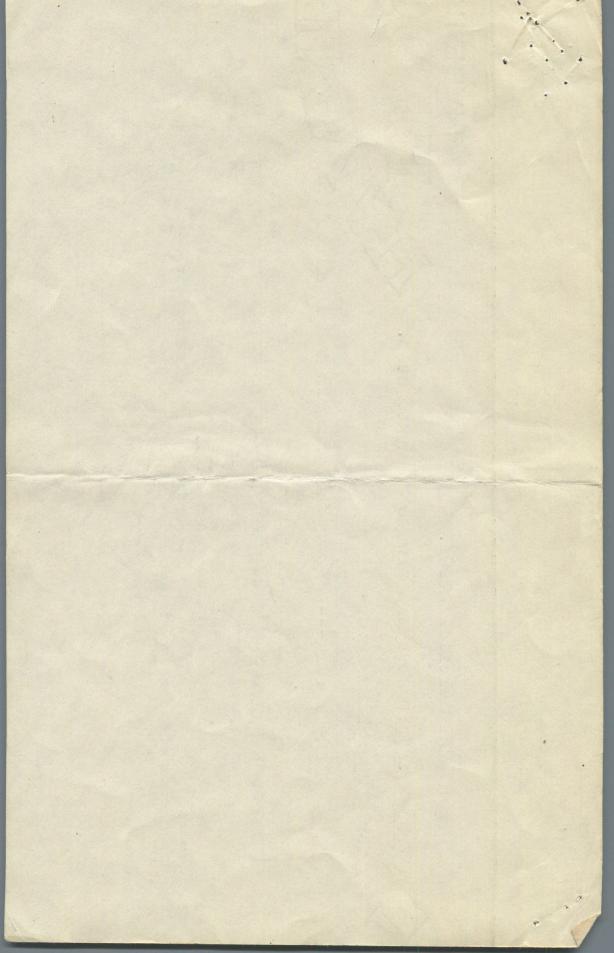
Theme: The merciful Jesus.

that I may receive my sight.

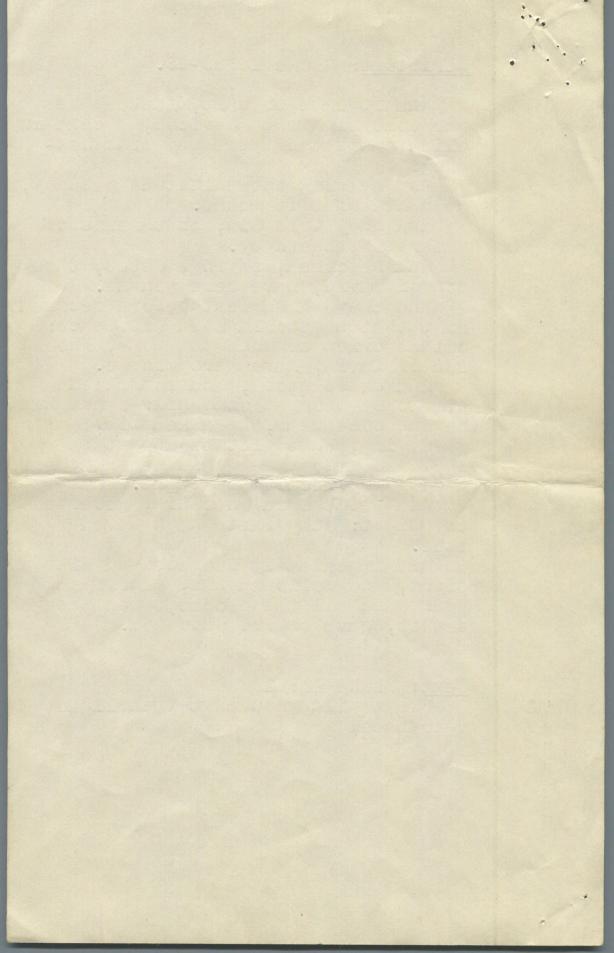
And esus said unto him, Receive thy sight: thy faith hath saved thee.

And immediately he received his sight, and followed him, glorifying God: and all the people, when they saw it, gave praise unto God.

