SALISBURY, N. C., AUGUST 22, 1903.

SUNDAY, AUGUST 23, 1903.

The Brethren elected to preach met at the Stand. Elder P. D. Gold introduced the services of the day, and preached from Isaiah 9th chapt. 6-7 verses. Elder J. A. Ashburn followed from last chapt. 17 verse of Rev.

23. Called on Presbyteries to report; no report.

24. We return thanks to God, the brethren, sisters and friends for hospitality and kindness during this meeting.

25. Adjourned to time and place above mentioned.

CIRCULAR LETTER—1903.

The Primitive Baptists of the Abbott's Creek Association for many years have furnished the readers of her minutes with a let-

ter written by some one of her members, which is right. This gives us a chance to hear from brethren in different parts of the Association, and gives the writer an humble boldness, as servants of King Emmanuel. We, the Abbott's Creek Association, hold but one general meeting in each year. I, for one, am satisfied with this. We learn that many years ago the people went up to worship once a year. I think those people were Primitive Baptists. This duty of writing has fallen to my lot this year. I have nothing to say, only I fear that I may make some mistake. This keeps me humble. The cause is precious. I want to write only what will be to the honor of Him who rules the army of Heaven. I desire that the little ones may be comforted. I want to say to the poor and afflicted people that we should rejoice, praise and bless the Lord that it is as well with us as it is, when we see so many inventions of man, which are calculated to lead the weak children astray, but we should be glad that there is not one of his children to be left. C., located eight miles west of Linwood, eleven miles north of Salisbury, twelve miles southwest from Lexington, commencing on Saturday before the fourth Sabbath in August A. D. 1905, Elder P. W. Williard to preach the introductory sermon, Elder W. T. Broadway his alternate. Worship to commence at 11 o'clock.

21. Appointed the Clerk to superintend the printing of these minutes, and that we have 650 coppies printed and distribute them as usual.

22. The Clerk was allowed \$7 for services.

23. Called on Presbyteries to report. Elder W. T. Broadway reports that himself and with other ordained help proceeded to ordain brother O. M. Bain to the office of deacon. Also reports that himself, Elder Jesse Brown and Deacon A. P. Leach by request of the church at Sugg's Creek on the 8th day of November, 1903, proceeded to the ordination of Nathaniel Tucker to the office of deacon of said church, finding him orthodox in faith.

24. By request of A. P. Leach, the present Clerk of the Association, it is agreed that Brother A. L. Owen be appointed Assistant Clerk, as the present Clerk has served 33 years, and is feeble.

Preaching by Elders J. L. Mills, J. A. Crews and P. D. Gold. The words was preached in faithfulness to large congregations, and we hope will be as bread cast upon the water.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

To the Churches Composing the Association, sends GREETINGS:

Dear Brethren and Sisters:—According to appointment we send you this our Circular Letter, though I don't feel like I am worthy to attempt to write to you, but in Hebrews 4th chapter, 9th verse, we read that there remaineth therefore a rest to the people of God. Appointed the clerk to superintend the printing of these minutes and that we have 650 copies printed and distribute them as usual.

22nd. The clerk was allowed \$7.00 for his services.

23rd. Called on presbyteries to report; they report that Elders W. T. Broadway, J. A. Burch, Brothers A. Snider, H. Monsees and J. S. Norris, deacon, proceeded to ordain J. A. Monsees, W. R. Galemore, W. L. Young to the ministry. Also Brother W. L. Bouldin reported that Elders P. W. Willard, J. A. Ashburn and Deacon H. W. Cox, proceeded to ordain D. R. Pope to the office of deacon, to serve the church at Abbott's Creek. Also Brother W. L. Young reports that Elder W. T. Broadway and Deacon J. H. Deadman proceeded to ordain Brother J. H. Snider and J. B. Hulin to the office of deacon to serve the church at No Creek.

24th. Agreed that we have the names of our ministers and their postoffices printed with these minutes.

25th. The Association appoints Brethren Nathaniel Tucker, A. P. Leach to visit the churches at Brush Creek and Bear Creek to inquire why they failed to represent themselves in the Association.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

This the date of 1905, August the 21:

Dear Brethren and Sisters and Messengers and ministers of the Abbotts Creek Association:—Being appointed at our last Association to write what is called a circular letter, I now will try by the help of the Lord as I hope to write. Note the scripture Second Theslonians, first verse: Now we beseech you brethren by the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and by our gathering to gether unto him that ye be not soon shaken in mind or be troubled, neither by spirit nor by word nor by letter as from us as that the day of Christ is at hand. Let no man deceive you. We understand the apostle to here speak words of exhortation to the church and that first by the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. By our gathering to gether unto him and that for an express purpose the command is that ye be not soon shaken in mind or or be troubled neither by spirit nor by word; note this as a portion of the word of God by inspiration; all scripture is given by inspiration and is

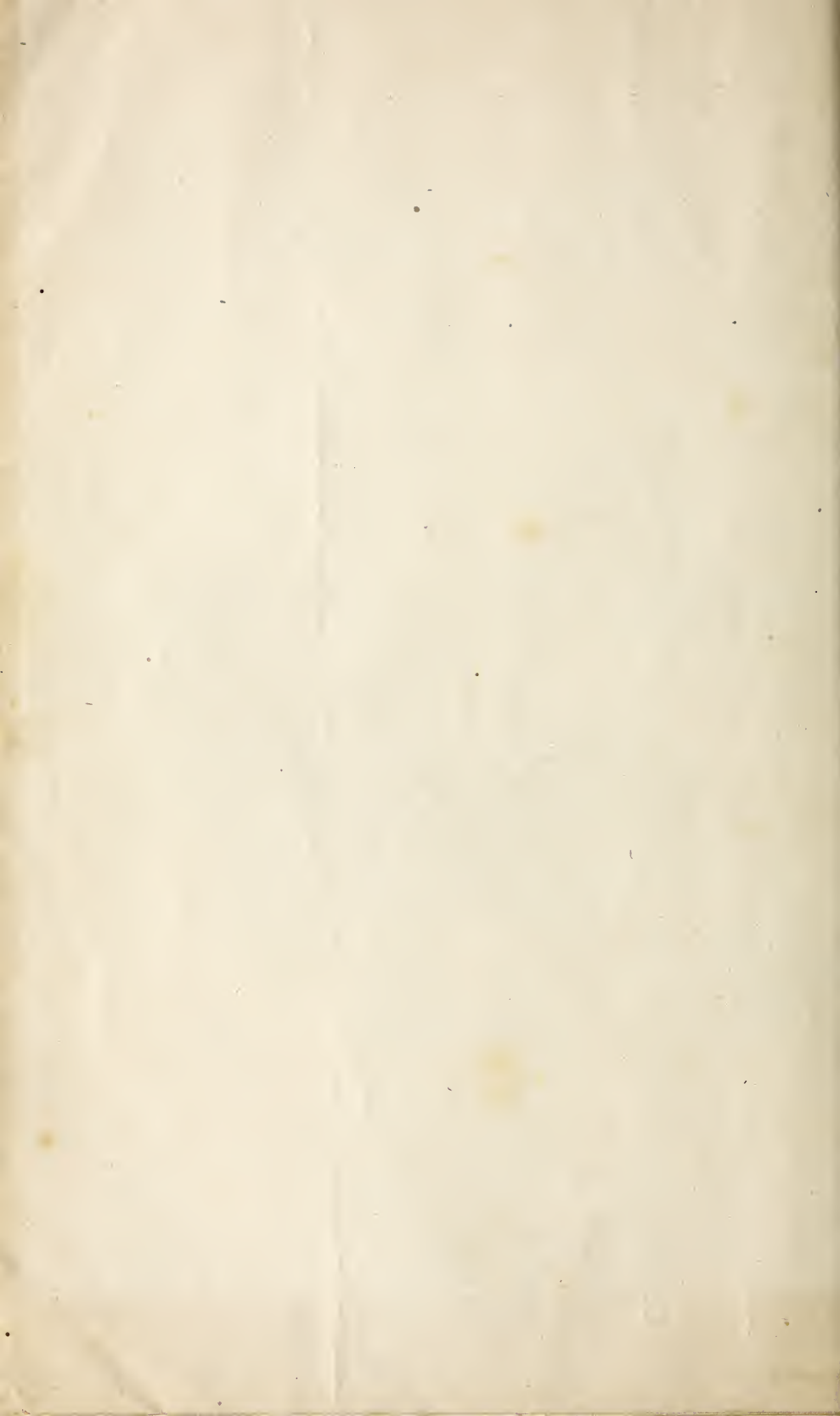
possible for doctrine and these words are as true to us to day as they were in the former days. Because God is one and the church is one and of one heart thus of one mind and all things are common with them and the apostle exhorts the church as a band of believers calling them brethren; to be brethren and sisters we must be born of one mother and the children of one father; then God is our father and wisdom is justified of all her children, then the church or the children of God by birth, born of God, have equal right one with another for there is no difference, for we are all one in Christ. Then my dear brethren is it not needful that we as children of God should come together, in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water; then it is by the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and by our gathering together in the communion of the spirit of God. God leads his children by his spirit and gathers them together in love and in union and in fellowship one with another. Then let us not be shaken in mind nor be troubled neither by spirit nor by word, but trust in God and hold fast our profession of faith and contend for the ancient landmark which our fathers have set by the guide of the spirit of God, for the word of God standeth sure, having this seal the Lord knoweth them that are his, then dear brethren let up never neglect the assembling ourselves together in our church meetings each month and our association each year, there to associate with each other of our sister churches in an associated capacity. So I commit this to your truth, may God the Father enable us his charge to keep that when our time is filled up with a pilgrim travail we may be able to say with the apostles we have fought the good fight of faith and hence forth there is a crown of righteousness laid up for us and not for us only, but for all them that love his appearing.

Pray for me. Your unworthy brother in hope.

Articles of Faith of This Association.

1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, the Word and the Holy Ghost.

