The Moderator then asked that each messenger present hand in his report to the committee. (See reports).

On motion Dr. E. E. Smith, Rev. F. D. Bandy, Rev. S. W. Smith, were chosen delegates to State Convention.

On motion Committee on Resolutions reported. (See report).

Mrs. R. H. Campbell from the First Church, Fayetteville, came to us with a paper that charmed the entire body. The Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. was represented by two promising little girls, and bringing as a gift \$2.56 for missions (from the above named church).

Miss White, secretary of the Sisters' Union, came forward, and said the work carried on by the Sisters was progressing, and asked the continued cooperation of the brethren.

Rev. Geo. Williams, chairman of the committee ap-

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pointed to look after our property at Clarkton, N. C., turned over to Finance Committee \$25.00 rent money. The Association closed to reconvene at 7:30. Benediction by Rev. P. C. Covington.

### **First Day, Night Session**

The Association reassembled at the hour appointed by Rev. J. L. Simpson and Bro. Peter Pilican conducted the opening devotions. Opening hymn No. 159, "Must Jesus Bear the Cross Alone, etc." Reverend Simpson read first chapter of St. Luke. Prayer was offered by Bro. Pilican. Thirty minutes were given for echoes from the field, Bro. F. M. King led with well-fitting words; Rev. B. F. McInhan, D. D. McDonald, J. W. Collings, Rev. A. L. Boon, W. R. Monroe, responded to the call. The hour having come for the doctrine sermon Rev. T. H. McKoy with Rev. T. M. Council ascended the rostrum. Opening hymn, "Come Ye that Love the Lord, etc." Reverend McKoy used for a text Ephesians 6-11, "Put on the Whole Armor of God." The sermon was logical and delivered with Biblical explanations. At the close Rev. T. M. Council offered prayer.

On motion Bro. F. M. King was appointed Finance Committee in the absence of P. Dixon. A collection was taken to the amount of \$3.00. The Association then adjourned. Benediction by P. Pilican.

### **Friday Morning Session**

10:00. The Vice Moderator, S. W. Smith, called the house to order, and after some brief remarks asked Rev. E. J. F. Melvin and W. J. Purdie to conduct the opening devotions, after which the minutes were read by the Secretary and approved by the body.

The pending questions for discussion were taken up. Topic: "Do young men of today manifest the same interest in preaching the Gospel as compared with the men of 30 or 40 years ago?" Opened by Rev. N. B. Dunham, followed by Revs. Geo. Williams, M. Wright, T. M. Council, J. M. Smith, J. F. Freeman, Dr. T. H. Dwelle.

First it was clearly shown in the discussion that Christ's interest today is just as strong as it was the day He gave His life a ransom for many. Second, we remember thirty-five years ago our Association was in

its infancy, a good many of our ministers rode to their appointments on horseback, with no saddle. Now we say they had faith in what they were doing. Well, why?" "Because they labored under dark circumstances, and ministered in the Master's cause. Today we have the aeroplane, electric car, automobile service, "but what has that to do with our interest in Christ's cause as ministers?" I answer, nothing.

None of these things move me, Christ is just the same today.

Conclusion: One has said that a man was interested in the cause that saved him, that being true every saved man will manifest an interest in his Christ.

Rev. S. W. Smith, Vice Moderator, came to the chair. Dr. E. E. Smith, Moderator, came before the body and after complimenting the Elders for the way in which the question was discussed, presented our State work. (The one hundred thousand dollar drive).

(Secretary):

Now dear brethren, when we voice the sentiments of the Union Association we say Dr. Smith is a friend to education, and yet he is one of the foremost educators of the State. First, the doctor called the attention of the body to consider our State work, the number of Baptists, and money to be raised.

The presidents of the different organizations were asked by the Moderator to unite in this great cause. Rev. F. D. Bandy, president of the Ministers' Conference, Rev. E. J. F. Melvin, president B. Y. P. U. Con.; Hon. A. L. Johnson, president Sunday School Convention, Miss A. L. E. Farley, president Sisters' Union.

The question was asked by the Moderator, "How much shall we pledge as an Association to our State work?"

A motion was made by Rev. W. T. Currie and seconded by Rev. N. B. Dunham that we pledge \$2500.00. Same to be paid in five years. Reverends Bandy, Currie, and Rev. Geo. Williams were chosen by the body to arrange payments. (See report).

After the appeal for the State a collection was taken to amount of \$43.65.

Time having arrived for the educational sermon, Rev. W. R. Monroe ascended the rostrum accompanied by Revs. W. H. Muckles and E. L. Thompson. Reverend Monroe selected for a text Heb. 12:1—2 verses.

Subject: "Run Looking to Jesus."



