THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER

1. The Conference shall meet at 9:00 a.m. and open with devotional exercises, and close at 12:30 p.m.

2. The Memorial Services shall be held the first morning of the Conference immediately following the Communion Service and shall include the calling of the roll of the honored dead.

3. The nominating committee consisting of five persons shall be appointed by the bishop quadrennially.

4. No person shall be a member, concurrently, of more than two standing committees or commissions (except as provided for by the Discipline).

5. The Conference fiscal year shall end 20 days before the first day of the Annual Conference.

6. The pastors' reports shall be in the hands of the treasurer and statistician 15 days before the opening day of the Annual Conference.

7. The reports of all major commissions and committees shall be mimeographed and passed out at the seat of the Conference on or before the day the report is read.

8. The roll of Conference lay members shall be called at the opening day of the Conference.

9. The Treasurer's report shall be mimeographed and passed out at the meeting of the Conference.

10. The minutes of the Annual Conference shall be printed and distributed within 90 days after the adjournment of the Conference.

11. All recommendations and memorials shall be presented to the Conference in duplicate form.

12. All motions from the floor shall be in writing when requested by the secretary of the Conference.

13. The program for the Annual Conference shall be arranged by a committee composed of the host pastor, the host district superintendent, the Conference lay leader, and two persons at large named by the nominating committee, in consultation with the bishop.

14. When a member wishes to speak he must arise and address the chair and shall not proceed until he is properly recognized by the presiding officer.

15. No member shall speak on any question more than once until all who wish to do so have spoken, nor shall a member speak more than ten minutes except by permission of the Conference.

16. Motions made and seconded, reports made and accepted are to be deemed the property of the Conference and cannot be withdrawn without the consent of the Conference.

17. All motions to lay on the table, to take from the table, shall be taken without debate, but the one who offers a formal motion or resolution shall have five minutes to close debates and this right shall not be forfeited by a motion ordering the previous question or to lay on the table.

18. All questions of privilege shall be decided by the president.

19. No member of the Conference shall be recognized who is outside the boundary of the Conference.

20. The following motions may take precedence of the original motion or precedence of each other in the order given here: (a) to adjourn to a given time; (b) to adjourn indefinitely; (c) to take up the order of the day; (d) to lay on the table; (e) to

move up the order of the day; (f) to postpone to a given time; (g) to refer to a committee; (h) to amend; (i) to postpone indefinitely.

21. Any person voting with the majority may move a reconsideration, but such motion shall not be debatable.

22. The yeas and nays may be taken on any motion on the call of one-third of the members present.

23. These rules may be suspended by a two-third vote of the Conference.

24. These rules may be amended at any regular session of the Conference at least one day before action is taken.

CONSTITUTION

BOARD OF MANAGERS—BALTIMORE AREA PASTORS' SCHOOL THE METHODIST CHURCH

Herewith is transmitted the Constitution of the Board of Managers Baltimore Area Pastors' School—The Methodist Church, and adopted by the Board of Managers in session at Baltimore, Maryland, September 11, 1957.

ARTICLE I. NAME AND PURPOSE

Section 1. Name—The name of this Board shall be the Board of Managers of the Baltimore Area Pastors' School—The Methodist Church.

Section 2. Purpose—The purpose shall be to provide counsel, make plans, elect a dean and other officers, staff members and teachers (nominated by the dean), set up a budget, approve recommendations and reports, set the time and place of the Pastors' School and to transact any other business pertaining to the school.

ARTICLE II. BOARD MEMBERSHIP

The membership of the Board shall consist of: The Resident Bishop and three members from each of the Annual Conferences of the Area. Two of the three conference representatives shall be nominated by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications and elected by the Conference, the third representative shall be the Executive Secretary of Christian Education. They shall be elected at the first session of the quadrennium and shall serve until the end of said quadrennium. They shall take office at the first meeting of the Board, called by the Resident Bishop, after each of the Annual Conferences shall have met.

ARTICLE III. OFFICERS AND DUTIES

Section 1. Officers—The officers shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary and a Treasurer. Each conference shall be represented in, at least, one office. They shall be elected quadrennially from the membership of the Board

at the first annual meeting of the new quadrennium, by a majority of the members of the Board, after being nominated by the Nominating Committee or from the floor.

Section 2. President—The President shall preside at meetings of the Board, countersign all checks drawn on the treasury, represent the Board when necessary and perform other duties normally performed by a president.

Section 3. Vice-President—The Vice-President shall preside and act in the absence of the President and assist the President when needed.

Section 4. Secretary—The Secretary shall record the minutes, send out notices of all meetings and keep the president and members informed of any matters germane to the Board or Pastors' School.

Section 5. Assistant Secretary—The Assistant Secretary shall perform the duties of the Secretary in his absence and shall assist the Secretary when necessary.

Section 6. Treasurer—The Treasurer shall have charge of all monies of the Board, deposit the same in an account known as "The Baltimore Pastors' School," and shall write and sign all checks. He shall disburse funds only upon written order signed by the Secretary with the exception of bills pertaining to the expense of the School session. In such cases the dean shall sign the order and report the same to the Secretary.

ARTICLE IV. MEETINGS

Section 1. Time—The Board shall meet annually on the first Tuesday in October. The place and hour to be determined by the President in consultation with the Resident Bishop. This date may be altered by the Executive Committee provided it shall be held in the Fall of the year. Special meetings may be called by the President or by a majority of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Quorum—Seven members shall constitute a quorum for transacting business not otherwise specified, provided at least one member from three conferences of the Baltimore Area is present.

ARTICLE V. COMMITTEES

Section 1. Committees—There shall be the following committees representative of each of the Annual Conferences and consisting of not less than four persons: Executive Committee, Nominating Committee, and Recommendations Committee.

Meetings of committees shall be regulated by the Board of Managers, and time and place of meetings shall be subject to the call of the chairman.

Section 2. Executive—The Executive Committee shall be composed of the elected officers and the Resident Bishop. The President and Secretary of the Board shall be the chairman and secretary of this committee. It shall act for the Board between meetings in matters that are necessary to be acted upon before the next Board meeting and report its action to the next Board meeting. It shall constitute the Finance Committee and recommend a budget to the Board after consultation with the dean. It shall have the financial records audited by a certified public accountant.

Section 3. Nominating—The Nominating Committee shall nominate the officers of the Board of Managers, the business manager, the dean and other administrative officers provided that others may be nominated from the floor. It shall be composed of one person from each Conference elected by the Board and shall elect its own chairman.

Section 4. Recommendations—The Recommendations Committee shall examine all reports, receive recommendations from members of the Board, officers of the school, the Department of Ministerial Education and other sources; counsel with the dean and others; and shall make any recommendations, as a result of the above procedure or otherwise, to the Board of Directors. The vice-president shall be chairman of this committee.

ARTICLE VI. PASTORS' SCHOOL

Section 1. Sessions—The time and place of the school sessions shall be set by the Board of Managers.

Section 2. Courses—Courses for the school shall be elected by the dean according to the procedure of the rules of the Department of Ministerial Education.

Section 3. **Dean**—The dean shall be elected at the first meeting of the new quadrennium and shall serve until the end of said quadrennium, or until his successor is elected. He shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the incoming Board of Managers by a majority of its members. He shall be responsible for the administration of the school in keeping with the rules and recommendations of the Board of Managers and the Department of Ministerial Education. He shall submit a written report, by mail, of the school to the Recommendations Committee following the school session; and a written report in person at the next Board meeting; at the same time he shall submit nominations for the faculty of the coming school session.

Section 4. **The Faculty**—The faculty shall be nominated by the dean after consultation with the resident bishop and the director of the Department of Ministerial Education.

Section 5. **Business Manager**—The business manager shall be elected quadrennially at the first annual meeting of the Board of Managers by a majority of its members. He shall be responsible for the business proceedings of the school in cooperation with the dean.

ARTICLE VII. PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the Board meetings in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution of the Board.

ARTICLE VIII. METHOD OF AMENDING

This Constitution may be amended in the following manner:

A proposed amendment shall be submitted in writing to the secretary, at least sixty days before the annual meeting of the Board of Managers. The secretary shall send the same through mail to all of the members of the Board. The proposed amendment shall be submitted by the secretary to the Board in session and shall require a three-fourths vote of the members present and voting, for adoption.

Any part of this Constitution in conflict with the Discipline of the Methodist Church or the rules of the Department of Ministerial Education shall be amended after the Board of Managers reviews the same.

**REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE
COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE**

beginning June 19, 1960 and ending near May 15, 1961

Bishop Love, your Commission on World Service and Finance of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church wishes to present its report for the coming Conference year. The Commission has considered sincerely and prayerfully, all requests, particularly where there has been request of increased budgets. We feel that it is in the interest of the Conference that items in our budget, where possible, without hindrance to work, remain the same.

1. The Commission recommends for your action and determination here and now the following budgets for the Conference year beginning June 19, 1960 and ending May 15, 1961: \$34,509.00.

- A. In addition to the \$34,509.00, the Commission also recommends the amount of \$1.30 (one dollar and thirty cents) per church member for Higher Education and the Wesley Foundation.
- B. That a Reserve Fund be established by setting aside 5% of all gross income of the Conference. In addition to the 5% of all gross income of the Conference, the Commission also recommends that \$1,000 be apportioned to the several charges of the Conference annually, for this fund, until a total amount of \$5,000 has been established.
- C. For World Service General Administration and Annual Conference Benevolence \$34,509.00

II That the cabinet make the apportionments for the individual charges on the basis of the ratio that other apportionments are made.

- A. Treasurer's expenses shall be 5% not to exceed \$600.00 (six hundred dollars) of all funds collected.
- B. That the district superintendents receive a salary of \$4,500 (four thousand five hundred dollars) per year, travel expense items at \$500.00 (five hundred dollars) and district parsonage rent at \$600.00 (six hundred dollars), making a total of \$5,600.00 (fifty-six hundred dollars) to be prorated to each charge.
- C. That the Episcopal Fund shall be an amount equal to 2% (two percent) of the pastor's cash salary.
- D. That the Conference claimants shall be an amount equal to 15% (fifteen percent) of the pastor's cash salary.
- E. That an amount of fifteen thousand dollars be apportioned to the several charges as special cultivation, to be used in new church and parsonage construction and repairs greatly needed on buildings now being used.
- F. That an amount of \$800.00 (eight hundred dollars) be raised for the World Methodist Conference.
- G. That the remaining \$20,000 needed to complete our goal of \$100,000 be divided between the districts of the Conference, according to the accepted ratio, and that each church be apportioned its rightful share as all other apportionments are made.
- H. That the Greensboro and Winston Districts be given 27% of all apportionments and that the Western and Laurinburg Districts be given 23% of all apportionments.
- I. That the ministers' wives be requested to continue their efforts in the interest of our Conference Reserve Pension Fund, and that a special effort be made to increase their contribution to \$5,000 for the coming year.
- J. That each charge of the Conference observe the special days as set forth by the General Conference.

We have examined the statement of recorded cash receipts and cash disbursements of the North Carolina Annual Conference for the period August 1, 1958 through June

30, 1959 in the manner and extent outlined below.

Cash on deposit at June 30, 1959 was confirmed by correspondence and reconciled with the balance reported in the bank. We were unable to trace individual recorded receipts to bank deposits; however, total bank deposits exceeded recorded receipts. We inspected paid bank checks representing recorded disbursements for the year. No vouchers, invoices, or other evidence supporting disbursements were submitted for our inspection. We did not request independent confirmations of recorded receipts from the various contributing churches and individuals.

As the scope of our examination did not include independent confirmation of cash receipts and as vouchers, invoices or other evidence supporting disbursements was not available, we are unable to express an opinion upon the statement of recorded cash receipts and cash disbursements.

REPORT ON TRAFCO SEMINAR HELD IN NASHVILLE ON TELEVISION, RADIO, AND FILM COMMISSION

Bishop Edgar A. Love, and Members of the Annual Conference:

Greetings:

I want to thank our bishop for appointing me to attend this (CJ) Conference in Nashville, Tenn., February 9-11, 1960. I joined the 110 chairmen, directors, and consultants in the seminar, six from the Central Jurisdiction. From the Central Jurisdiction: Mrs. Burnice Hughes Martin, (Bluefield, W. Va.); Mrs. M. F. Strong, (Little Rock, Ark.); Reverend Daniel M. Clemons, (Covington, Ky.); including myself and Reverend T. R. Nelson, (Columbus, Ohio), Public Relations Director for the St. Louis Area.

This 110 were divided into 13 groups, and much of the time was spent in this recommendations.

three-day seminar in small group discussions, which resulted in a total of 48 pages of

During these discussions, it was thought that the clergy were not interested in this "mass media" (communication), but more than anyone may think, the clergy are striving to reach as many people as possible, and are willing to take their place on the program, for we are living in a day that demands reaching out into and beyond the frontier of our own ecclesiastical district, in reaching all peoples, of every race. The ministry and church are fully aware of this modern age and their responsibility to serve the same. The ministry understands that the voice of a man in one way or another is circling the globe on radio and TV waves, at the fantastic speed of 186,000 miles a second. And too, the ministry well knows that the population tide is flooding in at the rate of 120,000 a day or 43 million or more a year. The un-Christian peoples are multiplying far more rapidly than we are winning them for Christ. As ministers of the church, we must quicken their spirits, move more rapidly, catching up with our task or commission as a teaching or healing one, and must not vary one minute, as long as it is a Christ-led mission. And yet, we would not think of trying to reach people in our day with the methods and approach that Isaiah used in his day. It is said that if he had preached from his day to ours, using the same method, he would have reached the same number that the death of President Roosevelt in a single day reached, which was an audience of 90 million. The clergy stands ready to accept this exciting opportunity God has given us to hurry the message of His lost world. It is true that we as ministers are not reaching as many people as the industry communicating world, but it is the God-fearing mind that the ministry go about this great Commission of our Master, reaching two persons out of three. Too many of us may not have as yet lived up to our full responsibility, but at this pace, we as God's ambassadors claim 62% of the population of America, and a large percentage of the total world, for our Christ and His kingdom. Certainly speed has come into our effort in leading men to the fold of our "Waiting Father."

Certainly the radio and TV ministry have their tremendous value at home, and serving millions in the foreign lands in the missionary fields. If our TV ministry can be supported by our church, so we may come into more homes telling the good news of our Master, some fear that sooner or later the TV and radio industry will displace the clergyman at home and abroad. We will admit that many of us have attitudes which will not fit totally on the Master's Commission, but on the whole, this ministry has not failed and will not fail. The God-sent ministers are working faithfully to see His redemptive grace realized through the pulpits, through visitations, and in a large

way, using the mass TV and radio program which belongs to God's program as an outreach to save His lost world. And as ministers, we must rise up and claim this unspeakable opportunity to reach the lost.

Before the day of radio, a poet whose name is unknown, wrote thus:

"If I was a voice, a persuasive voice, that could make
all the world rejoice
That could travel the wide world through
I would fly on the wings of the morning light, and
speak to men with a gentle might
And tell them to be true.

I'd fly, I'd fly, o'er land and sea, wherever a human
heart might be,
Telling a tale, or singing a song, in praise of the
right, in blame of the wrong.
I'd fly, I'd fly on the thunder crash, and into the
blind boson flash
And all the evil thoughts subdued, I'd teach them of
Christ, His way, the true."

We all remember that Lincoln's Gettysburg address was only three minutes, but with rapid speed it took a week or more for a small part of the world to learn of it. But today, through the wonder and magic of electronic communication, the whole world has a front-row seat.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Bishop Love, fellow ministers, lay members of the North Carolina Annual Conference, and visitors:

I am deeply grateful to Almighty God for guidance and strength which has been ours for another year. In fact, I am equally grateful to you and my fellow ministers for having been permitted to remain with you for this quadrennium. I regard it as a high privilege to make this report. The laborers of this year in this field have been limited for these reasons: the inclement weather during the period we were to have followed the Bishops' Crusade as of last year, which had been asked by the General Board of Evangelism, made it necessary to cancel these plans. In the face of the oncoming General Conference, we found it impossible to do it at a later date on a conference level. In many of the charges, however, pastors took advantage of the Holy Week, on their own accord, to foster such spiritual services. I had the privilege of mingling in these services with some of the pastors, by invitation, which I enjoyed very much.

At an earlier date I had fostered three Sunday night services of evangelism at the church of my charge. As individual ministers, and as a group, we were able to enjoy limited gains. It is our hope that some form of evangelism on a conference level will continue for a long time to come.

