CONSTITUTION

Article I.—This body shall be known as the “Wake Baptist Association.”

Art. II.—The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ’s kingdom among men, and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity with the New Testament.

Art. III.—This Association shall be composed of delegates chosen by churches connected with it, each church being entitled to at least one delegate, and then one delegate for each hundred members or fraction thereof. Ministers who are members of the churches connected with this body shall be considered members of the Association, ex officio, and ministers who are not in charge of or connected with churches within the bounds of this Association, who present testimonials of good standing in the Baptist denomination, may become members of this Association by payment of \$1 annually: Provided, ministers who aided in the organization of this Association shall be considered members so long as they are in good standing in the Baptist denomination; also any layman in good standing in a Baptist church may become an annual member by the payment of \$1.

Art. IV.—The delegate from each church shall bear a letter certifying their appointment, giving an account of the condition of the church, and a statement of all funds contributed for benevolent purposes during the year.

Art. V.—The officers of this body shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, an Auditor, and a Statician, whose duty shall be such as are generally performed by such officers. In addition there shall be appointed a Home Board, Foreign Mission Board, an Educational Board, Sunday School Board, and an Executive Board, which latter shall have charge of the work of the Association during the interim of its annual session, and three members of the Executive Board

shall constitute a quorum, and the officers of the body shall be ex officio members. The other boards shall have supervision of the work of the Association along their service lines, subject to the Executive Board and the Association, and shall so organize the territory of the Association as to accomplish the best results, but not contrary to the Executive Board or the Association.

Art. VI.—It shall be the duty of the Moderator to reside during the deliberations of the body, to enforce an observance of the constitution, preserve decorum, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion concerning any subject under discussion after others have spoken or when called upon, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

Art. VII.—It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record the proceedings of each annual session and superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes among the churches.

Art. VIII.—It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches or collected during the session of this body, and disburse the same for the purpose for which they were sent or collected. He shall not pay any order on the Treasurer except it is signed by the Moderator and the Clerk of the Association, subject to the provisions in the By-Laws.

Art. IX.—Any church desiring to become a member of this body shall present her petition at an annual session of the Association through delegates appointed for that purpose; and if the Association shall consent to receive her the Moderator shall extend to the delegate the right hand of fellowship.

Art. X.—This Association shall not maintain fellowship with any church that does not preserve Gospel order.

Art. XI.—The Association may invite visiting brethren to seats and extend to them all privileges of the body save that of voting.

Art. XII.—The Annual Session of this body shall

commence on Wednesday before the third Sabbath in August, at such place as the Association may select.

Art. XIII.—All ministers composing the Association shall hold three ministerial meetings a year in such place as the brethren may designate.

Art. XIV.—We will receive no ministers into this Association but those who have a good moral character

Art. XV.—Any Baptist Sunday School or Missionary Society within the bounds of this Association may become a member of this Association by sending voluntary contributions. Each shall be entitled to one delegate.

Art. XVI.—We will withdraw the right hand of fellowship from every minister who walks disorderly and contrary to the gospel rule.

Art. XVII.—Each church connected with this Association can continue its membership by supporting this constitution.

Art. XVIII.—By appointment of the Association there shall be preached during each session an introductory sermon.

Art. XIX.—This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

BY-LAWS

Schools, Societies and individual shall be acknowledged. Schools, Societies and individuals shall be acknowledged in the minutes of the Association.

Sec. 2.—Before the final adjournment of the Association all the funds, notes, etc., shall be counted by the Finance Committee and Treasurer. The Treasurer shall give the Finance Committee a receipt for the amount placed in his hands.

Sec. 3.—The Treasurer, before receiving any funds from the Association, shall give a justified bond for a sum double the amount of that which may come into his hands, for the faithful performance of the duties of his office.

Sec. 4—No Missionary or Agent of this Association shall be Treasurer.

Sec. 5.—The Treasurer shall pay out no money except on order written by the Clerk and signed by the Moderator.

Sec. 6.—After the expenses of the Association shall have been paid the remaining Associational funds shall be applied to such purposes as the Association may direct. The Executive Board shall execute the plans adopted by the Association.

Sec. 7. The Treasurer shall turn over to his successor all funds, notes, books, and papers belonging to the Association as soon as his successor shall give bond as directed in the above section.

Sec. 8.—Should the newly elected Treasurer in any case fail to qualify the Finance Committee shall retain the funds and be held responsible for the same until a Treasurer is elected or the Board shall qualify.

