





BISHOP'S OPENING STATEMENT

It gives me pleasure to welcome you all to this our Annual Conference Session, the fourteenth such session since our Conference was renamed Zimbabwe Annual Conference in 1980. It gives me great joy to see you all here and you are looking bright and ready to make decisions for and on behalf of our church in Zimbabwe, South Africa, Zambia and Malawi.

1993 has come and is almost gone. 1993 has not been an easy and enjoyable year for us all. Many families lost their loved ones. We celebrate with joy the lives of many faithful believers who have gone to be with the Eternal Master. We all mourned with sadness the deaths of Rev. Samuel Munjoma, Rev. Webster Munjoma and Mrs Harriet Malianga. There are many more faithful followers of Christ who are not mentioned here by names who served their Lord faithfully and are now in eternal glory.

1993 has been a very difficult year. Many families have experienced the harsh realities of illness and death in their families. A lot of people are going through serious suffering because of retrenchments affecting members of their families, unemployment and the unaffordable high cost of basic commodities. The gap between the rich and the poor seems to be ever widening. A new community of street dwellers is fast growing in our cities. There is a growing number of single parents some of whom are teenage and are not employed. Armed robberies, some of them involving young people are on the increase. The Zimbabwe government's ideal of "Health for all by the year 2000" now appears to be an unattainable ideal. Health Services are unable to cope with the demand for health/medical care.

There is a general moral decay all over and we have read in newspapers about some of the most gruelling and heinous cases of immorality including cases of incest in which father and daughter make love as husband and wife.

In this confused and confusing context and environment, how can people experience life in all its fullness? Our quadrennial theme is: ABUNDANT LIFE IN JESUS CHRIST. How do we experience abundant life in the midst of these hardships, frustrations, hopelessness, neglect, disease and death? The church, and indeed our conference, is called to be faithful to its calling and give comfort to those who mourn, food to the hungry, clothes to the naked and hope to the hopeless.

A lot of the members of our church have worked very hard in their churches, circuits and districts to help others to experience life in all its fullness.

When we left Mutambara in 1992, we noticed a rare level of excellent enthusiasm in us all to go and give our best for the Lord.

Because of (and not inspite of) the difficulties and hardships summarized above, the church continued to grow in all its aspects: Glory be to God!

At Mutambara we made certain fundamental commitments which we must never lose sight of.

A. QUADRENNIAL EMPHASIS:

Do you all remember that at Mutambara we committed ourselves to focus on the following as our major emphases: Evangelism, Christian Education and Stewardship? At your local church, do you have vital programmes in Christian Education? And Stewardship? The starting point is your local church. Do you have well planned programs to address the needs of the people in your circuit?

I am pleased to note that in their composite report, the District Superintendents have demonstrated a realistic commitment to our quadrennial emphases. I am also pleased that Council on Ministries (COM) has embarked on a programme to train curriculum developers and material writers for Christian Educationists. During the year, we were able to secure the services of expert Christian Educationists (Ethel Johnson and Florence Krieger, both from the USA). These experts worked with leaders in our Conference to prepare strategies for developing relevant programmes for our Churches.

B. DROUGHT AND DROUGHT RELIEF:

I am pleased to inform you that your conference was able to distribute nearly two hundred and fifty thousand dollars to our districts within the national borders of Zimbabwe for water development and for purchase of seeds and other agricultural inputs. We wish to thank the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) for providing the bulk of the funds.

Our districts were able to raise more than 120 tonnes of food for distribution in areas worst hit by the drought.

Although the drought appears to be over, there are several isolated pockets of areas where the drought still persists. I invite all of you "to feed the hungry again" in those areas where the drought situation persists.

C. FINANCE:

At Mutambara we passed a resolution calling on all United Methodists to embark on TITHING. There is a clearly noticeable growth in the spirit of giving. It has been discovered that where the leaders (the pastor and the lay leader) are tithers, the followers are enthusiastic to tithe. Stewardship is one

of our quadrennial emphases and this work area organised excellent seminars in 1993.

Our societies are doing an excellent job. The women's society (RRW) has contributed and committed substantial sums of money to various projects and programmes of the church. The men's and youth's societies have also increased their funding of the projects and programs which they are supporting.

We are beginning to witness a new exciting dimension of our patterns of giving in which an individual or a group (e.g. a society) picks a project for funding. A very exciting case in point is that of Mr Samson Katsande (Mapereke) who for 1993 supported Chambuta Circuit by paying the full pastor's salary for the whole year. In 1994, he is going to fund the mission work in new area of Mount Darwin where the church has embarked on an intensified evangelization programme.

May I urge Harare and Murewa Districts to form a joint task force to work out the strategies and modalities of implementing a properly coordinated evangelization programme in Mt. Darwin so that the funds being donated are properly utilized.

One area of concern remains and it is the area of Pastoral Support in a few of our circuits. The majority of the circuits are doing very well. They pay their pastors in good time and they send in their pension contributions in good time. Quite a few circuits have gone further to provide health insurance for their pastors' families. Indeed, they are a"a step ahead."

There are, however, several circuits which lag behind, some by seven months, in the payments of their pastoral support and thus they create an arrears situation in the payment of pension premiums. I urge all such circuits to be faithful to their faith and commitments.

On another very encouraging note, I have observed a growing number of persons who are giving part of their property to the church by designating in their wills the church as a beneficiary of their estate when they die. Isn't that wonderful! What is disturbing though is that quite a few of these good people are not givers today. So it means that while they live and pray for long life (and God grants them long life,) the church starves! Shall we pray that they die sooner!

D LEADERSHIP:

Conference is proud of the high quality of leadership we see at all levels of our church. May I single our Mr William Marima for special mention. He has been Conference Lay Leader for about twenty five years! And, you will agree with me that he is one of the greatest leaders for all time. His work as Conference Lay Leader has been exemplary. We thank God for Mr Marima's untiring efforts. I must also make mention of the work which our district lay leaders are doing. Again, Conference will agree with me that we have a dedicated team of District lay leaders. Praise be to God!

District Superintendents: This is a special group for me. They are special for me because, as the extension of Bishop's office in the Districts, they carry a heavy responsibility on behalf of the Bishop. The problem with leadership is that sometimes I might think that people are following me when, in fact, they are chasing me. A shrewed leader would continue to head for the destination which he wants people to reach and they will get there anyway. I am glad to say that the District Superintendents are following and not chasing, yet!

E. <u>QUADRENNIAL THEME:</u> ABUNDANT LIFE IN JESUS CHRIST. This is a rich theme. It is a difficult, but rich theme. May I appeal to the Board of Ordained Ministry and Council on Ministries to unwrap this theme for easy understanding and interpretation by all. Indeed, the mission of the church is to offer ministry/service which will help people to experience the abundant life.

F. <u>PERSONNEL:</u>

The personnel situation in our church is very disheartening. I mention it here in order to highlight the problem. All our high schools except Lydia Chimonyo have no substantive deputy heads. All our schools, both primary and Secondary are headed by men. We do not have a woman head. The clergy personnel analysis portion of the District Superintendents Composite report reveals the extent of our problems. This Conference has only five women clergy on appointment.

Currently Nyadiri Hospital and Old Mutare Hospital have no doctors.

Conference needs to come up with creative ways of "producing" properly qualified personnel.

I must, at this point, pay special tribute to our missionary partners who are giving invaluable service to our conference.

G. <u>ENVIRONMENTAL AWARENESS</u>: One of the most frightening things that I have seen as I travel across our Conference is the destruction of the natural forests of Zimbabwe. The amount of tree cutting that goes on daily is unbelievably very high. It is appreciated that people cut trees for use as poles and firewood. What the church needs to do is to TEACH PEOPLE TO PLANT TREES.

Starting in 1994, I shall expect all pastors to make an effort to establish a wood lot in their circuits, at least one at the location of the parsonage.

Using our education infrastructure as a starting point, I call upon the Education Secretary to mobilize all our schools to develop a nursery for trees through their Agriculture Departments. The seeds for gum trees, I am told, can be obtained free of charge from parastatals which specialize in forestry.

Seeds from these nurseries would be distributed to circuits free of charge every year for the next five years. Our schools should feel proud for giving such a service. The idea is for our circuits to start small wood lots and continue to expand them.

There is another aspect of environmental degradation which the church needs address and it is the problem of siltation in which rivers are fast filling with sand. As responsible members of our society, let us avoid doing things that produce siltation.

H. <u>PASTORS:</u> This is just to pay special tribute to pastors for their commitment to their calling. I continue to receive excellent reports of your work from people whose lives have been touched by your ministry.

With the coming of the Africa University and the introduction of a continuing education program, I will call upon pastors to take advantage of the facilities made available.

- I. <u>AFRICA UNIVERSITY:</u> The dream is now a reality. Africa University will be opened officially in April 1994. The United Methodist Churches overseas are raising money for the development of the University. As a Conference, we must also join in and play a significant part in the development of Africa University. Retired Mrs Miriam (Mbuya) Chiza has opened the way for us all. She has sent her forty dollars. I call upon our Conference to raise money locally for Africa University.
- J. <u>SOLIDARITY WITH WOMEN:</u> As United Methodists we are observing this decade as a decade in which we must be in solidarity with women.

I am pleased to advise Conference that Cabinet has appointed Mrs Ella Makunike as the Coordinator of Women's work. Working together with the office of Mrs Makunike, let us all support projects and programs which empower and uplift women. Conference will be pleased to know that money is now available to help with the upgrading of girls dormitories in our schools.

Sermon - The bishop's theme was that Christians within our church have the spiritual power to perform miracles.

He came up with an impressive list of the real life experiences which occurred to our Christians during the course of the year in review.

The most dramatic example being that of a Christian whose booking on the plane had not been confirmed, but miraculously he was helped by a crippled stranger who gave him money to secure a first class seat on the same plane. The man's booking had been confirmed from Hong Kong to Harare. This Christian would have been stranded in India for a whole week when he had not a cent left in his pocket because he had given his last \$2,00 to a woman who had approached him requesting for help. Through the power of prayer the miracle in the man's travel happened.

After the sermon, Holy Communion was administered by the Bishop with the assistance of the district superintendents. About 800 people received the Holy communion.

18. Business:

Special prayer for District Superintendents - conducted by Rev. Dr. Eben Nhiwatiwa. Song 211.

Message: Brief but appropriate introductory comments were made. The District Superintendents were asked to fall into the footsteps of any great church leader of our church who have gone ahead of us.

19. Conference Lay leader's Report:

This was presented by Mr P. Kangara.

- a. The report was read after numerous alterations, necessitated by non availability of information in time for the typing of the report.
- b. Headlands South was congratulated for having cleaned their debts. They had gone for almost a year without paying the Minister, but cleared their debts at the last minute.
- c. Nemasasi circuit in Marange was singled out for its problems in paying its pastor. Suggestions for improvement were made by other delegates.

20. Noon Devotion:

Kune Rwizi rwekusamba. Singing was harmonious and the blending of voices was melodious to the ear.

Congregational Song: 102. "Come Holy spirit" (Uya Mweya Wakachena) Rev. Marange led in prayer.

Scripture reading: first by Amy Benjamin the daughter of the preacher, Rev. Keith Benjamin, Genesis 11: 109 and second Rev. Furman. Acts 2 verses 1-13. Coming of the Holy Spirit.

Message: After a few expression of thanks, he spoke of the confusion which emanated from the use of many languages. When people are selfish this leads to confusion. He said that we are all eager to get ourselves to Heaven. Making a name for ourselves is not the way of getting ourselves to Heaven. Some disciples followed Jesus because they wanted to make a name for themselves.

The story of the disciples receiving the Holy Spirit demonstrated the two miracles taking place at once - hearing and speaking. Rev. Benjamin said he could and was hearing the presence of God right here in this church.

 - a. The Coordinator Mrs Ella Makunike read the report. Before reading she thanked the Bishop and Conference for appointing her to that office.
 - b. Mrs Makunike outlined the basic aims and objectives of her office.
 - c. Women's Division appears to have been quite generous in funding projects involving women and children in our country. (Zimbabwe.)
 - d. Figures listed were expressed in USS the total sum is therefore in the category of a few million ZWS.
 - e. The exclusion of orphanages was raised and the coordinator hoped that the implementation committee would look into it.
 - f. Rev. Marewangepo was the last to speak and warned that the money should not be used to put up new buildings, but to renovate the present facilities. The report was adopted.

23. Conference Calender

Changes to the Conference Calender were read out by Rev. Chikoore, a member of the committee. The changes are incorporated in the approved Conference Calendar.

24. Greetings:

- a. Rev. Marewangepo was asked to greet conference. He brought greetings from Rev. Mawokomatanda, the New York Office, Rev. Mumbiro, Rev. Mukwindidza and also greetings from West Africa.
- b. Bishop responded and asked Rev. Marewangepo to return our greetings to his fellow workers. Greetings were read from Mbuya Chiza who greeted Conference with \$2,00, Rev. Manyarara greeted conference with \$5,00. Mr Matsikinyire was not in at the time to greet Conference.

25. <u>Announcements:</u>

The Conference Secretary requested that the evening service be 45 minutes long to enable conference to devote time to business.

26. Further Greetings:

The Host District greeted Conference in style. Singing and ululating they came into the Ehnes Memorial Church carrying all sorts of fruits. Each holding either a bunch of bananas, peaches, green mealies. It was quiet a sight. The district lay leader of the Pisa Pisa, (Pisa Pisa is a slogan meaning Hot Hot) district said a few words of greeting to the conference and presented some fruits and corn produced in the district.

27. Special Prayer for the RRW by Rev. S. Mungure:

Hymn 238 was sung while all the members of RRW were standing. Rev. Mungure then led the conference in prayer. Support at 6.45pm.

28. Evening Sermon - 7.40pm.

James Salley - Assistant Vice Chancellor for development for Africa University preached. Africa University Chapfain and acting Dean of Students, Rev. Julius Tsiga was the liturgist.

Hymn 236 was the opening song. People sang with enthusiasm.

Mrs B. Mutasa led in prayer. Special Music by Quartet "I remember Calvary." Harmony was par-excellent.

Scripture readings - 2 Corithians 9:1-15 was read by Rev. J. Tsiga "Ndinodisa Jesu, Ndinokudza Iye".

Before his sermon, Salley mentioned a long list of people and groups that sent greetings to conference, starting with the Chancellor of Africa University, to his small rural church in his home country.

He asked each participant to greet as many people as possible and that they greet only those who could look them in the face. The sweet expressions in each face were indication of the presence of the spirit in this church.

Conference attention was drawn to verse 8 of the chapter read. Theme: Standing on the promises of God. Africa is a promise from God. Africa University is a school of Dreams as was dreamt by Bishop Hartzell almost 100 years ago.

Business Session:

29. Board of Trustees Report:

- a. The report was presented by Mr R. Chimonyo, the acting secretary.
- b. Lease agreements were to be obtained for rural churches they could be obtained from the responsible authority.

- c. Under recommendation No. 5, it was reported that only Nyadiri Centre had submitted copies of leases to the Conference Board of Trustees for records. The centre was congratulated.
- d. Conference was also informed that the Tenant renting the episcopal residence had finally left on November 29, 1993. Conference greeted the news with great joy.
- It was agreed that the ground for Mutare Girls Hostel be purchased before May 1994.
- f. The idea of insuring our property including buildings was emphasized and this was supposed to be done as early as possible.
- g. Mutasa-Nyanga to bring the generator to the conference Board of Trustees within three months.

30: NEW HEADQUARTER OF THE CHURCH:

- a. Mr Lovemore Kurangwa, a consulting engineer was called upon to deal with item 19. The proposal was a building with a basement, and ground floor with 6 floors.
- b. Mr Kurangwa also designed the Gweru Technical College, and is going to design the All Africa games Aquatic Centre.
- c. Mutambara and Lydia Chimonyo leases were sent
- d. Leases for Mutoko Centre were sent so was the lot for Nyamuzuwe.
- f. Conference was assured that the model for Head Office proposed building would be displayed some time on the next day and Mr Kurangwa would explain in detail.
- g. The session was concluded at 10.25pm.
- h. Special music was sung by the South Africa delegation as people left the conference meeting.

32. Business Session 8.05am:

Board of Trustees:

- a. Model of the proposed Headquarters Building was presented to the conference by Mr Kawenda. Conference was warned that if building is delayed, costs could sky rocket, and will be beyond our means.
- Conference gave the Bishop the mandate to appoint a committee to work on the mechanism.

33. Council on Ministries Report:

This was presented by Rev. Mafondokoto.

- a. All the recommendations on page 2 were deleted, as they reflect the existing (present) situation.
- b. A question was raised on the composition of the board of governorts for our schools.
 - Rev. Mafondokoto reminded the conference that the composition is in terms of Education Act 1991.
- c. It was recommended that the Board of Education look into the possibility of setting up boards that would extend beyond the school - to include hospitals. COM should play a part also in this regard. It had been noted that there are people with vested interest sitting on our school Boards.

Christian Education:

The Bishop called upon every United Methodist family and members to have Bible Studies at home and at church.

34. Church and Society:

It was strongly recommended that in future proper records of donated items be kept.

35. Evangelism:

a. Concern was expressed over the minimum involvement of pastors at revivals, especially during Easter.

- b. The statistics under membership drive were questioned as they did not reflect losses. The rounding off of figures to the nearest person was querried.
- c. The idea of holding a crusade in 1995 be pursued.

36. Health and Welfare:

On the subject of abortion it was referred to CCOM for their consideration.

- 37. Recognition of Rev. Streyfeller:
 - The Bishop recognized him and he was asked to feel free to make any contributions.
 - b. Rev. Streyfeller expressed his concern on the situation of Nyadire Hospital.
- 38. Pages 13-25 show details of budgets and other financial matters. These are CONFAD matters and therefore were not discussed.

39. Worship:

Chikwata was defined as a prayer group, but it was felt that there was a problem in it. There are members in Chikwata who became irresponsible. They should be corrected. This matter produced queit a bit of debate but the Bishop finally said that the prayer groups are necessary to keep us spiritually healthier, but the irresponsible ones should be taught the correct way.

40. RRW:

- a. Recommendation on page 34 was necessitated by the need to have more women. The committee that deals with rules and procedures will consider the request.
- b. RRW would have to be represented in the Conference Board of Trustees. Anything purchased by the church at any level become the property of the conference.
- c. RRW should be represented in the Zimbabwe Annual Conference just like any other organization. This needed further consideration by COM.
- 41. Page 36, recommendation No. 2, it was moved that the word "increased" be inserted so that it will read, "the increased involvement of women". The COM report was adopted.

42. <u>Presentation of Chief Mutasa:</u>

The traditional hand clapping was done to welcome the chief. The Bishop informed the Chief of the internationl nature of our conference delegation.

Chief Mutasa greeted conference. The Chief talked about his old school days here. Each student had to weed his own line at the Black-Fields. He then said he was in his own true line of the hereditory chieftainancy which he now holds.

He went on to say there was one area where the church and his forefathers had agreed but which the church seems not to be observing. Gumba, the daughter of Chief Mutasa was sent here as a test case. She returned home as she had come.

He took exception to the counselling on AIDS as reported from Masvingo Bulawayo District. He urged the church not to encourage weddings of pregnant women and men as boy and girl. The chief said there were serious problems of immorality. He did not want to lead mothers whose children had no fathers. There is no accidental pregnance. Children without fathers are a serious social problem to a community. He said in conclusion that there was a massive cover-up of immoral issues.

The Bishop assured the chief that where cases of immorality were brought to his attention, no stone will be left unturned to deal with the matter.

 Song: God answers prayer in the morning. Sung with the help of a group. Prayer was made by Rev. Mhondoro.

45. Business Session:

Report on Publication and Stationers Foundation.

The report was presented by Mr E. Muzorewa. The Bishop reminded conference that the three major projects are

- c. Nyadiri Farm.

The report was adopted with appreciation.

46. CONFAD REPORT: 12.05pm.

This was presented by the chairperson Mrs B. Mutasa.

All reports to annual conference were to be in by 31st. October of each year. The report was yet to be discussed - 12.25pm.

47. Devotion - Rev. J. Munjoma - District Superintendent. Liturgist - Rev. Tobie of South Africa.

Mr G. Kambarami Executive Secretary of the Bible House representing Zimbabwe Council of Churches (ZCC).

- 50. The Bishop spoke at length extending greeting to Cde. Duri and telling him about the extend of the Zimbabwe Annual Conference.
 - a. Cde. Duri said a few words of greetings to the delegation. He told conference that coming to Old Mutare was a form of Home coming. He was able to identify several people in the audience Mr Marima, Makunike, Dr Nhiwatiwa and others. He told conference that he had been a student here from 1965 1969.

In conclusion he extended greetings to all delegates from beyond our borders and hoped they would see some of the beautiful sites of the rich region.

i. Rev. Dabengwa was presented by the Bishop to conference. He
 extended warm greetings from our sister church - the Methodist
 Church in Zimbabwe.

His message centred on the need to get our young people to be involved in the affairs of the church. It was suggested that our

 - Conference was informed that our country has been able to supply bibles to 10% of the population

- Conference was informed that the bible had been translated and produced

in 2006 languages, including Shona, Ndebele and Tonga.

- Donations have been enough to cover distributions and he concluded by explaining how important the bible is. It is a good and important book. Mr Kambarami had a series of interesting anecdotes to share with conference.

PART VIII

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' COMPOSITE REPORT

Preamble

The most Reverend Resident Bishop Christopher Jokomo, and Mrs Jokomo, we greet you in the name of our blessed Saviour Jesus the Christ. It is our real joy to be back to this your Annual Conference Session at which we bring an account of our activities as your Superintendents. It has been a very short twelve months of hectic "Kingdom business". But the urgency of publishing the good news of Jesus Christ is our sole motivation in being about God's work. Even though the going was tough, we can assure you that we were not found the least wanting in the performance of our appointed duties. God's Grace and Peace be yours. Amen.

Theological Statements:

In the prayer which Christ taught his disciples, we are to pray for the coming of the Kingdom of God. Jesus believed in the absolute efficacy of God's reign. Hence, He teaches us to pray for its coming. When we put ourselves under the Lordship of Christ and make him ruler of our lives, we can say that the Kingdom has truly come for us. In fact, Christ revealed that God's rule is 'within us'.

What we pray for is that this imminent divine reign be fully acknowledged and actualized in our daily lives. This is in keeping with Bishop C. Jokomo's first episcopal sermon at Mutambara United Methodist Centre when he earnestly called us to "Let us go to Heaven". Being "Heavenbound" is the sole business of every follower of Jesus and every true child of God.

The "architect" of the early Church, St. Paul, boldly testified: "I do not account my life of any value nor as precious to myself; if only I may accomplish my course and ministry which I received from the Lord Jesus, to testify to the Gospel of the Grace of God."

By the principle of apostolic succession, St. Paul's mission becomes the mission of today's church. Thus, the challenge to carry on Christ's three fold mission of Teaching, Healing and Preaching must be accepted as our own mission, if we are to be the authentic church the Body of the risen Christ. Bishop, that is precisely what we, as your Superintendents, are striving to help the United Methodists of this country ti become!

Introduction:

Heading the passionate invitation by the Bishop to "Let us go to Heaven", we observe an abundance of people of all ages, life circumstances and means who, indeed, experienced <u>Heaven</u> in their various <u>Faith</u> journeys during 1993.

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When asking each other: who goes to Heaven? St. Mathew's Gospel gives us a ready answer. It is those who give food and drink to the hungry, and thirsty: those who take into their homes the stranger (sojourner; those who visit the sick and go to see those in prison, and those who clothe the naked (Mathew 25: 35-36).

It is necessary and good for us to rejoice and thank God for the good health that He gave to all our members and to every clergy family. As a Conference we were saddened by the deaths of the spiritual giants viz Rev. Webster Munjoma and Rev. Samuel Munjoma. (Please see Memoirs). Our profound sympathy goes to their families. Our sympathy is also extended to all members of our church who lost their loved ones.

The State of the Church:

The church is continuing to grow both geographically and numerically. This positive trend is something we need to thank God for. The boundaries of the Zimbabwe Annual Conference expanded to include Zambia, Malawi and South Africa. The Conference looks at the church work in the above mentioned countries as our mission areas. This includes Botswana which we consider as a preaching point and Namibia which is a circuit in the making. It is important to know that this expansion of our conference boundaries is taking place when the conference has very limited financial and manpower resources. In most cases the church in the mission areas lacks a very strong base or infrastructure. For an example the majority of the circuits which were created do not have facilities such as parsonages and sanctuaries. In addition, more and more circuits are being looked after by untrained or semi-trained (clergy) personnel. We need to mention also that, because the expansion programme lacks a strong financial base, conference is being compelled to subsidise by paying Pastoral Salaries for the newly formed circuits for a long time. The conference Evangelism Programme must be highly commended for the success of the expansion programme and, for the principle of "sub- divide and grow". Conference 1992 resolution fifteen (15) has tremendously helped in the orderly creation of new preaching points, local churches, circuits and districts. However, if the Zimbabwe Annual Conference would like to continue, there is need for a co- ordinated effort through our Council on Ministries. For an example before we accept invitation to start work in a new area we need to consolidate our gains in areas which we have evangelized, by providing the necessary facilities. Therefore, Cabinet recommends that:

Funds be generated for the mission work and insist that the creation of structures in the new areas be done orderly by consistently implementing resolution fifteen of the 1992 Conference.

