

# PROCEEDINGS

Route 1, Wadesboro, N. C., Oct. 16, 1929

Pursuant to the adjournment of the previous session, held with the Ebenezer Baptist church, on Salisbury St.. Wadesboro, N. C., the Zion Missionary Baptist Association met in its 57th annual session, with the Brown Creek Baptist church today. Rev J A Little, pastor, Rev J W Diggs, Moderator, presiding. Promptly at 11:10 a.m., the moderator called the house to order, and requested Rev T C Dunlap to conduct the praise services. Hymn No. 214 was sung. Prayer by Rev B F McManus. 2nd hymn No. 131, "O for a closer walk with God," etc. Prayer by brother W M Allen. Praise services closed.

Time having arrived for the introductory sermon, Rev J C Ellerbee, accompanied by Revs W H Horne, H I Quick

and B J Sturdivant, took seats in the rostrum.

Rev Horne lined hymn No. 553. Rev H I Quick read the Scriptures from Paul's 1st letter to the Corinthians 13 chap. Prayer was offered by Rev B J Sturdivant. 2nd hymn No. 594. The moderator presented the speaker, in the person of Rev J C Ellerbee, to preach the opening sermon, who announced as a text for the occasion 1st Corinthians 13:13, "Now abideth faith, hope and charity; but the greatest of these is charity. The preacher said in part. The address was timely, thoughtful and full of information. After a few remarks on the address by Rev L W Wertz, a motion prevailed to refer it to a committee on moderator's address, viz: Revs H I Quick, B B Sturdivant, W H Horne, B F Mc-Manus, J A Little, Bros S M Marshall and L C Phillips.

The Cor. Sec. made his report. The report was adopted.

The following brethren were appointed committee to consider and report its finding on the proposed Constitution of the Baptist State Convention, viz: W H Horne, J T Ratliff, J F Davis, G W Baucum, B F McManus, J A Little, C C Horne. The committee on revision of the Constitution of Zion Association submitted its report. Motion prevailed to accept the report and make the adoption of the same a special

order for Friday morning.

An invitation was extended to visitors, and the following were recognized: Revs P C Covington. L W Wertz, E D Womack, A D Boatman and J T Williams of the Pee Dee Association, and Rev J W I Tunstell of the A M E Z church.

Revs Covington and Tunstell made remarks. "Together let us sweetly live," etc., was sung, and the benediction

was pronounced by Rev W H Horne.

# NIGHT SESSION

Praise services conducted by Revs B J Sturdivant, Jas Horne and J H Spencer. After the praise services, the moderator announced that the local program will be taken up.

Miss Lucy Broadaway was mistress of ceremony and

the program followed.

Welcome address on part of the church, by C R Smith, On part of the Women's Circle, by Mrs Catherine Crowder. On the part of the ministry by Rev J A Little.

The addresses revealed the fact that extensive preparations had been made for our entertainment, and we were

assured of a pleasant session.

Prof. C C Horne on behalf of 5,600 members of Zion Association accepted the welcome extended. In his response he referred to the incident when the word welcome was first spoken on the American continent, After leaving Wadesboro a year ago he said toiling amidst storms and shipwrecks, we weary toilers, were glad to hear that word which would give us an opportunity to rest.

Rev B F McManus, accompanied by Rev C W Marshall took a seat in stand to preach a sermon. Rev Marshall

lined hymn "Come holy spirit heavenly dove,"

Rev McManus arose announced as a text Prov. 3:3, "Her ways are ways of pleasantness and all her paths are peace." In his discourse he endeavored to electrify his hearers with the message. He closed by singing "Drink the living water which Jesus has," etc. Prayer by Rev Marshall. Rev J C Ellerbee lifted the collection. Am't \$11.05. Benediction by Rev James Horne.

and ready for business.

On motion the minutes of yesterday and last night were

read and approved.

By the ruling of the moderator, the matter of adopting the committee's report on Constitution be taken up now

instead of to-morrow as was decided yesterday.

