# PROCEEDINGS.

Burlington, N. C., Aug. 2, 1916.

The High Point Educational and Missionary, Baptist Association convened in its 27th Annual Session with Mt. Pisgah Baptist Church, near Burlington, N. C., August 2 to 6, 1916, at 1:00 o'clock p. m. The Moderator, Rev. J. E. Boykin, called the Association to order for the dispatch of business.

Praise service was conducted by Bros. S. Troxler and W. M. Gregory. Hymn No. 196 was sung. A Scripture lesson was read by Father Troxler from Prov. 8th chapter. Prayer was offered by Rev. V. L. McLean. Hymn No. 296 was sung.

After some preliminary remarks by the Moderator, the 27th annual session of the Association was declared open for business.

According to a prearranged program the first was to hear expressions from the field. Many of the brethren gave expressions, among whom were:

Rev. A. S. Croom, gave as a basis for his expression, 1st Cor. 13th chap.,

"Though I speak with the tongue of men and angels, and have not charity it profiteth me nothing." Rev. Croom put great stress on real Christian love, which should permeate every Christian's heart and life.

Having caught inspiration from the opening talk by Rev. Croom, the following brothers responded, with great zeal: Y. S. Turner, Father Troxler, H. M. Gregory, Deacon R. T. Jennings, Dr. Washington, S. P. Warren, Rev. E. D. Groves, L. L. Traynham and others.

The Moderator having observed the time closed this part of the program and adjourned with benediction by Rev. S. Troxler.

#### WEDNESDAY EVENING SESSION.

At 3:20 p.m. the Association reassembled. Praise service was conducted by Rev. S. Troxler and Y. S. Turner. Hymn No. 5 was sung: "A charge to keep I have," etc. Father Troxler used as a Scripture lesson: Romans 7th chapter, and offered prayer. Hymn No. 145 was lined by Bro. Y. S. Turner and sung with fervor by the audience.

Rev. J. M. Trolinger formerly of the Christian Church, but now of the Baptist Church, was introduced, and gave expression.

Bro. Rufus Thomas paid 50c to the Association for privilege, as he was not a delegate.

The Association adjourned with benediction by Rev. Y. S. Turner.

#### WEDNESDAY EVENING SESSION.

At 8:00 p. m. the Association assembled. Praise service was had. The address of welcome by Rev. S. P. Warren was responded to by Bros. J. B. Martin, S. S. Supt. of Mt. Pisgah Church, and F. Dilworth, S. S. Missionary, on the part of the Woman's Auxiliary by Mrs. Polly Jefries. Response by Mrs. M. E. Crews. These spelndid addresses were very inspiring.

At 8:45 p. m. the Moderator presented Rev. G. H. E. Washington to preach the introductory sermon, assisted with Rev. A. S. Croom. Dr. Crews lined hymn No. 58. After singing this hymn with great earnestness, Rev. Croom read for a Scripture lesson 12th chapter Jeremiah. Rev. G. W. Coats led in fervent prayer. Hymn No. 105 was sung, after which Dr. Washington chose for a text Psalm 55:18, "Restore unto me the joy of thy salvation." Rev. Washington was at his best and preached a soul winning sermon.

Prayer was offered by Bro. John Hargraves.

Rev. Croom commented at length on the most excellent sermon preached by Dr. Washington.

Bros. Jennings and Thacker called for an offering. The amount contributed was \$3.03.

Benediction by Rev. McLean.

#### THURSDAY MORNING SESSION.

At 9:30 a.m. the Association assembled. Praise service was conducted by Rev. J. L. McMullin and A. R. Landingham. Hymn No. 543 was sung. A. R. Landingham read for a Scripture lesson the 61st Psalm and led in prayer. Hymn No. 228 was sung and prayer was offered by Rev. Gregory. Time being observed the Moderator occupied the chair and proceeded to business.

The minutes of the first day's session was read and approved.

The following visitors were present and made some timely remarks: Bro. Joseph Brown from Cedar Grove Association.

The topic for this hour was: "The best methods for raising church funds," by Prof. Folkner, F. A. Long and Thomas Clark. Prof. Folkner's paper on this topic gave much light on the subject.

The time being observed the Moderator asked Rev. Woods to ascend the rostrum. Rev. Woods was assigned to preach the missionary sermon. Bro. L. L. Traynham was selected as alternate and lined hymn No. 559. Rev. Wood read for a Scripture lesson the 104th chapter of the Psalms. Prayer was offered by Bro. Traynham. Hymn No. 231 was sung.