The Conference now has eight (eight) districts. It is encouraging that a petition to create a ninth district will be tabled at this Conference for approval. The sub-division of Harare District has been postponed to 1995 due to the fact that, Harare District failed to meet some of the requirements. Resolution ten (10) of the 1992 Annual Conference, recommends the sub-division of Masvingo/Bulawayo district in 1994. The plan has been postponed indefinitely due to the failure of the district to meet the requirements of 1992 Annual Conference resolution number fifteen (15) of 1992. It is clear that the sub-division of our Districts, circuits, local churches, and sections, is a sign of growth. Cabinet stresses the need for sub divisions to be done in an orderly manner. Cabinet takes CCOM recommendation seriously that a delimitation commission be appointed whose task will be to oversee the creation of circuits.

The indegenisation of the church in mission areas is an issue of concern for Cabinet. The areas are Zambia, Malawi, Botswana, Namibia and South Africa. Conference's move to recruit and train clergy personnel from these areas is a step in the right direction. Still more has to be done in the form of the church structures being created. They have to meet the local needs. Worship models must be indegenised. Resolutions 57, 60 and 61 address this issue.

The church in Zimbabwe, in this region, Southern Africa has very strong prospects of continued to growth. Our theme for the quadrennium is "Abundant Life in Jesus Christ". More and more people are seeing the church as their only source and hope for survival. It means that there is a big challenge for the church to preach the gospel. Petitions for establishment of new circuits will be presented for approval.

- During this period of adjustment, there may be an error margin for the new circuits and new districts as they just read their registers and records.

Cabinet will do everything in its power to continue to improve the system of data collection and storage.

Personnel:

One of the most serious crisis facing our conference today is shortage of appropriately qualified personnel to work in and for the church. We are forever indebted to the missionary personnel who are giving invaluable service to our conference. Allow us to mention them by names:

We cherish their presence among us as partners in the church of our Lord Jesus Christ. We value their service to the people of Zimbabwe through their ministry within the United Methodist Church.

We have serious shortages of clergy personnel. The whole conference has less than one hundred ordained clergy. The Conference has lost five student pastors and four elders during the last two years. This is a very high rate of drop out. Particularly disturbing is the high rate of drop out of five student pastors out of a total number of

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thirty-eight (38) Theological Students at United Theological College. We call upon the Board of Ordained Ministry to come up with an instrument (system) which will enable the church to get its scholarship money from students who drop out.

From the clergy personnel analysis shown above, conference will see that unless more training facilities are made available, we are going to face critical shortage in the very near future.

We call upon the Board of Ordained Ministry and indeed the whole Conference to recruit students for Africa University. As a Conference we have failed to keep pace with providing sufficient clergy personnel for our fast expanding work. The clergy personnel analysis table shows how serious this is in all our districts.

Observation on Clergy Personnel

The Ordained clergy are outnumbered by unordained local pastors.

The ordained pastors constitute only 41.7% of the pastors in our conference.

Cabinet is urging this conference through the Board of Ordained Ministry to go out of its way to embark on an affirmative action to recruit and train clergy women. Cabinet is also urging Conference (again through the Board of Ordained Ministry) to find ways to accelerate the training of pastors in order for us to keep pace with the growing needs of both the new and old districts.

We call upon the Board of Ordained Ministry to come up with creative programmes which will help to address this problem.

As Cabinet, we want to express appreciation to local pastors and ordained pastors for the satisfactory manner in which the majority of them have performed their work.

Home and Family Life:

The family structure in Zimbabwe has changed over the years with the extended family losing its grip on the urban nuclea family. Social pressures including teenage pregnancies, meager financial resources and high cost of living which is beyond the reach of many have put a lot of pressure on the family resulting in high rates of separation and divorce. Because of the apparent "disappearance" of the extended family a new phenomenon (which is real!) of homelessness among both old and young has emerged in our towns and cities.

The church has a mission to the homeless. As Cabinet, we call upon all our circuits and districts to respond to their local situation of homelessness in cooperation with other local and national agencies which are involved in ministering to the homeless.

The church must be involved in programmes which enhance the unity of the family. There is great need and demand for teaching and training resource materials in the area of home and family life. We call upon the Council on Ministries to map out

strategies and develop programmes which will help to strengthen families which are under threat of breaking up.

There is also a fast growing number of single parents in our society. Council on Ministries is called upon to create special ministries for single parents and for children growing up in a single parent environment. Cabinet will take it upon itself to identify aspects of the family life which require strengthening through special ministries.

By designating a whole week on the Conference Calendar as Home and Family Life Week, Conference Council on Ministries has demonstrated its seriousness in wanting to address the issues of Home and family Life.

Cabinet calls upon all pastors to use available resources to prepare simple programmes to help strengthen the family.

Church's Ministry with Women and Children:

As a Conference we have gone a long way to adjust our structures to make it possible for women to play a meaningful role in the affairs of the church. However, much of the participation by women is at lower decision making level. As a Conference, let us dedicate ourselves to the ideal of making it possible for women to occupy positions at all levels of the church. This calls for major training programmes for women.

Women clergy and laity must be afforded resources and opportunity for higher education and training. Now that we have a full time officer to coordinate women's programmes we shall look to that office for leadership in discovering opportunities for women. Where there are opportunities for the advancement of women, Cabinet will not be found wanting in making the advancement possible.

The Social Witness of the Church:

Two beatitudes place an enormous responsibility on all believers as Jesus Christ declares that the church is "the salt of the earth"..... and "the light of the world....." (Mathew 5: 13 - 14). Our primary duty (mission) as the church is to give "light" and direction to society .or else the whole society will perish because of walking in darkness. Most importantly, the church must give society its "taste", its substance and significance since we are the "SALT OF THE EARTH".

The church carries out this missional imperative as it intentionally deals with the SOCIAL ILLS that render our people's lives miserable, intolerable and meaningless. Consequently, as a church, we are seriously concerned about the following societal maladies:

i) Economic Conditions in Zimbabwe:

Whilst we appreciate our government's acceptance of and meticulous effort in implementing Economic Structural Adjustment Programme (E.S.A.P.). we are, however, disturbed by the ESAP's drastic negative effects upon our people, nationwide. For an example:

a) Due to the widespread job retrenchments, unemployment has strangled the bread winners for most families. This has depressed and demoralized

many.

b) A sharp rise in production costs and, consequently in retail prices worsened by the rapidly falling value of our currency has made even basic commodities unaffordable. Street-begging, indecent mode of living and dressing have increased. We urge our church's appropriate ministries to identify and employ creative strategies to alleviate the suffering of victims of E.S.A.P.

ii) Public Transport Shortage:

Unless definite steps are taken to quickly address the acute shortage of public transport, we will soon reach crisis proportions. this shortage has resulted in the near unaffordable bus fares for ordinary commuters. There is a need for careful planning of our passenger transit system by transport planners in all our cities to avoid a total collapse of our traffic laws and regulations. Our church institutions could help the situation by purchasing their own vehicles for own use and/or for hire. Tariro could play a more visible role.

iii) The Refugee Problem

A massive displacement of people is the direct result of the civil strife which is so rampant on our (African) Continent.

We note with deep appreciation the churches' intervention in Mozambique and Malawi which resulted in the raised hope for permanent peace in the two nations. We also appreciate and praise our state President Mugabe in his involvement in the Mozambique peace process.

Natural Resources:

The preservation of precious natural resources could be taken more seriously if our church members and institutions could plant trees on every open land throughout the country beginning at your local neighbourhood.

To demonstrate how serious we are on the need for tree-planting, the Bishop will lead the Cabinet at this session of the Annual Conference in planting some trees on this campus before we return home. This is to respond to the President's call to plant trees in Zimbabwe.

v) South Africa

South Africa's welcome move towards ending apartheid in that country is a hope-inspiring development and momentous event on our continent. The church truly appreciates President De Klerk's, Mr. Nelson Mandela's and some Parties' determination to hold democratic elections in April 1994 in order to bring peace and prosperity to South Africa. The church fervently prays that the other political groups in South Africa will join in this honourable crusade for peace.

Programme Life of the Conference:

Quadrennial Focus:

The programme of the Zimbabwe Annual Conference was organized and processed around our three declared quadrennial emphases viz: Christian Education, Evangelism and Stewardship.

Guided by these quadrennial emphases we celebrate with the whole church the following accomplishments:

a. Christian Education:

Successful Christian Education Workshops were held in every district, at local church, circuit and district levels as well as Conference level. Everyone of these seminars was vividly enlightening and exciting learning experience for the majority of the participants who used to be intimidated by the Task of teaching a Sunday School class. As a result new Sunday School Classes are opening in a lot of our local churches across the Annual Conference.

We are grateful to our visiting consultants Ms. Ethel Johnson and Mrs Florence Kreiger; our Conference Director of Christian Education, the Rev. Christopher Chikoore and our hardworking District Christian Education Chairpersons and committees who made this possible.

Above all, we want to commend you our Resident Bishop for making sure that a Director was and will be appointed to serve in and guide this very crucial quadrennial emphasis to the end that most of our members do not and will not just feel their faith but most important know it, in order to live it!

b) Evangelism (Membership Growth and Consolidation)

Membership growth and consolidation this year was not a just "talked about" phenomenon but a concrete reality. This is accounted for by the number of new converts recorded not only by those circuits operating in new settlements but even in cities and established circuits as well.

However, a lot of improvement is still needed in the area of consolidation of our membership records; hence; the need for the continuation of the task of training our pastors for greater sophistication in the practice of recording, processing and

use of statistical data. Activities and results of evangelism at revivals and our conventions could be monitored more effectively for accurate records.

c) Stewardship: (Teaching and Cultivation)

Biblically speaking we are all stewards of the affairs and creation of God (Genesis 1: 26-28; 1 Corinthians 4: 1; and 1 Peter 4: 10).

<u>Harvest Thanksgiving</u> - although we managed to give far greater amounts this year than last year we nevertheless failed to reach our goal of \$2 000 000.00. In any event we must thank God for His children's love and generosity.

<u>Tithing:</u> Our districts are averaging a total of over a hundred (100) tithers with the Masvingo/Bulawayo District in the lead with a total of over two hundred (200) tithers.

We are truly grateful to those of our pastors who labour and put in everything in their souls to serve their Lord faithfully. Some did this with many months of salary arrears. Our sole ambition and hope is to finally eliminate the charge arrears syndrome by working hard for adequate and even fully and timely payment of all our pastors.

Petition:

Whereas in the Shona Culture the system of giving the first fruits to the Chief, who in turn gave to the needy was profoundly emphasized and practised cf Leviticus 23: 10 and

Whereas the Shona proverb, "Kupa kuturika mangwana uchaturura" (Lit: when you give, you will receive in future) promote generous giving, and

Whereas tithing is the biblical minimum system of giving to God and the support of God's work (see Genesis 28: 22; Leviticus 27: 30-33; Numbers 18: 21-32 and Malachi 3: 8-10),

and

Whereas over six hundred and fifty (650) in our Conference are now tithing; Therefore, be it resolved that:

- 1. The Zimbabwe Annual Conference re-affirms tithing as the basic principle of giving in our church.
- 2. All our clergy and lay leadership be exemplary in this regard.
- 3. Proper records of tithers at local church, circuits and district levels be kept.

d) Health and Welfare:

Aids Awareness:

The aids epidemic has not been just debated in our church, social halls and church school rooms. We have gone out to demonstrate ways of curtailing the

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spread of this killer disease. Our Health and Welfare Ministry was busy educating the public about the practical consequences of Aids to Human survival. For example there is an Aids Counseling officer in each of all our hospitals.

When all has been said and done we want to emphasize the fact that as a church, we do not condone promiscuity:

Cholera Outbreak:

The government's swift and effective awareness campaign coupled with people's response to the cholera outbreak in Manicaland and Muzarabani helped to avert an epidemic situation. Our Health and Welfare Ministry's teaching was so effective that only a small number of people, inclusive of our own church members, died of cholera which was of epidemic proportions in Manicaland.

Smoking in Public Areas:

One of our moral principles forbids smoking. Scientific studies which have been conducted in the developed world prove beyond any doubt that smoking is hazardous:

- a) to the smoker and.
- b) to the non-smoker who inhales the smoke from someone smoking nearby.

Many public buildings in Zimbabwe (eg, banks, hotels, airport terminal buildings etc) have no designated smoking areas. This leaves the non-smoking public including children at the mercy of smokers. There should be properly designated smoking and non-smoking areas in all public places in this country. Cabinet urges Conference to approve the following petition:

Petition:

Whereas humankind are stewards of all that God has created and is creating including our own bodies, and,

Whereas both recent scientific and modern medical studies have revealed the dangers of cigarette smoking to the smokers and yet more acutely hazardous to the non-smokers who secondarily inhale cigarette fumes,

and

Whereas these same studies have revealed the gravity of injury that may befall the fetus of a pregnant-smoking mother and that of a pregnant non-smoking mother who is exposed to cigarette smoke;

Therefore be it resolved that the Zimbabwe Annual Conference:

- 1. Declare all its public buildings (offices and toilets) as non-smoking areas.
- 2. Urge its entire membership to uphold the non-smoking practice including inside their own houses even by their guests.

3. Write to the Ministers of Health and of Transport and other relevant ministries urging them to require designation of smoking and non-smoking areas in all public buildings and in public transport.

We commend President Bill Clinton for declaring the White House and grounds as a non-smoking area, Express Motorways and Intercape Mainliner Bus Lines and others for a non-smoking policy aboard their coaches! ZUPCO led the way in 1992!

Drought and Drought Relief:

We were aggresively involved in alleviating the effects of the 1992 drought situation. As a church, our programme should not and will not

be found wanting in this regard until all people in our society - believers and non-believers - are saved, developed, and our societal existence transformed.

All our districts rejoiced in receiving from the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) and passing onto the needy of our people drought-relief in the form of tonnes of seed packs and mealie meal.

In some areas, the way desperate people were cared for gave them a unique religious experience that we are all vulnerable and could perish if we don't become "our neighbours' keepers". For example, in Masvingo-Bulawayo District some recipients of drought-relief confessed: "We learned to eat with those whom we had always considered 'witches' and 'untouchables'". Yes, indeed, the Kingdom (reign) of God extends way beyond the brick and stone walls of our comfortable sanctuaries!

Furthermore, God's grace was manifested in the way various national and international groups and sectors of our nation in particular: responded to the 1992 drought crisis. We thank our government for facilitating the operation of these generous groups including our districts and individuals who responded positively by giving generously to avert the crisis. We further commend our government for providing the peasant farmers with seed and fertilizer. Last but not least, we thank the taxable employees (workers) of our nation who let the Government Treasury put a 5% surcharge of their income to beat the drought.

Conference Participation in Drought Relief

Drought Relief and Drought Recovery

Cabinet is grateful to ALL our members for the way in which we conducted ourselves. Many members gave generously to the needy. The Conference initiative to collect mealie meal received an excellent response. In that appeal our districts were able to collect in excess of 150 tonnes of mealie meal for distribution. Harare District (in addition to collecting mealie meal and dried fish) raised and donated to Masvingo/Bulawayo District ten thousand dollars (\$10 000) for purchasing drought relief food.

The Conference allocated one hundred and five thousand dollars (105 000) for purchase of seeds during this drought recovery period. The conference also allocated about ninety eight thousand dollars (98 000) for development of water resources. All these funds were channelled through our districts.

Cabinet is grateful to the United Methodist Committee on Relief who contributed substantial funds to add to our local effort.

Petition:

Whereas the 1992-93 growing season was profoundly better than the 1991- 92 season, and

Whereas many previously drought stricken areas had close to bumper harvests this year, and

Whereas there are still pockets of a continued drought situation in our land making "operation Joseph" a necessity in those areas.

Therefore, be it resolved that the Zimbabwe Annual Conference:-

- 1. Raise food on its farms to assist those in need.
- 2. Appeal again to UMCOR for assistance to feed the hungry.
- 3. Appeal to all the districts to collect drought relief aid from their churches.

Water Resources Development:

As a church we are actively and practically engaged in permanent Water Resources Development Programmes as other non-Governmental Organizations and our Government are doing. We have done and are doing this through the Borehole Funds donated by UMCOR which were earmarked for boreholes.

Councils, Boards and Committees:

The strength of the United Methodist Church lies in its committee system. The committee system enables wider participation by the people in the decision making process of the church. Cabinet is very much satisfied with the manner in which our Councils and some of our Boards and committees have performed their tasks. We continue to see a steady development of our Committees as committee members evaluate and critique their committee's effectiveness. Recently Council on Ministries put forward a number of suggestions for discussion aimed at coming up with decisions which will help improve the structure and effectiveness of Council on Ministries.

Council on Finance and Administration (CONFAD) has gone a long way to try and improve the financial control and management in the conference.

At this session, CONFAD will present for approval two sets of budgets:

i) The Annual Conference Budget for 1993 which consists of the estimates of income and expenditure for all the programmes and projects funds which are administered through the Conference Treasurer's Books.

ii) Budgets for all other units including schools, hospitals, societies and districts.

Cabinet urges this session to examine and discuss these estimates carefully and approve them for 1994.

We are satisfied with the manner in which the Board of Trustees, the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Committee on Espiscopacy performed their assigned tasks.

Unfortunately, our greatest strength (the committee system) may become our weakness if there is no proper structure or machinery to follow-up on decisions and implement them.

All our societies have rendered invaluable service in Zimbabwe wherever we have organised units of the societies. Many souls were won for Christ through the ministry, preaching and witness of the three societies.

State of Our Mission Centres:

We note with some serious concern the manner in which our mission centres have deteriorated. Many old mission houses have not been renovated. Many roofs have turned brown with rust. At some of the mission centres, the grounds are not properly looked after. The roads are corrugated because of crosion. Obviously, we are not painting every mission with the same bad brush. A few are doing well in several aspects.

We call upon the heads at our centres to engage the services of our members who are expert/professional land scapers. We call upon these heads to embark on a properly planned renovation and repair programme of the near delapidated buildings. In doing this, care must be taken to keep within the budget. Further we call upon mission dwellers to respect the office and authority of the District Superintendent.

Schools and Education:

Cabinet notes with appreciation the work being done by our heads of schools and their staff. Results are generally quite satisfactory when viewed against the national average. Our schools have produced some outstanding results in grade seven, 'O' 'A' level and level examinations as the Education Secretary will show in his report. As Cabinet, we commend the good work being done by good staff.

We have enjoyed a good year with many of our schools reporting fewer of disciplinary problems. The newly appointed heads have settled down very well at their new stations.

Most of our schools still report a serious shortage of staff accommodation. This is also true of our hospitals. As Cabinet, we think that it is high time that we as confere ce must decide what we want as maximum capacity of our schools. Can

Nyadire, Murewa and Hartzell continue to grow indefinitely? Cabinet will take it upon themselves (itself) to study the ssituation and come up with a recommendation by next conference.

Cabinet is also very concerned about the quality of some of the teachers in our schools. We are refering particularly to those who are given to excessive drinking. The heads must make sure that their recruitment efforts give priority to qualified teachers who are of sober habits and good moral standing.

Cabinet was deeply saddened by the sudden death of one of our appointees, Mr. Clement Nyabvure, head of Nyadire Primary School.

Health Services and Hospitals:

Our three hospitals and their statelite clinics have continued to render invaluable service as treatment centres. From these hospitals and clinics, primary health care programmes are developed for the surrounding communities.

The results in the nursing school at Nyadire are consistantly very pleasing. Mutambara has started well. We note with concern the shortage of doctors and other qualified personnel. Cabinet will take the initiative to recruit Zimbabwean doctors to come and work at our mission hospitals.

It is noted with regret, that all our three hospitals have tended to focus mainly on treating diseased persons. Cabinet calls upon the Council on Ministries through its Health and Welfare Committee and the hospitals and clinics to start focusing seriously on disease

prevention. This calls for the distribution of resources in such a way that programmes for disease prevention are not disadvantaged.

Apart from the accute shortage of doctors and other staff, our hospitals face a serious shortage of staff houses. We should have incentives for foreign doctors to encourage them to stay.

Farms:

Conference will no doubt, join us in congratulating Rev. Allan Streyfeller on the manner in which he has managed to develop the farm at Nyadire. We know that he has gone through serious trials including accute shortage of funds and the drought, but he and his team of workers through hard work, dedication to duty, and creativity have managed to overcome those hardships and are now saying to the Conference: "Come and see what is happening at Nyadire".

Cabinet is grateful to Rev. Edward Furman for volunteering to come and develop Mutambara Mission farm along the same lines that Nyadire has been developed. He

is excited about the project and we are asking for your prayers for him as he embarks on this gigantic venture at Mutambara Mission.

The greater part of Old Mutare Mission is currently being leased to Africa University. All the other land which is not leased is being used by residents of Old Mutare under the conditions set by the Board of Trustees and CONFAD. Cabinet would like to see more being done to develop the land. The present situation where land is apportioned to local residents is uneconomical and will lead to degredation of the land. Tillage which is not controlled and monitored will inevitably lead to environmental degradation. We call upon CCOM (Agriculture Committee) to come up with proposals for proper utilisation of the land at Old Mutare.

Financial Activities:

All districts report a very encouraging recovery after the period of the drought. Pastoral support is very encouraging in nearly all the districts. Mutare South has reported the largest number of circuits which, at the time of writing this report, are lagging far behind in pastoral support. Details are in the relevant reports which will come before this session.

<u>Pledges:</u> This method of support has remained as one of the major methods of church support during th year under review.

Harvest Thanksgiving:

Many local churches, circuits, and districts, have taken advantage of the celebrations of Harvest Thanksging and urged their members to give to their Lord generously. Districts which made careful preparations for their harvest raised a lot of money. Many local churches, circuits, and districts, have used Harvest Funds as a source to clear their obligations, at all levels of Conference. Harare Districts has decided to pool part of the money raised in harvest celebrations in order to start a development fund to be used for funding their church construction projects.

Tithing:

The 1992 Conference sitting in session at Mutambat passed a resolution calling on the Conference to embark on TITHING and promote it to become the major method of church support. Cabinet is extremely happy with the strides we have made so far in this regard. More than six hundred people are already tithing. When the leader begins to tithe, the followers (at least the majority of them) will tithe. Allow us to make special mention of Mr. Never Chirokote, the chairperson of Conference Stewardship Committee and Mr. William F. Marima, the Conference Director of Stewardship. They lauched their stewardship programme quite early in the year by organising workshops at which they taught and explained the concept of TITHING. These workshops were very successful and have helped to promote the enthusiasm and excitement for tithing which has now taken root in our Conference. (See petition under stewardship in this report).

Church Construction:

Cabinet is beginning to discover a great spirit of commitment and dedication by church members who are determined to raise money locally for the construction of their sanctuaries. This is a very commendable expression of our faith. We hope that the time will soon come when those congregations whose sanctuaries were built by donated funds will begin to make special contributions of new sanctuaries through-out the whole conference.

Africa University:

This university is situated hardly two kilometres from the venue of this Conference Session. Cabinet and all the Conference and district lay leaders have agreed to raise money locally from our members. We call upon the delegates and observers here present to go and promote Africa University during the next three months so that by March, 1994, we all bring our gifts to the Conference Treasurer through our districts. Both COM and CONFAD have endorsed this as one of the projects which we will promote locally. Let us demonstrate to the world that we are part of the General Church which is building Africa University. As a Conference, we are not mere spectators and recipients. We are big contributors and participants.

Africa University will be officially opened next year during the week end of April 22-24, 1994. All our African Bishops will be present. Many of our overseas bishops will be present. Our state President, His Excellency, R.G. Mugabe will be present. We call upon all our districts to come for this grand ocassion in full force.

Petition: Africa University (Funds)

Whereas Africa University, just a dream a few years ago, is now a reality. Whereas we as a Conference are all excited about the founding of this all important institution; whereas overseas churches have raised millions of dollars to fund the development and scholarship programme for Africa University; and whereas the Zimbabwe Annual Conference is committed to make a meaningful contribution to the development of the University, and whereas Cabinet, CONFAD and CCOM have all seen the need for each member of our conference to give generously, to the Conference Fund for Africa University.

Be it resolved therefore, by this session of our Conference:

- a) that each member of the church in Zimbabwe be requested to contribute to this fund,
- b) that a special Sunday to be called Africa University Sunday be designated on the Conference Calendar and,
- c) that all names of contributors be compiled and published in April 1994 when the University will be officially inurgurated.