The clerk re-read the report. All went well until we got to the 11th article. After much discussion and explanation, the report was adopted by a vote of 72 to 21. By motion of Bro G W Baucum the adoption was made unanimous. By motion the time be extended 30 minutes to listen to the delegate to the Lot Cary Convention. Rev Davis made the report, and in pleading with the delegates to stand by the cause of missions, the Holy Spirit came

and bare witness to the message. Blessed Jesus guide me, etc., was sung and the benediction was pronounced by Rev J F Davis.

## AFTERNOON SESSION

The Association re-assembled. Praise service conducted by Rev B J Sturdivant and Bro W S Jackson. Music Prayer by Bro W M Williams. 2nd hymn, "I love thy kingdom Lord," etc. Prayer by Bro S A. Rhodes. The house was announced open and ready for business.

The committee to consider the proposed Constitution of the Baptist State Convention made the following report. "We recommend that we send a messenger to the Convention at Charlotte, N. C., to sit in council with the commit-

tee on Constitution. Respectfully submitted.

Your committee, W H Horne, Chairman.
On motion the report was received, and the following brethren were elected delegates, Revs J W Diggs, J F Davis, J T Ratliff and Bros L C Phillips and A L Leak.

Rev L W Wertz came forward and entertained us with an interesting address on the subject, "Wise as a serpent." This discourse was very interesting, and was enjoyed by all. He emphasized economy and thrift, saving among our group.

Mrs T C Beam, colored, supervisor for Anson County, was introduced, and made remarks. She also asked that a donation be made to the general teacher's fund in Africa, A collection of \$3.29 was lifted and turned over to her.

The Women Convention made its report through Mrs A C Robinson its president, as follows—amount given State Convention \$30.00; Lot Cary Convention \$10.00, Womens Convention \$25.00; Zion Association \$30.00.

Total paid to the mission causes \$95.00. Benediction by

Rev P. P. Pegues.

## NIGHT SESSION

The Association re-assembled, moderator presiding Praise services conducted by Rev A D Boatman, and Bro G W White as follows: 'I love thy kingdom Lord,' etc. Prayer by Bro W A Kersey, Second hymn 239. Prayer by Rev C W Marshall.

A spiritual was sung. Prayer by E Marsh. The

moderator announced the house open and in order for business.

Bro A L Leak discussed the subject, "Why should

the Association help weak churches."

He said in part, that every small group of our people set up as a church was not necessarily a weak church. When conditions waranted it, and there was necessarily a weak church, then it is the duty of the Association to help such group. The Bible commands it Stengthened the cords that be.

An invitation was extended to visitors. Dr W W Blair, presiding Elder of the Wadesboro District A. M. Z. church, Rev L R Williams of the same church and Rev S S Thomas of the Pee Dee Association, all came forward and were made welcome. All made remarks.

Dr B J Brawly, Raleigh, N. C., was presented as the representation of Prof. W C Craver. He came forward and in a strong speech laid the claims of Shaw before our people. He also solicited pledges for the Shaw campaign.

The session adjourned with the benediction by Rev J

T Williams.

# AFTERNOON SESSION

The Association was called to order by the moderator. He requested brothers J Q Robinson and Malon Phillips to conduct the praise services. After singing one number, prayer was offered by brother Andrew Redfearn.

# MODERATOR'S ANNUAL ADDRESS

APPENDIX

Dear Brethren, Ministers and Co-Workers-

During the past 2 years of the occupancy of the high office of moderator of this our beloved old Association, I have never felt more keenly the responsibility which this office involves than I do at this session. Circumstances and vicissitudes, both good and ill, have marked the labors of the year now closing and bring sensibly to my rememberance the famous statement "Uneasy lies the head that wears the crown." Experiences have taught me that as the work expands, my problems and difficulties multiply. However, two great facts has kept away discouragement, faith in God and the consciousness that I have the hearty co-operation of each delegate and pastor that make up this Association and the loyal support of the brethren who are working for their Master in kingdom building.

