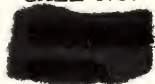

Constitution

of the

NEUSE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I. Name

This body shall be known as the Neuse Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. Purpose

The purpose of the Association shall be to devise, recommend and promote measures for increasing the harmony and spiritual power of the cooperating churches, to assist in developing and directing their energies, resources and gifts in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom, and to cooperate with the Baptist Convention of North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention in all religious, educational, mission, Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union and other work fostered by the said conventions.

ARTICLE III. Membership

SECTION 1. Membership in the body shall be composed of all Missionary Baptist pastors and duly elected messengers of the cooperating churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be represented, at the annual meeting of the Association and at any special meeting during the year, by messengers who shall be duly certified, in the following ratio: Each church with a membership of not more than one hundred members (100) shall be entitled to five (5) messengers. Churches having more than one hundred (100) members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for every additional one hundred (100) members or a major fraction thereof, providing that no church shall have more than twelve (12) messengers.

SECTION 3. New churches seeking to seat messengers in the Association must make written application to the Missions Committee not later than one month prior to the last meeting of the Associational Council prior to the annual meeting of the Association, giving evidence of their faith and order, and their agreement to cooperate in the general program of the Association, The Baptist Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention. The Missions Committee shall study applications and make recommendation to the Associational Council regarding same, and in turn, the Associational Council shall make its recommendations to the annual meeting of the Association for its action.

SECTION 4. All new missions and new churches should be sponsored by a local church or churches.

SECTION 5. The Association shall have power, upon given written notice of nine (9) months and by two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of messengers present and voting, to withdraw fellowship from any church that shall willfully depart from orthodox principles of the Christian religion as taught in the Southern Baptist churches or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or by letter at the annual session of the Association without sufficient reason or that fails to support causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular or that ceases to be missionary in practice.

SECTION 6. Any church may decline to send messengers to the Association at its pleasure. Whenever this constitutes a withdrawal of fellowship on the part of the church, the Association shall not as a body, or through a representative or representatives, seek to restrain by coercion or law the withdrawal action of the church.

ARTICLE IV. Meetings

SECTION 1. The Association shall convene annually on the fourth Tuesday night and Wednesday in October and may meet with different churches on the two (2) successive days.

SECTION 2. The time of the annual meeting may be changed, or special meeting called, by the Associational Council upon notice to the cooperating churches.

ARTICLE V. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the Association shall begin on January first (1st) and end on December thirty-first (31st) of each year.

ARTICLE VI. Officers

SECTION 1. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, the Trustees, the Associational Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Church Music Director, and such others as may be authorized by the Association.

SECTION 2. All officers shall be members of churches affiliated with the Association.

SECTION 3. Nominations for the officers shall be presented to the Associational

Council at its Spring Meeting for approval. These nominees shall then serve as "Officers-Elect" until the Annual Session of the Association, at which time (1) they shall be considered for election by the Association. (2) Any officer may be elected to succeed himself, except the Moderator, who may not serve more than two (2) years in succession. Vacancies occurring between Annual Sessions shall be filled by the Associational Council.

ARTICLE VII, The Associational Council

SECTION 1. The Associational Council shall consist of each Pastor in the Association, the Officers of the Association, the Superintendent of Missions, the immediate Past-Moderator, the representatives of the Denominational agencies, and two (2) lay members from each cooperative church, to be elected by the church. The names of the lay members shall be duly certified by notifying the Associational Clerk.

SECTION 2. The Officers of the Association shall serve as the Officers of the Council

SECTION 3. The Associational Council shall act for the Association in the interim between Annual Sessions. It shall carry out the policies and will of the Association, and shall make reports to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Associational Council also has the power to fill vacancies among the Officers, the Committees and/or the Executive Committee of the Association that may occur during the year.

SECTION 4. Twenty (20) members of the Associational Council will constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VIII, Administration

SECTION 1. The Superintendent of Missions shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program of the Association and the denomination. He shall work under the direction of and be subject to the authority of the Associational Council. He shall be nominated by the Executive Committee to The Associational Council, and elected by the Association at any Annual Session, or by The Associational Council if the next Annual Session of the Association is thirty (30) days or more beyond the date on which the Superintendent of Missions is nominated.

ARTICLE IX, Committees

SECTION 1. At a meeting of the Executive Committee prior to the annual meeting of the Association, the Moderator shall appoint a committee on committees, consisting of not less than five (5) members, whose duty it shall be to offer nominations to the Association for members and chairmen of all standing committees herein provided except those already named by the Constitution.

SECTION 2. The Association shall have the standing committees listed below, along with other committees authorized by the Association. These committees shall begin their duties at the close of the annual session, and shall make reports of their work to the Executive Committee. Members of the committees shall be selected from the membership of those churches cooperating with the Association and are subject to re-election provided, that in no case, any person shall serve on the same committee longer than three (3) years in succession, with the exception of the Music Committee and the Camp Committee. The Moderator and Superintendent of Missions shall be considered ex officio members of all standing Committees.

ARTICLE X. Annual Report of the Church

Each cooperating church shall send annually to the Association a report on the Associational Letter which is provided. Said reports should reach the Associational Clerk not later than October 15 of that year.

ARTICLE XI, Special Days

The fourth (4th) Sunday of January, of each year shall be designated as "Association Day" in all churches for the purpose of receiving an offering for the Missionary activities of the Association, such as church building lots, facilities for missions, rentals, Superintendent of Missions.

ARTICLE XII. Adoption of Constitution

This Constitution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall supercede any and all constitutions previously adopted.

ARTICLE XIII. Amendment of Constitution

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association provided the amendment has been presented in writing to the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws no later than September 1, and presented to the October meeting of the Executive Committee, and read on two successive days of the annual meeting, and receives a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present at the second meeting.

BY-LAWS

"The Work Of The Association Shall Be Governed By The Following By-Laws."

ARTICLE I - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. THE MODERATOR shall preside over the annual meeting of the Association and begin each session punctually. He shall appoint such committees as may be authorized by the Constitution, or the Association, enforce the rules, preserve order, and exercise all perogatives of a presiding officer according to parliamentary usage, and serve as chairman of the Associational Council, and ex officio member of all standing committees.

SECTION 2. THE VICE-MODERATOR shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence and serve as Chairman of the Calendar Committee.

SECTION 3. THE CLERK shall keep the records of the proceedings of the Association, superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes, keep on file the printed minutes and other important papers of the Association and shall serve as Secretary of the Associational Council and the Executive Committee. For his services, the clerk shall be paid an amount to be determined annually by the Association.

SECTION 4. THE TREASURER shall receive, safeguard and disburse all funds of the Association. Disbursements shall be made by the Treasurer in accordance with the Budget adopted by the Association. Non-Budget items should be approved by the Budget-Finance and Executive Committees. The treasurer shall make quarterly reports to the Executive Committee and an Annual Report to the Association. He shall be bonded in such an amount as the Executive Committee shall direct.

SECTION 5. THE HISTORIAN shall collect facts of interest to the Association and the cooperating churches, and shall make a report to each annual meeting of the Association.

SECTION 6. THE SUNDAY SCHOOL DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Sunday School Program in the Association in Cooperation with the Executive Committee.

SECTION 7. THE CHURCH TRAINING DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Church Training Programs in the Association in cooperation with the Executive Committee.

SECTION 8. THE MUSIC DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Church Music Program in the Association in cooperation with the Executive Committee.

SECTION 9. THE BROTHERHOOD DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Brotherhood Program in the Association in cooperation with the Executive Committee.

SECTION 10. THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Woman's Missionary Union Program in the Association in cooperation with the Executive Committee.

SECTION 11. THE TRUSTEES shall rotate one each year, and as provided by law and action of the Association, hold in trust the title to all property of the Association and shall represent the Association in all matters of legal responsibility regarding the purchase, improvement and disposal of Associational property. They shall have no power to buy, sell, mortgage, lease or transfer any property of the Association without a specific vote of the Association or Associational Council authorizing such action.

SECTION 12. THE SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS, though not an officer, his duties shall be:

I. GENERAL ASSOCIATIONAL WORK

1. Planning - Co-ordination
 - a. Assist in preparing the associational calendar of activities
 - b. Work closely with associational officers and committees
 - c. Work closely with Pastors' Conference and other associational organizations
 - d. Helping to plan association-wide campaigns and activities (Schools of Missions, Clinics, Enlargement Campaigns, etc.)
2. Dissemination of Information
 - a. Publishing an associational newsletter
 - b. Preparation of Book of Reports for Annual Meeting
 - c. Announcements at various associational meetings
 - d. Keeping up-to-date file in office on associational and denominational causes and activities
3. Promotion
 - a. Associational activities

- b. Denominational causes and activities
(He should keep well-informed on these so as to be able to explain them and answer questions about them)
- 4. Counseling
 - Associational leaders
 - Pastors
 - Pulpit Committees
 - Pastorless churches
- 5. Administrative (in the office)
 - Correspondence, file, equipment and supplies, office routine, etc.
- 6. Give time and attention as needed to work with military-related families through the churches of the association and, in co-operation with the Baptist State Convention.

II. ASSISTANCE TO THE CHURCHES

(Only upon invitation of the pastor, or of responsible Church leaders.)

In the Supt. of Missions, the Association provides a trained worker on call for churches, pastors, and leaders. He should endeavor to keep himself trained and informed.

- Pulpit Supply
- Training and Teaching (study courses, conferences, clinics, etc.)
- Church Community Surveys and Maps
- V.B.S. (for pastorless churches or where special need exists)
- Other assistance as the need arises

III. ASPECTS OF EMPLOYMENT

1. Responsible to Associational Council
2. Two weeks vacation with pay
3. Maximum of four weeks of denominational or church-related work outside the Association (Schools of Missions, Church Community Surveys, Revivals etc.) These to be carefully scheduled so as to avoid interference with his major associational responsibilities.
4. He shall submit a report of his work to the Associational Council at its meetings, and to the Annual Association at its Meeting.
5. A notice of thirty days shall be given by the Supt. of Missions or the Association before employment is terminated.

ARTICLE II - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES, consisting of not less than five (5) members, shall nominate the members and chairmen of all standing committees herein provided, except those already named by the Constitution. They shall submit these nominations to the Association for election.

SECTION 2. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDER OF BUSINESS, consisting of five (5) members, shall prepare the Program for the Annual Sessions. This suggested program shall be presented to the Association at the beginning of the first Session of the Annual Meeting for action. The Officers of the Association and the President of the Minister's Conference are Ex-Officio members. The Moderator shall serve as Chairman.

SECTION 3. THE COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS shall be composed of three (3) members whose duties shall be to present nominations for the "Officers Elect" to the spring meeting of the Associational Council, and to the Association for all officers

authorized herein, or by the Association. They shall present nominations to the Association for the representatives of the various agencies of the State Convention. They shall also present nominations to the Associational Council to fill any vacancy which may occur during the year.

SECTION 4. THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM shall be composed of five (5) members who shall cooperate with the State Chairman of Evangelism in the promotion of approved evangelistic efforts within the Association. It shall encourage evangelism in the churches, especially where the need is apparent, and shall help provide evangelistic services in the unchurched areas within the boundaries of the Association.

SECTION 5. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDINATION shall be composed of three (3) members who shall act in an advisory capacity for churches. The committee shall assist any church which requests its services in the examination of candidates for the Christian ministry. It shall help arrange, where necessary, proper services of ordination. Churches are requested to use this committee to examine candidates only after their call to some specific work. Further, churches are requested to refrain from announcing the date of ordination until after the candidate has received approval by this committee.

SECTION 6. THE COMMITTEE ON PLACE AND PREACHER shall be composed of three (3) members, whose duty it shall be to receive or solicit invitations for the place of meeting of the annual session for the following year, and to recommend to the Association in annual session, a place or places of meeting, along with a preacher and alternate for the sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS shall be composed of three (3) members and shall review all resolutions referred to it by the Association, the Associational Council, or the Executive Committee, and report suitable resolutions at the annual meeting.

SECTION 8. THE COMMITTEE ON BUDGET-FINANCE shall be composed of seven (7) members, one from each of the counties of Lenoir, Greene, and Wayne, and one at large, plus the Moderator, Treasurer and Superintendent of Missions. The Committee shall hear and give consideration to requests of the Executive Committee and other leaders in the Associational work. These requests are to be submitted not later than September 15th of each year.

The duties of the committee are as follows:

- (a) To plan and supervise the making and raising of the Budget.
- (b) To implement the financial program of the Association as directed by the Executive Committee of the Association.
- (c) To have a professional audit made of the Treasurer's books and make a report to the Association in its annual meeting.
- (d) To make a monthly financial report to the Executive Committee.

SECTION 9. THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS shall be composed of five (5) members whose duties it shall be to ascertain the need of new churches within the boundaries of the Association; to recommend to the Executive Committee the location of sites and the purchasing of lots for such churches, and to assist the organization of such churches as might be authorized. Churches contemplating making debts on lots, buildings, improvements and/or asking for Pastor's aid, must have the recommendations of the Missions Committee and approval of Executive Committee, if they expect to apply to the Baptist State Mission Board for aid in paying for the same. It shall be the duty of the Missions Committee to study the applications of Churches seeking to seat messengers in the Association as to evidence of their faith and order, and their agreement to cooperate in the general program of the Association, the Baptist Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention. The Committee shall then make recommendations to the Executive Committee regarding same.

SECTION 10. THE COMMITTEE ON MUSIC shall be composed of three (3) members who shall cooperate with the Music Department of the State Convention and shall assist in any music program approved by the Association. The Chairman shall also serve as Associational Music Director.

SECTION 11. THE COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN LIFE shall be composed of three (3) members who shall work with local and State Officials in every phase of promoting civic righteousness.

SECTION 12. THE COMMITTEE ON CAMP ACTIVITIES shall be composed of three (3) members. The chairman shall serve as camp director. The duties of the committee shall be to plan and execute the summer camp.

SECTION 13. THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS shall be composed of three (3) members who shall receive all proposed changes thereto and, upon study of this or other observations, make recommendations to the Association on all Constitution and By-Law changes.

SECTION 14. COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS, consisting of three (3) members, shall plan for our beloved dead a memorial service to be conducted during the Annual Session of the Association.

ARTICLE III - THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

SECTION 1. The Officers of the Council shall be the Moderator, the Vice-Moderator, and the Clerk of the Association.

SECTION 2. The Associational Council shall hold an organizational meeting on the First Monday of each November, and shall set up the following subcommittees, and any others deemed necessary for the proper handling of Associational business between the Annual Sessions:

1. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: This committee shall be composed of the Officers of the Association, the Superintendent of Missions, and the Chairmen of the various Standing Committees. This committee shall meet on the First Monday of each month (unless otherwise designated by the committee), and shall handle all matters committed to it by the Associational Council. It shall hear Organizational, Committee, and other reports and plans; design promotional activities, and seek ways and means of forwarding the Lord's work in and through the Association. It shall report all actions to the Associational Council at the next regular meeting, and shall be subject to the approval of the Associational Council. A majority of the Committee shall constitute a quorum. The Superintendent of Missions shall serve as chairman.
 - (a) THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE: This committee shall be composed of the Officers of the Association, the President of the Minister's Conference, and the Superintendent of Missions. (It shall be the duty of this Committee to plan and recommend through the EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE to the Annual Session of the Association, a Calendar of Activities for the coming year. The Vice-Moderator shall serve as chairman.)
 - (b) ANY OR ALL OTHER STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE ASSOCIATION shall function as subcommittees of the Executive Committee.

SECTION 3. The Council shall meet no less than four (4) times annually. The first meeting being on the First Monday of November, and the last meeting being on the First Monday of October. Times and places of the meetings shall be determined by the Council.

SECTION 4. The Council shall submit to the Association in Annual Session a full and complete Budget, Calendar of Activities, and a full and complete report of its work.

ARTICLE IV - RULES OF ORDER

The following rules shall govern deliberations in the meeting of the Association and the Executive Council.

SECTION 1. The official transaction of business in all regular meetings of the Association, the Associational Council, and the Executive Committee shall be by the affirmative majority vote of the members present and voting, except in matters relating to the constitution, the withdrawing of fellowship from any cooperating church, and the seating of messengers from those churches desiring to cooperate with the Association. In called meetings of the Association or of the Associational Council, a number equal to the majority of the membership of the Associational Council and representing a majority of the cooperating churches shall be necessary to constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. A messenger wishing to speak shall rise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration and shall avoid all personalities. No messenger shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special permission.

SECTION 3. All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer or at his request, read by the clerk before the vote is taken.

SECTION 4. When a question is under consideration, no other motion or proposition shall be received except a motion to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time. When there are several motions, they shall have preference in the order in which they come.

SECTION 5. The general business of the Association shall be recommended by the Committee On Order Of Business at the beginning of the first session of the Annual Meeting of the Association. When adopted this report shall become the order of business for the members and cannot be changed except by the vote of the Association.

SECTION 6. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided by Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE V - ADOPTION OF BY-LAWS

SECTION 1. These by-laws shall take effect immediately upon their adoption, and shall supercede any and all by-laws previously adopted.

SECTION 1. These By-Laws may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association provided the amendment has been presented in writing to the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws no later than September 1, and presented to the October meeting of the Associational Council. Passage shall be by majority vote of the messengers present and voting.

First Session

TUESDAY EVENING

1. The 42nd Annual Session of the Neuse Baptist Association was called to order at 7:30 p.m. on October 26, 1971, by the Moderator, David O. Leary, at the Rosewood Baptist Church. A group of youth from Spillman Memorial Baptist Church, Kinston, under the leadership of Bill and Judy Davis, presented excerpts from "Jesus Christ, Superstar" during the worship service. The selections were well done and everyone present appreciated the young people taking the time to come. Mr. Davis closed this period with prayer.

2. Rev. Glenn Short, Pastor of Rosewood Baptist Church, extended a cordial welcome to all present and invited everyone to remain after the close of the evening session for refreshments, which had been prepared by the ladies of the church.

3. The Moderator declared the 42nd Annual Meeting was in session to conduct business. Mr. Leary stated that the order of the proceedings for tonight and tomorrow would be according to the printed program, unless otherwise stated by the Moderator.

4. BUSINESS SESSION: Eugene Hager, Associational Superintendent of Missions, recognized the new pastors and staff members in the Association.

5. At the request of the Moderator, Mr. Hager had the Calendar of Activities for 1972 handed out to those present. The people were reminded that the Calendar would be adopted at the Wednesday session.

6. The Moderator invited all present to join in singing Hymn #41, "To God Be the Glory."

7. Charles Hodges, in the absence of both Ralph Knight and Charles Tanner, gave the Vacation Bible School report found on page #14 in the Book of Reports. Mr. Hodges said, among other things, the former Associational Sunday School Director had made available to the churches group schools for the purpose of studying the "Guiding Books."

8. Tom Waits came at this time and presented a projection for Sunday School work for the coming year. He noted that according to the comparison figures in the Book of Reports, we had lost in numbers. He emphasized that this is an age of change and urged all churches to look for new and better ways to do things.

9. Frank Bowers, Associational Director, presented the Church Training Report as found on page #6 in the Book of Reports.

10. Patricia Hill presented to the group her thoughts on "What is Training Union?"

11. The Clerk gave the registration for the evening session: 23 churches represented by 15 pastors, 75 messengers, 13 alternates, and 107 visitors.

12. A beautiful solo was sung by Mr. Donald Balltzglier, Director of Youth Choir, at Rosewood Baptist Church. He was accompanied on the piano by his wife.

13. Mr. Leary introduced the speaker for the evening, Davis Bowen, Coordinator of the Youth Ministries for the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. Mr. Bowen gave a very interesting and informative talk explaining to those present the many youth ministries supported by State Missions throughout North Carolina. A portion of his presentation was colored slides showing many of the features and facilities North Carolina Southern Baptists devote to youth work.

14. The Moderator asked Rev. Robert E. Lee, Pastor of Calvary Baptist Church, Goldsboro, to close this session with prayer.

Second Session

WEDNESDAY MORNING

15. The second session of the 42nd Annual Meeting of the Neuse Baptist Association was held at First Baptist Church, Kinston, October 27, 1971. David Leary called the meeting to order at 9:45 a.m. He invited the group to sing all stanzas of #138, "Glorious Is Thy Name."

16. Billy Freeman, Pastor of Calvary Center, spoke of the need for Christians to show love for all persons. He read I Corinthians, 13, and closed the worship period with prayer.

17. Mr. Leary introduced Mr. & Mrs. W.A. Mitcheners, who, with the aid of a table full of curios, took the group on a speedy but informative journey to several of the countries where Southern Baptist have mission work. The three main methods of reaching the "lost" are preaching, teaching, and healing, Mrs. Mitchener said.

18. BUSINESS SESSION: Election of Officers - Eugene Hager was asked, by Mr. Leary, to preside at this time as Lonnie Parker, Chairman, presented the report of the Nominating Committee for Associational Officers as found on page #15 of the Book of Reports. There being no other nominations, Lonnie Parker moved the election of those whose names appear in the report, motion seconded by Elliott Hill, carried.

19. The chair was turned back to David Leary, Moderator.

20. The Associational Council Report, on page #12 of the Book of Reports, was given by the Clerk, Mrs. R.S. Ault.

21. Copies of the Calendar of Activities for 1972, were distributed to those who were not present at the Tuesday evening session. Eugene Hager moved the adoption of the Calendar, seconded by Frank Turner, carried.

22. Charles Hodges, Chairman, presented the Committee on Committees Report, found on page #15 of the Book of Reports, and moved the nomination of these, with the vacancies being filled as soon as possible. Motion seconded by Gordon Conklin. There being no other nominations Mr. Conklin moved the election of the people as stated in the report, seconded by Charles Hodges, carried.

23. At this time Gordon Conklin was asked by the Moderator to give a word of welcome to the group assembled.

24. Hymn #293 "Love Is The Theme", was sung by everyone.

25. Reports - Leon Smith, Chairman, gave the Budget-Finance Report on page #3 of the Book of Reports. Mr. Smith moved the adoption of the report, seconded by Bruce

Boyers, carried.

26. The Woman's Missionary Union Report, page #7, in the Book of Reports was given by Mrs. George Ham, Associational W.M.U. Director.

27. The Brotherhood Report, page #16 in the Book of Reports, was given by Mr. H.E. Nickens, Associational Brotherhood Director.

28. The Superintendent of Missions, Eugene Hager, gave his report found on page #12, in the Book of Reports.

29. Russell Morris, Minister of Education-Youth, First Baptist Church, Kinston, was recognized to make an announcement about and give instructions for lunch.

30. M.O. Sears, Chairman, gave the Evangelism Committee Report on page #1 of the Book of Reports.

31. Gordon Conklin was given time to speak about the Amendment to it's Constitution to be presented at the State Convention next month, which would require every congregation to practice Baptism by emersion or forfeit any participation in the State Convention. He urged all churches be represented there.

32. For the worship period, James Hathorn, Pastor at Sandy Bottom, read from Genesis the first chapter beginning with the twenty-six verse, also Genesis 2:15.

33. A lovely solo was sung by Mrs. Norma Jean Hill of First Baptist Church, Kinston.

34. The Annual Sermon was brought by Eugene Hager. He said that much has been taught and preached about the stewardship of possessions, but man has overlooked the fact that he is, by God's decree, a steward of the "Garden Earth". His closing remark was, "If God has given to us the wonderful 'Garden Earth', do we dare give back to Him, a smelly junk yard?"

35. The Benediction for the morning session and the Blessing for the noon meal was offered by Lacy Oliver.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

36. The worship period was begun by the entire group singing hymn #307, "He Keeps Me Singing". George McKeithan, Pastor of Grainger Baptist Church, read Romans 13 and led in prayer.

37. Norman Arant read the names of the deceased church members of Neuse Baptist Association for the Memorial Service. Mr. Arant closed the period with prayer.

38. Mr. M.A. Shaver, Associational Representative for the "Biblical Recorder", relinquished his report time to Marse Grant, Editor of the "Recorder". Mr. Grant was heard at this time.

39. Roger Williams, of Kennedy Home, extended an invitation to all present to the dedication of several new buildings on the Kennedy Home Campus, at 3 p.m. November 7, 1971.

40. The Clerk made the attendance report for the Wednesday session as follows: 25 churches, represented by 63 messengers, 10 pastors, 4 alternates and 18 visitors.

41. Bruce Boyers, Chairman, made the Place and Preacher Committee report. The recommendation being that the 1972 Neuse Baptist Associational Annual Meeting be held at LaGrange for the Tuesday night session and Love Memorial, assisted by Jordan's Chapel, for the Wednesday session. Recommended for preacher was Earl Farthing, Pastor of Madison Avenue Baptist Church, and as alternate, George McKeithan, Pastor of Grainger Baptist Church. Mr. Boyers put this recommendation in the form of a motion, seconded by M.L. Tyndall, motion carried.

42. George McKeithan, Chairman, made the Camp Report, found on page #1 of the Book of Reports and added that he hoped at least ten youths from each of our churches would attend our camps this coming summer.

43. Earl Farthing, Chairman, presented the Resolutions for the 42nd Annual Meeting of the Neuse Baptist Association. Mr. Farthing made the motion the Resolutions be adopted, seconded by Elliott Hill, carried.

44. David Leary presented the new officers of the Association to those present and assured them that these workers would be willing, at all times, to help in any way possible, if asked.

45. Hymn #465, "God of Grace and God of Glory" was sung by the group.

46. Dr. Perry Crouch, Baptist State Convention General Secretary & Treasurer, spoke on the subject, "State Missions and Co-operative Program". Dr. Crouch told those present that one hundred and forty-one years ago seven preachers and seven laymen got together and organized the Southern Baptist Convention. He said it was in 1924 that the President of the Convention appointed a Committee to study the question of how Baptist could better support the needs of their institutions and agencies. The result of this study was the Co-operation Program. Dr. Crouch expressed concern over the complacency of our churches. He stated his belief that the church was born of a missionary spirit and that today, more than ever, the purpose of the church is to let people know the "Good News".

47. The 42nd Session of the Neuse Baptist Association was closed at 2:35 p.m. on a motion to adjourn, which was seconded and carried. Elliott Hill gave the Benediction.

Reports

SUMMARY OF ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL MEETINGS

The Neuse Baptist Association Council meets only four times a year, with two meetings, October and November, being specified by the Constitution.

The first meeting was held November 2, 1970, at Love Memorial Baptist Church. The following matters were considered: (1) Because Hollowell Oil Company had refunded the Association forty-two dollars and fifty cents (\$42.50), the equivalent of one month's rent, Mr. Hager made a motion the Clerk send a letter of thanks. The motion was seconded and carried: (2) Leon Smith made a motion that the Executive Committee select the other two dates for council meetings and pass the information to the Council members, the motion was seconded and carried: (3) Reports of Organizations and Committees were heard.

The second Council meeting was February 8, 1971, at Spilman Baptist Church. Items considered were: (1) Reports of Organizations and Committees: (2) George McKeithan was elected as Chairman of the Camp Committee upon the recommendation of the Committee on Committees.

The third Council Meeting was May 3, 1971, at Rosewood Baptist Church. The following matters were considered: (1) Reports of Committees: (2) The Nominating Committee presented the following to serve as "Officers-Elect" until the Annual Meeting in October 1971: Moderator - David O. Leary, Vice-Moderator - Charles L. Tanner, Clerk - Mrs. R.S. Ault, Treasurer - George Dupree, Historian - Forrest T. Jones, Trustee - Lindy Speight, Sunday School Director - Ralph Knight, Church

Training Director - Frank Bowers, Brotherhood Director - H.E. Nickens, WMU Director - Mrs. George Ham, Music Director - Charles F. Hodges: (3) Organizational Reports were heard.

The fourth Council Meeting was October 4, 1971, at New Hope Baptist Church, at which time reports from Committees and Organizations were the only order of business.

Youth Night was held at Spilman Memorial with about seventy attending. The "Outreachers" of Seven Springs gave our special music. Kay Huggins showed slides and told of the work being done during the summer by our youth. Johnny Clements of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes spoke of the Christian life.

Last month, September 12-17, Neil Jackson of the Church Recreation Department visited about 19 churches looking at their recreation program and facilities and making suggestions. He led a workshop on Thursday and Friday nights at the Seven Springs church. We are planning to have him back next September as a follow-up time. Plan to be included.