MINISTRY OF ALL BELIEVERS:

It cannot be emphasized enough that the ministry of all believers - the LAITY - can be most adequately understood and effectively supervised only by the laity themselves. Hence the crucial importance of the role of our Layleaders at local church, circuit, district and conference levels, in the overall supervision and leadership of the ministry of the LAITY. Accordingly, none of the good work which we are reporting here, would have been achieved without the dedication, sacrifice and commitment of Christian service by our district layleaders under our conference lay leader. The Cabinet would like your delegates to meet your outstanding layleaders through the following very brief resumes:

William Fambai Marima - Conference layleader - undoubtedly the longest serving conference layleader in modern United Methodist Church's history, in an elected position. A man of broad experience who has widely traveled to Europe, Asia, USA and to many nations in Africa, mainly on church business! He has sat on numerous boards, councils and committees up to the General Church agencies of our denomination.

A gifted, spirit filled and cloquent speaker who leads by precept, Mr Marima had led generation of our District lay leaders. Cabinet invited you all to meet more of Mr Marima in a citation on him. (Appendix "A") below).

Pedzisai Kangara - (Vice Conference Lay-leader) proven educator and educationist - served the longest period as vice conference lay leader while leading Mutoko-Mudzi district for the longest time on record. He is widely traveled to attend two General Conferences. Humbly but effectively deputized a great conference layleader and helped enhance his boss's leadership.

Beatrice Mutasa - (Harare District) The entire Annual Conference salutes her as the first ever female district layleader, a member of the United Methodist General Council on Ministries, an attested long serving educator and educationist, a skilful chairperson of our top Council on finance and Administration (CONFAD) and a member of our denomination's top executive committee of ACG&D.

Enock Nyamupanda - (Murewa District) - a distinguished school head and prosperous businessman and farmer who passionately lead in the crusade for truth -- hating crooked dealings in matters of church life and witness. Now outgoing Treasurer for the United Methodist Man (MUMC)

John Gumiro - (Makoni-Buhera District) - educationist and longtime district layleader of the then Mutasa-Makoni District and presently leading the newly created Makoni-Buhera District, he is not afraid to navigate the district-ship through strange waters.

Eliatha Chikuni - (Mutasa-Nyanga District) - longtime educator and a powerful public speaker and Christian motivator. She rightly claims an enviable history-making position of the second female district layleader and above all the first ever Mutasa-Nyanga District Layleader.

John Zvinoira (Mutare South District) - a long serving leader of our conference's largest district; a successful businessman who has so impressively served our conference as member of the global church's top flight ACG&D committee. For many years now Mr Zvinoira has tenderly guided our UMYF as "Father Advisor" A man of short and few words that are loaded with action and wisdom.

Crabbie Chinomona - (Mutoko-Mudzi District) - the newest of our district lay leaders, who is also an educator/educationist served well as Nyadire Teacher's College's Vice Principal, now leading a large district which has achieved great strides in stewardship commitment and spiritual dynamism.

Wilbert Tabvuma - (Masvingo-Bulawayo District) - highly placed in Industrial Management career -- he is deeply committed to the well being of over twenty pastors and circuit(s) lay leaders serving in a very difficult and the geographically most extended district which present him with formidable organizational difficulties.

Benjamin Gam - (South Africa) - leads the largest district in United Methodist since South Africa as a whole is one gigantic district. He leads a United Methodist laity in an emerging -- hence Volatile Society of south Africa. Mr Gam is a committed Christian and churchman of high moral character who is loyal to his District Superintendent's leadership in both fair and stormy weather. When others desert, he stays faithful to Christ and His church!

For us cabinet, it is very clear that, without these men's and women's enormous courage, dedication and Christian commitment to the work of Christ through His Church, little could be achieved. Layleaders are key trainers and principal motivators of our laity to become faithful stewards and disciples of Christ and committed members of the United Methodist Church.

It goes without saying, therefore that we, your Superintendents, deeply cherish with much gratitude and appreciation the creative companionship between our district lay leaders and the district superintendents which had made God's work, this year, most satisfying. As "volunteers," we acknowledge their willingness to walk the "second mile" as they devote their precious time to developing and "coaching" our church's laity in the ministry of all believers.

PETITION: HARARE DISTRICT:

Whereas the church has positively grown and opened congregations in many areassince 1980; therefore be it resolved that Greendale, Dzivarasekwe and Mhondoro be circuits in 1994.

PETITION (MASVINGO BULAWAYO DISTRICT:

Whereas Zaka Circuit in Masvingo-Bulawayo District has become the fastest growing circuit in Zimbabwe Annual Conference:

1992 = 618 members 1993 = 733 members

Whereas distances between local churches of Zaka Circuit are too long, e.g. Muzondiya and Benzi is over 75 kilometers.

Therefore Petition is hereby submitted that Zaka Circuit be divided into two circuits:

Zaka East (Chipfunde) / Full members = 118

Probationers = 315

Zaka West (Muzondidya Full members = 107

Probationers = 160

Conclusion:

Cabinet is satisfied that most of our conference personnel and agencies have done an excellent job in excecuting their responsibilities. If the achievements and successes of 1993 are anything to judge by, then it appears to us that 1994 is poised for greater growth with more meaningful participation by all our members in the programme life of the church.

A CITATION IN PRAISE OF A NOBLE CHURCHMAN WILLIAM FAMBAI MARIMA BY THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS:

As an old English cliche rightly put it, words are not adequate enough to describe the work of a great leader like Mr William Fambai Marima. It is for this reason that the African sage laments in two brief words: "Kutaurirwa Hunyimwa!" (translated: Hearing great news by second hand report is like not being told at all!)

There are four mirrors through which one could only modestly unravel the mystique of Mr Marima as a Christian person, namely; Marima the man of God; Marima the churchman; Marima the Conference Lay leader, and Marima of Stewardship.

Beginning with Marima the man of God we have it written in stone that Marima took his Christian vocation so seriously that, even though he could have chosen a secular and more lucrative personal business venture -- in which he could have been quite

successful --- he preferred to build up wealth of God. In both fair weather and in storms, one would not question Mr Marima's passionate love for his God!

The second facet is that of Marima the Churchman. No one was more upset when the United Methodist Church was played with and when opportunity to serve God seriously was wasted, than Mr Marima.

At a time when plundering God's House (the Church) was fashionable, Mr Marima taught and demonstrated that God's "Cow" must be fattened.

Now the church wants to confess to you Mr Marina that, at times, the tasks you called us to tackle were difficult to do; and at times, your words sounded rather harsh and bitter to hear yet to those who truly love Jesus Christ, the same words tasted "sweeter than honey in their spiritual mouths consequently, and in fact, enjoyable! And the Church mushroomed!

The challenges you gave seemed impossible to meet, but you spoke in a way that made sheer "dreams" become true.

From a lofty mountain of your spirituality and personal commitment to Jesus Christ, you lured the whole church --- pulling us to reach for and claim the highest ground in our stewardship, discipleship and in practising genuine love for the church.

The third facet is that of Marima the Conference Lay leader. Who doubts that Zimbabwe Annual Conference is the "Jewel" of all African Annual Conferences? If all the credit was to be given to one person only, then it would go to Mr Marima!

As cabinet we think Mr Marima thoroughly understood and applied the principle that, before we speak to any believer about giving money to God" first and foremost the soul of every United Methodist ---rich or poor -- must be converted, cultivated, and nursed diligently.

However, as Cabinet, we also believe that Mr Marina did not achieve all this "by might nor by his own power, but by the spirit of God almighty." (Zacharia 4:6)

In this regard, Mr Marima led our Conference by being obedient to the guidance of the Holy Spirit. One might say that Mr Marima was so spirit filled himself that he lived out the beatitude about the blessing of "hungering and thirsting for righteousness' sake." So that before persuading new converts to give to God material possessions, Marima first enquired of his audience whether they loved God above everything.

The fourth and very important facet is that of Marima of Stewardship. At certain times, when speaking of "giving" to the church was a "dirty" and rather "optional"

thing to do, Marima became even bolder in his witness that: "Yes we just don't worship God with our hearts, soul, body and mind, but also with our material possessions too. He taught, by precept, that if a Christian truly loved God, he/she does so through concrete deeds of charity! (see St. James)

We have been with Mr Marina as Conference Lay leader for such a long time that dates themselves are not as relevant as our acknowledgement that the STORY of his career is almost synonymous with the miraculous growth of our Zimbabwe Annual Conference's stewardship commitment and development.

Under his tutelage, the sense of "giving" among the United Methodists grew from "A PENNY FOR GOD" ... to the present battle cry - "Big Dollars for God" and tithing as a biblical method of building GOD's kingdom on earth. With his unique approach to giving, numerous churches and parsonages have been built and are still being built.

Mr Marima started with a determination to have people travel their own spiritual journeys! He spoke of "Heaven" in an earthly idiom, and people -- as it were -- ""caught the Spirit" on giving freely to God.

The mystery of the phenomenal growth of our church can be comprehended only by those to whom "The secrets of heaven" have been revealed by Christ (St. Matthew 11:25) Otherwise, who can comprehend how poor peasant believers called United Methodists could raise thousands ... and now millions in harvest thanksgiving proceeds year-in and year-out!

Mbuya Marima:

Mbuya Marima was the powerhouse behind sekuru Marima

They say behind every greatman there is a great woman. Mbuya Marima is a strong church woman in her own right. She gave all the support Mr Marima needed to do the work in the vineyard of the Lord. The cabinet salutes you mbuya Marima. AMEN.

MALAWI MISSION FIELD:

Rev. G. Kapfumvuti - District Superintendent

1. Introduction:

Malawi is a country politically divided into three regions with a population of about 10.5 million. The work of United Methodist Church started about 7 years ago. At its birth there was a handful of members. At this point in time, work has expanded to the extent that membership stands at over two thousands.

2. The State of the Mission Field:

Malawi was declared a mission field in 1988 Annual Conference held at Nyadire. Currently there are four circuits each having an estimated distance of 320 km diametrically.

a. The Clergy:

The total clergy for this mission field is 4. There are two elders, one deacon and one local pastor. With the type and volume of work, there is need for qualified personnel if expansion is to be realistic.

We are gratified by the fact that the Board of Ordained Ministry has approved two candidates who will begin studies at United Theological College in 1994. These are Mr Smark Musinkhu and Mr Robert Mdoka.

b. Church Suppori:

United Methodist Church is new in the country and therefore the operational system of church support is also new to the people. The church working on

two fronts has a task to do. We work on membership drive and at the same time teach people to give. The response is quite positive where our people are learning to give in support of the church. Some circuits will support themselves fully by the year 2000. People are eager and ready to work but they need time to grow.

c. <u>Infrastructures:</u>

In this mission field we have 4 church sites which await development. In the rural areas we have 26 local congregations out of which 9 churches are built and grass thatched. These are temporary shelters.

We have currently no parsonage in this mission field. Sites for parsonages are available at church sites since the sites are reasonably big.

3. Achievements:

As a mission field we have managed to do the following:-

- a. We have managed to build 9 churches in rural areas without external help. We have photographs of some of these.
- b. We have managed to achieve Harvest Thanksgiving of MK13 053,05.
- c. Through evangelism programme our membership has continued to grow.

4. Petition:

a. Whereas it is the circuit's responsibility to provide accommodation for the pastor and whereas the circuits in the mission area are unable to provide parsonages to its pastors and

Whereas two pastors are living in their own houses without receiving rent and, the other two pastors are living in houses where they pay rent from their own salaries. Therefore be it resolved that fund be raised for the construction of six parsonages and that from 1994 all pastors be given rent for the houses they are

occupying. (referred to CONFAD)

b. Whereas the church is growing numerically and geographically in Malawi and Whereas inorder to assure that the church is developing in the right direction a strong infrastructure has to be created: and whereas both personnel, financial and other necessary resources for creating such an infrastructure are not available in the mission area, Therefore be it be resolved that;

i. Missionary from the Board of Global Ministries be appointed to Malawi. But it must be noted that Malawi refused to have a missionary even though the rejection was not representative of all the people concerned. The

missionary is now appointed to Mozambique.

ii. A mission centre be established in Malawi and, funds be raised for that purpose and that a feasibility study be done for the establishment of a mission centre. The United Methodist church in Malawi must know that this can not be done over night.

3. Whereas most of the pastors who have worked in the mission area since 1985 sacrificed to do without basic requirements for their ministry e.g. travel, means of transport and whereas the minimum distances between the circuits are big like 300 Km to 400Km and distanced from local churches are sometimes 60Km, and

Whereas the circuit are unable to provide even the basic facilities. Therefore be it resolved by this annul conference that:

- a. The pastors' salaries be improved
- b. Funds be sought for the purchase of five motor bikes.
- Whereas a step has been taken to train both clergy and laity in the field of theology, Christian education and other areas pertaining the church work in Malawi and;

Whereas it is clear that the development of the church will not be possible without training programmes. Therefore be it resolved that four ministry to women and children chairperson be sponsored to attend the 1994 RRW leadership training to be held in Malawi.

5. Appreciation:

- a. We thank the Bishop, Christopher Jokomo for his episcopal visit to the church in Malawi for seven days. the church was blessed and requires his revisitation. The church awaits the spiritual mother (Mai Bishop).
- b. We thank God for the visit of the Area Secretary for Southern Africa designate Rev. Thomas Logsdon. He visited some local churches and the entire church feels greatly encouraged and inspired by his divine messages.
- c. We thank the Bishop and Area Secretary for allocating funds for Evangelism work without which there should have been no church growth.
- d. We are grateful for the funds designated for Pastor's travel and women and youth programmes. This has come from the General Board of Global Ministries.
- e. We appreciate the work that has been done by the people and lay pastors, District Lay leader Mrs B. Mutasa and Mr S. Machuma and the whole district.
- 6. As a mission field, we are grateful to what this Annual Conference has done.

SOUTH AFRICA DISTRICT

I. INTRODUCTION

South Africa is 1,127,200 square kilometres in size. It stretches from the Limpopo River in the north to the southern tip of the continent. To its west is the Atlantic Ocean and Namibia, to the east is the Indian Ocean and to the north and north-east are -Zimbabwe and Mozambique, respectively. It is divided into four (4) provinces viz Cape Colony (644,060 sq kms), Natal (91.740 sq kms), Orange Free State (125,930 sq kms) and Transvaal (265,470 sq kms). Within its borders are the so-called Homelands and two sovereign states of Lesotho and Swaziland.

2. DISTRICT BOUNDARIES

The United Methodist District of South Africa includes South Africa, the sovereign states of Lesotho, Swaziland and Namibia. English is one of the official languages in the entire region. Furthermore, Namibia and South Africa share a commonality of currency and Afrikaans Language.

3. <u>HISTORICAL BACKGROUND</u>

The United Methodist Church was established here in 1983. In order to differentiate it from an indigenous church which originated from the Transkei (Homeland) known as the United Methodist Church of Southern Africa, our church was registered as The United Methodist Church of South Africa.

In 1988 the Africa Central Conference meeting in Kinshasa, Zaire assigned the supervision of the work in South Africa to the Zimbabwe Annual Conference which in turn created a district out of this region with the Rev Joseph Mahlatsi, who had worked almost single-handedly for the acceptance of this church into the fold of the General Church, as the District Superintendent. For two consecutive years that followed, the work here was completely in the hands of South African Nationals. During that same period a schism occurred over the question of leadership resulting in two opposed groups of The United Methodist Church of South Africa, The Rev Mahlatsi remained at the helm of one of the groups and the Zimbabwe Annual Conference, while it did not completely disregard the other group, found itself obligated to stand by the "Mahlatsi Group".

However, with an interest to foster church unity and progress in the region, the Conference appointed a "missionary district superintendent" in the person of the Rev. Isaac Mawokomatanda in may 1991. And in that same year a merger of the two factions was achieved through personal involvement of Bishop Abel T. Muzorewa who was the area Resident Bishop then. In August 1992 the Rev. Mawokomatanda was succeeded by the Rev. John F. Munjoma as District Superintendent.

4. THE STATE OF THE DISTRICT

The merger has managed to hold its own ever since it was initiated. However, occurrences that are reminders of the schism do take place here and there, time and again.

Currently, the United Methodist Church is in Namibia and in all of South Africa except Natal. There are some congregations and circuits as well in the present Homelands of Bophuthatswana and Transkei. Our work is markedly concentrated in the Cape Colony Province where nine (9) of the fifteen (15) circuits, twenty-six (26) of the forty-one (41) congregations and 1 242 out of a total of 1 681 are found. (See Appendix 11) Please note that the membership figures are based on the 1992 statistical report as the 1993 figures were not available at the time this report was prepared.

(a) The Clergy:

Out of a total of twenty-five (25) pastors there are only four (4) who have received ordination and training. As would be expected, this presents the district with a mammoth problem. A need for professionally qualified clergy such as our own can result in the retardation of church programme. When this happens, then the vitalization of congregations becomes impossible, and where congregations are not vitalised; rigidity to changed sets in; and where rigidity to change reigns, church paralysis abounds. We are almost there!

To guard against this danger we are planning to step up as well as improve our training seminars for both the clergy and lay leadership as a first-aid remedy. This will include an annual Pastors' School. Furthermore, we are leaving no stone unturned in an effort to getting trained clergy as well as qualified candidates for the Ordained Ministry. This year we suffered a set-back in this regard when three candidates either changed their mind and withdrew or failed to secure the appropriate documents to study at the United Theological College (UTC) in Harare.

We are gratified by the fact that the Board of Ordained Ministry has approved two candidates who will begin studies at United Theological College next year. These are:-Christina Jikingqina and Amanda N. Mahlasela. We thank God for these two and ask the conference to remember them in your prayers.

(b) Church Support

The retardation of Church programmes is most profoundly evidenced in this regard. Generally speaking, financial support is still very low indeed throughout the district. Very few circuits operate on the basis of a budget and as a result only one or two pastors are sure of getting a full salary every month. Because of this the majority of our pastors are part-time; 15 out of a

total of 25, to be exact. Again the vitality of the Church is greatly compromised.

This has to be reversed and reversed sooner than later, in order to vitalize congregations in the district. The old expression, "Cast your bucket where you are" does apply here. We are therefore having to step up and revamp our annual lay training programme so that we concentrate on one given Region at one given time with emphasis on the Budget System, Christian Education, Evangelism, Stewardship and Tithing for the rest of the quadrennium. Circuit and local training seminars will be continued as well as intensified.

(c) <u>Infrastructure</u>

As would be expected, there is no infrastructure of any sort in the district as this requires finance. We have, however, six church sites in the district. Most of these have been in existence for quite some time now. On three of them we have temporary structures, the rest are still open and bare grounds. God willing, we plan to begin building on at least two in the not too distant future and with local funds! In fact, the revamping of our annual lay training programme referred to above, is targeted toward this and other projects in the district. We are grateful to the Zimbabwe Annual Conference who, through the action of CONFAD on 17 April 1992, gave us a grant of ZS200,000 towards the purchase of a district parsonage. We are hoping that this grant will give us the shot in the arm that we so badly need in our drive to acquire property and put infrastructure in place on our own or with very little outside help.

(d) <u>District Conference:</u>

There is a District Conference organized and structured in accordance with the Book of Discipline and the requirements of the Zimbabwe Annual Conference. We use this forum to effect changes that do not require Annual Conference action and to set in motion those that need to be sanctioned by the Conference.

We were graced by the presence of Bishop Christopher Jokomo; his Administrative Assistant, the Rev Samson J Mungure; the Director of Christian Education, Evangelism and Worship, the Rev Christopher Chikoore; the Rev Eliah Chitiyo; the Rev Elisha Kabungaidze; Mrs Norah Kadenge; the Director of Youth Work, the Rev Geoffrey Kagoro; the Registrar, the Rev Gift Machinga; Mr Marahwa; the Conference Lay Leader, Mr William F Marima and Mrs Lois Marima; Mrs Vickie Mbewe; the Rev Blessing Mukoyi and the Conference Youth Advisor Mr John R Zvinoira at this year's historic session which met in Sterkspruit, Transkei. The District Conference approved a budget for next year and elected a youth to the office of District Treasurer - Miss Bulelwa Makeleni.

(e) Achievements

As a district that is still in its "crawling stage", we boast of things the rest of the Zimbabwe Area may regard as routine. You only have to remember that you were once exactly where we are at now.

- 1. Two candidates approved to begin studies at UTC next year.
- We appeared in last year's Statisticians Report (See Journal).
- 3. On district level we have managed to start on the right foot. We involve men, women and youth in key district offices.
- 4. A budget is in place for next year.

GOALS

- (a) Establish the Church in Natal in this quadrennium.
- (b) To be a tithing church by the year 2000.
- (c) To be a Provisional Conference by end of 1996.
- (d) To win an additional 1 200 members next year.
- (e) To invest more money and time in leadership training next year.
- (f) To construct at least two churches and two parsonages by the end of 1995.
- (g) Develop our Johannesburg circuit by putting into place infrastructure and personnel befitting the cosmopolitan nature of the city, thereby ensuring The United Methodist Church of a viable centre there by the end of the quadrennium.

6. <u>RECOMMENDATIONS</u>

- (a) That the Conference, through CONFAD, grant South Africa at least ZS60,000-00 to jump-start our leadership training programme.
- (b) That a separate Pastors' School be organized for pastors in the district to enhance leadership training and let the first Pastors' School be held in August of 1994 and every August thereafter.
- (c) That as a Mission Field the district be given a grant of Z\$50 000-00 for a two year Evangelism programme.
- (d) That the present boundaries of the district, which fall within the political and economic fabric of the general area, be not compromised in one way or another.
- (e) See Petitions.

SOUTH AFRICA CONVENTION

WHEREAS, the Zimbabwe Episcopal Area includes Botswana, Malawi, South Africa, Zambia and Zimbabwe itself; and

WHEREAS, this vast Area is, for the purposes of administration. sub-divided into eight (8) districts viz Harare (including Malawi and Zambia), Makoni-Buhera, Masvingo-Bulawayo (including Botswana), Murewa, Mutare South, Mutasa-Nyanga, Mutoko-Mudzi and South Africa; and,

WHEREAS, these districts are grouped into clusters known as Conventions to accommodate the three church organizations so that vernacular would be the medium in meetings: North (Murewa and Mutoko-Mudzi), South (Makoni-Buhera, Mutare South and Mutasa-Nyanga) and West (Harare, Masvingo-Bulawayo and South Africa); and

WHEREAS, the West Convention, as presently constituted. defeats the very purpose conventions were created for by ignoring both the format and medium of a convention;

THEREFORE, be it resolved, that the fourteenth (14th) session of the Zimbabwe Annual Conference (1) Create a fourth convention,

- (2) take South Africa out of the West Convention,
- (3) establish it as the fourth convention and
- (4) designate it the South Africa Convention.

XOSA HYMNAL

WHEREAS, the District Conference has agreed to create a one-volume Xosa Language Hymnal for The United Methodist Church which will consist primarily of hymns, including both traditional and contemporary texts and tunes, as well as the basic worship resources needed by a United Methodist Congregation, such as services of the Sacraments, psalms and some other acts of worship; and.

WHEREAS, a district hymnal Committee has been created by the District Conference by re-designating its own Worship Committee as the District Worship and Hymnal Committee until the completion and publication of the hymnal; and,

WHEREAS, the District Worship and Hymnal Committee shall work in consultation and co-operation with the Conference Committee on Worship and The United Methodist Publication and Stationers Foundation in the creation and publication of the book; and.

WHEREAS, there is an urgent need to create and publish such a book for our Xosa speaking congregations;

THEREFORE, be it resolved, that this fourteenth (14th) Session of the Zimbabwe Annual Conference (1) endorse the creation and work of the South Africa District Worship and Hymnal Committee, (2) urge the publication of their work as soon as feasible; and

Be it further resolved, that the Session, closer to the date of the publication of the hymnal, commend the completed and published book to the South Africa District for use as an official hymnal of the denomination.

DISTRICT DIRECTOR OF COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

WHEREAS, South Africa is the eighth (8th) district of the Zimbabwe Annual Conference making it an integral part of the Conference; and

WHEREAS, both the Zimbabwe Annual Conference and the General Board of Global Ministries regard South Africa as a Mission Field; and

WHEREAS, the projects from this Mission Field and those from the rest of the Conference are presently forwarded to would-be donors, that include the General Board of Global Ministries, under one umbrella, Zimbabwe; and

WHEREAS, this single Umbrella System puts both the Mission Field and the rest of the Conference at a great disadvantage by jockeying against each other;

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the 1993 Session of the Zimbabwe Annual

Conference

- (1) abolish the Single Umbrella system of forwarding projects to would-be donors,
- (2) permit South Africa to designate its District Chairperson of Council on Ministries as the District Director of C.O.M. and
- (3) allow South Africa's processed projects to be forwarded to would-be donors separately under the umbrella of the Mission Field.

- 1. We appreciate this conference for an effort to make our lives easier by reviewing our salaries. We urge our circuits to meet at least the approved basic salary.
- 2. We appreciate this conference's effort in increasing the pension to raise the figures our retired colleagues are getting. We urge the conference to keep on at the figure of \$100,00 we now have, though much better, it is by far unsatisfactory.
- 3. We appreciate this conference's support in making us grow intellectually by making provisions for Pastors Schools and Crush Programme.

