

Convention, he shall first rise from his seat and address the chair.

7. When two brothers shall rise at the same time, the President shall name the one to speak.

8. No member shall speak twice on the same subject until all who

wish to speak have spoken.

- 9. Decency of speech shall be observed, and personal reflections avoided.
- 10. While the chair is putting a question, or any brother speaking, no one shall be allowed to walk across the house, or whisper, or otherwise interrupt him.

11. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received,

except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to postpone or amend.

12. All committees shall be appointed in time to do their duty.

13. All committees shall be composed of three members, if not otherwise ordered.

14. No standing rule shall be altered or suspended except by a two-

thirds vote of the Convention.

15. The Rules of Decorum shall be read at the opening of each annual session of the Convention, and as many times during the session as may be deemed practicable.

16. No member shall be allowed to intrude on the time by long debate

in this Convention.

## THE MINISTERIAL UNION.

In agreement with a resolution adopted by the Ministerial Union, in Raleigh, May 24th, 1889, the Union held a special session at Garysburg, October 25th, to complete its routine business and perfect arrangements to unite with the Baptist Educational and Missionary Convention. On examination, it was ascertained that thirty-seven members of the Union were present. At 4 o'clock, the President, Rev. L. H. Hackney, called the meeting to order. The object was stated, and a Committee on New Members, consisting of Revs. A. W. Pegues, J. A. Whitted and N. F. Roberts, D. D., was appointed.

The Constitution was amended, arranging the annual meetings to be held at the same time and place that the State Convention comes off, and making the officers of the Union and the elective members of the Board of Managers of the State Convention the Executive Board of the

Union.

The officers were re-elected to serve one year from date.

The payment of assessments on the Baptist printing press was called for and thirty-six dollars were raised. This amount was turned over to the Printing Committee. The brethren who were unprepared to settle promised to forward their money to the editor of the *Baptist Pilot* by January, 1890.

The necessity of supporting the *Baptist Pilot* was warmly discussed. The success and management of the paper were highly complimented.

A resolution setting apart the third Sunday in January to raise money to aid the press was unanimously adopted.

Bros. Joseph Ratliff, J. C. Parham, Henry Lee, J. C. Pool and H.

Cowan were received in membership.

The Ministerial Bureau, organized by the Educational and Missionary Convention, was heartily endorsed.

Speeches were made advocating the elevation and improvement of the

ministry.

The Union adjourned to meet in Wilmington, October. 1890, on Tuesday after the third Sunday.

## CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1. This organization shall be known as "The Baptist Ministerial Union of North Carolina."

ART. 2. The object of this Union shall be to unite, protect and encourage all worthy ministers, to promote harmony in the churches,

and, in every possible way, to further the Master's kingdom.

ART. 3. Its officers shall be a President, and a Vice-President from each Association in harmony with the Union, a Recording and Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, an Auditor, and as many Boards as may be necessary.

ART. 4. The officers of the Union shall perform all the duties usually discharged by officers holding similar positions, or such duties as may

be assigned them by the Union.

ART. 5. The election of officers shall take place annually, immediately after the opening of the session. Officers shall be chosen from the members of the Union and shall be elected by plurality. The President shall not be elected for more than one term during the lapse of five years.

ART. 6. Any minister of good repute who is blameless, and who possesses the other qualifications of a minister as laid down in the Bible (I Timothy iii: 1-7), may become a member of this Union upon subscrib-

ing to this Constitution and the payment of one dollar.

ART. 7. This Union shall provide, to the extent of its ability, for the disabled and superannuated ministers who have been faithful in working for the Master.

ART. 8. It shall be the duty of the Union to guard the good name of its members and recommend ministers to churches and needy fields.

ART. 9. The members of this organization shall not participate in the

ordination of any incompetent applicant for the ministry.

ART. 10. Any resolution may be adopted from time to time by a majority vote for the furtherance of the cause of this Union, provided it does not conflict with this Constitution.