2. We believe that the Scriptures of the old and the new Testaments are the word of God, and the only rule of Faith and Practice.

3. We believe in the doctrine of Original Sin.

4. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in, by his own free will and ability.

5. We believe in the doctrine of Election, that God chose his people in Christ before the foundation of the world.

6. We believe God's elect, who are sinners of Adam's fallen family, are in His good time effectually called and justified in the sight of God by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ received by faith alone, which faith is productive of good works.

7. We believe that the saints shall persevere in Grace and never fall finally away.

8. We believe baptism by emersion according to the Scriptures and the Lord's Supper are both ordinances of Jesus Christ, and belong to believers only.

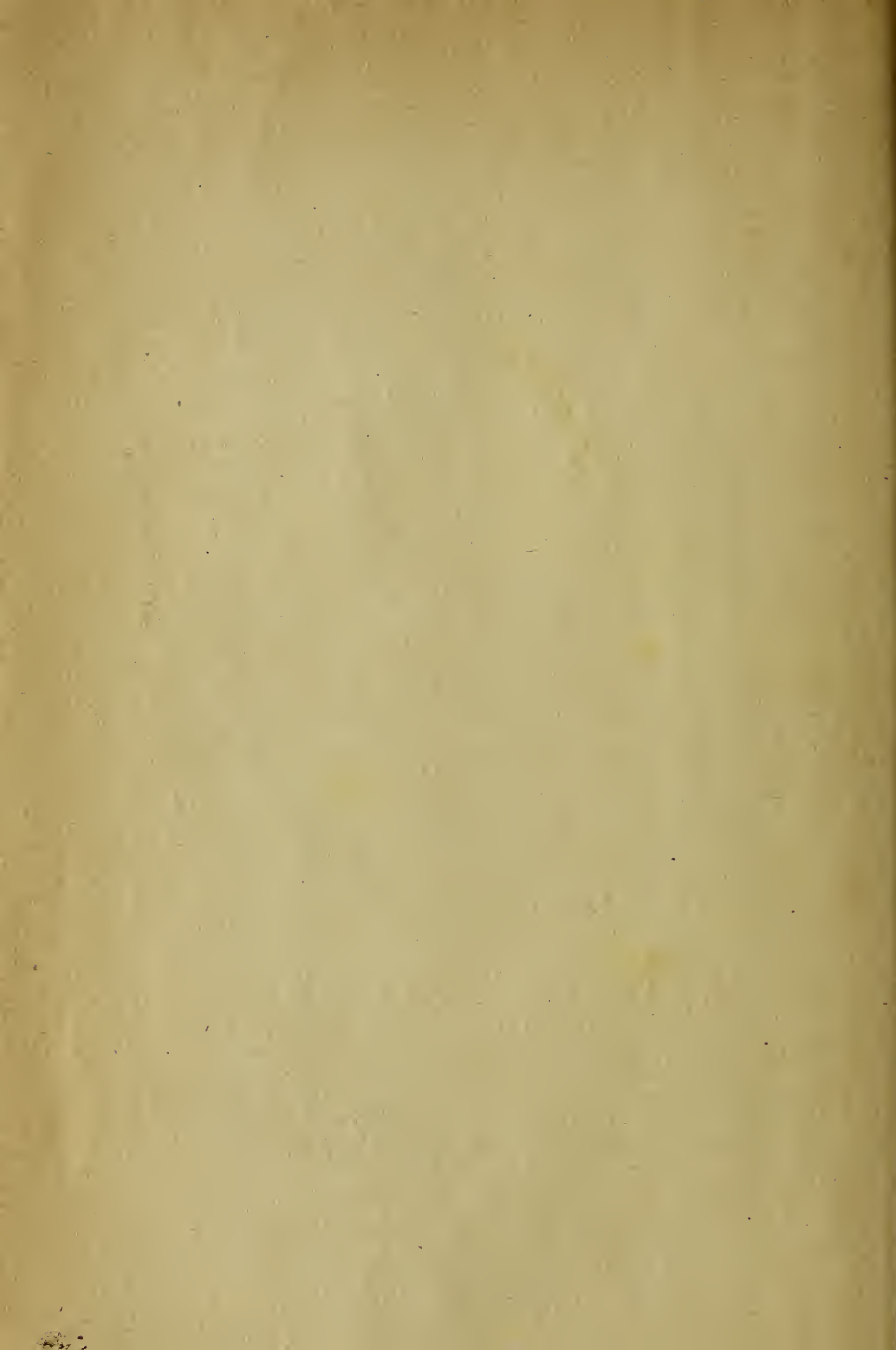

CIRCULAR LETTER.

at Cooleemee, N. C. August 6th, 1907.

Dear brethren and ministers and messengers, who may compose the Abbott's Creek Association, together with many brethren and sisters in relation with and according to the love and purpose of God through Christ—Being appointed by the Association to write a circular letter for our minutes of this session, August 1907, trusting in God that through the goodness of the spirit I may speak a word of comfort and edification in behalf of the cause of Christ in the salvation of the church. Is there not a cause? Yes, brother, there is a cause and God is the cause and not only the cause, but the author of our faith, and faith is belief and I believe, and therefore have I spoken, so brethren, I speak from a sense of feeling and impression. This is through the mighty working power of God which works in his children mightily, for God dwelleth in His children, and "I will dwell in them and walk in them, and I will be their God and they shall be my people."

Wherefore come out from among them and be ye separate saith the Lord. Cor. 6:16-17. The apostle is here treating on the word of exhortation and commandment to the church which was needful for the benefit of the church for God dwells in Zion and walks in Zion, which is the church, the pillar and ground of the truth, the habitation wherein God dwells.

This dwelling is in the power of God in the spirit or soul of the

man. The carnal or natural man is one in which the Holy Spirit dwells, in which is Christ in you, the hope of glory, the exercise of the spirit in us, in which is the spirit of God working in us to will and to do of his own good pleasure, thus commanding His children to come out from among such as are disorderly. We are not to suffer ourselves to be yoked together with unbelievers, but to be separate from all such as are false. Then the Lord says I will receive. Then dear brethren and sisters, let us cleanse ourselves from all things that are not pure, but hold fast in the form of sound words in the rule and order of the church as an Associational capacity, each church in the boundaries of an organized body of members of that same body under the church covenant and rule of decorum is an associational capacity. Now to be in order we must first be in peace among ourselves in an organized body and to keep in order is to keep the commandments of our Lord according to rule and example which we both feel and read in God's word.

Then dear brethren and sisters, let us examine ourselves and if we find ourselves out of order, then confess your faults one to another and come out from among them and be separate, then it is that God will receive us, and how pleasant it is for us to dwell together in the unity of the spirit. Then it is that God walks in his children of love, joy and gladness of heart, but when in disobedience and doubt, in fear and darkness, and coldness, how loathsome, how lost, how poor in this walk. I will walk in them. I will dwell in them. God dwells in his children, and walks in them for their good, both to will and to do his own good pleasure.

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This God does according to his purpose which he purposed in Himself, and to purpose in Himself is to purpose in Christ. Then Christ to make manifest the purposes of God must be born in the likeness of sinful flesh. This then brings about this warfare between the old man and between the new man, and dear brethren and sisters as the weapons of our warfare are not carnal but mighty, through God to the pulling down of strongholds, let us as good soldiers of the cross fight the fight of faith and live as pilgrims do.

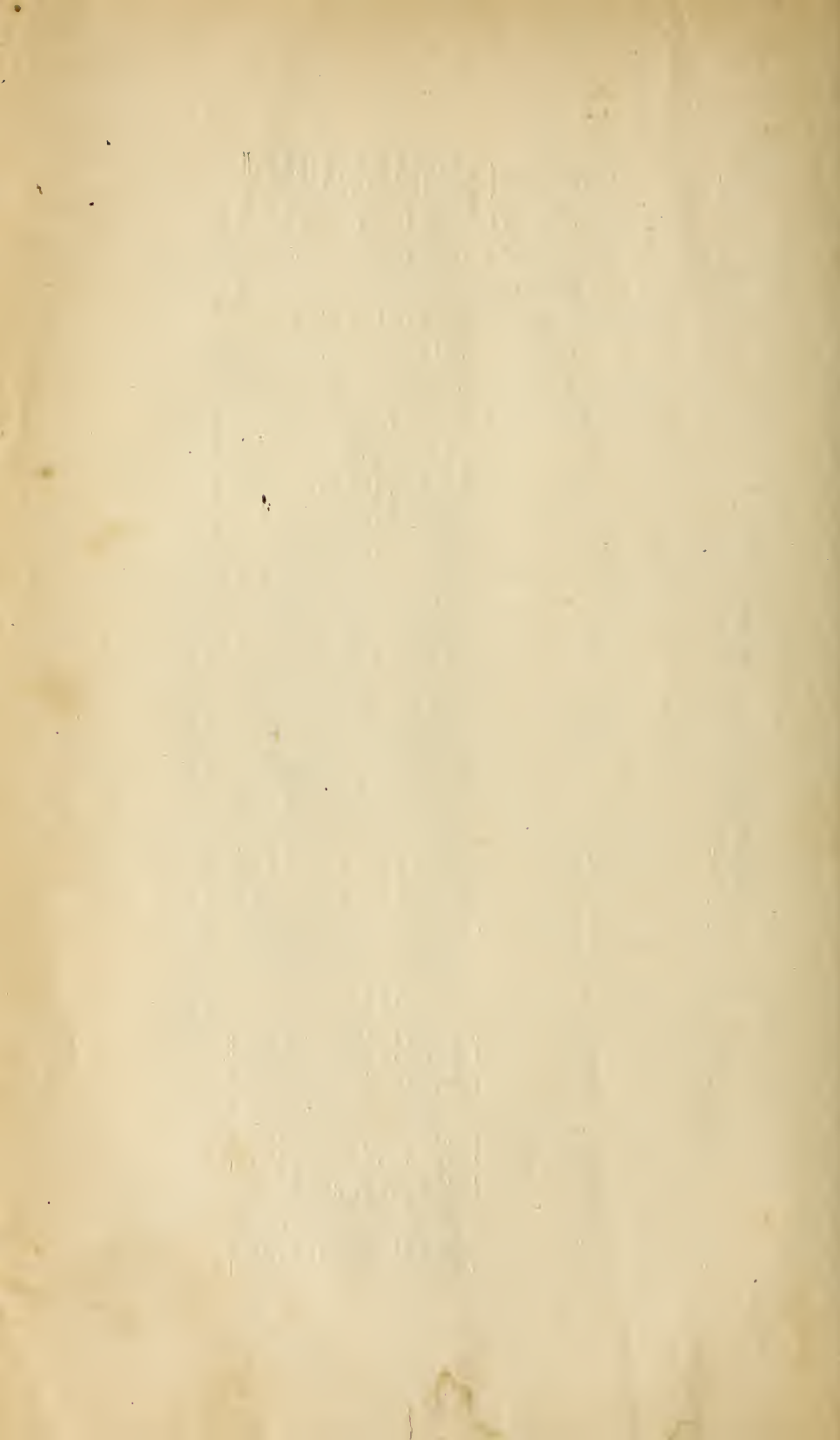

CIRCULAR LETTER.

