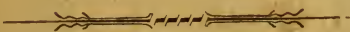

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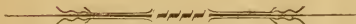

## DAILY JOURNAL.

### FIRST DAY.

FRIDAY, Oct. 1st, 1897.

The Atlantic Mission Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, met for its first session in the M. E. Church at Ocracoke, N. C., October 1st, 1897. Bishop Edward G. Andrews not having arrived, Rev. W. Q. A. Graham, Superintendent, took the chair and opened Conference. Hymn No. 822 was sung and prayer was offered

by the Superintendent. The 5th chapter of II Corinthians was read for the opening lesson.

**ROLL CALL**—On motion of U. S. Crowder, J. A. Sisk was elected Secretary and the roll was called. The following answered to their names: J. S. Crowder, T. S. Davis, W. Q. A. Graham, J. A. Sisk, J. F. Usrey, U. S. White.

**STATISTICIAN**—On motion of U. S. Crowder, J. F. Usrey was elected Statistician; Leolan Jackson was chosen Assistant.

**TREASURER**—On motion of J. A. Sisk, U. S. Crowder was elected Treasurer.

**ASSISTANT SECRETARY**—T. S. Davis was chosen Assistant Secretary.

**STATISTICAL SESSION**—Conference met at 1:30 p. m., for a Statistical Session, W. Q. A. Graham in the chair. Reports were received from all the charges except two.

**HOURS FOR OPENING AND ADJOURNMENT**—On motion of U. S. Crowder the hour for opening was fixed at 9 a. m., closing 12:30 p. m. Conference adjourned.

## SECOND DAY.

SATURDAY, October 2, 1897.

Conference met pursuant to adjournment, Bishop Edward G. Andrews, D. D., in the chair. T. S. Davis conducted devotional exercises.

COMMUNION—The Bishop, assisted by W. Q. A. Graham and U. S. Crowder, administered the sacrament of the Lord's Supper. Journal of yesterday read and approved.

QUESTION 13—"Was the character of each preacher examined?" was asked. The character of W. Q. A. Graham passed and he gave an encouraging report of the work of the Conference. The Bishop gave each pastor the privilege of making an extended report of his work as his name was called. J. L. Stevenson's character passed and he reported Swansboro and New River Circuits.

QUESTION 5—"Who have been continued on trial?" was next called. T. S. Davis, W. S. Moore and U. S. White were represented by the Superintendent. Their characters passed; the examining committee reported. T. S. Davis was advanced to the second year; U. S. White was continued in the first year; W. S. Moore was advanced and transferred to Blue Ridge Conference by Bishop Andrews.

QUESTION 7—"Who have been admitted into full membership?" was taken up. J. F. Usrey and J. T. Hardesty were called. Their characters passed. They reported their work; were admitted into full connection and elected to Deacons orders. H. H. Lowry was absent. His character passed and he was continued in the second year.

QUESTION 10—"What members have completed the Conference Course of Study?" J. A. Sisk and U. S. Crowder were represented. Their characters passed. They reported and were elected to Elders orders.

ANNOUNCEMENTS—The various committees made their announcements. Conference adjourned to Monday 9 a. m. Benediction by the Bishop.

## THIRD DAY.

MONDAY, October 4, 1897.

Conference met at 9 a. m. J. L. Stevenson conducted devotional exercises. Journal of Saturday was read, corrected and approved.

4TH QUESTION—"Who have been recommended for admission on trial?" was asked. The names of Charles M. Levister, Leolan Jackson, J. B. Bridgers and Charles S. Davis were presented. The examining committee reported favorably on each name. Upon motion they were admitted.

QUESTION 11—"What others have been elected and ordained Deacons?" W. Q. A. Graham asked that T. S. Davis and U. S. White be ordained under missionary rule. (See Dis. Par. 165, Sec. 4) It was so ordered.

RECOGNITION—Under Question 21 the Superintendent presented the name of J. S. Warren for recognition of orders. After examination by the Bishop on Discipline and Doctrine his ordination as an elder by the Disciple Church was recognized.

30TH QUESTION—"Where shall the next Conference be held?" Morehead City, Bethlehem and Goldsboro were nominated. Upon vote Morehead City was elected.

REPORTS—The reports of the various Committees were called. The Statistician and Treasurer reported. The reports showed an encouraging gain in finances and membership. J. A. Sisk read the report on Freedman's Aid and Southern Education; report adopted. T. S. Davis read report on Sunday Schools; report adopted.

RELIEF FUND—W. Q. A. Graham asked that a Committee be appointed to be styled Trustees of the Conference Relief Fund. On motion W. Q. A. Graham and U. S. Crowder were appointed. By advice of the Bishop, W. Q. A. Graham was appointed to negotiate with the Blue Ridge Conference concerning an equitable division of the moneys which have accumulated as Relief Fund in that Conference.



**GRAHAM ACADEMY**—The Superintendent reported the work of the year in Graham Academy. The Bishop spoke encouragingly upon the subject of Education and the School.

**BISHOPS ADDRESS**—The Bishop called the class to be ordained Deacons forward and addressed them upon the duties of the office and the work of the ministry, after which he ordained them according to usual form. The hour of adjournment having arrived, Conference adjourned to meet at 2:30 p. m. Benediction by the Bishop.

