

SPECIAL PROGRAM FUNDS

Contributed in fiscal 2002-2003

Sustaining Pastoral Excellence is a new program funded by Lilly Endowment of Indianapolis, Indiana, providing \$58 million to 47 major projects across the nation. The Divinity School has received a major grant to oversee and interpret this endeavor.

Caring Communities: Health Ministries and the Practice of Faithful Caring enjoys continued funding by The Duke Endowment of Charlotte, North Carolina, for a resource center to provide interdisciplinary training in health ministry for health care providers, clergy, lay leaders, policy makers and community leaders. The project also assesses best practices within health ministries in North and South Carolina to determine their integrity and effectiveness, as well as how those programs can be replicated, improved and integrated into the life of additional congregations and communities.

Pulpit & Pew, the research program on pastoral leadership, and The Youth Academy for Christian Formation continue to receive major funding from Lilly Endowment of Indianapolis, Indiana. The Center for Theological Writing is being sustained by grants from the Henry Luce Foundation, New York, New York.

The Duke Institute on Care at the End of Life with further generous funding from The Foundation for End of Life Care, Vitas Healthcare Corporation, and the Dade Fund, all in Miami, Florida, continues to expand its programs of teaching and research.

Generous support continues from Royce and Jane Reynolds of Greensboro, N.C., for the Reynolds Program in Church Leadership, a certificate program of the Divinity School and the distinguished Center for Creative Leadership for 24 pastors selected from the Carolinas and Virginia.

The Duke Endowment, in addition to its invaluable support for field education and continuing education programs in the Divinity School, also renewed support for the **Walltown**Ministries Project providing a range of services for the Durham neighborhood and urban ministry experience for students.