Recommendations:

- 1. The contribution rate by members be changed to 6% of pensionable salary and the employer contribute at the rate of 9% of members salaries.
- 2. Properties be bought for the Ministers Pension Fund as is the case with the lay workers Pension Fund.
- 3. We recommend that the conference get us a company of insurers and a policy that will offer us the best possible proceeds.
- 4. We recommend (after an unanimous agreement) that ministers salaries come from a common pool and we further recommend that CONFAD look into the detail of mechanics of implementation.
- We recommend that the Board of Ordained Ministry make an effort to identify talents of pastors and train them to develop these talents to specific work ares of our church.

BOARD ON LAY ACTIVITIES REPORT:

BOLA appreciates the support received from Bishop C. Jokomo and Mrs Edith Jokomo during the year. We pray that they be given more blessings. BOLA would like to thank clergy for work done in various areas of their ministry.

We praise God for the work done by BOLA in 1993.

CONCERNS:

BOLA raised the following concerns:

- a. The shortage of qualified clergy personnel. Some of those who intend to join United Theological College are lacking "O" level qualifications demanded.
- b. The state of our mission centres remains a matter of great concern (see 1992 Journal p. 116 No.2) various problems and causes were suggested like lack of funds, negligence and lack of job descriptions and division of labour.
- c. BOLA noted the need for personnel to help lead and develop the church in South Africa and other areas outside Zimbabwe boundaries.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. Study groups be established at circuit, district and conference level with the main aim of coaching school leavers wanting to enter ministerial training but are lacking full 'O' level certificate required at United Theological College.
- 2. Preference be given to United Methodists who have the necessary qualifications when enrolments are taking place in our institutions.
- 3. Lay Trainings be intensified in South Africa and Malawi.
- Qualified personnel/missionaries be sent to serve in specific capacities in South Africa.
- 5. South Africa District be urged to identify people who can be sent to United Theological College, Africa University and the crush programme for training.
- 6. Maintenance units be established if they do not exist in our centres.
- 7. Yearly ground maintenance competitions be introduced for mission centres.
- 8. Prayer groups within our local churches, circuits and districts be within our tradition and not to do things which offend others.

3.0. <u>AFRICA CHURCH GROWTH & DEVELOPMENT (ACG&D)</u>

- 3.1. Feasibility study on the relocation of (M.R.I.D) is underway.
- 3.2. Dr Humbane the new Executive Director visited Zimbabwe Annual Conference and the ACG&D sponsored projects in August 1993.
- 3.3. There is need to complete and up-date the list of ACG&D sponsored projects in the Zimbabwe Annual Conference.

4.0. <u>AUDIT:</u>

- 4.1. Most units were audited at least twice in 1993.
- 4.2. A workshop on Financial Administration was run for Heads of Unites/Schools and bursars. This was appreciated though some did not attend.
- 4.3. It has been noted that most treasurers of units and districts are not bonded.
- 4.4. General administration of funds has improved and fraudulent behaviour has been identified and dealt with.

5.0. PERSONNEL AND POLICY:

- 5.1. The revision and up-dating of the conference policy document is going on.
- 5.2. The policy document should be inclusive of conference policies i.e. including organizations and other agencies" policies/
- 5.3. Reports to Annual Conference need to be in early so that secretaries finish work on them early to allow time for delegates, pastors, etc. to study the reports before Annual conference for fruitful discussion.
- 5.4. New salary scales for conference workers have been adopted.
- 5.5. Inclusiveness in all spheres is viewed as very important in our church.

6.0. PROJECTS AND FUND-RAISING:

- 6.1. Fund raising projects within our church have been identified and listed:
 - 3 commercial farms
 - 2 tenant farms
 - 2 buses
 - 1 craft-shop

1 butchery

1 grinding mill

6 tuck-shops in mission centres

1 book shop

- 6.2. There has been a re-look at Umbowo which was banned.
- 6.3. It is noted with appreciation that some projects are making profit and progressing.
- 6.4. There is still work to be done to improve those projects which are still limping. They need encouragement and support in expertise and otherwise.
- 6.5. Some projects now have board of Governors appointed to run them.
- 6.6. Co-ordination of projects run by Board of Governors and projects without Board of Governors with CONFAD is important.

7.0. TARIRO BUS SERVICE:

- 7.1. Tariro now has a Board of Governors appointed to run it since January 1993. Chairperson Mr D.Z. Mareya Secretary Mrs B. Chesa
- 7.2. Plans to register Tariro as a company are now underway.
- 7.3. There are two buses and both have current valid certificate of fitness.
- 7.4. Bus one which is about eight years old has aged and so breakdowns are becoming more frequent.
- 7.5. Both buses are averaging a monthly mileage of 4 000km which is rather low.
- 7.6. Business is seasonal some months are very good while there is virtually no business other months.
- 7.7. Measurers have been taken to establish a proper accounting system.
- 7.8. Both buses have full comprehensive cover insurance.
- 7.9. Tariro rates of \$5,50 per km are relatively low as compared to other buses.
- 7.10. Profits.
- 7.10.1 Tariro has made profits over the ears through interest accrued to the benefit of the conference accounts.
- 7.10.2 Tariro proceeds have paid for the complete installation of the new Head Office PABX at \$26,259.50.

- 8.3. The Treasurer has warned that overseas contribution will be reduced by 15% of the 1993 revenue figures. Hence there is need to step up local contributions.
- 8.4. The revised conference charges are:

- 8.5. Payments of levy are usually delayed.
- 8.6. There is need for church organs and districts to give financial reports to CONFAD to facilitate decision making.

9.0. MAJOR CONCERNS:

- 9.2. Tithe has not yet quite taken off.

- 9.5. Non payment or delayed payments by district (apportionments) This creates problems for the treasurer in trying to meet pay outs.
- Implementing recommendation from the Equitable Salary Commission during the course of the year since the commission should report to the Annual Conference.

1994 REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE BUDGET FOR CONFERENCE UNITS:

1. <u>INTRODUCTION</u>

The CONFAD, through the Budget Committee is in the process of restructuring our Budgeting Systems in line with the CONFAD objectives that are stipulated in the Book of Discipline.

2. The key Objectives of CONFAD are as follows:-

- 2.1. To ensure that units, districts work areas and agencies hereinafter referred to as organs of the Annual Conference have proper financial statements or books.
- 2.2 To ensure that all organs of the Annual Conference submit annually the Revenue and Expenditure Budgets to CONFAD.
- 2.3 To ensure that all organs of the Annual Conference have Capital Budgets for each quadrennium and that those organs report to CONFAD on the income and expenditure.
- 2.4 To ensure that all organs submit termly financial reports to CONFAD so that such reports will become the basis for decision making by CONFAD on the Financial Management of the Conference.
- 2.5 To ensure that CONFAD set aside a fiscal policy for each Quadrennium.
- 2.6 To ensure that the District Finance Chairperson report to CONFAD termly on the Financial activities of the Districts and their Mission Centres.

In fulfilment of the CONFAD objectives, the Annual Conference units, Districts, Work areas, projects and head Office have been requested to present their 1994 Revenue and Expenditure Budgets. These have been grouped into specific categories for comparison purposes. It is hoped that this information will help the Bishop;

- 3. Bishop and the Conference, the following estimates of income and expenditure for the entire Conference and its agencies and units are presented in categories.
- 3.1 In 1994 the High Schools require Revenue amounting to \$12,807,924 for the efficient running of our Institutions of Higher learning. This is financed by Revenue from Fees and per Capita grants where applicable.
- 3.2 The Primary Schools require \$1 098 525 for their operations financed by the Government grants, and from school fees.
- 3.3 The Districts require a total of \$1 487 881 for the administration and operation of the church work areas. These estimates include the D/S Budgets. This is financed by revenue from the Conference Treasury and from District Circuit.
- 3.4 The Mission Centres require a total of 1 246 078 for the efficient operation of the Mission station. This is all financed by levies from the units or departments at each mission.
- 3.5 The Church Hospitals require a total of \$4 639 174 which is partly financed by Government Grants and by Church and its agencies.
- 3.6 The projects of the conference will require a total of \$4 063 836 for their efficient

- operations. This is financed from services and sales in order to generate a surplus of \$726,109.
- 3.7 The Head Office Administration excluding the Episcopal Budget and the Missionary vote will require \$191 190 for the efficient running of the United Methodist Church.

The entire Conference administration and programmes will require a total amount of \$2 419 927 for the efficient operations administration and programme work.

3.9 The Zimbabwe Annual Conference including its units, Districts work areas and agencies 1994 Budget summary consists of:-

CONFERENCE TREASURER'S AUDITED REPORT:

REJ Chimonyo TREASURER

United Methodists are faced with new challenges and new opportunities. Expansion resulting in new circuits calls for mote parsonages and additional salaries. Additional districts call for more funding. Additional number of theological trainees call for more funding. More and more buildings are needed everywhere within our boundaries.

External funds continue to be on the decline. The Zimbabwe Annual conference has no choice but to look for better ways to raise funds to maintain our old structures and also be able to fund new areas of work. In 1992 Annual Conference agreed to move into tithing as our method of giving. It is hoped that this will make it possible for us to continue to nurture what has been started and still be able to meet new challenges.

Our three sets of books have been audited for the period ended September 30, 1993. I am glad to report that they were all found to be in good order.

- a. Lay workers retirement fund of the United Methodist Church continues to grow from strength to strength. Interest earned from investments for twelve months of the audited period amount to \$118,181,00.
- b. The Pension Fund of Zimbabwe Annual Conference has fared well despite the large amounts of arrears held in circuits. At the end of the audit period \$98,000,00 representing the period \$1988-93 had not been sent to the Conference Treasurer. Each minister has been issued a schedule showing how much is outstanding in their own case.

In spite of this problem, we have been able to earn \$62,284,00 interest.

SPECIAL NEED: The quarterly payments we make to our retired ministers are adversely affected by current inflation rate. At the time of writing this report, the Board of Pension has not met. The Conference Treasurer is asking Annual conference to approve from 1/1/94 S26,00 per month or S78,00 per quarter for each minister. This will mean that none will be paid less than S100,00 per month. I believe we can meet this need from the interest. (Special approval is needed for this item).

Lay workers Retirement Fund of the United Methodist Church and Pension Fund of Zimbabwe Annual Conference are audited by Messrs Kadzirange &Co.

c. The United Methodist Church books are audited by Ernst and Young who are hired

by the Board of Global Ministries in New York.

The United Methodist Church books do not take into account certain land and building held under title, valued at approximately \$32,000,000,00.

Loans amounting to \$266 134,00 are secured by a first mortgage over stands 1424 and 1425 (Conference Headquarters), Lot 1/200 Highlands (Episcopal Residence), Stand 283 Masvingo (District Parsonage) and Stand 9571 (RRW house). Some of these should be paid in full by the time we report at the 1994 Annual Conference.

With financial assistance from UMCOR in U.S.A. we have been able to purchase seed for needy families in all our districts, spending \$380,293,00. These seed packs and agricultural inputs have been paid through the offices of the District superintendents.

m grateful for the continued support that I received from many Christian friends both al and overseas. When we have such a crowd of witnesses, "Let us run with ermination the race that lies before us. Let us keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, on whom faith depends from the beginning to the end."

AUDITORS' MANAGEMENT REPORT:

1. MINISTERS' PENSION CONTRIBUTION:

During our audit of the Ministers and Church contributions to the pension fund, we noted that most of the ministers' payments were in arrears. This has resulted in arrears of over S98 000 since 1988, which have been paid for by the Pension Fund tot he Assurance Company.

To enable the pension fund to be financially viable and pay reasonable pensions to retired Ministers and widows. We recommend that:

- Tighter control be introduced to ensure contributions are received on a
 monthly or Quarterly basis. The Conference should produce monthly or
 Quarterly reconciliations of payments and expected receipts to be agreed by
 the various districts per ministers under district.
- ii. To ensure no further financial loss to the pension fund from existing arrears contributions, the fund should collect the arrears contributions from the various districts, ministers and conference itself.

2. EXTERNAL MINISTERS:

We are made to understand that minister on overseas study do not earn a salary for the period they are on study. We however, noted that their pensions contributions were being paid for by the pension fund as opposed to conference. We suggest that this anomaly be addressed either as the conference's responsibility or that the ministers themselves. This includes Ministers on suspension.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORT:

Chairman: R.M. Kawenda

We are very pleased to present the report of the activities of the Board of Trustees during 1993, pertaining to the state of properties held in trust for the Zimbabwe Annual Conference.

1. <u>Conference House Rents:</u> As reported in the 1992 Conference Journal P.157, house rents have been increased. Many centres have adopted and followed the rent increases. In isolated cases only, the executive of the Board has met with tenants to answer questions and explain the necessity of increasing rents, and the need for signed lease agreements with each tenant.

2. Good Tenant Deposit Trust Account:

The Board of Trustees has ruled that all the deposit amounts paid by tenants shound be sent to the Conference Treasurer who will, in turn, open a special Trust Account in the Conference Books to ensure that when tenants leave our properties, their deposits can be paid without possibilities of default on the part of the Church. We still insist that these deposits be sent to the Head Office with accompanying copies of the signed leases.

4. Conference Store Room:

The Board has located a site on which to build a Conference Store-Room. Plans have been submitted to Harare City Council. We hope the building should be ready for use before June 1994. The storage house at the United Theological College has been donated to the College for use as accommodation.

5. Church Site Leases: Owners Charges: Property Rates:

We are glad to report that most congregations have accepted our action as per 1992 Conference Journal P.160, Item 10. The Conference has been relieved of Rural Church site leasee rent, owners charges and rates as they are now being paid by users. Every church site must have a Lease Agreement between the Local Authority and the United Methodist Church.

6. Electrification of Nyadire Mission:

The greater part of electrification at Nyadire has been done and paid by the CONFAD. The remaining small jobs are now being done and paid for by the Station Executive.

7. Mutare Girls Hostel Grounds Purchase.

The Board has ruled that Mutare Girls Hostel Board of Governors look seriously into the matter of purchasing the grounds at the Hostel, even if this can be done by mortgage loan.

8. Registered Deeds:

We now hold Title Deeds for Stand Lot 1 of Stand 29 Malvern Township Waterfalls, also known as 1/29 Cassino Waterfalls Parsonage.

9. Registration of Title Deeds in Progress:

Stand 684 Midlands Township of Subdiviosn C of Subdivion A of Upper Waterfalls (mortgage bond paid in full).

- Gweru East Circuit .Land Purchase with help of Lay Workers Retirement Fund.
- Stand 7121 Zengeza Chitungwiza Parsonage.

10. <u>Inventory and Insurance of Buildings:</u>

a. The Board is encouraging all districts and units to make sure that correct inventories are recorded and kept for each unit in the Conference.

b. The Board has found that it is impossible for all Conference properties to be insured under one cover, and for the Conference itself to pay that one premium, approximately \$100 000,00 annually. Instead, what the Board finds practical is for each Mission Station, or Unit or District to insure Conference properties directly under use and pay their own premium. It is being negotiated that all these properties are insured through Willis Corroon Insurance Brokers ZTA House, 95 Baker Avenue, P.O. Box 774 Harare. Mr G. Maponga - representative Tel. Nos. 793601, 703541, 703546 OR ANY OF THEIR BRANCHES IN YOUR OWN TOWNS. We are hoping that a system will emerge, where all our properties will be insured under one Policy, but that Mission Stations, Units or Districts can be able to pay just for the properties, under their direct use and care. Ground work has already been done and the company awaits to be contacted by centres.

11. Episcopal Vehicle:

The Board is happy to report that the Toyota Cressida for the Bishop is now on the road after repairs. A joint meeting of the representatives of the Board and the Episcopacy Committee took place during which many items pertaining to the use of the vehicle were discussed. Some of the issues included the security of the vehicle, non-vacating issue for the tenant at the Episcopal residence.

12. Accommodation:

At the time of writing this report, Bishop's family was still staying at 6 Gloucester Drive Eastle Harare. To improve security there, a durawall had been installed including a solid gate.

Although the lease at 3 Wetmore Close ended April 30, 1993, the tenant refused to move out on the grounds that there was an understanding between him and Tony West Real Estate that the lease would be renewed for a further period ending April 30, 1994. The Board investigated the nature of this 'understanding' and could only conclude that it must have been verbal and therefore not legal. Our legal advisers have told the Board that to evict the tenant needs court action. Unfortunately, there are many outstanding cases, which might mean ours might not enter the High Court until after two or three years. As this might cause the tenant to stay longer or beyond April 30, 1994, it has been decided to accept an undertaking that the tenant will definitely vacate our proprety without prejudice on or by April 30, 1994.

Since Tony West had not handled our house situation to our expectations. This Real Estate Company was dropped as managers of Conference rented houses. They have been replaced by Guest and Tanner Real Estate.

N.B: The tenant finally vacated the house on November 29, 1993.

13. Zimbabwe Annual Conference Constitutional Amendment:

The Zimbabwe Annual Conference Constitution (1981) needs revision or amendments to be consistent with the quadrennial up-dates of the Book of Discipline and the local needs of the ZimbabweAnnual Conference. A committee comprising Mr R.M. Kawenda (Convenor), Rev. Christopher Chikoore and Mr R.E.J. Chimonyo has been tasked for this purpose. These will work in consultation with our lawyers.

14. New Mission Store Rented - Old Mutare:

The Board of Trustees has entered into an Agreement to lease the former Machiwenyika Store at Old Mutare to Odzani Trading Company represented by Mr M. O'Dennell. The lease is a five year lease beginning October 1, 1993 with a 20% built-in escalating increase annually. He has already paid.

15. <u>Leasing Portion of Old Mutare Mission Farm:</u>

Agreement of Leasing a portion of Old Mutare Mission farm to Africa University is almost complete.

16. New Leases for Nyakatsapa and Arnoldine Mission Farms:

New leases are under review for two tenant farms: Nyakatsapa and Arnoldine. Among other changes, charges will be based on acreage instead of a blanket annual lease as in the past. Also, the new leases will be based on five year period, instead of being indefinite as in the past.

17. Conference Utensils:

The Conference Utensils have now been located, and are at the Conference Headquarters in Harare. These can be used by hosting district for Annual Conference use. The Board would like to remind users, that when taking the utensils, a count be conducted, then upon returning, a count will be conducted. Losses should be replaced before returning them to Conference Headquearters.

18. <u>Conference Diesel Generators:</u>

The Board of Trustees has not located the two or three diesel generators for revival meetings electrical power. The one is Mutasa-Nyanga district must be taken to Harare by the District Superintendent within the next three months and continue to look for the other one.

19. Development of Conference Headquarters - Harare:

The cabinet brought to Board of Trustees, long term plans to develop the Conference Headquarters building, by replacing the present buildings with a six storey complex. The Board voted unanimously in favour of this plan and hope that Annual Conference will approve of this grand idea in principle, and create

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a machinery whereby Cabinet, CONFAD, COM and the Board can set strategies for the plan to materialise. The estimated cost for the Head quarters building is \$22 million.

20. Conference Building Inspector Reports:

The inclusion of the Conference Building Inspector as an ex-officio member of the Board of Trustees has proved to be excellent move. Some of the recommendations from the Inspector appear in this report and recommendations.

21. Conference House Rents:

It has come to the attention of the Board that certain units of the Conference are not paying 50% of their rent collections to the Conference. This attitude is regretable. We remind all units to comply with the conference ruling, that 50% of all rent collections be sent to the Conference Treasurer, while the other 50% is retained at the unit for minor repairs and maintenance of the rented properties.

22. Counsel from Building Inspector:

- a. Water Supply/System and Sewage Facilities in our mission centres are not meeting the required or expected standards. There is need for up-date in this matter. As advice can be obtained from experts in this field, even if that means getting advice from those outside our mission centres.
- b. No trees should be grown near buildings and soak-aways.
- When constructing new buildings make sure that bath rooms and toilets are separated.
- d. Gutters should be cleaned before the rainy season, each year.
- e. Any cooking done outside dwelling houses, should be done away from buildings.
- f. Walls and doors of houses should be painted in different colours.
- g. There is need in the Conference to develop uniform pattern of housing and development in general. There are many cases where a house has been built in a wrong place. There is need for a survey for development on our mission centres so that building expansion follows a definite plan.

RECOMMENDATIONS: The Board recommend the following:-

- 1. That there be a conference building committee, which will work in close cooperation with the building inspector. In as much as we have an audit committee under CONFAD, it is imperative that we have a building committee which would approve house plans, aprove sites for new buildings on our mission sites, and supervises all conference building operations.
- 2. That Station Executives and board of Trustees have a meeting once per year to share successes and help each other with concerns and problems.

3. That the Zimbabwe Annual Constitution of 1981 be revised to cover certain aspects like guarantees, and those matters which have been included in the new

prints of the Books of Discipline.

4. That all Good tenant deposits collected from Mission tenants be sent to Conference Treasurer who should open a Trust Account in the Conference books. This is a very important legal matter, so that when a tenant leaves our premises at the termination of their lease, their deposit can be paid without delay, refunds can be guaranteed.

5. That copies of all leases signed at Mission centres be sent to the Conference

Board of Trustees for records.

EPISCOPACY REPORT

CHAIRPERSON - Denham A. Chidiya SECRETARY - Virginia Kagoro

Bishop and Conference, we, your committee, are pleased to present our report to you.

1993 was indeed a year of new experience for your committee - why? Because for the majority of the members, it was our first time to see what a new bishop "looks like". Fortunately, our task was easy because during the last quadrennium, we were all (as a conference) gearing up for this experience.

Welfare of the Chief Pastor and His Family

We regret to inform conference that during the year under review, the Bishop has lost close relatives. On behalf of the Bishop's family, and indeed on our own behalf as a committee, we wish to express our appreciation for the support and prayers which the Bishop received from the whole conference during those sad and difficult moments.

On a happier note, we are pleased to report that the Bishop and his family have (except for minor bouts of mild flu) enjoyed very good health. We thank God for their good health. Daughter Verna P. Runyararo turned six on July 31. She had started school in January at five and half years. Daughter Rutendo Grace turned three on February 1. She seems to be enjoying her pre-school environment.

One day the parents overheard a conversation.between these two girls: Rutendo said "Verna, I am daddy today and you are Mother." The elder and more logical Verna replied, "How can you be Dad? Dad does not put on a dress!" Confusing the Bishop's robe (gown) for a dress, Rutendo confidently replied, "don't you know that when Dad is at Church he is bishop and he puts on a dress in order to preach!" Aren't these girls funny?

Also during the year, Mrs Jokomo has changed job. She has moved from Girls High School where she was teaching and is now with the Ministry of Education's Curriculum Development Unit (CDU).

Although there have been attempted burglaries at the family's home, swift measurers were taken to improve security (see under Episcopal residence below). We have also acted as the Episcopal Residence Committee and we will continue to do so until the appropriate Committee is named.

Episcopal Residence

1. No. 3 Wetmore Close, Highlands

This committee wishes to register its appreciation and satisfaction on the manner in which the Board of Trustees have dealt with the problem of the Episcopal Residence at No. 3 Wetmore Close in Highlands. Bishop is still living at No. 6 Gloucester Drive, Eastlea. For the benefit of those who are not familiar with the problem, we summarize the problem here below for you:

The episcopal residence (and many of the church's properties in Harare), are managed by a professional Property Management Company, Tony West. At the beginning of 1992, the church informed the said Company 1992 in readiness for occupation by the new Bishop on September 1 1992.

Unfortunately, an officer of the management company had discussions with the "sitting" tenant and conveyed the impression that a verbal agreement had been made to the effect that the lease would be renewed May 1 1993 to April 1994. All this was done between the tenant and the Management Company without consultation with the Church. Now the Board of Trustees has continued tirelessly to try and force the Property Management Company to remedy this unfortunate situation. We strongly hope that the problem will have been solved by May 1 1994. This committee invites Conference to commend the Board of Trustees for its efforts. (It was reported during the session that the house was finally vacated on 29/11/93)

2. No. 6 Gloucester Drive

On realizing that No. 3 Wetmore's problem was complex and could not be solved over night and knowing that homes in Harare are now targets of burglary, this committee approached the Board of Trustees with a view to improve the security at No. 6 Gloucester. Again, the Board of Trustees was swift in their response and within a week or two of our request, a wall and a solid gate was erected around No. 6 Gloucester. The Board must be commended for their cooperation.

3. Security

Much of the next four items is a restatement of existing practice or Policy. No security measure is burglar proof. However, this committee feels that the episcopal residence must have some basic devices which help to trigger an alarm. This is requested because of the nature of the routines of the bishop. Quite often, both Bishop and Mrs Jokomo are away from home on church business.

4. Insurance

Because of the eventual accumulation of Conference equipment and property at the episcopal residence, a household insurance cover is needed to cover against burglary and other risks.

