VISITING MINISTER Ed Higgins

Following a buffet supper which was haghlighted by home-made ice cream a full-fledged preacher occupied the pulpit of the Church Sanctuary Wednesday, the 21st. It was indeed a pleasure and a privilege to have with us, to lead the mid-week devotional service, The Reverend W. J. B. Livingston. Mr. Livingston, who likes to be called Bill, is married and has, as he puts it, a "sandwich" of children. First came a girl, then a boy and then another girl. Mr. Livingston still has some "Tar" clinging to his heels. He is a native of Wilmington and while a resident there, was a member of the First Presbyterian church of Wilmington. He attended Davidson College for four years and, after graduation, matriculated at the Union Theological Seminary. Concluding his studies at the Seminary, he occupied pastorates at the Old Stone Presbyterian Church in Lewisburg, West Virginia, Staunton, Virginia and his present church, the First Church of Logan, West Virginia.

Hissscripture was taken from the 15th Chapter of 1st Samuel, in which the Lord and Samuel admonishes Saul for not killing Agag, the king of the evil and wicked Amalekits, as the Lord had commanded. Mr. Livingston reminded us that Agag represents evil and temptation in our lives and that without the help of the Lord, it is impossible to keep Agag out of our lives. Mr. Livingston's talk stirred quite a few thoughts in spite of the oppressive July heat.

MONTREAT-AN ESCAPE

In a recent magazine there was an article entitled "The Wish to Escape", and the writer quoted a cry from one of the Psalmists "Oh, that I had wings like a dove! For these would I fly away and be at rest!" Though centuries old, this is a cry that still rises from the heart of everyone of us at times. And God has furnished many ladders of escape from earth and one of these is Worship.

In the conferences there is conscious worship, skilfully planned by the consecrated leaders of our church. On the platform, in the leadership school Dr. Ed Grant with his radiant personality helped to weld the gathering of teachers, class presidents, directors of relegious education; ministers one body ready for

work and play.

In the class rooms, some of the ablest teachers of our church directed our study courses, that had been planned under the supervision of Miss Irene McIdwaine. Dr. Kirrot from Princeton Univ ersity, gave a marvelously simple and clear study of Hebrews, at the Bible hour. Dr. Joseph Gettys of A. T. S. had a course on how to teach the Bible-centered on the International S. S. lesson. Dr. E. T. Thompson from Union Seminary taught "Acts", and "Modern Religious Trends". Dr. Dwight Chalmers had a course on Youth work, and Dr. Clovess Chappel the noted author and Methodist minister from Charlotte held the whole conference by his sermons each night.

With a faculty of about 50 there were 499 registered and 768 certificates awarded. Work was done in every field of service from cradle roll to older adults. And if the full-throated-chorus of praise that each morning was a measure of the inspiration gained---not one of those present returned to ports of duty without renewed strength, peace and happiness---and a sense of

God's presence.