Plans are under way to offer our 10, 11, & 12 grade youth a Vocational Preference Inventory, lead by members of the Chowan Staff.

We hope every church will participate in our Church Training Workshop (Nov. 29- "M" Night). Our state Secretary of Church Training, Sam O'Neal, will share some of the brand new ideas, such as the creative arts festival. He will also be giving a sermon on "The World Is Listening." We feel that every Baptist should at least learn about the new ideas in Church Training and share their own ideas.

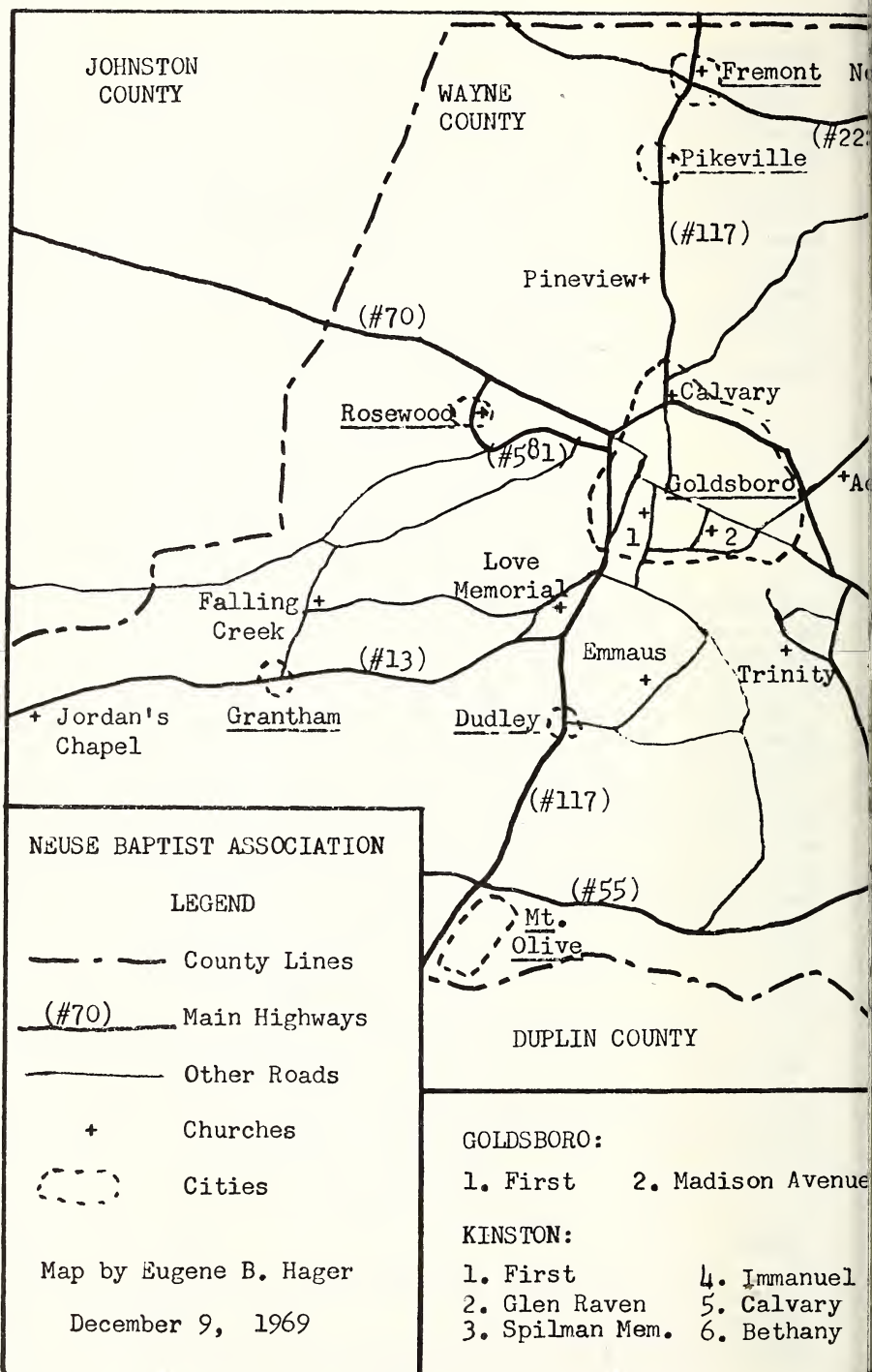

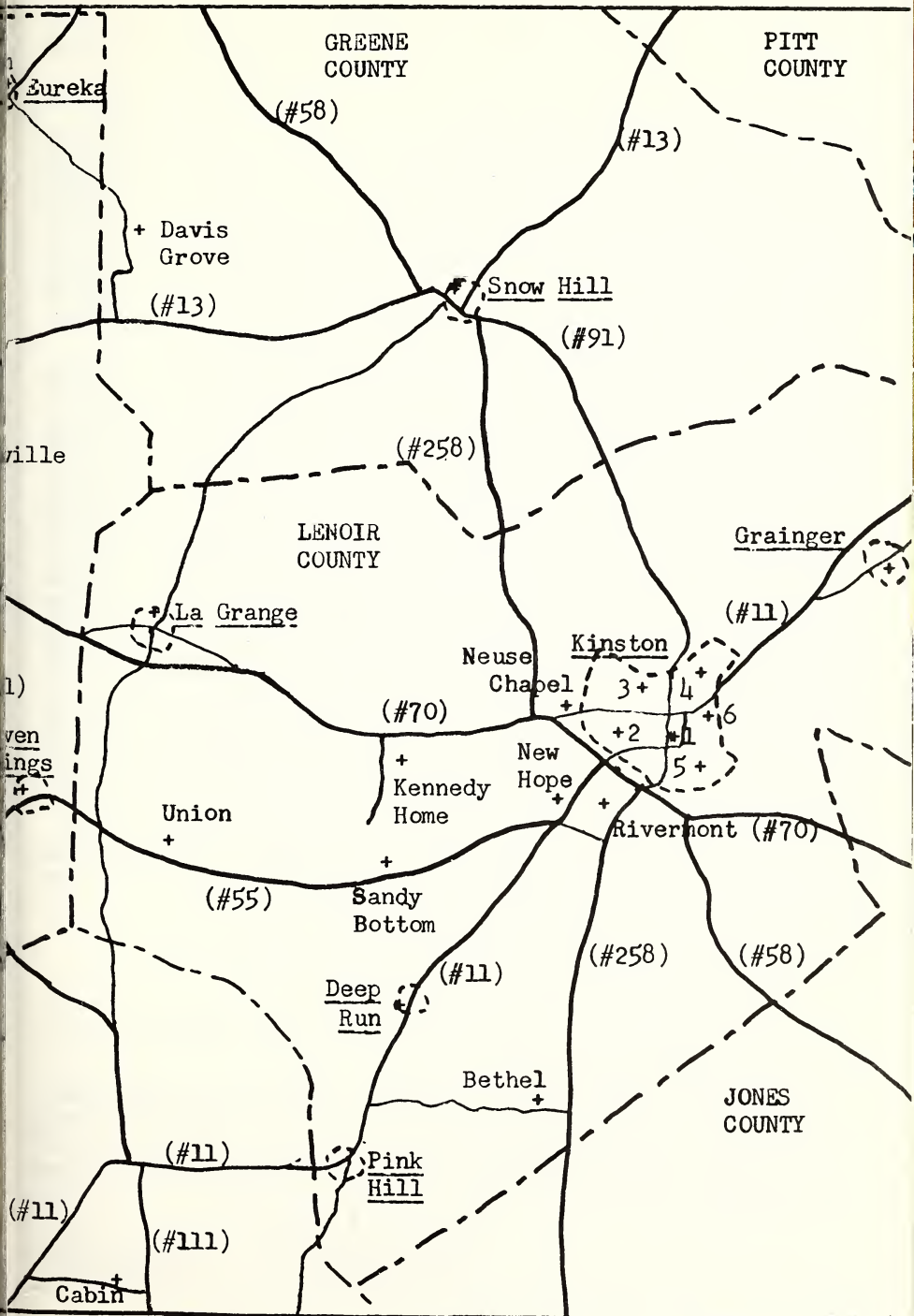

EVANGELISM REPORT

All Christians need to thank God for the renewed interest among youth in evangelism. This was evident during the Youth Evangelism Night this past February 2nd when almost 20,000 youth and adults overflowed the Greensboro Coliseum and War Memorial Auditorium. 1,519 decisions were made by these youth. Also many youth in churches across our state are involved in witnessing for Christ in unique ways.

There is great interest in North Carolina and the entire Southern Baptist Convention in the new WIN materials on lay witnessing and the one week Lay Evangelism Schools. Over twenty-five associations have already started specific planning toward a one week Lay Evangelism School in their area.

The Neuse Baptist Association is planning a Lay Evangelism School for May 8-14, 1972. The purpose of the schools is to motivate, train, and lead each Christian to be an evangelistic witness as he is involved in today's world.

The first preparation meeting for the school was held on September 9 at the La Grange Baptist Church with 70 present representing 10 churches.

We urge each church to commit itself to participate in the school (deadline for participation commitment is February 1, 1972) and to begin now to enlist those among you who are really interested in winning souls to Christ.

The Rev. William Lamb, State Director of Evangelism will direct and teach in our school.

Some of the churches are already using the "WIN" (Witness Involvement Now) materials for Church Training studies. There are six booklets (each designed for four one hour study periods) which are excellent for this purpose. They may be ordered on your regular church literature order blank from Nashville at 25¢ per copy.

The 26th Statewide Evangelism Conference will be February 7-9, 1972 at the Cumberland County Memorial Auditorium in Fayetteville. We urge all Pastors to attend with a good number of laymen from your church.

The next Statewide Youth Evangelism Night will be on Friday evening, August 18, 1972 at Greensboro Coliseum.

Remember to pray earnestly for the non-Christians in your church community, in North Carolina and around the world that through our efforts together the Holy Spirit may lead many persons to commit their lives to Jesus Christ.

Constitution

of the

NEUSE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I. Name

This body shall be known as the Neuse Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. Purpose

The purpose of the Association shall be to devise, recommend and promote measures for increasing the harmony and spiritual power of the cooperating churches, to assist in developing and directing their energies, resources and gifts in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom, and to cooperate with the Baptist Convention of North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention in all religious, educational, mission, Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union and other work fostered by the said conventions.

ARTICLE III. Membership

SECTION 1. Membership in the body shall be composed of all Missionary Baptist pastors and duly elected messengers of the cooperating churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be represented, at the annual meeting of the Association and at any special meeting during the year, by messengers who shall be duly certified, in the following ratio: Each church with a membership of not more than one hundred members (100) shall be entitled to five (5) messengers. Churches having more than one hundred (100) members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for every additional one hundred (100) members or a major fraction thereof, providing that no church shall have more than twelve (12) messengers.

SECTION 3. New churches seeking to seat messengers in the Association must make written application to the Missions Committee not later than one month prior to the last meeting of the Associational Council prior to the annual meeting of the Association, giving evidence of their faith and order, and their agreement to cooperate in the general program of the Association, The Baptist Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention. The Missions Committee shall study applications and make recommendation to the Associational Council regarding same, and in turn, the Associational Council shall make its recommendations to the annual meeting of the Association for its action.

SECTION 4. All new missions and new churches should be sponsored by a local church or churches.

SECTION 5. The Association shall have power, upon given written notice of nine (9) months and by two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of messengers present and voting, to withdraw fellowship from any church that shall willfully depart from orthodox principles of the Christian religion as taught in the Southern Baptist churches or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or by letter at the annual session of the Association without sufficient reason or that fails to support causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular or that ceases to be missionary in practice.

SECTION 6. Any church may decline to send messengers to the Association at its pleasure. Whenever this constitutes a withdrawal of fellowship on the part of the church, the Association shall not as a body, or through a representative or representatives, seek to restrain by coercion or law the withdrawal action of the church.

ARTICLE IV. Meetings

SECTION 1. The Association shall convene annually on the fourth Monday night and Tuesday in October and may meet with different churches on the two (2) successive days.

SECTION 2. The time of the annual meeting may be changed, or special meeting called, by the Associational Council upon notice to the cooperating churches.

ARTICLE V. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the Association shall begin on January first (1st) and end on December thirty-first (31st) of each year.

ARTICLE VI. Officers

SECTION 1. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, the Trustees, the Associational Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Church Music Director, and such others as may be authorized by the Association.

SECTION 2. All officers shall be members of churches affiliated with the Association.

SECTION 3. Nominations for the officers shall be presented to the Associational

Council at its Spring Meeting for approval. These nominees shall then serve as "Officers-Elect" until the Annual Session of the Association, at which time (1) they shall be considered for election by the Association. (2) Any officer may be elected to succeed himself, except the Moderator, who may not serve more than two (2) years in succession. Vacancies occurring between Annual Sessions shall be filled by the Associational Council.

ARTICLE VII. The Associational Council

SECTION 1. The Associational Council shall consist of each Pastor in the Association, the Officers of the Association, the Superintendent of Missions, the immediate Past-Moderator, the representatives of the Denominational agencies, and two (2) lay members from each cooperative church, to be elected by the church. The names of the lay members shall be duly certified by notifying the Associational Clerk.

SECTION 2. The Officers of the Association shall serve as the Officers of the Council

SECTION 3. The Associational Council shall act for the Association in the interim between Annual Sessions. It shall carry out the policies and will of the Association, and shall make reports to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Associational Council also has the power to fill vacancies among the Officers, the Committees and/or the Executive Committee of the Association that may occur during the year.

SECTION 4. Twenty (20) members of the Associational Council will constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VIII. Administration

SECTION 1. The Superintendent of Missions shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program of the Association and the denomination. He shall work under the direction of and be subject to the authority of the Associational Council. He shall be nominated by the Executive Committee to The Associational Council, and elected by the Association at any Annual Session, or by The Associational Council if the next Annual Session of the Association is thirty (30) days or more beyond the date on which the Superintendent of Missions is nominated.

ARTICLE IX. Committees

SECTION 1. At a meeting of the Associational Council prior to the annual meeting of the Association, the Moderator shall appoint a committee on committees, consisting of not less than five (5) members, whose duty it shall be to offer nominations to the Association for members and chairmen of all standing committees herein provided except those already named by the Constitution.

SECTION 2. The Association shall have the standing committees listed below, along with other committees authorized by the Association. These committees shall begin their duties at the close of the annual session, and shall make reports of their work to the Planning Committee. Members of the committees shall be selected from the membership of those churches cooperating with the Association and are subject to re-election provided, that in no case, any person shall serve on the same committee longer than three (3) years in succession, with the exception of the Music Committee and the Camp Committee. The Moderator and Superintendent of Missions shall be considered ex officio members of all standing Committees.

ARTICLE X. Annual Report of the Church

Each cooperating church shall send annually to the Association a report on the Associational Letter which is provided. Said reports should reach the Associational Clerk not later than October 15 of that year.

ARTICLE XI. Special Days

The fourth (4th) Sunday of January, of each year shall be designated as "Association Day" in all churches for the purpose of receiving an offering for the Missionary activities of the Association, such as church building lots, facilities for missions, rentals, Superintendent of Missions.

ARTICLE XII. Adoption of Constitution

This Constitution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall supercede any and all constitutions previously adopted.

ARTICLE XIII. Amendment of Constitution

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association provided the amendment has been presented in writing to the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws no later than September 1, and presented to the October meeting of the Associational Council, and read on two successive days of the annual meeting, and receives a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present at the second meeting.

BY-LAWS

"The Work Of The Association Shall Be Governed By The Following By-Laws."

ARTICLE I - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. THE MODERATOR shall preside over the annual meeting of the Association and begin each session punctually. He shall appoint such committees as may be authorized by the Constitution, or the Association, enforce the rules, preserve order, and exercise all prerogatives of a presiding officer according to parliamentary usage, and serve as chairman of the Associational Council, and ex officio member of all standing committees.

SECTION 2. THE VICE-MODERATOR shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence and serve as Chairman of the Calendar Committee.

SECTION 3. THE CLERK shall keep the records of the proceedings of the Association, superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes, keep on file the printed minutes and other important papers of the Association and shall serve as Secretary of the Associational Council and the Planning Committee. For his services, the clerk shall be paid an amount to be determined annually by the Association.

SECTION 4. THE TREASURER shall receive, safeguard and disburse all funds of the Association. Disbursements shall be made by the Treasurer in accordance with the Budget adopted by the Association. Non-Budget items should be approved by the Budget-Finance and Planning Committee. The treasurer shall make quarterly reports to the Planning Committee and an Annual Report to the Association. He shall be bonded in such an amount as the Planning Committee shall direct.

SECTION 5. THE HISTORIAN shall collect facts of interest to the Association and the cooperating churches, and shall make a report to each annual meeting of the Association.

SECTION 6. THE SUNDAY SCHOOL DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Sunday School Program in the Association in Cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 7. THE CHURCH TRAINING DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Church Training Programs in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 8. THE MUSIC DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Church Music Program in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 9. THE BROTHERHOOD DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Brotherhood Program in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 10. THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Woman's Missionary Union Program in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 11. THE TRUSTEES shall rotate one each year, and as provided by law and action of the Association, hold in trust the title to all property of the Association and shall represent the Association in all matters of legal responsibility regarding the purchase, improvement and disposal of Associational property. They shall have no power to buy, sell, mortgage, lease or transfer any property of the Association without a specific vote of the Association or Associational Council authorizing such action.

SECTION 12. THE SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS, though not an officer, his duties shall be:

I. GENERAL ASSOCIATIONAL WORK

1. Planning - Co-ordination
 - a. Assist in preparing the associational calendar of activities
 - b. Work closely with associational officers and committees
 - c. Work closely with Pastors' Conference and other associational organizations
 - d. Helping to plan association-wide campaigns and activities (Schools of Missions, Clinics, Enlargement Campaigns, etc.)
2. Dissemination of Information
 - a. Publishing an associational newsletter
 - b. Preparation of Book of Reports for Annual Meeting
 - c. Announcements at various associational meetings
 - d. Keeping up-to-date file in office on associational and denominational causes and activities
3. Promotion
 - a. Associational activities

- b. Denominational causes and activities
(He should keep well-informed on these so as to be able to explain them and answer questions about them)
- 4. Counseling
 - Associational leaders
 - Pastors
 - Pulpit Committees
 - Pastorless churches
- 5. Administrative (in the office)
 - Correspondence, file, equipment and supplies, office routine, etc.
- 6. Give time and attention as needed to work with military-related families through the churches of the association and, in co-operation with the Baptist State Convention.

II. ASSISTANCE TO THE CHURCHES

(Only upon invitation of the pastor, or of responsible Church leaders.)

In the Supt. of Missions, the Association provides a trained worker on call for churches, pastors, and leaders. He should endeavor to keep himself trained and informed.

- Pulpit Supply
- Training and Teaching (study courses, conferences, clinics, etc.)
- Church Community Surveys and Maps
- V.B.S. (for pastorless churches or where special need exists)
- Other assistance as the need arises

III. ASPECTS OF EMPLOYMENT

- 1. Responsible to Associational Council
- 2. Three weeks vacation with pay.
- 3. Maximum of four weeks of denominational or church-related work outside the Association (Schools of Missions, Church Community Surveys, Revivals etc.) These to be carefully scheduled so as to avoid interference with his major associational responsibilities.
- 4. He shall submit a report of his work to the Associational Council at its meetings, and to the Annual Association at its Meeting.
- 5. A notice of thirty days shall be given by the Supt. of Missions or the Association before employment is terminated.

ARTICLE II - COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES, consisting of not less than five (5) members, shall nominate the members and chairmen of all standing committees herein provided, except those already named by the Constitution. They shall submit these nominations to the Association for election.

SECTION 2. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDER OF BUSINESS, consisting of five (5) members, shall prepare the Program for the Annual Sessions. This suggested program shall be presented to the Association at the beginning of the first Session of the Annual Meeting for action. The Officers of the Association and the President of the Minister's Conference are Ex-Officio members. The Moderator shall serve as Chairman.

SECTION 3. THE COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS shall be composed of three (3) members whose duties shall be to present nominations for the "Officers Elect" to the spring meeting of the Associational Council, and to the Association for all officers

authorized herein, or by the Association. They shall present nominations to the Association for the representatives of the various agencies of the State Convention. They shall also present nominations to the Associational Council to fill any vacancy which may occur during the year.

SECTION 4. THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM shall be composed of five (5) members who shall cooperate with the State Chairman of Evangelism in the promotion of approved evangelistic efforts within the Association. It shall encourage evangelism in the churches, especially where the need is apparent, and shall help provide evangelistic services in the unchurched areas within the boundaries of the Association.

SECTION 5. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDINATION shall be composed of three (3) members who shall act in an advisory capacity for churches. The committee shall assist any church which requests its services in the examination of candidates for the Christian ministry. It shall help arrange, where necessary, proper services of ordination. Churches are requested to use this committee to examine candidates only after their call to some specific work. Further, churches are requested to refrain from announcing the date of ordination until after the candidate has received approval by this committee.

SECTION 6. THE COMMITTEE ON PLACE AND PREACHER shall be composed of three (3) members, whose duty it shall be to receive or solicit invitations for the place of meeting of the annual session for the following year, and to recommend to the Association in annual session, a place or places of meeting, along with a preacher and alternate for the sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS shall be composed of three (3) members and shall review all resolutions referred to it by the Association, the Associational Council, or the Planning Committee, and report suitable resolutions at the annual meeting.

SECTION 8. THE COMMITTEE ON BUDGET-FINANCE shall be composed of seven (7) members, one from each of the counties of Lenoir, Greene, and Wayne, and one at large, plus the Moderator, Treasurer and Superintendent of Missions. The Committee shall hear and give consideration to requests of the Planning Committee and other leaders in the Associational work. These requests are to be submitted not later than September 15th of each year.

The duties of the committee are as follows:

- (a) To plan and supervise the making and raising of the Budget.
- (b) To implement the financial program of the Association as directed by the Planning Committee of the Association.
- (c) To have a professional audit made of the Treasurer's books and make a report to the Association in its annual meeting.
- (d) To make a monthly financial report to the Planning Committee.

SECTION 9. THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS shall be composed of five (5) members whose duties it shall be to ascertain the need of new churches within the boundaries of the Association; to recommend to the Planning Committee the location of sites and the purchasing of lots for such churches, and to assist the organization of such churches as might be authorized. Churches contemplating making debts on lots, buildings, improvements and/or asking for Pastor's aid, must have the recommendations of the Missions Committee and approval of Planning Committee, if they expect to apply to the Baptist State Mission Board for aid in paying for the same. It shall be the duty of the Missions Committee to study the applications of Churches seeking to seat messengers in the Association as to evidence of their faith and order, and their agreement to cooperate in the general program of the Association, the Baptist Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention. The Committee shall then make recommendations to the Planning Committee regarding same.

SECTION 10. THE COMMITTEE ON MUSIC shall be composed of three (3) members who shall cooperate with the Music Department of the State Convention and shall assist in any music program approved by the Association. The Chairman shall also serve as Associational Music Director.

SECTION 11. THE COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN LIFE shall be composed of three (3) members who shall work with local and State Officials in every phase of promoting civic righteousness.

SECTION 12. THE COMMITTEE ON CAMP ACTIVITIES shall be composed of three (3) members. The chairman shall serve as camp director. The duties of the committee shall be to plan and execute the summer camp.

SECTION 13. THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS shall be composed of three (3) members who shall receive all proposed changes thereto and, upon study of this or other observations, make recommendations to the Association on all Constitution and By-Law changes.

SECTION 14. COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS, consisting of three (3) members, shall plan for our beloved dead a memorial service to be conducted during the Annual Session of the Association.

ARTICLE III - THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

SECTION 1. The Officers of the Council shall be the Moderator, the Vice-Moderator, and the Clerk of the Association.

SECTION 2. The Association Council shall hold an organizational meeting within sixty (60) days after the Annual Meeting, and shall set up the following subcommittees, and any others deemed necessary for the proper handling of Associational business between the Annual Sessions:

1. THE PLANNING COMMITTEE: This committee shall be composed of the Officers of the Association, the Superintendent of Missions, and the Chairman of the various Standing Committees. This committee shall meet every other month, beginning in November, but omitting July and August, (unless otherwise designated by the committee), and shall handle all matters committed to it by the Associational Council. It shall hear Organizational, Committee, and other reports and plans; design promotional activities, and seek ways and means of forwarding the Lord's work in and through the Association. It shall report all actions to the Associational Council at the next regular meeting, and shall be subject to the approval of the Associational Council. A majority of the Committee shall constitute a quorum. The Superintendent of Missions shall serve as chairman.
 - (a) THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE: This committee shall be composed of the Officers of the Association, the President of the Minister's Conference, and the Superintendent of Missions. (It shall be the duty of this Committee to plan and recommend through the PLANNING COMMITTEE to the Annual Session of the Association, a Calendar of Activities for the coming year. The Vice-Moderator shall serve as chairman.)
 - (b) ANY OR ALL OTHER STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE ASSOCIATION shall function as subcommittees of the Planning Committee.

SECTION 3. The council shall meet every other month (except July and August). The first meeting shall be held within sixty (60) days after the Annual Meeting. Times and places of these meetings shall be determined by the Council.

SECTION 4. The Council shall submit to the Association in Annual Session a full and complete Budget, Calendar of Activities, and a full and complete report of its work.

ARTICLE IV - RULES OF ORDER

The following rules shall govern deliberations in the meeting of the Association and the Associational Council.

SECTION 1. The official transaction of business in all regular meetings of the Association, the Associational Council, and the Planning Committee shall be by the affirmative majority vote of the members present and voting, except in matters relating to the constitution, the withdrawing of fellowship from any cooperating church, and the seating of messengers from those churches desiring to cooperate with the Association. In called meetings of the Association or of the Associational Council, a number equal to the majority of the membership of the Associational Council and representing a majority of the cooperating churches shall be necessary to constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. A messenger wishing to speak shall rise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration and shall avoid all personalities. No messenger shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special permission.

SECTION 3. All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer or at his request, read by the clerk before the vote is taken.

SECTION 4. When a question is under consideration, no other motion or proposition shall be received except a motion to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time. When there are several motions, they shall have preference in the order in which they come.

SECTION 5. The general business of the Association shall be recommended by the Committee On Order Of Business at the beginning of the first session of the Annual Meeting of the Association. When adopted this report shall become the order of business for the members and cannot be changed except by the vote of the Association.

SECTION 6. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided by Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE V - ADOPTION OF BY-LAWS

SECTION 1. These by-laws shall take effect immediately upon their adoption, and shall supercede any and all by-laws previously adopted.

SECTION 2. These By-Laws may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association provided the amendment has been presented in writing to the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws no later than September 1, and presented to the October meeting of the Associational Council. Passage shall be by majority vote of the messengers present and voting.

 First Session

MONDAY EVENING

1. The 43rd Annual Session of the Neuse Baptist Association was called to order at 7:30 p.m. on October 23, 1972, by the Moderator, David O. Leary, at the First Baptist Church, LaGrange. The Young People's Bell Choir from First Baptist Church of Kinston, under the leadership of Herbert Joyner, presented several beautiful numbers during the worship period.

2. Rev. Caleb Goodwin, Pastor of the Host Church, extended a cordial welcome to all present.

3. The Moderator declared the 43rd Annual Meeting in session and made a motion that the program, as printed, be accepted and followed unless it became necessary to make a change. Motion seconded by Rev. Caleb Goodwin - carried.

4. BUSINESS SESSION: Eugene Hager, Superintendent of Missions, asked the pastors and church staff members, who had come to the Association since the October 1971 Annual Meeting, to stand and be introduced. They were: Flay Price, John Thompson, Robert J. Floyd, and C. Arthur Wall.

5. At this time the Moderator recognized the visitors from outside the Association who were present.

6. In the absence of the Chairman of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, Mr. Hager presented the proposed changes to the Constitution and By-Laws. He explained that the changes would be voted on during the afternoon session tomorrow.

7. Mr. Hager also had copies of the "1973 Calendar of Activities" distributed. He reminded those present that this too would be voted on Tuesday afternoon.

8. The Clerk gave the registration for the evening session as of 8:15 p.m. as follows: Pastors-20, Messengers-103, and Visitors-38.