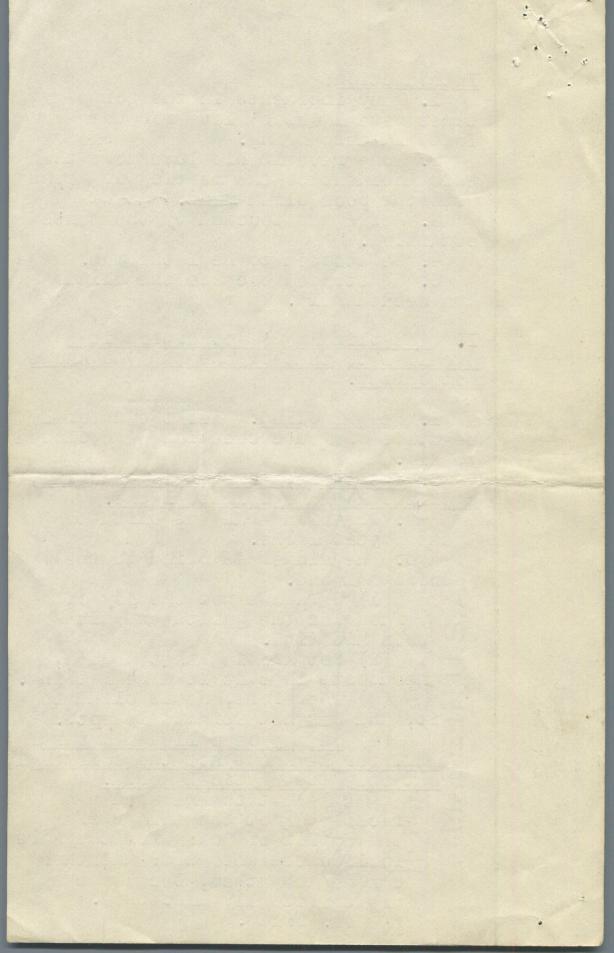

Introduction: 1. Many incidents in the Scriptures reveal Jesus' love for the lost and despairing. 2. None reveals his love more than this incident of the meeting of Jesus with the poor blind mind mon. 3. Jesus was touched by the man's condition. 4. He stopped to heal the man. 5. He stopped because the blind man needed help. II The blind man's condition is a parallel to that of the man who knows not Christ. 1. He was blind. All the natural beauties of God's creation were closed to him. 2. There are, however, two worlds, a phisical and a spiritual one. a. The blind man was blind to the physical one. b. The sinner is blind to the 3 spiritual one. (1) He knows not the joy of pardon for the guilts and sins upon his mind. (2) Not knowing that pardon, he doubts that it is a real thing. Sermons New Testament Luke 18:35-43 (3) Therefore, he is blind to it, and has not spiritual depth. (4) He may be called a natural man, for he knows not the spiritual, but only the physical world. (a) "But the natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God: for they are foolishness unto him: neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned." (I Cor. 2:14).



3. The blind man was helpless. He had to be carried to Jesus, or at least led to him, for he could not see him. His was a case which depended on others.

a. He had every reason to have lost faith in any hope of an external remedy removing his blindness.

b. He had heard of Jesus and was filled with emotion and hope that his affliction might be moved.

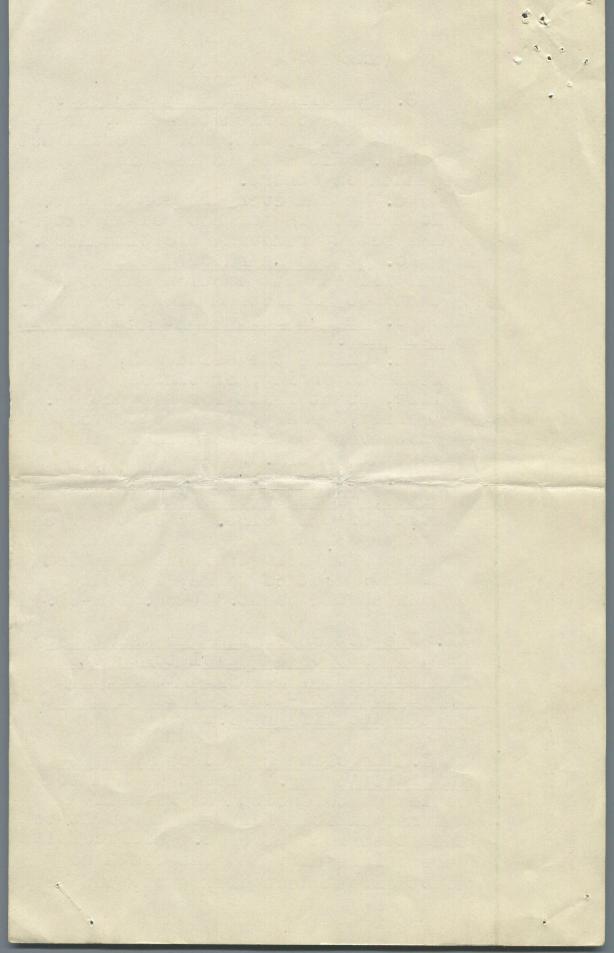
c. He had faith that Jesus could

help him.