This was a wonderful sermon, full of truth and delivered with spiritual force, and when the man of God was through saying Reverend McPhail lead in singing, "I Know His Blood Has Made Me Whole." Bro. Kelly Whitted offered prayer. A collection was taken to amount of \$11.01.

Rev. W. H. Muckles, president of the Thompson Institute was present, and spoke of the work carried on at the institution.

Rev. E. L. Thompson, pioneer of the Lumber River Association was present with greetings.

The body took a recess for one hour.

Benediction by Rev. W. H. Muckles.

The Association reassembled at the hour appointed. Bros. J. W. Collins and D. A. Simmons conducted the opening devotions.

After a few brief remarks the Moderator asked that all reports come in, this being the closing session of our work.

Rev. F. D. Bandy came before the Board and spoke of the work carried on by the Ministers' Conference. Among the many good things, Reverend Bandy tried to impress upon the minds of the young preachers the necessity of joining the Conference, because here we learn to love each other; we trust the time will come when every minister belonging to the Union Association will enroll as a member of the Ministers' Conference.

Rev. E. J. F. Melvin spoke of the work carried on by the Baptist young people. Reverend Melvin is one of our leading young men, and for ten years has proved himself competent of the honor conferred upon him as president of the B. Y. P. U. Convention.

Deacons A. E. Manuel, Dunkin Ray represented the Deacon Conference. In their deliberation it was clearly shown that they are only seeking for the relation that binds the pastor and his co-worker.

Hon. A. L. Johnson, who has stood at the head of the Sunday School Conventions for many years must be remembered for the stand taken in the education of the girls connected with our Association.

A motion prevailed that the committees appointed for the session report. (See reports).

The Moderator after thanking the brethren for their cooperation, urged that they go home and ex-

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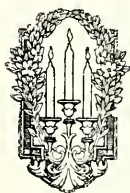
plain to the members of their churches that they are asked to pay five cents per month for educational missions.

## ANNUAL ADDRESS

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By E. E. SMITH, MODERATOR

Brethren, friends, one and all: As I behold you, at this time, I see before me young men with their faces set toward the future, with a vision of the Kingdoms of this earth becoming the Kingdoms of the Lord. I see, also, before me middle-aged men who have, bearing upon their shoulders the brunt of the battles of today and gray-haired ministers who have, through the years wrought well the work of our Church and whose labors are now about finished. I wish to say, Brethren and Friends, that I greet you in this, our fortieth annual meeting, of the District Association of Baptist Churches.

Our hearts go out in praise and thanksgiving to the great arbiter of the universe for the wonderful providences which He has so graciously visited upon us as an association during the year now closed. Our roll of ministers or of preachers discloses no decrease in our number by death. Hence, Brethren, our merciful Father has been gracious unto His undershepherds and has permitted them to assemble again to deliberate upon the work of Kingdom growth; to devise ways and means for more efficient service.

Have we, as undershepherds, as servants of the Master merited the manifold blessings which He has bestowed upon us during the year? Have we been faithful to the great responsibilities committed to us by Him who said to His ministers, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost"? Brethren, have we gone? If we couldn't go ourselves in person to teach the heathen in the foreign field, have we sent a representative? How much of our substance, our earnings, of ourselves have we laid upon the altar for the Master's use during the year just ended? In other words how much of our own money, money which we have labored for ourselves have we given to foreign missions during the year? Let us feel assured that whether we know how or not, a strict account, a record on High has been kept. How much of our own money have we given to help some struggling minister

so that he might more fully fulfill the great command "Go Teach"? How much, Brethren, have we given of our own money during the year to assist some man or some deserving young woman or girl to prepare himself or herself for better and more efficient service?

My Brethren, it is not enough for us to go to our Church and preach once a month and make the people happy and return home to go again in time to hold the August revival. All of this is good but it is not enough, for our commission commands us to teach as well as to preach; to give of our time, of our influence, of our thought and of our substance. To give all to the Glory of God for from Him cometh every good and perfect gift.

My friends, when I speak of giving in this address, I do not refer to gifts made to individuals, nor to your specific church, for building or improving the physical structure thereof. I am speaking in this connection of organized benevolences; gifts, contributions made to carry light to dark portions of the world; to tell the heathen of a loving Savior; to help in transforming the kingdoms of this world into the Kingdom of God.

A perusal of a copy of the minutes of the last session of our association shows that fifty-five churches were represented. Only twelve of this number reported any gifts whatever for foreign mission; and they, all save one, gave very small sums. One of these twelve gave more than the other eleven combined. What are the other forty-three churches doing for the extension of the Kingdom of God in the world? What do you think of a church paying its pastor a salary of several hundred dollars per annum and making no contribution whatever, to foreign mission work? Is the pastor of this church to be commended? Is he carrying out the command of the great commission—"Go ye, etc."? Will the Master, when the day's work is ended say to this pastor whose church gives nothing to foreign mission, "Well done"? Can such a pastor hope to hear the welcome plaudit "Come ye blessed, etc."? Brethren, I think not.