9. Rev. Bill Poole, Superintendent of the Baptist Homes for the Aging, spoke. He told the group that he, as well as all connected with the operation of the Home, realize that theirs is a Divine Task. He said they do attempt to minister to the total person; physical, mental and spiritual. Mr. Poole said it should be realized that the work done at the Home is a joint ministry of staff and the Baptist of North Carolina. He explained that 10% of their budget was made up by the Cooperative Program and 30% by the special offering taken in February each year. He emphasized that many of the guests could not be there if it were not for this offering, for no one is ever denied admission because of lack of funds. In closing he expressed sympathy for the family of Mr. Henry Belk who was a trustee for the Homes at one time.

10. Lonnie Parker and Gene Hager took a "Supper Count" for Tuesday night. Everyone was advised, at this time, that there would be a charge of \$1.00 per plate for the meal.

11. Copies of the Cooperative Program Receipts were handed out to those present.

12. Mr. John Tompson, Minister of Music and Youth at Kennedy Home, led the

group in singing Hymn #41, "To God Be the Glory". Mr. Herbert Joyner was at the piano.

13. REPORTS: Rev. Tom Waits, Associational Sunday School Director, made the Sunday School Report, a copy of which had been given to each person along with the Book of Reports. He also made the Vacation Bible School Report. Mr. Waits, then, called attention to a display promoting the January Bible Study of "Galatians". He said he hoped all the churches would provide a time for this on their calendar.

14. The Church Training Report was presented by Rev. Frank Bowers, Associational Church Training Director. He urged all churches who did not have a Church Training Program, to organize one so as to be sure their members were being offered every opportunity of Christian Training and development.

15. Rev. M.O. Sears, Chairman of the Committee, gave the Evangelism Report. Mr. Sears showed a letter in which Calvary Baptist Church of Goldsboro stated their intention to vote on November 15, 1972 on whether or not to disassociate themselves with the Neuse Baptist Association, the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. All were urged, by Mr. Sears, to pray for God to have His Way in this matter.

16. A beautiful duet was sung by Carolyn Allison and Tom Proffitt, accompanied on the piano by Herbert Joyner, all are members of First Baptist Church, Kinston.

17. Rev. George McKeithan, Pastor of Grainger Baptist Church, read the Scripture-John 10:1-5.

18. The Sermon was delivered by Rev. Earl Farthing, Pastor of Madison Avenue. Mr. Farthing said, like the sheep mentioned in the Passage just read, we as Christians, should always be alert to hear and recognize the Voice of God. We were given two "clues" where we could hear the Voice of God. The Bible and The World. All were cautioned not to manipulate the Bible and use it only to his own advantage, but to study and meditate upon it so God could speak to us through His Word. Also we were told that as we go out into the world we should not attempt to hush ALL the voices there for by so doing we take a chance on silencing the Voice of God Himself. Rev. Farthing closed his message with these thoughts - Through His Word, The Bible, and the people of the world, God is speaking. It is up to the church to hear His Voice, find out what He is saying, and follow Him.

19. Before closing this Session, David Leary, Moderator, once again urged all to remember Calvary in their prayers.

20. Rev. Arthur Wall, Pastor of Immanuel Baptist Church, pronounced the Benediction.

Second Session

TUESDAY AFTERNOON

21. The second session of the 43rd Annual Meeting of the Neuse Baptist Association was held at Love Memorial Baptist Church, October 24, 1972. David Leary, Moderator, called the meeting to order at 4 p.m. and led the group in singing Hymn #328, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus". Mrs. Delma Jackson, member of Love Memorial, was at the organ for the afternoon session.

22. Rev. Frank Turner, Pastor of Fremont Baptist Church, led the group in Responsive Reading #5, "God's World and Word". Mr. Turner then closed this worship period with prayer.

23. Rev. Frank Bowers, Pastor of Love Memorial, extended a welcome to all from the membership of both Jordan's Chapel and Love Memorial.

24. The Moderator called attention to the Hospital Report in the Book of Reports.

25. Rev. J. Boyce Brooks, Pastor of First Baptist Church, Warsaw, and a Trustee of Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem spoke. He said it was his hope that, like a parent's concern for a child far from home, Neuse Baptists would not let the fact that Winston-Salem is some distance away make us feel any less responsible for the work going on there. We were told that the Hospital's 50th Anniversary will be next year. Rev. Brooks related many facts about the Hospital and its program over the years. He reminded the group that the care and treatment given patients in the Hospital was only a small part of the activities. He told how doctors completing their training have gone to some 25 foreign countries to practice medicine as well as witness for the Lord; how fortunate it is to have men from other countries come to Bowman Gray to train; the importance of the Pastoral Care Program; the splendid work of the Chaplains; and the dedication of the staff members. He urged all present not to forget the Mother's Day Offering, all of which goes to pay for charity cases.

26. BUSINESS SESSION: Lonnie Parker, Chairman of Nominating Committee, presented the Committee's Report, with one change-Denominational Agency Representative for Homes for Aging, Rev. J.C. Hill. Mr. Parker moved the adoption of the Report, 2nd by Frank Turner - carried.

27. Rev. Rodney Beals, member of the Committee, presented the Committee on Committees Report. Mr. Beals made a motion the Report be accepted, 2nd by Caleb Goodwin, carried.

28. The Summary of Associational Council meetings was read by the Clerk. Mrs. R.S. Ault.

29. Eugene Hager presented a revised "Suggested Annual Meeting Schedule", and explained the reasons for the changes. Rev. M.O. Sears made a motion to accept the Schedule, 2nd by Wylie Hill - carried.

30. Mr. Hager then called everyone's attention to the Constitution and By-Laws changes to be voted on. Each change was read, explained and voted on separately. (See Report of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee.)

31. The Moderator presented another change in the By-Laws. Rev. Frank Turner moved the acceptance of the change, 2nd by Tom Waits, carried.

32. After explaining the necessity to make some change in the Calendar of Activities, Mr. Hager made a motion it be accepted as printed, 2nd by M.O. Sears, carried.

33. Mr. John Thompson led the group in Hymn #212, "Love Lifted Me".

34. In the absence of the Chairman, the Moderator gave the Budget and Finance Report. Mr. Leary called attention to the changes between the '72 and '73 Budgets. Earl Farthing made a motion the Budget be accepted, 2nd by George McKeithan, carried.

35. The WMU Report was given by Mrs. George Ham, Associational Director.

36. Mr. H.E. Nickens, Associational Director, gave the Brotherhood Report.

37. The Superintendent of Missions, Eugene B. Hager, presented his Annual Report.

38. Dr. Harold M. White, State Baptist Convention Stewardship Director, was recognized by the Moderator. Dr. White brought greetings from Dr. Crouch, as well as, all others at the Convention.

39. Roger Williams, Superintendent of Kennedy Home, spoke on the changes in the operation of the Children's Homes over the years. He cited the changes in life style, clothing, number of people residing in a cottage, the construction requirements, and the increase in the number of Foster Homes. Mr. Rogers explained to the people that the money for up grading of cottages to meet the safety code and the building and replacing of others comes from the 10 Star Building Program, he went on to say, that the monies received through the Thanksgiving Offering goes for the benefit of the children.

40. The Benediction for the afternoon session and the Blessing for the evening meal were offered by Rev. Murray Craft, Pastor of Emmaus Baptist Church.

TUESDAY EVENING SESSION

41. At 7:15 p.m. the Moderator, Rev. David O. Leary, called to order the final session of the 43rd Annual Meeting of the Neuse Baptist Association.

42. Everyone sang Hymn #266 "Standing on the Promises", led by John Thompson, with David Periconi, member of Madison Avenue Baptist Church, at the organ for the evening session.

43. The Clerk made the attendance report for the Tuesday session as follows: 22-churches, 17-pastors, 69-Messengers, 59-visitors.

44. Rev. Flay Price, Pastor of New Hope Baptist Church, read portions of Scripture from Hebrews, chapters 6 and 12, he closed the worship period with prayer.

45. The Memorial Service was conducted by Dr. John H. Bunn, retired minister.

46. M.A. Shaver, Associational Representative for Biblical Recorder, made his report.

47. J. Marse Grant, Editor of the Biblical Recorder, spoke briefly and expressed his joy that the circulation of the Recorder had passed the 2,000 mark last month. He said he was pleased to note the Recorder was a part of the growth of Baptist work in North Carolina.

48. At this time Mr. Hager recognized a new pastor who had come to Neuse Association since October of 1971: Rev. Ray Cooper.

49. BUSINESS SESSION: Mr. Bruce Boyers, Chairman of Place and Preacher Committee, reported that for the 1973 Annual Meeting, New Hope Baptist Church had agreed to host the Monday Evening Session and Goldsboro First the Tuesday Afternoon and Evening Sessions. Also the Committee recommended Rev. David O. Leary, Pastor of Spilman Memorial, as preacher for 1973, and Rev. Tom Waits, Pastor of First Baptist Church, Snow Hill, as alternate. Mr. Boyers made a motion that the report be accepted, 2nd by Roger Williams, carried.

50. George McKeithan, Chairman of Camp Committee, made this report, then relinquished the remainder of the time to Frank Bowers, Pastor of Love Memorial, and five members of the Love Memorial Acteen Organization. The girls gave an interesting account of "a day at camp" and closed with a song they had learned while at Mundo Vista.

51. Earl Farthing, Chairman, presented a Resolution for the 43rd Annual Meeting of the Neuse Baptist Association. Mr. Farthing made a motion the Resolution be adopted, 2nd by Rodney Beals, carried.

52. The Moderator presented the new officers of the Association to those present. He offered congratulations and encouragement to the officers themselves. As he accepted the gavel, Mr. Shaver said he was happy to note that the positions for the coming year were almost evenly divided between Pastors and Laymen. He extended a challenge to more laymen to become involved in the work of the Association.

53. When recognized by the Moderator, both Dr. Edward H. Pruden, Pastor at Meredith College and Dr. T. Sloane Guy, representing Wake Forest University, spoke briefly.

54. Rev. Tom Freeman, President of North Carolina State Baptist Convention, spoke on "Christian Education". Mr. Freeman took as his Text that portion of Matthew 28, the Great Commission. He said Christian Education does not begin in College, but in the Church's Sunday Schools. He said it is alarming how much ignorance there is about the Bible and how much misunderstanding of the Scriptures there is. But, at the same time, there is evidence of much interest in God's Word. In order to build up the Sunday Schools it is necessary to teach the Bible to people, "not empty chairs". Mr. Freeman said it is necessary to go out and bring in the lost and lead them to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ. Holding his copy of the Bible high he said, "We have the

Book with which to get the job done. Do we have the courage to use it for God?"

55. Mrs. R.S. Ault sang a solo "I'll Walk With God", accompanied by Mr. David Periconi, at the organ.

56. During a period of "Sharing", several ministers spoke of events and programs that had been of benefit to their local church and community.

57. Eugene Hager moved that the Association give a standing vote of thanks to the officers of the past year. This was done.

58. The Moderator declared the 43rd Annual Neuse Baptist Association Meeting adjourned at 9 p.m. Rev. Leon Smith, Pastor of First Baptist Church, Goldsboro, gave the Benediction.

Reports

SUMMARY OF ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL MEETINGS FOR 1971-72

The Neuse Baptist Associational Council meets only four times a year, with two meetings, October and November, being specified by the Constitution.

The first meeting was held November 1, 1971, at Adamsville Baptist Church. The following matters were considered: (1) Because Hollowell Oil Company had refunded the Association the equivalent of one month's rent (\$42.50), Mr. Hager made a motion that the Clerk send a letter of thanks. The motion was seconded and carried. (2) After the Moderator read the dates and places for the 1972 Council Meetings, a motion that they be accepted was made and passed. (3) Lonnie Parker made a motion that the Constitution and By-Laws Committee consider a date later than the first Monday in November for the Associational Council Meeting. Motion seconded by M.O. Sears - carried. (4) Lacy Oliver nominated Lonnie Parker as Vice-Moderator. Mr. Parker declined the nomination. (5) In the absence of the Chairman and because no report from the Missions Committee was available, Mr. Hager made a motion that tentative approval for state aid for Love Memorial and any other church that had been approved by the Council in the past two years be approved again, subject to the approval of the Missions Committee itself. This was seconded by H.E. Nickens - carried. (6) Reports of Organizations and Committees were heard.

The second Council Meeting was January 31, 1972, at New Hope Baptist Church. Items considered were: (1) Reports of Organizations and Committees. (2) After Lonnie Parker, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the name of M.A. Shaver as Vice-Moderator, he was elected.

The third Council Meeting was May 1, 1972, at First Baptist Church, Goldsboro. The following matters were considered: (1) Mr. Hager made a motion that the Council vote tentative approval of the "Suggested Annual Meeting Schedule", as presented by the Executive Committee, until it can be submitted for final approval at the Annual Meeting in October. The motion was seconded by Mr. Nickens - carried. (2) A motion by Mr. H.E. Nickens, in accordance with Article IV, SECTION 2 of the Constitution, was that the Council change the 1972 Annual Meeting from Tuesday evening October 24 at La Grange to Monday evening October 23, and the session at Love Memorial to the afternoon and evening of Tuesday, October 24 instead of the morning and afternoon of Wednesday, October 25. Motion seconded by Mr. Boyers - carried. (3) Elliott Hill made a motion that the matter of financing the meal for the Annual Meeting be referred to the Executive Committee. Motion seconded by Tom Waits. (4) Mr. Hager offered a substitute motion that the churches responsible for serving the meal consider charging up to \$1.00 per person. Motion seconded by Elliott Hill - carried. (5) In the absence of

the Chairman, Lonnie Parker, Mrs. Ault read the Nominating Committee's report as follows: The following are recommended as officers elect for Neuse Baptist Association for the year 1972-73: Moderator - Mr. M.A. Shaver, Vice-Moderator - Rev. Frank Bowers, Clerk - Mrs. R.S. Ault, Sr., Treasurer - Mr. George Dupree, Historian - Rev. Forrest T. Jones, Trustee; Term expiring 1975 - Mr. Lonnie Parker, Sunday School Director - Rev. H.T. Waits, Church Training Director - Mr. Douglas Sturgill, Brotherhood Director - Mr. H.E. Nickens, WMU Director - Mrs. George Ham. Leon Smith moved the acceptance of the report, seconded by Forrest Jones - carried. (6) Organizational and Committee Reports were heard.

The fourth Council Meeting was October 2, 1972, at Spilman Memorial Baptist Church. Items of business were: (1) In the absence of the Chairman of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, Mr. Hager presented the suggested changes sent to the Committee from the Associational Council Meeting of November 1, 1971, and the Executive Committee Meeting of September 11, 1972. Mr. Hager made a motion that the report of proposed changes, plus any minor changes made by the Committee be accepted as long as the Committee changes don't alter the sense of the meaning. Motion seconded by Frank Bowers. Rev. Tom Waits asked to make one addition to this motion as follows; That the By-Laws Article I, SECTION 12, Roman numeral III, number 2, be changed from "two weeks", to read "THREE weeks vacation with pay." There being no objection to this addition, the motion was carried. (2) Mr. Gene Roberts moved that we as an Association officially adopt the State Convention's "Together We Advance" program. Motion seconded by Tom Waits and carried. (3) Organizational and Committee reports were heard.

CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGES REPORT

ANNUAL MEETING TIME

Since the attendance at our Annual Meeting has been much better at the Night Sessions than at the Morning Sessions, the Associational Council feels that we should eliminate the Morning Session and have two Night Sessions. We would need to meet on Monday and Tuesday, instead of Tuesday and Wednesday, so as not to conflict with Wednesday nights services in the local churches. This would require the following constitutional change:

In Article IV, Section 1 of the Constitution, delete the words Tuesday and Wednesday and insert the words Monday and Tuesday to read: "The Association shall convene annually on the fourth Monday night and Tuesday in October . . ."

NOVEMBER COUNCIL MEETING

Since the November Council Meeting as set by the Constitution sometimes comes so soon after the Annual Meeting as not to give adequate time to notify members of the Council and to prepare the agenda, the following constitutional change is suggested:

In the By-laws, Article III, Section 2, sub-section 1, delete "on the first Monday of each November" and insert "within sixty (60) days after the Annual Meeting".

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

At its meetings on September 11, 1972, the Executive Committee voted to recom-

mend that the Constitution be changed as follows:

1. That the name of the Executive Committee be changed to Planning Committee.
2. To call for the Associational Planning Committee and the Associational Council to meet every two months (but alternating their meetings), beginning with a Planning Committee meeting in November. Thus, the Planning Committee would meet one month and report to the Associational Council the next month.

In Article VIII, Section 1 of the Constitution delete the words "Executive Committee" and insert the words "Planning Committee".

In Article IX, Sections 1 and 2 of the Constitution delete the words "Executive Committee" and insert the words "Planning Committee".

In Article XIII of the Constitution delete the words "Executive Committee" and insert the words "Associational Council".

In the By-laws, Article I, Sections 3, 4, 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10 change from "Executive Committee" to "Planning Committee".

In the By-laws, Article II, Sections 7, 8, and 9 change "Executive Committee" to "Planning Committee".

In the By-laws, Article III, Section 2, sub-section 1, delete "On the first Monday of each month" and insert "every other month, beginning in November, but omitting July and August".

In the By-laws, Article III, Section 2, sub-section 1, change "Executive Committee" to "Planning Committee".

In the By-laws, Article III, Section 2, sub-section 1 (a), and (b), change "Executive Committee" to "Planning Committee".

In the By-laws, Article III, Section 3, delete the present wording and substitute the following: "The Council shall meet every other month (except July and August). The first meeting shall be held within sixty (60) days after the Annual Meeting. Times and places of these meetings shall be determined by the Council.

In the By-laws, Article IV, first sentence, change "Executive Council" to "Associational Council".

In the By-laws, Article IV, Section 1, change "Executive Committee" to "Planning Committee".

In the By-laws, Article I, Section 12, Division III, Item 2 change to read "Three weeks vacation with pay."

SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS REPORT

This past year I have been encouraged by signs of progress. I have participated in the dedication of new buildings by three of our churches. In addition I have had reports of increased attendance and interest from a number of other churches. These are outward signs, but they are accompanied by impressions that they express inner vitality.

I regret that not all are sharing in this encouraging trend. This presents a challenge to each to ask "What lack we?" Is it in not proclaiming the Gospel with conviction and enthusiasm? Is it the lack of a visitation program to let people know that you care and that they would be welcome in your church? Is it a lack of quality in what your church has to offer if they did come - Bible teaching, music, missionary zeal, warm fellowship, etc.?

Our State Convention is committed to a three year program called "Together We Advance". It emphasizes some things we Baptists consider basic - evangelism, Bible study, and stewardship. The Associational Council has voted to recommend that

we join in this program. We hope that each church will do the same. Suggested basic goals for each local church (1973, 1974, 1975) are:

Increase by 10% each year the number of baptisms.

Increase by 10% each year Sunday School enrollment.

Increase by 10% each year Cooperative Program support.

Increase by 10% each year Associational Mission support.

Much of my work cannot be reported statistically. But here are some statistics on that part of it which can be:

Preached-----21 times.

Talks, speeches, prayer meeting conducted, etc.-----45.

Participated in Deacon Ordination Services-----4 times.

Participated in, led, or attended meetings in Neuse Association-----44.

Participated in, led, or attended meetings outside the Association-----31.

Conferences with pulpit committees or representatives-----28.

Served as Chaplain of the week at the Hospital-----1 week.

Rendered some kind of service in 21 of our churches and missions (2 or more times in 14, 5 or more in 8).

Conferences: Individual-----1,194 plus; Group-----60; Committee-----30.

Prepared this Book of Reports for Annual Meeting and other materials during the year.

Traveled more than 13,480 miles in my work.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

Sunday School, as the Bible teaching organization, continues to be the life-line of the local Church. Even as we seek new and more effective teaching methods we must, at the same time, take care that we do not dilute or make more ineffective the basic teachings of the Word of God.

There is, within our Association, a definite need for workers who are trained not only to teach and lead within their own Sunday School organization, but who would be capable of serving as conference leaders to train others. Each year we are faced with a great need for teacher training as new and inexperienced teachers are brought into the Sunday School class rooms of our Baptist Churches. We, in the Sunday School Organization, both on the State and Associational level feel that our first priority for the year 1972-73 should be:

(1) First of all, to find within the Sunday School organizations of our cooperating Churches, men and women who have dedicated their lives to teaching the Biblical revelation and who would be willing to be trained as resource persons in their chosen age level.

(2) Secondly, we plan to provide training opportunities, using the resources of our State and Southern Baptist Conventions to more fully qualify these volunteers in the area of service which they, themselves have chosen.

(3). Thirdly, we plan to use the time and talents of these trained resource persons to provide training in new teaching methods, use of teaching aids and curriculum study, both through Associational Teacher Training Clinics and in individual clinics held in every Church that will invite us to hold such a clinic or workshop.

This, we feel will provide an ongoing program of training for the workers and teachers of all Churches, both large and small, here in our Association.

This year the reports that have been received from our Cooperating Churches indicate a Sunday School enrolment of 7,307 as compared to the 7,223 reported last year, and increase of only 84, but an encouraging sign none the less.

Numerically, Sunday School growth will come only when we recognize the need to provide well equipped classrooms, staffed by trained and competent teachers who are serving in the will of God. This is within the reach of every Church both large and small, and we who serve in the Sunday School Department pledge our time and skills to make this a reality within the years ahead.

"Around the World with the Mitchiners" was the program for the Girls in Action Spring Rally at Immanuel Church in Kinston. There were 150 present with 11 churches represented.

The Neuse Association W.M.U. was presented the Distinguished Award at the State W.M.U. Convention in Winston-Salem. Two new W.M.U.s were organized: Bethany and Trinity.

In Mission Action, the rest homes have been visited and entertained with refreshments and inspired through Bible reading and music. Lap covers and ditty bags were made and given.

Christmas in August gifts were sent to missionaries.

Those whose homes were burned were clothed and furniture provided.

Cherry Hospital patients are given an opportunity to go to a church and see other people.

The W.M.U. leaders took Leadership Courses at Falling Creek and Kennedy Home Churches on September 18. Ninety-eight leaders attended.

Our theme for last year was "Expect-Attempt". For the years 1972-1974, the 85th Anniversary of W.M.U., we are attempting a Giant Step:

25% increase in membership

25% increase in organizations

25% increase in magazine subscriptions

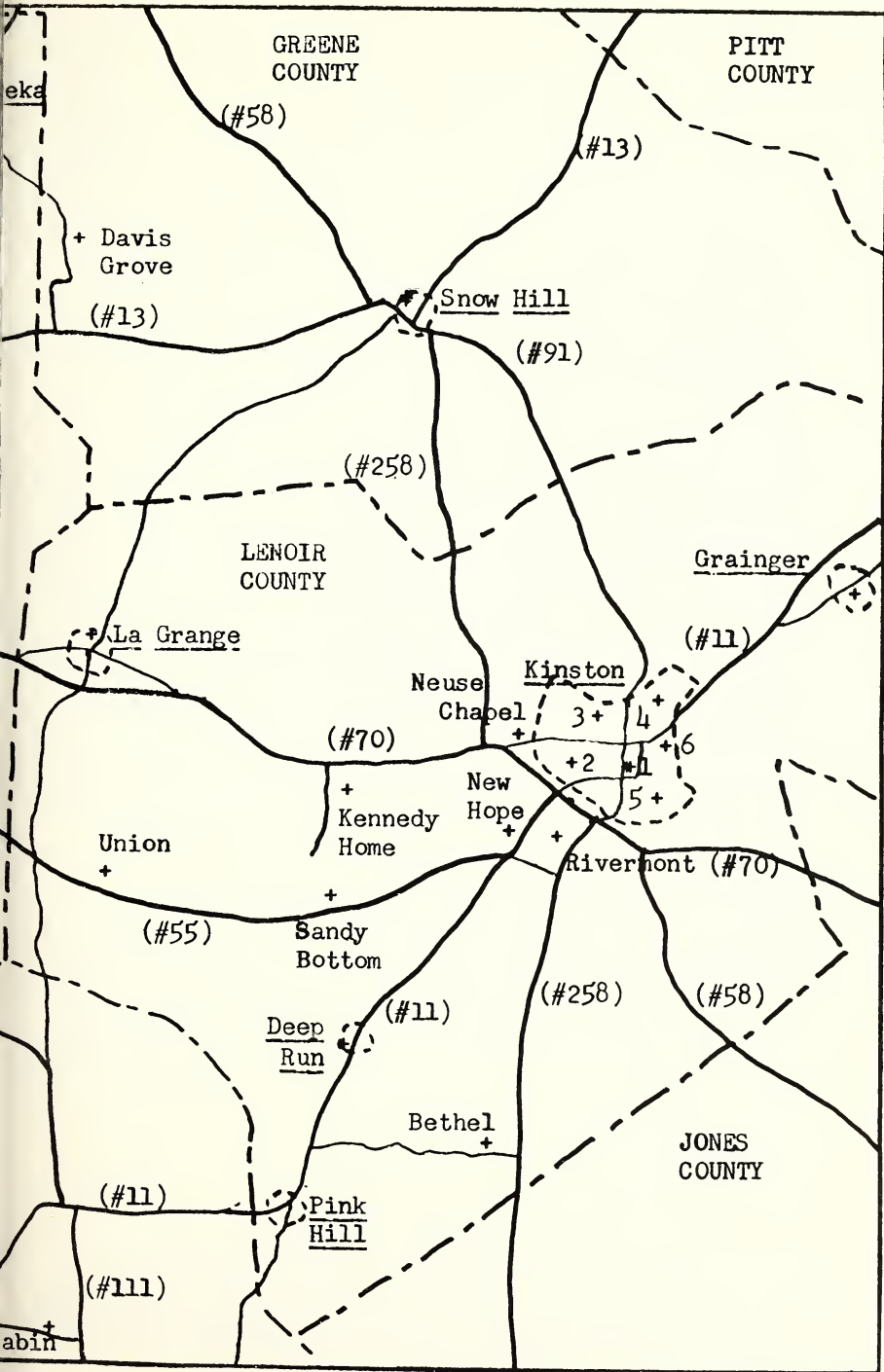

Changing conditions which are affecting American life today are determining factors in the number of children needing our care and the types of care that are needed. More and more we are being asked to serve children with special needs beyond neglect and dependency. The urgency of the present and the challenge of the future is to find effective patterns of care for these children.

The Children's Homes continues to expand and improve its services to children and their families. Two new cottages are under construction at Broyhill Home. Mills Home is engaged in a year-long study to determine how we can best serve the children in the Piedmont Area. The Ten Star Builders' Program is enlisting the support of Eastern North Carolina for Christian child care in our area. Across the state, renewed effort is being given to the enlistment of foster families. Expanded services to families are being initiated.

One of the major tasks confronting our work in Eastern North Carolina is the upgrading of our campus facilities to meet minimum standards for licensing our child care program. Most of our older buildings at Kennedy Home will require extensive and expensive renovation to meet these standards. Some buildings may have to be completely replaced with new structures. To meet this urgent need, we ask our Baptist friends in Eastern North Carolina to give serious and prayerful thought to increased support for operating expenses and special bequests and donations for capital improvements.

We believe this ministry of child care deserves the confidence and support of North Carolina Baptists. Our Baptist friends have demonstrated through their interest and support that they believe in what we are doing. The Cooperative Program continues to be the life-blood of our financial support. The 1971 Thanksgiving Offering channeled \$400,000 into our ministry of child care. Special gifts and bequests from individuals continue to provide for capital improvements. We deeply appreciate this generous support, and we pledge ourselves to continue this ministry of child care in the name of Christ and on behalf of North Carolina Baptists.

CAMP REPORT

The Association provided transportation for 38 boys and girls to Camps CaRAway and Mundo Vista for the week of August 7-11. We know of several others from our Association who attended these camps during other weeks of the summer. Although we do not know exact number, it is probably the largest group from our Association ever to attend CaRAway and Mundo Vista in one summer.

We urge each church to encourage its youth to attend these camps next year. It might be well to appoint someone to be in charge of plans in this direction.

