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Introduction:

1. In the parts of Luke preceding the Scripture we have read today is Luke's account that the angel Gabriel was sent by God to Mazareth to the Virgin Mary. The angel told her that she was favored of the Lord, that she would conceive a son, and that he should be called Jesus. This son was to be great, the angel said, and should be called the Son of the Most High. He would reign over the house of David, and there would be no end to his kingdom. Mary wanted to know how this could be, since she had no husband, and was told that the Holy Spirit would bring it about, and that the child therefore would be called the Son of God. The angel also told Mary that her kinswoman Elizabeth, then a childless old woman, had also conceived, for with God nothing was impossible. Mary responded to the angel's message, "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word."

2. In our Scripture is an account that after this appearance of the angel to MXXXXXMXXX her, Mary went hurriedly to "a city of Judah" to visit Elizabeth. When she entered her kins-

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woman's house, Elizabeth felt her babe leap within her, was filled with the Holy Spirit, and exclaimed, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb." Mary responded with the famous and beautiful words known as the "Magnificat." It begins, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Favior." XXXXX These words XXXXX we dse as a text to guide us today in thinking about our theme, "Preparing for Christmas." I think that there works indicate some ways in which we might prepare ourselves to grow spiritually in the coming Christmas season.

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l. Mary's words "my soul magnifies the Lord," suggest that she saw mainly her God, that she did put Him first.

2. When we today hear the word

"magnify", we may think of something made to appear larger than it is, perhaps through the usage of a glass lens. Perhaps magnification by a microscope gives a truer picture of the importance of a tiny organizm than we would otherwise get. Such would be the case when the microscope reveals that the cause of a serious illness is a tiny germ which is invisible to the naked eye. The microscope may reveal good things as well, as, for instance, that an unnatural growth is not, after all, the greatly-feared

malignant tissue called cancer.

At least, it tells us the truth, so far as we are able to interpret it, about that which is magnified.

3. When we "magnify" the Lord, we mean that we lift the thought of Him from the almost insignificant place we often assign Him. We put im first in our thoughts. We think seriously on His nature, power, love and mercy.

4. Such should be our attitude at this time of preparation for Christmas. We do need to concentrate on the idea of God, to realize how dependent we are on Him. We need to compare that which we call good ethics and righteous living with the attitudes and standards of Christ, and to revise our lives accordingly. When we do so, we become aware of our delire to praise the One whose birth we celebrate at the coming of Christmas.

- 2. For a person of today who really believes that the <u>Savior</u> was born on the first Christmas, the day can become a spontaneous flowing out of love and ratitude. The feast we have becomes a reminder of God's infinite love and mercy. The gifts we give are the expression to loved ones of the belief that God loves them even as you do.

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Conclusion:
