

# COURSE OF STUDY FOR THOSE HAVING THE MINISTRY IN VIEW

Reading, writing, arithmetic, United States history, general history, geography, and Scripture geography, theology, systematic theology (Pendleton), The Church (Harvey), Deaconship (Hewell), Church Discipline (Hiscox, Homiletics (Broadus), History of the Baptist Denomination.

The course of study was adopted unanimously by the Association, and the churches are requested to license no person who cannot pass a creditable examination on reading, writing, the fundamental principles of arithmetic, grammar and geography; and to ordain no person who cannot pass a satisfactory examination on the entire course.

#### CONSTITUTION:

ili

Article I. This body shall be known as the "Wake Baptist Association."

Art. 11. The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's kingdom among men, and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity with the New Testament.

Art. III. This Association shall be composed of delegates chosen by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to at least one delegate, and then one delegate for each hundred members or fraction thereof. Ministers who are members of the churches connected with this body shall be considered members of the Association, ex officio, and ministers who are not in charge or connected with churches within the bounds of this Association, who present testimonials of good standing in the Baptist denomination, may become members of this Association by payment of \$1 annually; Provided, ministers who aided in the organization of this Association shall be considered members to long as they are in good standing in the Baptist denomination; also any layman in good standing in the Baptist church may become an annual member by the payment of \$1.00.

Art. IV. The delegate from each church shall bear a letter certifying their appointment, giving an account of the condition of the church, and a statement of all funds contributed for benevolent purposes during the year.

Art. V. The officers of this body shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, an Auditor, and a Statistician, whose duties shall be such as are generally performed by such officers. In addition there shall be appointed a Home Board, Foreign Mission Board, an Educational Board, Sunday School Board, and an Executive Foard, which later shall have charge of the work of the Association during the interim of its annual session, and three members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum, and the officers of the body shall be ex-officio members. The other boards shall have supervision of the work of the Association along their several lines, subject to the Executive Board and the Association, and shall so organize the territory of the Association to accomplish.

the best results, but not contrary to the Executive Board of the Association.

- Art. VI. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside during the deliberations of the body, to enforce an observance of the constitution, preserve decorum, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion concerning any subject under discussion after others have spoken or when called upon, and give the casting vote of a tie.
- Art. VII. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to report the proceedings of each annual session and superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes among the churches.
- Art. VIII. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches or collected during the session of this body, and disburse the same for the purpose for which they were sent or collected. He shall not pay any order on the Treasurer except it is signed by the Moderator and the Clerk of the Association subject to the provisions in the By-Laws.
- Art. IX Any church desiring to become a member of this body shall present her petition at an annual session of the Association through delegates appointed for that purpose, and if the Association shall consent to receive her the Moderator shall extend to the delegate the right hand of fellowship.
- Art. X This Association shall not maintain fellowship with any church that does not preserve Gospel order.
- Art. XI. The Association may invite visiting brethern to seats and extend to them all privileges of the body save that of voting. The Association shall meet on Wednesday before the third Sabbath in August at such place as the Association may select.
- Art. XII. All ministers composing the Association shall hold three ministerial meetings a year in such places as the brethern may designate.
- Art. XIII. We will receive no ministers into this Association but those who have a good moral character.
- Art. XIV. Any Baptist Sunday School or Missionary Society within the bounds of this Association may become a member of this Association by sending voluntary contributions. Each shall be entitled to one delegate.
  - Art. XV. We will withdraw the right hand of fellowship from

every minister who walks disorderly and contrary to the gospel rule.

Art. XVI. Each church connected with this Association can continue its membership by supporting this constitution.

Art. XVII. By appointment of the Association there shall be preached during each session an introductory sermon.

Art. XVIII. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a vote of two thirds of the members present.

#### BY-LAWS

- Section 1. Schools, Societies and individuals shall be acknowledged in the Minutes of the Association.
- Sec. 2. Before the final adjournment of the Association all the funds, notes, etc., shall be counted by the Finance Committee and Treasurer. The Treasurer shall give the Finance Committee a receipt for the amount placed in his hands.
- Sec. 3. The Treasurer shall pay out no money except on order written by the Clerk and signed by the Moderator.
- Sec. 4. After the expenses of the Association shall have been paid the remaining Associational funds shall be applied to such purposes as the Association may direct. The Executive Board shall execute the plans adopted by the Association.
- Sec. 5. The Auditor shall audit the accounts of the Treasurer and make annual reports to the Association.
- Sec. 6. The duties of the Boards provided for in this Constitution shall be such as are usually performed by such boards in other similar bodies.