EVANGELISM REPORT

It is exciting what the Holy Spirit is doing through the ministry of evangelism in our state. Six thousand youth and adults in 425 churches have now participated in Lay Evangelism Schools or Pastor's Retreats. Forty-two associations already have confirmed dates for schools. We thank God for this tremendous response to the important

emphasis of lay witnessing. This will be a continuing effort in future years.

The Neuse Association held its Lay Evangelism Schools May 8-11. The Kinston area participants met a Neuse Chapel Baptist Church under the leadership of Rev. Bill Lamb, State Director of Evangelism, the Goldsboro area participants met at Adamsville Baptist Church under the leadership of Rev. Lewis Beal, Pastor of the Angier Baptist Church. Over 2,400 pastors and lay persons attended the 26th Statewide Evangelism Conference in Fayetteville last February. Outstanding speakers challenged pastors to involve their people in the total ministry of evangelism through the church.

A new week at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly at Southport during June 12-16 was Youth Ministries Week with inspiration and training in Evangelism, Vocational Guidance and Recreation. All evening sessions were centered around Bible Study and a workshop experience in learning how to witness for Christ. Over 600 youth and adults were present for the week. On Friday evening 113 youth made different kinds of public decisions. Next June we will have another Youth Ministries Week.

Almost 20,000 youth, pastors and adult leaders attended the 2nd Statewide Youth Evangelism Night on August 18 at the Greensboro Coliseum. It is evident that God is working through Christian youth today to share His Gospel in a thrilling, significant manner.

We rejoice in the excellent reports of many revival meetings and associational evangelism clinics during the past year. Last year the Neuse Baptist Association reported 324 baptisms and 425 other additions. This year our records show 411 baptisms and 447 other additions. It is our hope and prayer that we shall continue to have a strong increase in baptisms this coming year, and that many more persons may experience Christ through genuine faith and total commitment.

Another area in which we believe every church should give special attention is the growing number of nonresident members. Our association reported 2,893 nonresident members last year and 2,800 this year. Let us challenge every Baptist to re-read the Church Covenant, especially the part concerning keeping church membership local and active. Our next Statewide Evangelism Conference will be held February 5-7, 1973 at Owens Auditorium, Charlotte. We hope that more and more of our lay-people will be attending. Let us pray earnestly for the leadership of the Holy Spirit in the total ministry of evangelism in North Carolina, our nation and our world.

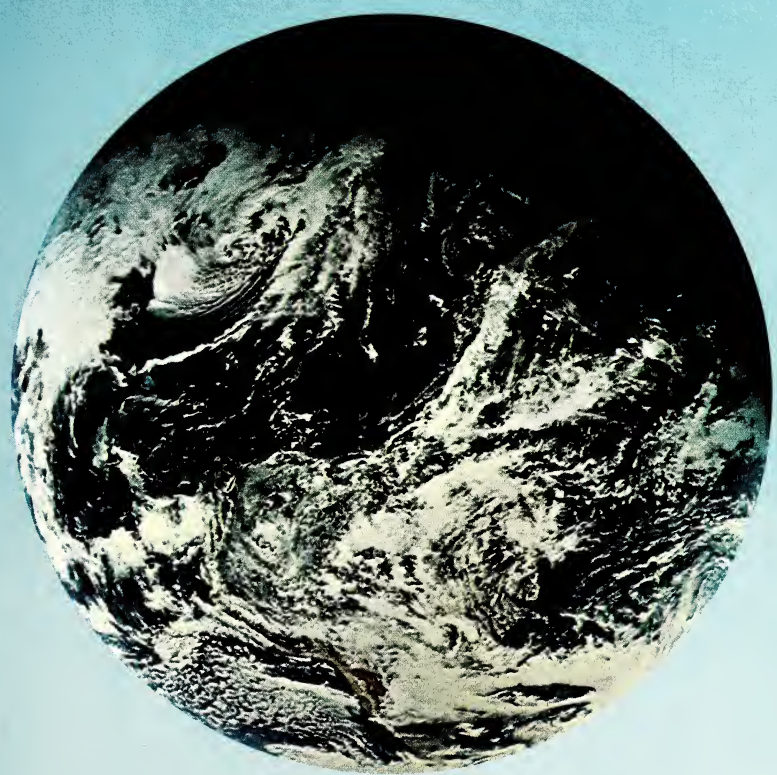

Constitution

of the

NEUSE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I. Name

This body shall be known as the Neuse Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. Purpose

The purpose of the Association shall be to devise, recommend and promote measures for increasing the harmony and spiritual power of the cooperating churches, to assist in developing and directing their energies, resources and gifts in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom, and to cooperate with the Baptist Convention of North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention in all religious, educational, mission, Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union and other work fostered by the said conventions.

ARTICLE III. Membership

SECTION 1. Membership in the body shall be composed of all Missionary Baptist pastors and duly elected messengers of the cooperating churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be represented, at the annual meeting of the Association and at any special meeting during the year, by messengers who shall be duly certified, in the following ratio: Each church with a membership of not more than one hundred members (100) shall be entitled to five (5) messengers. Churches having more than one hundred (100) members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for every additional one hundred (100) members or a major fraction thereof, providing that no church shall have more than twelve (12) messengers.

SECTION 3. New churches seeking to seat messengers in the Association must make written application to the Missions Committee not later than one month prior to the last meeting of the Associational Council prior to the annual meeting of the Association, giving evidence of their faith and order, and their agreement to cooperate in the general program of the Association, The Baptist Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention. The Missions Committee shall study applications and make recommendation to the Associational Council regarding same, and in turn, the Associational Council shall make its recommendations to the annual meeting of the Association for its action.

SECTION 4. All new missions and new churches should be sponsored by a local church or churches.

SECTION 5. The Association shall have power, upon given written notice of nine (9) months and by two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of messengers present and voting, to withdraw fellowship from any church that shall willfully depart from orthodox principles of the Chris-

tian religion as taught in the Southern Baptist churches or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or by letter at the annual session of the Association without sufficient reason or that fails to support causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular or that ceases to be missionary in practice.

SECTION 6. Any church may decline to send messengers to the Association at its pleasure. Whenever this constitutes a withdrawal of fellowship on the part of the church, the Association shall not as a body, or through a representative or representatives, seek to restrain by coercion or law the withdrawal action of the church.

ARTICLE IV. Meetings

SECTION 1. The Association shall convene annually on the fourth Monday night and Tuesday in October and may meet with different churches on the two (2) successive days.

SECTION 2. The time of the annual meeting may be changed, or special meeting called, by the Associational Council upon notice to the cooperating churches.

ARTICLE V. Fiscal Year

This fiscal year of the Association shall begin on January first (1st) and end on December thirty-first (31st) of each year.

ARTICLE VI. Officers

SECTION 1. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, the Trustees, the Associational Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Church Music Director, and such others as may be authorized by the Association.

SECTION 2. All officers shall be members of churches affiliated with the Association.

SECTION 3. Nominations for the officers shall be presented to the Associational Council at its Spring Meeting for approval. These nominees shall then serve as "Officers-Elect" until the Annual Session of the Association, at which time (1) they shall be considered for election by the Association. (2) Any officer may be elected to succeed himself, except the Moderator, who may not serve more than two (2) years in succession. Vacancies occurring between Annual Sessions shall be filled by the Associational Council.

ARTICLE VII. The Associational Council

SECTION 1. The Associational Council shall consist of each Pastor in the Association, the Officers of the Association, the Superintendent of Missions, the immediate Past-Moderator, the representatives of the Denominational agencies, and two (2) lay members from each cooperative church, to be elected by the church. The names of the lay members shall be duly certified by notifying the Associational Clerk.

SECTION 2. The Officers of the Association shall serve as the Officers of the Council.

SECTION 3. The Associational Council shall act for the Association in the interim between Annual Sessions. It shall carry out the policies and will of the Association, and shall make reports to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Associational Council also has the power to fill vacancies among the Officers, the Committees and/or the Executive Committee of the Association that may occur during the year.

SECTION 4. Twenty (20) members of the Associational Council will constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VIII. Administration

SECTION 1. The Superintendent of Missions shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program of the Association and the denomination. He shall work under the direction of and be subject to the authority of the Associational Council. He shall be nominated by the Executive Committee to The Associational Council, and elected by the Association at any Annual Session, or by The Associational Council if the next Annual Session

of the Association is thirty (30) days or more beyond the date on which the Superintendent of Missions is nominated.

ARTICLE IX. Committees

SECTION 1. At a meeting of the Associational Council prior to the annual meeting of the Association, the Moderator shall appoint a committee on committees, consisting of not less than five (5) members, whose duty it shall be to offer nominations to the Association for members and chairmen of all standing committees herein provided except those already named by the Constitution.

SECTION 2. The Association shall have the standing committees listed below, along with other committees authorized by the Association. These committees shall begin their duties at the close of the annual session, and shall make reports of their work to the Planning Committee. Members of the committee shall be selected from the membership of those churches cooperating with the Association and are subject to re-election provided, that in no case, any person shall serve on the same committee longer than three (3) years in succession, with the exception of the Music Committee and the Camp Committee. The Moderator and Superintendent of Missions shall be considered ex officio members of all standing Committees.

- N. Committee On Memorials

ARTICLE X. Annual Report of the Church

Each cooperating church shall send annually to the Association a report on the Associational Letter which is provided. Said reports should reach the Associational Clerk not later than October 15 of that year.

ARTICLE XI. Special Days

The fourth (4th) Sunday of January, of each year shall be designated as "Association Day" in all churches for the purpose of receiving an offering for the Missionary activities of the Association, such as church building lots, facilities for missions, rentals, Superintendent of Missions.

ARTICLE XII. Adoption of Constitution

This Constitution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall supercede any and all constitutions previously adopted.

ARTICLE XIII. Amendment of Constitution

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association provided the amendment has been presented in writing to the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws no later than September 1, and presented to the October meeting of the Associational Council, and read on two successive days of the annual meeting, and receives a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present at the second meeting.

BY-LAWS

"The Work Of The Association Shall Be Governed By The Following By-Laws."

ARTICLE I—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. THE MODERATOR shall preside over the annual meeting of the Association and begin each session punctually. He shall appoint such committees as may be authorized by the Constitution, or the Association, enforce the rules, preserve order, and exercise all perogatives of a presiding officer according to parliamentary usage, and serve as chairman of the Associational Council, and ex officio member of all standing committees.

SECTION 2. THE VICE-MODERATOR shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence and serve as Chairman of the Calendar Committee.

SECTION 3. THE CLERK shall keep the records of the proceedings of the Association, superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes, keep on file the printed minutes and other important papers of the Association and shall serve as Secretary of the Associational Council and the Planning Committee. For his services, the clerk shall be paid an amount to be determined annually by the Association.

SECTION 4. THE TREASURER shall receive, safeguard and disburse all funds of the Association. Disbursements shall be made by the Treasurer in accordance with the Budget adopted by the Association. Non-Budget items should be approved by the Budget-Finance and Planning Committees. The treasurer shall make quarterly reports to the Planning Committee and an Annual Report to the Association. He shall be bonded in such an amount as the Planning Committee shall direct.

SECTION 5. THE HISTORIAN shall collect facts of interest to the Association and the cooperating churches, and shall make a report to each annual meeting of the Association.

SECTION 6. THE SUNDAY SCHOOL DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Sunday School Program in the Association in Cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 7. THE CHURCH TRAINING DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Church Training Programs in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 8. THE MUSIC DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Church Music Program in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 9. THE BROTHERHOOD DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Brotherhood Program in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 10. THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Woman's Missionary Union Program in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 11. THE TRUSTEES shall rotate one each year, and as provided by law and action of the Association, hold in trust the title to all property of the Association and shall represent the Association in all matters of legal responsibility regarding the purchase, improvement and disposal of Associational property. They shall have no power to buy, sell, mortgage, lease or transfer any property of the Association without a specific vote of the Association or Associational Council authorizing such action.

SECTION 12. THE SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS, though not an officer, his duties shall be:

I. GENERAL ASSOCIATIONAL WORK

1. Planning—Co-ordination

- a. Assist in preparing the associational calendar of activities
- b. Work closely with associational officers and committees
- c. Work closely with Pastors' Conference and other associational organizations
- d. Helping to plan association-wide campaigns and activities (Schools of Missions, Clinics, Enlargement Campaigns, etc.)

2. Dissemination of Information

- a. Publishing an associational newsletter
- b. Preparation of Book of Reports for Annual Meeting

- c. Announcements at various associational meetings
- d. Keeping up-to-date file in office on associational and denominational causes and activities
- 3. Promotion
 - a. Associational activities
 - b. Denominational causes and activities
(He should keep well-informed on these as to be able to explain them and answer questions about them)
- 4. Counseling
 - Associational leaders
 - Pastors
 - Pulpit Committees
 - Pastorless churches
- 5. Administrative (in the office)
 - Correspondence, file, equipment and supplies, office routine, etc.
- 6. Give time and attention as needed to work with military-related families through the churches of the association and, in co-operation with the Baptist State Convention.
- II. ASSISTANCE TO THE CHURCHES
(Only upon invitation of the pastor, or of responsible Church leaders.)
In the Supt. of Missions, the Association provides a trained worker on call for churches, pastors, and leaders. He should endeavor to keep himself trained and informed.
 - Pulpit Supply
 - Training and Teaching (study courses, conferences, clinics, etc.)
 - Church Community Surveys and Maps
 - V. B. S. (for pastorless churches or where special need exists)
 - Other assistance as the need arises

III. ASPECTS OF EMPLOYMENT

- 1. Responsible to Associational Council
- 2. Three weeks vacation with pay.
- 3. Maximum of four weeks of denominational or church-related work outside the Association (Schools of Missions, Church Community Surveys, Revivals etc.) These to be carefully scheduled so as to avoid interference with his major associational responsibilities.
- 4. He shall submit a report of his work to the Associational Council at it's meetings, and to the Annual Association at it's Meeting.
- 5. A notice of thirty days shall be given by the Supt. of Missions or the Association before employment is terminated.

ARTICLE II—COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES, consisting of not less than five (5) members, shall nominate the members and chairmen of all standing committees herein provided, except those already named by the Constitution. They shall submit these nominations to the Association for election.

SECTION 2. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDER OF BUSINESS, consisting of five (5) members, shall prepare the Program for the Annual Sessions. This suggested program shall be presented to the Association at the beginning of the first Session of the Annual Meeting for action. The Officers of the Association and the President of the Minister's Conference are Ex-Officio members. The Moderator shall serve as Chairman.

SECTION 3. THE COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS shall be composed of three (3) members who duties shall be to present nominations for the "Officers Elect" to the spring meeting of the Associational Council, and to the Association for all officers authorized herein, or by the Association. They shall present nominations to the Association for the representatives of the various agencies of the State Convention. They shall also present nominations to the Associational Council to fill any vacancy which may occur during the year.

SECTION 4. THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM shall be composed of five (5) members who shall cooperate with the State Chairman of Evangelism in the promotion of approved evangelistic efforts within the Association. It shall encourage evangelism in the churches, especially where the need is apparent, and shall help provide evangelistic services in the unchurched areas within the boundaries of the Association.

SECTION 5. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDINATION shall be composed of three (3) members who shall act in an advisory capacity for churches. The committee shall assist any church which requests its services in the examination of candidates for the Christian ministry. It shall help arrange, where necessary, proper services of ordination. Churches are requested to use this committee to examine candidates only after their call to some specific work. Further, churches are requested to refrain from announcing the date of ordination until after the candidate has received approval by this committee.

SECTION 6. THE COMMITTEE ON PLACE AND PREACHER shall be composed of three (3) members, whose duty it shall be to receive or solicit invitations for the place of meeting of the annual session for the following year, and to recommend to the Association in annual session, a place or places of meeting, along with a preacher and alternate for the sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS shall be composed of three (3) members and shall review all resolutions referred to it by the Association, the Associational Council, or the Planning Committee, and report suitable resolutions at the annual meeting.

SECTION 8. THE COMMITTEE ON BUDGET-FINANCE shall be composed of seven (7) members, one from each of the counties of Lenoir, Greene, and Wayne, and one at large, plus the Moderator, Treasurer and Superintendent of Missions. The Committee shall hear and give consideration to requests of the Planning Committee and other leaders in the Associational work. These requests are to be submitted not later than September 15th of each year.

The duties of the committee are as follows:

- (a) To plan and supervise the making and raising of the Budget.
- (b) To implement the financial program of the Association as directed by the Planning Committee of the Association.
- (c) To have a professional audit made of the Treasurer's books and make a report to the Association in its annual meeting.
- (d) To make a monthly financial report to the Planning Committee.

SECTION 9. THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS shall be composed of five (5) members whose duties it shall be to ascertain the need of new churches within the boundaries of the Association; to recommend to the Planning Committee the location of sites and the purchasing of lots for such churches, and to assist the organization of such churches as might be authorized. Churches contemplating making debts on lots, buildings, improvements and/or asking for Pastor's aid, must have the recommendations of the Missions Committee and approval of Planning Committee, if they expect to apply to the Baptist State Mission Board for aid in paying for the same. It shall be the duty of the Missions Committee to study the applications of Churches seeking to seat messengers in the Association as to evidence of their faith and order, and their agreement to cooperate in the general program of the Association, the Baptist Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention. The Committee shall then make recommendations to the Planning Committee regarding same.

SECTION 10. THE COMMITTEE ON MUSIC shall be composed of three (3) members who shall cooperate with the Music Department of the State Convention and shall assist in any music program approved by the Association. The Chairman shall also serve as Associational Music Director.

SECTION 11. THE COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN LIFE shall be composed of three (3) members who shall work with local and State Officials in every phase of promoting civic righteousness.

SECTION 12. THE COMMITTEE ON CAMP ACTIVITIES shall be composed of three (3) members. The chairman shall serve as camp director. The duties of the committee shall be to plan and execute the summer camp.

SECTION 13. THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS shall be composed of three (3) members who shall receive all proposed changes thereto and, upon study of this or other observations, make recommendations to the Association on all Constitution and By-Law changes.

SECTION 14. COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS, consisting of three (3) members, shall plan for our beloved dead a memorial service to be conducted during the Annual Session of the Association.

ARTICLE III—THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

SECTION 1. The Officers of the Council shall be the Moderator, the Vice-Moderator, and the Clerk of the Association.

SECTION 2. The Association Council shall hold an organizational meeting within sixty (60) days after the Annual Meeting, and shall set up the following subcommittees, and any others deemed necessary for the proper handling of Associational business between the Annual Sessions:

1. THE PLANNING COMMITTEE: This committee shall be composed of the Officers of the Association, the Superintendent of Missions, and the Chairman of the various Standing Committees. This committee shall meet every other month, beginning in November, but omitting July and August, (unless otherwise designated by the committee), and shall handle all matters committed to it by the Associational Council. It shall hear Organizational, Committee, and other reports and plans; design promotional activities, and seek ways and means of forwarding the Lord's work in and through the Association. It shall report all actions to the Associational Council at the next regular meeting, and shall be subject to the approval of the Associational Council. A majority of the Committee shall constitute a quorum. The Superintendent of Missions shall serve as chairman.

(a) THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE: This committee shall be composed of the Officers of the Association, the President of the Minister's Conference, and the Superintendent of Missions. (It shall be the duty of this Committee to plan and recommend through the PLANNING COMMITTEE to the Annual Session of the Association, a Calendar of Activities for the coming year. The Vice-Moderator shall serve as chairman.)

(b) ANY OR ALL OTHER STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE ASSOCIATION shall function as subcommittees of the Planning Committee.

SECTION 3. The council shall meet every other month (except July and August). The first meeting shall be held within sixty (60) days after the Annual Meeting. Times and places of these meetings shall be determined by the Council.

SECTION 4. The Council shall submit to the Association in Annual Session a full and complete Budget, Calendar of Activities, and a full and complete report of its work.

ARTICLE IV—RULES OF ORDER

The following rules shall govern deliberations in the meeting of the Association and the Associational Council.

SECTION 1. The official transaction of business in all regular meetings of the Association, the Associational Council, and the Planning Committee shall be by the affirmative majority vote of the members present and voting, except in matters relating to the constitution, the withdrawing of fellowship from any cooperating church, and the seating of messengers from those churches desiring to cooperate with the Association. In called meetings of the Association of the Associational Council, a number equal to the majority of the membership of the Associational Council and representing a majority of the cooperating churches shall be necessary to constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. A messenger wishing to speak shall rise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration and shall avoid all personalities. No messenger shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special permission.

SECTION 3. All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer or at his request, read by the clerk before the vote is taken.

SECTION 4. When a question is under consideration, no other motion or proposition shall be received except a motion to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time. When there are several motions, they shall have preference in the order in which they come.

SECTION 5. The general business of the Association shall be recommended by the Committee On Order Of Business at the beginning of the first session of the Annual Meeting of the Association. When adopted this report shall become the order of business for the members and cannot be changed except by the vote of the Association.

SECTION 6. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided by Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE V—ADOPTION OF BY-LAWS

SECTION 1. These by-laws shall take effect immediately upon their adoption, and shall supercede any and all by-laws previously adopted.

SECTION 2. These By-Laws may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association provided the amendment has been presented in writing to the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws no later than September 1, and presented to the October meeting of the Associational Council. Passage shall be by majority vote of the messengers present and voting.

 First Session

MONDAY EVENING

1. The 44th Annual Session of the Neuse Baptist Association was called to order at 7:30 p. m. on October 22, 1973, by the Moderator, M. A. Shaver at the New Hope Baptist Church.
2. Rev. John Thompson, Jr., Minister of Music at Kennedy Home Baptist Church, led the group in singing the hymn, "To God Be the Glory," with Mrs. Charlotte Wood, member of New Hope Baptist Church, at the piano.
3. Rev. Arthur Wall, Pastor of Immanuel Baptist Church, read Psalms 79 and led the people in prayer.
4. Rev. Flay Price, Pastor of the host church, on behalf of the membership extended a cordial welcome to all present, and issued an invitation to remain for coffee and cake at the close of the session.
5. Mr. Shaver asked if there were anyone present who attended the first Neuse Baptist Association Annual Meeting forty-four years ago and Mrs. Mark Taylor, member of Davis Grove Baptist Church, indicated she had.
6. BUSINESS SESSION: The Moderator declared that barring unforeseen changes, the program would be followed as printed. The theme this year is, "Share the Word Now!"

7. The Superintendent of Missions, Rev. Eugene Hager, recognized the Pastors and Ministers of Education and Youth who had come to the Neuse Association since the last Annual Meeting. On behalf of the Association Mr. Hager welcomed them.

8. Mr. Shaver had all the visitors stand and introduce themselves, after which, he gave them a special welcome.

9. The Report on Registration was called for. The Clerk read the Report as follows: Pastors—16, Messengers—61, Visitors—21, number of churches represented—21.

10. At the request of the Vice-Moderator, Rev. Frank Bowers, Mr. Hager presented the Calendar of Activities for 1974. Copies were handed out to all present. Mr. Hager made a motion that the Calendar be accepted with any changes that may prove to be necessary later. Motion seconded and carried.

11. The Clerk, Mrs. R. S. Ault, read the Summary of Associational Council Meetings.

12. REPORTS: In the absence of the Chairman, Rev. Leon Smith, Mr. Shaver presented the Budget and Finance Report, calling for a motion to approve the Committee's recommended Budget for 1974. M. O. Sears made a motion the Budget be accepted, motion seconded and carried.

13. Rev. Frank Bowers, Chairman of the Camp Committee, reported that because so many of the girls got their reservation requests in too late for Mundo Vista, arrangements were made to take thirty-one of them to Fruitland. Mr. Bowers suggested this may be avoided next year if the applications were sent in before the end of January. Transportation was provided by the Association for eight boys to CaRAway the week of August 6-11.

14. At this time Mr. Hager asked for a chance to say a few words about the Book-of-Reports, a copy of which had been provided each person present. He reminded everyone that the Association had a three year cycle of reports from the platform. Therefore, he wanted to encourage the reading of the many reports in the Book-of-Reports that would not be presented as part of the agenda.

Mr. Hager took this opportunity to inform the folks of the new feature at the afternoon session on Tuesday. He explained it would be displays of Associational and Denominational Ministries set up with representatives present to answer questions and hand out literature.

Mr. Hager also advised the people the ham dinner would be served for \$1.50 a plate. The pastors were urged to encourage their members to attend Tuesday's session whether as messengers or visitors.

15. At this time John Thompson led everyone in singing the hymn "He Lives."

16. Mr. Shaver explained that Simon Jessee, Associational Representative to the Biblical Recorder, was unable to be present to make his report, but that Mrs. Marse Grant would have a display at the Tuesday afternoon session. The Moderator asked Ray Hodge if he had any comments on the subject and Mr. Hodge urged all churches, who were not participating already, to make the Biblical Recorder a budgeted item and see that each resident family received it.

17. M. O. Sears, Chairman of the Evangelism Committee, read Matthew 9:36-38 and John 4:35 and said he hoped that the members of Neuse Association would look out and see the opportunities that are so in evidence and follow the Lord's Command to do something about it. Mr. Sears noted two items that indicated the need for urgent action, the drop in Baptisms this past year and the number of unenlisted that had been reported throughout the Association.

18. Mrs. Ruby Greenlaw, Representative from North Carolina Baptist Hospital, was invited to speak, and she expressed her appreciation for what the churches in Neuse Association had done. Then explained that the Co-operative Program monies were now going to support the School of Pastoral Care and, therefore, the Mother's Day Offering was needed more than ever in order to continue the aid to patients.

19. Hargus Taylor, Representative of Chowan College, explained briefly the need for and the use of the Father's Day Offering to the Baptist Colleges, and said that without both the money from the Co-operative Program and the Special Offering the seven colleges would not be able to carry on many of their activities. Mr. Taylor asked the pastors to make an extra effort to get the names of the Baptist junior and senior high school students and send them in so the colleges could make arrangements to talk with them, this being part of the drive to enroll more Baptist young people in our Baptist colleges. Mr. Taylor let it be known that he would be

leaving some material about Chowan to be picked up by anyone interested in having it.

20. At this time Mrs. Nora Jean Hill sang a medley of sacred songs. Mr. John Thompson accompanied her at the piano.

21. Because of a conflict, Mr. Coy Privette, President of the Christian Action League, could not be present. At the request of the Moderator, Rev. M. O. Sears introduced Rev. Shannon A. Scott, Chairman of the Franklin County Unit of the Christian Action League, who came to speak to the group. With charts, Mr. Scott showed how the consumption of alcohol had increased in states after liquor-by-the-drink had been legalized, as well as, the increase in the cost of the beverage itself, the cost to the business man in that there was a noted drop in work efficiency and a rise in accidents. Mr. Scott pointed out that it is recorded fact that only after the legalization of liquor-by-the-drink, did many undesirable businesses move into the various states, many owned and operated by the Syndicate and Mafia. Mr. Scott emphasized what a victory it would be for the liquor-by-the-drink advocates to win this state, for North Carolina is twelfth in population and only forty-seventh in consumption. He ended his remarks by quoting Dr. E. M. Jellinek, of the World Health Organization sub-committee on Alcoholism: "The death, crime and accident rates in a given community varies according to the average alcohol consumption; and when alcoholism decreases, so do deaths, crime and accident rates; and relaxation of restrictions on alcohol is followed by a rise in commitments to asylums, hospitalizations and delinquency."

22. Rev. M. O. Sears, Co-Chairman for the Wayne County chapter of the Christian Action League, advised the people that the money to support the League had not come in as needed and that he was making a motion that a collection be taken right then and sent in, the amount being divided equally so one third could be credited to each of the counties represented in the Association, Green, Lenoir and Wayne. The motion was seconded by Rev. Tom Waits, carried.

23. Following the collection the Moderator asked Dr. R. W. Getchell to pronounce the Benediction to close the first session of the 44th Neuse Baptist Association Annual Meeting.

Second Session

TUESDAY AFTERNOON

24. The second session of the 44th Annual Meeting of the Neuse Baptist Association was held at First Baptist Church, Goldsboro, October 23, 1973, at 4 p. m., M. A. Shaver, Moderator, presiding.

25. John Thompson led the group in singing "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," Gordon Flesher, Minister of Music at First Baptist Church, Goldsboro, was at the organ for the afternoon and evening sessions.

