

Tresport a ndidate for the inistry under the care of Granville Trespytery is James Ronald Lloyd, the son of Mrs. Swannanoa Lloyd and the late James Green Carson Lloyd. James was born in Durham on December 22, 1031. Soon afterwards, he began attending the Church school and s rvices of Trinity Avenue. James has served in many loadership capacities in our Church School and youth fellowships. Furing 1048-51 James served as vice-president, president, and a commission ch irman on the Granville Presbytery's Youth Fellowship Council and as a member of Synod's Youth Council. In the summer of 1052 James was the Director of Youth York at Trinity avenue. He also has enjoyed summer counsellor experiences at our Fresbytery's Fioneer care. During his three years at Duke University James has been an active and interested participant in the Duke Lestminster Fellowship and Kappa Chi pre-ministerial fraternity.

School days for James began at E. K. Powe Elementary and Junior High School in 1938. In the fifth grade he began studying the violoncello and has continued this activity as a favorite interest. Other favorite activities have been the Chorus, the band, literary socities, dramatics, and student council work. Thile in the ninth grade, James began of ying the 'cello in the N. C. All-State Orchestra and the Duke Symphony.

Visitation programs, summer conferences, and Presbytery rallies h ve offered James fine opportunities for Christian Fellowship and growth in religious experience. Various Church conferences which have been high-lights in his experiences have been those at Peace College, Camp New Hone, Flora MacDonald College, Contreat, and the Fourth Cuadrennial Youth Convention in 1951 at Auburn, Ala. James claims as very influential in his life work decision the lives of the cinisters of Trinity Avenue, as well as many other persons who serve God and live in the knowledge, the fellowship, and the joy of our lord. James is planning to enter Union Theological Seminary in Richmond, Virginia in September, 1054.

Our prayers, love, and wishes go with him as he prepares for the Gospel Ministry.

An analysis of human nature leads me to believe that many of us are like this old dog in our habits. The tragedy is that far too often we settle down in the same old "groove" of live looking at the same old problems in the same old way, having only rearranged our prejudices for all our troubles.

The mind of the Christian is not static but to more closely conform his opinions, his habits, and his life to the pioneering life of Jesus Christ.