We therefore, come before you today happy and hopeful, happy, because our Master has led by day and by night by a pillar of cloud and a pillar of fire. Hopeful because of the increasing enthusiasm and the gracious

sacrifice you are making. I greet you comrades, in the name of the Lord, and stand ready to pledge a new my life with yours to carry on the work so well begun by our fathers, by the preaching of the Gospel of Jesus It is useless to state that we are a distinct denomination, preaching "One Lord, one faith, and one baptism," and we are determined that nothing shall move us to change this course. Our supreme work and mission is to magnify the Christ and his last great command "Go ve into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." This is the biggest object before the ministry and the christian workers. Preach lesus. We solicit the hearty co-operation of any and all regular ordained Baptist ministers in the prosecution of the work of the Master, to join us in the evangelizing the world for God and Christ. This Association was organized by the founders in the spirit of co-operation, In my last message to you a year ago, I pleaded with you, and urged that all auxiliaries co-operate, and in the constructing of our constitution we should insert this word "Co-operation." We hate no class of Baptist brethren regardless from whence they come. We love all and are praying that some day we will be one in the promotion of the kingdom of Jesus Christ, and the world shall be our field and not associational lines. Brethren, we cripple the cause when we wrangle, dispute, devour, and for personal greed split churches and scatter the youth of the churches by our selfish ambition for fame, and neglect the great duties as leaders, when we fail to let the people say whom they desire for their shepherd. No church can prosper without a pastor, and no pastor can succeed without the co-operation of every member in his parish,

We must some how cease contention, if we hope to permenent service in the world for good, We are filled with amazement to know that some ministers and laymen are objecting to our co-operation with the other Associations, and Baptist ministers in particular, who were not born among us, and because they do not bear associational "trade marks" on their backs, the doors of our churches are in a large number closed against them. Our doors should stand open to any regular ordained Baptist minis-

ter who is in good standing in the Association of which he is a member, and in good and regular standing in the church to which he belongs. If his life is clean and his character is not questionable, and he being a man of upright integrity, our doors should stand open to receive them, and we should heartily invite them to come in and help spread the kingdom of Jesus Christ. Let us not unite on men, brethren, but on Jesus Christ. But let it be understood that we are not clamoring for whiskey heads, and men of immoral lives to come. Every door should be closed against them until they are converted. It is sad to say, it seems that some leaders and churches are not satisfied with clean men; they will not rest until they get one

of the later type.

Financial Needs--Brethren, we can not run our Association without some money, and this money will have to come from the churches, the Sunday Schools and other auxiliaries in the bounds of the Associational field. must realize more fully the moral obligation that we owe to foreign missions, Shaw University and girls education. In our budget for the year now closing, we pledged to make this the banner year of the Association. Brethren we have not come up to our pledge. We pledged to raise \$750. set this as our goal. We have raised and donated the following from the various bodies. From the Association \$221.25 from the Joint Meeting \$22.00, from the Sunday School Convention \$219.46, and from the women's work \$51.00 total raised and donated for the various objects as designated by the Association \$513.71. You can readily see from the above figures, we have not come up to our pledge. We have fallen short of the goal \$226.29. This ought not to be. We should have reached the mark. We should not let little petty misunderstandings cause us to lag in the discharge of our duty to the work.

We must support the cause of missions, or we should cease to call ourselves Missionary Baptist. The very name in itself means to go, send or carry the message of peace to those in benighted lands, both at home and in the foreign fields. The missionaries on the foreign fields must be cared for as well as those who are on the home field. Shall we not do our part in this big program for the Mas-

ter. There is enough money spent in illicited whiskies, gas and oil for big times by church members to pay the salary of several fields work. If we will succeed as a race, we will have to cease the desecration of the Sabbath and slothfulness on the part of a large number of the church members and pay God His just dues. Our young men who are planning to enter the ministry should be encouraged by an annual donation from this Association each year, that they might better equip themselves from a lit-The age as you know are asking for a piepared ministry, and unless they are prepared for the work they will not succeed. It is impossible for them to keep abreast with the age unless they are prepared for the job. You will agree with me when I say they can not make it now as they used to, with a mourn, and jump; they can't sing it out for when the noise is over, the people is still looking for some food for thought, so you can see we need money for this cause if no other. The young women of our race need to be prepared to do religious work among the people at home and abroad. We should prepare them work in their home church and community. The State is doing great things for our race, but brethren, they are not teaching them the great duty they owe to God and their fellowman. This must be taught by consecrated men and women in denominational schools. As we elevate the pew we must elevate the pulpit. So let us help the young men who are entering the ministry until they tell they can make it. They may open their mouth, and think God will fill it for them. Yes, he will, but it will be air. Young men prepare for the task that is before you, if you desire to enter ministry.