ART. 11. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting

of the Union by a two-thirds vote.

ART. 12. The meetings of this Union shall be governed according to the rules laid down in Pendleton and Hiscock's Manual.

#### AMENDMENTS.

1. The Ministerial Union shall meet annually at the same time and place as the Educational and Missionary Convention of North Carolina.

2. The officers of the Union, together with the Board of Managers of the Educational and Missionary Convention of North Carolina, shall constitute a Board of Managers for the Ministerial Union; which Board shall become a bureau to recommend ministers.

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It was shown by the Treasurer's report that the Baptist State Convention turned over to the Society, out of funds specified, \$11.12. Rev. H. C. McDonald brought with him for the Society about \$15, which he turned over. This work was performed by him in answer to the request of circulars distributed by the Secretary. He did nobly.

The Treasurer stated that the Society would not be able to pay Rev. J. O. Hayes, our missionary in Africa, his quarterly salary, which was due October 31st. Out of the \$75 due, only \$55,21 were on hand. The members of the Society paid in \$8.97. A strong appeal was made to the Society to do all possible at once, so as to send the salary as soon as possible. Bro. Hayes is altogether dependent upon us for support. Several encouraging addresses were made by brethren present, in which they promise to do their best to raise the money.

Mention was made of the fact that there are at present in Shaw University. Raleigh, three young men and one young lady from Africa. The young lady and two young men came directly from Sister Flem-The young lady and two young men came directly from Sister Fleming at Palabala, on the Congo. The names of these young men are Robert Walker and Henry Stephens, and the young lady's name is Estey Caroline Fleming, named after Estey Seminary, where Miss Fleming was educated. The other young man comes from the Gold Coast, on the West, and his name is J. J. France. All the persons show much talent as well as devotion to Christ. Never before have we been so

near Africa, and never was our duty greater.

All of the old officers were re-elected. Rev. Luke Pierce was, however, elected a Vice-President in place of Rev. Z. Haughton, who had departed this life since the last meeting in Raleigh. Rev. H. C. McDonald and Rev. A. Cooper were also made Vice-Presidents. The Society was much encouraged by the prospects of the work. After prayer, the Society adjourned to meet at the same time and place as the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. A. SHEPARD,

## THE HAYES-FLEMING

## FOREIGN MISSION SOCIETY.

#### CONSTITUTION.

Believing that greater interest should be taken in the preaching of the gospel to the people of Africa, and in their conversion and christian-ization by the colored people of the South, and with no hostility to any other organization laboring either for Home or Foreign evangelization, but for the purpose of sending our money directly to those with whom we are acquainted, and in whose work we are deeply interested, we have organized the Hayes-Fleming Foreign Mission Society, with the following Constitution:

ARTICLE I. The officers of the Hayes-Fleming Foreign Mission shall consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Secretaries, and a Treasurer, to

be elected annually by the Society.

ART. II. The membership of this Society shall consist of members of Baptist Churches and congregations, Sunday-schools, auxiliary societies of the Hayes-Fleming Foreign Mission Society, and any other Baptist

missionary or educational organization.

ART. III. At each annual meeting there shall be elected an Executive Board consisting of nine members, seven of whom shall reside in the vicinity where the board is located, to supervise and carry out the general policy and action as expressed and adopted at each annual meeting of the Society.

ART. IV. The Society shall have power to appoint committees, organize auxiliary societies, appoint missionaries, co-operate with other missionary organizations in this country or Africa, establish rules and by-laws for its government, and transact all business necessary to its existence and success as a Foreign Mission Society, in all things exhibiting the spirit of Christ, and adhering to the doctrines and teachings of the New Testament.

ART. V. This Constitution can be changed by a two-thirds vote of the delegates enrolled at any annual meeting of the Society: Provided, that the proposed change is submitted in writing at the previous annual meeting of the Society, in the form of a resolution and properly entered

upon the records.