The General Board of Evangelism has offered many commendations and limited criticisms as relates to the Board of Evangelism of our Conference. They were high in their compliments to the Board of Evangelism for the report made to the last Annual Conference, and asked the Secretary of Evangelism of the North Carolina Conference to send copies to other conferences. They were equally as loud in the praise for what had been done under the Bishops' Crusade last year, but stated that with regret the report or reports had reached the office too late to go in the printed copy of what had been done. These suggestions were offered: (1) Closer connection with the four district secretaries and the executive secretary of the Annual Conference, (2) the naming

of someone for regular reports to the General Board, the bishop and the cabinet to name the individual, (3) they asked of me to ask the bishop and his cabinet to name a conference evangelist to promote evangelism on a conference level. Suggestions were that his expenses be paid by voluntary offerings wherever he served, but that the money be turned over to the Conference treasurer, which would be part of the expense. This is a direct copy, however, of the proceedings of what the board did in Washington two years ago.

Because of the distance and large financial obligations to make the trip and the small allowance to the Board of Evangelism, and the limited personal income, I decided not to go. I have had this request finally from them to recommend the adoption of a ten-year program of evangelism: 1960-1970. This program was passed in the past meeting of the General Board of Evangelism, and is therefore being asked of the Annual Conference to do likewise.

Bishop Love, Members of the 102nd North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church:

Again, we come before you to render unto you an accounting of the Board of Lay Activities' performances. The goals set forth last year have not been accomplished in the fullest, and we deem it proper and necessary that they should be continued.

Among the recommendations this year was the plan to sponsor a program to build a district parsonage on each district. A beginning has been made on three districts for this project, and we feel that this is going to be a great program, which we intend to see through until every district in the North Carolina Conference has its own parsonage.

The adoption of the fifth Sunday as District Meeting Sunday is having a very wonderful effect with the lay work. The district lay leaders that are pushing this are getting good results for their efforts. The Larrinburg District has developed the best district organization in the Conference by this fifth Sunday meeting. It is hoped that the other districts will improve in this behalf.

Methodist Men's Clubs are growing in number, but there is reluctance on the part of many clubs to renew their charter. This is vital! Every club must be chartered. It

is not really a Methodist Men's Club until it has and maintains a valid up-to-date charter.

We are delighted at the prospects of our entering into the Reserve Pension Fund this year. The efforts rendered by the laymen in this movement played a great part in bringing this to bear.

The laymen of the North Carolina Conference are becoming more concerned as to the growth and development of our church. The time is ripe for all agencies of the church to capture this zeal and use it for a greater and nobler church.

The laymen are not unmindful of the shortage of ministers and we stand ready to aid you and assist in helping to improve this very dangerous condition.

The laymen are not unmindful of the problems in connection with Church Extension. Neither are the laymen unmindful of the fact that we are on the verge of a new day. We cannot wait for 1975 to prepare for it. We must begin as of now, to be ready when it comes.

We must ask and we must know now: How many members we will have in, say 1985, and with that data, work towards a program that will meet the challenges of that day. Our goals and targets must be set if we would progress.

The laymen of the North Carolina Conference are dedicated and pledged to that endeavor.

THREEFOLD MINISTERS' RESERVE PENSION FUND

BE IT RESOLVED:

I. That the Three-fold Ministers' Reserve Pension Fund program of the North Carolina Annual Conference be in effect as of June 19, 1960 on the following basis:

- A. That the ministers who are admitted in full connection in the North Carolina Annual Conference at the 1960 session of the said Conference, together with the ministers who are received on trial and continued on trial at the 1960 session of said Conference, be enrolled as "New Entrant" members of the Ministers' Reserve Pension Fund of The Methodist Church, in accordance with rules and regulations of the said Fund, as set forth in §§1642 to 1655 of the **Discipline**.
- B. That the ministerial members of the North Carolina Annual Conference, in the effective relation, who were admitted in full connection prior to the 1960 session thereof, and who are otherwise not eligible for membership in the Ministers' Reserve Pension Fund, and the full-time approved supply pastors, be enrolled as members of the Partial Reserve Pension Fund, in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Fund, as set forth in §§ 1656 and 1657 of the **Discipline**.
- C. That, beginning with the Conference year 1960-61, each and every qualified member of the Partial Reserve Pension Fund shall contribute annually to the Fund an equivalent to 3% of the average salary of the Conference; provided, however, that if his support, as defined in §1643 §2 of the **Discipline**, be less than the average salary of the Conference, a member may elect to contribute annually to the Fund an amount equivalent to 3% of his support.
- D. That the service annuity payable to a retired minister of the Partial Reserve Pension Fund, or to the widow of a deceased member thereof, based upon contributions made to the account of such member by the North Carolina Conference, be regarded as part of the pension provided by the Conference for such conference claimant under the provisions of the pension code.

II. That beginning with the Conference year 1960-61, the Board of Pensions of The Methodist Church, Incorporated, in Illinois be, and it is hereby authorized and directed to pay annually from the Distribution Reserve account of the North Carolina Annual Conference on deposit with the said Board of Pensions, to the current distribution funds of the said Conference, as the Conference Board of Pensions may request, an amount equal to the total number of annuity responsibility years of the North Carolina Annual Conference multiplied by \$2.00 per year of such service.

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REPORT OF BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS

Bishop Love, and fellow members of the Conference:

To borrow a statement from Senator J. William Fulbright, "We live in an age of rapid social change, without precedent and without parallel." This change continues unabated despite all the efforts of the gatekeeper of the past to retard it. We praise God for every instance in which this revolution has moved along the line of Christian principles, and Christian solutions have been reached therein.

Human Relations In General

For quite a few years we have been told by some of the most brilliant minds of the century that the problem facing contemporary man is a moral and spiritual problem. Nowhere is the moral problem brought more sharply into focus than at the point of human relations. The problems in North Africa, South Africa, the Middle East, and in our own country are primarily problems of human relations.

The international scene is fundamentally a reflection of the crisis in relationships among nations. It is regrettable that our country, the strongest and most influential nation in the West, seems to be more interested in exporting its gadgetry than good will and improved, genuine human relations. Americans in general have been laboring under the illusion that the products of our industry would make friends for us abroad. What we failed to take into account was, as Senator Fulbright pointed out, "The rich and the powerful may be respected if they conduct themselves so as to merit respect, but they are rarely loved." A cup of cold water given in the name of Jesus Christ has a much stronger appeal to the human heart than products of industry or agriculture made available simply because our warehouses are overstocked. The lesson that we and the whole world must learn in the area of human relations is that which is found in Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan. All people everywhere are called upon to see every man as his neighbor and minister to him according to his needs and his own ability to meet that need.

The Shape of Things In Our Church

The condition of human relations in the Methodist Church in these difficult times leaves much to be desired. The General Conference adopted the report of the "Committee of Seventy," which recommended no change in the basic structure of the church. Structure and union seem to take precedence over loyalty to Jesus Christ. Congeniality is more to be desired than fidelity to our Lord who is the Head of the church.

In spite of all that remains to be done in our church in the area of Christian social relations, we are humbly grateful for any and all progress along this line. Here in our own state on November 19, 1959 a joint meeting of the Board of Social and Economic Relations of the Western North Carolina and that of our Conference was held in Centenary Methodist Church in Winston-Salem. That meeting pointed up the vast chasm which exists between the two Conferences. Each has been going its own way, hardly aware of the other. The group recognized as a primary need a program of education between the two Conferences. More such meetings as the one in Winston-Salem are needed in a program of education in Christian social relations in both conferences.

The report of the Board of Social and Economic Relations of the Western North Carolina Conference was unanimous at its 1960 session which included essentially the proposals made at the meeting in Winston-Salem last fall. The report stated in part: "The church has an opportunity and responsibility in race relations which it can neither ignore, evade, nor relegate to the courts, the school boards, or the secular press." The Board further stated that: "It felt an increasing concern over our church's hesitation to more fully implement the teachings of the Bible that God is the Father of all people and races, that all men are brothers, and that all men are of infinite value and should be treated with dignity." We as a conference also regret this fact. A

rather graphic example of this belief in practice is the resignation of the nine professors in the Divinity School of Vanderbilt University over the Lawson case.

The racial situation in the Methodist Church must improve; it will improve, and we as well as our white brothers must pray and work to bring race relations in our church into harmony with the Christ way of life.

The Post-Summit Crisis

The whole world should bewail the failure of the Summit Conference. Regardless of what responsibility Russia might have had for its failure, the United States cannot escape her responsibility for this international catastrophe. The aftermath of the U-2 incident has revealed that both the United States and Russia have been playing the deadly game of deceit and mistrust. What can be done now? Some sound proposals have been offered. Dr. Harold A. Bosley suggests that we should accept Khrushchev's proposal for another summit in another six or eight months. (2) Throw our weight behind disarmament negotiations (3) Propose all-out disarmament as our immediate objective. (4) Silence the military voices that keep calling for bigger appropriations, yet keep telling us we are safe because our armed forces are in readiness. (5) Make it abundantly clear to the men in the Pentagon that they are the choreboys, not the custodians of our society.