Dr. Watkins explained the meaning of devotion. That it is a time when we place our minds on God, an hour when all draw near to God. Several delegates took part in the meeting.

At the conclusion of the praise service the Moderator announced the hour for the address of welcome by the pastor, Rev. J. W. Powell.

Bro. Powell, with a warm word made all feel welcome and at home.

Rev. A. T. Price, in behalf of the Association responded to the address. The Moderator with appropriate words introduced Rev. C. F. Pope, who had been away for several years in school work, to preach the introductory sermon, assisted by Prof. A. B. Johnson. Bro. Johnson led in a fervent prayer. "Draw me Nearer" was sung. After which Prof. Pope made some preliminary remarks and chose for a text Phil. 4:8 Subject:Proper things to think about.

1. Whatsoever things are true; a man is estimated by the quality of his thoughts. (2) Honesty, Fair and square dealings with every man. (3) Justice, just dealings with man. (4) Purity, the world's greatest need is clean hands and clean hearts.

(5) Things lovely; think of the lovely things God has made upon which we can think. Why should we think on evil things?(6) Good report; good opinion of others.

These points were ably pressed upon the hearts of the delegates and congregation present.

Rev. J. W. Powell, Bro. R. B. Mangum and Dr. O. S. Bullock were appointed Committee on Hours of Meeting.

Rev. Alonza M. Wiggins, Rev. G. W. Todd and Bro. O. V. Carpenter were appointed on Enrollment.

Sister B. E. Barrett exhibited a beautiful quilt prepared by the Auxiliary Society to be sent to the Missionary field in Africa. The following brethren were introduced to the Association; Revs A. B. Johnson, L. E. Johnson, G. B. Fitts, Bro. T. H. Wilcox and wife. Each of these brethren made helpful remarks.

Prof. Johnson who is the Supervisor of the Deaf, Dumb and Blind School in Raleigh, gave some causes of blindness, and the difficulty of getting these unfortunate pupils in school where they can be trained.

Lieutenant Oxley, who also made helpful remarks calling attention to the method by the men who served in the world war can receive a bonus policy. #### AFTERNOON SESSION-2:30

Devotions conducted by Rev. Chas. Jones and Rev. John W. Jones, who read the Scripture lesson from Acts 11 chap., and led in prayer. "Pass me not, O gentle Savior" was sung. Minutes of the morning session were read and adopted. Mr. Berry O'Kelly and Prof. H. L. Triggs were introduced to the Association. Prof. Trigg made remarks relative to the work of the Berry Okelly Training School. Mr. Berry O'kelly expressed his pleasure in being present and spoke on the importance of keeping children in school.

Rev. G. S. Stokes was called to the chair and Rev. J. W. Ligon the Moderator, delivered his annual address. The Moderator expressed his pleasure in being where he began work as a teacher, a position which he held for twenty-six consecutive years. He emphasized the mission of the church and this Association is to give the world the gospel. The minister is the leader of the church and must be a man of good thought and vision. (See recommendations). On motion of Rev. O. S. Bullock a committee was appointed on the address.

The report of Boards was called. The executive Board reported through the secretary.

An interesting message with a check for ten dollars was received from Rev. Jas. A. Pearce and read to the Association by the secretary. Bro. Pearce is laboring in Cambridge, Mass., but has not forgotten his native state and the work of the Wake Association. The message was heartily received. Benediction was announced by the pastor, Rev. J. W. Powell.

#### WEDNESDAY NIGHT

The Association assembled at 8 o'clock. Praise service was

conducted by Revs. J. W. Jones and W. H. Reddick. "A Charge to Keep I Have," was sung. Bro. Riddick read Matt. 3rd chapter and offered prayer. Rev. A. A. Morrisey, assisted by Dr. G. W. Moore, preached an excellent sermon from Matt: 24:14. Subject: "The Gospel of the Kingdom." The sermon was instructive and enjoyed by the large congregation present. Rev. Geo. W. Todd and Rev. A. G. Seawell lifted a collection of \$14.37. Adjournment with benediction.