26. Rev. William Clements led the responsive reading, "Christian Discipleship" and had prayer.

27. Rev. Leon Smith, Pastor of the host church, welcomed the members and visitors of the Neuse Association Annual Meeting and reminded them that in days gone by the Baptist State Convention had met here at First Baptist (1867, 1880, 1891, 1912). Mr. Smith then gave instructions and directions so the people could find their way around the building, to the displays and the dining room.

28. BUSINESS SESSION: In the absence of the Nominating Committee Chairman, David Cox, a motion was made by Lonnie Parker that nominations be closed and the names submitted by the Committee and printed in the Book-of-Reports, be elected by acclamation. Motion seconded, carried.

29. Because Mr. H. E. Nickens, Chairman of the Committee on Committees, was in the hospital, Mr. W. H. Murry was asked to make that Committee's report. Mr. Murry stated the report was as it appeared in the Book-of-Reports. Therefore, Frank Bowers moved the report be accepted. Motion seconded, carried.

30. Mr. Shaver took a brief glimpse at history and told the audience that forty-four years ago another "Smith" was serving as pastor of First Baptist Church, Goldsboro. It was A. H. Smith and he was Associational Moderator.

31. Everyone was led in singing "At Calvary," by Mr. Thompson.

32. Before leaving the auditorium to go to the display area, Lonnie Parker had prayer.

33. The Associational and Denominational Ministries that had displays were: the Annuity Board, Department of Communications, Church Planning and Architecture, the Baptist Book Store, Biblical Recorder, American Bible Society, Bible Teaching Program of the Church, Chaplaincy, Woman's Missionary Union, and Christian Social Ministries. All displays were interesting and all had literature for the taking to aid in better understanding the work done by each agency and organization represented.

34. In the Fellowship Hall at 6 p. m. the blessing was asked by Dallas Prestwood, Minister of Education, at First Baptist Church, Goldsboro.

TUESDAY EVENING SESSION

35. At 7:15 p. m. M. A. Shaver, Moderator, called to order the final session of the 44th Annual Neuse Baptist Association.

36. Everyone sang the hymn, "Leaning On the Everlasting Arms," led by John Thompson.

37. Rev. Ray Hodge, Pastor of First Baptist Church, Kinston, conducted the devotion for the evening session. He read Psalms 51 and led in prayer.

38. Dr. John H. Bunn, Chairman of the Memorials Committee, as part of his report, had Mrs. R. S. Ault read the names of "Our Beloved Dead" and also sang "Amazing Grace." Included in his remarks was that the contribution to the world made by these Christian men and women should never be forgotten. To conclude Dr. Bunn read a poem he had written, a copy of which was to go to each family of a departed loved one.

39. BUSINESS SESSION: Rev. Earl Farthing, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, presented three resolutions for the forty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Neuse Baptist Association. Mr. Farthing asked that each be passed on separately. In each case, after reading the Resolution, he would make a motion it be adopted, each motion was seconded and approved by the messengers.

40. Ray Nodge made a motion that the first Resolution be published in the newspapers throughout the Association, and would like the Clerk to arrange it. Motion seconded by Tom Waits. Eugene Hager suggested Gene Roberts, the Associational Publicity Consultant, would perhaps be able to help in this matter as he could have it published as a news report from the meeting. The motion was carried.

41. Rev. Rodney Beals, Associational Representative to Children's Homes, advised those present that there was a pressing problem on the Children's Home campus. He told of the urgent need for Christian couples to be house parents. He asked that all would pray that the Lord would call those suited for this work.

42. The Clerk read the Registration Report as follows: Pastors—14, Messengers—52, Visitors—39, Churches represented—22.

43. At the request of the Moderator, Eugene Hager introduced the officers and Denominational Representatives for the new year. Mr. Hager congratulated them and assured them of his and the Association's support.

44. At this time the Youth Choir from Adamsville Baptist Church presented a choral worship period. The selections were, "In Remembrance of Me," "Relevant," from LIFE, "The Cruel War," and "Benediction." The music was well done and quite inspirational. The group was led by Mrs. Elaine Bean and Mrs. Elaine Getchell accompanied at the piano.

45. Mr. W. H. Murry, as a member of the Place and Preacher Committee, announced that the 1974 Monday evening session would be at Union Baptist Church, and the Tuesday session at Madison Avenue. Rev. H. T. Waits is to be the preacher with Rev. M. O. Sears as alternate.

46. Before reading the Scripture, Mr. Waits asked that all stand to show appreciation for Mr. Shaver and his work with the Association during the past year. Mr. Waits read I Corinthians 15:1-6, 55-58 and 16:1-4 then offered prayer.

47. The Moderator invited Rev. Leary, after his sermon, to close the meeting as he wished.

48. Rev. David Leary, Pastor of Spilman Memorial Baptist Church, said the greatest sermon ever preached was that of our Lord's called the "The Sermon on the Mount" and the second in importance is the one delivered by Paul, as recorded in the portions of Scripture just read. The introduction declares that he, Paul, preaches the Gospel, the "Good News." This "Good News" is set down in three points: (1) Christ died for our sins; (2) He was buried and rose

again the third day; (3) He lives! The conclusion of Paul's sermon is that if one accepts the Gospel he will be loyal.

Rev. Leary emphasized that loyalty involves being generous with ones time, talent and money; being willing to go where the Lord directs; do what He says do and give of oneself and his possessions as Christ demands.

Everyone was urged to recommit his life to God and His Purpose, then go in His Power and march for Him in 1973 and 1974.

Mrs. Nora Jean Hill led the group in singing "He Touched Me."

49. The forty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Neuse Baptist Association was closed with prayer by Rev. David O. Leary.

Reports

EVANGELISM REPORT—1973

"SHARING CHRIST NOW" was the theme of the 27th statewide Evangelism Conference at Ovens Auditorium, Charlotte—February 5-7, 1973. Over 2,400 pastors and lay persons were challenged by outstanding speakers to lead their people to become more involved in the work of evangelism.

The Division of Evangelism has encouraged churches to participate in KEY 73. One hundred and fifty denominations are sharing in this evangelistic effort. The purpose of KEY 73 is to unite all Christians in the task of evangelism and to enable Christians to confront every person in the United States and Canada with the Gospel of Christ.

During June 11-15 over 730 youth and adults were present for the Youth Ministries Week at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly, with the emphasis on Evangelism, Vocational Guidance, and Recreation. Eighty-One youths made various decisions, including sixteen professions of faith.

Over 16,000 youth, pastors, and adult leaders attended the 3rd Statewide Youth Evangelism Night at Greensboro Coliseum on August 17. It is exciting how God is using the witness of thousands of Christian youth across our state.

The response of youth and adults to Lay Evangelism Schools in the past twenty months has been outstanding. 9,564 youth and adults have participated in this lay witness training from 720 churches and 34 associations. Also, 107 pastors from nine associations shared in a Pastor's Retreat to learn how to lead their churches in Lay Evangelism Schools.

The 28th Statewide Evangelism Conference will be at War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, during February 4-6, 1974. We hope that many of our lay people as well as our pastors will make plans to attend.

Let us thank God for the excellent reports of revival and evangelistic efforts throughout our Association and State. Last year we reported 408 baptisms. When the records are all in for this year we hope there will be a considerable increase.

A growing concern for all of us is the ever increasing number of non-resident Baptist. Last year a total of 2,810 were reported. This means that 1 out of every 4 is lost to the service of Christ through a local church. If we can win this 2,810 for Christ during the next year what a great revival we will experience! Let us pray earnestly for the leadership of the Holy Spirit as we seek to bear a more effective witness for Christ this year than ever before.

I am deeply grateful for the Wonderful cooperation the women in the Association have given me during the past four years. Mr. Hager and his staff have all sought to work together in Christian Service.

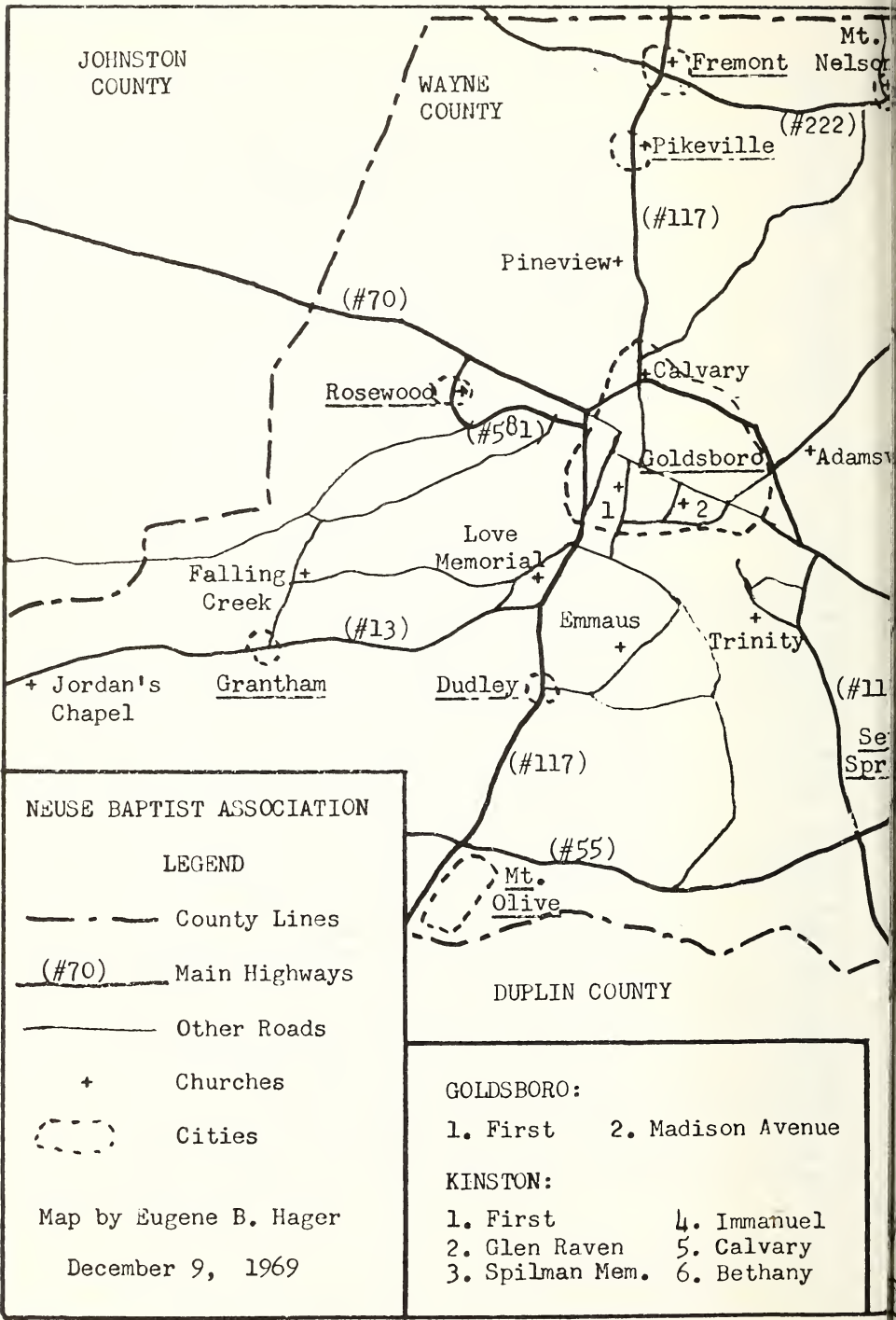

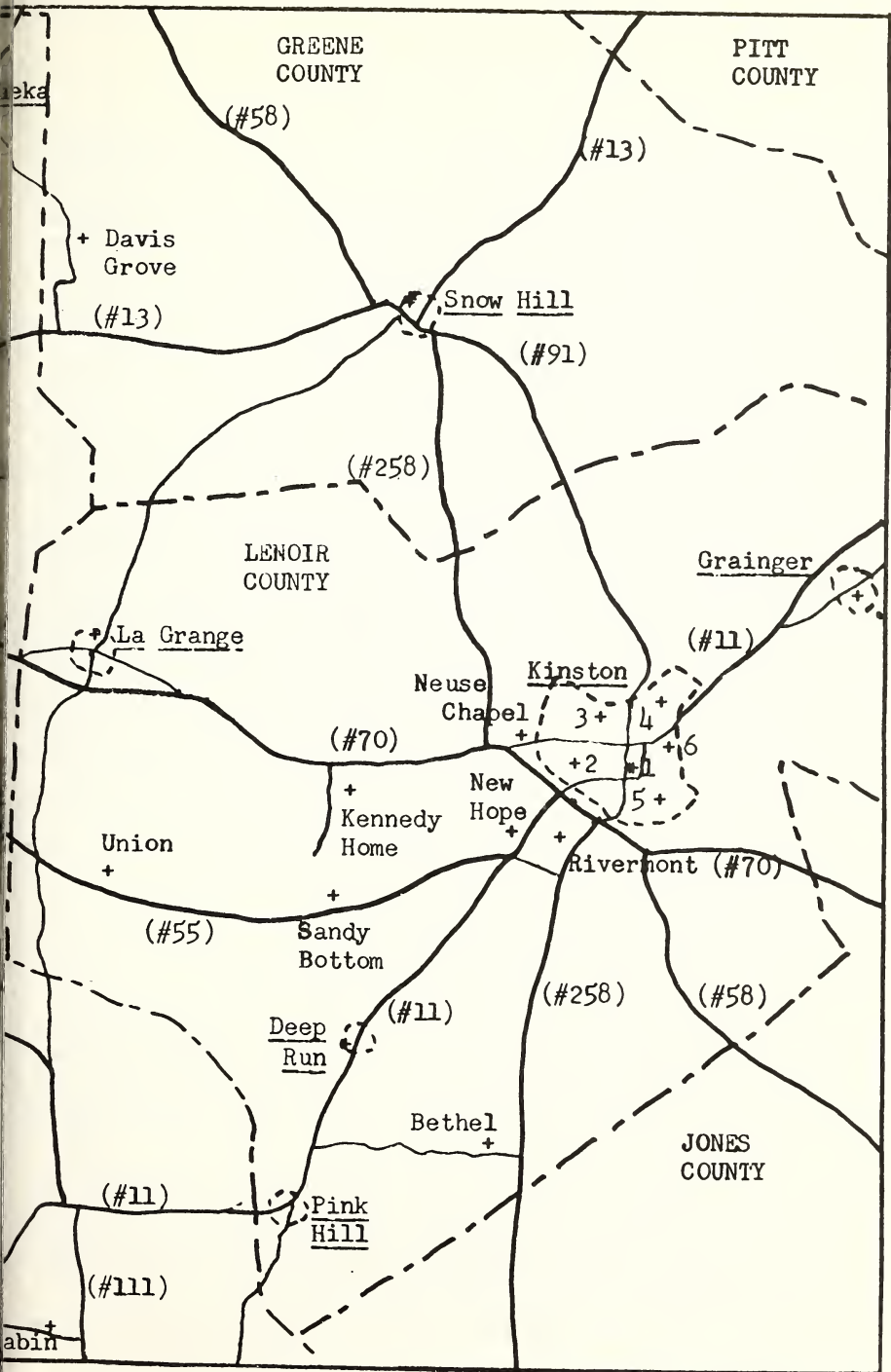

ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL MEETINGS FOR 1972-73

Because of a constitutional change passed at the 1972 Annual Meeting the Neuse Baptist Association Council meets five times a year.

The first meeting was held December 4, 1972 at Madison Avenue Baptist Church. The following matters were considered: (1) Rev. Herman Lineberger, Chairman of Missions Committee, moved that a request for \$1500 on behalf of First Baptist Church, Kinston, for Pastor's salary at Calvary Center be sent to the State Convention Board. The motion was seconded and carried. (2) Eugene Hager, as a recommendation from the Planning Committee, made a motion Mr. Eugene Roberts be elected as Association Publicity Consultant. The motion was seconded and carried. (3) Mr. Hager announced that Hollowell Oil Company had again refunded a month's rent (\$42.50) to the Association. He made a motion the clerk write a letter of thanks. The motion was seconded by Gene Roberts and carried. (4) Reports of Organizations and Committees were heard.

The Second Council meeting was held February 19, 1973, at Kennedy Home Baptist Church. Items considered were: (1) Reports of Organizations and Committees. (2) Mr. H. E. Nickens made a motion the clerk send a letter to each of the local T. V. stations and a carbon to the Federal Communication Commission, objecting to the language allowed on Network shows. Motion seconded by Lacy Oliver, carried. (3) Mr. Gene Roberts moved the \$100 given the Association by Belk-Tyler be put with additional funds to purchase an IBM Select-ric Typewriter for the Associational office. Motion seconded by Lacy Oliver and carried.

The third Council meeting was held April 2, 1973, at Adamsville Baptist Church. The following matters were considered: (1) David Leary, in the absence of the Missions Committee Chairman, reported that a request had been made to the State Convention for \$1200 for Mission Superintendent salary aid, but only \$1104 had been approved. Mr. Leary then made a motion the Association make up the \$96.00 difference. The motion was seconded by Lonnie Parker, carried. (2) Mr. Nickens made a motion that the advisability and desirability of a supper meeting for the Council be put in the hands of the Planning Committee who would advise the Council members of their decision. Motion seconded by David Leary, carried. (3) Organizational and Committee reports were heard.

The fourth Council Meeting was held the evening of June 4, 1973 at Rivermont Baptist Church. Items of business were: (1) Herman Lineberger, Chairman of the Missions Committee, presented the request of First Baptist Church, Kinston and Calvary Mission to the North Carolina Baptist Convention for lot aid in the amount of \$2500. Mr. Lineberger made a motion that the Associational Council approve the request, seconded by Mr. Nickens, carried. (2) In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Hager presented the slate of officers recommended by the Nominating Committee as follows: Moderator—M. A. Shaver, Vice-Moderator—Frank Bowers, Clerk—Mrs. Russell Ault, Treasurer—George B. Dupree, Sunday School Director—Tom Waits, Church Training Director—Arthur Wall, Woman's Missionary Union Director—Mrs. Nora Jean Hill, Brotherhood Director—H. E. Nickens, Historian—Forrest Jones, TRUSTEES: Lindy Speight—term expires 1974, Emulon B. Parker—term expires 1975, J. A. Stevens—term expires 1976. There being no other names placed in nomination Lacy Oliver made a motion the members recommended be elected by acclamation, seconded by Earl Farthing, motion carried. (3) Ray Hodge made a motion that Frank Bowers, with the approval of the Planning Committee, go ahead with plans for a Neuse Associational Booth at Wayne County Fair. Motion seconded and carried. (4) Organizational and Committee reports were heard.

The fifth Council Meeting was held October 1, 1973 at First Baptist Church, Goldsboro. The following business was considered: (1) Rev. Herman Lineberger, Chairman of the Missions Committee, had two requests from First Baptist Church, Kinston and Calvary Mission to the North Carolina Baptist Convention. The requests were for \$2500 lot aid and \$1200 for Pastor's salary. Mr. Lineberger made a motion the Council approve both requests, seconded by Mr. Hager, carried. (2) Organizational and Committee reports were heard.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The past year saw a drop in total Sunday School enrolment in our Association. We were down from 7,307 a year ago to 6,807 as of September 1973. However, in spite of this over-all decrease, we have twelve churches reporting an increase in total enrolment for the past year.

To waste our time in an effort to analyze these statistics would only detract from our thrust for 1973-74. I believe that Baptist Sunday Schools are facing the greatest opportunity in the history of our denomination. In working with, and visiting in several of the churches across our association during the past year I have found a spirit of optimism, a new vitality and a deeper concern than I have ever found in the past years.

Basically, the needs are many. But they are needs that can easily be met by planning and working at the task of Bible Teaching. In many instances the problem may be simplified by dividing it into two areas of need:

1. Many of our teachers and directors need to learn the basic concepts of teaching. They feel a deep need to set down with a qualified instructor and discuss their own particular problems, rather than becoming involved in a group training clinic. Our Associational Sunday School Department has, in this past year, tried to provide such training opportunities to those who have requested it.

2. The local Church often fails to provide adequate space and equipment for the Bible Teaching Program of the church. Proper equipment and teaching aids are a must, especially in the Preschool and Children's Divisions. Many teachers are hampered by lack of funds to purchase the small but often very important items that are listed in the resource section of every teacher's guide.

We would urge every Church to take an inventory of your Sunday School equipment. Ask your Budget Committee to provide an item in your Church Budget for class room equipment and teaching aids.

If you would like to have a Teaching Improvement Clinic in your own Church we would like to have you contact the Associational Sunday School Department and let us visit you and discuss your needs. We have well trained leaders who would welcome the opportunity to help your Bible Teaching program.

Dedicated, well trained and highly motivated teachers and directors will make our Sunday Schools a vital and growing ministry to the people of our church and community.

2. 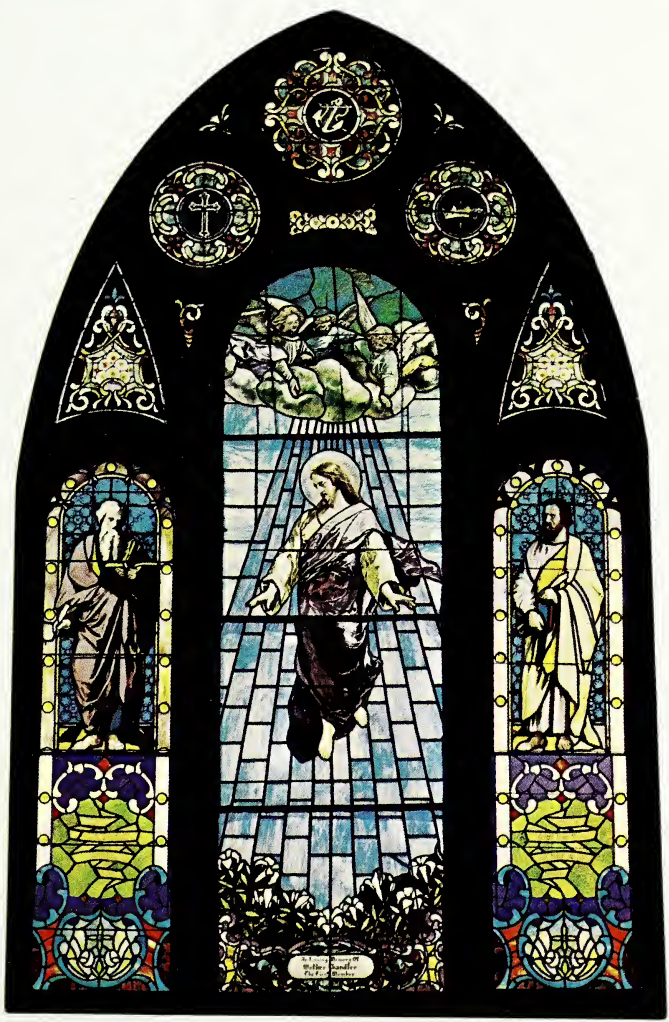

Constitution

of the

NEUSE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I. Name

This body shall be known as the Neuse Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. Purpose

The purpose of the Association shall be to devise, recommend and promote measures for increasing the harmony and spiritual power of the cooperating churches, to assist in developing and directing their energies, resources and gifts in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom, and to cooperate with the Baptist Convention of North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention in all religious, educational, mission, Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union and other work fostered by the said conventions.

ARTICLE III. Membership

SECTION 1. Membership in the body shall be composed of all Missionary Baptist pastors and duly elected messengers of the cooperating churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be represented, at the annual meeting of the Association and at any special meeting during the year, by messengers who shall be duly certified, in the following ratio: Each church with a membership of not more than one hundred members (100) shall be entitled to five (5) messengers. Churches having more than one hundred (100) members

shall be entitled to an additional messenger for every additional one hundred (100) members or a major fraction thereof, providing that no church shall have more than twelve (12) messengers.

SECTION 3. New churches seeking to seat messengers in the Association must make written application to the Missions Committee not later than one month prior to the last meeting of the Associational Council prior to the annual meeting of the Association, giving evidence of their faith and order, and their agreement to cooperate in the general program of the Association, The Baptist Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention. The Missions Committee shall study applications and make recommendations to the Associational Council regarding same, and in turn, the Associational Council shall make its recommendations to the annual meeting of the Association for its action.

SECTION 4. All new missions and new churches should be sponsored by a local church or churches.

SECTION 5. The Association shall have power, upon given written notice of nine (9) months and by two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of messengers present and voting, to withdraw fellowship from any church that shall willfully depart from orthodox principles of the Christian religion as taught in the Southern Baptist churches or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or by letter at the annual session of the Association without sufficient reason or that fails to support causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular or that ceases to be missionary in practice.

SECTION 6. Any church may decline to send messengers to the Association at its pleasure. Whenever this constitutes a withdrawal of fellowship on the part of the church, the Association shall not as a body, or through a representative or representatives, seek to restrain by coercion or law the withdrawal action of the church.

ARTICLE IV. Meetings

SECTION 1. The Association shall convene annually on the fourth Monday night and Tuesday in October and may meet with different churches on the two (2) successive days.

SECTION 2. The time of the annual meeting may be changed, or special meeting called, by the Associational Council upon notice to the cooperating churches.

ARTICLE V. Fiscal Year

This fiscal year of the Association shall begin on January first (1st) and end on December thirty-first (31st) of each year.

ARTICLE VI. Officers

SECTION 1. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, the Trustees, the Associational Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Church Music Director, and such others as may be authorized by the Association.

SECTION 2. All officers shall be members of churches affiliated with the Association.

SECTION 3. Nominations for the officers shall be presented to the Associational Council at its Spring Meeting for approval. These nominees shall then serve as "Officers-Elect" until the Annual Session of the Association, at which time (1) they shall be considered for election by the Association. (2) Any officer may be elected to succeed himself, except the Moderator, who may not serve more than two (2) years in succession. Vacancies occurring between Annual Sessions shall be filled by the Associational Council.

ARTICLE VII. The Associational Council

SECTION 1. The Associational Council shall consist of each Pastor in the Association, the Officers of the Association, the Superintendent of Missions, the immediate Past-Moderator, the representatives of the Denominational agencies, and two (2) lay members from each cooperative church, to be elected by the church. The names of the lay members shall be duly certified by notifying the Associational Clerk.

SECTION 2. The Officers of the Association shall serve as the Officers of the Council.

SECTION 3. The Associational Council shall act for the Association in the interim between Annual Sessions. It shall carry out the policies and will of the Association, and shall make reports to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Associational Council also has the power to fill vacancies among the Officers, the Committees and/or the Executive Committee of the Association that may occur during the year.

SECTION 4. Twenty (20) members of the Associational Council will constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VIII. Administration

SECTION 1. The Superintendent of Missions shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program of the Association and the denomination. He shall work under the direction of and be subject to the authority of the Associational Council. He shall be nominated by the Executive Committee to The Associational Council, and elected by the Association at any Annual Session, or by The Associational Council if the next Annual Session of the Association is thirty (30) days or more beyond the date on which the Superintendent of Missions is nominated.

ARTICLE IX. Committees

SECTION 1. At a meeting of the Associational Council prior to the annual meeting of the Association, the Moderator shall appoint a committee on committees, consisting of not less than five (5) members, whose duty it shall be to offer nominations to the Association for members and chairmen of all standing committees herein provided except those already named by the Constitution.

SECTION 2. The Association shall have the standing committees listed

below, along with other committees authorized by the Association. These committees shall begin their duties at the close of the annual session, and shall make reports of their work to the Planning Committee. Members of the committee shall be selected from the membership of those churches cooperating with the Association and are subject to re-election provided, that in no case, any person shall serve on the same committee longer than three (3) years in succession, with the exception of the Music Committee and the Camp Committee. The Moderator and Superintendent of Missions shall be considered ex officio members of all standing Committees.

- N. Committee On Memorials

ARTICLE X. Annual Report of the Church

Each cooperating church shall send annually to the Association a report on the Associational Letter which is provided. Said reports should reach the Associational Clerk not later than October 15 of that year.

ARTICLE XI. Special Days

The fourth (4th) Sunday of January, of each year shall be designated as "Association Day" in all churches for the purpose of receiving an offering for the Missionary activities of the Association, such as church building lots, facilities for missions, rentals, Superintendent of Missions.

ARTICLE XII. Adoption of Constitution

This Constitution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall supersede any and all constitutions previously adopted.