To the Ministers and Messengers Composing the Abbotts Creek Association, of the Primitive Baptist Church:

Dear Brethren—Many of you are aware of the fact that I was appointed at the last session of this honorable body to write what is termed a circular letter. Oh! how I was filled with fear and trembling, so much that I could not render an excuse. While meditating upon the vastness of its importance, these thoughts settled steadfast in my mind, "If this action of the association is of the Lord, it will have the desired effect, if not of the Lord, it will do no good, but will be a stain upon her, and a blot upon the one who makes the attempt, through the power of his own wisdom and righteousness. With these thoughts as a preliminary, I will, with God's help present to your minds some beautiful figures in types as shadowing forth in the language of the wise man in his beautiful song in the fourth chapter and twelfth verse, it is recorded "A garden enclosed is my sister, my spouse; a spring shut up, a fountain sealed."

This to my mind represents the fountain that was opened in the house of King David and to the inhabitants of Jerusalem for sin and uncleanness. How wonderful is the construction of that garden, in it a spring shut up, a fountain sealed. We will here make an illustration. It is unlawful for any person to break a seal, except the person to whom it is directed. It is so in reference to our mails. Even the carrier is not allowed to open a sealed package. He may handle all the sealed packages and handle carefully the name and address, in discharge of his official duty. If he goes beyond his duty in opening the seal it makes him an offender, and he is liable to be punished by the law which protects

him in doing his duty. This sets forth the duties of those who are enclosed in the garden of God's grace. And to them only is it given to open the seal, which has already been opened. Then they are commanded to open the doors of their hearts and let the king of glory come in. To such, God has given this seal. He knoweth them that are his and when the knowledge of this seal is given, then to believe that God for Christ's sake has pardoned their sins; to such he gives the wa'er of that fountain sealed. Yes, sealed to them through the blood of the everlasting covenant, which is ordered in all thing. And sure they set this seal upon their heart that God is true and every man a liar. That is, all men who are born of woman are conceived in sin and brought forth in iniquity, and go forth from the womb speaking lies. All such as are described in holy writ, as speaking the language of their father, who was a liar from the beginning and abode not in the truth, has no right to take the privilege of claiming the power to drink of that spring that is shut up, of the fountain sealed.

Now, having set forth the condition of all men in nature, this condition by reason of sin power debars them of the privilege of even a desire to drink of such a fountain. And men in the bonds of sin are bound slaves to it. Such is the condition of all the human family born into this world. Now let us see if this excludes forever the possibility of one and all of partaking of a single sip of this spring of living water. No, thank God a remedy was prepared by the eternal mind of him who said, "I will do all my pleasures, my council shall stand." It was the pleasure of the mind of wisdom to prepare a remedy and a sure cure for such a horrible disease as sin, which has been inflicted upon all men. This glorious remedy was promised to the mother of all living, that thy seed shall bruise the serpent's head. and that blessed seed undoubtedly is Jesus, who was born of a woman, born under the law to redeem them who were under the law. In this seed of the woman, all the seed have access to the spring shut up, to this fountain sealed. All and every one of them being vessels of mercy afore prepared unto glory, all of those vessels of mercy have access to the inclosed garden, to the spring shut up, to the fountain sealed. Let us consider for a moment the security of all who are enclosed in this glorious garden. What is it enclosed with? I will emphatically declare it is the life of God. His wonderful garden occupied by the family of a great king, must of necessity be born of that

king, consequently born in this delightful garden of their father, which is of his own individual make up. No power was consulted no agent employed, not even the wisdom of the holy angels was sought, but all things were made ready by the holy king and the king's son, to bid the subjects of grace to come in to his garden. And the language is this "I am come into my garden, my sister, my spouse. I have gathered my myrrh with my spice. I have eaten my honey comb with my honey. I have drunk my wine with my milk. Eat O friends! Drink yea drink abundantly, beloved is the language of the builder and maker of this garden which is, "whosoever will let him drink of the water of life freely and whosoever shall drink of the water that I shall give, it shall be in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life." ' This fountain was opened upon Mount Cavalry, when they pierced his hands and his feet. 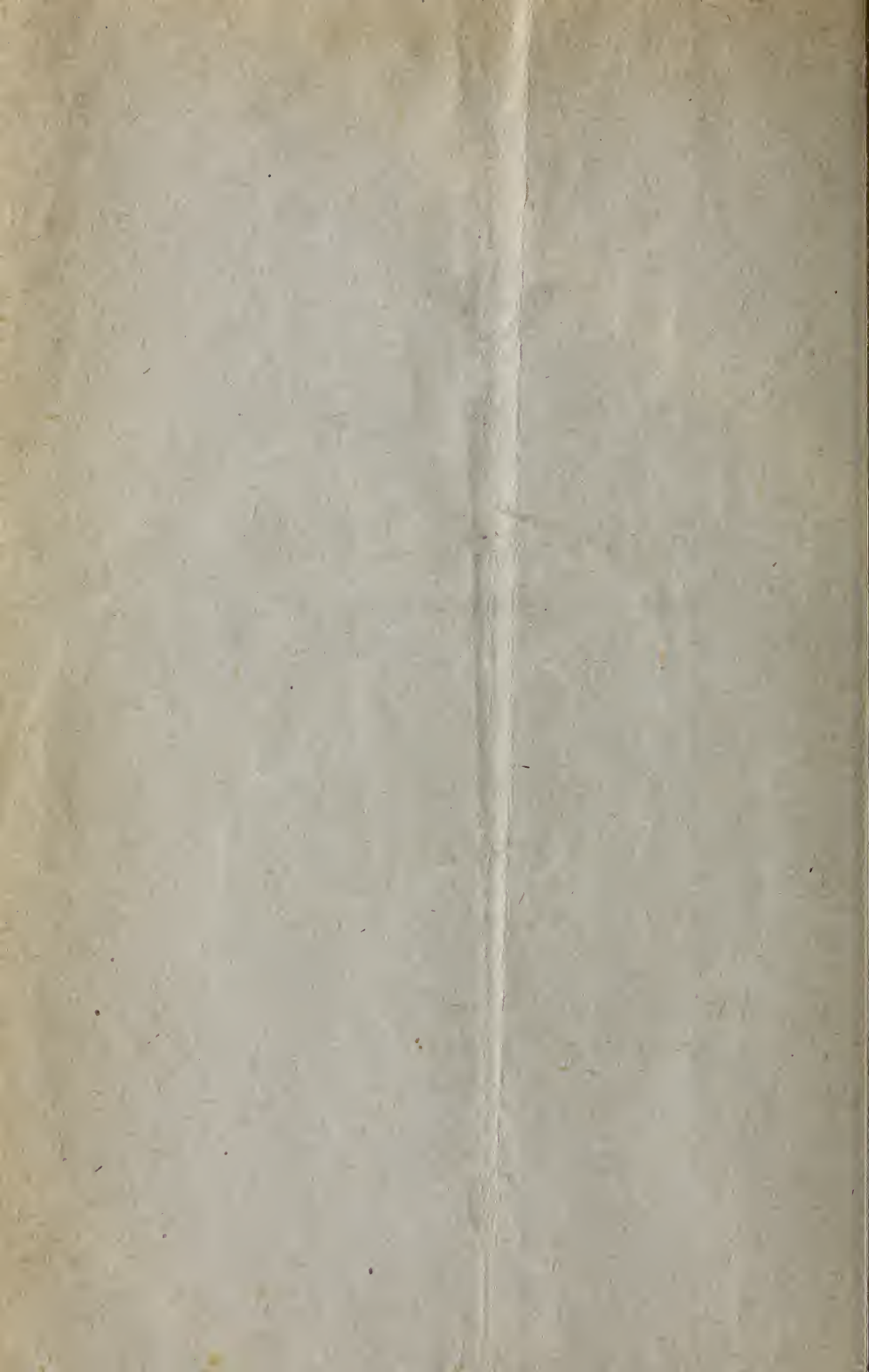

