All Christians cannot be teachers, and yet it is difficult to believe that a person can be a born-again child of God, and not want to teach - Christ definitely told all Christians to help carry the Word of God to all the world - and the more we love the Lord - the harder we will try to do this.

You cannot lead others to Christ unless you know the road yourself. You must be so familiar with the road to salvation that you can point it out to others - and this road is perfectly clear in the Bible - and this is the only place that you can find the necessary directions - the Word of God is a guide book for both Sinner and Christian - and tells us exactly how we can reach that home prepared for us after this short life is over.

The Sunday School is operated for the purpose of preparing you to use this guide book. And so it is important that Children start to Sunday School early and attend regularly - but it is just as important that grown people also attend - because you can never get too old to learn how to live in the Will of God - and it is so important that you be able to help the children prepare themselves for Church membership and for their part in the kingdom.

Jesus Christ did not put the entire responsibility for spreading the Gospel to all the world on the preachers - he quite definitely indicates that he expects all of his children to help in this great tasks it is entirely too large for just a few people to do the work. If you are to help with this task - you must prepare yourself so that you can tell others about Jesus and what his life and death means to sinners.

Preparation means Bible Study - and the best place to learn to study your Bible is in the Sunday School. And so you should attend reqularly with your children - you should study your Bible daily and help them to study theirs - you should spend much time in prayer - you should maintain a Family Altar so that others will know that you leve God - and when you have the opportunity you should attend teacher training classes - worker's conferences - and special classes that will enable you to bring sinners to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ.