ARTICLE XIII. Amendment of Constitution

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association provided the amendment has been presented in writing to the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws no later than September 1, and presented to the October meeting of the Associational Council, and read on two successive days of the annual meeting, and receives a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present at the second meeting.

By-Laws

“The Work Of The Association Shall Be Governed By The Following By-Laws.”

ARTICLE I—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. THE MODERATOR shall preside over the annual meeting of the Association and begin each session punctually. He shall appoint such committees as may be authorized by the Constitution, or the Association, enforce the rules, preserve order, and exercise all prerogatives of a presiding officer according to parliamentary usage, and serve as chairman of the Associational Council, and ex officio member of all standing committees.

SECTION 2. THE VICE-MODERATOR shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence and serve as Chairman of the Calendar Committee.

SECTION 3. THE CLERK shall keep the records of the proceedings of the Association, superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes, keep on file the printed minutes and other important papers of the Association and shall serve as Secretary of the Associational Council and the Planning Committee. For his services, the clerk shall be paid an amount to be determined annually by the Association.

SECTION 4. THE TREASURER shall receive, safeguard and disburse all funds of the Association. Disbursements shall be made by the Treasurer in accordance with the Budget adopted by the Association. Non-Budget items should be approved by the Budget-Finance and Planning Committees. The treasurer shall make quarterly reports to the Planning Committee and an Annual Report to the Association. He shall be bonded in such an amount as the Planning Committee shall direct.

SECTION 5. THE HISTORIAN shall collect facts of interest to the Association and the cooperating churches, and shall make a report to each annual meeting of the Association.

SECTION 6. THE SUNDAY SCHOOL DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Sunday School Program in the Association in Cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 7. THE CHURCH TRAINING DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Church Training Programs in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 8. THE MUSIC DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Church Music Program in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 9. THE BROTHERHOOD DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Brotherhood Program in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 10. THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION DIRECTOR

shall promote and supervise the Woman's Missionary Union Program in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 11. THE TRUSTEES shall rotate one each year, and as provided by law and action of the Association, hold in trust the title to all property of the Association and shall represent the Association in all matters of legal responsibility regarding the purchase, improvement and disposal of Associational property. They shall have no power to buy, sell, mortgage, lease or transfer any property of the Association without a specific vote of the Association or Associational Council authorizing such action.

SECTION 12. THE SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS, though not an officer, his duties shall be:

I. GENERAL ASSOCIATIONAL WORK

1. Planning—Co-ordination
 - a. Assist in preparing the associational calendar of activities
 - b. Work closely with associational officers and committees
 - c. Work closely with Pastors' Conference and other associational organizations
 - d. Helping to plan association-wide campaigns and activities (Schools of Missions, Clinics, Enlargement Campaigns, etc.)
2. Dissemination of Information
 - a. Publishing an associational newsletter
 - b. Preparation of Book of Reports for Annual Meeting
 - c. Announcements at various associational meetings
 - d. Keeping up-to-date file in office on associational and denominational causes and activities
3. Promotion
 - a. Associational activities
 - b. Denominational causes and activities
(He should keep well-informed on these as to be able to explain them and answer questions about them)
4. Counseling
Associational leaders
Pastors
Pulpit Committees
Pastorless churches
5. Administrative (in the office)
Correspondence, file, equipment and supplies, office routine, etc.
6. Give time and attention as needed to work with military-related families through the churches of the association and, in co-operation with the Baptist State Convention.

II. ASSISTANCE TO THE CHURCHES

(Only upon invitation of the pastor, or of responsible Church leaders.)
In the Supt. of Missions, the Association provides a trained worker on call

for churches, pastors, and leaders. He should endeavor to keep himself trained and informed.

Pulpit Supply

Training and Teaching (study courses, conferences, clinics, etc.)

Church Community Surveys and Maps

V. B. S. (for pastorless churches or where special need exists)

Other assistance as the need arises

III. ASPECTS OF EMPLOYMENT

1. Responsible to Associational Council
2. Three weeks vacation with pay.
3. Maximum of four weeks of denominational or church-related work outside the Association (Schools of Missions, Church Community Surveys, Revivals, etc.). These to be carefully scheduled so as to avoid interference with his major associational responsibilities.
4. He shall submit a report of his work to the Associational Council at its meetings, and to the Annual Association at its Meeting.
5. A notice of thirty days shall be given by the Supt. of Missions or the Association before employment is terminated.

ARTICLE II—COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES, consisting of not less than five (5) members, shall nominate the members and chairmen of all standing committees herein provided, except those already named by the Constitution. They shall submit these nominations to the Association for election.

SECTION 2. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDER OF BUSINESS, consisting of five (5) members, shall prepare the Program for the Annual Sessions. This suggested program shall be presented to the Association at the beginning of the first Session of the Annual Meeting for action. The Officers of the Association and the President of the Ministers' Conference are Ex-Officio members. The Moderator shall serve as Chairman.

SECTION 3. THE COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS shall be composed of three (3) members whose duties shall be to present nominations for the "Officers Elect" to the spring meeting of the Associational Council, and to the Association for all officers authorized herein, or by the Association. They shall present nominations to the Association for the representatives of the various agencies of the State Convention. They shall also present nominations to the Associational Council to fill any vacancy which may occur during the year.

SECTION 4. THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM shall be composed of five (5) members who shall cooperate with the State Chairman of Evangelism in the promotion of approved evangelistic efforts within the Association. It shall encourage evangelism in the churches, especially where

the need is apparent, and shall help provide evangelistic services in the unchurched areas within the boundaries of the Association.

SECTION 5. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDINATION shall be composed of three (3) members who shall act in an advisory capacity for churches. The committee shall assist any church which requests its services in the examination of candidates for the Christian ministry. It shall help arrange, where necessary, proper services of ordination. Churches are requested to use this committee to examine candidates only after their call to some specific work. Further, churches are requested to refrain from announcing the date of ordination until after the candidate has received approval by this committee.

SECTION 6. THE COMMITTEE ON PLACE AND PREACHER shall be composed of three (3) members, whose duty it shall be to receive or solicit invitations for the place of meeting of the annual session for the following year, and to recommend to the Association in annual session, a place or places of meeting, along with a preacher and alternate for the sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS shall be composed of three (3) members and shall review all resolutions referred to it by the Association, the Associational Council, or the Planning Committee, and report suitable resolutions at the annual meeting.

SECTION 8. THE COMMITTEE ON BUDGET-FINANCE shall be composed of seven (7) members, one from each of the counties of Lenoir, Greene, and Wayne, and one at large, plus the Moderator, Treasurer and Superintendent of Missions. The Committee shall hear and give consideration to requests of the Planning Committee and other leaders in the Associational work. These requests are to be submitted not later than September 15th of each year.

The duties of the committee are as follows:

- (a) To plan and supervise the making and raising of the Budget.
- (b) To implement the financial program of the Association as directed by the Planning Committee of the Association.
- (c) To have a professional audit made of the Treasurer's books and make a report to the Association in its annual meeting.
- (d) To make a monthly financial report to the Planning Committee.

SECTION 9. THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS shall be composed of five (5) members whose duties it shall be to ascertain the need of new churches within the boundaries of the Association; to recommend to the Planning Committee the location of sites and the purchasing of lots for such churches, and to assist the organization of such churches as might be authorized. Churches contemplating making debts on lots, buildings, improvements and/or asking for Pastor's aid, must have the recommendations of the Missions Committee and approval of Planning Committee, if they expect to apply to the Baptist State Mission Board for aid in paying for the same. It shall be

the duty of the Missions Committee to study the applications of Churches seeking to seat messengers in the Association as to evidence of their faith and order, and their agreement to cooperate in the general program of the Association, the Baptist Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention. The Committee shall then make recommendations to the Planning Committee regarding same.

SECTION 10. THE COMMITTEE ON MUSIC shall be composed of three (3) members who shall cooperate with the Music Department of the State Convention and shall assist in any music program approved by the Association. The Chairman shall also serve as Associational Music Director.

SECTION 11. THE COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN LIFE shall be composed of three (3) members who shall work with local and State Officials in every phase of promoting civic righteousness.

SECTION 12. THE COMMITTEE ON CAMP ACTIVITIES shall be composed of three (3) members. The chairman shall serve as camp director. The duties of the committee shall be to plan and execute the summer camp.

SECTION 13. THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS shall be composed of three (3) members who shall receive all proposed changes thereto and, upon study of this or other observations, make recommendations to the Association on all Constitution and By-Law changes.

SECTION 14. COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS, consisting of three (3) members, shall plan for our beloved dead a memorial service to be conducted during the Annual Session of the Association.

ARTICLE III—THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

SECTION 1. The Officers of the Council shall be the Moderator, the Vice-Moderator, and the Clerk of the Association.

SECTION 2. The Association Council shall hold an organizational meeting within sixty (60) days after the Annual Meeting, and shall set up the following subcommittees, and any others deemed necessary for the proper handling of Associational business between the Annual Sessions:

1. THE PLANNING COMMITTEE: This committee shall be composed of the Officers of the Association, the Superintendent of Missions, and the Chairman of the various Standing Committees. This committee shall meet every other month, beginning in November, but omitting July and August, (unless otherwise designated by the committee), and shall handle all matters committed to it by the Associational Council. It shall hear Organizational, Committee, and other reports and plans; design promotional activities, and seek ways and means of forwarding the Lord's work in and through the Association. It shall report all actions to the Associational Council at the next regular meeting, and shall be subject to the approval of the Associational Council. A majority of the Committee shall constitute a quorum. The Superintendent of Missions shall serve as chairman.

- (a) **THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE:** This committee shall be composed of the Officers of the Association, the President of the Ministers' Conference, and the Superintendent of Missions. (It shall be the duty of this Committee to plan and recommend through the **PLANNING COMMITTEE** to the Annual Session of the Association, a Calendar of Activities for the coming year. The Vice-Moderator shall serve as chairman.)
- (b) **ANY OR ALL OTHER STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE ASSOCIATION** shall function as subcommittees of the Planning Committee.

SECTION 3. The council shall meet every other month (except July and August). The first meeting shall be held within sixty (60) days after the Annual Meeting. Times and places of these meetings shall be determined by the Council.

SECTION 4. The Council shall submit to the Association in Annual Session a full and complete Budget, Calendar of Activities, and a full and complete report of its work.

ARTICLE IV—RULES OF ORDER

The following rules shall govern deliberations in the meeting of the Association and the Associational Council.

SECTION 1. The official transaction of business in all regular meetings of the Association, the Associational Council, and the Planning Committee shall be by the affirmative majority vote of the members present and voting, except in matters relating to the constitution, the withdrawing of fellowship from any cooperating church, and the seating of messengers from those churches desiring to cooperate with the Association. In called meetings of the Association of the Associational Council, a number equal to the majority of the membership of the Associational Council and representing a majority of the cooperating churches shall be necessary to constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. A messenger wishing to speak shall rise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration and shall avoid all personalities. No messenger shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special permission.

SECTION 3. All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer or at his request, read by the clerk before the vote is taken.

SECTION 4. When a question is under consideration, no other motion or proposition shall be received except a motion to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time. When there are several motions, they shall have preference in the order in which they come.

SECTION 5. The general business of the Association shall be recommended by the Committee On Order Of Business at the beginning of the first session of the Annual Meeting of the Association. When adopted this report

shall become the order of business for the members and cannot be changed except by the vote of the Association.

SECTION 6. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided by Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE V—ADOPTION OF BY-LAWS

SECTION 1. These by-laws shall take effect immediately upon their adoption, and shall supersede any and all by-laws previously adopted.

SECTION 2. These By-Laws may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association provided the amendment has been presented in writing to the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws no later than September 1, and presented to the October meeting of the Associational Council. Passage shall be by majority vote of the messengers present and voting.

1974

First Session

MONDAY EVENING

1. The 45th Annual Session of the Neuse Baptist Association was called to order at 7 p.m., October 28, 1974, at Union Baptist Church, by the Moderator, M. A. Shaver.

2. Rev. John Thompson, Jr., Music Director at Kennedy Home Baptist Church, led the group in singing the hymn, "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." The pianist for the evening was Mrs. Thompson, and at the organ was Mrs. Blanche Davis, organist for Union Baptist Church.

3. Rev. Robert Miller, Pastor of Grainger Baptist Church, directed the attention of all present to the theme of this year's Annual Meeting, "Share His Love Now," and then read a portion of Jesus' prayer of intercession from John 17:13-26. Rev. Miller then led in prayer.

4. Rev. Bill Billinger, Pastor of the host church, welcomed all members and visitors to Union. He said it was his hope that this year's Session would be a means whereby each person attending would have his faith deepened and God's work would go forward as He would wish it to. Everyone was invited to remain for refreshments at the close of this night's Session.

5. BUSINESS SESSION: The Moderator declared that barring unforeseen changes, the program would be followed as printed.

6. The Superintendent of Missions, Rev. Eugene Hager, recognized the Pastors and Ministers of Education and Youth who had come to the Neuse Association since the last Annual Meeting; also those serving as interim pastors at the present time. On behalf of the Association, Mr. Hager welcomed them and offered them any assistance they would need.

7. Mr. Shaver welcomed the visitors and asked those from outside the Association to stand and introduce themselves.

8. Copies of the Association Calendar of Activities for 1975 were handed out by the Vice-Moderator, Rev. Frank Bowers, who advised the group that if any errors, omissions or changes were necessary it should be called to his attention before the Calendar is voted on tomorrow night.

9. The Report on Registration was called for. The Clerk read the Report as follows: Pastors — 13, Messengers — 65, Visitors — 40, and Officers—3. There was no tally of Churches represented at this time. (7:30 p.m.)

10. The Clerk, Mrs. R. S. Ault, read the Summary of Associational Council Meetings. Eugene Hager made a motion the Report be accepted, motion seconded, carried.

11. The group was led in the singing of, "Love Lifted Me," led by Mr. John Thompson.

12. REPORTS: Because he was unable to attend, Simon Jesse, had asked Rev. Ray Hodge to say a few words on behalf of the Biblical Recorder. Mr. Hodge called attention to the printed report in the Book of Reports, and added that there was no better source by which Southern Baptist of North Carolina could obtain information about our work. Mr. Hodge moved the adoption of the report, seconded, carried.

13. As Chairman of the Evangelism Committee, Mr. Hodge said he was glad that so much had been done during the past year. He expressed the hope that everyone would read the Committee's report printed in the Book of Reports. Mr. Hodge then made a motion the report be adopted, seconded, carried.

14. Rev. Eugene Hager, Superintendent of Missions, commented on the

well balanced and wide variety of his activities for the past year. He let it be known that the facilities of the Association Office were available to any church or individual member of any of the churches. Mr. Hager expressed the hope that no one would hesitate to call the office at any time if help was needed.

15. Dr. W. Perry Crouch, General Secretary of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, stated that the North Carolina Baptists have a unique heritage in that our forefathers took the time to discover what the Bible said in the light of God's messengers. From the writings of Paul, they became convinced that each Christian had the right to approach God directly with prayers and petitions, and that each church had the right to be an independent governing body.

It was in 1611, Dr. Crouch said, that Baptist Churches started in North Carolina. From the beginning Baptists practiced the belief that each individual is a Temple of God, every person is important. When King Charles gave the land grant for the area that is now North Carolina, he stipulated that dissenters would have the right to worship here, meaning that it was not necessary to be a member of the Church of England.

As Paul preached and taught, in his day, that the wisdom of God, not man, was needed to get God's business accomplished; just so is the situation today. If we could just catch the vision of what God wants Southern Baptists to do, we could change the State and the World, Dr. Crouch said. We need to get in business WITH God. Take advantage of the offer He gives us to be partners with Him. We have a good program going in North Carolina, but the program will not win the lost or minister to the needs of those for whom it is intended without Christian people who are willing to work and witness, Dr. Crouch declared.

Briefly we were told of some of the facets of the State Missions Program, the Baptist serving and the people being served, such as: those who move into our state from some other places, (Japanese, Cubans, those who come to work in new industry); the deaf, of which there are 7,000 in North Carolina (the T. V. film made in Raleigh each week to minister to the non-hearing in particular, is shown in from 13 to 15 other states); youth work, (students from our own Baptist Colleges doing summer work at churches, camps, assemblies, and resort areas); Mountain Area work; Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute; Inner City (ministries to the military). In speaking of the work done in our metropolitan areas, Dr. Crouch voiced the fear that as the population grows in these areas that the church seems to get crowded out. He cited the example of Atlanta, Georgia, where 17 Baptist Churches were lost while industry, commerce and people increased. With more and more industry moving into our State, Dr. Crouch asked the question, "Are we going to let this happen in North Carolina?"

Back in 1970 it was decided that one thing that was most needed was a Conference Center at Caraway so that there would be a place where retreats for all church leaders could be held the year around. And this year, Dr. Crouch told us, all monies sent to State Missions Offering over \$260,000 would be spent for that purpose.

He then reminded us that the Co-operative Program undergirded ALL our missions work at home and abroad, as well as, give support to our colleges and institutions.

In closing, Dr. Crouch urged the pastors to encourage their members to feel they are partners with God in this world mission program.

16. At this time everyone sang, "Love Divine, All Love Excelling."

17. WORSHIP: Rev. M. O. Sears, Pastor of Adamsville Baptist Church, read the scripture, Luke 19:1-10.

18. Rev. John Thompson asked all pastors, church staff and departmental directors to come forward to render the "special music." He then instructed them to sing the verses of "Nothing But the Blood" and the chorus of "Revive Us Again." The performance was enjoyed by one and all.

19. The Annual Sermon was brought by Rev. H. T. Waits, pastor of Snow Hill First Baptist Church.

Mr. Waits pointed out that in all his reading and research he has found that not one historian thought he was living in "normal times." Even today the statement is made that the local, national or world situations are not "normal." Therefore, we were told, our responsibility as Christians must be to work with conditions as they are NOW, not wait for some future time when things may return to "normal."

These are times when it seems we will never reach goals set for our churches and we become discouraged. The need to unburden to someone is not always possible, but there is one to whom we can always go and who is always available, the Lord Jesus Christ.

Jesus, Himself, proclaimed, "I am the Way." In citing the case of the woman taken in the act of adultery, Rev. Waits said it is not our place to accuse, condemn or destroy, but to show the way to Jesus. As was earlier read, we were reminded that Jesus did not accuse Zaccheus, but pointed the way to Salvation.

All around us, people are living in sin. It is the Christian's responsibility to lead them to a faith in Christ and His Church, but there will have to be faith in the one doing the leading. The Young Adults and Youth are turning away from the church because they no longer trust the leaders.

In conclusion, Mr. Waits stated that we were told that Jesus spent little time telling people what they were doing that was wrong. Positive teaching and living make more of an impression than criticism and fault finding.

20. The Moderator asked Rev. Waldo Early from First Church, Clinton, to pronounce the Benediction to close the first session of the 45th Neuse Baptist Association Annual Meeting.

21. The total registration for this session was: churches represented — 25, pastors — 18, messengers — 68, visitors — 40, officers — 24, a total of 130 present.

Second Session

TUESDAY EVENING

22. The second session of the 45th Annual Meeting of the Neuse Baptist

Association was held at Madison Avenue Baptist Church, October 29, 1974, at 7 p.m., M. A. Shaver, Moderator presiding.

23. John Thompson, song leader for the session, led the group in singing the hymn, "Standing on the Promises." Mrs. Thompson was at the piano for the evening and Mr. David Periconi at the organ.

24. Richard Poindexter, pastor of LaGrange Baptist Church, read portions of Scripture from Romans, Acts and John, then led in prayer.

25. Mrs. Norma Jean Hill gave the reading, "Reach Out and Touch" and sang the solo, "Do You Really Care?" John Thompson accompanied her at the piano. The selections were beautifully done and much enjoyed.

26. Rev. Earl Farthing, pastor of the host church, welcomed all who had come and assured them he and the members of Madison Avenue were happy to have them and wanted to do everything possible to make things comfortable.

27. The Calendar of Activities for 1975 was presented by Rev. Frank Bowers, Vice-Moderator. He called attention to the fact that all Associational activities were underlined. Mr. Bowers moved the adoption of the Calendar, motion seconded, carried.

28. Rev. Murry Craft, pastor of Emmaus Baptist Church and Associational Sunday School Director for the coming year, asked everyone to do as much as possible to increase the Sunday School enrollment in the next twelve months. He also urged all teachers and leaders to take advantage of Work Shops when they are in the area.

29. Mr. Hager called attention to corrections to be made on the Vacation Bible School Report as printed in the Book of Reports. He also called special attention to the fact that Goldsboro First conducted three Bible Schools this year.

30. Mrs. Morris Hill, Associational W. M. U. Director, referred to the W. M. U. Report as printed in the Book of Reports. She said it had been a good year as far as activities and achievements went, but she was disappointed that there was such a low enrollment in the Girls in Action and Mission Friends organizations. She expressed the hope that ladies, who could be leaders, would show more interest in this phase of the W. M. U. work. The need to teach children missions at an early age was emphasized as she recalled the testimonies of many missionaries who felt the call to the mission field as G. As. or R. As.

Mrs. Hill also encouraged those present to make Mission Action a church-wide concern, not just projects for the W. M. U. and Brotherhood.

31. Mr. H. E. Nickens, Associational Brotherhood Director, directed attention to the printed report as found in the Book of Reports. He told of the success of the Association's first father and son retreat at Eagle's Nest this past summer. Before leaving the camp, he said many expressed the desire to have another next year.

32. The Clerk read the Registration Report as follows: Churches represented — 28, Pastors — 16, Messengers — 79, Visitors — 76, Officers — 2; a total of 173 at 7:30 p.m.

33. The Kennedy Home Choir presented a program of music consisting

of: "He's Everything To Me," "Yesterday," "They'll Know We Are Christians" and "Sweet, Sweet Spirit." The choir was led by John Thompson with Mrs. Thompson at the piano. Their performance was an inspiration to all.

34. Mr. Hager introduced Rev. W. O. Hern, Southern Baptist Missionary to Lebanon.

35. Mr. Hern expressed his pleasure in having a chance to tell of the work as well as report on the situation in the country which has been so much in the headlines of late. Having had surgery only three weeks earlier, he said he was indeed grateful to be able to be present and bring greetings from the Baptists of Lebanon, Jordan and Egypt. He said the Presidents of each of the Baptist Associations asked him to convey their thankfulness to the people who sent missionaries to their countries. Mr. Hern said every three year term he and his family have lived through a war or revolution there in the Middle East for the past twenty years.

At one time he was refused a permit that would have enabled him to remain in Egypt and teach. But he has served in Jordan and is now on furlough from his post in Lebanon. We were told that there are five Baptist Churches in Beirut, that we would find that the dress in Beirut is of very bright colors, and the style is western. Most men carry pistols, Mr. Hern said, but just the same he had found most Arabs kind and congenial. The age old tradition still prevails, that if you admire anything in the home of an Arab, you are given it as a gift as you leave. Mr. Hern related an experience he and his wife had had of this nature.

We were reminded that Lebanon was the original "Land of the Pharisees" and that it was from here that the cedars for King Solomon's Temple came.

Lebanon has a long history of being ruled by other countries. It was in 1943, after the fall of France, that this land obtained its freedom. It is considered strategically important because of the oil terminals and because it is the headquarters of the Palestinian Liberation Organization.

Mr. Hern said, unlike America, in Lebanon a man's religion is his politics. He says it is good that there is religious freedom there. Our Southern Baptist work began in 1948. Our work now includes thirteen organized churches, Baptist school, Social Service Ministeries, Good Will Centers, Summer Ministeries, a printing press from which all literature for all Arab countries is sent out, also there is a radio and T.V. Ministry.

The difficulties mentioned by Mr. Hern were: the military system in the country, the fact that traditionally the Christian is looked at with suspicion, the resistance of the Muslim to believe in the risen Christ, and the devaluation of the U. S. dollar.

One thing that brings joy to the heart of the missionary is that every lay-Baptist is an active witness for the Lord.

The political situation enables the Muslim to change his religion by going to court and having it legally documented.

With all that has been and is being done, Mr. Hern asked that all here at home would pray the message of God's Love would be conveyed to these people and that a great revival would be experienced in the Middle East.

The audience was thanked for their support both by means of prayer and money and were requested to continue to do the same.

36. The Memorials Committee report was given as follows: Mrs. L. A. Warrick read the list of names of the deceased members reported by the churches for the past year. Dr. Bunn, Chairman of the Committee, said "The greatest heroes are those heroes for the cause of Christ." He read a poem he had written for this occasion and asked Rev. Forrest T. Jones to close this period with prayer.

37. The hymn, "Stand Up, Stand Up For Jesus," was sung by the group.

38. The Budget-Finance Committee report was given by the Chairman, Rev. David Leary, and attention was called to the Auditor's Report as printed in the Book of Reports. Rev. Leary made a motion that the Report be adopted, motion seconded, carried.

39. In presenting the Camp Committee Report, Eugene Hager called attention to the dates on which Associational transportation would be provided this year. He urged G. A. leaders to get reservations for their girls for camp in soon after Christmas in order not to be turned down. At the same time the R. A. reservations could wait until Spring.

40. Mrs. Wiley Hill, member of the Committee, presented the Nominating Committee's report as printed in the Book of Reports. There being no other nominations from the floor, Mrs. Hill made the motion the names submitted by the Committee be elected by acclamation, motion seconded, carried.

41. Mr. H. E. Nickens, Chairman, gave the Committee on Committees Report and stated that all nominees had been contacted and had agreed to serve. Mr. Nickens made a motion the Report be approved, motion seconded, carried.

42. The Place and Preacher Report was presented by Mr. Nickens also. The 1975 Monday evening session will be held at Neuse Chapel Baptist Church, and the Tuesday evening session will be held at Adamsville. The preacher is to be Rev. Frank N. Bowers with Rev. Johnny Sasser as alternate.

43. Since there would not be another Associational Council meeting before the Board met in Raleigh, Rev. M. O. Sears, Chairman of the Missions Committee, asked the group to vote on two matters that needed attention. The first was a request for State aid in the amount of \$1200.00 for salary supplement to the Superintendent of Missions and the second was for State aid in the amount of \$1200.00 for salary aid for Pastor's salary at Calvary Baptist Church, Kinston. Mr. Sears made a motion both be approved, motion seconded, carried.

44. At this time an amusing film was shown in which the "Devil" admitted how he kept Baptist from participating in Associational activities. He said he could always keep them ignorant, uninvolved and prejudiced.

45. Rev. Murry Craft, a member of the Committee, read the two resolutions submitted by the Resolutions Committee and made a motion they be adopted, motion seconded, carried.

46. Eugene Hager presented the officers for the coming year and wished

them well. Mr. M. A. Shaver, past moderator, handed the gavel over to Rev. Lacy Oliver, Moderator for 1974-75.

Mr. Oliver said he was grateful for the chance to serve the Association in this way and he accepted the position with the full knowledge that the Love of the Lord was with him.

47. Rev. Oliver closed the 45th Annual Session of the Neuse Baptist Association with prayer.

48. The attendance for the second session was as follows: Churches represented — 23, Pastors — 16, Messengers — 80, Visitors — 81, Officers — 3, total of 180.

Reports

EVANGELISM REPORT — 1974

The continuing response of youth and adults to Lay Evangelism Schools has been significant. In the past thirty months 11,032 youth and adults have shared in this lay witness training from 855 churches and 44 associations. Also, 107 pastors from nine other associations have participated in Pastor's Retreats dealing with Lay Evangelism Schools.

"SHARING HIS LOVE AND SPIRIT" was the theme of the 28th Statewide Evangelism Conference at War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro — February 4-6, 1974. Over 2,400 pastors and lay persons heard excellent speakers emphasize various phases of evangelism.

God is greatly blessing the evangelistic ministry of our three summer youth evangelism teams. Nine college students are leading in music, preaching in youth revivals, and directing youth witness training sessions among 27 churches from Pisgah Forest to Edenton.

Youth Ministries Week was held at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly during June 10-14 for about 700 youth and adults with the emphasis on evangelism, vocational guidance and recreation.

About 15,000 youth, pastors, and adult leaders will attend the 4th Statewide Youth Evangelism Night — August 16 — at the Greensboro Coliseum. Richard Hogue, evangelist, Houston, Texas, is the guest preacher, and Darcy and Sharon Hodges are the guest soloists. Christian youth continue to share a strong witness for Jesus Christ across our state.