5. Furnishing

Because many church dignitaries including many members of our local churches go to visit at the Episcopal residence, the conference has an obligation to provide the residence with a deep freezer and a refrigerator, curtains in visitors' bedrooms and for the living room. Conference must also provide supplementary furniture for the dining-room, living-room, and bed-rooms for visitors. We also have a responsibility to ensure that the grounds are properly maintained.

6. Bills

A lot of phone calls both local and international have to be made at home after office hours. Conference may want to know that phone, electricity and water bills are the responsibility of the church.

Pastoral and Leadership: Duties of the Bishop

Bishop Christopher Jokomo has now completed his first full year in office as our episcopal leader. We, your Committee, Bishop, felt very proud of you for the manner in which you led and conducted your very first session of the Annual Conference at Mutambara Centre in December 1992. We hope that your Conference noted that we received the rare Divine visit of the Holy Spirit from above at that Conference.

The Bishop is very responsive to the needs of the church, hence many appointments and visits were made during the year in an effort to respond to these needs. We congratulate bishop and his cabinet for managing to identify appropriately trained personnel to help the bishop in managing the temporal affairs of our institution (Book of Discipline 735: 3a). Bishop has taken keen interest in seeing how the temporal affairs of the church are being managed. During the year under review, bishop has managed to visit all districts including Malawi (which is part of Harare District) and South Africa. We wish to thank all the Districts for the warmth with which you welcomed the bishop. Bishop is grateful for the excellent hospitality and

for the gifts given to him by many of our churches, circuits, districts and societies. We glorify God.

During the visits, the Bishop has observed lay training workshops in session District Conference and other meetings at various levels of the Conference. Cabinet members, pastors and the laity have highly commended the manner in which the Bishop has steadfastly upheld to the tradition of the Methodist Church. Also, whenever the bishop has attended a revival, he has stayed throughout.

Bishop, your Conference must know that we are at the disposal of all churches, circuits and districts. If there are special needs in your areas which affect the bishop's relationship with his Area (conference) please let the Committee members know or write to the Chairperson of this committee. We thank the Mutoko Community for alerting us early about the Mutoko School issue which you will hear about in the report of the Board of Trustees or some other reports.

Let us know as a conference that wherever and whenever there is a District Superintendent, the Bishop's office is there.

Episcopal Car:

The Episcopal car is now on the road. We are grateful to the Conference Treasurer, Mr. Chimonyo and to the Board of Trustees and all the other people who worked hard to order the new engine parts from West Germany. It took nearly a year and half. The Board of Trustees have had the car fitted with some anti-burglar devices. Your committee, Bishop mentions all these things to show you how much support we have received and enjoyed in our efforts to fulfil our responsibilities.

Pastors and Their Ministry

Bishop and Conference, your committee has received very good reports of the work your pastors are doing. As a committee, we think that Bishop has a good team of District Superintendents as well as the majority of the pastors. Our pastors are doing an excellent job in these days of suffering through illness and deaths in many families.

The Committee regrets to advise conference that we lost two members of the pastoral family of our conference (Rev. Samuel Munjoma and Rev Webster Munjoma). Your Committee is grateful for the support this conference gave to the bereaved families.

Your Committee is not happy with the way some circuits deal with pastoral salaries and pension contributions. Conference needs to know that the Chief pastor (Bishop) has a responsibility to all the pastors who receive appointments from him. This committee is proposing to ask Conference to designate 1994 as the YEAR OF THE PASTOR during which the conference will highlight all the aspects of the ministry with specified periods set aside for prayers for issues of the ministry of the church. Once this idea is accepted by the conference, the committee would work with the Board of Ordained Ministry to produce specific guide-lines.

Visitors

Apart from his visitation and attending meetings and attending to office calls, Bishop has also had time for discussion and sharing with visitors. We have received excellent feed back about our Conference's hospitality to visitors.

Recommendations

For easy of reference, we list recommendations as follows:

- That this conference gears itself to equipping and furnishing the episcopal residence once it becomes available.
- 2. That this conference declares 1994 as the year of the pastor.
- 3. That all circuits take seriously a mammoth task to improve every pastors' salary and pension contribution.

N.B: Recommendation No. 2 was referred back to the committee for clarification.

1994

As conference will notice from the Bishop's <u>Itinerary</u>, the Bishop will be on leave in January. Please do not involve him in official duties. Dates have been allocated to Districts. It is the District Superintendent's responsibility to share the dates in his circuits for 1994. Those that miss out will receive priority during the next visitation.

Note: The itinerary is overridden by an emergency which comes at conference level.

Conclusion

In conclusion your committee wants to repeat what we said above: WE, THE COMMITTEE ON EPISCOPACY, ARE AT THE DISPOSAL OF MEMBERS OF OUR CHURCH, EVERY MEMBER OF THE CHURCH IN OUR CONFERENCE, WE ARE THE EARS AND EYES OF THE BISHOP. THE COMMITTEE IS THE BRIDGE BETWEEN THE BISHOP AND THE PEOPLE.

Bishop, your committee invites every conference member to personally pursue and remain stead-fast in the Historical and Spiritual heritage entrusted to us by our forefathers and mothers, under the Lordship of Christ. Bishop and Conference, this is our report.

N.B: The committee was advised to consider appreciation for the Bishop.

CCOM REPORT:



Rev. C. Chikoore: CCOM Director

MISSION STATEMENT The Zimbabwe Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church is <u>engaged</u> in the glorification of God through its Ministry to the poorest of the poor; the marginalized: the privileged; persons of all races and sexes in all situations.

The church is tasked to equip its membership and community with high moral values, awareness for justice, good health habits, and become resourceful citizens.

Further, the church will always thrive for excellence in its educational and medical institutions and will continue to establish more similar institutions for the betterment of the community.

The United Methodist Church shall develop and utilize its own resources to the fullest. The church shall diversify its programmes, train and motivate its members, staff and leaders so that every person will be made aware that Christ is alive.

THE STATE OF THE CHURCH: The United Methodist Church is deep rooted in:- Evangelism; Education; Agriculture for self-reliance; Health Services; Social justice especially for the disadvantaged.

The Zimbabwe Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church has not been found wanting in all these aspects of human life.

EVANGELISM: The Zimbabwe Annual Conference continues to grow. At present there are eight districts and this session of the Annual conference may create two more. United Methodist Church Men (MUMC), United Methodist Church Women (RRW), and United Methodist Church Youth Fellowship (UMYF) have had very successful conventions in new areas like Chiwere in Marange, Chiwaira in Chihota and Mhondoro. District and circuits revivals were also held in numerous places throughout the conference.

The worship atmosphere and the desire for Christian Education programmes is high. Yet the need for Christian literature continues to increase everyday. Our worry is whether the church is capable of matching this growth with trained manpower. The great concern is that we are continuing to grow in membership but failing to produce enough manpower for the efficient management of the church. "The harvest is ready but the labourers are few".

EDUCATION: In most third world countries the church is the frontier of education. Zimbabwe is no exception. So far we are satisfied that in all our schools and colleges we are giving the best education. The results in each case speak for themselves. There are however, some areas which still need special attention. Nevertheless we will always thrive for excellence. The church has been invited to set up a Girls' High School in Murewa and other High Schools at Nyamachem in Gokwe, Chipfunde in Zaka, Dendera in Mudzi, Arnoldine in Makoni and in many other places. In some of these areas we have given some commitment. The major handicap is lack of finance. There is need for an all out fund raising campaign if these institutions are going to be a reality.

CCOM'S PROBLEM:

Lack of adequate funding is a problem for the CCOM. It is a matter of urgency for the conference to see to it that the CCOM is financially provided for. CCOM must be budgeted for in order for the church's programmes to be implemented.

WORK AREAS:

AGRICULTURE:

Introduction:

The purpose of this report is to show progress and problems encountered by the committee during the 1993 year. The elected committee sat only a few times during the year because of logistical problems. However the committee sought permission from the COM Director to co-opt Mr G. Tsododo - deputy Director of Agritex to help formulate policies that can be adopted at conference level and to be followed in all districts. This permission was duly granted in May 1993.

To date the committee has set up the following:-

a. The committee has drawn up a position paper the FOUR YEAR ACTION PLAN. to be adopted at Conference. The committee proposes that all districts have an agricultural committee. The four year plan will be available from the Conference committee to enable district committees start their programs. The annual plans can be taken from this four year plan to suit districts in their respective agricultural areas based on financial and technical viability.

The committee will always be available to give technical advice to all districts when asked to do so.

It is pleasing to note that the Harare District now has an active agricultural committee. All districts therefore are requested to set up active agricultural committees. All districts have so far been asked to submit the programme for 1993/94 season and by 31/10/93 no returns had been received. Reports for the 1992/93 have not been received.

b. Mission Farms:

The committee will initiate a programme to do a land use viability study of our mission farms at, Nyadire, Arnoldine, Mutambara, Old Mutare, Nyamacheni and others.

We hope this will be done by Agritex very soon. The findings of this programme will be available to the conference and individual farms once completed. The individual farms are expected to be guided by these findings if they are to run these farms viably. This land use plan, we believe, has already been done by a consultant company but no copies are available yet at the Headquarters. We will see these reports first before we do another feasibility study.

Your committee strongly recommends that CONFAD set up a revolving fund where individual farms can borrow money at a reasonable interest to enable them to execute their tasks efficiently. So far reports for 1992/93 season and 1993/94 programme has been received form Mutambara only. If CONFAD does not have money make use of existing financial sources and agents.

3. M.R.I.D.

- i. The committee will soon initiate a study to consider the activities and viability of the Methodist Rural and Industrial Development (MRID), and its relocation form Old Mutare to Arnoldine.- Headlands and its future role. To date Glen Forest Training Centre, Silveira House, DAPP, and Danhiko Training Centres have been visited. We can model our MRID centre by blending what happens at these training centre without spending too much money. Further such organization like the Intermediate Technology Group are willing to assist in any training that will benefit our rural folk.
- ii. All districts are being encouraged to have their own small MRIDs at Circuit level to include the butcher in the backyard programme and many others that are suggested in the four year action plan. You will note that in this action plan there are plenty of things to be done based on simple and appropriate technology and can suit different agro- ecological regions in Zimbabwe. So wherever you are there is something suitable for you.

iii. The committee believes that it is able to improve the Butchershop in the Backyard handbook to include other programmes in the Four Year Action Plan. This can be done is Shona, Ndebele and English provided there is funding.

4. SUGGESTIONS:

- a. We need a well structured committee at Conference level and a secretary to co-ordinate our activities. This is a restatement of what is already prevailing.
- b. All committee members you elected last year to run for (4), years should remain as they are but we need to have a (think-tank) core committee which will act as the executive committee.
- This executive committee and the Agricultural Committee should sit more often.
- d. The mission farms and district projects should be visited regularly by the Secretary of Agriculture.

ARCHIVES & HISTORY:

<u>Theme:</u>The old saying, "Take from the past the flames and not the ashes" is the theme of the committee. This theme is in line with the committee's role in reminding the church about the achievements attained through the dedication and commitment of the entire membership and leadership of the church in all the past years.

1. <u>Achievements:</u>

- 1. Most circuits observed Heritage Week.
- 2. About 75% of the circuits have written record of their history.
- 3. Some circuits/districts have acquired video cameras, photo cameras, and collection of pictures.
- 4. A few circuits held workshops.

2. Recommendations/Resolutions 1993-96:

- 1. To encourage teachers and students to engage in research in our local churches under the direction and control of archives and history committee.
- 2. To continue to observe Heritage Week.
- 3. To continue to hold workshops at circuit/district level on History writing and recording.
- 4. To set weekend starting December 12, 1997 as a tentative date for the centenary celebrations.
- 5. To include school children, teachers, hospital staff, missionaries etc. in our centenary celebrations.
- To commission an expert to write book/booklet on the history of the church from 1897-1997.

Budget: \$10,000,00 for traveling, printing material and writing of the book/booklet.

CHURCH & SOCIETY:

Purpose:

Our love of God as Christians cannot be truly meaningful unless we love our church, neighbours and society, - James 2:14-26. The Church and Society committee's mandate is to help through church members' organization in all issues affecting the existence of people and the church particularly where need is identified.

1. Achievements:

- 1. Only two districts provided 1339 pieces of clothes and bars of sop valued at \$55,380 and cash forwarded to the Conference Treasurer \$1,168.08.
- Many circuits observed the church and society week but the attendance was
 discouraging. Pleasing however, was the thoroughness in preparation done
 by speakers who were teaching on different subjects which included Life
 Assurance, Red Cross programmes.
- Over 429 pieces of clothes and \$523,00 were raised and distributed to three orphanage Homes.
- 4. Food distribution to families and communities was not properly recorded by our districts as this role was at time assumed by other church bodies without the involvement of the committee. Mealie meal worth S17 660,00 was given out (the bulk was from Harare District to Chikwizo Community)
- 879 pieces of clothes and 23 blankets valued at S9 786,00 were given to the Mutema Leprosy Camp.
- Funeral condolences in cash and kind valued at \$6,349,03 including 720 Kg mealie meal.
- 7. Over 599 individuals from Nyamuzuwe. Old Mutare, Masvingo resettled people in Samaringa and local communities received clothes, blankets, food, soap and cash valued at \$7.852.62.
- 8. Such people in hospitals and homes were assisted with cash and kind valued at \$1,553,65. Total value of acts of benevolence for the year were \$52,222,78.

2. <u>Recommendations:</u>

The committee recommends:-

a. The following programme for the church and society week.

Theme: "Am I the keeper of this world".

Monday: There is no tomorrow for you (conservation issues related to management of trees and soil.)

Tuesday: Effective development dialogue between the church and state.

Wednesday - Rights of Children (U.N. Convention).

Thursdays - A Christian employer and employee relationship.

Friday: - Christian call to respond to crisis and disasters - why and how.

Saturday: Christian living in the extended family environment of different beliefs and cultural practices.

Sunday:- Summary of the week's topics.

- b. Efforts by districts and circuits will be intensified to provide food/seeds to various communities. Each District must raise a minimum f S5 000,00 for this purpose.
- c. Christians at all levels should not allow themselves to let pastors leave a destitute life by not paying them accordingly. The conference must rectify this anomaly and ensure that all pastors are paid.
- d. The committee will design posters on conservation which will be presented to the Zimbabwe government for distribution to the nation.
- e. Once a month for 10-15 minutes each local church must promote conservation awareness among members through children involvement e.g. drawings, plays, poems, writings and readings in the church.
- f. The United Methodist Youth Fellowship (UMYF) should spearhead the conservation awareness campaign by producing Tee-shirts.
- g. Our church especially our Mission Centres must participate fully in the district development committees.
- Refugee Sunday collection should be sent to the Conference Treasurer by end of June 1994.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION:

THEME: We are aiming towards a well informed faith for our church members in all walks of life. Acts 8:31

ACHIEVEMENTS:

- 1.1 Two training workshops on writing and seminars were conducted at districts and conference levels by Ethel Johnson. She gave lectures on writing curriculum for Christian Education in January at St. Pauls.

 Florence Kruiger visited districts and gave lessons on how to organize junior churches. Written Sunday School lessons will be used in 1994.
- 1.2. Many local churches and circuits conducted lesson on Christian Home and Family life during the year.
- 1.3. We have identified suitable literature written by the late Rev. Martin Chiza on lesson for Local Preachers. This production is being edited and will be made available as soon as possible. Members with some talents are invited to write and submit materials for possible publication.
- 1.4. Each district has received prepared kits on Christian Education.
- 1.5. Lectionary some preachers are using the circulated lectionary, but we encourage those who have not started yet to follow suit.

2.0. <u>RECOMMENDATION:</u>

- 2.1. That pastors ensure the Book of Discipline is taught in their congregations.
- 2.2. That space be provided for Christian Education literature at Head Office.

3.0. OBJECTIVES:

- 3.1. To prepare and circulate lessons on the following topics; Holy Spirit, Stewardship of Time, and Value of Christian Education.
- 3.2. To continue to encourage circuits and districts to make use of the lectionary.

COMMUNICATIONS:

THEME: Communication is, and always has been an important feature of life. Communication is a vital link in a connectional church such as the United Methodist Church. Activities, great and small take place in local churches, circuits, district. conference, and in global organizations to shoulder Christ's kingdom today. Hence communication ties us together for great and small accomplishments. We aim to make communications and publications a viable committee this quadrennium.

1.0. ACHIEVEMENTS:

- 1.1 Newsletters were produced by most circuits and districts.
- 1.2. Mutasa Nyanga has a district map
- 1.3. Mutare South bought a camera
- 1.4. Most districts video taped and took photographs of major events of their various functions. Both CONFAD and CCOM are working on resustaining UMBOWO (a newspaper published by the United Methodist Church in Zimbabwe and was banned during the Smith regime.)

2.0. <u>RECOMMENDATIONS:</u>

- 2.1. Workshops for all district communication committees be organized.
- 2.2. Public address systems and megaphone be used during big gatherings.
- 2.3. That Communication Director be appointed.

ECUMENICAL & INTER-RELIGIOUS CONCERNS:

Introduction:

This committee has been set up in all districts and in many circuits though in some places its just nominal. There is need to place emphasis on enabling participation of all members in ecumenical activities to gain understanding while we continue to maintain our identity. The committee therefore continues to interpret and advocate for the unity of the Christian church and create dialogue with persons of other faiths.

2. Achievements:

1. Through encouragement and guidance of this committee our members are participating in such activities as funeral, weddings, revival and mibatanidzwa (interdenominational gatherings).

- We are glad to report that our UMYF and MUMC groups have spearheaded the creation of <u>mibatanidzwa</u> services. To this course our women continue to be the leaders.
- 3. We have had inter-denominations exchange of pulpits and choirs.
- 4. Our members are integrating well with other churches in areas where the United Methodist Church does not exist.
- 5. Awareness on the need to participate in ecumenically organized events is noticeably increasing.

3. Recommendations:

We recommend that:-

- Fraternal delegates give reports to whoever sent them as well as to this
 committee.
- 2. Those appointed to Ecumenical services should submit written reports to the committee.
- 3. Efforts to revive the Ecumenical Arts Association be seriously pursued at all levels by those who have been active participants of its workshops and activities.
- Efforts to create awareness on Ecumenical Decade for Women and an increased participation by the Church in related activities be encouraged.

BOARD OF EDUCATION REPORT:

MISSION STATEMENT:

Board of Education is an organ of the United Methodist Church which firmly believes not only in maintaining but also in raising standards of Education in all our institutions. Thus the church must play its part in forming the values, faith and learning character of the student. In its endeavour to realize some of its goals, Board of Education will ensure students have access to quality, VALUE CENTRED Education meant for the total transformation of humanity. This will include the upliftment in three spheres thus physically, mentally and spiritually, at the same time providing a curriculum to cater for people with diverse potential and capabilities.

ACHIEVEMENTS.

- 1. Education standards have continued to improve as evidenced by high pass rates in most of our schools as per statistics presented.
- 2. Recruitment of qualified heads and principal in some of the institutions i.e.

Mr Benjamin Mutasa - Mutambara High

Mr Isaiah Tendai Mudiwa - Nyadire High

Mr Fungai Chinake - Nyamuzuwe

Mr Lloyd Chaduka - Nyadire Teachers College

3. Staff Development Workshops were held throughout the year focusing on grounds, finance, discipline and general school management.

- 4. Our schools continued to participate and excel in co-curriculum activities. The highlights included United Methodist Sports Association games held at HARTZELL HIGH SCHOOL, Quiz and Mathematics Olympiad and other National competitions.
- 5. Board of Governors to run our school were introduced although some may still be experiencing teething problems. (The issue of Boards of Governors was referred to the Board of Education for review.)
- 6. Some of our schools held successful Parents/Prize Giving Days whilst others held "Form Four Days" in cases where Parents/Prize Giving Days were not possible.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

The Board recommends that:

- 1. More funds be raised for workshop to improve leadership skills for all our key personnel.
- 2. Detailed projects proposals be drawn for the new schools approved by Conference so that these proposals may be included in the Advance Special.
- 3. The conditions of service be improved to enable us to attract and retain competent staff.
- 4. Missionary teachers be recruited.
- 5. Seminars and Workshop be organized for Boards of Governors to assist them in gaining a broader perspective of their role in schools.
- 6. Funds be raised locally and abroad to electrify our schools by 1996 and to buy trucks for schools, and strive for efficiency in our educational work.

EDUCATION SECRETARY'S REPORT

INTRODUCTION

The report reviews the educational activities of the Church, covering the Period 1990 to 1993. It makes no pretence that standards on our schools are good. Rather it accepts the position that much needs to be done; standards are unsatisfactory. By coincidence the period was plagued by drought, hunger in the rural areas, escalating food prices, retrenchments, and their rippling effects in our schools. All but one high school have boardings, and all but one are co-educational.

The period under review saw considerable change in the administrative leadership of our schools, as it also witnessed a drop in some of the enrollments and the resultant instability in some of the staff establishments.

Trends in examination results are discussed in an attempt to get to the root of the problem in the quest for solutions to improve standards.

Boards of Governors were instituted this year. They are an instrument intended to encourage development of schools. The institution of the Boards of Governors is an innovation which came into existence this year. They are intended to improve and encourage development of schools.

EARLY LEARNING CENTRES

There exists in all our centres set-ups for early learning, but these are not organized at Conference level. A few affected local parents pool resources to give their children some form of learning.

Lack of funds result in a cursory treatment of this vital stage of children's development. The teachers themselves are severely restricted by their lack of adequate preparation, if any, for this formative and sensitive stage. In most cases more damage than good is done to the young minds before the formal learning stage is reached. The average enrollment in these centres is 80. It is interesting to note that pre-school figures that received supplementary feeding in drought period 1991 to 1882 are higher than present enrollment in our centres.

PRIMARY SCHOOLS

Five out of seven Primary schools are located in the major mission centres, and they enjoy more sophisticated infrastructure than their counterparts in smaller centres - at Arnoldine and at Mutoko. Attractive infrastructure, naturally, tends to attract better quality staff at the big centres. Except for Nyakatsapa, the Primary schools in the big Church centres have boarding facilities to cater for a few pupils..

Comparison of standards, including examination results, may be unfair when it takes cognizance of these dissimilarities. Where much is given much is expected.

When the 1992 Grade VII examinations were compared within the respective districts, four of our primary schools were placed in first positions. These are: Nyadire, Murewa, Hartzell and Nyakatsapa. Mutambara was placed in second position. Such achievements are indeed pleasing.

I report with Pleasure that the wrangle on Mutoko Primary School between the School Committee there and the Church is over. It was finally resolved in favour of the Church on November 18, 1993. The Church resasserts its authority on Mutoko Primary School. I am also pleased to report that, while official notification is yet to be received, all the paper work on the re-registration of Dindi Schools - Primary and Secondary - is complete. The two schools will revert to Church control where the centre formally belonged. Murewa School grounds are neat, attractive and exemplary. Nyadire School community put a classroom block to limit double sessioning. Murewa and Hartzell have also put up additional classrooms. This is most commendable effort.

At Nyakatsapa Primary School the roof of a classroom was blown away by strong winds, causing hardships there. Hard work is being done to restore the roof.

In the same year, Murewa received the prestigious Secretary's Bell in a colourful ceremony which was attended by the Secretary for Education and Culture. Recently, on October 18, 1993, Hartzell Central Primary School Choir won the Regional Colgate Palmolive music competition. As a result the Choir became the representative for Manicaland Province at the National Colgate Palmolive Music Competition on October 30, 1993, in Mutare. Hartzell Choir was Placed in first position in both the set Piece and the own choice piece.

Awards in this keen competition were overwhelming. At Regional level, Hartzell received a trophy and a sum of \$200.00, at National Level they received a trophy and a sum of \$700.00 for its set piece, and \$400.00 for the own choice piece, totaling \$1 300.00. Hartzell Primary School Choir is congratulated heartily on this considerable achievement.

HIGH SCHOOLS

As in the primary school segment, all our schools are coeducational except Lydia Chimonyo Girl's High. Males outnumber females in enrollments.

Examinations Results:

Performance at the secondary segment of our high school system could be described as poor at both Z.J.C. and "O" Levels.

In academic affairs, however, Hartzell continues to produce results which are always a tribute to the students concerned and to the efforts of the staff. It is consistently extremely good, coming always among the top schools of the nation. Murewa makes remarkable improvement and is consistently on the road to excellence, but it must work hard to improve its English Performance. The rest of the schools must double their efforts to improve their Pass rates.

For those institutions where entry at Form One is not governed by academic criteria and where entrance to the Sixth Form cannot be the sole right of only the brightest Pupils, we cannot expert wonders, but it is unacceptable for the pass rate to be this low, as the examination results indicate in the core subjects in the following table. Both Z.J.C. and "0" level results in English, Mathematics and Science are a real cause for concern. Staff turnover is sometimes: given as being the contributing factor to this low rate.

Only a few schools participated in the Maths Olipiad, and in the High School Quiz.

Guidance and counseling was mere lip service in most schools.

Schools offer co-curricular activities which is mostly limited in variety and scope. The commonly offered activities are: netball, basketball, volleyball, and athletics. Lack of equipment and staff with the know-how result in schools leaving out tennis, swimming, hockey, cricket, rugby, etc.

