

#### VERNON JOHNSON REPORTS THAT:

In this series of articles about people in our church whom we all want to know better, we have chosen to write about our genial Sunday School Superintendent, Mr. Preson P. Phillips, Sr.

Mr. Phillips was born on February 2, 1893 at Hampton, Virginia. After graduating from Hampton High School in 1910, he went to VPI where he received a B. S. Degree in Civil Engineering. Following a year surveying coal properties in Kentucky, he opened his own C. E. offices in Hampton. He entered the Army in 1916 and served on the Mexican Border and in Europe until 1918. Returning to the States, he worked with the Engineering Department of the City of Norfolk, Va. In 1922 he moved to Durham where he held the position of Designing Engineer with the Gilbert C. White Co., until 1933 when he went into the insurance business.

On December 22, 1921 Mr. Phillips was married to Miss Elizabeth Jones from near Oxford, N. C. They have one son, Preson, Jr. who is now assistant Pastor in the First Presbyterian Church of Florence, S.C.

The Phillips' make their home at 905 Dacian Avenue where they are always glad to have "company", particularly their fellow-members of Trinity Avenue Presbyterian Church.


It seemed to Pete that everyone was doing his best to keep him from playing ball with the boys on the vacant lot. "Bring in the paper!"