#### THURSDAY MORNING-10 O'clock

The praise service was conducted by Rev. Geo. W. Todd. Minutes of the afternoon and night sessions were read and approved. The treasurer submitted his annual report. The report was adopted.

The Church and its Mission was ably discussed by Dr. A. W. Pegues:

- 1. The church in its larger sense is composed of all regenerated persons.
- 2. Christians are not concerned about going to heaven, but about bringing God's kingdom into the world.

God, to get the world back to Him, wants the church to help. A local church's business is to lend all its energies to establish the Kingdom in themelves and the world. The churches are all one army on the fighting line. Every church must do its part; no one church is safe until all the churches are safe. The people of God don't live for this world alone. God has made man for a higher world. All the material things must be used to help get up into a higher life; the church must be evangelized. The person is not saved when he is converted but must be trained for christian work. The church is a resevoir like a water system, christians are pipes through which God's blessings flow.

The Present Day Opportunity for Baptists, was next discussed by Dr. O. S. Bullock;

1. We must know just when to act. We must not love so much but do more. Our love is measured by what we do. A church must serve the community and help in saving the world. Christ always did things at the appointed time. The good Samaritan seized the opportunity to do good.

2. We must put our hands on our young people and hold there in the church.

Rev. M. L. Dawson spoke on the same subject. There are classes of christians fighting each other when people begin to think and fight it is a good time to convert the same body. This is the opportunity of the baptists. Nicodemus and Luther were recited as illustrations.

People are getting tired of bossism. They are beginning to think for themselves. The people want liberty.

Christian education is an education that is based upon God that makes God their center.

The Dead sea and the sea of Galilee were recited as illustrations of the christian or the church that holds all that it receives and the one that gives out what it received.

At the conclusion of the able discussion of the subject the moderator called for a collection of a hundred dollars. \$60.42 was lifted.

Sister Williams, Rev. B. F. Jordan, Rev. M. Jones, Lawyer McBrayer and Deacen Cherry were introduced to the Association and made helpful remarks. Benediction by Rev. O. S. Bullock.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION

Devotions were conducted by Rev. M. G. Watkins and Rev. J. C. Love. Hymn 550 was sung. Bro. Love read Isaiah 63, and led in prayer.

Hymn 293 was sung.

Mniutes of the morning session were read and adopted: Rev. T. H. Mangolly of Africa was presented to the Association and made some remarks Dr. Geo. W. Watkins addressed the Association on the Educational Movement in N. C.

Calamities sometimes bring us to our senses.

More thoughts concerning education is given to that subject than ever before. This gives people power to accomplish things with less effort.

We have demonstated that we have ability to help ourselves.

This teaches us the value of our children. What is to become of our church schools?

These well equipped public schools will eliminate these church schools, there should be a well equipped high school in every county for the colored people. Dr. G. W. Moore spoke on the same topic.

Auxiliary Societies made their report and turned over to the Association \$55.00.

Mr. C. E. Lightner was presented to the Association and made remarks, and asked for the cooperation of all the educational work of Shaw University. Prof. C. R. Frazier, cashier of the Mechanics and Farmers Bank was introduced and made a helpful speech.

The Home Mission Board, through Rev. G. W. Todd. (See report).

Committee on officers; reported. Adopted.

Committee on Moderator's Address. The report was adopted.

Committee on place. Report adopted.

Committee on Finance reported. Adopted.

Sunday School Board reported. Adopted.

Committee on Temperance reported. Adopted.

Foreign Mission Board submitted its report. Adopted.

Committee on resolutions reported. Adopted.

The following delegates were elected:

Lott Carey Convention—Dr. G. W. Moore and the Moderator. The Baptist State Convention—Rev. J. W. Powell, Rev. A. T, Price, Rev. Geo. S. Stokes.

After some remarks by the Moderator the Association adjourned with benediction by the Moderator.