What can Christian people do in this era of tension and international balance of terror? We can refuse to support the blind, but popular position of my country right or wrong. We can also help to give our country an uneasy conscience, and thereby help her abstain from the sin of self-righteousness. The problems between East and West cannot be solved by self-pedaling our weakness and shortcomings and magnifying the evil of the communist system. We must remember that capitalism and the Kingdom of God are by no means identical twins. The Christians of the United States must use their influence to help our nation steer clear of provocation, and at the same time Christians must continue to pray, work for, and promote world peace.

The Sit-In Demonstrations

It is our position and considered opinion that the students who participated in the sit-in demonstrations are deserving of our highest commendations. They have done so with courage, fortitude, and dignity as becomes Christian youth. These demonstrations must be seen as the sharp and cutting edge necessary to awaken a calloused community conscience to its moral and spiritual responsibility. We commend those cities that have opened their lunch counters to all customers on an equal basis.

General Conference Action

The 1960 General Conference merged the three Social Action Boards and created a mandatory Board for the Annual Conference, and a mandatory commission on Christian Social Concerns in the local church. The three divisions will be:

1. Division of Temperance and General Welfare
2. Division of Peace and World Order
3. Division of Human Relations and Economic Affairs

Recommendations

1. That the North Carolina Conference seek to establish and maintain communications with the two conferences in the Southeastern Jurisdiction in order that a program of mutual education may be effected among the three conferences in North Carolina.

2. That our district superintendents see that the mandatory Commission on Social Concerns be set up in every local church.

3. That the Conference Board of Social and Economic Relations and for its successor furnish leadership and guidance to the local church commissions in their work on Social Concerns.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

Bishop Love, members of the 102nd session of the North Carolina Conference:

Your chairman and two district directors, Rev. Ferree and Rev. Robinson, attended the Briefing Conference on Temperance in October at Lake Junaluska, and came back with the determination to keep an active program going in our conference. We held workshops and seminars, trying to lift first of all the ministers from a state of apathy concerning the temperance.

The Methodist Church takes the position that laws should be enacted controlling and prohibiting the traffic of alcohol. The right of the people to enact such legislation to protect their homes and communities is a fundamental legal and moral right.

When one considers that the estimates are that about fifty per cent of the crimes in the United States has alcohol as a factor, and of traffic deaths in highway accidents, about the same percentage, and when one thinks of the terrific expense it is to the nation to take care of the alcoholics, how many different arrests, trials, and imprisonment for periods of varying length, each separate count runs into money. One wonders how anybody could think the revenue derived from it is anywhere near the cost. The money spent for liquor by the father whose family is poorly clad and ill-nourished, is a good example.

One has only to read the Bible open-eyed to find facts and references condemning the drink evil. If a preacher is to declare the whole truth, he must preach against this sin. You will find more scripture on the use of intoxicating drink than the subjects of lying, adultery, swearing, stealing, cheating, hypocrisy, pride, or even blasphemy.

Hence, your Board recommends that at the first quarterly conference that each district superintendent see to it that there is a Division of Temperance in the Commission on Christian Social Concerns in every church.

We further recommend that in order that these committees be not paper but active, that each district director hold as early in the year, that is the conference year, as possible, a workshop for the pastors and local church committees to provide background information that will stimulate new understanding of the alcohol problem.

We also recommend that where we find members of the Methodist Church with property on the highway and the space can be secured from them, that billboards warning against drinking and driving or alcoholism be erected.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WORLD PEACE

Bishop Love and members of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Central Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church:

We wish to submit the following annual report of the Board of World Peace of the N. C. Conference of the Central Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church.

World Peace must come—and with it understanding.

The primary conditions of peace lie in the attitudes of men. Since it holds in its keeping the moral and spiritual forces for a peaceful world; the church has a unique and God-given responsibility to take the lead in the development of a philosophy and to suggest strategy to bring about peace among nations.

The "one world" concept of less than two decades ago has become a reality, for in less than a week we may circuit the globe. Science has physically brought us closer together, but we have yet to accomplish the more difficult feat—the development of a "one world spirit," the building of a world society. We are generally agreed on the necessity of establishing such a world order if we are not to destroy ourselves in our very effort to preserve ourselves. We recognize that such an understanding is perhaps the most difficult ever faced by the human race, and that it will require all the knowledge, wisdom, faith and good will of which peoples are capable. Such integrated living requires a rethinking of one's philosophy and an analysis of the factors which will bring this dream to fruition.

Now, as never before in the history of our country, we Americans are re-thinking our philosophy and taking stock of our traditions, our way of life and our privileges. We are evaluating anew such things as personal liberty, freedom of thought and speech, religious liberty and the opportunity to work, to play, to hope and aspire. All of us have decided that such privileges are worth defending, preserving and perpetuating. We are now at war with those forces that would take away those things we hold dear.

It is the opinion of authorities in the field of history and sociology that the world was never in such a chaotic condition as it finds itself today. All the larger nations, as well as the smaller ones, are engaged in conflicts with those nations believing in freedom for its citizens allied against those nations which have ambition to rule the world.

A cold war has involved our nation, but it's not war alone which makes men doubtful as to the course they should pursue, doubtful of their whole philosophy of life. It is not alone the attitude of the totalitarian leaders which causes world uneasiness but it is the attitude of the people. Many people seem to have lost their standards of life. Some revel in hatred, some welcome a dominant leader because he saves them from the trouble of thinking and making decisions for themselves, some are in despair because they see no way out of their bondage.

America today is calling for **Christian** citizens to have within them courage, faith, confidence, will power, and initiative for the great struggle in which it finds itself in the space age.

It is a very interesting time in which we are living, a time filled with great potentialities for the future, a time in which the shape and direction of the future are being fixed as we have never seen in any previous day, but it is not an easy time. It is putting all of us to a very severe test, and it is trying the society and civilization to which we belong. We have just seen the collapse of the Summit Conference, the U-2 incident, the threat of reprisal and counter-reprisal, all bringing about utter confusion in world affairs. And we have seen suggestions for action that range from one extreme to the other.

Does this not all add up to a clear indication that we must redouble our efforts toward peace? We must reaffirm our faith in God and in man—every man. It is good to remember that a crisis can bring out in us a response that may be better than we have known or expected of ourselves. We pray it may be so for our country, and for our world. We must seek to build a united front if our civilization is to stand in the space age.

We believe—certainly the church can be an agency of great power for the establishment of a world community, as has been demonstrated by the missionary and ecumenical movements. That the bonds of brotherhood among Christians have held so firm during the years of war and international tension is occasion for humble thanksgiving to God. From the beginnings already made, a wider world community must be fashioned through cooperation with persons of all religious faiths. To this ideal we dedicate ourselves unflinchingly.

Peace is the gift of God but it is acquired by man only through the patience of love and cooperation. The peace of God cannot be contained within any one nation, economic system, or religion. To be a stable and lasting reality it must become universal. While the ultimate aim of the Christian mission is the conversion of the world, the urgent need to establish the conditions of peace call for the immediate and unremitting efforts of Christians and non-Christians alike. No one nation or group of nations pitted against other nations can initiate or maintain world peace. It can only be the results of understanding, forbearance and cooperation on the part of all nations. Hatred and prejudice must be overcome by love as the cementing bond of brotherhood.

We believe firmly in the statement about the role of the church in today's situation which was made by Kyle Hasselden in his book, **Racial Problems in Christian Perspective 1959**. Mr. Hasselden states that, "The church is a power for racial solidarity, a voice of protest and hope and a training ground for developing leadership."

When the teachings of Jesus are fully accepted and implemented by vigorous actions, war as a means of settling international disputes will die, sit-down strikes in the south and racial uprisings such as exist in South Africa will end. As war disappears, thereby setting the world free from tyranny and destruction, man will be able to build anew, within a more Christian structure, an environment of lasting freedom and peace.

The primary conditions of peace being the attitudes of men, therefore the Christians have the moral and spiritual forces for a peaceful world.

We give thanks to God for the United Nations and its specialized agencies, and their continued efforts to create peace in the world. Particularly do we commend the United Nations for its direct approach, exploration and action on crucial problems that arise periodically throughout the world and pose a direct threat to the peace of the world.

