## Building up the body to... Tell the Story!

On October 8, 2000 we will celebrate 75 years of ministry on the corner of Gregson and Trinity Avenue.

According to a history of our church that was compiled by Bob Blake:

"The first service was held in the new Sanctuary on Sunday, October 6, 1925, and Dr. Frank S. Hickman, Minister to the Chapel at Duke, was the speaker for the occasion.

The approximate cost of the new building in 1925.

General Contract	48,000

If we were to build the same building today at \$175 per square foot, the General Contract alone would be \$2 million.

But building costs aside, I like the way Mrs. H. C. Carr said it in her account, "In answer to prayer we believe a large group of members in the First (Presbyterian) Church, realizing the opportunity and being anxious to be used by the Master in the furtherance of His Kingdom, moved their membership to Trinity Avenue Presbyterian Church. ... Hearts have overflowed in their zeal for service, and many lives have been made happier for having felt that they were actually needed to render some deed done for Him."

Join us on October 8<sup>th</sup> as we celebrate the many lives that have answered the call and continue to answer the call of our Lord Jesus Christ!

It was a good thing we arrived early for church on Rally Day. We were so overwhelmed by the greeting we received in the parking lot, we barely made it to the worship service on time. There a full house, exquisite music, a timely message, and great fellowship all served to make us glad to be home.

We landed in the USA in June. After visiting family in California, we made our slow trek across the country by minivan. We arrived in Durham on August 19<sup>th</sup>, and this will be our home through the first week of November. These six months in the USA are part sabbatical leave from Trinity Theological College, a time of research and preparation, and part "Mission Interpretation" wherein we visit Presbyterian churches to share about our work in Singapore and the overall work of the PCUSA in Mission. Thus, over the next two months, we will be visiting churches in North Carolina, Tennessee and South Carolina as well as churches as far away as Michigan and Rhode Island. This means we will only have a few Sundays at TAPC even though we will be in Durham most of the time during the week. We are renting a lovely home just off Oval Park at 1300 Oakland Avenue and our phone number is 286-2200.

Words cannot express the depth of our thanksgiving and appreciation for the love, prayers, concern and support you have shown us over the 3-½ years of our work in Singapore. At Trinity we teach that mission is not an individual thing but concerns the whole church. How much easier to teach that lesson when your home church sets the standard! Your support through the Mission Committee and the tireless efforts of Martha Sparks have allowed us to set up a proper office where students can come to learn and share, made it possible to do critical work in Northwest India and East Malaysia, funded students who will make a critical difference in the Church for years to come, and allowed us to take a nice cool drink of water on a hot day thanks to a refrigerator we couldn't have afforded otherwise. In short, through your kindness and generosity, you have not only changed our lives but the lives of many who live on the other side of the earth.

As for our current status, we have been asked by TTC and the PCUSA to return for another three years to Singapore to continue our work there. There will be some changes. TTC will be moving into its new facilities next July and this will be a major undertaking for all of us on staff. Further there will be an expansion of the programs at TTC into a variety of areas. One is to develop several centers of denominational education. We will be involved in the John Knox Center, which will be established to serve Presbyterians throughout the entire Southeast Asia region. Further, it is our long-term goal to establish a Ph.D. degree in Asian Church History and Theology. Thus, we can look forward to a busy and productive term.

One stop on our journey from California to Durham was our conference in Louisville with other missionaries on fur-lough or returning permanently as well as the leadership and staff of the World Ministries Division. This is a personal observation and evaluation, but in the midst of tremendous transformation and turmoil, the WMD is in a process of positive change. Like much of the PCUSA, the WMD has been a house divided against itself. Our experience in the past has been that these differences were more often exacerbated by some leaders in the WMD than addressed much to the detriment of the Mission and work of the PCUSA. Nonetheless, our new director, Marian McClure, is a capable leader who is working to establish our common ground in mission as well as the need for coherent diversity. She has instituted critical changes on staff that bode well for the future of the WMD. There is still much work to be done, but the WMD is on the right track.

Finally, I fear that our time together will pass all too quickly and that before we know it, we will be leaving Durham again to return overseas. With our being gone so many weekends, we are going to make a special effort to be at the church for the Wednesday night get-togethers to catch up with old friends and get to know those of you who have joined the church since we left. We will also take time to share in greater detail about our work overseas. Even if you don't regularly attend, Wednesday evening may be your best chance to get to see us and talk with us. Aside from that, do feel free to call us at any time at the number above.

We look forward to sharing with you more.

## Building up the body to equip you to...

Welcome to a new year of Christian Education at TAPC. We hope you enjoyed the Rally Day 2000 celebration!

Christian Education is something to celebrate and has a very definite purpose in our lives. Sunday School can be a place where people meet Jesus Christ and come to know his infinite power and love. It can teach people how to become contributing members of the Christian community. It can help students learn about and feel a part of their Christian heritage, and it can be a training ground for students to fulfill the Christian mission. A good Sunday school program should offer trust, guidance and challenges that produce growth.

We have a program that we believe will achieve all of these things.

Our new Children's Sunday School curriculum is Bible Quest. It is a Bible story curriculum which teaches the overall story of the Bible, helps to develop skilled and faithful interpreters of the Bible and invites the children to live as disciples of Jesus Christ.

On their first day of Sunday School, the students will receive "A Year At A Glance" which will let parents know what Bible stories we will be exploring each week. We hope parents will use this information to follow along, share, and reinforce at home what the children are learning in Sunday School. (Each age level is color-coded. Look for any bulletin board notices in this color regarding your child's class.)

#### Kindergarten parents:

Kindergarteners are now joining 1st and 2nd graders for Children's Church. Parents need to pick their children up from their Sunday School classrooms and take them to the sanctuary for worship. (If you cannot do this please arrange for someone else to pick them up.) After the children's sermon they will leave the sanctuary with their teachers for Children's Church in Room 207.

On the first Sunday of each month there is no Children's Church. All children in K-2 still need to be picked up from their classrooms and taken to the sanctuary. After the children's sermon, Kindergarteners will go to their Sunday School classrooms for child care. First and second graders will remain in the sanctuary with their parents for the worship service and communion.

All Parents need to arrange for their child's pick up from Sunday School up through third grade. Fourth and fifth graders can take themselves to worship.

The age levels of classes have shifted to better accommodate developmental stages of the students. All new curriculum is broken down in this way.

#### Looking for a Way to Help Somebody? Try A Helping Hand.

A Helping Hand, a non-profit organization serving the elderly and disabled, is looking for volunteers to provide transportation and to work in AHH's respite care program. Cathy Ahrendsen, a member of TAPC, founded A Helping Hand in 1995. Ahrendsen serves as Executive Director. Since then, AHH has served more than 480 senior citizens and disabled clients in Chapel Hill and Durham.

AHH gives respite care at no charge for two to four hours a week to provide a break for full-time caregivers. Volunteers can work flexible hours in service as sitters for as little as two hours at a time. Volunteers would work one-on-one with clients in the client's home.

AHH also provides homemaker services. Duties include companion care, transportation, meal preparation, light housekeeping, and prescription pick-up using paid staff who are mostly UNC graduate students in one of the health-care fields. A Helping Hand offers these services based on the individual's ability to pay.

A Helping Hand does not perform any kind of medical service. "Our goal is to assist senior citizens and the disabled, not to do everything for them," Ahrendsen says. "These people have more capabilities than many people realize."