#### THURSDAY NIGHT-8 O'clock

The Association met at 8 o'clock. The praise service was conducted by Rev. J. W. Jones and Rev. W. H. Riddick. "A Charge to Keep I Have," was sung, led by Bro. W. M. Wright. Scripture lesson, 3rd chapter of Matthew. Hymn, "My Soul be on Thy Guard," was sung. In the absence of the Moderator and Secretary, Rev. G. S. Stokes acted as Moderator and Bro. T. J. Foster Secretary.

The Moderator's Recommendations which were adopted: an able sermon from Matt. 24:14. Subject: "The Gospel of the Kingdom." Bro. Bethea ofered prawer. A Collection of \$14.37 was lifted. After which the Association adjourned with benediction by Dr. G. W. Watkins.

#### MODERATOR'S RECOMMENDATIONS

The moderator's Recommendations which were adopted.

Since an efficient ministry is the greatest need of the people and confers the greatest and the most far reaching benefits, the pastors and churches of this body are urged to lend their fullest encouragement to young men evidencing a call to the gospel ministry.

- 2. But since the great progress in education and diffusion of knowledge among the people that our churches license no young man unless he can stand the test of the course adopted by this body.
- 3. Since the growth, prosperity and happiness of a community depend upon the religious and moral training of its people, it is recommended that our largest churches extend their regular services to at least twice a month.
- 4. It was recommended that the standard average amount of raised per member in our churches for Missoion, Christian Education and Charity be one dollar.
- 6. That the budget amount sent up to this Association be \$2,000. (a) This to be apportioned and raised by each church in proportion to its membership.
- 6. That since the special session of our body proved so beneficial to our work, it is recommended that a semi-annual session of one day be held at a time and place to be decided by the executive Board.
- 7. That while this body recognizes the full freedom of the individual churches in calling pastors it is the sense of this Association that churches connected with it should not call to their pulpits any but men of recognized ability and who are in sympathetic accord with the work of this Association.

Cooperation to the schools in finance and regular attendance of their children throughout the term, and support the teachers

in maintaining good order on the part of their children, that they may receive the best possible training to make them good and useful citizens.

#### REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION BOARD

- 1. As a means of strengthening as well as interesting the weaker and more needy parts of the field, we recommend that we extend financial aid to churches such as Merry Grove whose building was destroyed by a cyclone in 1923 and the church at Bailey that is now trying to build and that as far as we can assist like churches in destitute sections of the state.
- 2. That we continue to aid our charitable institutions. We recommend that each pastor once every quarter, bring to the attention of his church or churches the subject of missions. And also a lesson of missions be taught in the Sunday School once a quarter.

The Foreign Mission Board submitted the following report: Being aware of the fact that many souls in far away lands are hungering and thirsting after righteousness and realizing that the church is the only agency through which Christ has transmitted his redemption power to fill their needs in preaching the gospel and in view of the fact that forty missionaries are already on the foreign fields who need the hearty cooperation of the christian world; and since money being an element in carrying the eternal word of God we therefore recommend that each church of this organization will support this very worthy cause more strongly both financially and prayerfully.

- 2. Furthermore we recommend that this Association in keeping with former records will send to the Lott Carey Foreign Missionary Convention as liberal donation as possible for the promotion of missions.
- 3. That all pastors will sometimes during the year preach sermons pertaining to foreign missions informing their people of the different fields and the laborers thereon.

#### REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Your Sunday School Board desires to make the following recommendations: 1st. That every pastor in the bounds of our Association take an active part in the Sunday School of his church or churches, 2nd. that our Sunday schools where they lack the various points of standardized schools begin to supply themselves as follows:

(a) Cradle Roll. (b) Grading the Sunday School in kindergarten. Primary, Intermediate, and Bible Grades. (c) The establishment of a Home Department, (b) The organization of a Teacher's Training Class. We further recommend that the Circle County Sunday School Convention send all its Home and Foreign money each year to the Wake Baptist Association which will more closely unite the two in putting over the great program of evangelization. We further recommend that the splendid book on teaching published by the National Publishing Board, Nashville, Tennessee, whose author is our own Dr. S. N. Vass, be used by the teachers of our Sunday Schools.
