

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FOREWORD

THE PURPOSE OF THE BOOK

This book is planned for primary superintendents. It is the first of a series of planbooks, or guides, for use in a primary department in which the Graded Primary Lessons are taught. By Graded Primary Lessons are meant the primary lessons of the International Course of Graded Lessons. The primary lessons of this course include first, second, and third year lessons. (See chart of the Graded Lessons of the International Course in the appendix.)

To superintend a class session in a department in which these lessons are taught it is necessary for the superintendent to know the lessons and memory verse or verses to be taught in each grade and the requisites necessary for teaching. To study three textbooks to extract this knowledge requires both time and effort. To conserve this time and effort by setting forth in brief and concise form such information as is needed by the superintendent is the purpose of this book.

THE PLAN OF THE BOOK

The lesson detail of the lessons in the Primary Teacher's Text Books is assembled by months and by years or grades. Under each month, beginning with October, there is given, first, the lesson detail of the First Year Lessons for the month; next, the lesson detail of the Second Year Lessons; and, last, the detail of the Third Year Lessons for the month.

Under each lesson will be found the lesson title, the Bible passage or lesson material, the memory verse, the aim or purpose of the lesson, the titles and sources of pictures for lesson illustration, directions for the pupil's handwork, and if there is a Correlated Lesson, the lesson or Bible verses given for memorization.

Lessons with which missionary instruction may be given in connection with the lesson teaching, through the offering service or as a special feature of the program, are starred.

THE CONTEXT OF THE BOOK

In most primary departments the superintendent conducts the different exercises of the program, guides the class teachers, and supervises their work, with view to helping them accomplish the best results through their teaching.

The most acceptable program or order of exercises for a primary department is one that has for its thought or theme some truth that relates to and supplements or strengthens the lesson teaching. ample, when the theme of the first year lessons is the Protecting Care of God, the Bible responses and songs used for the worship present the same thought. When the second or third year lessons tell of Jesus, the Bible responses and songs used for opening, offering, and closing exercises supplement the lessons. it is evident that to arrange a program or order of exercises for a given Sunday or series of Sundays, a knowledge of lesson titles, memory verses, and purpose of the lessons is necessary. This book gives this knowledge in a form for ready reference. (For a year of primary programs see Book II of this Series.)

Pictures are among the most valuable accessories of the primary department. By the correct use of the right picture the child gains knowledge and a perception of truth, for every picture has some message or

truth to convey. Pictures that will be found helpful in illustrating the lessons are listed that superintendents may know what pictures are available for the different lessons, may guide teachers in the use of pictures, and may stimulate interest in picture work by placing selected pictures about the room—on the wall, blackboard, or screen—and by making use of pictures in conducting reviews and story-telling periods.

The handwork suggestions for each lesson are given that the superintendent may understand the work to be done and the preparation that needs to be made for it, and may know what and how well the work is being carried out by the teachers and with what benefit to the pupils.

It is necessary also for the superintendent to know when the correlated lessons occur and what the lessons are, that the extra memorization may be urged upon the pupils and be reviewed and incorporated in the exercises of the department, and therefore such information is given.

THE USE OF THE BOOK

The book is designed for use week by week. By turning to it each week the superintendent will be able to tell almost at a glance what truth or form of teaching should be emphasized in the program the next Sunday, which pictures are appropriate for the decoration of the room and for the use of class teachers, and what models may be used to further illustrate the lessons.

The book is designed also for use in teachers' meetings. By studying it not only week by week for its program suggestions, but also month by month in advance, it will be possible to anticipate the needs of the

class teachers and to acquaint them with the character of the work that is coming and the preparations to be made for it. To help the teachers to look ahead and to understand the preparations they are to make for handwork, story-telling, correlated-lesson teaching, or special activities at the Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter seasons is a form of teacher-training.

The superintendent will find it helpful if one copy of the book may be kept at home for use in preparing programs and making necessary notes and another copy at Sunday school for ready reference in directing class work and conducting teachers' meetings. The second copy, if not the first, should be a part of the equipment required for the department and be provided by the school.

In the use of the book it will be found that some statements and explanations of themes and lesson aims or purposes are more briefly stated than in the textbooks. Similarly, there are a few changes in the handwork suggestions.