Let us rejoice in the leadership of the Holy Spirit in wonderful revival meetings, city-wide crusades, and evangelism clinics during the past year.

The 29th Statewide Evangelism Conference will be at War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, during February 3-5, 1975.

Remember to pray daily for the work of evangelism in all the churches of our state, nation, and world.

The Evangelism Committee of Neuse Association met several times to discuss our needs and to make plans concerning evangelism in the churches and association.

On Thursday, March 21, there was a Neuse Association Clinic on Evangelism, which was held at the Neuse Baptist Church in Kinston. Mr. Charles

McMillan, Director of Missions in the Mount Zion Baptist Association was the clinic leader. There were nearly 100 of our people present.

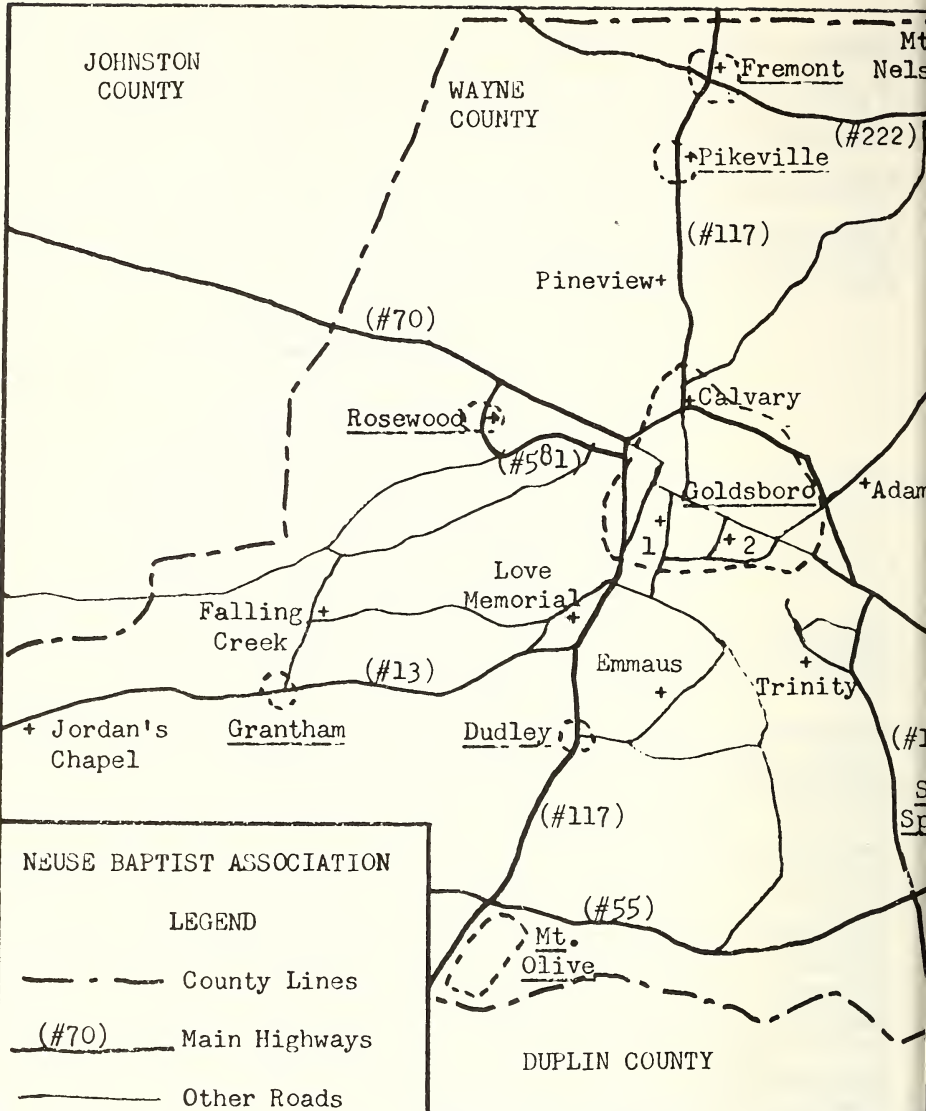
The purpose of the clinic was to enlist the pastor and several key leaders from each church, and to learn from them and to acquaint them concerning methods of evangelism our people and churches can use.




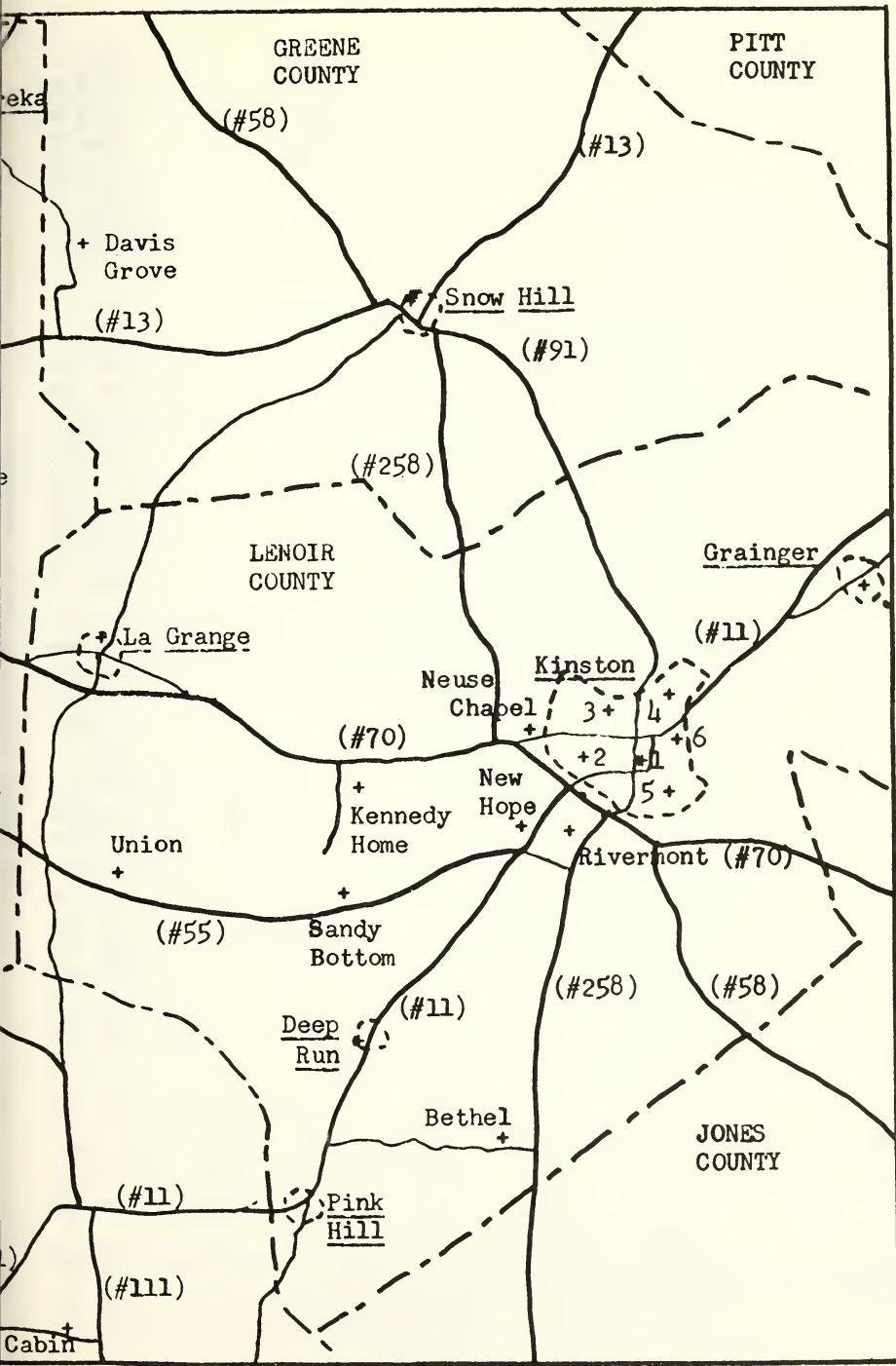

HOMES FOR THE AGING REPORT

As a Baptist, among the many vital ministries that you support are your North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging. For over 23 years now, you have had a part in serving hundreds of older people and making life much happier and secure for them. You have done so through two very helpful means of income: (1) The Special Offering for the Homes, received on the 3rd Sunday of February each year; (2) The Cooperative Program. Gifts through these two sources have increased from year to year, and offerings for 1974 will perhaps exceed \$350,000, providing more than 30% of the budget needed to operate 5 resident Homes and the Nursing Care Unit.

God, through you, has blessed this ministry of our Baptist Homes in a remarkable way, leading you to establish two Homes in Winston-Salem, Resthaven, and the Hayes Home, and the Nursing Care Unit, and three other Homes at Albemarle, Hamilton, and Yanceyville. In these Homes, 4 out of every 5 residents depend upon your love gifts and simply could not be cared for without your help.

Of greatest significance during the past year, has been the decision by the Trustees of the Homes to establish a 6th Home in Western North Carolina, to be located in the city of Asheville on the Pearson Estate, a magnificently beautiful twenty-one acre site, overlooking the city, and with the gorgeous Blue Ridge Mountains in the background. A dedicated group of people in the Western Carolina area have organized the first initial phase of what will become, it is hoped, a major State-Wide fund-raising effort to obtain the necessary money to build this proposed Home, after approval by the General Board, and the Baptist State Convention. Church groups are encouraged to visit the beautiful site on which the proposed Home will be built, and will be served lunch, if an appointment is made in advance.

With the addition of a 6th Home for the Aging, with the spiraling cost of living, and the great and ever increasing needs of older people, it is most urgent that our Baptist people be more generous than ever before in support for the Homes through the regular channels of the 3rd Sunday of February Offering, the Cooperative Program, and an over and above gift for the Western North Carolina Home.

Ministry to an older person is a direct ministry as unto Christ Himself and is most pleasing to Him, we are sure!

The first Council Meeting was held December 3, 1973 at Spilman Memorial Baptist Church. The following matters were considered: (1) Reports of

Organizations and Committees. (2) Rev. Ray Hodge made the motion a recommendation be made to the Program Committee that, in order that more laymen may attend, the two sessions of the Annual Meeting be night meetings from 7-9:30 p.m., with no afternoon session; that refreshments be served instead of supper, but if supper is served the host church(es) be given one hundred dollars (\$100.00) to defray expenses and no charge be made for the meal. Motion seconded by Rev. David Leary, motion carried.

The second Council Meeting was February 11, 1974, at Adamsville Baptist Church. The items of business considered were: (1) Organizational and Committee reports. (2) Rev. M. O. Sears made a motion a letter be sent to the churches to which Rev. Glenn Short and Rev. Art Wall are going, stating the value they have been to the Neuse Association. Motion seconded by Rev. Frank Bowers, motion carried.

The third Council Meeting was held at Kennedy Home Baptist Church, on April 1, 1974. The matters considered at this time were: (1) A motion made by Rev. Rodney Beals, that the June 3rd Neuse Associational Council meeting be held at Love Memorial Baptist Church, a "Dutch Supper" at one dollar \$(1.00) per person be served at 7 p.m. with the meeting following at 8 p.m. The motion was seconded and carried. This past year we have had a wide variety of ministries on the associational level. They range from the Senior Citizens' meetings (N.A.B.S.) held at Madison Avenue and Kennedy Home to the Music Day Camp for children in grades 1-4 in August at Kennedy Home. They included such things as the Youth Camps in July for boys and girls, the meeting arranged for high school students and our Baptist College Representatives and the Men and Boys Rally at Eagle's Nest, in July. Then there was the Pastoral Ministries Workshop for pastors held in January and the Sunday School Teaching Improvement Clinics in Goldsboro and Kinston in April. EXPLANATION CONCERNING REPORTS AT ANNUAL MEETING

For some years associational leaders across the state have been wrestling with the problem of Annual Meetings packed with three and four minute reports from an ever increasing number of agencies, institutions, and causes. Many people have been complaining for several years that such a program is monotonous, tiring, and does not give time for a listener to learn much from any of the reports.

Some associations have eliminated these reports in whole or in part. In Neuse Association we do not want to do that. We would like to hear from all and with adequate time for a meaningful report. The solution seems to be to spread them over a three-year period. In 1965 the Program Committee tentatively began doing so. The programs since have been so well-received that the policy is continuing.

More time will be given each of these on the program for the year their report comes. For the in-between years, we will continue to print their written reports in the Book of Reports. And we will continue to welcome their representatives to visit our Annual Meeting, be introduced, and be available for individual conferences when convenient. But there will be no time for an oral message or report except every third year.

An exception would be made, of course, if some new program or urgent development occurred during a year that an agency or institution would not normally have time on our program. Also, the Biblical Recorder is being allowed a few minutes each year to remind us that we can read about all of these institutions and agencies all through the year in its pages.

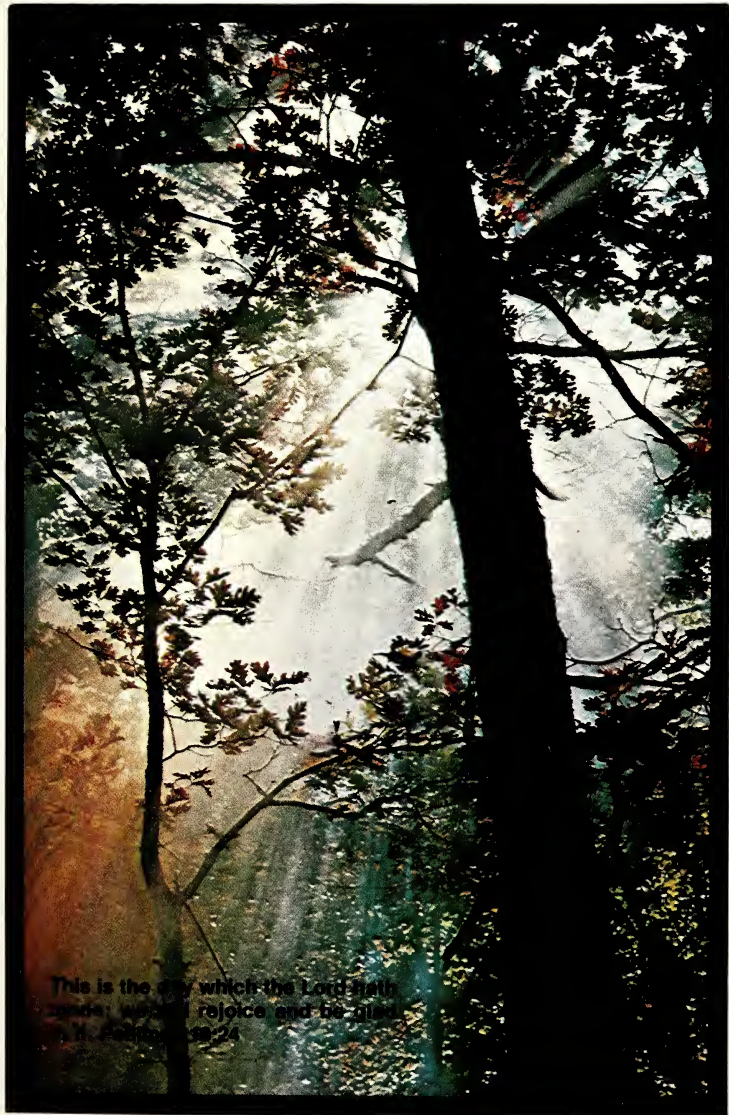

Constitution

of the NEUSE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I. Name

This body shall be known as the Neuse Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. Purpose

The purpose of the Association shall be to devise, recommend and promote measures for increasing the harmony and spiritual power of the cooperating churches, to assist in developing and directing their energies, resources and gifts in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom, and to cooperate with the Baptist Convention of North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention in all religious, educational, mission, Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union and other work fostered by the said conventions.

ARTICLE III. Membership

SECTION 1. Membership in the body shall be composed of all Missionary Baptist pastors and duly elected messengers of the cooperating churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be represented, at the annual meeting of the Association and at any special meeting during the year, by messengers who shall be duly certified, in the following ratio: Each church with a membership of not more than one hundred members (100) shall be entitled to five (5) messengers. Churches having more than one hundred (100) members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for every additional one hundred (100) members or a major fraction thereof, providing that no church shall have more than twelve (12) messengers.

SECTION 3. New churches seeking to seat messengers in the Association must make written application to the Missions Committee not later than one month prior to the last meeting of the Associational Council prior to the annual meeting of the Association, giving evidence of

their faith and order, and their agreement to cooperate in the general program of the Association, The Baptist Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention. The Missions Committee shall study applications and make recommendations to the Associational Council regarding same, and in turn, the Associational Council shall make its recommendations to the annual meeting of the Association for its action.

SECTION 4. All new missions and new churches should be sponsored by a local church or churches.

SECTION 5. The Association shall have power, upon given written notice of nine (9) months and by two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of messengers present and voting, to withdraw fellowship from any church that willfully depart from orthodox principles of the Christian religion as taught in the Southern Baptist churches or that fails to represent itself either by messenger or by letter at the annual session of the Association without sufficient reason or that fails to support causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular or that ceases to be missionary in practice.

SECTION 6. Any church may decline to send messengers to the Association at its pleasure. Whenever this constitutes a withdrawal of fellowship on the part of the church, the Association shall not as a body, or through a representative or representatives, seek to restrain by coercion or law the withdrawal action of the church.

ARTICLE IV. Meetings

SECTION 1. The Association shall convene annually on the fourth Monday night and Tuesday in October and may meet with different churches on the two (2) successive days.

SECTION 2. The time of the annual meeting may be changed, or special meeting called, by the Associational Council upon notice to the cooperating churches.

ARTICLE V. Fiscal Year

This fiscal year of the Association shall begin on January first (1st) and end on December thirty-first (31st) of each year.

ARTICLE VI. Officers

SECTION 1. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, the Trustees, the Associational Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Church Music Director, and such others as may be authorized by the Association.

SECTION 2. All officers shall be members of churches affiliated with the Association.

SECTION 3. Nominations for the officers shall be presented to the Associational Council at its Spring Meeting for approval. These nominees shall then serve as "Officers-Elect" until the Annual Session of the Association, at which time (1) they shall be considered for election by the Association. (2) Any officer may be elected to succeed himself, except the Moderator, who may not serve more than two (2) years in succession. Vacancies occurring between Annual Sessions shall be filled by the Associational Council.

ARTICLE VII. The Associational Council

SECTION 1. The Associational Council shall consist of each Pastor in the Association, the Officers of the Association, the Superintendent of Missions, the immediate Past-Moderator, the representatives of the Denominational agencies, and two (2) lay members from each cooperative church, to be elected by the church. The names of the lay members shall be duly certified by notifying the Associational Clerk.

SECTION 2. The Officers of the Association shall serve as the Officers of the Council.

SECTION 3. The Associational Council shall act for the Association in the interim between Annual Sessions. It shall carry out the policies and will of the Association, and shall make reports to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Associational Council also has the power to fill vacancies among the Officers, the Committees and/or the Executive Committee of the

Association that may occur during the year.

SECTION 4. Twenty (20) members of the Associational Council will constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VIII. Administration

SECTION 1. The Superintendent of Missions shall be charged with the responsibility of the promotion of the whole program of the Association and the denomination. He shall work under the direction of and be subject to the authority of the Associational Council. He shall be nominated by the Executive Committee to The Associational Council, and elected by the Association at any Annual Session, or by The Associational Council if the next Annual Session of the Association is thirty (30) days or more beyond the date on which the Superintendent of Missions is nominated.

ARTICLE IX. Committees

SECTION 1. At a meeting of the Associational Council prior to the annual meeting of the Association, the Moderator shall appoint a committee on committees, consisting of not less than five (5) members, whose duty it shall be to offer nominations to the Association for members and chairmen of all standing committees herein provided except those already named by the Constitution.

SECTION 2. The Association shall have the standing committees listed below, along with other committees authorized by the Association. These committees shall begin their duties at the close of the annual session, and shall make reports of their work to the Planning Committee. Members of the committee shall be selected from the membership of those churches cooperating with the Association and are subject to re-election provided, that in no case, any person shall serve on the same committee longer than three (3) years in succession, with the exception of the Music Committee and the Camp Committee. The Moderator and Superintendent of Missions shall be considered ex officio members of all standing Committees.

ARTICLE X. Annual Report of the Church

Each cooperating church shall send annually to the Association a report on the Associational Letter which is provided. Said reports should reach the Associational Clerk not later than October 15 of that year.

ARTICLE XI. Special Days

The fourth (4th) Sunday of January, of each year shall be designated as "Association Day" in all churches for the purpose of receiving an offering for the Missionary activities of the Association, such as church building lots, facilities for missions, rentals, Superintendent of Missions.

ARTICLE XII. Adoption of Constitution

This Constitution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall supersede any and all constitutions previously adopted.

ARTICLE XIII. Amendment of Constitution

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association provided the amendment has been presented in writing to the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws no later than September 1, and presented to the October meeting of the Associational Council, and read on two successive days of the annual meeting, and receives a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present at the second meeting.

By-Laws

“The Work Of The Association Shall Be Governed By The Following By-Laws.”

ARTICLE I—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. THE MODERATOR shall preside over the annual meeting of the Association and begin each session punctually. He shall appoint such committees as may be authorized by the Constitution, or the Association, enforce the rules, preserve order, and exercise all prerogatives of a presiding officer according to parliamentary usage, and serve as chairman of the Associational Council, and ex officio member of all standing committees.

SECTION 2. THE VICE-MODERATOR shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence and serve as Chairman of the Calendar Committee.

SECTION 3. THE CLERK shall keep the records of the proceedings of the Association, superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes, keep on file the printed minutes and other important papers of the Association and shall serve as Secretary of the Associational Council and the Planning Committee. For his services, the clerk shall be paid an amount to be determined annually by the Association.

SECTION 4. THE TREASURER shall receive, safeguard and disburse all funds of the Association. Disbursements shall be made by the Treasurer in accordance with the Budget adopted by the Association. Non-Budget items should be approved by the Budget-Finance and Planning Committees. The treasurer shall make quarterly reports to the Planning Committee and an Annual Report to the Association. He shall be bonded in such an amount as the Planning Committee shall direct.

SECTION 5. THE HISTORIAN shall collect facts of interest to the Association and the cooperating churches, and shall make a report to each annual meeting of the Association.

SECTION 6. THE SUNDAY SCHOOL DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Sunday School Program in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 7. THE CHURCH TRAINING DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Church Training Programs in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 8. THE MUSIC DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Church Music Program in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 9. THE BROTHERHOOD DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Brotherhood Program in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 10. THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION DIRECTOR shall promote and supervise the Woman's Missionary Union Program in the Association in cooperation with the Planning Committee.

SECTION 11. THE TRUSTEES shall rotate one each year, and as provided by law and action of the Association, hold in trust the title to all property of the Association and shall represent the Association in all matters of legal responsibility regarding the purchase, improvement and disposal of Associational property. They shall have no power to buy, sell, mortgage, lease or transfer any property of the Association without a specific vote of the Association or Associ-

ational Council authorizing such action.

SECTION 12. THE SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS, though not an officer, his duties shall be:

I. GENERAL ASSOCIATIONAL WORK

1. Planning—Co-ordination
 - a. Assist in preparing the associational calendar of activities
 - b. Work closely with associational officers and committees
 - c. Work closely with Pastors' Conference and other associational organizations
 - d. Helping to plan association-wide campaigns and activities (Schools of Missions, Clinics, Enlargement Campaigns, etc.)
2. Dissemination of Information
 - a. Publishing an associational newsletter
 - b. Preparation of Book of Reports for Annual Meeting
 - c. Announcements at various associational meetings
 - d. Keeping up-to-date file in office on associational and denominational causes and activities
3. Promotion
 - a. Associational activities
 - b. Denominational causes and activities
(He should keep well-informed on these as to be able to explain them and answer questions about them)
4. Counseling
Associational Leaders
Pastors
Pulpit Committees
Pastorless churches
5. Administrative (in the office)
Correspondence, file, equipment and supplies, office routine, etc.
6. Give time and attention as needed to work with military-related families through the churches of the association and, in co-operation with the Baptist State Convention.

II. ASSISTANCE TO THE CHURCHES

(Only upon invitation of the pastor, or of responsible Church leaders.)

In the Supt. of Missions, the Association provides a trained worker on call for churches, pastors, and leaders. He should endeavor to keep himself trained and informed.

Pulpit Supply

Training and Teaching (study courses, conferences, clinics, etc.)

Church Community Surveys and Maps

V. B. S. (for pastorless churches or where special need exists)

Other assistance as the need arises

III. ASPECTS OF EMPLOYMENT

1. Responsible to Associational Council
2. Three weeks vacation with pay.
3. Maximum of four weeks of denominational or church-related work outside the Association (Schools of Missions, Church Community Surveys, Revivals, etc.). These to be carefully scheduled so as to avoid interference with his major associational responsibilities.
4. He shall submit a report of his work to the Associational Council at its meetings, and to the Annual Association at its meeting.
5. A notice of thirty days shall be given by the Supt. of Missions or the Association before employment is terminated.

ARTICLE II—COMPOSITION AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES, consisting of not less than five (5) members, shall nominate the members and chairmen of all standing committees herein provided, except those already named by the Constitution. They shall submit these nominations to the Association for election.

SECTION 2. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDER OF BUSINESS, consisting of five (5) members, shall prepare the Program for the Annual Sessions. This suggested program shall be presented to the Association at the beginning of the first Session of the Annual Meeting for action. The Officers of the Association and the President of the Ministers' Conference are Ex Officio members. The Moderator shall serve as Chairman.

SECTION 3. THE COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS shall be composed of three (3) members whose duties shall be to present nominations for the "Officers Elect" to the spring meeting of the Associational Council, and to the Association for all officers authorized herein, or by the Association. They shall present nominations to the Association for the representatives of the various agencies of the State Convention. They shall also present nominations to the Associational Council to fill any vacancy which may occur during the year.

SECTION 4. THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM shall be composed of five (5) members who shall cooperate with the State Chairman of Evangelism in the promotion of approved evangelistic efforts within the Association. It shall encourage evangelism in the churches, especially where the need is apparent, and shall help provide evangelistic services in the unchurched areas within the boundaries of the Association.

SECTION 5. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDINATION shall be composed of three (3) members who shall act in an advisory capacity for churches. The committee shall assist any church which requests its services in the examination of candidates for the Christian ministry. It shall help arrange, where necessary, proper services of ordination. Churches are requested to use this committee to examine candidates only after their call to some specific work. Further, churches are requested to refrain from announcing the date of ordination until after the candidate has received approval by this committee.

SECTION 6. THE COMMITTEE ON PLACE AND PREACHER shall be composed of three (3) members, whose duty it shall be to receive or solicit invitations for the place of meeting of the annual session for the following year, and to recommend to the Association in annual session, a place or places of meeting, along with a preacher and alternate for the sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS shall be composed of three (3) members and shall review all resolutions referred to it by the Association, the Associational Council, or the Planning Committee, and report suitable resolutions at the annual meeting.

SECTION 8. THE COMMITTEE ON BUDGET-FINANCE shall be composed of seven (7) members, one from each of the counties of Lenoir, Greene, and Wayne, and one at large, plus the Moderator, Treasurer and Superintendent of Missions. The Committee shall hear and give consideration to requests of the Planning Committee and other leaders in the Associational work. These requests are to be submitted not later than September 15th of each year.

The duties of the committee are as follows:

- (a) To plan and supervise the making and raising of the Budget.
- (b) To implement the financial program of the Association as directed by the Planning Committee of the Association.
- (c) To have a professional audit made of the Treasurer's books and make a report to the Association in its annual meeting.
- (d) To make a monthly financial report to the Planning Committee.

SECTION 9. THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS shall be composed of five (5) members whose duties it shall be to ascertain the need of new churches within the boundaries of the Association; to recommend to the Planning Committee the location of sites and the purchasing of lots for such churches, and to assist the organization of such churches as might be authorized. Churches contemplating making debts on lots, buildings, improvements and/or asking for Pastor's aid, must have the recommendations of the Missions Committee and approval of Planning Committee, if they expect to apply to the Baptist State Mission Board for aid in paying for the same. It shall be the duty of the Missions Committee to study the applica-

tions of Churches seeking to seat messengers in the Association as to evidence of their faith and order, and their agreement to cooperate in the general program of the Association, the Baptist Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention. The Committee shall then make recommendations to the Planning Committee regarding same.