#### BY-LAWS.

1. The annual meeting of the Hayes-Fleming Foreign Mission Society shall be held at the same place and time as the Baptist Ministerial Union of North Carolina.

2. The duties of the President shall be such as usually belong to a

presiding officer.

3. There shall be chosen annually ten Vice-Presidents, any one of whom may act in the place of the President at his request or in his

4. There shall be elected annually a Corresponding Secretary, with Assistant Corresponding Secretaries, also a Recording Secretary, with

duties usually belonging to such officers.

5. The Treasurer shall take charge of all moneys and keep an account in some National Bank, and shall make no disbursements except by order of the Executive Board, and shall render a quarterly report, to be published in any of our denominational papers interested, of all receipts and disbursements, with the belance on hand the first day of each

6. No money shall be expended by the Society save what is necessary to pay postage, stationery, foreign drafts, cost of circulars and printing, also for salaries of missionaries or the education of natives. Nothing shall be paid any agent or person taking up a collection, but everything

done for the love of Christ and the perishing heathen.

7. At each annual meeting, there may be appointed missionaries to labor in Africa, and the commission issued by the Board at the first regular meeting after the annual meeting of the Society. Also, money can be applied towards the education of native children connected with the general mission work of Bro. J. O. Hayes and Sister L. C. Fleming.

There shall be appointed at each annual meeting a Finance Committee to assist in forming auxiliary societies, giving information, devising plans and adopting measures for the raising of money. This

committee may be composed of male and female members.

9. Representation in the annual meeting of the Society shall be constituted as follows: Life-members by paying ten dollars; annual members by paying one dollar; churches, Sunday-schools, auxiliary societies and any Baptist missionary or educational organization, one delegate for

each five dollars paid into the treasury of the Society.

10. All meetings of the Society shall be conducted according to parliamentary usage, and the affairs of the Society in the spirit of humility, union, peace, and good-will to all men, and under a sense of responsibility and obligation to carry out the great commission: "Go, teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost.

11. Any by-law can be suspended or changed by a two-thirds' vote of

the delegates enrolled at any annual meeting of the Society.

Submitted by the Executive Board through A. W. Pegues:

That this Convention may have knowledge of the moneys raised and disbursed for various purposes by the different organizations of the State, and that this Convention request all Sunday-school societies and County Conventions of the State to make full reports of their collections and distributions during the current year.

#### By I. C. Jeffreys:

WHEREAS, There are so many Sunday-schools in the State that are not represented in the State Sunday-school Convention: therefore, be it Resolved, That each auxiliary see to it that every Sunday-school in their section be represented in the State Sunday-school Convention.

#### By G. B. Dunn:

WHEREAS, It is embodied in the Constitution of the State Sundayschool Convention to assist in carrying forward the work of the Colored Orphan Asylum of North Carolina: therefore,

Resolved, That this Convention donate twenty-five dollars in this

WHEREAS, The temperance cause has a tendency to build up fallen humanity, and so many do not engage in this noble work: therefore,

Resolved, That this Convention, and each one of us as delegates, or as workers in this Convention, should see to it that our towns lift up the temperance banner, and organize temperance meetings weekly for the benefit of gaining those who are degrading themselves by the use of intoxicating liquors.

According to an understanding reached at the meeting of the Baptist State Sunday-school Convention, held at Franklinton, N. C., its continued session was held in the Garysburg Baptist Church with the Baptist State Convention, Ministerial Union of North Carolina and Hayes-Fleming Foreign Mission Society, Thursday morning, October 24th, 1889.

The meeting was called to order by Rev. B. B. Hill, Vice-President of

the Convention.

Singing by the choir, "Work, watch and pray." Reading the Scrip-

# CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I. The name of this body shall be "The State Baptist Sun-

day-school Convention of North Carolina."

