## CONSTITUTION

Art. I. This Convention shall be known as the Woman's Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Art. II. It's object shall be to organize and improve Baptist Home Mission Circles, Young Women's Christian Associations, Baptist Young People's Unons, Bible bands, and Sunshne bands in all the Baptist Churches and Institutions of the State; to support at least one missionary on the foreign field; to assist in supporting the Roanoke Collegiate Institute, located at Elizabeth City, N. C., the Orphan Asylum, located at Oxford, N. C.; aid the cause of missions, home and foreign, and to awaken a general religious education among both old and young.

Art. IV, Sec. 1. The officers of this Convention shall be a President, two Vice Presidents; Recording and Corresponding Secretaries, Treasurer, Auditor, and an Executive Board of nine members and two State Missionaries.

Sec: 2. The President shall preside over all the meetings and perform such other duties as belong to her office, and on eof th Vice Presidents shall perform the same duties in her absence, and assist her in all of her duties.

Sec. 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep a faithful record of all the proceedings of the Convention, prepare the minutes for the press, publish and distribute the programs.

Sc. 4 The Corresponding Secretary shall write to each organization that represents in the Convention, or may represent, do general missionary work on the field, and report annually to the Convention.

Sec. 5. The Treasurer shall hold all money belonging to the Convention, and pay out same only by an order from the Recording Secretary, signed by the President. Her books heall be open for inspection at any time, by any member of the Executive Board.

Sec. 6. The Auditor shall before each annual meeting examine all the receipts, disbursements, papers and books of the Treasurer and her report shall be attached to the Treasurer's report.

Sec. 7. The Executive Board shall take a sufficient bond of the Treasurer to cover the money in treasury or may be in treasury, and shall have full power to carry out any unfinished business of the Convention during its recess, appoint missionaries, fiv their salaries and appont their field of labor.

Art. V. That we represent in the month of September with the Woman's National Convention by sending one or two delegates to same, and that we hold a mid-year meeting during the month of May.

Art. VI. This Convention shall meet annually at such time and place as may be decided by the Convention.

Art. VII. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any regular meeting by a two-third vote of all the members present.

## **BY-LAWS**

I. This Convention shall be opened and closed with prayer.

II. Not more than one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the President with the words, "Madam President."

III. The person speaking shall strictly adhere to the subject and shall in no case reflect upon any other member who spoke before her.

IV. The person speaking shall not be interrupted unless she is out of order.

V. No sister shall absent herself from the Convention without first getting permission.

VI. No person shall be at liberty to speak during the time another sister is speaking.

VII. The President shall not interrupt any member unless she violates the rules.