For the use of class teachers, and more especially for first-year teachers, more pictures are listed under some lessons than are listed in the textbooks. Under some lessons more pictures are given than one teacher will need to use. When they are available, a number of pictures are given under each lesson, that teachers may have pictures from which to choose and that there may be pictures for use in a number of classes.

The differences that will be noted in this book are not contradictory to any of the statements, explanations, or work given in the textbooks. The book is in agreement with the textbooks in all of its detail, for otherwise it would be of no value or use to those for whom it has been prepared.

IMPORTANT STATEMENTS AND ADDITIONAL EXPLANATIONS

While the lesson detail needed by the superintendent to supervise the primary department and to direct the work of the class teachers has been extracted from the primary textbooks and gathered together in this book, it must not be supposed that the superintendent does not need to be familiar with the text books or to make use of them. The textbooks contain help and suggestions for the superintendent as well as for the class teacher, and there is much valuable material contained in the textbooks not included in this book, for example, the editorial statements, the forewords, and the appendices of the textbooks.

In the forewords are to be found explanations of the graded lessons as a course, explanations relating to the construction and use of the primary lessons, discussions of superintendents' and class teachers' problems, methods of introducing the graded primary lessons into an ungraded primary department, program suggestions, and answers to the many questions class teachers ask or should be led to ask at the beginning of each new Sunday school year. It is important at this time for the superintendent to read the forewords.

Besides the foreword in part one of each primary textbook there are prefaces in parts two, three and four. These prefaces contain instructions or call attention to special features in the textbooks or lessons. At the beginning of each quarter it is advisable for the superintendent to read the prefaces in the textbooks that are to be used during the quarter.

Besides the prefaces there are the appendices, and


in each textbook material for use in teacher-training classes. For example, in the first year textbooks the quotations at the head of chapters or themes have been chosen from the point of view of child study. The explanations of the themes and of the lessons have been written for the purpose of helping superintendent and teachers to come to a better understanding of the characteristics and needs of childhood. A study of these quotations and explanatory notes and a reading of the books listed in the appendix of each first year textbook would constitute a course in child study. Similarly a study of the quotations and explanations of themes and lessons in the second and third year textbooks and a reading of the books recommended would constitute a course in principles and in methods of teaching. The superintendent desiring to pursue a teacher-training course, or planning to institute and carry on a teacher-training class with primary class teachers as students, will find much material ready for use in the textbooks. This material could not be included in this book.

If a teacher-training class of primary class teachers is to be formed, make a study of the first year text-books one year. Read and discuss the quotations, the explanations of themes, and the lesson material. Assign home reading on the lessons, and as a part of each meeting of the class call for reports on the reading and for a discussion of what has been reported or reviewed. For the assignment of home reading see the book lists and suggestions in the appendix of parts one to four of the first year textbooks. Make a similar study of the second year textbooks and then of the third. The result will be teachers trained to teach the lessons of their grades and to teach them not only with

ability, but with an understanding of the primary lessons and work as a whole.

The appendices of the different textbooks are the superintendent's source book. They contain missionary and temperance suggestions, promotion exercises, songs for use with different lessons and on special occasions, and book lists. See the appendix in this book for "Special Features Contained in the Appendices of the Primary Textbooks."

In the lesson detail under different lessons the use of a model or of models is recommended. Not all primary departments are or may be equipped with models. When this is the case the drawings that have been made for this textbook may be used. The drawings in half-tone will give correct ideas of the complete or real model. For drawings in outline that may be copied on the blackboard or on paper see the Appendix. See the Appendix also for a chart of the graded lessons and for the prices of the Primary Teacher's Textbooks, the Folders for the pupils, and the Picture Sets referred to in this book.

OCTOBER FIRST YEAR

AIM FOR THE YEAR

To show forth God's power, love, and care, and to awaken within the child responsive love, trust, and obedience.

THEME I

GOD THE CREATOR AND FATHER

To lead the little child to think, to question about what he sees, to wonder at what he is told, and then to know that it is God who is his heavenly Father who has created the heavens and the earth, is the purpose of the lessons under this theme.

LESSON 1. GOD THE CREATOR OF ALL THINGS.

The aim or purpose of this lesson is that of directing the thoughts of the pupil to the things that may be clearly seen in the world of nature, and of teaching him that all things have been created by the power and might of God.