SECTION 10. THE COMMITTEE ON MUSIC shall be composed of three (3) members who shall cooperate with the Music Department of the State Convention and shall assist in any music program approved by the Association. The Chairman shall also serve as Associational Music Director.

SECTION 11. THE COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN LIFE shall be composed of three (3) members who shall work with local and State Officials in every phase of promoting civic righteousness.

SECTION 12. THE COMMITTEE ON CAMP ACTIVITIES shall be composed of three (3) members. The chairman shall serve as camp director. The duties of the committee shall be to plan and execute the summer camp.

SECTION 13. THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS shall be composed of three (3) members who shall receive all proposed changes thereto and, upon study of this or other observations, making recommendations to the Association on all Constitution and By-Law changes.

SECTION 14. THE COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS, consisting of three (3) members, shall plan for our beloved dead a memorial service to be conducted during the Annual Session of the Association.

ARTICLE III—THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

SECTION 1. The Officers of the Council shall be the Moderator, the Vice-Moderator, and the Clerk of the Association.

SECTION 2. The Association Council shall hold an organizational meeting within sixty (60) days after the Annual Meeting, and shall set up the following subcommittees, and any others deemed necessary for the proper handling of Associational business between the Annual Sessions:

1. THE PLANNING COMMITTEE: This committee shall be composed of the Officers of the Association, the Superintendent of Missions, and the Chairman of the various Standing Committees. This committee shall meet every other month, beginning in November, but omitting July and August, (unless otherwise designated by the committee), and shall handle all matters committed to it by the Associational Council. It shall hear Organizational, Committee, and other reports and plans; design promotional activities, and seek ways and means of forwarding the Lord's work in and through the Association. It shall report all actions to the Associational Council at the next regular meeting, and shall be subject to the approval of the Associational Council. A majority of the Committee shall constitute a quorum. The Superintendent of Missions shall serve as chairman.

(a) THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE: This committee shall be composed of the Officers of the Association, the President of the Ministers' Conference, and the Superintendent of Missions. (It shall be the duty of this Committee to plan and recommend through the PLANNING COMMITTEE to the Annual Session of the Association, a Calendar of Activities for the coming year. The Vice-Moderator shall serve as chairman.)

(b) ANY OR ALL OTHER STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE ASSOCIATION shall function as subcommittees of the Planning Committee.

SECTION 3. The council shall meet every other month (except July and August). The first meeting shall be held withing sixty (60) days after the Annual Meeting. Times and places of these meetings shall be determined by the Council.

SECTION 4. The Council shall submit to the Association in Annual Session a full and complete Budget, Calendar of Activities, and a full and complete report of its work.

ARTICLE IV—RULES OF ORDER

The following rules shall govern deliberations in the meeting of the Association and the Associational Council.

SECTION 1. The official transaction of business in all regular meetings of the Association, the Associational Council, and the Planning Committee shall be by the affirmative majority vote of the members present and voting, except in matters relating to the constitution, the withdrawing of fellowship from any cooperating church, and the seating of messengers from those churches desiring to cooperate with the Association. In called meetings of the Associational Council, a number equal to the majority of the membership of the Associational Council and representing a majority of the cooperating churches shall be necessary to constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. A messenger wishing to speak shall rise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration and shall avoid all personalities. No messenger shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special permission.

SECTION 3. All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer or at his request, read by the clerk before the vote is taken.

SECTION 4. When a question is under consideration, no other motion or proposition shall be received except a motion to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time. When there are several motions, they shall have preference in the order in which they come.

SECTION 5. The general business of the Association shall be recommended by the Committee On Order Of Business at the beginning of the first session of the Annual Meeting of the Association. When adopted this report shall become the order of business for the members and cannot be changed except by the vote of the Association.

SECTION 6. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided by Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE V—ADOPTION OF BY-LAWS

SECTION 1. These by-laws shall take effect immediately upon their adoption, and shall supersede any and all by-laws previously adopted.

SECTION 2. These By-Laws may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association provided the amendment has been presented in writing to the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws no later than September 1, and presented to the October meeting of the Associational Council. Passage shall be by majority vote of the messengers present and voting.

Proceedings

1975

First Session

MONDAY EVENING

1. The 46th Annual Session of the Neuse Baptist Association was called to order at 7 p.m., October 27, 1975, at Neuse Baptist Church, by the Moderator, Rev. R. Lacy Oliver.

2. Rev. John Thompson, Jr., Associational Music Director, led the group in singing the hymn, "Love Lifted Me". The pianist for the evening was Mr. Bennie Enzor.

3. Rev. Huber Dixon, Pastor of Kennedy Home Baptist Church, read the Scripture, I Corinthians: 13, and led in prayer.

4. The "Pastors Chorus", led by John Thompson gave a fine rendition of "He Keeps Me Singing".

5. Rev. David Cox, Pastor of the host church, welcomed everyone to the "newest" church in Neuse Association. He extended an invitation to all to remain for refreshments at the close of the Session.

BUSINESS SESSION:

6. Rev. Oliver, as Chairman of the Program Committee, said that except for a few minor changes the Program would be followed as printed. A motion was made to accept the Program with those changes that become necessary. Motion seconded, and carried.

7. Eugene, Hager, Director of Missions, introduced the nine new pastors who have come to the Neuse Association since last year's Annual Meeting. He also recognized all visitors from outside the Association at this time.

8. A report on registration, as of 7:10 p.m. was given by the Clerk at this time. The final tally for the evening was: 28 churches represented by 21 Pastors, 98 Messengers, and 81 Visitors, a total of 200 present.

9. Rev. Frank Bowers, Vice-Moderator, had copies of the 1976 Associational Calendar of Activities distributed to each person present. Mr. Bowers made a motion the calendar be adopted, with the provision that should any member find the need for corrections or additions they could notify either himself or Mr. Hager. the motion to adopt the calendar was seconded and carried.

10. A summary of Associational Council Meetings was read by Mrs. R. S. Ault, Clerk. A motion was made to accept the report, seconded and carried.

11. A this time John Thompson led everyone in singing, "Standing on the Promises."

REPORTS:

12. Mr. M. A. Shaver, Associational Representative for the "Biblical Recorder", related a bit of "Recorder" history when he informed us that the "Recorder" was first published in 1833. This makes it three years younger than the Southern Baptist Convention, and one year older than Wake Forest College (now Wake Forest University). Mr. Shaver said he would like to see, in the next six months, the few remaining churches in Neuse Association who do not have the "Recorder" included in the Budget, do so. For five cents per week, per family, he is convinced that there is no better bargain to be had anywhere.

13. Rev. M. O. Sears, Chairman of the Evangelism Committee, first of all extended an invitation to all present to attend the Second Session of the Annual Meeting at Adamsville Baptist Church the following night. Turning to his report, Mr. Sears said that the first work of the Christian should be evangelization, or to put it another way, sould winning. Special attention was called to three dates in 1976: Simultaneous Revival for Neuse Association March 28-April 4; Statewide Evangelism Conference, at Ashville, February 2-4; and Neuse Association's Seminar on Evangelism, to be held at Kennedy Home Baptist Church, February 24th. Mr. Sears also encouraged all the Pastors to make use of the 1976 "plan book" sent to all the preachers from the Convention.

14. Rev. Eugene B. Hager, Director of Missions, expressed his appreciation, and that of his family, for the "Tenth Anniversary Dinner" given in his honor, and held at Kennedy Home, July 7th. With much interest, the group listened to the details of how John Leland, of Virginia, and Isaac Backus, of Massachusetts, got the First Amendment added to the Constitution.

Mr. Hager reminded those present that not all the reports included in the "Book of Reports", would be heard at this year's sessions, and, therefore, urged that all be read in order to get a more complete understanding of the year's activities.

15. Under the direction of John Thompson, the Kennedy Home Choir of 7th, 8th, and 9th graders, presented a varied program of music. They sang, "How Long Has It Been", "Alleluja" and "Let There Be Peace On Earth".

DENOMINATIONAL FEATURE:

16. Calvin Knight, Director of Denominational Relations, at Baptist Hospital, was somewhat surprised, because of the distance, to learn, by a show of hands, how many present had

either been a patient or had a member of their family as a patient in North Carolina Baptist Hospital, located in Winston-Salem. Mr. Knight told of several cases where the Hospital was able to put into practice its many aspects of service: accepting those people who require specialized care; attempting to minister to the spiritual, as well as, the physical needs of each patient; and to, fulfill the desire to help a person whether he has any personal financial resources or not. Everyone was reminded that the annual "Mother's Day" Offering goes to make possible, treatment for those who cannot meet the cost of treatment themselves. For himself and on behalf of all those who would not have otherwise been helped, Mr. Knight expressed gratitude to all who have shown their love and concern by giving to the special offering year after year.

17. Ralph Cannon, Trustee for Homes for the Aging, lamented the fact that North Carolina, with its 1,000,000 Baptists, accommodate only 230 aged, while Virginia, with 350,000 Baptists are caring for 500 residents. He told of the waiting lists, which grow everyday. He did want all to know how much the special offering taken in February each year, is appreciated. We were told of the plans to build a sixth Home in Ashville. A sincere request for prayer concerning this building program was asked.

Earlier, Mr. Cannon had asked for a show of hands to see how many present had ever visited in one of the Baptist Homes for the Aging. Now he extended an invitation to the others who would find it convenient or desirable to visit any of the Homes at any time.

18. Horace Hawes, Director of Social Services, at Kennedy Home, told the group that everyone connected with the work was trying in every way to meet the needs of all those in need of Baptist Children's Home facilities, but there is a waiting list for every one of the Children's Homes in the State. He reviewed the different types of accommodations and programs available. He let the folks know a few of the expenses for a one month period and only for Kennedy Home. For instance, at present, it costs \$300.00 per month per child. We were told that often the children who come are victims of the "Drug Culture", have been abused by their parents, as well as, others, and are extremely angry; at their family, the law, Kennedy Home, themselves, and God. These are but a few of the variety of the problems that have to be dealt with while providing all the necessary needs from day to day.

Mr. Hawes suggested the use of the film, "The Mountain Within", in churches and groups who may not have seen it. He requested our continued prayer and concern for the work of the Agency and urged the expression of our love through the "Thanksgiving Offering" each year. Everyone was invited to visit Kennedy Home, but was reminded that it IS A HOME, and has a schedule to maintain, so to please call first. In closing he let it be known that should anyone present be interested in the Foster Home Program, he would be delighted to talk with them after the close of this evening's Session.

19. Robert Mullinax, Secretary of Christian Higher Education for Baptist State Convention, was pleased to learn, by a show of hands, how many present had attended a Baptist College and a second show of hands that told who had a son or daughter presently enrolled in a Baptist College. He expressed his pride and pleasure at being a Baptist. We were told that there is taught on each campus, having both a Biblical and theological foundation, the creation, fall and redemption of man. That there is a constant desire and striving to share and preserve the truth, in the Name of Him Who is Truth. Mr. Mullinax expressed his thanks for the support of the colleges shown through the "Father's Day Offering" each June and solicited the help of all present to encourage their own, as well as, other Baptist youth to attend one of our Baptist Colleges.

20. A brief question and answer period followed, during which members of the audience obtained additional information from the agency representatives.

21. A few announcements of general interest were made.

22. In the absence of Rev. Wellmon, the Moderator asked Rev. Clyde Baucom, Interim Pastor at Falling Creek Baptist Church, to pronounce the Benediction, bringing to a close the First Session of the 46th Neuse Baptist Annual Meeting.

Second Session

TUESDAY EVENING

23. The second session of the 46th Annual Meeting of the Neuse Baptist Association was held at Adamsville Baptist Church, October 28, 1975, at 7 p.m., Rev. R. Lacy Oliver, Moderator presiding.

24. John Thompson was invited, by the Moderator, to lead the group in singing, "Love Lifted Me". Mr. David Periconi, Organist at Madison Avenue Baptist Church, was playing the organ for this evening's session.

25. Rev. Jimmy O'Tuel, Pastor of Spilman Memorial Baptist Church, read a portion of the 6th Chapter of Ephesians, beginning with the 10th verse, then he led in prayer.

26. For this Session the "Pastor's Chorus" sang, "Blessed Assurance", under the direction of John Thompson.

27. The host Pastor, Rev. M. O. Sears, after a few words of welcome, said the Young People of the church had made all the arrangements for "surprise" refreshments to be served at the close of tonight's Session. Mr. Sears expressed the hope that everyone would remain and enjoy them.

REPORTS:

28. A report on Registration, as of 7:20 p.m., was given by the Clerk at this time. The final count of the second session was 29 churches represented by 20 Pastors, 104 Messengers, and 108 Visitors.

29. Rev. Harold Harris, Pastor of Rosewood Baptist Church, and acting Associational Sunday School Director, until elected, said that the heart beat of a church's life depends on the health of the Sunday School Program. Mr. Harris brought to the attention of those assembled a few important plans for 1976; 1. Pastor-Sunday School Director's Planning Work Shop; 2. "People Search" for the summer of 1976; 3. Sunday School Preparation Week.

Everyone was also reminded of "High Attendance Sunday" on November 2nd. For the benefit of those who had not gotten a copy of the flier, Mr. Harris informed the group of the Sunday School Conferences to be held in and around the Neuse Association in November.

30. Rev. Richard Poindexter, Associational Vacation Bible School Director, said he was very pleased with the attendance at the 1975 V. B. S. Clinic and hoped the one to be held April 8, 1976, will find even more folks present. He praised the churches who had a School this past year and challenged every church in the Association to have a V. B. S. in 1976.

31. Rev. Andrew Moon, acting Church Training Director for the Association, until elected, said, because he stepped into this job so late in the year, he had no report on the year's activity just past, but he would have some announcements about Church Training Activities later.

32. Mrs. Nora Jean Hill, Associational W. M. U. Director, asked pastors to announce the observance of Women's World Day of Prayer to be held at Adamsville Baptist Church, November 3rd at 7:30 p.m. Mrs. Hill expressed the belief that all W. M. U. activities have planted seeds of faith resulting in strong and expanded missions work. She urged the leaders of each church to continue to emphasize and promote the mission offerings and to make an effort to interest every age group in desiring to add to their knowledge of missions and mission work carried on by Southern Baptist.

33. Mr. H. E. Nickens, Associational Brotherhood Director, reviewed the Associational work and activities of the Royal Ambassadors and Brotherhood for the year just ended. He said that by far the highlight of the year was the Associational Men and Boys Week-end Retreat at Camp Eagle's Nest, August 8 & 9, with an attendance of 90. At this time Mr. Nickens introduced Mr. C. V. Bailes as Brotherhood Director elect and Mr. Al Percy, who will be Associational Royal Ambassador Leader for the year 1975-76.

34. At this time John Thompson led everyone in singing, "Nothing But the Blood".

35. Mr. Rowland Pruette, Representative of Chowan College, thanked the Moderator for a chance to speak. He said he extended greetings on behalf of all seven Baptist Colleges, but most especially from one of the two Baptist Junior Colleges in the State (Wingate being the other). As Mr. Mullinax did the night before, Mr. Pruette voiced the hope that Baptist young people would be encouraged to attend Baptist Colleges.

36. The film, "Rope of Sand" was shown at this time. The film explains the development of the Cooperative Program and shows some of the ministries around the world supported by it.

37. Mrs. R. S. Ault, Associational Clerk, read the names of "Our Beloved Dead", Dr. John H. Bunn, Chairman of the Memorials Committee, recited the poem he wrote, "Living Dead", Rev. Forrest T. Jones, spoke of the strength available from the Lord if we will depend on Him and believe He will supply us with the strength needed at all times. He closed this period with prayer asking that the Christian will always exhibit the kind of faith and understanding that would sow seeds which would last through eternity.

BUSINESS SESSION:

38. In the absence of the Chairman, Rev. Tom Waits presented the Budget-Finance Committee report. After calling attention to the items where changes were made from last year, Mr. Waits made a motion for the Budget to be adopted, motion seconded, carried.

39. Rev. Frank Bowers, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the slate of officers as printed in the Book of Reports, plus Rev. Eugene L. Roberts, as Associational Publicity Consultant, and made a motion they be elected, the motion was seconded. There being no other nominations, a motion was made to elect them by acclamation, seconded and carried.

40. Rev. Tom Waits, Chairman of the Committee on Committees, presented the following to serve on the Committee on Memorials: Rev. Huber Dixon, Chairman, Rev. Forrest T. Jones, and Mrs. Bruce Boyers; and the Committee on Senior Citizens: Mrs. Catherine Ham, Chairman, Mr. Walter Murray, Mr. Gus Williford, Mrs. Carolyn Strickland, and Mrs. Esther Walters. These to be added to the Committee's report as printed in the Book of Reports. Mr. Waits made a motion the Committee's recommendations be accepted, seconded, carried.

41. Mr. H. E. Nickens, Chairman of Place and Preacher Committee, said the first session of the Annual Meeting for 1976 will be held at Deep Run Baptist Church and the second session at Pineview Baptist Church. The preacher for the annual sermon is to be Rev. Ray Hodge, Pastor of First Baptist Church, Kinston. Mr. Nickens moved the report be accepted, seconded, carried.

42. John Thompson led the group in singing the hymn, "There is a Name I Love to Hear".

43. In the absence of Johnny Sasser, Rev. Tom Waits read the Scripture, Matthew 16 beginning with the 12th verse.

44. Mrs. Eugene Hager, Director of the Adamsville Baptist Church Choir, thanked Mr. Periconi for "filling in" at the organ, introduced Miss Lynn Phipps at the piano and Doug Tart, trumpeter. The choir and instrumentalist presented two numbers, "Untold Millions" and "The King is Coming".

45. The Pastor of Love Memorial Baptist Church, Rev. Frank Bowers, brought the Annual Sermon. He stated that while he felt good to be a part of Christ's Gospel, he wasn't sure the thing to do was let everyone go home "feeling good" about what Southern Baptists are doing. Rather with renewed spirits we should become more determined to do more. There is a need for Southern Baptist to work to bring to reality the Hope, the Vision, that has been God's Plan since creation. We need a great dream that we can, with God's help, make "real".

From the beginning the Law did not work. There was no reconciliation, the people were still separated from God, because it was impossible for them to live up to the Law.

God's Love for the world made it possible to send His Son knowing all the while what would happen. It is man's inability not to sin which made Jesus' Sacrifice necessary.

Yes, God loved the world, but He wanted to be loved by the people. Christ's Dream inabled all who would believe to become the "Body of Christ".

This was to mean that whether He was present with them in the flesh, or not, all believers in Him would be able to draw strength from Him and be able to witness for Him and live in a manner pleasing to Him. Furthermore, His Followers are assured that no evil on Earth will be able to destroy the work done in His Honor and for His Glory.

As Christians we need to grasp this dream, this foolish, impossible dream—to man's way of thinking, but, always a workable plan and reasonable according to the Wisdom of God.

His Kingdom can come "on earth as it is in heaven", as soon as Christians cease to pray, "Thy Will be done", and mean that it be done by someone else. Each one of us needs to become disciples every hour of every day, seven days of each week. No longer is a simple tithe of time, talent and money enough. "What if Jesus had only given the world a tithe?", Mr. Boweres asked.

Christ intrusted His Dream to all who would believe on Him, abide by His Teachings and do His Will. It is going to happen with or without our help. But any Christian who wants to be a part of Christ's Body and help bring this "impossible dream" to fruition, must forget and put aside all his narrow way of thinking, his prejudice, and blind ideas.

In other words, if the "world" sees that Christians themselves cannot agree and work TOGETHER as one "Body of Christ", how can the lost ever accept Jesus for what He is, the Savior of ALL people.

Until the Christlike love, concern and interest is exhibited by each Christian to his neighbor and any person in need with whom he comes in contact, the meaning to God's Love for the World will never be received by the lost and dying around us.

With the quoting of John 3:16a Mr. Bowers ended his message.

46. Rev. Floyd Enzor, Chairman, read the Report of the Resolutions Committee and made a motion it be accepted, motion seconded, carried.

47. The Moderator announced the members of the Committee on Committees would remain the same for the coming year.

48. Mr. Oliver asked all the officers elected to serve the Association for the year 1975-76 come forward.

49. A prayer of guidance for the Associational Officers, as well as, a Benediction was offered by Rev. Billy Joe Sloop, Pastor of Seven Springs Baptist Church, bringing to a close the 46th Annual Meeting of the Neuse Baptist Association.

Reports

ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL MEETINGS FOR 1974-75

The first of five Council Meetings was held Dec. 2, 1974, at Adamsville Baptist Church. The following matters were considered: (1) Reports of Organizations and Committees. (2) Frank Bowers, Chairman, brought the Nominating Committee's recommendation of Eugene L. Roberts, as Associational Publicity Consultant. This was accepted. (3) Lonnie Parker, Associational Trustee, read the duties of the trustees from the Association By-Laws (Article I, Section II). He then explained that originally Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Wooten donated property to Neuse Baptist Association for the specific purpose as a building site for Neuse Baptist Chapel. Since Neuse Chapel was about to be constituted into a church, Mr. Parker moved that the property be deeded to Neuse Chapel. The motion was carried.

The second Council Meeting was held February 10, 1975, at New Hope Baptist Church. The items of business were: (1) Organizational and Committee reports. (2) Frank Bowers, Chairman, of the Nominating Committee, moved that Rev. Harold Harris, be nominated Associational Sunday School Director. Motion was carried.

The third Council Meeting was held at Madison Avenue Baptist Church, on April 7, 1975. The matters considered at this time were: (1) Organizational and Committees Reports. (2) After an explanation by Eugene Hager, Director of Missions, of the preparation and purpose of a World Mission Conference, a motion was passed that Neuse Baptist Association hold such a Conference, March 20-27, 1977.

The fourth Council Meeting was on June 2, 1975, at Snow Hill Baptist Church. The following matters were considered: (1) Rev. Tom Waits, Chairman of the Committee on Committees, presented recommendations for replacements on three committees of several members no longer in the Association: BUDGET-FINANCE COMMITTEE—Rev. Earl D. Farthing—Chairman (Replacing David Leary), Rev. Bill Gay (taking Rev. Farthing's place as the Committee's representative from Wayne County); MISSIONS COMMITTEE—Rev. David Cox (Replacing David Leary); RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE—Rev. Harold Harris (Replacing Murray Craft). Mr. Waits made a motion that the Committee's recommendations be accepted. The motion carried. (2) In the absence of the Chairman, Rev. Waits presented the Nominating Committee's recommendations for Associational Officers to serve from November, 1975, through October, 1976, as follows:

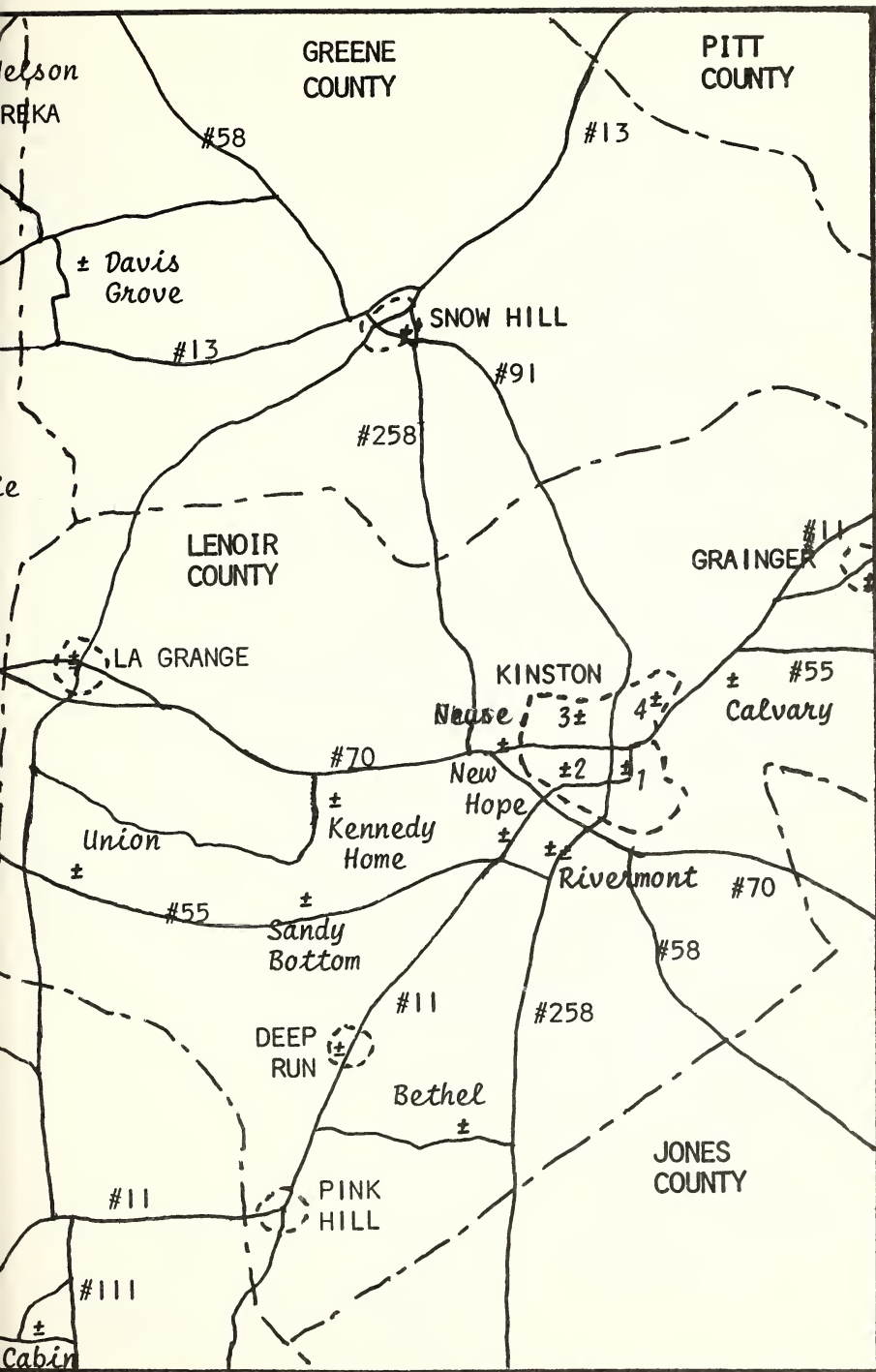

EVANGELISM REPORT

Our Saviour's marching orders are "make disciples", "baptize them", "teach them to obey". Evangelism is the exciting ministry that seeks to carry out these orders.

Every church in the State is urged to plan a simultaneous revival during the Spring of 1976. The date for the Neuse Association is March 28-April 4. We hope all 33 churches will participate. A proclamation '76 planning calendar booklet will be mailed to every church from the State Evangelism Office.

The continuing response of youth and adults to Lay Evangelism schools has been significant. During the past 3 1/2 years, 12,774 persons have shared in this training from 1,007 churches. Two churches in the Neuse Association are planning a Lay Evangelism School this year. Perhaps there are others who would like to participate.

"Be reconciled to God and Man" was the theme of the 29th Statewide Evangelism Conference at War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, February 3-5, 1975. Over 2,400 pastors and lay persons attended. The 30th Statewide Evangelism Conference will be held at the Civic Center Auditorium, Asheville, during Feb. 2-4, 1976.

The Neuse Baptist Association held its first Seminar on Evangelism at Kennedy Home, Feb. 25, 1975. This seminar was so well received that we plan another in 1976 of the same type. The date is February 24.

An interesting review of baptisms and other additions in 1974 is as follows: 33 churches reported 346 baptisms and 440 other additions. This is a baptism ratio of 1 to 24 resident members. It is also interesting to note that 5 of the 33 churches reported 1/2 of the total baptisms with a ratio of 1 to 13. Of course, the important thing is for each church to win as many souls to Christ each year as it possibly can. This year (1975) there were 357 baptisms reported from the 33 churches. From the same churches 376 other additions were reported.

Let us urge every church to initiate an aggressive, evangelistic effort, and every individual to be a faithful witness for Christ during 1976.