In view of all this we are in harmony with the role of the church in today's situation, as outlined by the Committee on World Peace at the General Conference in Denver, Colorado, in April, 1960, which defines the role of the church for today's world as follows:

"The role of the church in today's world situation is clear. Its task is to help mankind attain freedom, human rights, justice, adequate living standards, self-government, and the cooperation of all nations for the maintenance of peace." Therefore, we call upon individual members of the church to make the gospel articulate in world affairs to the end that peace may become real and dynamic in the world and all mankind will be free on earth.

REPORT OF AREA ADMINISTRATIVE SECRETARY

Bishop Love and Members of the Conference:

Instead of attempting to give a review of my activities of the past year, I am submitting to the Annual Conferences of the Area for their approval our financial report covering the years 1957 and 1958, with a few announcements of area-wide meetings for 1960. These reports were given at the Area Council in Bluefield, W. Va., last October.

Inasmuch as the Annual Conferences provide the major support for operation of the Area office, I think it is important that they should be given the privilege of reviewing our finances. The Area Council, not being a legislative body, can only hear reports and pass recommendations involving financial matters to the Annual Conferences for action. The report for 1959 will be presented first at the next Area Council, and then to the Annual Conferences in 1961.

I wish to make the following announcements:

1. The third annual Ministers' Wives' Retreat will be held at Morgan State College, Baltimore, September 1, 2, and 3. We anticipate another excellent program and fine fellowship for the wives of our pastors.

2. The Area Council will be held at Ebenezer Church, Washington, on November 8, 9, and 10. Pastoral delegates should be chosen as soon after the Annual Conferences as practicable.

We should mention the fine response which has been given to the group insurance plan which was presented at the last Annual Conference sessions. The Delaware, North Carolina, and Washington Conferences were able to qualify; thus the full-time plan. We urge pastors to pay their premiums promptly. We do not think it is necessary to argue the value of this type of insurance, and we invite discussion on the matter so far as time will allow. We expect the East Tennessee Conference to qualify this year.

I am in the eighth year of service in present office, and wish to express my deep appreciation for the fine continuing relations with Bishop Love, our Area staff and cabinet and the pastors and laymen of our churches.

REPORT OF THE GREENSBORO DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Members and Friends of the North Carolina Conference, Greetings!

It is with a profound sense of pleasure that I present my third report as district superintendent of the Greensboro District.

I thank our heavenly Father for giving me protection, strength, and guidance during the year.

Bishop Love, I thank you for your leadership and counsel.

I thank my fellow district superintendents for their brotherly spirit and cooperation.

Again, I thank the ministers and their wives and the laymen of the district for their wonderful cooperation.

The District Conference

We held a one-day session of the District Conference at St. Matthews Methodist Church, Greensboro, N. C., on May 28, 1960. We were royally entertained by the pastor, the Reverend J. E. Brower, and his members.

Excellent reports were given by five of our district workers. Those presenting reports were Mr. J. W. Sapp, district lay leader; the Reverend O. W. Burwick, district secretary of Evangelism; Mrs. Dorothy P. Jones, district president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service; Mrs. Bettye J. Taylor, district director of Adult Work; and the Rev. John G. Corry, district director of World Peace. A thought-provoking discussion followed each report.

The Reverend G. H. Caldwell, pastor of St. Paul Methodist Church, Reidsville, N. C., preached an inspiring noon-day message.

At the afternoon session, Mr. J. W. Sapp, our delegate to the Town and Country Conference held at Wichita, Kansas, gave a report. Mr. Sapp gave us the highlights of this great conference.

Bennett College also presented a program at the afternoon session. The Reverend John G. Corry, acting director of religious activities at the college, was the speaker.

District Youth Work

We held a one-day Youth Rally at Wesley Chapel Methodist Church on Saturday, June 11, 1960. We had forums on the following topics: "Christian Youth and the Problem of Integration," "Christian Youth and the Problem of World Peace," and "Christian Youth and Evangelism." With keen insight, our youth entered into a discussion of these problems.

We were wonderfully entertained by the pastor, Rev. W. E. Hairston, and his members.

Higher Christian Education

The Greensboro District is fortunate in having working relations with three outstanding colleges within its bounds. These colleges are Bennett, our own Methodist school, A. and T. College, and North Carolina College at Durham.

Almost every Charge on the district raised its full apportionment for Bennett this year.

We now have growing Wesley Foundations at A. and T. College and North Carolina College at Durham. The Reverend John G. Corry, director of the Wesley Foundation at A. and T. College, and the Reverend Douglas E. Moore, director of the Wesley Foundation at North Carolina College, have both done fine jobs this year.

On September 7, 1960, all Methodist College Student Work in North Carolina will be integrated. At that time there will be organized an Inter-Conference Commission on Student Work. The Commission will be composed of representatives from the Western North Carolina Conference and the North Carolina Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction and the North Carolina Conference of the Central Jurisdiction. Each conference will have eight representatives on the Commission. These representatives will be: the president of the Conference Board of Education, the executive secretary of

Christian Education, the secretary of Student Work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, one student elected by the North Carolina Methodist Student Movement, one district superintendent, one layman, one pastor, and one college professor.

The integration of North Carolina Methodist College Student Work will be a long step toward the integration of North Carolina Methodism.

Summary of Work on the Charges

Bass Chapel and Raleigh Cross Roads: W. E. Tyler, pastor. Under the circumstances, this Charge has done fair work this year.

Brown Summit: W. L. Napper, pastor. Under the leadership of Brother Napper, this Charge has had another fine year. This Charge raised more on its benevolences this year than any year since I have been on the district.

Browning Chapel: C. C. Armstrong, pastor. This Charge has great potentialities. It has done good work this year.

Chapel Hill Circuit: F. F. McCallum, pastor. A new church building is being erected at St. Paul Church on this Charge.

Collins Grove: T. C. Tarpley, pastor. This Charge has done fair work this year.

Cox Chapel and Shady Grove: C. G. Bynum, pastor. This Charge is still struggling. The work there has been fair.

Durham: D. E. Moore, pastor. Taking all things into consideration, this Charge, under the leadership of Brother Moore, has done a good job. Brother Moore deserves much credit for the work he has done here. With hard work this Charge has the possibilities of becoming one of the leading Charges in the Conference.

Empire Circuit: F. D. Morehead, pastor. The Piney Ridge Church on this Charge is planning to build. New church buildings are also needed at Pleasant Hill and Stout's Chapel, the other two churches on this Charge.

Kernersville: E. J. Jones, pastor. This Charge is moving forward under the leadership of Brother Jones.

Laughlin Memorial and Ramseur: Liston Sellers, pastor. Taking all things into consideration, this Charge has had a fine year under the leadership of Brother Sellers.

Leaksville: John G. Corry, pastor. Leaksville has had another great year under the leadership of Brother Corry. This Charge is planning to relocate.

Mount Carmel and Warren Street: F. D. Caldwell, pastor. These two churches, under Brother Caldwell's leadership, have had a great year. The spiritual life of the churches has been deepened this year. They have raised more money for benevolences than they have raised since I have been on the district.

Mount Tabor: R. F. McCallum, pastor. Mt. Tabor has had a banner year under Brother McCallum's leadership.

Mt. Zion and Zion Hill: J. H. Minor, pastor. A new church building is now being erected at Mt. Zion. Both churches have done good work this year.

Newport News and Pleasant Ridge: R. E. Sharpe, pastor. In many respects this Charge is still struggling and has many problems yet to be solved. However, in the face of this, Brother Sharpe has worked hard. This year this Charge is making the best report for benevolences that has been made since I have been on the district.

Oxford Circuit: L. W. Coltrane, pastor. Brother Coltrane has had his best year on this Charge since being appointed pastor there three years ago. This year he is making the best report for benevolences since being appointed to Oxford.

Raleigh: O. W. Burwick, pastor. Raleigh has had another fine year under Brother Burwick's leadership. He has as his followers a loyal and hard-working congregation.

Randleman: I. C. Spinks, pastor. Brother Spinks and his people have done good work this year. The indebtedness on the church has been paid and they are now ready for the dedicatory service.

Reidsville: G. H. Caldwell, pastor. Under the circumstances, this Charge has done well. Brother Caldwell is making the best report for benevolences that he has made

since his going to Reidsville as pastor. This Charge has the possibilities for doing great things.

St. James and Summerfield: W. N. Johnson, pastor. These two churches are still moving forward under the fine leadership of Brother Johnson.