Lesson Material.—Genesis 1:1 to 2:3; Psalm 33: 6-9.

MEMORY VERSE.—In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Genesis 1:1.

LESSON 2. GOD THE FATHER OF ALL.*

To lift the thoughts of the little child to God and say, "It is he who is your heavenly Father," is the aim of this lesson.

^{*}With lessons that are starred missionary instruction may be given, if desired. With some lessons this instruction may be made a part of the lesson teaching; with other lessons it will need to be supplementary to the teaching and be given in connection with the offering service or as a special feature of the program. When made a part of the offering service or a special feature of the program it will be found expedient with some lessons to use them as a preparation for missionary teaching and to give this teaching not on the day the lessons are taught, but the next Sunday. The character of the lessons will determine the kind of instruction that is appropriate and its place on the program.

THEME II

LESSON 3. THE GIFT OF WATER.

To teach about the gift of water and lead the child to recognize God's power and loving care in bestowing this gift is the aim of this lesson.

Lesson Material.—Exodus 15: 22, 27; Psalms 104: 10-14; 147: 7-9; Isaiah 41: 18; 43: 20b.

Memory Verse.—Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father. James 1:17a.

SECOND YEAR

AIM FOR THE YEAR

To build upon the teachings of the first year (1) by showing ways in which children may express their love, trust, and obedience; (2) by showing Jesus, the Saviour, in his love and work for men; and (3) by showing how helpers of Jesus and others learn to do God's will.

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THEME I

THE RIGHT USE OF GOD'S BOOK, GOD'S HOUSE, AND GOD'S DAY

The lessons of this theme aim to secure the performance on the part of the pupil of certain right acts which are possible for him to perform, which are a natural response to the feeling of love for God which the lessons for the first year roused within him, and which will help him use God's Book, God's house, and God's day in the way he should, and have regard and reverence for them.

LESSON I. A LOST BOOK FOUND.

The aim of this lesson is to teach that the Bible is one of God's ways of speaking to people, and to lead to a more reverent regard for and handling of the Bible by the child that he may give a more willing and joyous obedience to the Bible precepts and laws that he has learned or will learn from time to time.

Lesson Material.—2 Kings 22:8, 10-13, 18-20; 23:1-3.

Memory Verse.—Be ye doers of the word. James 1:22.

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LESSON 2. A King and His People Caring for God's House.

The purpose of this lesson is to teach that the people about whom the story tells gave gladly and freely for their church and that each was happy in doing his part to make the temple a beautiful place. The responses hoped for on the part of the child are a more orderly behavior inside the church building when passing in and out; a better care of church and Sunday school furniture and property; a sense of responsibility and joy in taking part in the exercises of the department and in contributing to the offerings.

Lesson Material.—2 Kings 12:4-15; 2 Chronicles 24:4-14.

MEMORY VERSE.—Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise. Psalm 100: 4.

The purpose of this lesson is to teach the right use of God's day, and to arouse the desire of the child to attend church and Sunday school regularly and to make God's day a blessed day by giving joy and help to others.

Lesson Material.—Genesis 2:2, 3; Exodus 20:8; 31:12, 13; Psalms 100; 118:24.

Memory Verses.—Remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy. Exodus 20:8. This is the day which the Lord hath made; we will rejoice and be glad in it. Psalm 118:24.

THEME II

PRAYER AND PRAISE

To begin to instruct the child concerning those for whom he may pray, the times and places for prayer, the different kinds of prayer, and the answers God sends, is the purpose of the lessons of this theme. LESSON 4. Praying for a Friend.

The purpose of this lesson is to teach that we should "pray one for another," and that one another means members of our households, people we know outside the family, and members of that one big family of world-children who have all one Father, who is God.

Lesson Material.—Acts 12:3-17.

MEMORY VERSE.—Pray one for another. James 5: 16.

PICTURES FOR LESSON ILLUSTRATION.

Pictures of places in different countries and of grown people and children living in or near these places. See post cards, photographs, story books, and magazines published by the Women's Home, and Foreign Mission Boards of the different denominations, and by the Missionary Education Movement. See also the children's magazine Everyland.

Objects for Use of Class Teachers and Pupils.

Flags of different nations or any curio that will stimulate the interest of the pupils in children of other countries and arouse a desire to remember them in prayer.

