# Introduction:

L. Some of you have travelled a good deal. Perhaps you have even been around the world and can tell stories of interesting countries and peoples. The experiences of long trips away from home seem to stick with us vividly.

If on such trips we find at each place a guide to show us the points of interest and to explain local customs we get much more from such a trip. A native guide who can sepak your language well enough to communicate effectively with you can enrich a trip tremendously.

As we think in terms of today's topic, "With Christ Around the World," we are not trying to make Christ a traveller when he wasn't. In his earthly life he stayed pretty much in one small part of the world. He can not be described kxxxx as h ving been a world traveller.

4. Even so, he is an excellent guide

for the world traveller. He shows how to respect and love people everywhere, how to gain their respect and friendship, how to receive from them that which they can give and teach.

- 5. As we travel we find that there are people in all parts of the world who love and respect Christ, and who are Christians.
- 6. There are, then, many ways in which with accuracy we can use the phrase "with Christ around the world."
- I. We find that Christ is worshipped around the world, as this communion day suggests
- 1. We are aware of the Roman Catholic form of Christian worship. Centering in Italy, it is found in most countries of the world. Belgium, France, Spain are strong Roman Catholic countries of Europe. We think of almost all of the Latin American countries as being strongly Roman Catholic, so that when Brazilia, the new capitol of Brazil, was opened a few months ago

In almost every part of the orld there is at least a smattering of Roman Catholicism, a testimony to a great missionary zeal which we can not help but admire even though we may lisagree with their beliefs in many ways.

2. Protestantism is less than 1/3 of the size of Catholicism, when you count total numbers of believers. Xxxx The stronghold of the Protestant Christian outlook, numerically, probably is the United States. Yet Garmany, the Scandi-avian countries, xxxxxxxxxx others of the European countries of course have strong Protestant groups, and are often the leaders in sound theological thinking. Our own Methodist church has missions in many countries in all parts of the globe. By agreement with other denominations we are not in mission work in some countries and they work in turn do not work in the countries where we have missions. But all Protestant work is not just the

esult of on-the-spot mission workers. In many countries the Protestant churches are truly indigeneous, or composed of and run by the native eoples.

3. Besides traditional Roman Catholicism and independent Protestantism, there are in parts of the world other forms of Christianity. We think of the Mar-Thoma church of notthern India, It is a truly christian church, the origins of which are shrouded in histor; but which the natives say was founded by Thomas, the disciple of Jesus. In parts of Asia minor, such as in Ethiopia, there are various "old Catholic" churches, also claiming to have been founded by Paul or one of the disciples. Most of us are familiar with the Russian Orthodox church, perhaps now having been degraded to the point of being a tool of the Communist state. nere is some sort of Christian worship almost wherever you go. If you will seek to understand the spirit of such worship you will find at the core of each form, of each church, a love of and respect for Jesus Christ. Truly in this sense you can be with Christ Around the World.

5. Not always is it safe to be a Christian. In the old days, for the immediately after Christ's ascension, and often for several hundred years afterwards, it was difficult and dangerous to worship Christ. The symbol of the fish, representing the first letters of the Greek words standing for the phrase "Jesus Christ, Son of God, Savior", was the secret symbol by which Christians identified themselves one to another. The term catacombs has come to signify a place of hiding. It actually refers to underground caves and tombs in Rome where Christians gathered secretly to worship. But all danger in being a Christian has not passed away.

In Red China and other Communist and dietatorial countries it is still

langerous to be a Christian. Freedom of worship and thought can not be tolerated when it leads one to question the government that is denying to people their basic rights to life, liberty, and happiness; so the governments of some countries persecute Christians still. A recent news article from Berlin telling of an east-German protest against the sounds from a Billy Graham tent meeting some hundred yards away in west Berlin illustrates the fear in which dictatoria government holds for freedom-exciting Christian thought.

6. As we go around the world with Christ it is good to see that this suppression of and danger for Christian worship is not everywhere. Some of the most beautiful and greatest buildings in the world are ones for Christian worship. Notre Dame in Paris and other great cathedrals can be cited.

7. But not only ean the traveller find Christians worshipping under conditions of beauty. They also worship

All this was part of the Chilean scane. Martin Niemoller was long a pastor in German concentration camps in the World War II period. He tells of an experience near the end of that time. He writes that "A Dutch cabinet minister, two Norwegian shippers, a British major from the Indian army, a Yugoslavian diplomat, and a Mace-

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tolerably good German, their understanding did not present great difficulties. Indeed, we sang our German chorals with a zest and joy to be found in few congregations of our homeland. Our congreation, moreover, was almost as rich in denominations xxx as in nationalities; Calvinists, Lutherans, Anglicans, and Greek Orthodix found themselves together here -- nearly all isolated individuals who were cut off and separated from their religious communities as much as from their families and friends. What else was left to us than to put into practice now, as well as we understood it, the una sancta, the one Holy Church, and to gather together around God's word? Indeed we did it, and all of us rejoiced with all our hearts in the communion that united us as disciples of the same Teacher and Savior.

This should be the most meaningful communion of the year. On this day the walls of the upper room melt away and we all sit at table with the Master. "World Communion Sunday takes a

step in the direction toward which every observance of the Lord's Supper points. Its affirmation of Christian solidarity is certain to strengthen in Protestants a sense of common life, of mutuality, of holy fellowship in the church of Christ. Its wide extension will be rich in the fruits of the Spirit."
