As we enjoy the air conditioning this summer, remember it is part of our efficient and effective energy system that the Campaign financed.


After five months of researching and testing formulas, the PreSoCo Company (used by many historic societies) has developed a cleaner for Duke Memorial's Sanctuary brick that will remove the sixty years of very stubborn dirt. We were quite a challenge to them!

Fifty-five gallons of cleaner have now been ordered: You will soon see the "snorkel lift" in action, cleaning the Duke Street side first. This process of cleaning, pointing and sealing will be done by the Seager Company over the next four months. The scraping, restoring and painting of the wood trim; the down spout work and roof repair will be coordinated during the same period. Following their completion, the indoor plastering and painting will be done. Ben Mixon will oversee and coordinate the schedules for all of these jobs.

The Steering Committee will be meeting in early May to evaluate how far we've come in this first year. As funds are available we will prioritize jobs not yet scheduled and present them to the Administrative Board.

HOUSEKEEPING CORNER



LEADER DAY II is scheduled for Sunday, April 29. Begin with a deli lunch right after worship. We'll conclude no later than 3:30.


The purpose of this event is to provide training for anyone in our congregation who plans or presents programs.




Our J.O.Y. Class will be collecting items for a YARD SALE to be held Saturday, May 12, from 8am - 2pm.