In most Schools there is little participation in cultural activities such as drama, public speaking, and clubs.

Schools should give a wide range of opportunities in the extra curricular activities to enable students to discover their talents. No one knows what there future will be especially in these hard days of unemployment.

Three years ago our United Methodist church schools agreed to meet annually for a big sports contest. Meetings take place at chosen centre each year. The day is most exciting and one to always look forward to.

HIGHER SCHOOL CERTIFICATE ('A' LEVEL)

Three schools - Murewa, Hartzell and Mutambara enroll students at 'A' level. This is specialized area in which students study in depth in three chosen subjects to prepare themselves for work at higher level or for entrance to the University and other high professions. It is an expensive sector of the high school in terms of finance and manpower. This level is costly especially in books, and science equipment. Highly trained staff must be recruited. The government considers education at 'A' level as a critical area.

To attract good students the school must publicize itself. It must be seen to be good by producing good examination results by its good conditions of living in hostels and so forth. Workshops and staff development programmes must be constant, however, financial constraints have not always made these possible.

As already stated the examination results reveal a fair performance; one which seems to indicate progress. Heads of Department suggest that stable staff would result in improved performances because staff mobility creates instability.

BOARDINGS:

Seven - eights of our total students live in hostels for total of nine months in the year. Boardings should be made as homelike as possible. One does not always find the situation there ideal. In their enthusiasm to give opportunity to more students to learn and to help the many parents who clamour for boarding places, students are often overcrowded in some of our schools, forcing some of these schools to use bunk beds. Some dormitories are very old and dilapidated. There is definite need to revamp them.

Toilets are bad- showers, cisterns, window and panes are broken. What is distressing is that some of them are somehow neglected.

I for one do not favour putting young primary school children into a boardings, a facility which is usually suitable only for grown-ups. I have observed that high school and college authorities are expected to look after the primary school boarders. This is a delicate stage which would be handled by the tenderly motherly care of the primary school teachers, preferably women teachers. This is what is done by those who house primary school boarders where they are kept in good dormitories and not in squalours.

Hartzell High has just dedicated a nice new girls hostel on October 2, 1993. They must be congratulated on this great achievement. Maintaining a school, let alone with boardings, is an extremely difficult affair. Those responsible have found themselves affected by the very real galloping rate of inflation, coupled with the effects of the most severe drought in living memory. Consequently they have no alternative but to raise fees to meet the ever increasing cost of running these schools.

TEACHER EDUCATION - NYADIRE COLLEGE:

This is the only tartiary education the church offers. It has grown from strength to strength. Its standards compare very favourably with national standards. Encouragingly new buildings are shooting up such as hostel and staff houses. Some female students have now moved into a new hostel this year and another one should be ready for occupation in the new year.

The College which has an establishment of 38 lecturers including the Principal and Vice-Principal, has an employment of only 32. shortage of staff accommodation bars the employment of the full compliment of staff. They could increase by four lectures if sufficient houses are built. One duplex is near completion.

Examinations results could have been better last year, 1992. The number of students deferred and referred is rather disturbing. The number of referred students last year was rather high.

SPECIAL EDUCATION:

Almost all our major centres carry out a programme for special education, catering mainly for the visually impaired and partially impaired students. Great service is being done, barring considerable hardships. The programmes are very costly as special equipment is required. Programmes are integrated with those of the sighted students.

Integration is not only in the classrooms, but in the hostels and other areas as well. There are psychological problems and it takes understanding on the part of those who

run the programmes and on the part of the other students. Handicapped students are sensitive and need to be accepted.

When the environment is conducisive to learning, the students climb the ladder of education as high as possible. At Parents Day at Murewa on October 9, I was encouraged to see one visually impaired student receiving a price and to learn that he was enrolled in the Lower Sixth Form there this year 1993.

PROFESSIONAL STAFFING:

The Standards of excellence which we strive for are intrinsically and inextricably tied to our ability to maintain a professionally qualified staff. In our recruitment efforts we encounter keen and even cut-throat competition from schools outside our own, especially from cities, as we all endeavour to fish graduate teachers from one limited pool - the University of Zimbabwe.

In order to retain good staff, thereby creating tradition, stability, and continuity, we need to create attractive conditions in our centres. Maybe we need to think about the idea of some form of incentives - perks of a sort.

VALUE - CENTRED EDUCATION:

Bishop Jokomo's emphatic speech to Headmasters on value-centred education in the second term caught fire. Increasingly schools try to put it into practice. Talks at assemblies, and in classrooms stress such values as courtesy, respect, caring for the young and the elderly, politeness, wearing uniforms and wearing them with pride, proud for one's school, winning and losing in games graciously, and so forth, are encouraged.

ADULT LITERACY - NON FORMAL EDUCATION:

The study group at Hilltop United Methodist Centre is growing fast, with a total enrollment of 244. The programme runs from Form I to Form IV. Programmes will soon include practical courses, such as dressmaking and secretarial studies.

Performance in examinations is quite creditable. In 1992, they had a 60% pass rate.

COMPUTER SCIENCE:

The world of high technology, the age of the computer, in which we live demands that computer technology be taught to our children in our classrooms. We cannot afford to lag behind in this branch of science.

The programme is an extremely expensive one to operate. Unless the Church can source the equipment, the computer, from overseas, there can be no hope to mount these vital programmes in our schools.

We are happy that Hartzell High School has received donations of computer machines from well wishers in the United States. Computer programmes are well underway there. Congratulations Hartzell.

PREFECTS AND LEADERSHIP COURSES:

I am pleased to observe that some of our schools are beginning to realize that boys and girls who are chosen to serve as prefects need direction - need leadership training courses.

For three days or so the group is taken out, away from the school, sometime into the jungle. There the youth is confronted with many challenges - both mental and physical - and it does not take the individual long to appreciate that they are, in fact proving their worth not to their peers or to the world at large, but to themselves. They certainly come to realize that each one of them is capable of surmounting obstacles which, hitherto, they had thought to be beyond their limits of achievement. Mutambara and Murewa have already pioneered. Other schools may soon follow suit.

WORKSHOPS FOR HEADS:

This year has seen the appointment of five new Headmasters to man our schools. That is revolutionary! The need for workshops and seminars for staff development is paramount. Miniature workshops have been mounted within the limits of the finances available. Bigger and sounder workshops are encouraged. With knowledge and technology explosion, the Church cannot afford the leadership of schools to lag behind.

The opportunity must be seized to thank the Methodist Publications and Foundation who have sponsored one workshop for Headmasters in the middle of this year.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

The Education Amendment Act of 1991 has given rise to the formation of School Development Committees, The Church has opted for the formation of Board of Governors. The constitution was approved and the Boards are at work. Good work is already reported for some of them. A few have been slow in starting.

Boards are tasked to promote, improve, and encourage the development and maintenance of the school; to assist in the advancement of the moral, cultural, physical, spiritual and intellectual welfare of pupils and their parents and teachers; to promote and encourage programmes of interest, both educational and social, for the benefit of the pupils, parents and teachers.

In terms of the Education Amendments Act, Government may no longer pay the per capita grants previously paid to schools. Already it has not been received this term and the lack of forewarning has not been without hardships in schools. Schools budgets for this year had taken into account these per capita grants.

LIBRARIES:

Every headmaster is becoming aware, as the time passes, of a critical and ever increasing need for a sound library background in his students. All our schools maintain reasonable stakes of library books. Lydia Chimonyo Girls High has a neat and well maintained library - though small. Nyadire College is another good example of a well run library.

Libraries draw quite heavily on the budgets of schools. Nyamuzuwe library is impoverished. It requires a great deal of stocking. It is recommended that when further books are received from overseas, as was the case last year, Nyamuzuwe be given a greater proportion.

- 1.2. To provide awareness to the communities about preventable and communicable diseases and about the killer dicase AIDS.
- 1.3. To continue providing student nurses in our church insitutions with a foundation in christian principles so that hey can have a deeper understanding of the relationship between a healthy body, mind and soul.
- 1.4. To encourage personal hygiene.
- 1.5. To teach the communities on the importance of maintaining high moral standards.
- 1.6. To provide awareness to communities on the advantages of good water supply and proper sanitation.
- 7. To observe the Health and Welfare Week April 25th to May 1, 1994.

N.B: The issue on legalling abortion was referred to CCOM.

HOSPITALS:

MUTAMBARA:

The establishment is 1 Doctor, 1 matron, 8 SRNs, 21 SCNs and 26 others. Through the Manicaland Provincial Directorate we were given 1 Doctor, 1 tutor, 1 pharmtech and 1 Rehab Assistant. Drs. Bernard Thoma's and Babra Herzherger's contracts expired and the two have since left the hospital. We have Dr. Eric Lemke from the German volunteer Services. We are expecting two more doctors to join the hospital before the end of the year. The matron III post that was granted the hospital was filled in by

Mrs Evangelista Murwira - congratulations to her. Our grateful appreciation goes to the following:-

Wautoma UMC in the U.S.A. for donating \$64 000,00

The German Development Services for donating:-

i. 8 gas lamps worth - \$3 6000,00

ii. Duplicating machine - \$16 000,00

iii. Shelving and solar lighting system and extension of the pharmacy - \$20 993.23

iv. Re-electrification of the hospital and mortuary - \$25 000,00.

The Ministry of Health and Children Welfare for donating \$50 000,00 for the building of a refrigerated mortuary.

The hospital is successfully running the following projects which are now

self reliant:- i. piggery

ii. poultry

iii. vegetable garden.

The expansion of the maternity wing should be completed by the end of November 1993.

OLD MUTARE:

b.

The establishment is 1 doctor, 4 SRNs, 10 SCNs and 30 others. Dr Moser's contract expired at the end of July and he has left the hospital. An agreement was reached with a doctor at Bonda mission hospital to visit the hospital once per fortnight provided the hospital paid for his mileage. With the absence of a resident doctor, the matron and the nursing staff are doing their best to treat and refer patients when necessary to Mutare General Hospital.

Orphanage:

The institution cater for 40 children at full capacity from a day old to 5 years. We rely on donors since the social welfare gives only \$100,00 per child per month and this is very little. We are grateful to individuals such as chief Marange, church organizations, non governmental organizations (NGO) and the churches overseas for their continued support.

NYADIRE:

The establishment is 2 doctors, 1 matron, 12 SRNs, 27 SCNs and 66 others. We have one doctor and the second post is vacant. Dr Buterbaugh is on furlough as from 25 September 1993 till the end of February 1994. Dr Bringman from the Swedish United Methodist Church is working here on voluntary basis for two months from the 19th September 1993. The hospital is going to face serious problems when Dr. Bringman leaves at the end of his two months stay since there is no doctor coming until the Buterbaughs come back end of February next year. We are expecting a nurse Tutor from Oklahoma in the U.S.A, to come before the end of the year, and Mrs Muchada will be completing the D.N.E.course in December, 1993.

The Matron 111 post that was granted to the hospital was filled in by Mrs Joyce D. Tsiga - congratulations to her. We are grateful to the friends of Nyadire Hospital in the U.S.A. who donated \$26,000 for the renovation and extension of one section of our duplexes and a section of a second duplex was extended with funds from Bread for All \$15,000. The hospital received a reconditioned laundry machine and drier from Jon Lovland's supporting churches in Norway and this has made things much easier for our laundry staff and we appreciate this donation. The presence of Jon Lovland here has been most helpful to the hospital financially because he does vehicle repairs, servicing hospital equipment and has electrified the school of nursing and we are grateful for the services that he is rendering. A laboratory incubator has been donated to us by individuals and churches in the U.S.A. and we are thankful to these donors. The mother and child health unit has not been opened because the contractor has not yet come back to rectify some problems pointed out to him by the Ministry of construction. The new refrigerated mortuary is not yet functioning as it has not been inspected.

The Iowa Methodist Medical Centre did send a team of four people who conducted a Christian leadership workshop at La Rochelle in Penhalonga - Mutare from the 21st to the 25th of June 1993. People who attended the workshop were Heads of units and hospital personnel from Mutambara, Old Mutare, Nyadire Missions and Africa University. The participants were awarded certificates of achievements. We had a good time at the workshop.

Nursing Training Schools - Mutambara:

The last group of State Certified Nurse (SCN) trainees finished their training in March 1993 and they had a 100% pass, well done Mutambara. The first group of the Upgrading Course started training on 1st May 1993 with an intake of 10 student nurses.

The school appreciates the money which is being donated by the Norwegian United Methodist Church for the running costs. The School of nursing was officially opened by our Resident Bishop, Bishop Jokomo on the 17th of July 1993. Congratulation to Mutambara School of Nursing.

Nyadire still has classes of SCN trainces and SCMN trainces who will complete their training in March 1994. In March 1993, our SCN trainces has a 100% pass and our SCMN trainces had 99%. In August 1993, both our SCN and SCMN trainces had 100% pass. We are proud of both records. We postponed our graduation ceremony so that those who finished this year and the last groups finishing in March 1994 will graduate together in April 1994. In August 1993, we should have our first graduates of the Upgrading Course. Due to the Conversion Programme, we have been given additional posts for trained staff. The first 10 student nurses for the Upgrading Course started training on 1st September 1993 and the second 10 student nurses will start on 1st May 1994.

The two training schools are grateful for the donation of library books from Ohio Wesleyan School of Nursing through Mrs Janet Chilcote, and another donation from Shenadoah University School of Nursing through Mr Patrick Matsikinyire.

DISTRICT CLINICS UNDER OUR HOSPITALS:

Chikwizo, Chindenga, Dendera, Dindi and Nyahuku and the establishments for these five clinics is still the same. At Chindenga, a second nurses house has been built and the two nurses houses and the clinic have piped water. Chindenga clinic has new equipment.

Our gratitude goes to the family Health Project Phase 1 through Mutoko District Hospital. Chinyadza, Gatsi, Nyangombe, Arnoldine and Gandanzara are visited once a month and their establishment is still the same as last year.

DISTRICT HEALTH AND WELFARE:

Mutare South, Harare, Makoni-Buhera and Mutoko-Mudzi all observed the Health and Welfare week and were able to meet the Conference Committee objectives.

MUTAMBARA SCHOOL OF NURSING (SRN)

- As SCN trainings stopped country wide, the nursing school qualified for the new 12 months upgrading programme SCN to SRN.
- The training commenced in May 1993 with ten (10) students.

- The last group of SCN who finished their training in March 1003 were once again on a 100% pass record.
- Mutambara School of Nursing thanks the United Methodist Church in Norway which provides funds for running costs.

The School thanked Bishop Jokomo for officially opening the school on the 17th of July 1993.

Infrastructure

The nursing School classes need a major repair if not a new building since it is nearly collapsing.

The school of nursing has never been budgeted for. Therefore we are kindly asking CONFAD to increase our budget from $$40\ 000.00$ per annum to $$56\ 075.00$

1.1. Worship workshop was successfully held at St Pauls. All districts sent delegates.

- 1.2. People were taught on good Hymnal singing, prayer and Christian Calendar.
- 1.3 Many circuits exchanged choirs and pulpits.
- 1.4. Music Director attended the world choral symposium.
- 1.5. All hymns have now had their tonic sofa notation identified and have all been compiled.
- 1.6. There is notable progress on formulating rituals for the new hymn book.

2.0. RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 2.1. Punctuality at Sunday services be seriously observed.
- 2.2. That more church buildings be built.
- 2.3. United Methodists be largely employed at our Mission Stations inorder to enforce principles of our Church.
- 2.4. Sundays be observed as the worship day and that no manual work be done.
- 2.5. That one convention that brings all United Methodist at one point for ten days be held once in every fours years.
- 2.6. That Chikwata be allowed to exist but should not clash with other church programmes.
- 2.7. Use of hosho and drums in the main Sunday worship service, be restricted and when used must be well controlled and harmonized.
- 2.8. Congregational hymns and choir songs should support the sermon theme.
- 2.9. People should not leave before the end of the programme at Conventions.

3.0. RESOLUTIONS:

- 3.1. Every church must have twenty or more hymn books for use by visitors or during meetings.
- 3.2. District Superintendents must make available holy communion cups for use at Conventions.
- 3.3. Every member of the United Methodist must have a Bible and Hymn book.
- 3.4. Choirs representing districts at Conference Choral competitions receive assistance on travel expenses from their respective districts.

STEWARDSHIP AND TEMPERANCE

1. Theme: "Tithe is the seed do not eat it"

2. <u>Introduction:</u>

As a stewardship committee we believe in obeying everything that Jesus commands us to do. We also believe that it is apparent that, knowledge of the Holy Scriptures is a pre-requisite more so in the process of creating a strong dedicated and righteous discipleship for the Kingdom of God.

3. Achievements:

- 3.1. The chairman visited 6 districts promoting tithing.
- 3.2. Task forces were set up from districts to circuits.
- 3.3. Trainings were held in districts at Zonal levels.
- 3.4. We encouraged opening of banking accounts by circuits especially in rural areas.
- 3.5. Tithing has gained ground but there is need for more teachings. We have a total of 573 tithers (from 4 districts) and we commend Masvingo-Bulawayo district for having 203 tithers.

- 3.6. Stewardship week was observed in many circuits.
- 3.7. Church support has improved very much in rural circuits.
- 3.8. Total harvest collections amounted to \$1 911 000.00 MAKOROKOTO. (Congratulations)

4. Recommendations:

We recommend that:

- 4.1. Preservation and conservation of natural resources be taken seriously at all levels by all people.
- 4.2. Circuits finance committee prepare programmes which accommodate and support 'tithers' in terms of allocating tithing funds to church work.
- 4.3. Pastors and all church leaders be examples in tithing.
- 4.4. Intensive teaching on tithing be seriously pursued basing everything on the Scriptures.
- 4.5. Teachings on all aspects of stewardship including wills and trusts be emphasized.
- 4.6. Records of tithers be kept correctly at all levels.
- 4.7. We have specialists in each area of concern to help training of personnel.
- 4.8. Drinking of beer be prohibited during weddings held on United Methodist Church premises, the same be discouraged during any party for our United Methodist Church members.

MINISTRY TO WOMEN AND CHILDREN:

Theme: To work as an advocacy Unit internationally for formal and non formal education of women, children and youth.

Achievements:

- 1. We extended our services to street kids by giving them food and clothes.
- 2. Literacy Education Programmes were conducted by some of our male and female church members in various districts.
- 3. Health Education programmes were conducted by experts who enlightened us on special issues like caring of Aids Patients and other terminal illnesses.
- 4. We continue to award Scholarships to the students under our support.
- 5. In some areas women were taught better farming methods.

Recommendations:

- 1. We recommend that seminars and workshops be held at circuits, districts and conference level to equip leaders with the necessary leadership skills.
- 2. We recommend that vocational training programmes be organized to provide skills to the less privileged women and youth.
- We recommend that Kingaroy Farm be converted into a conference Centre for women.

- 6. Mutoko-Mudzi has set up a District Choir and all circuits in the district are preparing for the district Choral Competition.
- 7. Masvingo-Bulawayo donated \$175.00 towards drought relief and groceries worth \$75.00 were donated to the old people's home.
- 8. Murewa District now has a District Office.

Recommendations:

- 1. We recommend that the Youth members be represented in the scholarship committee so as to assist Youth Members to acquire scholarships.
- 2. We recommend that there be increased involvement of Women in Church leadership.
- 3. We recommend that District Superintendents should give serious consideration to the appointment of dedicated Youth Directors.
- 4. With the increase of unemployment in the country, we recommend that the Conference seriously consider giving priority to the UMC members on offering jobs in our institutions.

<u>CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES SUPPLEMENTARY</u> REPORT:

1. SERVICES RENDERED BY REV. F.K. MUKWINDIDZA:

The CCOM appreciates the services rendered by Rev. F. K. Mukwindidza who served CCOM for 4 years. CCOM would like to put him on a rock pedestal for the untiring and unflagging support he manifested as CCOM Director. He was a person who wanted to see work done.

He was a man who had a telescopic view of council issued in our church. His vision in CCOM programmes was appreciated by many. We wish him all the good luck in the world as he pursues his academic studies in the U.S.A. We pray for peace and harmony in his family. Well done. Makaita zvakanaka. Because of his services of inestimable value we petition conference to give him a token of appreciation of \$1 500.

2. **DELIMITATION COMMITTEE:**

Whereas the creation of new Districts in the Zimbabwe Annual conference has been going on well directed by the Districts concerned, Council strongly feels that this creation of Districts should be done by an impartial committee. Council, therefore petitions the conference to appoint a Delimitation Committee whose task is:-

- a. the creation of new districts from the perspective of conference.
- b. look at boundaries, financial viability, location of district parsonage and membership etc.
- c. the Delimitation committee will recommend to council executive for study and adoption.

3. CHANGE OF POLICY:

Whereas Boards, Council and Committes have been involved in the making and changing of policies, Council feels that this has been done hapharzadly without synthesising issues and as a result conflicts arose. Therefore council petitions conference that in all matters of change of policy and departure from the known tradition by all conference councils, boards and committees, such changes must be approved and circularised by Cabinet to all concerned for implementation.

4. **NEW DISTRICT**:

Whereas Mutare South District is currently the biggest district with 34 circuits and a membership of over fifteen thousand (15 000). Its rate of expansion has necessitated its division into two districts. Council feels that Mutare South District is financially viable and also had identified the location of a district parsonage. Council therefore petitions conference to approve the creation of:-

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- a. Mutare district whose boundaries shall be Mutare urban, Marange and Zimunya areas.
- b. Mutare South District whose boundaries are Chimanimani, Chipinge and Buhera areas.

SPECIAL REPORTS

AFRICA UNIVERSITY COMMITTEE REPORT:

Frame of reference:

The Committee on Africa University serves as a link between the Africa University and the Zimbabwe Annual Conference on activities concerning the university.

The Committee on Africa University commends the Vice Chancellor Dr. Kurewa and his staff on the remarkable progress on the development of the university. It is hoped that before this annual conference ends, time would be arranged for delegates to go on a guided tour of the university campus. The following is a summary of the progress on AU.

Total 64 students

The students are from six countries: Angola, Mozambique, Zaire, Tanzania, Burundi and Zimbabwe.

48 students are Zimbabweans and 16 are from the other countries. A total of 85 students are expected for 1994.

The committee on Africa University would like to draw the conference's attention to the small number of women students. This is an issue which the Vice Chancellor also raised whilst on tour in New York. Funds are to be raised to support female students. The deans of the two faculties have agreed to increase the number of female students to be enrolled at Africa University. Africa University can accept students who may have failed to qualify for University by one subject and intend to join either faculty. A proposal has been submitted to New York and a maximum of 10 such students is expected to be funded to supplement the 'A' level subjects.

The limiting factor to the enrolment of students into the faculty of Agriculture was that a number of women students do not have the science subjects required at A level eg Chemistry and Biology. Most women choose only arts subjects.

The first graduating class will be in 1994. The need to introduce post graduate classes has been expressed in various fora and this will be taken up for consideration.

STAFFING.

Considerable progress has been made on hiring suitable qualified staff for Africa University.

Faculty of Theology

The full complement for the faculty is 8 posts. Five of these have been filled and all the incumbents have doctorates and are specialized in specific areas. There are three Americans, one Zimbabwean and one Zairian. The other three posts were advertised.

Faculty of Agriculture and Natural Resources

There are thirteen posts approved. Eight Posts are filled, all with Africans of which five have doctorates and three have masters degrees. Five of these incumbents are Zimbabweans, one Malawian and two Tanzanians. All the cadres in the Posts are outstanding experts. Some had done distinguished work in their areas of expertise before, Joining Africa University.

Five more lecturers are to be recruited, hopefully before March 1994.

ADMINISTRATION

Africa University is growing very fast therefore Assistant Vice Chancellors are needed.

There is an Assistant Vice Chancellor for Development, Jim Sally, who is based in the USA.

The posts of Assistant Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, Assistant Vice Chancellor for Administration and Assistant Registrar Academic were advertised we hope these posts will be substantially filled soon.

The post of Book Manager was also filled. There will be a close cooperation with the Cokesbury Book Shop, the United Methodist Publishing House in the States. The Person would need to be trained in the USA to establish the proper link.

PROGRESS ON THE UNIVERSITY

Campus Construction

Two halls of residence were completed and students are already living in them. Two more are under construction. These should be completed by mid 1994. One should be completed by April 1994 in time for the official opening. The students' union and the multi-purpose, building will both be completed at the end of March 1994.

The main building for the Faculty of Agriculture should start any time. The plans were already approved by the funding agency USAID and the construction was to begin in October or November. The building will cost ZS8 million.

The Agricultural Engineering Building which is to be funded by a different organization—is also to be constructed soon. Discussions on the construction of the University chapel and the University Library building will also start soon.

USAID again was to be approached to fund the faculty of Management and Administration Building. Syracuse University was interested in supporting the construction of recreational facilities.