The Moderator presented Rev. Wood who took for a text Math. 28:19, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel," etc. Bro. Wood's sermon was a splendid portrayal of true discipleship.

We feel that we voice the sentiment of the Association in bidding Bro. Woods God's speed.

Rev. Broox made some splendid comments on Bro. Woods' very excellent sermon.

An offering was taken by Eros. Clark and Summers. Amount \$4.30.

Adjourned.

Note.—During the session Rev. Coats preached to a large audience under the arbor erected in front of the church for the purpose of entertaining the great crowds that could not get room in the church. Rev. Coats preached from the Revelations. The offering was \$3.02.

#### THURSDAY EVENING SESSION.

At 3:30 p. m. the Association assembled. Praise service was conducted by Bros. E. D. Graves and L. S. Troxler. Hymn No. 375 was sung. Father Troxler read for a Scripture lesson Heb. 13th chapter. Bro. Graves offered prayer. Bro. Gregory lined hymn No. 99.

The Moderator pronounced the evening session open.

Delegates A. F. Brow and S. P. Picken asked leave of absence to return home. The same was granted.

Bros. S. B. Thomas and Rev. S. G. Walker were introduced to the Association and accorded a welcome to the sessions by a rising vote. Both of the Brothers spoke in the interest of Thomas Memorials.

Rev. Croom, after some remarks favorable to the book, offered a motion to suspend the business of the session 10 minutes to give the delegation and the public a chance to purchase a copy of the book. Many copies were distributed.

At the expiration of 10 minutes the Moderator called Vice Moderator Ellis to take the chair and proceeded to deliver the most excellent annual address in the history of the High Point Association.

Dr. Washington and Dr. Croom made some soul stirring comments on this very excellent address.

Rev. Croom motioned a hearty adoption of the address, and that the same be referred to the proper committee. Motion prevailed. See Address.

Rev. Ellis, as Vice Moderator, made only a verbal report having prepared no written report, as is a long standing rule and custom.

- R. E. Catus, recording secretary, made report. See Report. On motion by Bro. Washington the report was adopted.
- Rev. S. G. Gilmer, corresponding secretary, made report. See Report. The report was approved.
- R. T. Jennings, Treasurer, made report. See Report. The same was adopted by a motion by Rev. A. S. Croom.
- L. S. Troxler, Superannuated Treasurer, made report. Report was adopted. See Report.
- Rev. T. D. Ware, Church Missionary, made report. The same by motion was adopted. See Report.
- Rev. V. L. McLean, Chairman of Ministers' and Deacons' Union, made report. Same was adopted. See Report.

Bro. McLean in concluding his report tendered his resignation to the Association as Moderator of the Ministers' and Deacons' Union. Resignation not accepted at the time.

Rev. Washington, Chairman Committee on Education, made report.

Bro. H. H. Folkner offered an amendment to the report of Committee on Education. The amendment was adopted. See Amendment.

During this session Rev. L. L. Traynham held preaching service under the arbor. The offering was 25c. Benediction by Rev. S. Troxler.

#### THURSDAY NIGHT SESSION.

At 8:30 p. m. the Association assembled and praise service was conducted by Bro. John Thompson and Deacon R. T. Jennings. Hymn No. 417 was sung. Scripture lesson read by Bro. Thompson, 15th chapter 1st Epistles of John. Prayer was offered by Brother Thompson.

The Moderator observing the time presented Rev. A. S. Croom to preach the doctrinal sermon, alternated by Rev. G. H. E. Washington. Dr. Washington lined hymn No. 99. Dr. Croom read for a Scripture lesson 5th chapter 1st Epistles of John. Rev. Coats led in fervent prayer. Rev. Washington lined hymn No. 449 which was sung by the congregation. After some preliminary remarks appertaining to the subject of his discourse Dr. Croom used as a text John 10:28. Dr. Croom seemed to have been inspired by the Holy Spirit as he advanced into the subject, for truly our hearts burned within us as he opened the mysteries of God's Word. Long live Dr. Croom to preach God's Word. Dr. Washington led in fervent prayer and spoke in very commendable terms of Dr. Croom's very excellent and able sermon.

Bros. Tom Welborn and P. Taylor took the offering. The Moderator asked every one to contribute to the honor roll.

Hairston was at his best and preached an excellent sermon. Rev. S. Troxler led in fervent prayer. Dr. Washington made some splendid comment on the very excellent sermon.