Handwork suggestions are omitted for this lesson that time may be secured for teaching the words of the prayer on page five in the folder of Story 4.

THIRD YEAR

AIM FOR THE YEAR

To build upon the work of the first and second years

by telling (1) about people who chose to do, God's will; (2) how Jesus by his life and words, death and resurrection, revealed the Father's love and will for us; (3) such stories as will make a strong appeal to the child and arouse within him a desire to choose and to do that which God requires of him.

THEME I

SEEKING TO KNOW AND TO DO GOD'S WILL

The purpose of this theme is to further extend the child's understanding of what it means to be obedient to God and to lead him to render the obedience of which he is capable.

LESSON I. A SHEPHERD BOY AND A GIANT.

The aim of this lesson is to teach the child that he may turn to God at all times and for all things, and to lead him to so turn that he may feel his dependence upon God and be helped to form the habit of "seeking to know and do God's will."

Lesson Material.—1 Samuel, chapter 17.

Memory Verse.—I will fear no evil; for thou art with me. Psalm 23:4.



A second truth is that the child himself has a part to fulfill in learning and in being good. A third truth is that one should willingly and cheerfully give up one's own way when it is

not God's way for one. To teach and impress the first and third truths is the purpose of this lesson. The truth that the child himself must put forth effort is taught, but not so directly as by other lessons of the theme and course.

LESSON 18. A LONELY HIDING PLACE.

So many children are timid and afraid when left alone or called upon to act for themselves that one of the needs of childhood is to know about God's power to protect in lonely places and to help in times of trouble. To meet this need is the aim of this lesson.

Lesson Material.—1 Kings 17: 1-6.

Memory Verse.—What time I am afraid, I will put my trust in thee. Psalm 56:3.



To give this knowledge to the child and to lead him to trust God has been the aim of Lessons 18 to 20. To repeat the teachings of these lessons and impress their truths through the memory verse is the purpose of this lesson.

The aim of the story is to add to the child's sense of wonder at the power of Jesus to help, and to his appreciation of the readiness and quickness with which Jesus always responded to the call or need of those who came or sent for him.

It is in the feeling of wonder and awe that reverence has its birth. The knowledge of what Jesus had power to do strengthens belief. The example of Jesus and his readiness to help are spurs to action and to deeds of kindness and mercy.

LESSON MATERIAL.—John 4:46-53.

Memory Verse.—The man believed the word that Jesus spake unto him, and he went his way. John 4:50.

THEME VI

JESUS CHOOSING HELPERS

As has been stated in the discussion of previous themes, one of the aims of the lessons about Jesus is to inspire the child to deeds and acts of Christian service. Because one method of securing action is by suggestion, the definite purpose of this theme is to give the suggestion to become one of the helpers of Jesus. It seeks to do this through the story of "The Helpers Chosen and Sent Out."

LESSON 20. THE HELPERS CHOSEN AND SENT OUT.

The child of primary age may not rightly understand why he should be one of the followers of Jesus, but it is important for him to try to do as Jesus said and did. To inspire him to make the effort is the aim of this lesson. The lesson is adapted to accomplish its aim through the suggestiveness of its story.

Lesson Material.—Luke 6: 12, 13; Matthew 10: 1-13.

Memory Verse.—Freely ye received, freely give. Matthew 10:8.

To strengthen the desire of the child for service, which the lessons of preceding themes aimed to arouse, and to give direction to this desire, that it may pass over into purposeful action, are the two aims of this theme.

Love is the great energizing power, it is the motive from which we would have the child act, and, therefore, the first lesson of the theme seeks to deepen the love of the child for Christ by telling of the love of Jesus for children. The other lessons of the theme aim to show how love may be expressed and to reinforce the teachings of previous lessons, in which the idea of helpfulness or service was prominent. LESSON 21. JESUS AND THE CHILDREN.*

To reveal the love of Jesus for children is the purpose of this lesson.

Lesson Material.—Matthew 19:13-15; Mark 10: 13, 14, 16; Luke 18:15, 16.

Memory Verse.—Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not. Luke 18:16.

THIRD YEAR

The lesson is preparatory to lessons which occur later in the theme, and which have for their purpose to so tell of the death and resurrection of Jesus that the child who is ready because he knows Jesus as his personal Saviour shall find in him the way unto life.