Sec. 9.—The Auditor shall audit the accounts of the Treasurer and make annual reports to the Association.

ec. 10.—The duties of the Boards provided for in this Constitution shall be such as are usually performed by such boards in other similar bodies.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR THOSE HAVING THE MINISTRY IN VIEW

Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, United States History, General History, Geography and Scripture Geography, Theology, Systematic Theology (Pendleton), The Church (Harvey), Deaconship (Howell), Church Discipline (Hiscox), Homiletics (Broadus), History of the Baptist Denomination and the History of the Bible.

The Course of Study was adopted unanimously by the Association, and the churches are requested to license no person who cannot pass a creditable examination on reading, writing, the fundamental principles of arithmetic, grammar, and geography, and to ordain no person who cannot pass a satisfactory examination on the entire course.

PROCEEDINGS

The Wake Baptist Association met in its fifty-third Annual session with the Holly Springs Baptist Church on Wednesday, the 13th day of August, 1919, the Moderator, Rev. J. W. Ligon, presiding.

The devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. H. Pair and Rev. E. Wimberly.

Bro. Wimberly announced hymn 422, "My Soul be on Thy Guard," which was sung by the congregation. Bro. Pair read a part of the 10th chapter of Romans and led in prayer. "Am I a Soldier of the Cross?" was next sung.

The Moderator announced that the praise meeting would be continued. Several spiritual songs were sung and interesting remarks by the different brethren were made.

The Moderator then introduced Prof. W. S. Turner the pastor of the church, who extended a cordial welcome to the delegates and visitors. Among other things Prof. Turner called attention to the importance of getting together as a Christian people.

In the absence of Dr. S. H. Witherspoon, the Moderator called upon Dr. A. W. Pegues to respond to the address, which he did, and stated how the delegates might show their appreciation of the cordial address of welcome. Dr. Pegues called attention to the work that this Association is doing in helping others.

The Moderator appointed the following Committees:

The Committee on Hours of Meeting reported as follows: Meet at 9:30, adjourn at 12:30. Meet at 2 p. m., adjourn at 4. Meet at 8 p. m. adjourn at pleasure.

The Moderator then announced the arrival of the

hour for the Introductory sermon by Rev. John W. Jones.

Bro. Jones was assisted by Dr. A. B. Vincent.

Dr. Vincent read for a scripture lesson the 18th chapter of Matthew.

Prayer was offered by Bro. R. B. Mangum.

After singing, Rev. John W. Jones preached a very impressive and practical sermon on "Humility," using as a text, Matt. 18:3.

The speaker presented the following points: The evidences of true conversion; the characteristics of a little child. Humility. Teachability. Faithfulness. Don't try to boss. Has the spirit of co-operation.

At the conclusion of the sermon, Dr. Vincent offered a fervent prayer, and led in singing the "Good Old Fashioned Way."

The members of the Sisters Auxiliary were presented to the Association.

The Constitution of the Woman's Auxiliary was read.

On motion, the following brethren were appointed to confer with the Sisters on the Constitution: C. E. Askew, W. H. Fuller, J. H. Halbert, W. S. Turner and A. B. Vincent.

Collection of \$5.51 was lifted. Adjourned with benediction.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The Association met at 2 o'clock. Praise services conducted by Revs. G. A. Mial and E. W. Moragne.

Rev. G. W. Hunter was introduced to the Association. Rev. H. Pair, the Vice-Moderator was called to the chair and the Moderator, Rev. J. W. Ligon delivered his Annual Address. (See address.)

On motion the address was referred to a Committee consisting of Dr. A. W. Pegues, Prof. W. S. Turner, Prof. W. H. Fuller.

The "Relation of the Sunday School to the Church," was discussed by Dr. N. F. Roberts.

Bro. High and Bro. Mial spoke on the same subject.

The Union Reformer as an Agency in Developing the churches, was discussed by Bro. I. W. Holden and Rev. D. S. Saulter.

The Association adjourned with benediction by Rev. Junious Jones.

NIGHT SESSION

Association convened at 8 o'clock. Praise service conducted by Rev. S. S. Person and Rev. Geo. Stokes.

Bro Person read a portion of 1st Cor. 14 chapter. "I am Thine O Lord," was sung by the choir.

The Auxiliary of the Wake Baptist Association made its report.

On motion, the Constitution of the Auxiliary was adopted. The financial report was also read.

The hour having arrived for the sermon, the Moderator announced that in the absence of Rev. A. T. Price on account of illness, we were fortunate in having Dr. Spiiller, pastor of the Mt. Vernon Baptist

Church, Durham, N. C., who had kindly consented to preach. Dr. Spiller was assisted by Rev. D. S. Saulter. "I Need Thee Every Hour," was sung. Dr. Spiller, after preliminary remarks, referring to the Pastor, of the church, announced Rev. 14:6 as a text. Theme, "An Ideal Preacher and His Message." The sermon was a powerful one and made a deep impression upon the large audience present.

