The Pioneer Department - The age of decision - Preson P. Phillips

The Pioneer Department - formerly called the Intermediate Department of the Sunday School is for children between ages of 12 and 14 usually to 7th to 9th grades in public schools. Until recently the superintendent of this department was Mrs. Helen Vail - but it is not in the very capable hands of Gurney R. Blanchard - who also sings tenor in the church choir and has been on the Session of the Church for one year now.

Gurney moved from Newport News, Virginia to Durham in 1946 and has lived at 904 Monmouth Avenue since October of that year with his wife Betty and children - now three - Roger, Donald and Jane. While in Newport News, Gurney was employed in the drafting office of the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company - and he was educated in the public schools of that city and at the school that is operated by this company. He moved to Durham to go in the insurance business with his Uncle - Preson P. Phillips, and is now secretary of the Phillips Insurance Agency, Inc.

Gurney was raised in the Methodist Church - but when he moved to Durham, he transferred his membership to Trinity Ave. He started singing in the choir, was soon elected a Deacon and served as treasurer of the Church for several years, until he was elected an Elder.

The Pioneer Department - in addition to having Gurney as Superintendent - in fortunate to have a splended corp of consecrated teachers. Mrs. H. B. Christie is serving as secretary of the department, and is doing a good job. Teachers in the department now include Miss Peggy Lucas, Miss Connie Castle, Mrs. Anne Noble and Mrs. Robert Byrd. The department has three class rooms in the New Sunday School Bullding, but the department has grown enough so that they must now use a class room in the basement of the Church building.

Your General Superintendent's wish for this department would be that each year at least one member of the department will decide to give his or her life for Mission work - either home or foreign; and that one person will decide to give his or her life full time to the Lord for preaching or as a Director of Religious Education. There fields need workers so much - and in this department is the time that this decision should be made.

Let our entire Church pray daily for the Lord's guidance in the lives of these young people - and that he will strengthen the teachers and officers of the department that they may help them find his will.

News from the Departments - Grace Shaw

Nursery - Mrs. Rambeau reports that there are about twelve members on the roll at present. The average attendance his been faily good during this month. The children enjoyed singing, and listening to stories. They also had lots of fun playing with the dolls and doll carriages that were donated to the department.

Beginners - The themefor the month of February is "Our Church Needs Many Helpers". To get acquainted with their minister, Mr. Bennett waw invited to visit with the children - after a short introduction, Mr. Bennett accompanied the class and the teachers to the Church sanctuary - the cross over the organ was lighted, the use of the baptismal fout was explained, the children sang Jesus Loves Me" and Mr. Bennett had a short prayer. The children were impressed with the new carpet. On another Sunday Mr. Carden, our Sexton, spoke to the class and all went on a tour of the furnace rooms - he explained his many duties in keeping the Church warm in winter and clean at all times. The children brought dust cloths for Mr. Carden and furniture polish also. On next Sunday, we will have Mr. Phillips visit the class - also Mrs. Skillen who will present her duties as Church Organist.

Primary - The Primary Department has just finished reading the bood, "Mpengo of the Congo" which has made everyone feel that he has been on a visit to the "Hidden Village" and the people who live there. Interest has been so keen, that the children are making a display in their assembly room of some of the things learned about from the book. Each class is making a contribution to the display. The first grade is working on a house typical of the Congo region. The second grade is making palm trees and banana trees, while the third grade is making pottery, dolls, drums etc. that are characteristic of the jungle life. The teachers feel that the children have learned to better understand our friends who live so far away and have developed a good feeling of wanting to share with and help those who are so eager to learn of our Christian way of life.

Juniors - The "Missions" study unit last month led the Juniors to send a special offering to Board of World Missions Presbyterian Church U.S. for Fictures of Christ to be sent to the Belguim Congo, Africa. One of the overall goals in the religious education of the Junior Department is to "guide the Junior to a knowledge of and faith in Jesus Christ as Redeemer and Lord which will give him the hope of eternal life and will bear fruit in Christlike living". The study this month has been based on this overall goal and is called "what it means to be a Christian". This study needs the interest and support of the home behind it, so parents are urged to follow each week with your Junior, the cooperative study and discussion paragraph in the Junior quarterly titled, "Something to do with your Parents". The quarterly message to Parents page too, cannot only enrich your own spiritual life, but gives suggestions for YOU to guide the spiritual growth of your child. The home and Church school working together these months can make this unit full of meaning for our Juniors as we relate it to their own lives and guide them in finding ways in which boys and girls may express the Christian Spirit in everyday living.

THE ELECTION OF OFFICERS for the

THE ELECTION OF OFFICERS for the next term is about to take place. As you know, officers are elected for a term of three years. They are then eligible for re-election for another three year period. At the end of this time, they must take one year as inactive before being eligible once again. This is called the rotary system, and has proved a good one in the various churches that have used it. The officers who go off the boards, however, remain officers, only on an inactive status.

The congregation will nominate 10 men for elders this Sunday, March 1st. From this number, 5 will be elected next Sunday. An identical procedure will be followed on the next two Sundays for the deacons. They will be ordained(those who are becoming officers for the first time) and installed(those who have been officers before), on the first Sunday in April, Easter Sunday, April 5th.

To be an officer in the Church of Jesus Christ is not to be thought of as an honor. It is to be thought of as a divine obligation. It is in no way an honorary position. It is rather a place of special service, absolutely requiring utmost sincerety of faith in Jesus Christ and a humble desire to serve His Kingdom. It is never to be thought of as a social position, but a divine calling.

God will guide us in the selection of the right men for the right place if we call on him and depend upon him to lead us to men of strong character and Christian spirit.

God forbid that we should enter into our choice of his Church's leaders lightly or thoughtlessly. We should not vote for a man only because he is our friend, but because he is a man of faith.

March 8th is CHURCH LOYALTY DAY... by that time we hope to have all our pledges in for the completion of our campaign to support the current expenses and the benevolences of the Church. We all want to be present at Church on that Sunday. What does it mean to be loyal to your Church?

- 1. Attend its services of common worship. Do you make a real effort to bring the children systematically to Sunday Church School? Do you come and stay yourself? Dou you attend the Mid-Week Service for Worship and study?
- 2. Participate in the activities... The Women of the Church, the class activities, the social functions.
- 3. Serve when you are called upon to help. And do you volunteer your services? You might help with the music, visit the sick, assist in the nursery, the kitchen, help with the projects of various groups.
 - 4. Witness to your faith in Christ... to the people you see at home and on the job. Do you invite others to come to your Church? Would you be willing to go and get them if they needed a way?