Rev. Croom and Rev. Ellis took the offering. Amount \$8.27. Adjourned with benediction.

Mrs. Washington responded to Bro. Young's paper in a most excellent manner. This paper and the very excellent responses were greatly enjoyed by all who were so fortunate as to be present. Rev. Croom commented at length on Mrs. Washington's very excellent paper.

The Association by motion gave a rising vote of thanks to Mrs. Washington and Bro. Young for their splendid work in getting out and delivering such excellent papers.

The hour having arrived for preaching, the Moderator presented Rev. J. B. Ellis to preach the temperance sermon and Rev. J. H. McCroom alternate. Rev. Ellis read as a Scripture lesson, Prov. 4th chapter. Prayer was offered by Rev. C. M. Hughes. After a selection of music Rev. Ellis used as a text: Daniel 1:8. Subject, "A prepared heart." This was a splendid discourse and full of practical thoughts.

The Moderator stated that the ninth session of the Association was opened. The minutes of Friday's sessions was read and adopted.

A motion by Bro. Charles R. Young that the papers by Mrs. P. E. Taylor and Mrs. Washington on the work of the Women's Auxiliary be printed in the minutes of the Association. Motion prevailed.

Rev. U. A. Broox, associated by Rev. V. L. McLean, ascended the rostrum, after singing a hymn of praise, read for a Scripture lesson, Romans 1st chapter. Rev. Broox chose for a text, Romans 1:16. Subject: "The true ministry." Bro. Broox preached an excellent sermon. Rev. J. B. Ellis gave some timely comments on the sermon by Bro. Broox.

Rev. T. D. Ware offered a resolution disclosing some immoral conduct by

A. R. Landingham. The resolution was adopted. See Resolutions.

The Association at this juncture gave way for the officers of the Woman's Auxiliary, viz.: Mrs. P. A. Taylor, President, and Mrs. Nannie G. Washington, Secretary, to organize local auxiliaries in Mt. Pisgah and Martin's Chapel Churches. The President and Secretary succeeded in perfecting and organizing auxiliaries in both of these churches. This session adjourned about 3:00 p. m. Shortly after adjournment our Moderator, Rev. J. E. Boykin, was called by wire to the bedside of his mother, at Clinton, N. C. He arrived at her bedside and found her very sick. She lived only a few days after his arrival and passed into the spirit land. As a Christian body, and he being our executive head, we extend to him our heartfelt sympathy and share with him in regret on the loss of a dear mother.

#### SUNDAY MORNING SESSION.

At 11:00 a. m. Sunday School was conducted by Supt. J. B. Martin and R. E. Catus. We had a splendid Sunday school with over 50 young people in attendance. The combined classes were instructed by R. E. Catus. All seemed to enjoy the lesson. Rev. S. G. Gilmer addressed the school. Collection \$1.50. Turned over to the Sunday school.

We emerged out of this service right in to the preaching service.

The Moderator being called away on Saturday by wire the memorial service usually held was dispensed with.

Revs. Gilmer and McLean preached. Rev. Gilmer read a Scripture lesson and Bro. McLean offered prayer. Bro. Gilmer took for a text, Matt. 24:42. After a magnificent display of God's Word by these brethren Bro. Willis Wilson offered a fervent prayer.

Bro. Charles R. Young offered a resolution of thanks to the hospitable people of the community.

A collection was called and response made to the amount of \$6.25. Half of this collection was given to the local church that entertained the Association, the other half to the ministers.

Then came the parting hymn, "God be with you till we meet again," and the parting handshake, during which many melted down in tears, thus ending the most harmonious and profitable sittings in the history of the Association.

#### MODERATOR'S ADDRESS.

Fellow Ministers, Delegates and Visitors:

This being the twenty-seventh annual session and my fourth year as your presiding officer of this great High Point Educational Missionary Baptist Association, it so fills my heart with joyful thanksgiving to God for having spared us to assemble at this place.

It seems almost incredible that a year of our history has been erased from life's allotment since we met at Liberty Grove in our last session. We

are living in a rapid and progressive age. More events are being crowded into limited space than there ever was before in the world's history. The result is that the days ripen into months and the months blossom into years ere we realize that time has rolled its ceaseless course. Yet God has so arranged time that we make proper use of every moment. Yet when we consider the progress made during the past years, we ought to be thankful.