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### THIRD DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference met at 2:30 p. m., the Bishop in the chair. Prayer by J. T. Hardesty. Journal of the morning session read, corrected and approved.

**REPORTS CONTINUED**—J. L. Stevenson read report on Periodicals. After discussion the report was adopted. The Bishop asked J. B. Bridgers to report the organization of Winfall Circuit.

Resolutions of thanks were tendered to the N. & S. R. R. Co., to the citizens of Ocracoke and to Bishop Andrews.

hymn was sung and prayer offered by the Bishop, after which the appointments were read and Conference adjourned.

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## ATLANTIC MISSION CONFERENCE.

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### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

DEAR BISHOP AND BRETHREN :

It will be no surprise to you that I feel an unusual degree of interest and pride in presenting this, the first, report of the Atlantic Mission Conference. After ten years of continuous labor in this field I cannot but regard our meeting under these circumstances as an evidence that our labors have not been in vain.

It may not be amiss to state that ten years ago we had but three churches and seventy five members in all this end of the State. We now have 15 churches; 16 other societies, 3 parsonages, a conference school with buildings worth \$2500, a membership of 1200, and congregations aggregating 300 persons to whom we regularly preach the word of life.

We feel that with this nucleus around which to build; the noble band of workers which we have; our glorious Church back of us, and the God of battles with us we are well equipped to begin our Conference life

The results of the past year fully justify this confidence for under our labors more than 500 persons have professed conversion, quite a number have claimed entire sanctification, and about 350 have been added to the church.

Our preachers may not be great men as the world counts greatness but they are good men. They are not masters in theology but they know the disease and its remedy. Under the Spirit's power they deliver telling blows at sin. Their sermons are neither faultlessly pure, magnificently splendid nor icily cold, but they feed the flock and awaken sinners and lead them to Christ.

I prefer, with your permission, rather to allow them to

make their own reports than to summarize myself. In a general way, however, I will say that quite a bit of new territory has been taken in. In the country adjacent to Elizabeth City a local brother—J. B. Bridgers—has been laboring. He was employed at Conference to supply the work at Elizabeth City but under my direction he gave up the city and went into the country. Here he met with considerable success and organized a circuit with 125 members.

This circuit will be self supporting from the beginning and is a good charge.

The work at Elizabeth has regularly supplied since and promises to become an important point for us. We have a neat hall well seated and lighted; a good chapel organ; a good congregation and 15 good loyal members to begin with this year.

Many needy points open to us. Were it not for the lack of means and men we could easily enter and develop our church in most of the larger towns of eastern North Carolina. As to the rural districts it is an easy task to establish a church any where.

We are determined to not be a pauper Conference. We need help from the missionary society to enter new fields but I think we are a unit in thinking that the money given us must be used in this way rather than in the older work. We shall ask for more of our present charges to be placed upon the self supporting basis. It is true that our people are poor but they are generous and we will trust God and them for food and raiment.

Our geographical boundaries are: On the north by Virginia; on the east by the Atlantic Ocean; on the south by South Carolina; on the west by the western line of Cumberland, Harnett, Johnson, Nash and Halifax counties in this State. This territory includes 43 counties some of which are nearly as large as Rhode Island. Our present work includes only 11 of these leaving us 32 counties in which to spread ourselves.

Bishop I hope you will return ten years hence and find that Isreal has possessed the land and that the little one has become a thousand.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FREEDMAN'S AID AND SOUTHERN  
EDUCATION.

DEAR BRETHREN:—Next in importance to the direct work of the church is that of the Freedman's Aid and Educational Society. The Methodist Church has inscribed on her banners in large characters: Freedman's Aid and Education. Of all the branches growing out of the church, we believe the Educational Society is nearest the heart. We regret the fact that this part of the Church's work is so much neglected. Realizing that the future destiny of the Church largely depends on the work in and for our Educational Institutions here in the South. We praise God for the earnest efforts that have been and are still being made by this Society to reach the poor of both races and to lift the escutcheon of ignorance from off them. A total of about 10,000 is now enrolled in schools aided more or less by this department of the Church. In as much as we have but one Church school, to wit: Graham Academy, in our Conference, which embrace all Eastern North Carolina, and

WHEREAS, Our Church will be forced to follow in the wake other churches unless we put forth earnest and continued educational efforts as well as spiritual; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we make Graham Academy the center around which to rally our forces.

Resolved 2nd, That it shall be obligatory on the Superintendent, Presiding Elder or Elders to bring the cause of Education prominently before the people and keep them interested if possible in our school.

Resolved 3d, That each Pastor shall co operate with his Elder in keeping the people alive to our school.

Resolved 4th, That the President and Principal of Graham Academy shall urge the young men, on leaving their school to enter our Theological School at Chattanooga, Tenn., for the more thorough drill and equipment for the duties of life.

Resolved 5th, That the Superintendent and all the Pastors shall preach special sermons, and take collections for the cause of the Freedman's Aid and Educational Society.

The future church depends largely on the Sunday School of today. The Sunday School Union aided last year more than 31,000 schools of our church. It has no resources to draw from, and is solely dependent on contributions from the charges; therefore be it

Resolved, That we as pastors make it a specialty to raise something on our respective fields of labor for this worthy cause.
