#### MINISTER'S MESSAGE

All of us are aware of how individualized and privatized our faith tends to be. This fact, in part, is rooted in the nature of religion in America. We respect the "freedom to believe" and are generally not inclined to invade another's "privacy of faith." But such a notion is quite contrary to how we ought to relate to one another as members of the Body of Christ. True community requires that we be open and honest with one another. Pretense and deception inhibit growth in grace and prevent reconciliation. Christian maturity and the formation of sincere Christian discipleship requires a willingness to be held and to hold others accountable for the way we live out or fail to live out our faith.

The "class meeting" of early Methodism was a very concrete way of assisting persons to form holy habits of Christian living in a context of "mutual accountability." Class meetings were small groups consisting of about 12 members each. They met together once a week in order to be accountable to God and to one another for their discipleship. At these weekly meetings they sang hymns and prayed together. But the main agenda was to testify to the work of God's grace in their lives and to give an account of their discipleship during the past week. Their accountability was in no way judgmental. As John Wesley put it, they "watched over one another in love." The early Methodists knew that they all faced the same challenges, temptations, and pitfalls in their journey of faith in this world; they experienced similar joys, strengths and victories. To be mutually accountable was to help each other along the way.

Today in United Methodism the class meeting has been re-traditioned and we now call it Covenant Discipleship. Here at Duke Memorial, we presently have 6 Covenant Discipleship Groups (CD Groups) which are meeting weekly for mutual accountability. Those who have been a part of Covenant Discipleship have found it to be extremely helpful in their Christian journey.

On Sunday, December 11th, we will form new CD groups. Some groups may decide to stay together, some will re-form, and there may be other church members who will want to join a CD group for the first time. Anyone is invited to become a part of Covenant Discipleship. With around 6-8 in a group, each group spent part of January writing a covenant together (e.g. I will pray for 10 minutes each day ... I will read the Bible for 15 minutes each day ... I will give at least two hours per month in an outreach ministry of the church, etc.). All commit to meeting together for just 1 hour per week for a year at a mutually agreed upon time to give an account of how it's going and to pray together (some groups share in Holy Communion). 
