PROCEEDINGS

Salisbury St., Wadesboro, N. C. October 17, 1928

Pursuant to adjournment of previous session held with the Ramah Grove Baptist Church, the Zion Missionary Baptist Association met today in its fifty-sixth annual session with the Ebenezer Baptist Church of this place as hostess, Rev J R Faison, pastor, Rev J W Diggs, Moderator, presiding.

At 11:30 A.M., the Association was opened with praise

service conducted by Rev R L Micheal as follows:

Hymn No. 323. "Arise my soul arise," etc.

Prayer by Rev G R Chambers.

Second hymn No. 520, "I love thy kingdom Lord."

Prayer by deacon C C Horne.

In the absence of Revs W H Shaw and A B Moore, who was to preach the introductory sermon, Revs W G Flake and W H Horne took seats on the rostrum to officiate.

Rev Horne lined hymn No. 248 C. M., "Amazing sight the Saviour stands," etc. Rev Flake read the Scripture, Romans 13:1-7. Prayer by Rev P P Pegues. Hymn 378,

After the roll call, Rev J F Davis was invited to the chair by the Moderator to preside during the deliverance of the Moderator's address. Two verses of "There's not a friend like the lowly Jesus" was sung, after which Rev. Davis presented Rev Diggs to his address.

Bro. G W Baucum, Cor. Sec., read his annual report. See elsewhere for the report. By motion the report was

received and adopted,

An invitation was extended to visitors, to which Mrs Lucy Thompson, Reidsville, N. C., Revs A D Boatman, C H Daniels, J S Rowland and R H Reddick all came forward

and were made welcome.

Rev J H Randolph, the Cor. Sec. of the Lot Cary Convention, was presented by the Moderator, who came forward, by way of an address electrified the audience with an entelligent presentation of the cause of missions as fostered by his Convention. We all were made to feel that we had a part in the cause he represented, and resolved to stand by and support the cause.

A collection of \$22,25 was taken and turned over to Dr

Randolph for foreign missions.

Long meter doxology was sung, and the Association adjourned with benediction by Dr J H Randolph.

NIGHT SESSION

Promptly at 7 o'clock the praise services were opened by Rev B B Sturdivant, Jr., as follows: Hymn No. 197, "O for a heart to praise my God," etc. Prayer by brother B F Watts, 2nd hymn No. 578, "Come we that love the Lord," etc. Prayer by deacon S H Waddell,

The Moderator presented Dr J H Moore who came forward and delivered one of his famous addresses on Chris-

tian Stewardship.

To say that this address was thoughtful, painstaking, awakening, is just putting it mildly. Give account of thy stewardship was the subject.

On motion we donate to Dr Moore on his salary \$25.00, the same be credited to Zion Association for State missions.

Rev C H Daniels, accompanied by Dr Mials, took seatsin the stand to preach. Dr Mials lined hymn "There is a fountain filled with blood," etc., which was sung by the

congregation.

The Moderator introduced Rev Daniels who came forward and preached a very helpful sermon from the text "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation." St. Mark 16:15. Dr Mial led in singing "Glory to God I am going that way," etc. Prayer by Rev W H Shaw. Collection \$12.30.

The above program was both inspiring and uplifting, Doxology. Benediction by Dr J H Moore.

THURSDAY MORNING SESSION

The Association assembled at 9:30 A. M., the Modera-

tor, Rev J W Diggs, presiding.

Praise services were conducted by Rev J C Ellerbee, as follows: A spiritual was sung. Prayer by Rev J C Chambers. Rev Ellerbee read the 24th division of the Ps., and commented on the same. Prayer by Rev S S Bennett. The Moderator came to the chair. After making some very timely remarks, announced the Association open and in order for business.

Red Level failing to report two successive years, was under the penalty of the Constitution. On motion the ordaining board would investigate and report to this body.

Rev G A Mial, the Reformer man, very ably presented

gues and Dr. Mial.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Promptly at 2:30 p. m. the Association was called to order, and brother W A Kersey conducted the praise services as follows: Hymn No. 250, "Come ye that love the Lord," etc. Prayer by deacon H F Davidson. After singing two verses of "What a wonderful change in my life have been wrought," the praise service was closed, and the moderator announced the house open and ready for business. The moderator introduced Dr Pegues, who came forward, in his usual dignified manner, very ably discussed the work and problem, mission of the ministry. Also brought before us the work of the State Convention and what it is doing to foster Christian Education and missions, and our duty to support it. The address was timely and well received by all who heard him.