Visits--Brethren, I have visted the Sunday School Convention at Poplar Springs. At this session I found at its head the Rev J T Ratliff. As you know this was the first session of the Convention presided over by him. You will co-inside with me when I say, there was no mistake made by the delegates and pastor in placing this honor upon him. I observed that his manner was in keeping with modern methods of doing Sunday School work. I am asking each pastor and Supt. to co-operate with him, and if we do, he will make this one of the best Conventions in

the State.

The womens meeting was marvelous. When I arrived I

found the atmosphere filled with the spirit of love and hospitality. I found at the head of this meeting our beloved sister, Annie Robinson with an efficient group of officers and a band of zealous working women, busy working for the Master. I never was more surprised in all my life to see the work that was being done by those good women. We cannot keep the church alive without them, and each pastor should give them their loyal support at all times; speak encouragement of the work they are doing at home

and in the State and foreign fields.

Brother ministers and christian workers, an irresistible compulsion, generated by God's Spirit, command us to move up. We are not only called upon to give the gospel to the heathen whose faith clings to some false god of wood or stone. We are demanded to help those at our door. The crime wave was never as it is now. Our young men and young women in a large measure have turned their backs on the church and God, and gone wild after the pleasure of this world, the dance, the car rides, rum bottle, and other evils that is damning their souls and destroy their lives. The alarming question is, will the christian church be able to stop this wave of crime retrograding & bring them to the fold of Christ? We cannot divide. We must unite in the home, the church, Sunday School and all religious auxiliaries. I therefore plead with you for unity of purpose in the Association, for therein lies the victory. We must stand together, and not let the banner of Jesus Christ trail in the dust.

Beloved pastor, you have been chosen, we trust by the Almighty, to preach. You are charged with a grave responsibilty to preach the everlasting gospel in all the world. Pastors you hold the key to the success of this Association and to bring the world to God, and should you evade your duty to God, you are not worthy to wear the badge of a preacher. It might be some of you would do more, but you are waiting until some seemingly wrong as you think is rectified. If you will wait until every thing gets as you or I would like for it to be, we will never do anything for Christ, for when we came here we found something in the world wrong, and when we depart for the beyond, there will

still be someting wrong. So let none of us complain but let each do his duty, and look to the Lord for reward. I desire to make the following recommendations:

1. That we continue our support to the Baptist State Convention, Shaw University, and all our National Bodies, and represent as far as possible in them each year individually, Churches, Sunday Schools, Women Auxiliaries.

2. That all monies collected by the various bodies be reported to the Association annually that we might ascertain the exact amount that is raised and paid out.

3. That we continue our budget plan, and the Association adopt a system of 5c. extra per member annual-

ly for ministerial and girl's education.

4. That each minister and deacon join the Annuity Society and that the ministers confine their labors to two churches, in order that they might be able to do more efficient work among their members, and to encourage the work in the various auxiliaries of their churches.

## CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be known as the Zion Missionary Baptist Association.

Art. 2. The primary object of this Association shall be to increase the efficiency of the churches in our bounds: to assist the churches in the erection of suitable buildings for worship; to help the weak churches in the support of an evangelical ministry; to co-operate with the general Baptist State Convention of North Carolina in doing educational and missionary work.

Art 3. This Association shall be composed of regular Baptist Churches in good standing, and in full practice of the faith, discipline, ordinance, and of the doctrine of regular Baptist denominations. Also of the regular ministers in good standing in the churches in the bounds of the Association, and messengers elected annually by the churches of this body.

Art. 4. The officers of this Association shall be a moderator, vice-moderator, recording and corresponding secretaries, treasurer, auditor and executive committee of seven; and an ordaining board. The moderator, recording secretary and treasurer shall constitute three members of the executive committee. These officers shall be elected annually, and hold their office until their successors are elected.