St. Matthews: J. E. Brower, pastor. This church has done good work this year. Plans are now being made to build a much-needed church and parsonage.

St. Peters: R. M. Martin, pastor. Brother Martin is still leading this church forward. The indebtedness on the church has been paid. The pastor deserves much credit for the fine leadership that he has given in paying the debt on this church.

South Greensboro: Eugene Black, pastor. Brother Black has done an unusually fine job this year. Under his leadership, the New Goshen Church, one of the three churches on the Charge, has asked to become a station at this Conference. In a special session of the Quarterly Conference held at New Goshen Church, it was agreed that the pastor's salary, travel and expense fund would be raised from \$1,050.00 to \$3,000.00. They also agreed that they would accept whatever amount would be apportioned them for benevolences. In the light of these facts, I am recommending to Bishop Love that New Goshen Methodist Church of the South Greensboro Charge become a station another year.

Union Memorial: G. M. Phelps, pastor. This Charge, under the leadership of Brother Phelps, has done an excellent job this year. The old debt owed the National Board of Missions was paid out this year. After paying this debt, this Charge decided to make extensive repairs and improvements. These repairs and improvements were made at a cost of \$14,000.00. Ten thousand dollars of this amount was borrowed from the National Board of Missions. Six hundred dollars was given from our Conference Cultivation and Advance Funds, and \$3,400.00 was raised by the local church.

A beautiful paint job has been done in the assembly room and main auditorium. Extra toilets have been built in the basement. Fire escapes have been built. Tile has been placed on the floors of the main auditorium and the assembly room. These are just some of the extensive improvements that have been made.

This is one of the leading Charges in the Conference.

Wesley Chapel: W. E. Hairston, pastor. This Charge is still going forward under the great leadership of Brother Hairston.

Running water has been installed in the church. Indoor toilets have been built. A central heating system has been installed. The interior of the rooms in the Department of Education is almost complete.

The Conference will always be indebted to Brother Hairston for his leadership in building this beautiful church.

The Healing Ministry

The gospel of healing had a large place in the ministry of Jesus. Much of his time and energy were spent in the healing of disease. Modern psychology, psychiatry, and psychosomatic medicine are bringing us back to Jesus' idea that the preaching of the gospel and healing belong together.

With these facts in mind, and after twelve years of study and research and prayerful thinking on the place of the healing ministry in the church, I initiated, early this year, spiritual healing services at the Browning Chapel Methodist Church in Greensboro. (Of course, these services were initiated with the consent of Dr. Clinton C. Armstrong, the pastor, who is himself a great scholar in the field of the relation of religion and health). These services are held each Friday night.

I have conducted spiritual healing missions at Union Memorial and Warren Street Methodist Churches in Greensboro. These missions were conducted on invitation of the pastors of these churches. I have been invited by the pastors to hold spiritual healing missions at Mt. Tabor and Mt. Carmel Methodist Churches in Greensboro and Saints Home Methodist Church in Winston-Salem.

Among those who have encouraged me in this ministry are Bishop Edgar A. Love, Rev. and Mrs. F. D. Caldwell, Rev. and Mrs. L. A. Brown, Rev. and Mrs. G. M. Phelps, Rev. J. E. Brower, Rev. and Mrs. G. H. Caldwell, Dr. C. C. Armstrong, Rev. Douglas E. Moore, Rev. John G. Corry, Rev. R. C. Sharpe, Rev. H. W. Philips, Rev. R. F. McCallum, Rev. J. W. Gwyn, Rev. and Mrs. Liston Sellers, Jr., Rev. W. E. Hairston, and Rev. F. D. Morehead.

Among outstanding Methodist writers who have made brilliant and scholarly contributions on the spiritual healing ministry are: Dr. Albert E. Day, director of Spiritual Life at Wesley Theological Seminary, in his *Autobiography of Prayer*; Dr. E. Stanley Jones, famous evangelist, in his *Conversion*; Dr. Georgia Harkness, professor at the Pacific School of Religion, in her *The Providence of God*; Dr. Edgar N. Jackson, pastor of Mamaroneck, New York Methodist Church, in the December 1959 issue of the *Adult Student*; Dr. Lewis L. Dunnington, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Iowa City, Iowa, in his *The Inner Splendor*; and Dr. Paul Johnson, professor of The Psychology of Religion at Boston University, in his *The Psychology of Pastoral Care*.

Among outstanding Methodist churches where regular healing services are conducted are: the First Methodist Church, Iowa City, Iowa; Broadway Temple Methodist Church, New York City; Mamaroneck Methodist Church, Mamaroneck, New York; and Mt. Washington Methodist Church, Baltimore, Maryland.

One of the greatest challenges that comes to the church today is to offer men wholeness, that is, healing of body and mind and spirit. In cooperation with the medical profession, may we accept this challenge.

These associations have helped to relieve some of the tensions and strain that are an unavoidable part of the district superintendency. We have labored together in love and harmony to do the work of the church, striving to build the kingdom of God in the hearts of men and women, boys and girls, so that finally they may become Christian citizens. We are thankful to our heavenly Father, and to you, Bishop Love, for having had the privilege of working with such understanding and kind people. The experiences gained through these associations will be most helpful in the coming years.

Some Items of Concern

The death of the old social order and the birth of the new at times have made the atmosphere very tense. However, we believe with wise counseling, patient effort, and passive resistance, we will eventually come into our own.

The District Woman's Society of Christian Service has been very active and has Building Fund in Wilmington. This valuable assistance has given great stimulus to the folk in Wilmington, for which we are deeply grateful. Our heartfelt thanks go to Mrs. Emily Benton, president, and to the ladies of the district, for the great work done under her able leadership and their willingness to support their leader.

The Methodist Men have been consistent in their support of the program of the district. In the struggle of the congregation of John Wesley they contributed \$167.00. Under the leadership of Mr. Bruce Hargrove, the men are doing wonderful work.

The Commission on Membership and Evangelism has kept the program of evangelism constantly before the people and has been quite successful in workshops and evangelistic campaigns. We will list later the conversions and accessions to the credit of the local churches.

Stewardship has been stressed in every church as a means of increased financial support. Our total life as a trust from God has also been emphasized, realizing that where a full life commitment has been made, all other things follow in natural sequence. The number of tithers has not quite reached the proportion that we had desired for the district as yet. Nevertheless, we are hopeful that before too long the tithing program will be most outstanding in the Conference, with very gratifying results.

The Ministers' Wives, under the leadership of Mrs. J. W. Ferree and Mrs. J. H. McCallum, have been working in the interest of the permanent fund. These ladies are planning to make a better report this year than in former years. It is hoped that each pastor will see to it that his wife gets every means available to enable her to make a good report. These women in the parsonage are doing a great work and should be given every encouragement possible.

The district staff of Christian Education has done an excellent job in developing Christian citizenship. The retreats and workshops were attended by our young folk in large numbers. Most of the churches have had young people in all of the meetings. The Leadership Training School held at Simpson in Charlotte was most rewarding. The staff members were all certified and our young folk were a credit to the district. Their conduct and behavior was excellent. It is very significant that the teaching and training given these young folk is developing in them a Christian freedom that will enable them to choose for themselves the right for Christian citizenship to the glory of God and to the benefit of mankind. They have very promising futures; we are hopeful that some of them give themselves to full-time Christian service.

Four of the supply pastors from the district attended the Pastors' School at Bennett, Brother McEachin graduating from the course. He, with the others, is doing very acceptable work.

The Work by Charges

Bolton and St. Peter: Walter L. Davis, pastor. The pastor has done his best to give efficient leadership to his people. Conversions, 1; Accessions, 2. The church school continues to grow and the work of Christian Education is progressing nicely.

Charlotte: C. E. Strickland, pastor. The pastor and people have been doing an excellent job. This church has had a rebirth in their new location and has potentials for a great church. Conversions, 3; Accessions, 10. Simpson is making great strides in Christian education.

Fairmont: John Monroe, pastor. Our church is having a difficult struggle in Fairmont. Brother Monroe has done his best and yet he hasn't been able to reach the people. Their future is not as bright as we would like it to be. Conversions, 2; Accessions, 6.

John Wesley: R. B. McRae, pastor. The pastor and people have made efficient use of their church and facilities in serving the community. The membership has grown considerably.

Goldsboro: Harlon London, pastor. This church needs a resident minister. In this

situation the members and friends would have close supervision and leadership. Brother London has done his best, but in serving as a full-time chaplain at the Sanatorium in Wilson, he just does not have the time that is needed to devote to the church.