This knowledge is as vital to the child as it was to the disciples. It made the disciples strong in faith and "inspired teachers and converters of the world." It is necessary to the child if he is to feel the power and presence of Christ in his life and desire to do his will.

MEMORY VERSE.—Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to the whole creation. Mark 16:15.

The memory verses to be reviewed are those of Lessons 11, 12, 22, and 29. Thou shalt call his name Jesus; for it is he that shall save his people from their sins. Matthew 1:21. Behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy which shall be to all the people: for there is born to you this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord. Luke 2:10, 11. The Son of man came to seek and to save that which was lost. Luke 19:10. For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth on him should not perish, but have eternal life. John 3:16.

Lesson Material.—Selected stories and memory verses from Lessons 11 to 28.

THEME IV

THE MESSENGERS OF JESUS DOING GOD'S WILL

There is not a child of primary age, unless it is an exceptional child, who does not realize that often he fails

in being as good as he would like to be or as he knows he should be. That he may be helped to renew his efforts after failure he needs to realize that it is not easy "to be good," but that it is God's will for him to try to be so, and that when he tries God will help him. He needs to know that when he fails and is sorry, God does not look upon him as being "bad," but as his child to love and help and make strong. The child needs also to perceive something of the heroic in effort, that he may be impelled to put forth effort and attain the victory. To meet these special needs of the child is the purpose of this theme.

LESSON 30. Peter the Fisherman.

To tell how it was that Peter became one of the disciples of Jesus and learned to know Jesus as the Son of God is the first purpose of this lesson. A second purpose is to strengthen the child's desire to be one of the followers of Jesus.

The lesson is introductory to those lessons about Peter which are peculiarly adapted to lead the child to recognize by whom strength and power and goodness are given, and to seek the strength, the power, the goodness, he needs to do what is God's will for him.

Lesson Material.—Luke 5: 1-11; Matthew 14:22-33.

Memory Verse.—They left all, and followed him. Luke 5:11.

THEME XII

PLEASING GOD BY RIGHT DOING

The purpose of this theme is that of giving to the child certain ideals of action.

The characters about whom the stories tell are not children, but they teach certain virtues, such as obedience to parents, brotherliness, kindness, forbearance, forgiveness, and other practices possible and desirable for the young child to acquire and follow. The stories present not only ideals of action which are childlike in their essence, but also teach that right doing is pleasing to God. They should help to win the child to a more thoughtful and purposeful performance of those right acts of which he is capable.

LESSON 35. Joseph Obeying His Father.

This lesson is the first of a group of lessons about Joseph. While the lessons resemble chapters or different parts of the same story, each aims to teach a certain truth.

The aim of this lesson is that of teaching obedience to parents.

Lesson Material.—Genesis 37: 1-4, 12-17.

Memory Verse.—Honor thy father and thy mother. Exodus 20: 12a.

The value of this lesson to the child rests in that which Peter and John were able to do by the power of Jesus, and in their willingness to do what they could to help the lame man. The lesson should arouse and stir the child to the helpful acts of Christian service of which he is capable.



THEME X

THE NEEDS OF CHILDREN THE WIDE WORLD OVER

The purpose of this theme is to make definite the teachings of the preceding themes by leading the child to make some response to the desires that are being aroused within him to show love to Jesus. The results to be expected in the life of the child are: (1) an interest in the children of the world upon which the teacher may build for future instruction, (2) a deepening of the child's own love for Jesus, (3) an understanding that all the children of the world are God's children, and that he loves them and wants them to be brought to a knowledge of him.

In seeking this response, the method to be used by the teacher is (1) to give to the pupil a knowledge

of the children of other races and their needs, (2) to suggest something to be done for these people in order that they may hear of Jesus, (3) to direct the child's response.

By the use of this method there is a further development of the instincts of love and sympathy. The deepening of the child's love for others comes through what he does for them, and his love for Jesus is strengthened through what he does for others for the sake of Jesus.

The purpose of this theme is, in these lessons, accomplished by means of stories and instruction about the American Indians, the Eskimos, and the Japanese.

LESSON 35. THE NORTH AMERICAN INDIANS, I.*

The aim of the lesson is to lead the child to think of the little Indian children in their home life, to picture them in their work and play, to feel with them in their joys and sorrows, and to understand their need of Christ.