The real work of this association, of our State convention and of Christianity is to save the unsaved. The work of the Church, I repeat, is not to build edifices and to pay salaries to pastors only; but it is far

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greater, for it to save, it is to carry the glad news of the Gospel to the ears of the unsaved and to foster Christian education.

This progressive age is calling for better men and women in every vocation of life. We don't need more churches, but better churches; we don't need, perhaps, in this association more preachers, but we do need better informed and more concentrated teachers. The rural district public school felt just as we should feel, that, while they remain small in number of pupils they could hope for only small results in efficiency. And so, with our churches; we have too many little churches that are struggling for existence, almost unable to hold together. There is still a disposition in some quarters to organize additional small churches. Brethren, we should think seriously upon the question of multiplying the number of our churches without taking into consideration the prospect of their becoming self-sustaining. The minutes of the last session of our association show that there are a number of churches included in our fifty-five with membership of only ten, one with only nine, others with thirteen, fourteen, eighteen, nineteen, twenty, etc. Brethren, these churches have membership too small to accomplish much good for themselves or the Master.

The rural schools' awakening to their weakness and inefficiency on account of their small number of pupils began to combine two, three and four into one, all over the country, thereby securing better buildings, larger attendance and more efficient instructors. May we not Brethren profit from this knowledge? Is there not something that we can do in this regard—for indeed, "In union there is strength" and further "together we stand." There is, my Brethren, a campaign on now by the Baptist of the State to raise during the next five years \$100,000.00 for Shaw University. This does not include what we hope to raise during the same period for foreign missions. The pro-rata for

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our association is about \$2,500 or \$500 per year for the next five years. This we should raise in addition to raising what is necessary to pay our pastors, improve our churches and take care of our local needs. Brethren, we shall be content, happy, and prosperous in proportion as we labor to do the will of Him whose servants we are.

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### Recommendations

1. Am asking every church to give to the cause of foreign missions.
2. That we urge the brethren to see the importance of strengthening our churches, by uniting some of the smaller ones and thereby making the unit stronger.
3. We recommend, where it can be done, have two preaching services a month.
4. That the pastor and officers of the church visit every member.

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### PREAMBLE AND CONSTITUTION

Whereas, the people of God are commanded to strive together in union of interest and effect, element of success for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom; therefore, the Missionary Baptists of this section of North Carolina, agree to form ourselves into an Association for mutual help, having in view the following objects:

1st. The establishment of union among our churches upon principles embracing discipline, government and organization to encourage among our brethren by all Christian means, industry, education, self reliance, general improvement and spiritual advancement, and to preach the gospel as far as our ability will permit. To secure these ends we pledge ourselves to God and to each other to sustain the principles embodied in our Constitution.

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### CONSTITUTION

Art. 1 This Association shall be known as the Union Missionary Baptist Association. The object shall be substantially as enumerated in the above preamble.

Art. 2. The officers shall consist of a President, 1st Vice-President, 2nd Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Corresponding Secretary, Auditor, and an Executive Board of seven members. These officers shall be elected annually by the Association.

Art. 3. It shall be the duty of the president to preside at all meetings of the Association, decide points of order and sign all orders drawn on the treasurer of the Association. He is also ex-officio president of the executive board. He shall not vote only in case of a tie.

Art. 4. The Vice-President shall assume the duties of the President in his absence.

Art. 5. The Secretary shall keep a correct record of all proceedings of the Association and prepare the same for publication, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes. He shall keep all books and stationery belonging to the Association.

Art. 6. The treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to and collect during the sitting of the Association and to pay out the same upon the order of the Association, all orders being signed by the President and counter-signed by the Corresponding Secretary.

Art. 7. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence, he shall be Secretary of the Executive Board of the Association and shall counter-sign all orders on the treasurer.

Art. 8. The auditor shall examine the accounts of the treasurer and make annual report of its condition to this body.

Art. 10. This body shall be composed of ordained ministers belonging to the churches connected with the Association and messengers chosen from the same, each church being entitled to three messengers, and must send to the Association 15 cents for each member represented in this Association; 10 cents for Christian Education and 5 cents for Associated purposes.

Art. 11. Any church desiring to join the Association may do so by letter and messengers, the same being regularly organized. All messengers to the Association must be armed with properly credited credentials. No church will be fellowshiped in this Association which neglects to maintain gospel order.

Art. 12. The annual session of this Association shall be held

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on Thursday after the second Sunday in October of each year at such places as may be selected.

Art. 13. By appointment of the Association there may be preached at each annual session an introductory, missionary, educational and doctrinal sermon.

Art. 14. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a two-thirds vote.

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### BY-LAWS

Art. 1. This Association shall not recognize or receive any church having as members any person excluded from any other church.

