It is the first time that color has ever been used in this way by the multilith process. Four different drawings were made on separate plates, one for each color including black. The colors were then printed separately in the order of yellow, blue, red, and black. Errors and slip-ups were not so severe as to prohibit the use of the picture for our cover.

GEORGE MATTHIS CLASS TO HAVE ALTERNATING TEACHERS - Tobe Shaw

At a recent meeting the class voted unanimously to alternate teachers each quarter. By alternating in this manner each teacher will be given an opportunity to complete the regular series of lessons as outlined on a quarterly basis.

We have just completed a series of most interesting lessons on Christian Teachings on Human Relations taught by Forrest Callahan. On Sunday, October 7, we welcome back as teacher Charlie Vail; who, in his usual way, will bring to us a series of most interesting lessons for the next quarter.

We are most fortunate in having two members of our class so well qualified and so willing to share teaching as Charlie and Forrest are doing in our class.

THE MOST INTERESTING LESSON FOR SEPTEMBER - S. B. (Sam) Wilkins

All through September we have had very interesting lessons on Fellowship, but the most interesting in our opinion, was Fellowship in the Church. This topic should be the hub and all Christian teachings on Human Relations should spring out from this hub.

In this lesson presented on September 9 we were reminded that we hardly realize the important place our church holds in our lives; we have never been deprived of its services as have multitudes of our Christian brothren in other lands. This lesson provides an opportunity to think through the importance and value of the local Church in the development of Christian character and the promotion of Christian service. Our local Church is the place where we meet our fellow Christians as Christians. We contact them in social or business circles but not in the same way as at Church. We Christians come together on one common level only at Church. The Church is a fellowship of kindred hearts and minds that brings more enrichment to life than any other organization in the world. Fellowship is a word of rich content.

In Acts 4:31-37 we find how things were in the first Christian Church. It stands as a noble example for the local Church in any time or place. (1) It was a fellowship in the Holy Spirit. The Spirit works in the Church today as then. (2) It was a fellowship of faith. They accepted the teachings of the apostles as true and ordered their lives by their teachings. This basis of faith still binds. The New Testament teachings are strong bonds of Christian Fellowship. (3) It was a fellowship in ministering to need. Those who had material goods shared them with those in need. This was a beautiful Christian fellowship that should be emulated by all congregations on earth. As we read the record of the early Church we think of it as a group of people who love the Lord Jesus and who love one another.

Fellowship in the Church - a great topic to study and practice.

CHARLIE VAIL RESUMES POSITION AT DUKE

Mr. & Mrs. C. R. Vail returned to Durham in September where Charlie has resumed his position as Assistant Professor of Electrical Engineering. RALLY DAY AT TRINITY AVENUE A SUCCESS - P. P. Phillips

Rally Day 1951 was very successful - with an attendance of more than 205 and one of the largest collections we have ever taken for the Board of Education - more than \$60.00. The Church was almost filled to capacity - and since our attendance report was not too complete and we did not record our visitors, I believe we had about 230 present for our Rally Day program.

We hope that next

year many of the parents of children in the Primary Department will encourage their children to memorize this catechism - they might not understand all of it while they are in this department, but it will mean much to them later in life.

This Sunday was also promotion day in our Sunday School and many of the pupils will be in new classes and departments next year. We are hoping that the parents of all the pupils will assume the responsibility of helping their children learn their Sunday School assignments - the lesson will mean so much more to the child - and the teacher will be encouraged too. Ask your child who his or her teacher is - and then make a point of meeting the teacher to see how you can help your child to get his Christian Education.

Next Rally Day we will be in our new building - lets all work to increase our attendance to around the 300 mark. There are many members of our church who are not now attending our church school, and many children in our area who do not attend any Sunday School. Be a booster - bring your children - don't send them.