Mrs Lucy Thompson, representing the Orphan Home at Gibsonville, N. C., made a very strong plea in behalf of the institution, and solicited support. She laid it's obligations heavily on us, and it was our duty to help support it. A collection of \$12,55 was lifted by Rev L W Wertz and donated to Mrs Thompson for the institution.

On motion we supplement this amount to \$25.00 out of

the State mission fund if said funds warrants it.
Mrs Wertz was presented and made remarks.

On motion Rev Wertz preach the sermon tonight, provided Rev Dr E W Burk fails to come, at the Methodist church. Doxology. Benediction by Dr A W Pegues.

NIGHT SESSION

The Association re-assembled at the Kesler's Chapel A MEZion church, Rev WH Horne conducting the praise services as follows: Hymn No. 277, "Come holy Spirit heavenly dove," etc. Prayer brother E D Medley. Second hymn No. 316, "How sweet the name of Jesus sounds," etc. Prayer by Rev L T Allen. Third hymn No. 587, "Soldiers of Christ arise," etc. Prayer by Rev B F McManus.

The praise services being closed, the house was announc-

ed open and ready for business.

On motion we turn a vote of thanks to the missionary sisters for their splendid report and general donation.

Rev H I Quick was presented, and he discussed the sub-

ject "Economy and Thrift,"

In the absence of Dr. Burk, Rev L W Wertz was presented, and he delivered a master sermon from the text "Iam the way." St. John 14:6. The speaker, with eloquence and power intelligently proved without a shadow of doubt that Jesus is the way in life, in Christian attainments and salvation. Indeed, this was a great sermon.

One stanza of "I heard the voice of Jesus say," etc., was sung, and Rev T R Richardson addressed the throne of heavenly grace in a fervent prayer. "Go preach my gospel saith the Lord," etc., was sung during which time we enjoyed the presence of the Holy Spirit. Collection \$18.10.

On motion the proceedings of vesterday and last night

were read and adopted.

The Ordaining Board made its report. See elsewhere

for report. The report was adopted.

Miss Ida Shadd of Monroe read a paper. Subject;

"The mission field and the laborers."

The committee on condition of the country made report. Report adopted. Committee on officers made report. The report was adopted, except that part in reference to the moderator. The committee recommended Rev J F Davis for moderator. They changed that recommendation and elected Rev J W Diggs Moderator, See first page for roll of officers.

Revs E D Womack, J W Bennett, S M Quick and W M Pickett were introduced and made welcome. Committee on place reported, recommending Elizabeth M. as the place of our next meeting. A vote was taken, and it stood 66 to 68 unfavorable to Elizabeth. Brown Creek was nominated by Bro Richmond Sturdivant. After a vote was polled, on motion the selection of Brown Creek as the place of next Association was made unanimous.

On motion we endorse the Pee Dee Institute of Hamlet

for our ministers.

Adjourned with benediction by Rev Jas Horne.

AFTERNOON SESSION

MODERATOR'S ANNUAL ADDRESS

It is an honor to greet you in this, the 56th annual session of this body, for the first time as your humble moderator, We are closing another year's work for our King. Your presence today shows that you have not turned aside either at Dan nor Bethel to pay homage to false ideals and selfish leadership, but have followed that Spirit of christian fellowship which prompt us not to forsake the

assembling of ourselves together as the manner of some is. It is indeed a privilege for us to be together and inquire

of one another, "What hath God wrought?"

When last we met a year ago, our beloved moderator was with us, but today his voice is hushed, and he is gone the ways of all the earth. In the moving of him, let each of us tighten up and continue to carry out those principles that were so dear to him, and with the poet may we say, "Brethren, we are all sailing home, and by and by, when we are not thinking of it some shadowy thing (men call death) at midnight, will pass by and call us by name, and will say "I have a message for you from home. God wants you, heaven waits for you."

As great and sore the problems that have confronted us as a church, nation and individual, have been severe, they were not so severe as our sins, follies and neglect deserved. Therefore it becomes us to acknowledge our short comings before God and implore His mercy and resolve in our hearts to re-dedicate our lives and all earthly treasure to

His service.