In reviewing the work of the past four years I find it is no easy task to maintain the high standard of excellency already established, but I realize that continued activity is essential to attain the greatest efficiency in any vocation. We all agree that we are doing well and yet admit we can do better; but to do more the time now demands that we must get close together to accomplish better results. We as pastors and officers of our churches ought to unite in planning and acting, and let us contribute freely of our intelligence and thought when it will not be difficult for us to move on and continue to make progress.

Ability generally shows itself, and the usual sign of success is shown in continued progress.

We affirm our belief in the continued progress we are making and declare our faith in a brighter future and a better day intellectually and otherwise.

We want the spirit of Christ to continue among us in all our deliberations. Let us avoid personalities, and consider that there is not a delegate sent here so unimportant that he is not to be given a chance along with the others to discuss and express himself on all matters.

Our young preachers too shall have a better chance from year to year to exercise themselves in their work. Even up to now an honest examination on these little points, each brother will find that we have been doing just all that could be done to do justice to all concerned.

We fully understand that the preacher is a class that has known sorrows, but is a class of hallowed and heroic memories. No class of people in any age has done more to mould, shape sentiments and turn men in the right channel than the preacher. And I want to say to you fellow preachers, let us strive to keep the standard up by carefully preparing ourselves to do the work that we are expected to do.

Never try to pull another down in order to get up yourself. If you have been called of God follow him, and prepared to do God's service then in due time and at the right place God will open a way for you. You can rest assured that a large percentage of preachers roosting on the top rungs of the ladder of fame deserve their perch.

I shall present to you in brief the deliberations of my office.

Every institution and business person, in order to be successful must of necessity keep in touch with their constituents in order to know their conditions and needs. It is not expected for me to visit annually all the churches that make up this Association, but it is necessary for me to keep in touch with the large majority of them by means of correspondence and inquiries. I did, however, have the pleasure of visiting Locus Grove, Liberty Grove, Calvary, White Oak Grove, East Market St., McLeansburg and New Light, during the year, and I must say these churches gave me a hearty reception. I found them and their respective pastors getting on nicely. From what I have learned by observation and otherwise I can report to you that our As-

sociation with very few exceptions is in a flourishing condition.

The relation existing between the churches and the Association seems gratifying.

Most of the churches are supplied with pastors and only a few of them are in debt.

During the year my attention was called to unpleasant conditions existing in Militia Grove Church, and I submitted the case to the Missionary, Rev. Ware, for his consideration and by his visit there I think great good was accomplished. Also White Oak Grove and their pastor, Rev. D. Thacker, severed connection during the year and Rev. T. D. Ware acting in his capacity as Missionary rendered helpful assistance to the church. A full account of his work there will doubtless be given in his Missionary report. This is enough said to suggest Rev. Ware to be a man of enduring principles, intelligent and a faithful worker.

The other Missionary, Rev. G. W. Austin, was to the extreme end and as the churches were divided betwee nthe two Missionaries it kept us apart during the year, but their reports will give a full account of what they did during the year.

I will conclude my address with the following recommendations:

1. The Auxiliary. We recommend a hearty support of all churches and pastors to the Woman's Auxiliary in the local church and in their annual meetings.

We favor the work of our women being fostered until every church and pastor in our Association will be in accord with the work.

- 2. Education. Among us as Baptist, ducation is neglected as a whole and individually. I shall not recommend the establishment of a school, because we are not able to support one, but I do ask that the ministers encourage education everywhere. We have schools of our denomination and to them our boys and girls ought to go when they leave the public schools, so they can be trained in religious nurture. Our churches can not meet the demand of religious training in the church alone. Other denominations make special efforts to have the children of their members trained in their schools; and if we keep the standard and advancement made thus far by us in religious pedagogy we mus tnot be slack along these lines. Let us ministers urge the members of our churches to educate their children in our Baptist institutions.
- 3. The Union Meeting has been neglected for lack of patronage, so I recommend, that we take it under consideration at this session and see what can be done about it.
- 4. The Sunday School Convention is making progress and I am asking every church to represent its school and B. Y. P. U. in the Convention next year.
- . 5. The Missionaries have been complaining because some of the churches fail to give them appointments as they should. I must say for our missionaries as long as we put them on the field we ought to encourage them in every way possible.
- 6. As to Time of Meeting. I want to recommend that we assemble and open our session at night on the first day of the Association each year.

We trust these recommendations will be carefully considered and practiced if you adopt them.

