

We rejoice in the centrality of Jesus Christ in all your works, for he was with you from the very beginning and is supreme over all creation.


We praise you that Christ is before all things, and that in him allthings hold together, especially our very fragile, vulnerable, and often broken lives.




(Kneeling or sitting)



CHRIST AS CHIEF ELDER FESTIVAL, NOVEMBER 13, 1741

Prior to 1741, the Moravian Church was governed by an elected Chief Elder who presided over the affairs of the communities in Europe and the expanding mission fields in North America. This individual's primary job was to oversee the Church's activities and ensure that they were remaining true to the will of Christ. When it was realized that the job had become too large for a single person, the synodical conference decided to declare Christ Himself as the Chief Elder The decision was announced to the European Congregations on November 13, 1741, and its anniversary remains a festival day in the worldwide Moravian Church.
