An ordained Baptist minister, he is the former pastor of John Street Baptist Church (MA), New Red Mountain Baptist Church (NC), and Bell Buckle and Hopewell A.M.E. Churches (TN). Pollard is a former associate minister of Trinity Tabernacle Baptist Church in Mableton, GA, and board member and consultant to numerous organizations. He and his wife Jessica Bryant Pollard, a school counselor, have two adult children, a son, Brooks, and daughter, Asha.