Faculties

The faculty of Management and Administration is scheduled to start in 1995 with a Masters in Business Administration Programme. A committee was appointed to draw up a proposal for submission to the Commonwealth Secretariat. Authority has been already granted to the Commonwealth Secretariat to assist the Africa University in setting up the faculty. The faculty is to start with 20 students and already 10 scholarships have been offered.

The Implementation Committee met from the 6 -9th September, with some members from well known Universities, to finalize the curriculum of the MBA programme. The dean is to be appointed soon .

In 1996 the Faculty of Education will be introduced. There is a proposal to have Humanities and Social and Natural Sciences to be under the wing of Faculty of Education.

Other faculties are to be introduced gradually with time.

Standard

The external examiners who examine the work of both students and faculty at the end of each semester have continuously praised the Africa University standards. The standards were above expectation except for laboratory exercises since the university did not have a lab. Last year the university was using Hartzell High School laboratory. Recently however an excellent laboratory for the university was erected. The university should also be praised for successfully marrying agriculture theory and practice in their approach.

There are also various symposia planned. Some of the symposia are to look at the following issues:

The vision of what the Africa University graduate is to be like and what is meant by academic excellence.

What constitutes the right mixture between theory and practical approach, how can the two be integrated to the best advantage?

Africa University is a church related institution. What does this mean? What is the interrelatedness of Africa University to the United Methodist Church?

THE ZIMBABWE ANNUAL CONFERENCE AND AFRICA UNIVERSITY:

There is not enough effort put to bring United Methodist (UM) students to Africa University. The Annual conference should discuss and agree on strategies to woe UM student to Africa University.

Various activities such as symposia, workshops will be conducted in order to get the views of concerned parties. A symposium of United Methodist representatives will also be held to discuss the relationship of Africa University with the United Theological College in Epworth. Areas of collaboration will be discussed and already ideas of distance education for Bachelor of Divinity are being crystalized.

OFFICIAL OPENING OF AFRICA UNIVERSITY:

The Annual Conference needs no reminder of the big awaited event, the official opening of Africa University. This is to take place on April 23, 1994. The Africa University staff is already busy planning for the event. Guests are expected from all over i.e. All African Bishops, American Bishops, other guests from the States (1000 - 1500), Europe, Japan and other countries.

The University has already booked for some of the guests and this has resulted in most of the hotels in Mutare, Nyanga and Harare being fully booked for those days.

Since most of our districts are organizing buses to bring people for the opening, there is need to discuss and submit an estimate of the total number of people expected throughout the conference since this would assist Africa University in organizing for the function.

An invitation has already been sent to the President of Zimbabwe to be the guest of honour and to officially open the university.

There is need to raise funds for the opening. This could be taking place in different fora. There is need to collect also what we can at this conference. A special meeting should be organized to finalize the arrangements.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

It is strongly advised that we continue implementing the 1992 recommendations in addition to the following new recommendations:

- 1. The Board on Ordained Ministry should undertake a more vigorous recruitment drive and process applications in time to submit them to Africa University.
- 2. The Annual Conference was requested to raise at least \$100 000,00 within 1993-94 to open an endowment policy which will help two students each year at the Africa University.
- 3. The Zimbabwe Annual Conference should give Africa University moral and financial support for the official opening of the Africa University scheduled for 23rd April, 1994.

NEW RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. We recommend that counseling be given at "O" level to help students in selecting the right subjects and that we sensitize the students in our High Schools on these issues.
- 2. The Annual Conference should discuss and agree on strategies to woe UM students to Africa University.

PUBLICATIONS AND STATIONERS FOUNDATION:

Chairman: E.I. Muzorewa Secretary: I. Chibanda

1. <u>Introduction:</u>

Once again we greet you Bishop and the Zimbabwe Annual Conference in the name of Jesus Christ, our Lord who guided us through the 1993 Trading year.

Objectives:

The objectives of the United Methodist Publication and Stationers Foundations hereinafter referred to as the Foundation are clearly stated in the Official Journal of the 1992 Annual conference pages 250-252.

The Board of Directors for the Foundation are working tirelessly in an endeavour to fulfil both the short term and the long term objectives to date a good number of them have been achieved.

3. Achievement in 1993:

The following achievements were recorded and noted especially in a very difficult financial year in the period of Economic Structural Adjustment Programme (ESAP).

- 3.1. The Foundation worked towards the improvement of the United Methodist Church Heads of Schools by organizing and sponsoring a management workshop 26/8/93. The workshop was well attended, more such workshops will be done in 1994.
- 3.2. The foundation was finally approved by the Booksellers Association of Zimbabwe on June 2nd, 1993. This approval entitles the Foundation to market books and stationery to all schools in Zimbabwe and to also get Foreign currency allocation for importation of Books,
- 3.3. The Foundation continued to operate a retail book-shop in Mutare.
- 3.4. The foundation continued to market books to United Methodist Church Schools at competitive prices and will continue to do so now that we are going into the uncontrolled market.
- 3.6. The Foundation's marketing or supplying of books to own schools had the following advantages:

3.6.1. It cushioned or protected the schools from the adverse effect of ESAP because there was not even one school which was taken to court by Booksellers for delayed payment.

The Foundation continued to get the privileged support from Schools Banks 3.7.

Publishers and the church.

The Foundation's accounts were audited by both Internal and External 3.8. Auditors, report is here for inspection.

- The Foundation Training, Profit and Loss Account: for the year ended 4. 30-9-93 recorded the following successes and weaknesses which are only revealed when you subject your financial data to various parameters.
- 4.1. Average Collection Period is the measure of the average amount of time taken to collect account receivable. In the Trading year under review it took 143 days to collect accounts receivable. I must point out that some schools were INSENSITIVE to their commitments to pay for the books and stationery they purchased. Fellow Heads of schools it is important and business like to honour your financial commitments. There are no two ways about it.
- In looking at the profitability rations especially when you look at the Gross 4.3. Profit Margin which indicates the percentage of each sales dollar remaining after the foundation had paid for its goods the Foundation achieved a 14.1% Gross Profit Margin.

In analysing the Operating Profit Margin, which measure the percentage of 4.4. profit earned on each sales dollar before interest and taxes the foundation achieved a 7% operating profit Margin.

When we look at the Net Working Capital of the Foundation which is the 4.5. numerical difference between the total Current Assets and the total current liabilities a total of \$216 063 was achieved. This is remarkable when you consider that the Foundation started with zero working capital.

The Foundation's Bank balances are as follows as at 30 September 1993: 4.6.

4.6.1. Mutare Book-shop Account \$23 431.

Harare Main Foundation Account \$85 050. 4.6.2.

- 5. The Foundation Strategies for reducing the weakness noted in the trading year under review are as follows:-
- To monitor the schools payment through the annual conference new 5.1. budgeting system instituted by CONFAD.
- To charge interest to debtors who fail to meet their payment within the credit 5.2. terms.
- The Foundation Annual contribution to Zimbabwe Annual Conference is as 6. follows:-
- Bishop, the Foundation Board resolved to give a cheque for \$4 000 to be 6.1. payable towards boosting the clergy Pension Fund.

6.2. Bishop the foundation proposes to upgrade the management and leadership standards of the Heads of Schools, District superintendents, the station chairpersons by organizing and sponsoring three (3) management workshops during 1994. These workshops will be held in February, April and August. The estimated expenditure is \$8 000,00.

Bishop we believe our church leadership is lagging behind in sound management and leadership skills which they can get through management workshops which can provide good management foundations.

Management:

The board is grateful to the foundation's management for their tireless efforts to keep the operation running efficiently.

8. Recommendation - Resolution:

In view of the Council On Finance and Administration (CONFAD) resolution that all church fund-raising projects with Boards of Directors should report to CONFAD as the Annual General Meeting in compliance with statutory requirements, it is recommended that the Foundation's Constitution be amended so that the Foundation can report to CONFAD annually and not to the Zimbabwe Annual Conference.

WOMEN COORDINATOR'S REPORT ON THE WORK OF THE WOMEN'S DESK AND MINISTRY TO WOMEN, CHILDREN AND YOUTH,

Ella Makunike - Coordinator.

BACK GROUND HISTORY:

Initiatives negotiated by the Women's Division from 1964-1966 with the Board of Missions, resulted in the formation of Ministry to Women and Children's programme within the World Division. Programme assignments for the new office were as follows:-

- 1. To work as an advocacy until internationally for formal and non formal education of women and girls.
- 2. To work with global organizations such as the World Council of Church Women's Desk, World Young Women Christian Association (YWCA), World federation of Methodist Women, Internal World Day of Prayer, Ecumenical and Regional Church Councils regarding human rights and justice for women, children and youth.

PROGRAMME AND PROCESSES:

The aim was - to administer:-

- 1. Programmes and processes which enable full participation of women at all levels of decision making in the church.
- 2. Programmes and processes which strengthen organized women's groups including ecumenical associations.
- 3. Programmes and processes which provide leadership development, giving women of all racial, ethnic and economic groups opportunity for the realization of their full potential with recognition of the importance of spiritual development.
- 4. Programmes and Processes which provide direct services to women and children through church related channels, affirming institutions as a base for mission and recognizing maintenance of these institutions as an essential element of programme. Women should participate in every aspect of an institution designing programmes, carry them out, serving on governing boards and in executive leadership.

Priority was to be given to new institutions and services created and administer by women for women.

It is believed such programmes and processes will have the following characteristics, e.g.

- a. They will deal with the dynamics of women's oppression, helping men and women accept the fact that things are systematically wrong and not wrong because of "the way women are."
- b. Help create new vision of possible and desirable futures.
- c. Bridge gaps between older women and younger women. (rejecting ageism, affirming sisterhood.)
- d. Bridge gaps between women employed outside the home and those who are exclusively homemakers (Rejecting status; affirming our common humanity.)
- e. Bridge gaps between single women of all categories and married women. (Rejecting status; affirming sister hood.)

Having narrated all that is involved in women's programmes I have the pleasure to share with you the goodnews from the Women's Division in New York.

Women's Division Centennial Goal of HIGHER EDUCATION AND WOMEN IN AFRICA is to be realized now. They have generously approved recommendations to fund most of our Conference Women's institution in the promotion of higher education for Women in Africa and Zimbabwe has been singled out as follows:-

- 1. That library services be up-graded and include supplementary books, periodicals, other educational resource materials, equipment, furnishings and their maintenance. This will cater both primary and secondary levels. Amount recommended \$45,000,00.
- 2. That mobile library services be provided for children and their families in areas near mission schools Amount recommended \$20,000,00.
- 3. That boarding facilities (hostel) for women and girls be up-graded, this will include providing adequate shower and toilet facilities, storages, beds, mattresses, bedspreads, mirrors and curtains -, amount recommended \$125,000,00.
- 4. Money set aside for food preparation and dining facilities be up-graded. amounted recommended \$40,000,00.
- 5. Money has been set aside for computers, maths and science laboratory equipment in women's institutions. Amount recommended \$20,000,00.
- 6. That educational learning resources and parent and teacher training for special students such as those who are deaf and blind impaired be provided. Amount recommended \$5 000,00.
- 7. That subject areas of language, art, maths, science, responsible parenting and drug education be provided to strengthen females' self image and counter gender stereotyping at all levels of education at the selected sites. Amount recommended \$75,000,00.
- 8. That basic educational supplies and equipment be provided. Schools: Nyadire, Murewa, Mutambara, Old Mutare, Mutare Girls' Hostel. Amount recommended \$15,000,00.
- 9. That an implementation committee for Zimbabwe be formed. Composition of the committee will include:-

- a. Zimbabwe Annual Conference Coordinator of Women's Ministry staff person.
- b. Conference chairperson of the Ministry to Women's Committee.
- c. Conference Education Secretary.
- 4. New York Women's Division Staff.
- 5. New York Staff of the World Division's Ministry to Women, children and Youth's office.
 - Local transportation of the committee amount recommended \$1 500,00. The implementation committee will work with appropriate school personnel on recommendation related to specific sites.
- 10. That additional scholarship for school fees and tuition for secondary level girls in circumstances of critical needs be provided. Amount recommended \$15,000,00, and that one third of it be set aside for use as revolving credit loan fund for parents or students to borrow.
- 11. That a symposium focusing on African Women Higher Education be held in conjunction with the inauguration of the United Methodist Church's Africa University in April 1994.

<u>Theme:</u> "Strengthening African Women's Role and Opportunities in Higher Education for the 21st Century."

<u>Goal:</u> To strengthen the position of African women leaders in church and society through education, furthering and development and full participation of Women's leadership in Africa.

The symposium will be coordinated by the New York Women's Division but jointly implemented by representatives of the:-

- a. Women's Division
- b. World Division
- c. Board of Higher Education
- d. Africa University
- e. Bennet college

In addition, participation will be requested from:-

- World Federation of Methodist Women
- World Council of Churches
- Africa Church Growth and Development
- World YWCA
- All Africa Council of Church
- National Council of Churches U.S.A.
- plus other deemed appropriate.

The year 1994 will be a busy one as we aim for education for all by year 2000

These activities are very much in line with the World Council of churches declaration. "Ecumenical Decade of Churches in Solidarity with Women". The decade of which we are already half way gone - 1987-1997. We only have five years to go.

Therefore on behalf of all the Women's programmes and institutions in Zimbabwe, I humbly call for your participation in prayers for these exiting ventures between the Women's Division and the Zimbabwe Annual Conference to take off.

Last but not least I call upon all women in the United Methodist Church to be united. For united we stand and divided we fall.

THE LAYING ON OF HANDS IN ORDINATION

I. The Biblical Tradition

The Laying on of hands in the act of ordination for leadership in the Christian church is as old as Christianity itself. The tradition actually has its roots in the Old Testament. The Israelites used the laying on of hands to signify the conferring of authority for leadership. A classic example of this is the transition of leadership from Moses to Joshua. Deuteronomy 34:9 describes the passing of leadership: "Joshua son of Nun was full of the spirit of wisdom, because Moses had laid his hands on him." The book of Numbers (27:22-23) provides a similar account: "So Moses did as the Lord commanded him. He took Joshua and had him stand before Eleazar the priest and the whole congregation; he laid his hands on him and commissioned him--as the Lord had directed through Moses." The laying on of hands suggested not only the conferral of authority, but also the conferral of authority from one leader to another in a specific way. The meaning was that the laying on of hands signified that the person on whom hands were laid stood in the tradition in such a way that he could be trusted by the people to carry on according-to inherited teachings and procedures.

In Judaism there were two major traditions of religious leadership, the priesthood and the role of the elder. The priesthood was an inherited position which included the passing of the role from generation to the next within one priestly family. The position of elder was not inherited but was a role reserved for men of special ability who were regarded as thoroughly trained in the law and the prophets, and who possessed the wisdom to teach and offer guidance to the community. The symbol of continuity in the teaching office was the laying on of hands. This act was intended to signify a conferral of authority for teaching and counseling leadership for the good of the people. The reason for the laying on of hands was the demonstration that there was a conferral of authority for teaching that affirmed continuity with a tradition of learning and interpretation of scripture texts and community practice. Hands were laid on by those elders who had taught the successive generation to demonstrate continuity and authenticity.

As Christianity developed there was a gradual merging of the ideas of priesthood and eldership. At first, leadership in the Christian community was what sociologists call "charismatic'. Paul's description of the variety of gifts is a clear indication of this. The New Testament demonstrates a clear movement toward a more "organized" ministry, however, evidencing the development of "offices." The offices of diakonos and episkopos grew up particularly within Christianity influenced by gentiles (and especially Roman organizational practice) while the office of presbyteros grew up in Jewish Christianity, and was representative particularly of the tradition of "elder." This paper cannot trace the history of the development of these offices, but two things should be emphasized. The first is that offices of Christian ministry go back to the first century A.D. The church began to organize itself for leadership almost from the beginning. The second is that the church made judgments about appropriate qualifications for leadership and symbolized the conferring of authority from one generation to the next by the laying on of hands.

This laying on of hands was taken from the Jewish tradition, as represented in the Old Testament. It suggested not just the passing of leadership, but the passing on of a learned tradition. In the church it represented the passing on of a direct knowledge, understanding and experience of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. There is a kind of "ordination" suggested in the pastoral epistles, for instance, in II Timothy !:6: "For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands." The idea was that received tradition of the Gospel would be authentically communicated and passed to successive generations. The apostolic tradition meant that there was an unbroken line of teaching and interpretation from the original apostles to later believers. The concern was that Christians could trust that their "elders" were persons who had received the teachings directly from "authentic sources." The concern was for "right teaching." The laying on of hands in the New Testament thus functioned in the same way as in the Old Testament. It signaled the passing of "authorized" teaching through responsible "commissioned" leadership.

II. Christian Ecclesiastrical Traditions

In Christianity the laying on of hands developed in such a way that it represented the conferring of both priestly and teaching authority, and these two were linked. They were linked because the early church viewed the Eucharistic celebration as the supreme moment in which the full meaning of the Gospel was communicated. It was communicated through verbal expression (teaching through the liturgy), and sacramental expression.

In those churches which hold to the Catholic tradition of apostolic succession the laying on of hands is understood to impart an indelible priestly character. The Eastern Orthodox churches, the Roman Catholic Church, other churches in these traditions, and the Anglican churches understand the <u>episkopos</u> to be the office through which the church perpetuates the ordained ministry. It is impossible to detail the complex theological issues involved, but the main point is that the laying on of hands for

deacons, presbyers and bishops <u>must</u> include the hands of a bishop. The reason for this is not just mechanistic, as some Protestants have charged. The reason is that the priestly office brings together the total communication of the faith in word and sacrament. There is a real sense in which the laying on of hands is intended as a "guarantee" of apostolicity for the people of God.

In the Protestant churches there is wide diversity in regard to the question of who decides about qualifications for ordination and who actually ordains. The laying on of hands, however, has almost always been done by presbyters. In the Lutheran and Reformed traditions synodical presidents (sometimes called bishops) have acted on behalf of "colleges" presbyters, often with other presbyters also participating. It is significant that representative figures of the "elders" (presbyters) have almost always been designated.

While practices may vary in the Christian traditions, and the theology of ordination, particularly in regard to its sacramental character, divides Christian churches, it is significant that there has been a fundamental assumption that the role of "teacher" of the church ("teaching elder" in the Reformed tradition, "presbyter", "elder", or "priest" in other tradition), involves the laying on of hands by representative figures of those already ordained. The reason for this has to do with teaching authority and the apostolic tradition. The idea is that those, who have already been entrusted with the obligation and responsibility for faithful articulation of the Gospel, are charged with teaching and authenticating the next generation.

III. TheWesleyan Tradition

In the Wesleyan tradition ordination has always been done by presbyters, from the time of John Wesley himself. Though Wesley acted as a "scriptural episkopos" he was a presbyer in the Church of England. In the British Methodist Church, and those Me:thodi dies which are its off-spring, delegated presbyters, usually desrgned "presidents" lay on hands in ordination. In Episcopal Methodism, from !784 on, bishops of the Methodist Church have laid on hands for deacons (usually only bishops in diaconal ordination) and bishops and other elders (presbyters) in presbyterial ordinations. It is accurate to say that while Episcopal Methodism has required bishops to lay on hands technical theology would demonstrate that a valid ordination is actually presbyterial since the Wesleyan tradition does not understand the episkopos as a third order, but as a third office. Episcopal Methodism thus has had two orders (diakonos and presbyteros and three offices diakonos, presbyteros, and episkopos).

What is significant is that Wesleyan Methodism has understood the laying on of hands to involve the passing on of the apostolic tradition in the sense that teaching and sacrämental authority is conferred. This is not intended to signify entry into a "club" or the conferring of "tenure." Rather, it is about the guarantee that any person ordained to Word, sacrament and order will be <u>authentic</u> and <u>responsible</u> to the Church of Jesus Christ, the community of God's people in the world. In this sense the laying

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on of hands is a kind of "seal" that the ordained ministerial leadership is accountable to the historic tradition of Christianity and can be trusted to offer "right teaching" to God's faithful people.

IV. Where We Are Today

This brief paper has suggested that the United Methodist Church stands in a larger Christian context in regard to ordination and the laying on of hands. From the scriptures, through the totality of church tradition, the laying on of hands has signified conferral of authority for teaching (Word) and sacrament. This has continued in Methodism.

The move to involve lay persons in the laying on of hands is an effort to <u>symbolize</u> the role of the laity in the church. That laity should be, and are, involved in the ordination process is unquestioned. What is a legitimate question is <u>how</u> laity should be involved.

Our own Wesleyan tradition, and most Christian tradition, restricts the laying on of hands in ordination to the ordained. The reason, as this paper has made clear, has to do with teaching authority and obligation (obedience to the church). In Episcopal Methodism, of which the United Methodist Church is the major body, a bishop's hands are required for ordination, by the law of the church.

Laying on of hands, therefore, may not be the best way to symbolize lay involvement. There are historic, theological and ecumenical reasons to suggest that the laying on of hands should be done by those already ordained to represent the fact that there is a real apostolic tradition (not apostolic succession) that is passed on. To guarantee that Christian teaching would be responsible and accountable to the apostolic tradition, the Church insisted that those entrusted with sacramental authority be persons tested and approved by those who already were ordained. This was to protect the community from wrong teaching. The point of this was not an "elite," but an accountable group set apart for representative ministry of service.

United Methodism has not deviated from the tradition that the laying on of hands in ordination is done by the ordained. At the General Conference in 1988 legislation was adopted which deviated from that tradition in that it permitted, but did not require, lay participation. Such permissive legislation is in the current BOOK OF DISCIPLINE and reads as follows: "An elder shall be ordained by a bishop, employing the Order of Service for the Ordination of Elders. The bishops shall be assisted by other elders and may include laity designated by the bishop representing the Church community... in the laying on of hands." (1435.3) This was an effort to profess that clergy and laity are called to "a ministry of the people of God within the community of faith and in the world." (1401, THE BOOK OF DISCIPLINE) In addition to this affirmation "there are persons within the ministry of the baptized who are called of God and set

apart by the Church for the specialized ministry of Word, Sacrament, and Order." (P402.1, THE BOOK OF DISCIPLINE)

The legislation has resulted in some confusion. Bishops have special responsibility for the Service of Ordination, and they have interpreted and acted in various ways on P435.3. Our Council has suggested that some consistency on this important issue across The United Methodist church is a desirable goal.

V. Recommendations

- In affirmation of our Wesleyan tradition in the conferring of teaching and sacramental authority, authenticating the successive generation in the apostolic tradition, the laying on of hands upon the heads of those being ordained shall be done by elders.
- 2. In recognition that the Ordination of Elders is an ordination within the Church universal elders, presbyters or priests of other Christian communions may assist in the laying on of hands.
- 3. In an expression of the unity of all baptized Christians a layperson or laypersons representing the laity may participate in the service for the Ordination of Elders. The representative layperson, such as the lay leader of the annual conference, may read the Scriptures, stand with the bishop, symbolizing service among God's people in the community of Christ. We further recommend that only laity representing Church community as a part of the larger Body of Christ share in the Service of Ordination.

STATEMENT FROM HIV/AIDS CONSULTATION, HARARE, ZIMBABWE JUNE 21-25, 1993.

The Reverend Charles Carnahan, during the opening session, reminded the delegates from annual conferences in West Angola, Mozambique and Zimbabwe that the United Methodist Church has an historic understanding of faith that links mind,

body and spirit. As far back as John Wesley, United Methodists have been concerned about these links. We know that physical and mental health is inseparable from spiritual well-being.

On April 20, 1988 our United Methodist Council of Bishops, in a Statement on Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndronme stated

Humankind does, indeed, face a crisis in the wake of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome

seriously the impact and implications of aids will now do so.....

While our brothers and sisters in Africa still face the grim reality of death due to hunger-related diseases and war, the escalation of deaths from diseases associated with HIV is perhaps the most threatening crisis we face today.

The World Health Organization estimates that by the year 2000, 10 million persons will die of HIV/AIDS in Africa. The social and economic costs to our nations will be staggering. It is estimated that Africa will have more than 10 million orphans by the year 2000.

Governments and private social service and health care institutions will face incredible, if not impossible, demands for the care of those suffering from HIV disease and their families.

In the panic which HIV disease provokes some are tempted to consider those affected by the disease as being punished by God. Our Council of Bishop in their 1988 Statement clearly reminds us that

...we in the religious community are certain that (the HIV disease) is not sent as a curse from God.... We do not believe that the God of love, revealed in Jesus Christ, wages germ wargarte on the human family..... We reject unquestionably such propostions and preaching. While AIDS is not curable, It is preventable.

The origins of HIV disease are unknown. AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome) is an infectious disease caused by a virus known as HIV (Human Immune Defiency Virus).

<u>Sexual Intercourse</u> is the main means by which the HIV virus is transmitted, if either the male or female is already infected (either heterosexual or homosexual activities). The virus is also transmitted by transfusion of contaminated blood and through infected syringes and needles. Persons are also vulnerable from the use of contaminated razors and knives used by African healers and in the rituals of female and male circumcision. An infected mother can transmit the virus to her unborn child.