We should praise God today, that out of all afflictions of the past there has come to us manifold blessings. The God whom we serve is still on the throne of the universe, keeping watch over His own and directing the church in her earthly mission.

Our opportunities are larger, the means more abundant and the time near, when the minister must live cleaner and nobler lives, that they might be able to preach the everlasting gospel to them that dwell on the earth with-

but any compromise.

We should feel grateful to Almighty God for His guidance during the past year, and while the work done does not measure up to the numerical strength and possibilities of our great Association, yet it evidences growth in unity of action, and awakening of deeper interest individual responsibility among the laity and larger sacrifices of means to advance the Kingdom of Christ than at any period during our past history as a Association.

The good seed sown by our fathers and predecessors in the Christian faith are still abiding within us and yielding rich returns. We today would not be what we are nor where we are, had not others come before us and blazed

the way.

No greater assurance, therefore, of our labors being fruitful needs be sought elsewhere than in this large assemblage of splendid men and women, who our fathers led to Christ, baptized into the fellowship of the church and taught the fine art of Christian living and true citizenship.

Our methods of work vary, but the gospel we spread is the same. "One Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all, and in all.

We believe in the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of man, that God made of one blood all men, and since Christ died for all, His blood is the only cure for our sins.

As Baptists, we stand for the democracy taught by Jesus Christ on the Mount-equal rights for all and special We teach our people to be loyal to the favors to none. flag of their country, law abiding, industrious, sober in their habits and Christlike in their daily living. We condemn crime in whomsoever found, and will by no means shield the guilty. We plead for equal justice in the courts. equal accommodation on public conveyances and an equal chance in the field of industry, labor and add to the country's wealth and renown. We are ready and willing at all times, when called upon by the authorities, to help put down violence and establish law and orderdeplored that there are any lynching in this fair land of ours. No greater insult, except treason, could possibly be hurled at the flag of this country than the taking of the law in its own hands by a mob and with savage glee. and in the most barbarious way deprive a citizen of life without trial, and due process of law. We call upon the Chief Magistrate of this Nation and his executives and all organized forces in the land, both civic and religious. to exert the most potent means possible to heal this running sore of our national life, which is not only weakening us at home, but as a so-called christian nation, it is putting a discount on the religion we export to the heathen.

We may raise millions of dollars for the conversion of the heathen but still drag along through the years with only nominal success, because we neglect to heed the voice of Him, who speaks from behind the seven golden candlesticks. "Not by might nor by power, but my Spirit saith the Lord," but insist on raising large sums of money to equip mission stations as if we meant to impress the heathen with our power and greatness, rather than by precept and example at home and abroad, carry to them the Spirit of Christianity and not so much of the letter.

We should be proud, my brethren, and thank God for the grip which the colored ministry has on the masses of our people. Their zeal for God and the high ideals of law and order exhibited in the preaching-of-gospel of Jesus Christ. We can only hold this grip upon our people by living clean lives, abstaining totally from intoxicating liquors, be the husband of one wife, and live above the petty things of life.

Missions. The greatest claim upon this Association is the work of missions. Under the Great Captain, our marching orders are "Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you, and lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." Besides those already on the field, others ought to be sent to carry good news and glad tidings to a lost world. Our forces ought to be re-enforced that greater work might be done for the Master and the reclaiming of the lost souls. Shall we do our part? Let us give more for missions this year than we have done before.

Education The educational system of North Carolina has been, as we know, wonderfully improved. Longer school terms and better pay teacher, and compulsory education enforced. This is as it should be, for ignorance is a burden on the commonwealth, and we must see to it that every child receives the training which the State provides.

Brethren, we should co-operate in the religiously training of the youth of denomination. We should support credited secondary schools operated by Baptists in the State, and support Shaw University in its educational program that we might have better prepared men, both in the pulpit and the pew.