I have left myself a little time to speak extemporaneously upon these some points in order to give you a better understanding of these vital questions. Then I shall close with the hope and prayer that God may bless and prosper you in your continued work for the Master's cause.

Let us pray for fresh power of the Holy Spirit on the whole work and workers.

Brethren see to it that all of your reports and all matter intended for your minutes are legible, or readable, so that the minutes can be properly compiled. Thus you will help your secretary and your printer and you will have a better minute, and we shall be better prepared to give the required status of the Baptists in this State.

With brotherly love for all and malice toward none, I am yours for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom.

I got the church to launch a rally for the third Sunday in April. We raised on that Sunday \$53.17. Of this amount I sent Rev. Thacker \$50.25, leaving a balance of \$10.00. The rally was continued to the third Sunday in May. On that day the church raised \$29.15, making a total of \$82.32 raised for the relief of the White Oak Church. Paid Rev. Thacker \$60.25 and Rev. Ware \$7.49, leaving a balance in church treasure of \$14.58.

- 4. The officers of this Association shall be a President, a Vice President, Recording and Corresponding Secretaries, Treasurer, and as many Boards of Managers as may seem necessary. Each board shall have control of all business committed to them, and shall be elected annually.
- 5. All boards, committees and officers elected at one session of the Association shall make a satisfactory report to the Association before they are re-elected.
- 6. Each church in this Association will be expected to send 20 cents per member and said amount will be known as the Association fund.
- 7. The Association will co-operate with the American Baptist Home Missionary Society of New York, with its work within our bounds.
- 8. We recommend Hiscock's Baptist Church Directory as a true guide for the churches in business meetings within the bounds of this Association.
- 9. There shall be a treasurer and fund raised annually and kept expressly for superannuated ministers within the bounds of the Association.
- 10. The Association shall have no power over the internal affairs of the churches; but where a church holds a pastor and accepts his services, the failure or neglect to pay such pastor his salary will place the church in bad standing.
  - 11. There shall be the following boards appointed at each annual ses-

- sion: (1) Home Mission Board; (2) Educational Board; (3) Executive Board.
- 12. This Constitution may be changed by a two-thirds' vote; provided it does not effect Sections 2, 3, 4, 5 and 10.
- 13. This Association shall meet annually on Wednesday before the first Sunday in August, at such place as may be agreed upon while in session.
- 14. Extra sessions of this Association may be called by the President and Executive Board and conduct the same business as an annual session, except in changing the Constitution; this is to be a matter for the annual session.
- 15. We further recommend that one-half of the fee for secretary shall be paid at the Association, the remaining half to be paid after minutes have been distributed to the various churches.
- 16. Any church in good standing wishing to withdraw from this Association, upon a written request, can do so, provided it notifies the President three months before the Association convenes and the President shall notify the Executive Board.
- 17. Any minister coming from any other Associations to unite with us shall bring a letter from his church before he can be recognized with us.
- 18. No member of our church shall join another sister Baptist Church without proper letter form of dismissal.

Whereas, men belonging to the High Point Association have been unlawfully ordained in the past, be it known—

#### SUPPLEMENTARY TO CONSTITUTION.

- 1. That we recognize no ordination outside of two or three members of the Ministerial Council.
- 2. Any man ordained otherwise will not be recognized as an elder in this Association.
- 3. If any minister violates this order he shall be dropped from this Association.

By order of the Executive Board.

#### STANDING RESOLUTIONS.

- 1. That while we recognize the independence of the Baptist Church, we cannot believe that said church is at liberty to enact a law or usage conferry to the denomination to which it belongs, or with which it is identified.
  - 2. That we believe it to be our interest as Baptist Churches to cling to

and practice the New Testament usages.

- 3. That we recommend to our brethren of this Association the obtaining of a thorough knowledge of Baptist usages.
- 4. That it is to be the best interest of the churches of this Association to call ministers belonging to this Association as pastors.
- 5. That no minister should be ordained unless his usefulness actually demands it.
- 6. That we heartily endorse Shaw University, Raleigh, as our great Baptist headquarters.
- 7. That the Baptist Home Mission Monthly published under the direction of the American Baptist Home Mission Society, of New York, should be read by every Baptist minister in this Association.
- 8. That hereafter no minister shall be ordained unless he has a good primary education. He must understand church government; eight parts of speech of the English language; six rules in grammar; four fundamental principles of arithmetic; eighteen articles of faith and must be a man of good character. That the hand of fellowship be withdrawn from any brother breaking this rule.
