AN AMAZING THING happened in the sports world recently. It was almost unbelievable. A seventeen-year-old, Pete Sampras, won one of the premier international tennis tournaments -- the U. S. Open.

To make the situation more amazing, he was the youngest person ever to win the tournament. He won by defeating Andre Agassi, having eliminated two giants of the tennis world, Lendl and McEnroe, in the earlier rounds.

I was able to see some of it on television and marvelled at Sampras' 124 mph serves, deep volleys and graceful ground strokes. A new face had appeared, the new kid on the block -- only seventeen years old.

Of course Pete Sampras is enormously talented, but how did he become U. S. Open champion at seventeen? As I watched the t.v. flashbacks and listened to the interviews, I discovered the secret



years disciplined living. Since childhood he had devoted himself to the achievement of this goal. lived to play tennis. That's the way it is in the sports world. You

don't buy a tennis racket today and play in the U.S. Open tomorrow. And so it is with all of life, and certainly that's the way it is in our Christian life. 

A NOTE TO:

I am excited to be at Duke Memorial Church, Everyone has been extremely gracious and I look forward to getting to know you and your children better. A new choir season is about to begin and with it comes new opportunities to help our children develop one of their most precious gifts -- the singing voice. Because I am so new to Duke Memorial, I want to take this opportunity to share some of my thoughts regarding children's choirs in the church.

As parents you have a tremendous influence on your children, also on their decisions and what they tend to see as valuable and important. What you support they are usually willing to pursue, and what you encourage and give priority to, they continue to be a part of--even when the luster at times temporarily wears thin.

I believe the children's choir is a learning experience which constantly nurtures the Christian growth of children who are being taught great theological truths through the texts of hymns and anthems, and who are being encouraged to proclaim these truths in beauty and simple dignity in services of worship. Radiating from this central purpose are many other "means-These to-the-end." are musical



growth, development of skills to increase the capacity of children to serve. the acceptance of responsibility of leadership worship, and the encouragement of a

spirit of respect and reverence in the house of God. Our choir program will work to develop each child by group instruction to sing correctly, with beauty and sincerity, so the singing of each choir might be a truly inspirational part of the worship service.