When we look back over the past year's record, we can say we have done remarkable; the following amounts has been collected, paid out according to a statement handed me by secretary. At a joint board meeting July, 30, 1928,

we adopted the budget system for our educational and mission work for the year, our budget was \$750; how well we have kept our pledge will be seen by the following. The Association have paid \$144.42, the Women's Convention \$20; the Sunday School Convention \$201.80; Madison Grove \$5.01; Elizabeth \$60.00; Gallilee \$3.10; Ebenezer \$1.50: New Zion \$4.00; Poplar Springs \$10.00; Cedar Creek \$4.00; Flint Ridge \$7.50; Mt. Zion \$6.00; the Joint Meeting \$12.50. Total for missions \$475.83. For education, Association **\$**228.30, Joint meeting \$14.60. Sunday School Convention \$68.00. Total for education \$310.90. A grand total for missions and education \$786.73. You can see from the above we went beyond our expections, and still we have not done our best. There are other churches whose name ought to enter this roll of contributors and is Brethren, let us go forth the coming year with new zeal, that we might do more, and a better work for the Master than we have ever done. Finally my brethren let selfishness and office-seeking, strife in the field of service be banished from your mind, and let us see the world for Christ, and that, Baptist, regardless from whence he came, if he is in good and regular standing in his church, and his or her character is good, and his or her soul has been touched by the divine power from above, and he put on Christ's baptism, and is walking in the newness of life. he is your brother and sister.

The Women's Work Brethren, let us go forth the coming year with more faith in the work of our women. They have wrought well in the past, and it is up to us to see to it that in each of our churches they be given more support in putting over the program for the Master. Without them, our churches would lag, it is by them they are kept alive, and by them we are are supported, and by them the world must be saved. Let there be a Circle in every church the pastor deacons, & members supporting them in all their endeavors. Women of the Zion Association, you can give and serve and pray. You can give self-denyingly and serve lovingly. You can pray conqueringly. Best example of self-denying liberality in the Bible is recorded of women. The best example of conquering prayer in Bible is recorded of women. It was no great gitt, no great service, no great prayer. The gift was a widow's mite. The service was anointing of Jesus with a box of ointment. The prayer was a mother's prayer for a daughter possessed of a devil. But the gift and service and prayer were self-denial and love and faith. And so in the sight of God are of great value.

Recommendations:

1. That our contribution for State missions, girl's education and ministerial education be double this year.

2. That we secure the service of some competent Bible teacher, and a Institute be held in the bounds of the Association in the month of January or February, for the benefit of ministry of the Association and Christian workers. And that a sum of money be set aside for the expense of such institute from the Association treasurer; and such institute shall be held at such place as the Executive Board may decide.

3. That this Association unite with some other Associations in its educational endeavors. And that a commission be appointed by this Association to confer with

Commissioner appointed by other bodies.

4. That the pastor give the missionery workers an opportunity from time to tlme to speak of their work in their respective churches, that the entire membership of the churches may see the great need of co-operating with them in the mission work.

Committees Report on Ways and Means of Helping Superanuated Ministers

We, your committee on ways and means to further aid the aged and infirm ministers of our field, beg leave to make the following report: After carefully considering the urgent need of help in a financial way among the clergy, both in time of sickness and death, recommend the following: 1st. That there be organized a Ministerial Annuity Society, composed of the preachers and deacons of Zion Association. 2nd. That the members thereof be required to pay a joining fee of \$1.00 and an annual fee \$1.50 each. 3rd. That the revenues collected in this society be paid into the treasury of Zion Association annually, and paid out in manner as all other funds are paid out of said treasury by recommendation of the Ministerial An-

nuity Society. 4th. Upon the death of each member of this society the Moderator of Zion Association shall cause an order to be drawn upon the treasury of Zion Association for the sum of \$25.00 to be turned over to family for burying expense. 5th. In case of continued illness of a member, and the sick member so require, the Ministerial Annuity Society may recommend to donate such amount as the society in session may determine, and given to him as sick dues, provided the amount is not to exceed \$12.50; provided further whatever amount paid as sick dues, be deducted from \$25.00 burial expense. 6th. We further recommend the encouragement of the churches to continue their annual appropriations to Zion Association for aged ministers and endeavor to enlarge them. Provide that 10 per ct. of the public collection in the Association, not specified, be added to the appropriation given by the churches and paid to them as heretofore.

CONSITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be known as the Zion Missionary Baptist Association.