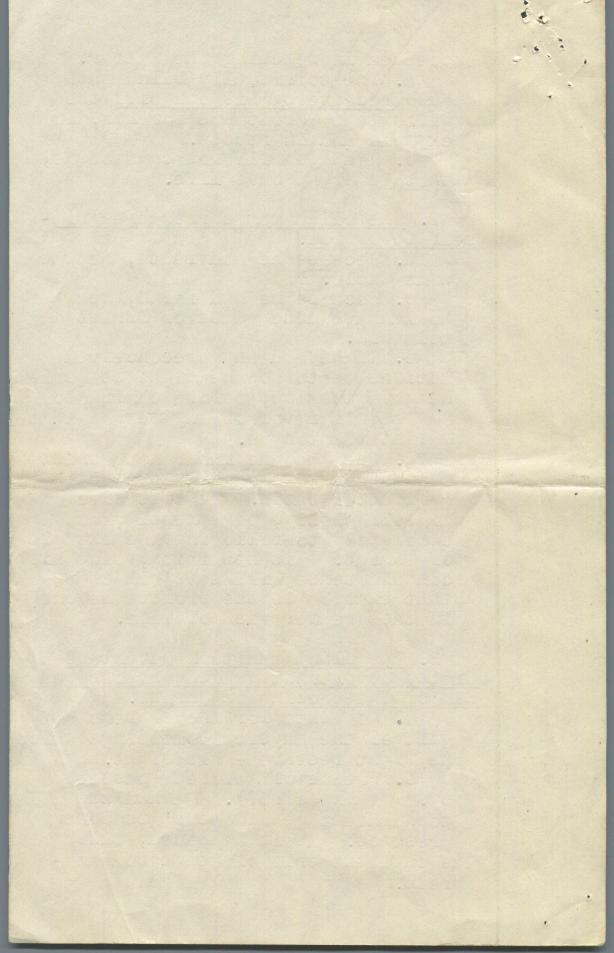
- d. Unlike the blind man, he who leads an erring, or sinful way of life, is at fault for his action. "Verily, verily, I say unto you, Whosoever committeth sin is the servant of sin."
- e. Yet, faith will save us, througrace, or mercy of Christ, in spite of past sins. "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any many should boast." (Eph. 2:8-9).
- II. The action of him who knows not Christ must be parallel to that of the blind man, if he is to receive the salvation the spiritual sight that makes life real.
- 1. The blind man placed himself in Christ's way. Though he had to be led up to Christ, he himself was responsible for being b rought to the attention of Jesus. Difficulties were before him, and the crowd no doubt almost kept him; away, but he

succeeded in reaching the Master. a. The spiritually blind must also receive by his own will the gifts that Christ has for him, in example and in repose. b. "And ye will not come to me, that ye might have life." 2. The blind man surrendered himself to Christ. a. Because he had faith, he was made whole. b. Because he had faith, he would have done whatever Christ told him. c. If he had any preconceived notions as to how he might be healed he gave them up, before coming to Christ, in favor of any method that Christ might have. d. The man who knows not Christ cannot get to know him on an experimental basis. He must give himself wholly, permanently, and completely to following the example of Christ. His new faith, plus his commons sense will show him that 10 that example is the profitable one, in the greater view of life. 3. The blind man took advantage of the opportunity which was offered him by the passing of Christ. al He asked for the supreme gift of the physical blessings which Sermons New Tests Luke 18:3 he might receive - his sight. b. "Jesus of Nazareth passeth by." (Luke 18:37). He kxxxxx took advantage of Jesus' temporary presence. As it happened, this was the last trip of Jesus to Nazareth.



4. The man who knows not Christ must also: a. Place himself at the mercy of Jesus. b. Surrender himself wholeheartedly to the will of Christ. c. Take advantage of the opportunity of following Jesus when it is presented. Conclusion: 1. This story illustrates that Jesus is always ready to help. 2. But he is not always passing by. That is, a man's heart is not always in a condition to accept him. 3. Thus, he had best be accepted when he is heard knocking. 4. rHe is always ready to help but he must know the need. 0 Sermons New Testament Luke 18:35-43