ART. II. The object shall be to establish and improve Baptist Sunday-schools in all the churches and destitute neighborhoods throughout the State; to assist in supporting the Orphan Asylum, and to awaken a general interest in the religious education of both the aged and the young by gathering them into the Sunday-schools.

ART. III. It shall be composed of life members, annual members and delegates. No one shall be an officer of this Convention unless he be, at his election, a member in good standing in some Missionary Baptist Church. Any such person may become a life-member of this Convention by paying five dollars at one payment; an annual member by paying one dollar. No person shall be a delegate to this Convention who is not, at his election, a member of some regular Missionary Baptist Sunday-school.

ART. IV. Schools of fifty, or less than fifty, cholars shall be entitled to one vote in the Convention; and for every additional fifty, or fraction thereof, one vote. All schools represented by a delegate or delegates

shall be governed by this basis of representation.

ART. V. The Convention shall meet annually at the same time and place as the Educational and Missionary Convention of North Carolina.

ART. VI. The officers of the Convention shall be a President, five Vice-Presidents, a Recording and Corresponding Secretary for the State, and a Treasurer, Auditor, and a Corresponding Secretary in each county where there are Missionary Baptist interest—all whom, except the County Corresponding Secretaries, shall be elected annually by the Convention.

ART. VII. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Convention. to decide points of order and to perform such other duties as usually belong to a presiding officer. In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall assume his duties.

ART. VIII. It shall the duty of the Recording Secretary to record all proceedings of the Convention while in annual session, and counter-sign

all orders.

ART. IX. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary of this Convention to correspond with the Corresponding Secretaries of each County Convention, pertaining to the work in the various counties, and each Convention shall be auxiliary to this Convention.

ART. X. The Treasurer shall hold all money belonging to this Convention, and give bond and security in double the amount which he receives from the Convention, for the faithful discharge of the duties of his

office, and pay the same to the order of the President.

ART. XI. The Board of Managers shall meet at the call of the President of the Convention, who, by virtue of his office, shall be its chairman. It shall have power to employ a missionary and transact such

other business as may be referred to it.

ART. XII. County Baptist Sunday-school Conventions may become auxiliaries to this Convention by contributing to its funds fifty cents per school represented, and furnishing their statistics to the Secretary. Such Convention shall not be entitled to more than ten votes in the State Convention: Provided, that Conventions with less than ten schools shall have but one vote for each school represented

ART. XIII. Each school belonging to this Convention shall contribute annually to the Convention two cents per scholar represented by said school. New schools may be represented upon the ame terms.

ART. XIV. This Constitution may be altered oramended by a vote of

two-thirds of the members present at any annual meeting.

# RULES OF ORDER.

ARTICLE I. Every meeting for business shall be opened and closed with prayer, either by the presiding officer or some one whom he may appoint.

ART. II. Each speaker shall arise and address the President on any

subject to be discussed.

ART. III. No motion shall be debated unless seconded, and no member shall speak more than twice on the same motion without special leave of the Convention.

ART. IV. The President shall be chosen by ballot: the other officers in any way the Convention may direct, but not necessarily from among

ART. V. Every question shall be decided by the living voice, unless

otherwise directed.

ART. VI. During the hours of business, all private conversation, walking across or out of the house, without permission of the President first

obtained, shall be deemed a breach of order,

ART. VII. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, signed by the mover and handed to the Chai or Secretary before they are debated. ART. VIII. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, postpone indefinitely, to lay on the table, or to amend.

ART. IX. When a motion has once been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the majority to move for reconsideration thereof on the same day.

ART. X. When a reading of any paper is called for, and objected to by any member, it shall be determined by a vote of the Convention.

ART. XI. No member shall absent himself from the services of the Convention unless he has leave, or be sick and not able to attend.

ART. XII. Should the presiding officer fail to enforce the foregoing regulations, he shall be regarded as untrue to his trust, and shall be liable to be reminded of his duty by any member present.
