MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Over the past number of years I have stood with other Christians across the street from Central Prison in Raleigh as part of a candlelight vigil in opposition to state sanctioned execution. I was not able to be there this past Monday night when the state took the life of Kermit Smith and I felt bad that I was not able to be a part of that Christian witness this time. Perhaps of all those put to death in recent years I have had the closest association with Kermit Smith. Kermit was a native of Roanoke Rapids, a community in which I lived and served as a pastor from 1983 -1988. Just a few years prior to that he had abducted several women students from North Carolina Wesleyan College in Rocky Mount, a United Methodist school at which I taught several courses during my appointment in that area. The remembrance of his horrible deed was still fresh.

As a Christian and as a minister of the Gospel I stand in strong opposition to the death penalty. Although I know that my position on this was fostered through my childhood upbringing, my opposition to the death penalty has been confirmed through my own study of God's word and my understanding of the nature of God's justice-love. For one, our Lord died by state execution.

Opposition to the death penalty is not a popular opinion to hold these days. Holding such a view certainly won't get you elected as a public official, because in a society of ever rising crime the majority of the secular world supports capital punishment. Besides statistics which show us that the death penalty does not deter crime, and that it falls unfairly and unequally upon an outcast minority, and that it costs the state much more money to execute a criminal than to keep that person in jail for life, my reason for strongly opposing capital punishment rests on other things.

I hold that the God who is revealed to us in Jesus Christ looks upon the taking of another human life, whether by murder or by state sanctioned execution, as abhorrent to God's justice-love. As a minister of the Gospel I am compelled to give voice to Jesus' own teachings as recorded for us in the Gospels. I would especially call our attention to his teachings in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew chapter 5, etc.) where Jesus teaches that "It is said an eye for an eye. . . , but I say to you" Jesus overturns the accepted opinion of his own society. But more than anything I believe that what we should be seeking as Christians is not vengeance, but rather, we should pray that in the midst of one's incarceration for life that God might work out this one's redemption and even through this one bear some fruit. We Christians, who are called by Christ to "visit those who are in prison", are commanded to be instruments of God's redemption for people like Kermit Smith, not his executioners.

Our United Methodist Church has historically stood in opposition to capital punishment. Our Book of Resolutions declares that "The United Methodist Church cannot accept retribution or social vengeance as a reason for taking human life. It violates our deepest belief in God as the creator and the redeemer of humankind. . . we believe that the state cannot teach respect for human life by taking human life. . . the Holy Scriptures teach us that human life is both sacred and divine and that we bear the image of the incorruptible God. . . Jesus taught us love, forgiveness and reconciliation. . . all Christians are under divine mandate to safeguard life and work for the salvation of all humankind." I am thankful that the United Methodist Church holds to such a courageous position.



METHODIST EPISCOPAL DIALOGUE

The Anglican-Methodist International Commission has asked local congregations to answer three questions so it may continue its work. The questions center around the possibility that the Anglicans and Methodists may obtain full communion with each other; are there enough agreements about basic belief and understanding of the mission and ministry; what are the obstacles to full communion; and what do we think full communion should look like? (DIALOGUE continued)

Duke Memorial has been paired with St. Titus Episcopal Church, here in Durham, to begin to talk about our understandings of beliefs such as salvation; polity, or how the churches are organized; sacraments; Chrustian Education; and others. Six members of St. Titus have been meeting and have held many discussion about these issues. Our talks at Duke Memorial will take place during the month of February. They will allow us to identify our beliefs as United Methodists. When we are ready, we will meet with the St. Titus group.

This is an exciting time for Anglicans and Methodists. We are recruiting members who feel called to engage in the dialogue about our Methodist beliefs and who feel called to participate in sharing our beliefs and learning about another branch of our "family."

We have study books for seven persons. We hope to complete the work during February so we can meet with St. Titus in March. Our churches have set the weekend of April 29-30 for our reunions. We need to be ready!