After singing, "I'll be present When my Name is Called," Dr. A. W. Pegues and Prof. W. S. Turner were called upon to lift a collection for Ministerial Education which amounted to \$53.60.

Rev. G. A. Mial presented two little orphan girls who made interesting recitations and sung a beautiful song to the delight of the audience. The congregation contributed \$21.34 to the Orphan Home at Winston-Salem.

The Association then adjourned with benediction by Dr. N. F. Roberts.

THURSDAY MORNING

Association met at 9:30. Praise service conducted by Bros. Hezekiah Cook and I. C. Jeffries.

The minutes of the previous sessions were read and adopted.

The Opportunities of the Rural Church were discussed by Dr. M. C. Ransom, Dr. A. B. Vincent, Dr. A. W. Pegues, Prof. W. S. Turner, Rev. Junior Jones, Dr. R. Spiller and Bro. I. J. Holden.

The scriptural ordinances, their significance and importance was discussed by Rev. W. S. Turner and Dr. A. W. Pegues.

The Committee on Place made its report which was adopted. The report of the Committee on Nomination of officers was adopted.

The Educational Board submitted its report through the Chairman, Rev. D. S. Saulter. The report was adopted.

Mrs. Barrett reported for the Auxiliary and pro-

sented \$60.00 to the Association. Report was received and adopted with thanks.

The Committee on Moderator's address reported. The report was adopted.

The Committee on Temperance made its report, which was adopted.

Prof. C. R. Frazer, Bro. C. E. Lightner, Rev. M. W. Brown, Bro. A. J. Rogers, Mrs. Turner, Mrs. Sanders were introduced to the Association.

Adjourned with benediction by Rev. G. W. Watkins.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The devotions were conducted by Bro. W. H. Riddick and Bro. John R. Ivey.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

Dr. A. B. Vincent, Chairman of the Sunday School Board made an interesting address on the work of the Sunday School.

Bro. J. H. Jenkins led in prayer.

ON PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

We, your Committee on the President's Address have examined it carefully and commend it as practical, sound and to the point.

In keeping with the spirit of the recommendations, we suggest and recommend that the work of all organizations doing work in the bounds of Wake Baptist Association be so corre-

lated and harmonized with that of the Association, that their annual statements can appear in the minutes of the Association as a part of a great whole.

That the Association, therefore requires the Wake Missionary Union and the Wake County Sunday School Convention as well as the Woman's Auxiliary, to make reports to the Association annually of all monies received and expended.

Further, we recommend to the churches that they require from their various Sunday Schools, an annual financial statement setting forth the collection and expenditure of funds.

We also recommend that the Association establish scholarships for ministerial education.

ASSOCIATION EDUCATIONAL BOARD

We, your Educational Board have partially kept up with the educational movement, among our people during the past year. We find there is more interest manifested in the education and preparation of our young men for the ministry than ever before. The churches of this Association are contributing more money through the budget system recommended by our Moderator than ever before in the history of the Association. They have seen that the times in which we live, demand a prepared ministry or in other words, prepared men along all lines.

Last year we received \$100.00 from this Association which aided seven young men in school through the entire session. This is a very encouraging feature of our work.

We recommend that every pastor belonging to this body, preach at least two educational sermons and take a collection for the same. We also urge our pastors to lecture on this important work, take public and personal contributions and forward the same to Dr. N. F. Roberts, the Dean of the Theological Department of Shaw University.

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL ADDRESS.

Dear Co-workers, Brethren and friends of the Auxiliary to the Wake Baptist Association:

Many marvelous works have been wrought by God, in bringing about good things for His people.

September 29th 1918—just eleven months ago—this Association met in Pleasant Grove Baptist Church at Wendell, N. C., and organized the Woman's Auxiliary to the Wake Baptist Association, its purpose being to help the brethren to raise money for foreign missionary work. With pleasure we recall the the meeting held at Pleasant Grove Baptist Church, Rev. A. T. Price, Pastor. The earnestness with which you worked in striving to carry out the purpose for which we were organized, gave me a peculiar pleasure in greeting you. I wish for you, health, strength, joy and happiness while here to carry out your mission.

My sisters, our coming together each year is only a repetition, with an increase in number, interest, spirituality, loyalty and love, for the cause which we espouse and that is missions. Let us thank God for His guidance in leading us thus far, and

pray that peace and love may ever exist among the women of this Auxiliary, that a crave of rivalry for personal aggrandizement may not enter our ranks, but as sisters aiming at one great object, and a desire to work for the salvation of souls, and make our meeting so effective that it will make a lasting impression for good upon those who come among us.

