

MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING
OF THE COMMISSION ON STEWARDSHIP
AND FINANCE - DUKE MEMORIAL CHURCH

Apr 25, 1962

A regular meeting of the Commission on Stewardship and Finance was held in the Dining Room of the Church at 6:00 o'clock P. M. on Wednesday, April 25, 1962 with Chairman, Tom White, presiding:

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Reverend Mr. Bradshaw after which the following matters were discussed and acted upon:

1. A report by Mrs Kale, acting for Mr. Jones, regarding the church treasury in which she stated that \$4,000.00 had been paid on benevolences since last month and the approximate balance unpaid amounted to \$7,000.00 on this item. It was estimated that the full sum would be retired by May 31, 1962.
2. Mr. Coman then stated that immediate action should be taken on the air conditioning system for the basement before active work begins on the new Educational Building. After discussion, it was a majority opinion that Messrs Coman and Barton should be given permission to negotiate with the General Electric distributor, or any other similar dealer, in order to obtain the best price on a new condensor unit.
3. The Reverend Mr. Bradshaw reported that he had been approached by officials of the General Telephone Company for permission to erect a telephone booth on the church parking lot for convenience of the public, and that the Civil Defense Department desired to use our present basement facilities for a fall-out shelter. Upon motion of Coman, seconded by Dozier, and approved by the Commission, it was authorized that permission to place a booth on church property be declined and the matter of fall-out protection be referred to the Board of Trustees.
4. The pastor further stated that immediately after completion of the Building Crusade, our attention should be turned toward the