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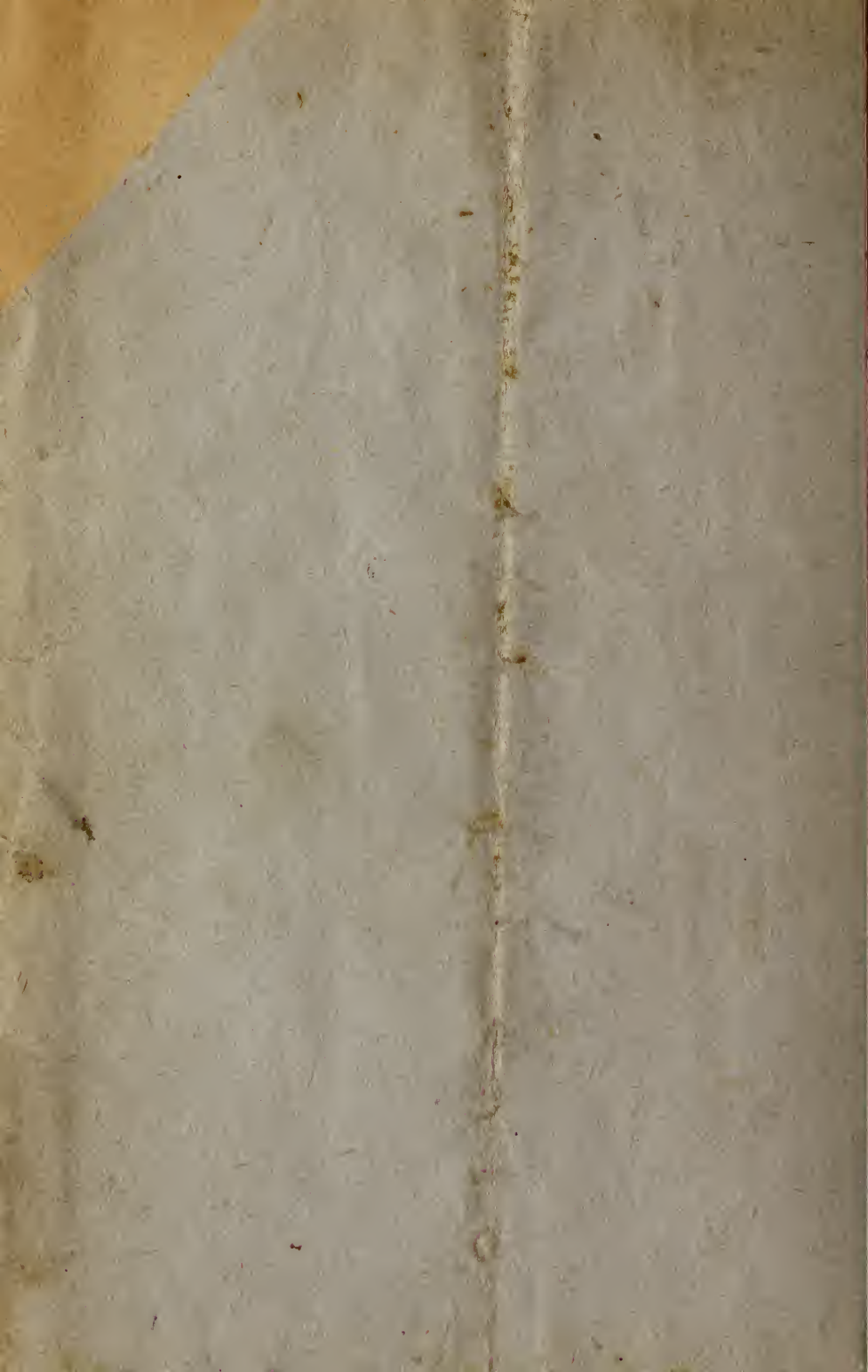

We received a file of minutes from Upper and Lower County Line, Little River, Contentnea, Kehukee, Bear Creek, Fisher's River and Salem Associations.

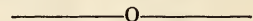
8. Called for Circular Letter. It was handed in and referred to Committee on Arrangements.

10. Appointed Brethren M. H. Hill and J. A. Williams as Committee on Finance.

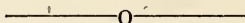

12. Adjourned until Monday morning at 9 o'clock. Dismissed by Elder P. W. Williard.



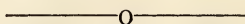
SATURDAY EVENING.

26. Agreed that, as Elder J. D. Draughn, of Mt. Airy, N. C., has severed his connection with the Pilgrim's Banner, we no longer hold

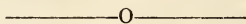
him in bonds for his connection with said paper. But we hold him in bonds for misrepresenting his standing in our body.

28. Adjourned to time and place mentioned.

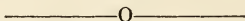

MONDAY'S PREACHING

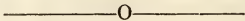

CIRCULAR LETTER.

To the most precious and lovely Brethren and Messengers and Elders, which shall sit in gospel order in an association together for the purpose of the worship of the true and living God:

As it seemed good to the minds of the association last session to appoint this servants to write what is termed a circular letter to be read and approved by the body and placed in the minutes of the Abbott's Creek Association, I hope to be under the power of the Spirit of God to speak to the praise and glory of God and to the edification of the saints, and herein may I be able to consider some things which may be of some comfort to us, as we believe there is but one God, who is the beginning and the ending; the creator of all things, visible and invisible, and rules in heaven and in earth; one law giver, the man Christ Jesus, who is our life, and light, and without him we are nothing and less than nothing, but vanity and vexation of spirit. This declares our communion with Christ. This carries all the ordinances of the church in the Gospel order of discipline of every church of God, and where a church is in union and communion with each other there it is that that church is in union and communion with God, and there are not words sufficient to express the happy state of that church. So, dear brethren, strive to enter in at the straight gate, and endeavor to keep the spirit of unity in the bonds of peace, and beware of all such things as may be calculated to disturb the peace of the saints, either in the order of the church or in the order of the association, and shun every appearance of evil; love the brotherhood. Brethren, do not go to the house of God to wrangle or quarrel. Evil communication corrupts good manners, but a meek and quiet spirit is in the sight of God of great price. So, dear brethren, fare you well. If you can think of me, pray that the Lord may deliver us from the evil of unreasonable men. Your brother in hope.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

As I was appointed by the Association to write a circular letter for our next minutes, I will now try to perform my duty, not knowing what to write, but if I only could be blessed of the good Lord to write what competent judges would consider a good letter, I feel like I would be thankful, to his great name and satisfied.

The 25th chapter of Psalms and 14th verse reads thus: "The secret of the Lord is with them that fear him."

It seems to me that I have seen a great beauty and mystery in these precious words spoken by King David, a man after Gods own heart. We will try to inquire what the secret of the Lord is. 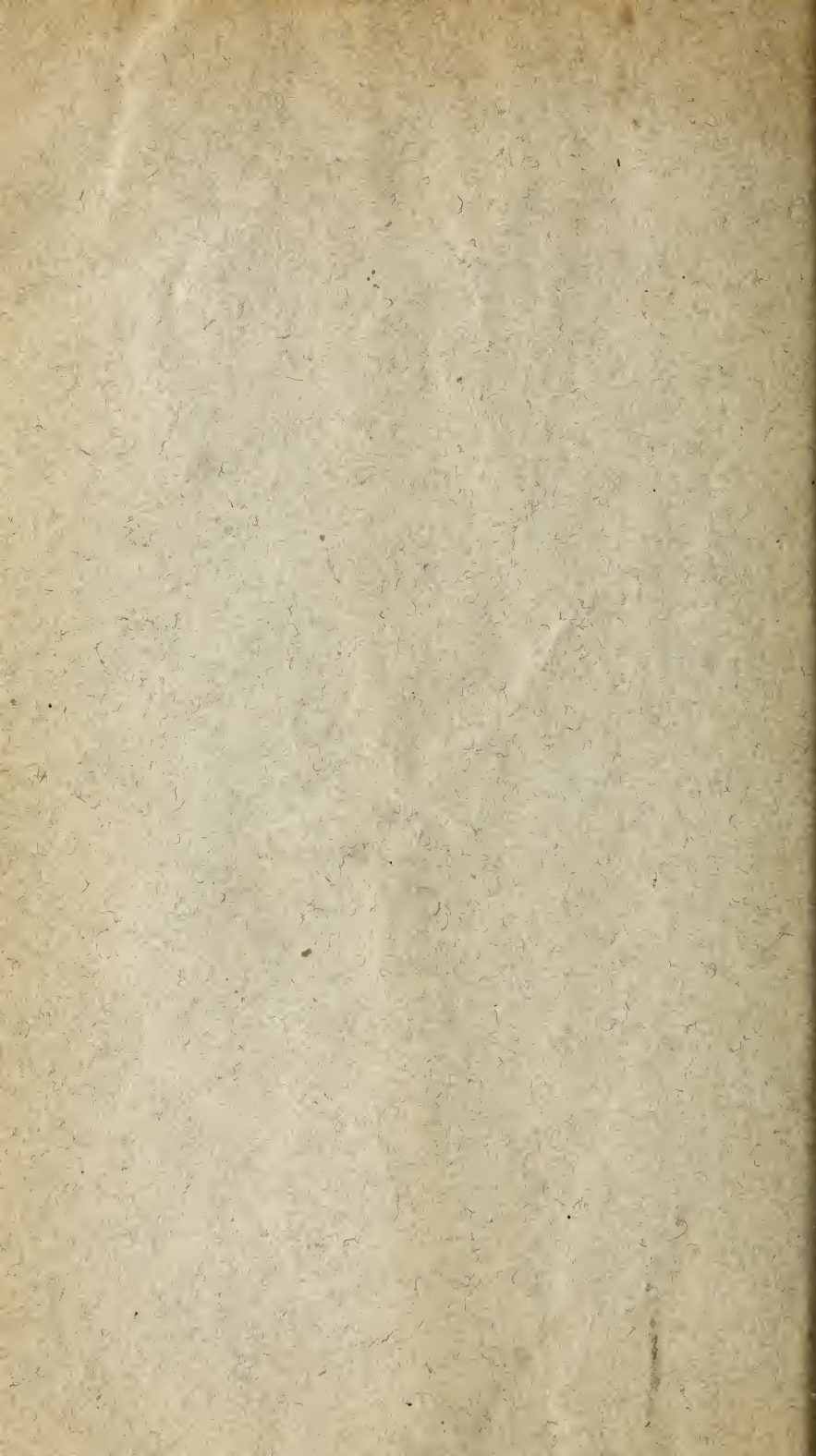