Our work from year to year, gives encouragement to those who are giving time, prayers and money to it. Let us never feel that it is being done in vain, when we think of the world and its present condition in comparison with the history of the past, it is truly evident that there has never been a time when the vitalizing truth of the gospel was more needed than now. Many have declared christianity a failure, because of the failure on the part of the world to conform to the teaching of the scriptures, and especially to the spirit of the sermon on the mount.

Since we were organized, the world's war has grown into flame, destroying nations as a mighty earthquake in their mad and blind struggles for national supremacy. The spirit of Europe has even invaded our own land and some of the bravest of our sons have gone down in their contention for national defense, therefore Christian friends, let us be up and doing in our humble service as missionary workers to send the Gospel to those who have it not, by fortifying and strengthening the work already organized by this Convention, both home and abroad.

Our ideal of foreign missions has not as yet arisen to the standard whereby the gospel is being given to the heathen as it should. The field is broad for service; there is much land yet to be possessed.

Personally, I am not content with the work we are doing in Africa for our fields of labor are too small, we need to spread out and enlarge our cords and send more missionaries to other parts of mother Africa apart from Liberia to carry the Gospel to the heathen.

Could we not recall the sainted name of our dear Sister Mial and an host of others who have given their lives for foreign missions of whose fields of labor we hear nothing in these latter days. Therefore, let us again begin to think that the fields to be possessed are growing larger and larger and we

need more and more workers to accomplish the great work that lies before us. I would be glad if the sisters in charge of the different **auxiliaries would keep** correspondence with the president so that she might have a little **knowledge** of their work during the year. **Let us be** more encouraged to do a greater work for the coming year; let foreign missions play a great part in our lives, in our talks, in our conversations with those whom we come in contact.

The keynote of the present time is preparedness in every branch of our state and national government but especially in our war and navy departments, this is the watchword. It is no new word brought into use by our present time alone, but merely suited to the conditions of the present time, for a casual glance from the Holy writ discloses the fact that it has ever been the call of God to man—for instance the call of God to Noah, “prepare thee an Ark.” His call to backsliding Israel through the prophet Hosea, “O Israel, prepare to meet thy God,” and even the clarion voice of the wilderness preacher was keyed to the note of preparedness, for he was but a voice crying in the wilderness. His theme was, “prepare ye, the way of the Lord.” The advent of our blessed Christ was the preparation for missions on earth. He lived, moved from place to place taught and performed miracles among the people and especially did he train His disciples and commanded them to go ye into all the chain which binds us to Christ. Our work for the salvation of world, and preach the gospel to every creature. There is a chain which binds us to Christ. Our work for the salvation of souls is linked on to that which He left and we are to herald the gospel to the unsaved sinner, to carry out the prophecy of our Master. The gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations and then shall the end come.

Now dear friends, this is the first time for the women of the Auxiliary to the Wake Baptist Association to have attempted to come together. We have worked hard to bring before you the best results. We started without one penny. The first of the year, we were hindered by the influenza which threw us to the last of Spring before we could make any effort to work.

We first put God in front and said if you will be with us, we will try to do our best. Then my mind was called to the

37th Psalm and 4th verse which reads: "Delight thyself also in the Lord and He shall give thee the desires of thine heart." I took that as a watchword.

I visited eight different churches; set up nine Auxiliaries. The good people received me cordially also aided me on from place to place. Dear friends, sometimes I found myself rejoicing, sometimes crying, sometimes sighing and all the time praying, but the latter, through faith, was where I received strength to push the battle to the end.

Now dear sisters, I hope to have the pleasure of shaking hands with each of you before leaving. I recommend that each delegate return to her Auxiliary and hold an echo meeting, tell all of the members the proceedings of the body, make them feel as though they are in the real convention.

I would further recommend that some one be appointed to bring into our next meeting, a sketch of the lives of our missionaries who have labored in the foreign fields but are now sleeping a peaceful slumber, whose awakening shall be supremely blest. My sisters, I further recommend that we give the women of the state a donation, and represent by delegate in the Lott Carey Convention.

May the sentiment expressed in the following lines rise like incense daily from every heart:

"Life time is working time,
Spend no idle days,
Jesus is calling thee,
On the harvest ways,
Working with willing hands,
Sing a song of praise;
Work, ever hard for Jesus.
Learn where duty lies,
Grasp every passing day,
As a precious prize,
Glad to help the sorrowing,
Glad to sympathize,
Work, ever work for Jesus.
Life time is working time
Do thy honest part,
Though in discouragement

Bear a cheerful heart,
Trusting Jesus as thy friend,
Ne'er from Him part.
Work, ever work for Jesus.
