The talented motion picture director, Peter Bogdanovich, is well known for what is called nostalgic movies. When he made "The Last Picture Show" and "Paper Moon," someone asked him why he is attracted so much by the past.

He said, "I like anything better than now. I just don't like what's happening today. The music bores me, the cars are ugly, the people are droll. So I retreat to the past."

He's not alone. Many people like any time better than now...so they try to avoid the present, either by living in the past or the future.


PARENTS' MORNING OUT






SHOP FOOD LION/BENEFIT THE METHODIST HOME FOR CHILDREN