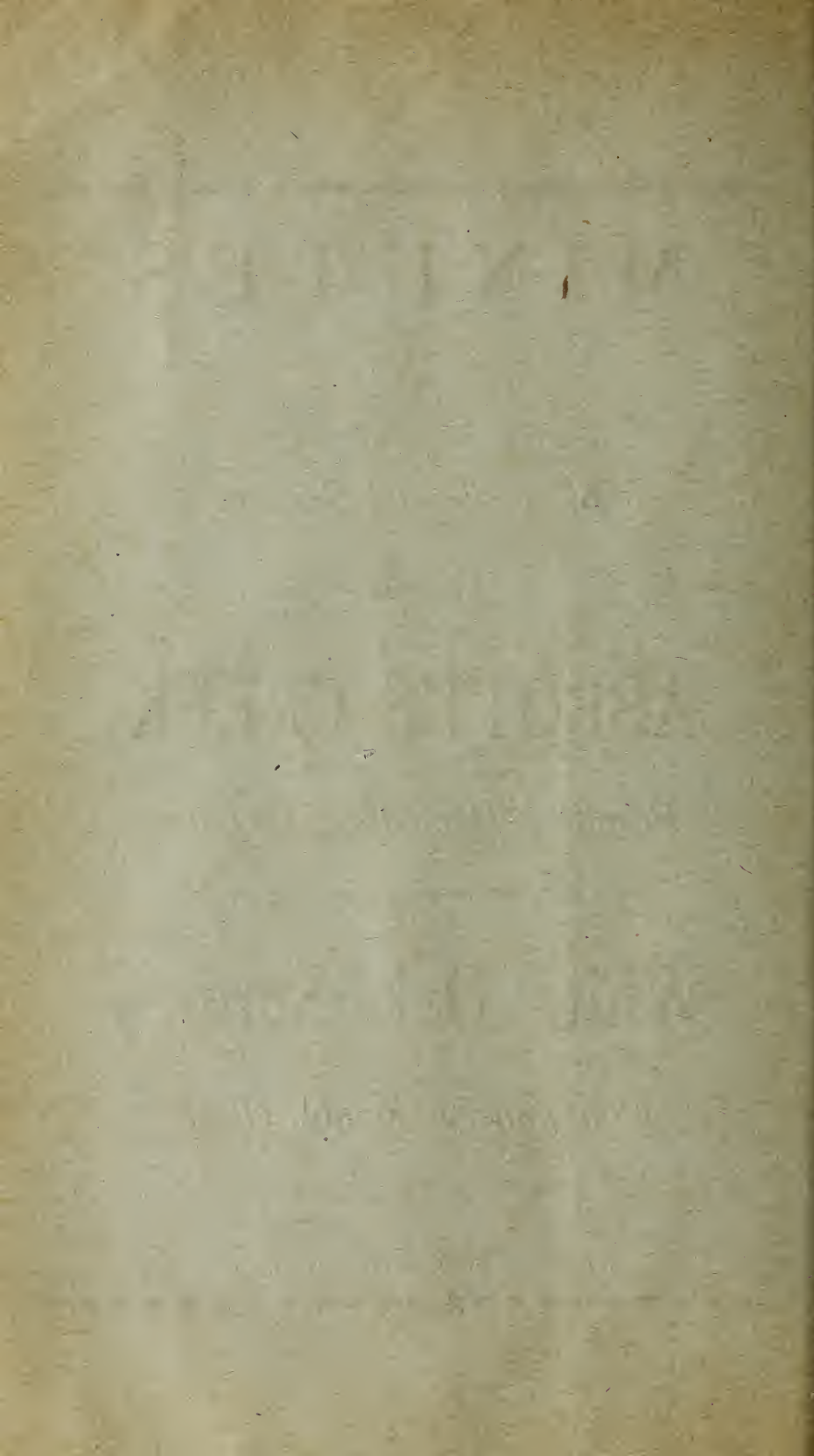

As I was appointed by the Abbott's Creek Association of 1911 to write a circular letter for the minutes of 1912, I will now try to perform that duty.

If the brethren who appointed me were moved by the Spirit of God, I feel that the letter will be of comfort to some one at least, if not, the letter will be a failure.

In the 3rd chapter of St. John and the 7th verse, we have this Scripture; "Ye must be born again."

The word "again" in this Scripture means, another time, and nothing can happen another time until it has happened one time. Then there must be two births in order to be born again. The first birth, of course, is a natural birth and the second a spiritual birth. Then it follows that the child of the natural birth is a natural child or a child of the flesh, and the child of the spiritual birth is a spiritual child or a child of God.

The natural child, when born, at once becomes the child of his parents, no one else claims him. He is under the direct control of, and in the immediate care of his parents. They handle the babe tenderly, administer to his needs, lead him about and instruct him in the way that they think he should go; but as man is fallible, he often makes mistakes.

This natural child, when born, at once becomes sensible of pain and hunger, it soon learns to appeal to its parents for comfort and protection. Just how soon it realizes true relations that exist between father and son, it would be hard to tell, but the more it learns of its relations to father the better it loves him.

As the natural child, when born, becomes sensible of pain and hunger, so does the spiritual child, when quickened by the Holy Spirit become sensible of the weight of the great load of sin which he has heaped upon himself. He at once flees to the law for justification, but finds only condemnation, he vows he will reform his life and puts on his self-righteousness which proves to be nothing but filthy rags, he pins fig-leaves together to clothe himself, but finds himself yet naked, he groans, he mourns, he begs, he prays. He has exhausted all of his powers and finally he realizes his entire helplessness and inability to free himself from the great burden that has so long wearied him, then it is, that he goes to his Heavenly Father and casts his all at His feet and becomes willing to be God's anything, then it is that the Comforter comes and he is made to rejoice and realize what Jesus meant, when he said: "If I go not away the Comforter will not come unto you; but if I depart, I will send Him unto you." John 16-7 and again. "I will pray the Father and He shall give you another Comforter; that He may abide with you for ever: Even the spirit of truth whom the world cannot receive."

The great secret of genuine Christianity is in this second birth. You may approach any, so-called, sinner and ask him if he is a sinner and he will answer "Yes," yet he seems indifferent and unconcerned. He has told you the truth, he is a sinner, a dead sinner. When you converse with him further he will show the Pharisee, you will find him claiming to be about as good as others around him: But after awhile you meet him again, he is not the bright looking fellow you saw a few days ago, he is now careworn, bowed down, and distressed, he realizes that he is a sinner indeed and in truth, and of all men the most miserable. You ask him, if he is a sinner and he answers "Yes" he feels to be the very chief of sinners. He tells you the truth, he is a live sinner and ere long will you see him rejoicing that the Comforter has come. He can now, as never before, say our Father which art in Heaven. As the earthly father leads his children about and instructs them, and administers to their needs, so does the Heavenly Father through the Holy Comforter, lead His children about and instruct them and administer to their needs. The earthly father is fallible and may lead wrong, but the Heavenly Father

is infallible and can not lead wrong.

Now that you have been quickened and have been visited by the Comforter which Jesus promised would come, what shall you do? You are a child of God and you should obey Him. He says, "Take my yoke upon you and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart; and you shall find rest unto your souls, Mat. 11-29. In this Scripture, the child of God is commanded to do two things, then Jesus promises one thing. The first command is: "Take my yoke upon you." The second command is: "Learn of me," and the promise is: that "Ye shall find rest to your souls." So it is when we obey that we enjoy the presence of the Comforter, it is when we walk close around the City of Zion that we are happy and strong in the Lord. Now that you have received the Comforter, what shall you do? Jesus says, "Go home to thy friends, and tell them how great things the Lord hath done for you." Mark 5-19. Now, to all, who feel that they are sinners and feel to hope that they have been visited by the Comforter, let me say: come and take the yoke upon you, go home to your friends, which I believe is the church, obey the commands of your Heavenly Father, and I assure you, from my own experience, that you shall find rest to your souls. I sometimes hear our people advise the children of God in this manner, "Never join the church as long as you can help it."

Now my dear brethren I would refer you to 2nd Timothy 3rd chapter verses 16 and 17. "Al Scripture is given by inspiration of God and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works."

The one great purpose of the Scripture being given, is, according to the above text; that the man of God may be perfect and thoroughly furnished, and now I would pause to ask, where does the man of God get his furnishing that prompts him to advise the child of God to neglect his duty as long as he can?

Now dear brethren, excuse my feeble efforts, and may God's richest blessings rest on you and all who love Him in deed and in truth.