Art. 5. The moderator shall preside at all meetings, and enforce order in accordance with the Constitution and Baptist usages. He shall settle points of order, give casting vote in case of a tie, and appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered by the body. In the absence of the moderator, the vice-moderator shall preside with all the rights and prerogatives of the moderator.

Art. 6. The recording secretary shall perform the usual duties belong-

ing to such office. He shall draw all orders on the treasury.

Art. 7. The corresponding secretary shall have charge of all correspondence between this Association and other bodies. All communications and appeals intended for the churches of this body shall be sent through this office. No communication will be considered valid unless signed by the moderator and attested by the corresponding secretary.

He shall be ex-officio secretary to the executive committee.

Art. 8. Sec. 1. The treasurer shall hold all monies and valuable papers belonging to this Association. He shall pay orders only when drawned upon proper vouches, approved by this body, signed by the Moderator and counter-signed by the clerk of this Association. He shall be treasurer of the Union Meeting. He shall, before entering upon duty, give a bond, approved by the executive committee, to the full security of the Associational property in his hands. He shall make an annual report to the Association. Sec. 2. The auditor shall, 15 days prior to the sitting of the Association, carefully examine the books and vouchers of the treasurer containing his transaction for the current year, and his certificate to the facts in the case shall be attached to the treasurer's report. He shall keep on file in his office a copy of said report. In case of a change, he shall turn over to his successor all papers and reports in his office.

Art. 9. The executive committee shall have full charge of the working of the Association when it is not in session. They shall draw the plan of operation for the field, approved by the Association. All claims on the treasury of this body must be presented to the executive committee. They shall meet as often as called together by the moderator and corresponding secretary.

They shall make full report of their work to the Association through the corresponding secretary. Three members shall constitute a quorum.

Art. 10. The ordaining board shall have the supervision of the ecclesiastical department of the Association. They shall examine all applicants for ordinations, and pass on the credentials of all members of this body. All requests for ministerial aid from this Association must be recom-

mended by the ordaining board

Art. 11. Any regular Baptist church may continue its membership in this Association by the payment of thirteen (13) cents per capita for each of its members to be used as follows: Five cents for general expenses; 4 cents for education, 2 cents for missions and 2 cts. for weak churches as set forth in Article 2. The money paid into the Union Meeting as representing tee shall be a part of the 13 cents. Provided any church may send a voluntary contribution to the Association or Union Meeting for any object they so desire. Said contributions shall be kept separate and distinct, and be applied only to the object designated by said church or churches. Provided further, any church failing to comply with the requirements of this Constitution will not be considered in good standing and will not be allowed to enroll until satisfaction is rendered to this body by said church.

Art. 12. Newly constituted churches, or churches dismissed from other deliberated bodies of the same faith and order, may be admitted into this Association by sending their messengers to an annual meeting with letters of petition and agreeing to the declaration of principles laid down

in God's word

Art. 13. The members convened in this Association shall have no

ecclesiastical or disciplinary power over the churches.

Art. 14. The Association shall meet annually and be composed of not more than three messengers from each church, with a letter giving the condition of the church. Said meeting to convene on Wednesday before the 3rd Lord's day in Oct. Open with an introductory sermon, and continue in session until all business is completed. The Union Meetings shall meet on Friday before each 5th Sunday, or as often as may deem practicable. Should there fail to be a place selected for the Union meeting at the session, the executive committee shall find a location and immediately notify the field through the corresponding secretary.

Art. 15. No difficulty between church or churches shall be heard by this Association until gospel steps have been fully taken outside of this body

to settle the difficulty.

Art. 16. Any church, a member of this body, that is corrupt in practice or doctrine, after gospel steps have been taken to reclaim it, and it persists in its course, shall no longer be a member of this body, and the reason in full shall be published in the minutes. Any church failing to represent by letter or messenger two consecutive years, shall be visited by suitable admonition, and if it neglects to represent the 3rd year, it shall be dropped from this Association.

Art. 17. All visiting ministers shall be welcomed to seats among us, but

not allowed to vote.

Art. 18. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the members present. Provided such amendments shall be submitted on the 1st day of the sitting of the Association and adopted on a subsequent day.