Hamlet: D. H. McLean, pastor. This church and pastor report another good year of work. Even though Brother McLean was hurt during the last few months of the last conference year and for more than three months did not go into the pulpit and even yet has not fully recovered his normal strength, the work under his supervision with the loyal members has made steady progress. This membership has been very loyal. He has worked with them and they have made a good report. Conversions, 8; Accessions, 10.

Hickory Bend and St. Mark: D. R. McGirt, pastor. The pastor and people have done well at Hickory Bend; the church has been completed. Conversions, 3; Accessions, 7.

Hoffman and Millers: John McEachin, pastor. Hoffman has finished paying for their church and this pastor and people are doing a nice job. Conversions, 3; Accessions, 7.

Johns Station and Piney Grove: J. H. McCallum, pastor. The pastor and people are doing a great job in Christian education and they are making excellent progress with their young people. At Piney Grove they are hopeful of finishing the church this year. Johns is planning to begin a building program in the very near future. Conversions, 8; Accessions, 8.

Laurinburg: G. E. Hogue, pastor. The pastor and people have done a great job in finishing their church and it is now in a position to carry their current overhead. This is one of the churches that the Conference has helped in a great way. The members were able to get a loan from the North Carolina Mutual Insurance Company to pay the General Board of Missions so that now they owe only one concern. They have a very fine educational program in this church. Conversions, 3; Accessions, 7.

Lumberton and Beauty Spot: J. W. Ferree, pastor. The pastor is giving fine leadership in Christian education. They have a nice group of young people at both churches. Conversions, 1; Accessions, 10.

Maxton: O. M. Graham, pastor. This church is doing well, and with a resident pastor will do much better. There is an increase in their claims this year over the past few years.

Mt. Zion and Philadelphia: E. A. Williams, pastor. This charge has had a new birth under the leadership of Brother Williams. Philadelphia Church has been finished and they are doing nicely. Conversions, 12; Accessions, 12.

Rowland and Salem: J. F. Sawyer, pastor. This pastor and people are getting along nicely. Conversions, 10; Accessions, 10.

Red Springs: Miles Murphy, Jr., pastor. Under the leadership of Brother Murphy this church has taken on new life. They have an excellent program of Christian education. The payment of claims increased over the past few years.

Sanford Circuit: A. H. Douglas, pastor. This charge is doing fair. Mt. Olive is building a new church and is very hopeful of completing the building this year. Conversions, 17; Accessions, 13.

Wilmington: J. H. Shiver, pastor. This group has done well under the leadership of Brother Shiver. They will have to get a place to worship as June 30th is the deadline for their use of the present building. We had hoped to begin building a church before this, but help from the Conference was temporarily withdrawn and that has helped to slow us up a bit in our building plans.

Laurinburg Circuit: Leroy Worth, pastor. Brother Worth is a new man in our Conference and is doing a wonderful job. A student at Livingstone College, he is making an excellent pastor. Conversions, 8; Accessions, 5.

Summary

Significant gains have been made in all our work. We have no barren charges. The district was at the very bottom six years ago; in fact, I am the first resident superintendent in nine years. We have built four churches, relocated one, and are in the

process of building two more. This gives the Laurinburg District some good churches and increases in property value. There is also in the making a new parsonage at Lumberton. The pastors and the people of the Laurinburg District are in a good spirit and within the next few years there will be a marked increase in the work of the district. The district led the Conference in conversions and accessions for the past two years and we hope we are leading this year.

I must express my profound gratitude for the faithful service that has been rendered by both ministers, their wives, and the laymen of the district. They have been wonderful. We have had more destructive storms and hurricanes in the past six years than this section has experienced in 30 years and yet the people have shared with the work out of their little in a great way, they have proven to be friends of God. Such loyalty will always serve as a memorial to them. We express our sincere appreciation to all who did so much to make the work on the district a success. Bishop Love, I want to thank you for your wise counsel and brotherly fellowship. I also want to thank Brother Phelps for his wise counsel and fatherly advice. He has been a brother beloved in all my struggles. Again both ministers and laymen have been wonderful.

Recommendations

1. The salary of the district superintendent be increased to \$5,000.00.
2. There are 30 places in this district where new work should be developed. There will have to be ways and means provided by the Conference in order for this much-needed expansion to become a reality.

Five of these new possibilities have been presented to the General Board of Missions, to be accepted as General Advance Specials. A copy of this recommendation has been put into the hands of the bishop and a copy will be placed in the hands of my successor.

Now the God of Peace, that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work to do His will, working in you that which is well-pleasing in His sight, through Jesus Christ; to whom be glory forever and ever. Amen.

REPORT OF WESTERN DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Brothers of the North Carolina Conference, Lay Members, Fraternal Delegates and Friends:

It is with deep humility, insurmountable love and devotion for the great Cause and church which I serve that I stand before you this day and make this my third report to the Annual Conference.

This report constitutes the inspirations, devoted and untiring efforts, and, above all, the hard work and unselfish labor of numerous church members and loyal ministers throughout the Western District. To these dear people whom I have served this year, I wish to express my profound gratitude and sincere appreciation for the splendid work they have done to make this report possible.

My special appreciation and recognition go to many of the ministers on the Western District, whom I shall not name personally, who worked with extreme devotion and stick-to-itiveness to achieve many of the goals set forth by the district. For your ideas and contributions, I feel indebted to pay this special recognition for the outstanding work you have done far beyond your pastoral duties. It has been most satisfying and rewarding to have the intense interest, support, and cooperation of the entire Western District. To you, I am extremely grateful.

Lay Activities

In most of our churches we are carrying on a very successful program of lay activities. However, on the district level, due to the illness of our district lay leader, our program has almost disappeared. This is a phase of our district program with which we are most concerned. With the coming of a new year, we are planning to put special emphasis on the vital work of lay activities on the district level. Our goal is to have in each church a chartered Methodist Men's Group and a strong Woman's Society of Christian Service.

Education

In most of our churches there has been an energetic Commission on Education. Most of our churches have large Sunday schools, a few churches have Boy Scout and Girl Scout groups, and week-day activities for children. Even though we have much for which to be thankful, educationally, we have not lost sight of the tremendous improvement needed in our district.

For two years in succession we have conducted a Christian Workers' School, which has been most successful. The school is in session for a full week. During this time, courses are taught on phases of education in the local church. Last year we added a course that was designed to help accepted supply ministers of the district. We feel that much benefit was derived from it. All of the personnel were certified in the course that they conducted.

Missions

Brother J. T. Jones, who is district missionary secretary, has tried to inspire our people to be missionary-minded. He has given many inspirational talks at our meetings.

Our Woman's Society of Christian Service, on the district and local level, has done much to acquaint people regarding their personal obligations to missions.

In the early fall of the conference year, a workshop on "Temperance" was conducted by Brother A. E. Robinson, our district secretary of Temperance. Many attended and were benefited by being there.

District Meeting

We have had five district meetings this year and each one was largely attended. Our District Conference was held at Gastonia, at which time the pastors reported over \$2,000 on various claims.

One of the highlights of our year's meeting on the district level was the coming of our beloved bishop to Lawndale, to the Philadelphia Church. There he and Mrs. Love gave a very interesting summary of their visit and tour of Africa. Everyone was elated to have our bishop and Mrs. Love with us. An offering of \$25.00 was presented to them as a donation for missionary work in Africa. A banquet was given in their honor at this meeting.

Special Cultivation

After returning from the special session of the Annual Conference in Laurinburg, we found ourselves faced with an additional obligation of raising \$5,000 for Special Cultivation.

Many of our pastors were reluctant to even try, but after having a special meeting for the purpose of chartering our course, most of us went forward knowing that "all things are possible, if we only believe." With this motivation we decided to put on a special effort in the form of a contest, in which only half of the churches participated. This contest terminated just before our Bennett College Roll Call, at which we counted over \$1800 raised throughout various churches on Conference Cultivation. As we come to Conference this day, the Western District is happy to say, though we did not reach our goal, our report for Conference Cultivation exceeds \$3,000.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service

Our Woman's Society of Christian Service is well organized. The district is divided into zones and each zone has its meeting each fifth Sunday. These loyal and devoted women on the Western District have done such a marvelous job throughout the years that success to them is nothing less than their very best.

This year Mrs. Margaret London, who gave herself and unflinching services as president of the district was replaced by Mrs. Jettie Morrison.