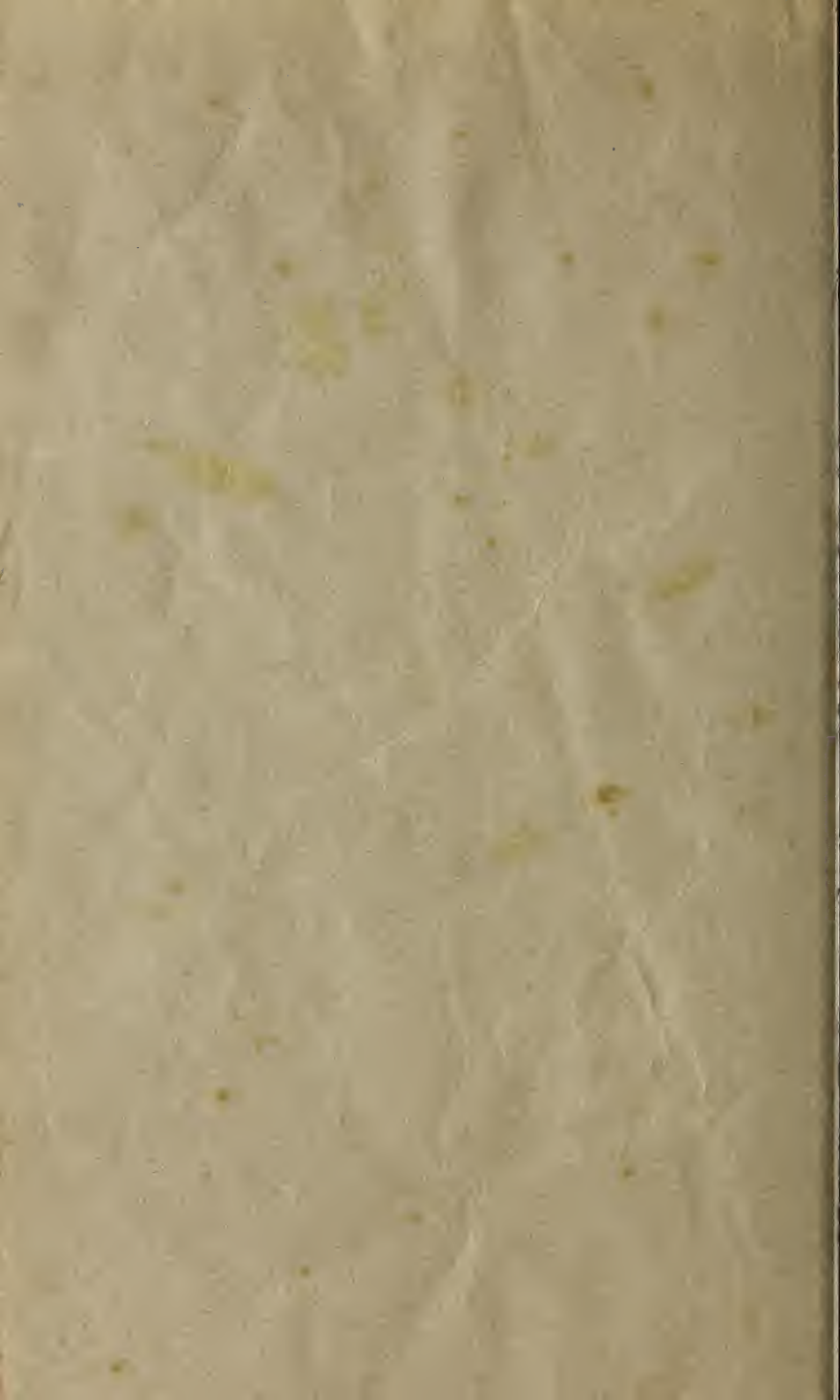

CIRCULAR LETTER

the Ministers and Messengers composing the Abbots Creek Association, when assembled at the Church at Salisbury, N. C.: Dear Brethren—Once more we have assembled together, as trust, in the fear of an all-wise God, and as appointed by us, the purpose of engaging in His divine service and worship of mingling ourselves together, that we may confer together concerning the things that are of mutual interest and benefit to and to our churches. Being desirous of complying with your counsel and the obligation laid on me by your last session of addressing you by what is known as a "Circular Letter," I will try, in weakness, asking the good Lord to lead and guide me to His own glory in what may write concerning the things that are and have been on my mind, which I hope will be to the mutual benefit of all lovers of truth, and hoping that what I may be blessed to write will serve to edify and unify the household of faith and glorify God.

We will now call attention to a portion of Scripture recorded Matthew xxiv. 12, 13: "And because iniquity shall abound, the love of many shall wax cold; but he that shall endure unto the end, the same shall be saved." So at this time we are led to believe that loyalty to our churches, not only those composing our Association, but everywhere, be admonished, and that the doctrine and order of God's house be kept in mind and steadily maintained against all opposition, whether in or out of the church, that this be done in love. The Scripture that we refer to says "the love of many shall wax cold." Is it possible that because iniquity abounds our love to God and His good cause would grow cold, and moral cowardice develop until the servants of the most High God would be afraid to contend for the true principles of this God given kingdom? I feel that the true service of God is some power behind and before to rely upon, because it is said "the love of Christ constraineth us." So we are not left to ourselves, but are kept by His mighty power, and thus enabled to contend for the precious truths in love. If we are born of God, we are born of love; so that principle is born in us that causes us to come forth in fear and trembling to testify in the court of our God.

Preaching or teaching the truth in love is the cap-stone. It ought be that some would fail to declare the full truth owing to fear of hurting someone's feelings. It might so be that one may be led to contend for truth without love but with anger or malice, with a spirit of contention or strife. This ought not to be done, neither of these would be unjust to the good cause of our God. I feel sure the grace of God is sufficient to enable His servants to contend for the whole truth with perfect love to all who may need instruction, or those who might be ensnared or blindfolded by false doctrines and practices. I think I have seen contention without love; and on the other hand it seems I have seen a mistaken love, which possibly led to a concealing of the precious truths of God. Neither of these are to be desired by the family of God, but rather deplored. It seems to me to be a sure fact that if we love the truth and feel like we have been made free of it, that we would have a loving zeal to declare it to bring freedom to others, rather than contention and strife. I feel sure that the servant of God, constrained by His love, wants, above all things, to hold out to others the precious things that have so graciously blessed his soul in gone by days; and I am sure it will be the power of God and wisdom of God to them who are the called according to His purpose. So, in as much as we are taught in God's word that nation shall rise against nation, and we shall hear of wars and rumors of wars, and pestilences in divers places, and the end not yet come, I feel like saving to the brotherhood of fellow-servants, to gird on the helmet of hope and shield of faith and contend for the rights of this Old Baptist kingdom anywhere and everywhere your lot may fall, for if God be for us, who can be against us?

It was love that brought our Saviour down from the heavenly

court to redeem His bride, and He has manifested His love to her in all dispensations and ages of the world, and has displayed His power to protect and keep her, revealing in His word that she was not her own, but bought with a price which consists of His precious blood and righteous life, which love was the foundation of them. Ought we not to be loyal to Him and manifest our love to Him by keeping His sayings, doctrine, and practice in mind daily and hourly, always remembering that purity of doctrine ought to come first, which, to my mind, should be the chief object in the warfare in this Old Baptist kingdom. But this is not the only thing, however, to be observed by His witnesses. They should follow after things that make for peace, which virtually is the acknowledging of the truth and fellowship of this dear kingdom.

We find by searching God's word that in His kingdom there are vessels of large and small quantities, which are all for the perfecting of His children in an organic way. There are some who are clear and distinct in doctrine that have been weaned from the breast, and others, so to speak, are only babes; but all are bound by the same principle of love and fellowship.

Finally, brethren, let me exhort you in this circular letter concerning the great and high responsibility resting on us with our visiting brethren from every direction of abiding in the form of doctrine and practice which was revealed to us, and which this Association was organized on years ago, which has been fellowshiped by yourselves and all your sister Associations, for I am sure God has not left you and your churches in darkness at these years concerning any important principles you should have known. If someone comes into your midst with extreme doctrine that have not been revealed to you admonish him in love.