Art. 2. All churches of this body are especially requested to take special care of their pastors and use all efforts to help them gain instruction into the ministry.

Art. 3. From this time forward, no church within the jurisdiction of this Association shall ordain any ministers to preach unless he can read the Bible intelligently.

Art. 4. Any elder or minister found intoxicated or who shall visit places of ill repute, such as bar rooms or knowingly indulge in any immorality, such as living in cohabitation without being lawfully married, or acting in any manner such as will bring reproach upon the Baptist faith and profession, shall be called before a Council of Elders and dealt with for breach of good behavior.

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### RULES OF DECORUM

Art. 1. The President and Clerk shall hold their offices from their election at one session until the election of officers at the next session and it shall be their duty to occupy their respective stations and proceed regularly to organization.

Art. 2. The President shall call the Association to order or in his absence the Vice-President shall act, and if he is absent the Secretary must open the session.

Art. 3. There shall be singing and prayer at the opening of each day's session.

Art. 4. Delegates shall enroll their names by letter or other evidence of election. Letters real and other statistical matter read.

Art. 5. Visiting brethren from other Associations may be invited to seats by a majority vote of that body.

Art. 6. The Association shall proceed to organize by electing a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer who, when elected, shall take their seats.

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### ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in one living God, and that there are three persons in the Godhead, the Father, Son and Holy Ghost.

2. We believe that the scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the words of God, and the only rule of faith and practice. Gen. 13:26; 2 Cor. 13:14.

3. We believe in the doctrine of eternal particular election. Acts 3:46; Romans 8:28-30; 11:5-7; II Timothy 2:10; I Peter 7:17; II John 6:37-44.

4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin. Psalms 1:5.

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5. We believe in the doctrine of man's impotency to recover himself from the fall he is in by nature of his own free will and ability. Eph. 11:1-10.

6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ. Gal. 11:16. Rom. 8:24. 5-9.

7. We believe that God's elect shall be called converted and sanctified by the Holy Ghost. Eph. 1:4-7. Thess. 1:13-14.

8. We believe that the Saints shall preserve in grace, and never fall finally away. John 10:28-30. 3-I. I Peter 1-9.

9. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's supper are ordinances of Christ, and that the true believers are the only subjects of these ordinances and that the true method of Baptism is immersion. Matt. 3:16. Acts 8:38-9; Romans 6:4; Eph. 4:12.

10. We believe that the punishment of the wicked is everlasting, and that the joys of the righteous are eternal. Matt. 15:43. Rev. 20:12-15.

11. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general judgment. I Cor. 15.

12. We believe that ordained ministers of such as have come under the imposition of hands by a regular authorized presbytery only, have a right to administer the ordinance, I. Tim. 4:14; II Tim. 1:6.

13. We believe that only regular baptized members in good standing have a right to take the Lord's Supper.

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## CONSTITUTION OF THE UNION

Art. 1. This body shall be known as the church union of the Union Baptist Association.

Art. 2. The object shall be to supply ourselves with better houses of worship and to foster the spirit of union and missions in our churches among our ministers and deacons on principles of righteousness as contained in the Bible.

Art. 3. Its officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually, and a Home Mission Board, and it shall be presided over by the officers of the Union, and make all appropriations and have charge of all home mission work.

Art. 4. There shall be devotional services at the opening of each day's session.

Art. 5. The Union shall meet Saturday before the fifth Sunday of each month having five Sundays at such places as may be chosen.

Art. 6. There shall be preached an introductory, Doctrinal, and a Missionary sermon at each Union.

Art. 7. The Union shall be composed of messengers chosen of the churches and deacons and ministers belonging to the same.

Art. 8. Each church may be represented by a letter and messengers by payment of two cents for each member represented. 1 cent for building funds and one cent for expenses and mission. Each church is entitled to two messengers.

Art. 9. This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the union by a vote of two thirds majority of those present.

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### CONSTITUTION OF THE MINISTERIAL CONFERENCE

Art. 1. This body shall be known as the Ministerial Conference of Union Missionary Baptist Association.

Art 2. Its officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer.

Art. 3. Its object shall be to better understand ourselves as a body of Gospel Ministers of Christ to consider the condition and mission of the Churches under our administration.

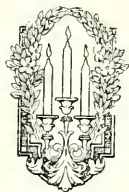
Art. 4. That we encourage and sustain a high standard of Christian morals among ourselves as stewards of Christ.

Art. 5. That we require a higher standard of ministerial preparation in examination.

Art. 6. That all applicants for alternation shall be examined by the Conference, and required to make an average of 70 per cent.

Art. 7. Alternations without the signature of this Conference will not be recognized.

Art. 8. Ministers coming from other Associations will be required to bring a written recommendation signed by the Moderator.