The aim of the lessons is to strengthen and make purposeful the desire and impulse to love Jesus, be his disciple, and do his will. Incidentally, the lessons teach how the gospel was first preached among the nations and the Christian church established. But the teacher must keep in mind that to teach facts is not the purpose of the lesson.

The purpose of this lesson is (1) to teach that all the children of the world are God's children, and that he loves them and wants them to be brought to a knowledge of him, and (2) to show the child what he may do to give this knowledge to God's children who do not know him.

That the lesson may not fail in its purpose, the child needs not only to be shown what he may do, but also to be helped to do his part. "An impression which simply flows in at the pupil's eyes or ears, and in no way modifies his active life, is an impression gone to waste. It is physiologically incomplete. It leaves no fruits behind it in the way of capacity acquired. Even as mere impression, it fails to produce its proper effect upon the memory, for to remain fully among the acquisitions of this latter faculty it must be wrought into the whole cycle of our operations. Its motor consequences are what clinch it. Some effect due to it in the way of an activity must return to the mind in the form of the sensation of having acted, and connect itself with the impression." †

If the day for teaching this lesson should prove stormy, and a large number of pupils should be absent for this or for some other reason, the lesson should be taught on the following Sunday.

If for some unavoidable condition the lesson must be omitted, the instruction it contains may be given in a series of talks in connection with the offering services of the department. The lesson is one of the most important of the lessons of the year and its truth should be taught, that the child may begin at an early age to understand the world's need and to respond to it.

SECOND YEAR

THEME XI

LEARNING TO DO GOD'S WILL

The aim of this theme is to strengthen the higher self-consciousness of the child by quickening his perception of his relation to God and stimulating him to act in accordance with his better perception of what is God's will for him.

The lessons seek to accomplish their aim by means of stories which present admirable traits of character and ideals of right action. The more conscientious and purposeful choosing of the right, to which the lessons aim to inspire the child, is the natural expression of the love for Christ and the desire to fulfill God's will that the lessons of the preceding themes of the course sought to develop and make strong.

LESSON 40. Moses, the Prince and Shepherd.

The purpose of this lesson is to teach that God can guide to the right and will give the strength necessary for its accomplishment when one puts forth the effort of which one is capable.

Lesson Material.—Exodus 1:7-14, 22; 2: 1-21; 3: 1-12, 17; 4: 1-5; Hebrews 11: 23-25.

MEMORY VERSE.—Certainly I will be with thee. Exodus 3: 12.

In a way a child can understand, they teach that, trusting in the power of God to give the needed strength and help, one should bravely attempt all duties and the fulfilling of all that one believes, or is taught, is the will of God.

LESSON 40. ELIJAH, THE MAN OF GOD.

To teach trust in God and obedience to him is the purpose of this lesson.

THE RIGHT USE OF GOD'S GIFTS

To present concrete examples of certain right things that the child should do to fulfill God's will for him, and to help him understand why he should do these right things, is the purpose of this theme. The lessons of the theme are the three temperance lessons, "The House in Which I Live," "God's Gifts for Food," and "The Story of the Rechabites."

LESSON 46. THE House in Which I Live.

To give the idea that the body, or the house in which we live, is one of God's good gifts and the ideal of strength, beauty, and capability, to which the body may attain, is the aim of this lesson.

Both the idea and the ideal are introductory to specific temperance teaching, for, first, the child must desire a clean, strong, capable body before he can be affected by the knowledge of the harm to the body of the use of alcohol and narcotics.

THEME VI

CHOOSING THE RIGHT

To give to the child stories adapted to make a strong appeal to him "to choose the right," and to present certain lines of conduct which are desirable and right for him, is the purpose of this theme. It completes the aim for the year.

LESSON 47. RETURNING GOOD FOR EVIL.

To return evil for evil is one of the instincts of childhood. To show the child a better way and to teach him that one should overcome evil with good, and that to do this is to be obedient to the will of God, is the purpose of this lesson. The lesson teaches self-control and gives a new vision of conduct and the relationship that one should maintain with others.

LESSON MATERIAL.—2 Kings 6: 18-23.

MEMORY VERSE.—Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good. Romans 12:21.