May God bless you and keep you in fellowship

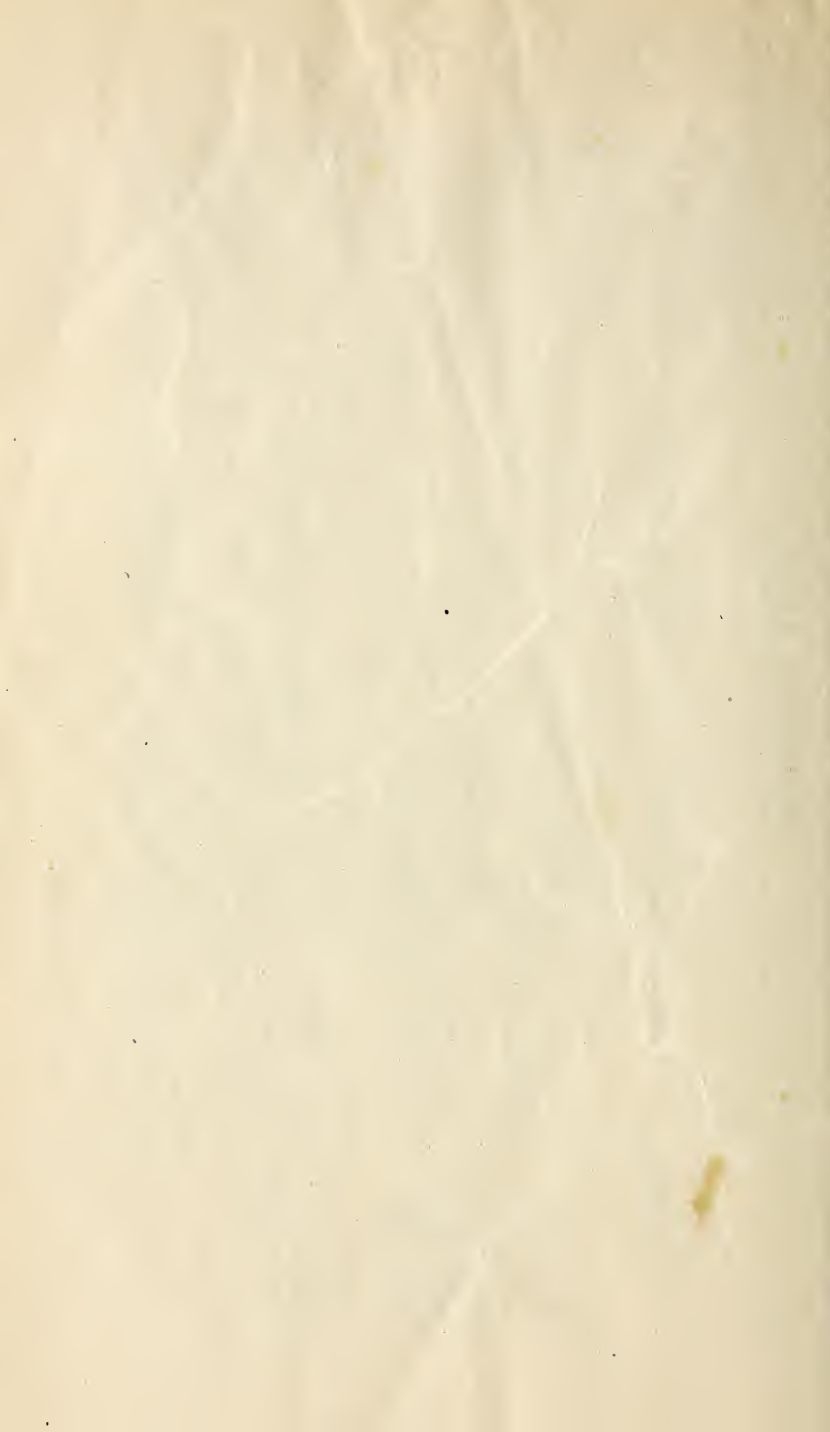

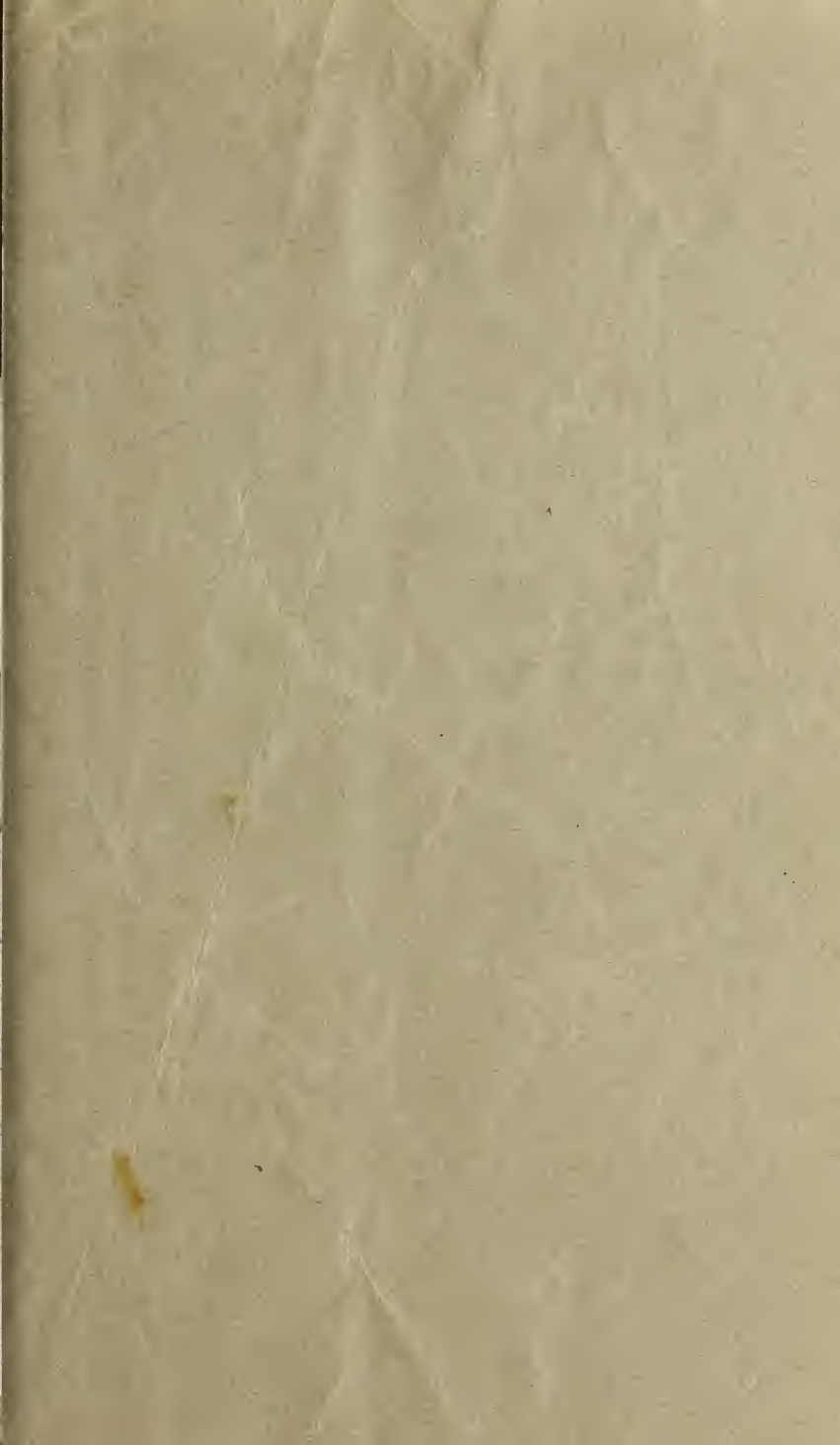

CIRCULAR LETTER

TO THE ABBOTT'S CREEK PRIMITIVE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION:

Dear Brethren—As I was appointed at our last Association to write a circular letter for this year, I will try with much fear and weakness to comply with the appointment, hoping that the brethren will bear me up in their prayers, that I may not write anything that will be a hindrance to the love and fellowship of the church.

I will offer a few thoughts on the following scripture: "Let brotherly love continue."—Hebrews xiii. 1. When God for Christ's sake pardoned our sins we came in possession of this brotherly love, and we should cherish it and not do anything that will hinder a full continuance of it. I will first notice a few things that hinder it from continuing:

First. Love of self more than love of the brethren. This is a dark picture, but can we not often see it in ourselves, creeping into our churches and causing division and strife? Could we only go back a few years and view ourselves as we did when we were under the awful load of sin and without God and without hope in the world, we would surely feel that any of our brethren are better than we are; and instead of trying to kill our brethren spiritually we will be made to go down in unblameableness and ask God for Christ's sake to make us fit to be at our brethren's feet.

Second. Covetousness. We should not covet our brother's worldly things; neither should we covet what God has given him, but let each

one be content with that which he has. We sometimes see brethren striving to be as large as some other brother, or a great deal larger.

Third. Back-biting and devouring each other. Some little thing may arise against a brother, or he may trespass against us, and instead of treating him as we are commanded to do we begin to tell it to other instead of going to him, and the first thing we know we have caused the finger of scorn to be pointed at that brother, and instead of saving him we have destroyed him, and sometimes ourselves also. May the Lord lead us in the paths of peace and love.

We will now notice a few things that are calculated to bind us more closely in love.

First. Let us esteem our brother better than ourselves, because when we see ourselves as we are surely our brethren are better than we.

Second. Let us do unto others as we would have them do unto us, and then brotherly love will continue.

Third. Let us love God supremely. We will notice the awful condition that we were in before God brought us as He did David, up out of a horrible pit, out of the miry clay and set our feet upon a rock, and established our goings. Surely we can love a God who has done so much for us, and who has promised never to forsake us. While loving God we will also love our brethren, too. May God give us of His grace to love Him here in time, and also to love our brethren. And, finally, when we are done with this sin-cursed world, may He through the worthiness of Christ our Redeemer take us all home to Himself where we will dwell forever, where all but love is done away.

e Father, unto Him be glory, majesty, might and dominion forever.

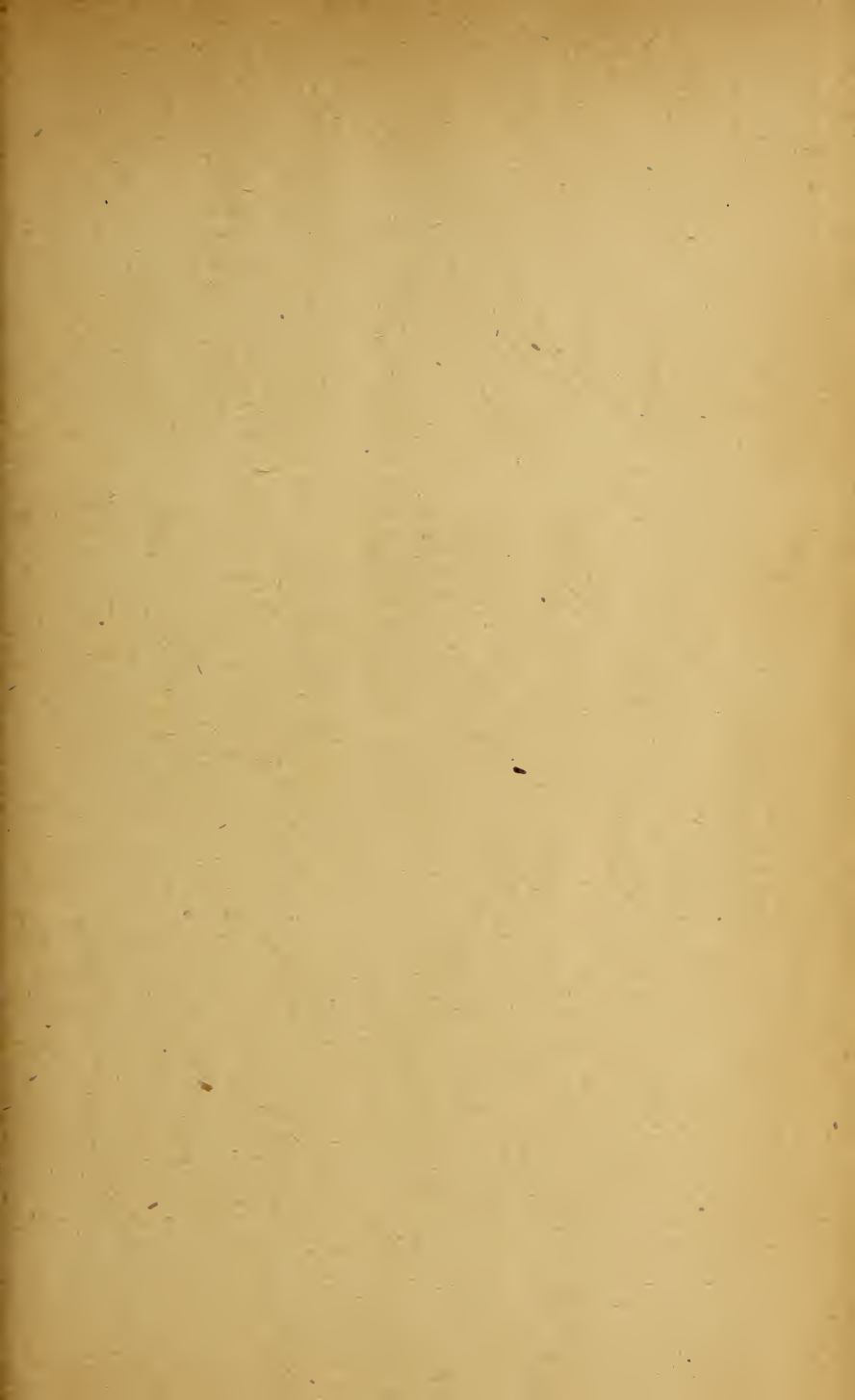

CIRCULAR LETTER

To the Churches Composing Our Own Association, and to Our Beloved Correspondence, Greetings:

We wish to say to our corresponding associations, That we are always glad to meet your delegation. It calls our minds back to the time when they gathered in Jerusalem from every quarter and worshiped God. We hope you will accept this little tribute of love and continue to send messengers as long as it is the Lord's will. And as we only have two ministers, help us to pray the Lord of the harvest to send forth laborers in this part of His vineyard.