Art. 2. The primary object of this Association shall be to increase the spirit and efficiency of the churches, to support the gospel in destitute places among us, to assist the churches in the erection of suitable buildings for worship; to organize churches and Sunday Schools whenever practicable; 10 raise contributions for State, Home and Foreign Missions, and to co-operate with the Union Baptist State Convention of North Carolina in all of its plans of educational and missionary work.

Art. 3. This Association shall be composed of regular Baptist churches in good standing, and in full practice of the faith, discipline, ordinances, and of the doctrines of regular Baptist denominations. Also of the regular ministers in good standing in the churches in the bounds of the Association, and messengers elected annually by the churches of this body.

Art. 4. The officers of this Association shall be a moderator, vice-moderator, recording and corresponding secretary, treasurer and auditor, an executive nommittee of seven, and an ordaining board. The moderator, recording secretary and treasurer shall constitute three members of the executive committee. These officers shall be elected annually and hold their office until their successors are elected.

Art. 5. The moderator shall preside at all meetings or call some brother to fill the chair, and enforce order in accordance with the Rules of Decorum and Constitution. He shall settle points of order, give the casting vote in case of a tie, and appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered by the body.

Art. 6. The recording secretary shall perform the usual duties belonging to such office. He shall sign all orders drawn on the treasurer.

Art. 7. Corresponding secretary shall take charge of all the correspondence between this Association and other bodies. All communications and appeals to the various churches of this field shall be sent to him. He shall be ex-officio secretary to the executive committee.

Art. 8. The Treasurer of this Association shall be treasurer of the Union meeting. He shall hold all monies and valuable papers belonging to this Association. He shall pay orders only when they are properly drawn and signed by the moderator and secretary. He shall give an annual report to this body, preceded by an examination and endorsement of the Auditor. He shall give bond to the full security of the Association property in his hands.

Art. 9. The executive committee shall have full charge of the Association when it is not in session. They shall draw the plans of operation for the field approved by the Association. All claims on the treasurer of this body must be presented to the executive committee. They shall meet as often as called together by the corresponding secretary and moderator and shall make full report of their work to the Association through the corresponding secretary. Three members shall constitute a quorum.

Art. 10. The ordaining board shall have supervision of the ecclesiastical department of the Association. They shall examine all applicants for ordination, and pass on the credentials of all members of this body.

All requests for ministerial aid from this Association must be recom-

mended by the ordaining board.

Art. 11. Any regular Baptist church may continue its membership in this Association by the payment of ten (10) cents per capita for each of its members. (Said 10 cents is also the representation fee into the various Union Meetings.) Two fifths of which shall be used for general expenses, and three-fifths for ministerial education, and by raising money for missions. Any church failing to come up to the financial requirements of the Association shall not be considered in good standing and not allowed to enroll until satisfaction is rendered to this body by such church.

Art. 12. Newly constituted churches, or churches dismissed from other deliberative bodies of the same faith and order, may be admitted into this Association by sending their messengers to an annual meeting with letters of petition and agreeing to the declaration of principles laid down

in God's word.

Art. 13. The members convened in the Association shall have no ec-

clesiastical or disciplinary power over the churches.

Art. 14. The Association shall meet annually, and be composed of not more than three messengers from each church, with a letter, giving the condition of the church. Said meeting to convene on Wednesday before the third Lord's day in October, with an introductory sermon, and continue in session until business is completed. The Urion Meeting shall meet on Friday before each fifth Sunoay or as often as may deem practicable, and should there fail to be a place for a Union Meeting at the session, the Executive Committee shall find a location and notify the field immediately through the Corresponding Secretary.

Art. 15. No difficulty between churches or church shall be heard by this Association until Gospel steps have been fully taken outside of this

body to settle the difficulty.

Art. 16. Any church, a member of this body, that is corrupt in practice or doctrine, after Gospel steps have been taken to reclaim it, and it persists in its course, shall no longer be a member of this body, and the reason in full shall be published in the minutes. Any church failing to represent by letter or messengers: two successive years, shall be visited by suitable admonition, and if it neglects to represent the third year, it shall be dropped from this Association.

Art. 17. All visiting ministers shall be welcomed to seats among us,

but not allowed to vote.

Art. 18. The Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the members present. Provided such amendments shall be submitted on the 1st day of the sitting of the Association and adopted on a subsequent day.