Women are the most vulnerable to HIV and to the economic and social problems associated with HIV. Because of economic pressures many men are forced to leave their families for work in the towns or neighbouring country. This often leads men to develop sexual relations with other women; some of whom are infected with the HIV. When the men return home, their sexual partner is placed at increased risk for

contraction of HIV. Married persons who indulge in extramarital sex place their spouse at risk.

Peer pressure among youth encourages them to become sexually active at an early age. Many of them do not believe in their mortality and therefore fail to postpone their sexual activity or to utilize precautions which would reduce their risk for contracting HIV.

The virus in not spread through everyday social contact such as:

- shaking hands
- living together
- playing together
- eating together
- food, utensils
- water, communion cups, blankets, insects and toilet seats.

As Christians we celebrate our suxuality as a gift from God. God created us male and female.

United Methodist affirm that the marriage relationship is the foundation for a strong family life and the foundation of our societies.

Monogamous, sexual fidelity within the bond of holy matrimony is the standard behaviour expected of United Methodists recommended to all others as behaviour that comes close to assuring the prevention of AIDS. (Council of Bishops Statement, April 20, 1988)

Allowing that not all persons in our society subscribe to our ethical standard, we urge people to heed the warning of the medical community and world health leaders by protecting oneself and partner by using a (condom) during (start to finish) sexual intercourse. And, to avoid sharing needles.

In John 15:12 we are called to love one another. The ministry of healing and compassion has always been an integral part of our Christian faith. Therefore, we are called to reach out to persons with HIV infection and AIDS as well as to their families and friend. The lack of knowledge within our societies about HIV/AIDS has created shame and fear within families. We would urge therefore that our annual conferences train persons who can counsel with HIV/AIDS persons and families.

Every effort should be made to work inter-denominationally and ecumenically; sharing personnel, material, and economic resources.

We commend our Ministries of Health for their efforts in trying to combat AIDS. And encourage our churches and other voluntary agencies to continue collaborating together.

HIV disease is not just a medical concern. It is a spiritual, social, cultural, economic and psychological problem.

We join with our Council of Bishops in expressing our Christian love.

..for those who suffer with this deadly disease and to say we share the pain of their families and loved ones. We are forever reminded in our Christian community that when one suffers we all suffer. When one is estranged we are all made the less whole. (Council of Bishops Statement - 1988)

Our consultation developed plans of action which are suitable to each annual conference. We, therefore, appeal to our church leaders to enable their implementation if we are to succeed in the fight against this threat to human existence - AIDS.

In order to guarantee follow-up of the proposals approved at this consultation, it is recommended that an inter-conference committee be established. This committee should have a representative from each annual conference. It should report to the Central Conference. In order to enable this committee to function, we appeal to the General Board of Global Ministries to provide the required support.

HIV/AIDS CONSULTATION REPORT

Introduction:

The AIDS virus attacks a person's immune system and damages his/her ability to fight other diseases. Without a functioning immune-system to ward off other germs, he/she now becomes vulnerable to becoming infected by bacteria, protozoa, fungi and other viruses and malignancies, which may cause life threatening illness, such as pneumonia, meningitis and cancer. The origin of this virus is still in question in the medical community, we in the religious community are certain that it is not sent as a curse from God upon those whose life style is called into question. Humankind does, indeed, face a crisis in the wake of AIDS - we speak with the hope that those who may not have taken seriously the impact and implications of AIDS will now do so.

THE STATE OF AIDS IN ZIMBABWE:

Of late AIDS figures have become a real controversy in Zimbabwe. Statisticians, healthy officials and other organizations with their own computer programmes and formulas have been throwing in their figures, guesses and estimates. And in offices, queues and social places, the general public has been arguing over what they

understand of the figures. By the end of 1992 Zimbabwe had well over 18 731 reported cases of AIDS/HIV. Records show that the mostly affected age group is the 20-29. In this age group the mostly affected are women. In the 15-19 age group, the mostly affected are girls. The reason for that is obvious - (sugar daddies). In the 30-39 age group the mostly affected are men.

ORPHANS OF AIDS:

In 1988 there were less than a thousand of AIDS orphans. By the end of 1992 there were about 20 000 AIDS orphans country wide. If the disease is not stopped by the end of year 2000 there will be about 140 000 AIDS orphans in this country. You will agree with me that no disease in recent memory has threatened the human life in such proportions as does AIDS, not even the 1949 'Influenza'. By late 1992 Sub-Saharan Africa had lost 7,5 million people because of this deadly disease. Christians should join hands in this AIDS/HIV awareness campaign.

PETITION:

That the Conference ask the Bishop to set up a Task-force which will report direct to him.

That the Bishop appoints a full time AIDS/HIV Ministry Coordinator. This task-force will be made up of representatives from the following committees: Christian Education, Evangelism, Stewardship, Church and Society, RRW, MUMC, Youths and Health and Welfare Committee. The Task-force will look into the following areas: training, counseling and education. This Task-force will also develop a Church statement about AIDS/HIV for presentation to Conference.

OBJECTIVES OF THIS TASK FORCE:

- a. EDUCATION: Target groups Youth, men and women, clergy, health personnel, community leaders etc.
- b. SEX EDUCATION: i.e. Anatomy, physiology, and sexuality church's view on sexuality, birth control etc.
- c. Fund-raising
- d. AIDS Care Centres
- e. Orphan Care Centres adoption and fostering, drop in centres and home care.

CONCLUSION:

We thank the Bishop for awarding us the opportunity of representing this Annual Conference at this Consultative meeting on AIDS/HIV. We want to thank all of you in anticipating that you will go to your circuits and districts and join hands with other Christians in this AIDS awareness campaign. God Bless you.

RESOLUTIONS:

- Conference gears itself to equipping and furnishing the episcopal residence once it becomes available.
- 2. All circuits take seriously a mammoth task to improve every pastor's salary and pension contribution.
- 3. Conference reaffirms tithing as the basic method of giving in our church. All leaders be exemplary in tithing and that the teaching of tithing be intensified and records of tithers must be well kept.

- 64. Use of hosho and drums be restricted in the Main Sunday Worship Services, and when used must be well controlled.
- 65. Congregational hymns and choir songs should support the sermon theme.
- 66. People should not leave before the end of the programme at conventions.
 - Every church must have twenty or more hymn books for use by visitors or during meeting and also that each and every member of the United Methodist must have a bible and a hymn book.
- 68. District Superintendents must have available holy communion cups for use at conventions.
- 69. Choirs representing districts at conference choral competitions receive assistance on travel expenses from their respective districts.
- 70. Ministry to women and Children hold seminars and workshops at circuit, district and conference level to equip leaders with the necessary leadership skills.
- 71. Kingaroy Farm be converted into a Conference Centre for women.
- 72. MUMC leadership be centralized and that their year start soon after Dumba each year.
- 73. MUMC be allocated a storeroom at the Head Office or elsewhere in the Conference
- 74. An RRW representative be co-opted into Board of Trustees at all levels of the church.
- 75. Youth members be represented in the scholarship committee so as to assist youth members to acquire scholarships.
- 76. There be increased involvement of women in church leadership.
- 77. Fund generating projects with Boards of governors (Directors) report to CONFAD.
- 78. That CONFAD becomes the annual general meeting for Tariro Bus Service and any other fund generating projects in our conference that attains/have attained autonomous/semi autonomous status
- 79. United Methodist Church Foundation and Stationers changes its constitutions to enable it to report to CONFAD
- 80. Information on lists of scholarship church related recipients from all levels e.g.

UMYF be sent to CONFAD

- 81. Reviewed salaries for pastors be effected from January 1994 salaries.
- 82. District payments be made quarterly to the Conference Treasurer to facilitate payment on received funds.
- 83. All church organizations send their policies to CONFAD for inclusion in the Conference Policy Document.
- 84. The Bonding of all units and district treasurers be implemented by January 1994
- 85. The equitable salary commission be renamed e.g. Salary Board/Committee so that it reports to CONFAD.
- 86. District Finance Chairperson report to CONFAD on the financial activities termly.
- 87. That all agencies submit financial activities termly.
- 88. All Conference reports be in the Bishop's office by October 1994.
- 89. Conference to give Rev. F.K. Mukwindiza a token of appreciation of \$1,500.00.
- 90. Conference to appoint a Delimitation Committee.
- 91. Counselling be given at 'O' levels to help students to enroll at Africa University, in selecting the right subjects and that we sensitize the students in our High Schools on these issues.
- 92. Conference is advised to discuss and agree on strategies to woe United Methodist Students to Africa University.
- 93. Conference is advised to address the gender issue vigorously on enrollment of students into Africa University.
- 94. Bishop to set up a task force which will report directly to him on AIDS and appoint a full time HIV/AIDS Ministry Co- ordinator.
- 95. Districts to prepare their form of action on how they can pay back their arrears and bring that PLAN OF ACTION to the 1994 Conference.
- 96. Appropriate organs of the Annual Conference study further the noted decline in Christian Marriages performed in a view to instituting corrective measures.
- 97. Responsible organs of the annual conference institute a study on the reasons of the chronic pancity of men as compared to women in our church, and to devise appropriate corrective measurers.
- 98. Harare District be actively considered for splitting into two districts in 1995 (I)
- 99. Preference be given to United Methodists who have the necessary qualifications when enrolment is taking place in our institutions. (I)
- 100. Lay Trainings be intensified in South Africa. (I)
- 101. Qualified personnel/missionaries be sent to serve in specific capacities in South Africa and Malawi. (I)
- 102 South Africa District be urged to identify people who can be sent to UTC, Africa University and the Crush Programmes for training. (I)
- 103. Maintenance units be established if they do not exist in our centres. (I)
- 104. Yearly ground maintenance competition be introduced for Mission Centres (I)

- 105. A long serve award be instituted to Pastors starting at fifteen cars of service and every subsequent five years and pastors be given double their salary as appreciation gift upon retirement for the service rendered.(I)
- 106. Any student who drops out of United Theological College refunds the Conference the money that will have been invested in him/her. (I)
- 107. Bonding system for pastors be instituted. (I)
- 108. The contribution rate by members be changed to 6% of pensionable salary and the Employer contribute at the rate of 9% of member's salary.
- 109. Properties be bought for the ministers' pension fund as is the case with the lay workers pension fund.
- 110. The conference get a company of insurers and a policy that will offer us the best possible process.
- 111. Ministers' salaries come from a common pool and that CONFAD look into the detail of mechanics of implementation.
- 112. The Board of Ordained Ministry make an effort to identify talents of pastors and train them to develop these talents in relation to specific work areas of our church.

MEMOIRS REPORT:

MRS HARRIET M. MALIANGA 1916 - 1993



Little Harriet Mazwienyu Mandikutse was born May 22, 1916 and later turned out to be a big Harriet Mazwienyu Malianga with a big .heart and a devout Christian who read and believed in the Bible for her entire life. She was later to be affectionately known as Mbuya Malianga with several grandchildren. Mbuya left us on April 5, 1993 and was laid to rest at Old Mutare Mission on April 7, 1993.

Diana, Mbuya,s sister in law, said at the funeral that the lady we were laying to rest was a "GAMBA" who singlehandedly managed to look after Harris, Morris, Washington, Moton, Aggrey, George, and little Margaret who were all from her late husband's first marriage. Her late husband Reverend Paul Malianga, who died from a bus accident in 1948 left her with the above mentioned children together with her own sons Quinton, John, and Fungai who she had not given birth to yet at the time of her husband,s death. She loved all !! She did not show any discrimination whatsoever.

Astrid Leikness, her long standing friend and colleague, says of Mbuya Malianga:

"As far as how we met, I cannot recall the very first time, but we got to be close when we came to the then Umtali African Girls' Hostel and worked with Mbuya. Mbuya was just a wonderful person and I do not think that many others have done the work she did for our Church in Zimbabwe. I can not remember all details of her life but she used to tell of how she got to know the Mission at Mutambara as a very young girl. As it was not common for girls to be educated at that time, she had many hardships with her family because they did not want her back home since she had run away from home to come to the Mission. She used to tell me how proud she was putting on her first dress. I can still remember her standing on the table as she was trying to fit into the dress. She later on went to boarding school where she could not

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understand when other girls had their evening prayers. So Mbuya crept under a table and mumbled something as her prayer."

" As years passed on ", recalls Astrid, " Mbuya got to be a warm Christian person very much respected by everyone. From Mutambara she then went on to the then Old Umtali Mission where she helped out at the Orphanage and what great work she did. She looked after the local Minister's daughter from birth and got married to the Minister who had six other sons from his marriage to the late first wife."

" After getting married." continues Astrid, " the family left for Bulawayo where she had to learn a new language and cope with looking after a rather big family. She took all the hardships with a smile and a strong faith that God was always with her. We are all glad that the Church looked after her following the death of her husband from whom she was blessed with three sons Quinton Farai, John Ndaitawani, and yourself Fungai Paul. I am sure you are well aware of all the good work that she did at the Girls, Hostel as you grew up."

December 4, 1939 Mbuya passed the necessary examination for the then NATIVE FIRST-AID CERTIFICATE with a Class A distinction. July 7, 1976 saw Mbuya being awarded a LOCAL PREACHER'S LICENCE of the United Methodist Church in the Umtali South District Hilltop Circuit.

On her retirement from the Girls, Hostel in 1977 the Bishop said,

"On behalf of the Bishop and the Rhodesia Annual Conference we want to thank you for the wonderful work that you have done at the Girls, Hostel. We know that you have truly been Mai to many, many girls, although you may not be aware of it.

I am sure if you travelled throughout the country you would meet many happy families, where the wife would reach back to you and consider that contact at the Hostel as vital to their lives.

In addition you have been a pillar of Christianity throughout the Conference.

Mbuya, we wish you a very happy and restful retirement and we pray for God,s blessings upon you.

Mbuya will always be remembered for her strong faith in God and her love for every living thing. The Mutare Girls' Hostel, the Hilltop Church Mutare, the Inner City Church Harare, the Mount Pleasant Section, and the United Methodist Church Conference in general will for ever miss you Mbuya.

In particular, your son Fungai and your favourite daughter Lynette who you converted and are trying desperately to keep to your ways will always be singing your favourite

song Hymn 222 " Zvowamuka Mangwanani " (Munamato Unesimba) and shall leave it instilled in your grandsons' hearts till we meet.

GARIKAI WEBSTER MUNJOMA:

Rev. Garikai Webster Munjoma was born in chief Mutambara village in the year 1912. Like many Africans of his time, Rev. Garikai W. Munjoma struggled as a young man to receive education. In 1924, at the age of 12 years he started Sub A. at Mutambara United Methodist Mission near Cashel when his mother died in 1932, he moved to Mutare town where he worked during the day and went to school in the evening (night school), and obtained Standard Three qualification.

In 1939 Rev. Garikai Webster Munjoma married the late Ms Annalue Magagade according to the African Customary Law. In 1951 they had a Christian Marriage. They had a blessed life together. They were blessed with 11 children and one passed away, 8 daughters and 2 boys are living.

Upon his Christian marriage, Webster became a full participant in many church activities. He became a full member of the United Methodist Church under the leadership of the late Rev. Marange. He was elected to lead the men of United Methodist Church (MUMC) during the time of Rev. Dikanifuwa. After he worked at Duly's Garage for over 40 years he felt the call into the Ordained Ministry. During the leadership of Rev. Jijita at Hilltop Webster was accepted into the ministry as a lay pastor. His first appointment was at Chiduku circuit. During that time he would go to Epworth College to receive instructions related to his ministry. He was also appointed a pastor in Chipinge where he served until retirement. Upon his return home, Rev. MW. Munjoma continued to assist pastors at Hilltop United Methodist church. He worked very closely with Rev. Chitewere, in fact at the time of his death he was in charge of the circuit when Rev. Chitewere was on leave overseas.

Rev. Garikai Webster Munjoma is known by the Hilltop Circuit as a man who was pleasant and full of Christian personality. He was loved by both his family and the church. In every sermon that he preached he would end the sermon by saying repent and you will be saved. He was a man who was dedicated to save the Lord.

Rev. Garikai Webster died in Mutare General Hospital and his remains were put to rest at Mutambara Village in the traditional cemetery at the foot of Guhune Mountain on 28th June, 1993. He is survived by 10 children. He is dearly missed by his children and Hilltop United methodist church.

Webster you fought a winning battle, May You Rest In Peace.

REVEREND SAMUEL WESLEY MUNJOMA (1909-1993)



Samuel Wesley Munjoma was born in 1909 in Mutambara Tribal Trust Land he was the fourth of seven children: four boys and three girls. There father was Chakadai Jonathan the son of Munjoma Charima. Those who grew up with Samuel remember him as a loving and caring cousin who loved football with a passion.

When he was 12 years old, Samuel's parents went to work in Wedza. Samuel did his first three years of school in Wedza and then moved to Old Mutare where he did his grade 3 to standard 6. After his standard 6, he went to Chiramba in Mutambara area to teach in the primary school. He stayed at Chiramba for one year only, but in that brief stay his caring and brotherly attitude towards his pupils and other people and his love of football were felt and are remembered.

The following year Samuel went back to Old Mutare for a two year primary school teacher's training course. His first appointment as a trained teacher was at his home school of Mutambara Mission where he opened the standard 4 class level. He only served for one year and was transferred to Chitimbe School in Uzumba Murewa. He taught at Chitimbe for two years and then felt called to serve the Lord as a pastor. So he went back to Old Mutare to train for the ordained ministry.

His first pastoral appointment was at Chitimbe in Uzumba circuit in Murewa in 1942. The following year, 1943 Samuel got married to a young intelligent lady teacher with a great sense of humour and a dedication to God that matched his, Sarah Chleza.

Their first appointment as a couple was in Uzumba South circuit. During their stay in Uzumba they befriended a young primary school teacher, Abel Tendekai Muzorewa. The young teacher went on to become not only a pastor too but the first black United thodist Bishop in Zimbabwe. From that time until they moved on Samuel and Sarah had a special place in Bishop Muzorewa's heart. The young couple remained in

Uzumba until 1948 when they were transfered to their home church Mutambara Mission Centre in 1949.

Samuel and Sarah had eight children: 3 boys and 5 girls. Caring for extended family members is the norm in Zimbabwe as in the rest of Africa. However, Samuel and Sarah's love of people at large and family in particular was demonstrated by not just the customary caring for their extended family, but by blending 6 nieces and 2 nephews into their nuclear family of eight children. Their own children thought that all sixteen of them were siblings, until they were much older.

Samuel Munjoma was a gentle and supportive husband, he listened and smiled. He always had a humorous anecdote to tell in his quiet way. After Sarah's untimely and sudden death in 1989, Samuel was lonely but remained dedicated to God and accepted the love and care of his children. His children remember him as a quite yet loving father, a man of prayer and study. He taught them to be "humble and silent, reluctant to complain but thankful to God for what we have and are". His grand children affectionately call him "sekuru" (grand father) Samuel.

Rev. Munjoma was very strict with time. He was always punctual and expected the same of other people. Even though he stopped playing football when he became pastor he remained a footballer at heart right up to the end. Whenever Samuel could, he went to watch the school and other football games that were often played at the football field near his home.

From 1950 to 1952 the Munjomas served in Mundenda Circuit, Mutasa. Their longest appointment was at Chipfatsura in Marange North Circuit, 1953 to 1962. They were then transferred to Bulawayo Circuit in Bulawayo where they remained from 1963 to 1968. His last appointment before retirement was as pastor of Ehnes Memorial Church Old Mutare. He served there as pastor as well as Station Chairman from 1969 to 1975. In 1976 Reverend Munjoma officially retired from the ministry but accepted to help relieve the great shortage of pastors in the Annual Conference by accepting to serve in his home circuit of Mutambara East from 1976 to 1983. His appointment coincided with the war of liberation in Zimbabwe. He continued to serve for three years after independence. It must have been their most dificult and challenging appointment throughout their ministry. They kept the fires of faith glowing during the most trying time for all Christians in Zimbabwe, especially those in rural areas. The faith of the Munjomas, their courage and quiet dedication not only kept embers of faith glowing during the war but fanned them to burning fire after the war. They got the church back on its feet again. Throughout his ministry, but especially at this time, Rev. Munioma came through as a man of great moral courage. He was not afraid to reprimand where and when it was necessary. Neither was he afraid to stand up and be counted as a Christian. Rev. Munjoma's last official appointment was in 1984 to 1985 as associate pastor of Mutambara United Methodist Church.

Parishners in all the places he served remember Samuel as a hard working father who worked in the field and garden whenever and wherever he could in order to help feed his family well. He is remembered as a hard working pastor who rode his bicycle to visit his flock. He was a pastor who quietly delivered powerful sermons with a keen sense of humor. He was do dedicated to serving the Lord that he continued to help new and young pastors who came to Mutambara East Circuit. He always accepted an invitation to preach and to help in the church until the last few months of his life when he was too sick to walk and was in hospital.

We celebrate Samuel's life with gratitude to God for giving him to us for the years that he was allowed to be a husband, father, teacher, pastor, footballer, neighbour, and friend among us. As we celebrate his life we feel encouraged and strengthened to do our share in the Lord's vineyard. May he rest in peace.

PART XII

THE 1993 STATISTICAL REPORT

INTRODUCTION

- I am pleased, and it is my privilege, to present this statistical report to this year's Annual Conference.
- 2. The report follows the general practice of past reports in both format and substance. However, I have, during the year, concluded that some aspects of the report needed to be modified with a view to making the data collected more vivid, more question-begging, more provocative, more meaningful and more usable as active forces in the decision-making processes of the Annual Conference. I wish to thank Bishop Jokomo for allowing me a free hand in these matters.
- 3. Usable Statistics has to be our main objective. Statistics should be meaningful to us; it should say something to us; and it should raise questions, and we should be able, ourselves, to use these figures or data to make decisions in planning our future work. Where statistics is never used after it has_been produced it is useless. This Statistical Report has been re-organized with this in mind.
- 4. The following modifications should be noted:
 - (a) The first part of the "B" section of this report is now termed "COMPARATIVE ANNUAL STATISTICS". This section seeks to compare the performance of the Annual Conference year by year at a glance. Each year's summary will be added until the full quadrennium is achieved. This will expose considerably the tendencies and patterns of the development of the United Methodist Church more meaningfully and more readily.
 - (b) The second part of the "B" section of this report is similarly termed. COMPARATIVE DISTRICT STATISTICS" because the data are presented in a comparative fashion. And here we are concerned only with each District's totals. Here we are simply naming the section more accurately.
 - (c) The third part of the .B" section of the report is now more properly named COMPARATIVE CIRCUIT STATISTICAL REPORT." and each District's data is presented as before in alphabetical order of the Districts.

- (d) The "C" section of the report is termed <u>Analytical Statistics</u> because the intention is to analyse some aspects of the data now presented. This year we focus on:
- 1. the size and composition of our Christian Community;
- ii. the numerical strengths of the societies; and
- iii. the numerical strengths of the Districts.

These presentations should provoke thought, questions, suggestions and new programmes in order to help the "weaker" units to grow to achieve the same "heights" as the more advanced units thereby saving more souls.

- (e) The "D" Section of the report seeks to gather some pertinent conclusions or inferences from the data presented, for all members of the Annual Conference to react to.
- (f) And, finally, the "E" Section proposes recommendations for action.

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


STRENGTH OF SOCIETIES

CONCLUSION:

The following major conclusion, drawn from the statistics so far presented seem to be self- evident.

- 1. The Annual Conference experienced a favourable 12.8% growth under "Section Leader", as well as a favourable 14.5% growth in full membership. (See Comparative Annual Statistics 1993). The Annual Conference should be congratulated for this favourable growth pattern.
- 2. However, the Annual Conference experienced decline of 24.2% in "Christian Marriages Performed". Is the institution of marriage facing challenges?
- 3. The Analytical Statistics show that men are lamentably dwarfed by women. Where are the men? Why do they not become members of the Church? Is the United Methodist Church's faith being resisted? Why?
- 4. A comparison of full membership, District by District, shows that both Mutare South District and Harare District are long overgrown. I am pleased, however, to note that Mutare South District will split into two Districts in 1994, at long last! How about Harare District?
- 5. Finally, Masvingo-Bulawayo District, a truly "frontline District" in many ways, remains the last in terms of numbers of full members. There growth in full membership status was an additional 136 full members representing an increase of 7% over the previous year (1992)

RECOMMENDATIONS:

In light of the foregoing conclusions I would recommend:-

- 1. That appropriate organs of the Annual Conference study further the noted decline in Christian Marriages performed in a view to instituting corrective measures.
- 2. That the responsible organs(s) of the Annual Conference institute a study on the reason of the chronic paucity of men as compared to women in our church, and to devise appropriate corrective measures.
- 3. That Harare District be actively considered for splitting into two districts in 1995.

In conclusion, I am grateful to all the District Superintendents for the submission of reports on time and for their commendable effort in accuracy. Last but not least, myheart-felt thanks go also to the Bishop's office for their foresight, timely assistance and understanding. Without these I would have been hopelessly lost.