To our Association I wish to say, This work of writing circular letters has been going on in this Association for ninety years. Elder James Badget, who was Moderator at the time, was appointed to write the first circular letter in 1826, and from time to time different ones have been appointed to write this letter. And last year, as you remember, this lot fell on me, "Who am less than the least of all saints," if one at all, and I resisted on account of weakness and inability. And when my resistance failed to have any virtue, I remembered that the power that should be behind all such work has never been exhausted, but He is still able to bring "Light out of darkness, strength out of weakness and wisdom out of ignorance." I am sure this will have to be done in this case, if the Association is in any way honored, and God glorified in the least. One day while meditating on this matter, and wondering how I would come out, this Scripture came to me with some force: "My grace is sufficient for you." If I was sure these words came direct from the throne of God I would be sure of the kingdom; but I am not sure; I am so often left to doubt and fear.

I believe that this grace was present with Abraham when he went to offer up his son, Isaac. He felt sure that God would be with him, and prepare himself an offering.

The three Hebrew children were enabled by grace divine to trust God, regardless of the king's decree, and God delivered them out of the fiery furnace unharmed.

I have thought too, that the grace of God must have been with Daniel in the den of lions. I believe he could sing "Grace 'tis a charming sound" just as good in the den of lions as he could in his own house, "With his windows open toward Jerusa'em."

And, brethren, I firmly believe that you "Are traveling home to God in the way your father's trod," and very soon you will meet here on earth in an associated capacity your last time, then the joyful news will come, "Child, your Father calls, come home," and that grace which has stood by all the redeemed family of God, will stand by you while you are going through the cold jaws of death, will march with you through the portals into that beautiful city, where you can walk the golden streets of New Jerusalem, where you can fill the blissful seats in the courts of heaven, and where you can march around your Father's throne and enjoy the blessings of that kingdom which was prepared for you from the foundation of the world. The grand beauties of that glorious kingdom I am not able to describe, and such wonderful blessings I am not worthy to receive; but I would love to be permitted to fill some humble seat beneath your dear Redeemer's feet, where I could spend eternity, reaping the benefits of that "Grace which is sufficient for you." Farewell.

Steeds, N. C., August 19, 1919.

To the Dearly Beloved and Highly Esteemed and Precious Brethren that May Be Blessed with the Privilege of Meeting Together in an Associational Capacity:

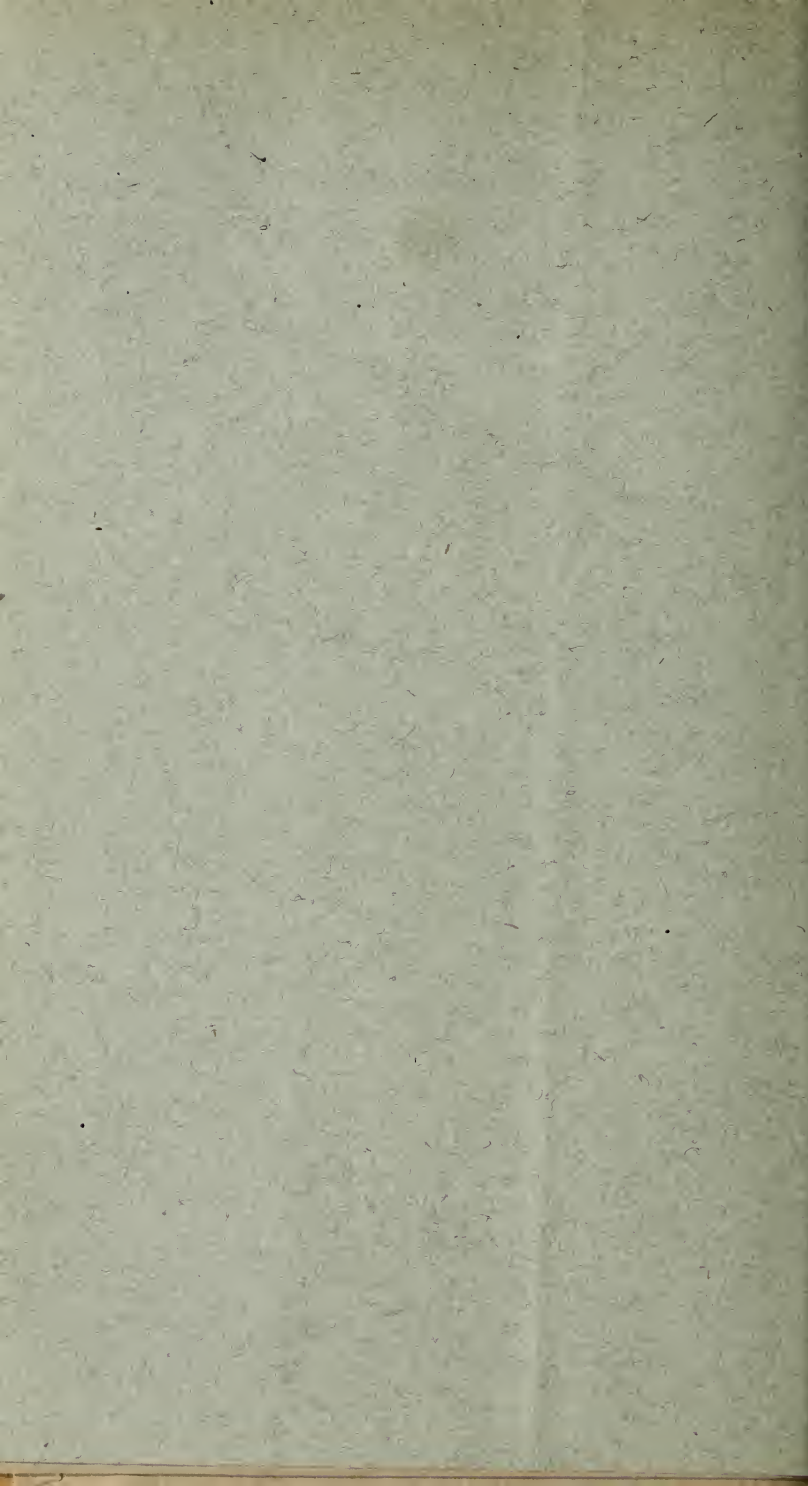

CIRCULAR LETTER

Spies, N. C., July 25, 1920.

Dear Brethren, Ministers and Messengers, who may compose the ninety-fifth session of the Abbots Creek Association which was appointed to be held with the church at Tom's Creek, Davidson county, N. C., together with many brethren and sisters in relation with and according to the love and purpose of God through Christ.

When I was appointed by the association of last year to write a circular letter for our minutes of this session, August, 1920, it shocked me so I could not render an excuse, feeling I was so short in comprehending the deep mysteries of the Scriptures.

This scripture which I will use came on my mind shortly after I was appointed to write this letter. It will be found in Second Peter, third chapter and eleventh verse: "What manner of persons ought ye to be." This is, I understand, to the child of God, one who has put on Christ with an open profession, and gone home to his friends, the church, not to tell what he has done for the Lord, but what the Lord has done for him, if we believe that the sinner before he is changed is dead in sin and condemnation and can not come out within himself and we go to the church telling our little hope, that God for Christ sake has pardoned our sins. "What

manner of person ought ye to be." This scripture as I understand has reference to how the child of God should act, walk and talk.

I remember before I joined the church I would go to meeting and while waiting for the preacher, the brethren would talk to one another on spiritual things and when the preacher would drive up, the brethren would go out to meet him and shake each other's hand.

Now brethren let us keep in memory what one of the old writes commands was, calling for the old paths, speak often to one another, forget not the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is.

Brethren let us examine ourselves and see if we are in the faith, if we so find, let us be ever ready to help in anything pertaining to the church militant. If we hear the Armenian world speaking against the doctrine of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, speak out brethren, don't be ashamed of the gospel of Christ for it is the power of God unto Salvation to every one that believe.

Preaching of the gospel is not as the world says, to save dead sinners if they will accept the terms of the gospel; but to save them that has been killed to the love of sin who in time past drank sin down as a greedy ox drinketh water and at a time unexpected to him God visits him and turned him right about, then belief set in. This is the only way a man comes in possession of the belief and when God calls and qualifies a man and sends him forth with a message and he comes loaded with the good things from a far country, this man is ready to receive it.

We read in the scriptures that there are false teachers in the world so we should be careful how we follow even a gifted and qualified minister of the gospel of Christ, for all are subject to vanity and are liable at any time to drift into covetousness and idolatry.

Finally, brethren, farewell, be perfect, be of good comfort, be of one mind. Live in peace, and the God of love shall be with you. The grace of our Lord and Saviour, and the love and communion of the Holy Ghost be with you all. Amen.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

Salisbury, N. C., August 24, 1927.

To the members and messengers who may compose the Abbotts Creek Association to convene with the church at Pine Meeting House, Davidson County, N. C.

GREETINGS:—Being appointed by our precious brethren at the last session of this association, to write a circular letter, I now make the attempt. I wish to speak of the things most assuredly believed by our brethren. By this I mean the churches composing this association. As I have spent my time in the ministry with them I feel like I know what they believe. Having done all to stand, they now stand and earnestly contend for the faith once delivered to the Saints.