Building Program

There are several building projects on the district. Among these are plans for a new parsonage for the Mooresville Circuit; a real plan for a district parsonage that we hope will materialize this year; a new church building at Mott's Grove Camp Ground; plus many other building projects which are pending.

We are very happy to report that the Berry Temple parsonage in Asheville is now one hundred percent complete, including building, lot, and other necessities. The cost of this parsonage ran up to \$20,000. I do not hesitate to say that this parsonage is one of the best in the Central Jurisdiction. We invite anyone who comes to Asheville to go by and observe this beautiful structure.

Delegates to Methodist Conferences

Last summer after the Annual Conference the district raised over \$700.00 to send ministers and laymen to various meetings throughout the church. There were two meetings in Texas at which we were represented, and one in Kansas. We gave six scholarships to young people to attend the youth assembly; we were represented in the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference at Lake Junaluska, North Carolina, on Social and Economic Relations, and several others, on which I will not take time to elaborate.

Bishop's Visit

We are much indebted to Bishop and Mrs. Love for giving of their busy schedule to tour the churches of the Western District. In less than three days the bishop made seven appearances and the final appearance was at the Morningside High School at a chapel service in Statesville, North Carolina. Bishop Love gave a powerful address, so much so that he was asked to come back to give the commencement address. On his way to the East Tennessee Conference, our beloved bishop stopped over for a few minutes to give this very special address. Again, the audience was lifted, as Bishop Love gave this address out of his vast experiences.

Reclamation of Property

This year we are happy to report a valuable piece of property that has been reclaimed and returned to the Methodist Church. By deed dated January 1, 1879, on Clay E. Tucker and wife, Mary Tucker, executed warranty deed with the granting clause as follows: "To Wesley Abernathy, Henry Brevard, Milton Monday, Alexander McLean, Trustees of Tucker's Camp Ground, a tract of land in Lincoln County, North Carolina."

By the habendum clause which, of course follows, the description, the following states: "And said C. E. Tucker and wife, Mary E. Tucker, for the consideration above written to agree to a warrant and defend the aforesaid premises to the trustees of the Methodist Church and their successors, against claim and entry to all persons whatsoever."

Through the determined efforts of Lawyer Erwin of Winston-Salem, North Carolina, this property was returned to the Methodist Church. It has been in private custody for thirty years."

We have, at present, four abandoned churches on the Western District. We are ready to give information to the Conference Board of Trustees so that they can make dispositions concerning the same.

Finance

Even though we have raised over \$2,000 on Conference Cultivation, we find that the total amount does not exceed that of last year's report. Consequently, many of the other claims were cut short because of this special cultivation.

I regret to say that we have fallen short on collections for insurance. We feel that this Conference should re-emphasize the importance of each pastor making himself personally responsible for the collection of this insurance.

The Reserve Pension Fund is still lagging on our district. It is remarkable to learn that it will be possible for us to enter the Reserve Pension plan this year, knowing the indifference of many of our ministers toward this plan.

Our Advance Fund was also badly crippled because of the special cultivation that was raised. However, there is a wonderful consolation in knowing that the Bennett College drive has gone beyond the amount that we have raised, normally, and far beyond the regular asking for Bennett College.

Evangelism

As I look over our reports, our pastors have done a marvelous job in evangelism. Even though we were handicapped for several weeks by inclement weather, our report for members on professional faith exceeds that of last year.

The work of the district superintendent of the Western District is hard, but rewarding, being supported by a group of ministers who are cooperative; and being motivated by the spirit of the Great Commission, I think not of self, but the ultimate success of the program of the Methodist Church. As we work and toil together to promote supreme goodness in this world and build temples for Christ, may we ever remember that our creations are not just to serve ourselves, but to serve mankind. Again, it is with a deep sense of humility that I submit this my third report to the North Carolina Annual Conference.

REPORT OF THE WINSTON DISTRICT

Bishop Love, fellow ministers, laymen and visiting friends of the North Carolina Conference:

As I come to make my third annual report of duties performed and progress made on the Winston District, I am deeply conscious of my indebtedness to Almighty God, for health and strength and his guiding presence which have been ours this year. The Lord has been good to us and it is with a feeling of deep gratitude that I stand before you to make this report.

Under your leadership, Bishop Love, and with the wholehearted cooperation of ministers and laymen I am able to take pride in this my third annual report of the Winston District.

Shortly after the adjournment of the one hundred and first session of our Annual Conference, ministers and laymen of every charge on our district were called together at Saint Home Methodist Church, Winston-Salem. All charges were well represented. The purpose of the meeting was to lift up the goal of stewardship in general, and its relationship to our conference benevolence and evangelism through the use of our Commission on Membership and Evangelism and the Board of Education.

In our first quarterly conferences a follow-up of our challenging meeting was pursued with emphasis on the opportunities and responsibilities of the Commission on Membership and Evangelism and the Church School, under the direction of the Board of Education. The results were that we set as our goal the bringing in of four hundred-seventeen new members. As a result two hundred ninety-three have been

received on profession of faith. We have reason to believe that in the future greater success will be achieved through the working interest of our local commissions.

The District Board of Education, under the direction of its chairman, Rev. Glenn A. Brooks, has been active in its planning and training of workers on the local church level. In spite of interrupted schedules of meetings due to the severe winter weather, the Board was able to follow through on a district-wide Workers' Conference held at saint Andrews in April. Plans were perfected for our District Youth Institute to be held June 20. This institute will also be held at Saint Andrews, of which the Rev. J. W. Gwyn is pastor.

Our District Conference, held at Boone Mill, Virginia, May 21, was a memorable one-day session. It was well attended by both laymen and ministers. Highlights of the program of the church were presented by the lay leader of the various organizations of the district. We are grateful to the pastor, Rev. Buford Miller, and his good people for the fine entertainment.

Time being of an essence, I am compelled to refrain from speaking of individual accomplishments. However, I wish you to know that I can say in all sincerity that every minister on the district has done a commendable job under the varying circumstances. We have on the Winston District one of the finest teams of workmen in the field of kingdom-building to be found anywhere in our great church.

I am happy to report again, as I did last year, that the physical plants of our churches (most of them) are in good condition; however, considerable improvements have been made at an approximate cost of twenty-nine thousand dollars, e. g., Brooks Memorial, heating system; St. Marks, extensive repairs and decorations; Asheboro, lavatory facilities; Stoneville, extensive repairs and decorations; Liberty Grove, heating system and remodeling; Elkin, ten thousand dollar educational and overflow addition; and many other minor repairs.

Misfortune visited our Madison Charge and on November 29th the St. Stephens Church suffered a total loss by fire. Since that time, by sacrificial giving, hard work and the help of friends, they have been able, under the leadership of Pastor H. H. Smith, to begin a beautiful modern building with educational facilities that will cost \$36,000. They are in urgent need of substantial help from our conference.

The Rev. L. M. Mayfield has magnificently led the St. Paul congregation in raising funds to the stage where they are breaking ground for a beautiful and spacious modern church plant that will cost \$180,000.

Again, may I say that every minister has done a superb job according to the circumstances under which he labored. The officials, along with the ministers, are to be commended. I have enjoyed immensely the fine spirit of cooperation that has been manifested this year in the work of kingdom-building.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Ministers' Wives have, as always, played a unique role in the success attained on the district. Their untiring devotion in the area of stewardship expressed in both benevolences and evangelism has had a telling effect in the success of the total program of the district.

My heartfelt thanks to all who contributed to the success of the Winston District.

XIV HISTORICAL VIEW

From the organization of Methodism in America, the work in North Carolina was continued in Virginia and afterwards in the Virginia and South Carolina Conference. In the year 1836, the General Conference set up in North Carolina. Its first session opened as a part of the Virginia Conference, but when it adjourned, there were two Conferences.

Facts from the first ninety sessions are gleaned from the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. The Conference Journal for those years, which is now in custody of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

At the Conference of December 4, 1844, there were 10,495 white members and 3,100 colored. Without consulting the wisdom of the latter, nearly the whole membership became a part of a new church, organized in May, 1845, and called the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Some of the colored members entered the A.M.E. Church, some the Colored M.E. Church of America, but thousands turned gladly to the bosom of the old Methodist Episcopal Church as it returned to the State after the Civil War.

Between the years 1844, when the Church was separated over the slave question, and in 1865, when at the close of the War, the M.E. Church returned to shepherd its scattering flock in North Carolina, there was no session of the North Carolina Conference.

From the North Carolina Conference, the Blue Ridge was formed with twelve preachers, 2,839 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices.
