#### **MINISTER'S MESSAGE**

A recent Newsweek article was entitled "Twenty Seconds of Terror". I suspect that not many of us can imagine the devastation of the kind that struck Kobe, Japan in January, an earthquake that killed some 5,000 people. In addition to the dead, it is reported that an additional 25,000 people were injured, about 300,000 left homeless, and there is upwards of some \$80 billion in property damage.

Like so many past disasters, the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) was almost immediately present to offer assistance of personnel and resources. It is known around the world that UMCOR is almost always one of the first relief agencies to respond to a national disaster and often the last to leave. Because of financial contributions by United Methodists around the United States throughout the year, UMCOR has been able to give immediate assistance to the people of Kobe, Japan. I am sure that most all of us are aware that of the three missionary couples whose ministries we annually support one of these is located in Japan; they are Bob and Hazel Terhune. Bob and Hazel were among us on a Sunday morning and afternoon just about two years ago. We are happy to learn that all of our 28 United Methodist missionaries in Japan are safe. It has been reported, however, that one UM missionary parsonage was moved off its foundation and another one was badly damaged. Six Kyodan churches were completely destroyed, seven partially destroyed, and nine have collapsed walls or ceilings.

Next Sunday, February 12, during the morning worship service, you will be given an opportunity to contribute to UMCOR's efforts to offer relief to the victims of the Kobe earthquake. You should make your check out to Duke Memorial UMC, specified for the "Kobe Quake". If you would like more information regarding how UMCOR has responded, you may call 1-800-841-1235. In my last article in this newsletter, you may recall the praise I offered to this congregation for the generosity you have shown over the past years as you have responded to such appeals. Let us continue to minister in this way.

#### WESLEY WOMEN UPCOMING MEETINGS



# The Augel Phenomena

Since the summer of 1992, I have been surrounded by a plethora of angels. They are all over in newspapers, magazines and retail shops. Book stores herald passersby with angelic volumes prominently displayed in their windows. Why this sudden interest in angels?

I began a verse-by-verse Bible study of Genesis. I was amazed at what I found in the first book of the Old Testament -- both direct usage of the word angel (angelos-Greek; malakh - Hebrew) and inferences to angels: Genesis 1:26 "Let us make men ...", "..the man has become like one of us.."

New Revised Standard Version: and 6:7 "There were giants in the earth who were

descendents of human women and the supernatural beings. They were the great heroes and famous men of long ago." Good News Bible.

"His Mysterious Ways" column in Guideposts magazine is verifiable testimony of God's continued, and often unexplainable action in lives today. Time magazine in its year-end issue for 1993, carried a full-page cover of an angel with the following title "The new age of angels. 69% of Americans believe they exist. What in heaven is going on?"

Here are some of the reasons I have garnered for: WHY THE ANGEL PHENOMENON TODAY?

First, it's now 1975 — only five years away from a new millenium. Every century brought a rash of concern for the "possible" forthcoming end of the world. Predictors, prophets, writers and religious leaders alike have shared in making their readers/listeners aware of this. Hence, there has been a preoccupation with impending doom, fulfillment, world conflagration ending with paradise or the "other place" depending on what you have internalized and accepted in your faith journey.

Second, the baby boomers of the sixties and seventies who intellectually thought they had all the answers and the world on a string, are flocking back to the churches—some to their parents' established churches and some to the newer more experiential, spiritual finding and fulfillment churches.

Third, we of the western and Judeo-Christian traditions, have for too long ignored some of the great truths and contri-

butions from Eastern religions that need to be acknowledged in our religious growth and life. Before we "Aha, New Age!" too quickly, know your/our own faiths and just what is and is not new age.

What has all this to do with angels? Angels have been throughout Biblical and world history. Once you begin studying angels you become quickly aware that the Judeo-Christian religions do not have a corner on the angel market. Islam, other ancient and/or Far Eastern religions, as well as Native American religions have angels or angel-like emissaries in their faiths, along with one great central diety.

Looking for angels, encountering angels, believing in angels and even being an angel to someone else at times is a natural, Biblical, God-given need of humankind. I won't agree with some of the angel explainers who say we one day day will become angels That is New Age and old heretical Christian doctrine. But I will accept another's experience of angels as God's reality and experience working in their lives.

There are four writers whom I blame and acclaim for being the instigators of this "phenomenon": Billy Graham, Sophy Burnham, Betty Eadie and Mortimer Adler. Billy Graham's Angels: God's Secret Agents is still one of the best Biblical books on angels. Betty Eadie's Embraced by the Light has been a controversial book and definitely dubbed New Age by many, but Christians have to read it so they at least know what they are objecting to. Mrs. Eadie is a devout Christian and has relayed her near-death experiences with no other purpose than sharing her faith and belief in God. I do not agree with everything she says or interprets as having happened during the hours she "was dead", but I respect it as being a reality of her life and faith. I don't feel she is trying to convert anybody. Though she speaks of angels, it is not a book just about angels.

Dr. Mortimer Adler, editor of the *Great Books* began his summation of articles on the ideas prominent throughout history with "angel" as the first entry. When called to task for including such an ethereal, non-scientific, unproven, questionable term, his adamant defense was that "angels" were part of the religious writings of not only many of the great religions of the world, but also the greatest writers --Aquinas, Milton, Shakespeare, etc.

The fourth writer to inspire the profusion of angel books is Sophy Burnham who has written what people around the world wanted to share of their experiences and encounters with angels. Human-kind, in this late 20th century technological, informational-explosion age, is seeking a closeness to God. Many have found it in their lifelong experiences as believing and caring members of churches and congregational families. Many want and seek assurance that the next exploding century will still be in God's control and care, as will their personal lives and future. Caring angels, guiding angels, protecting angels, guardian angels are the essence of God throughout all Judaic and Christian scriptures. They are a little bit of the unknown reality—showing that God is just as much present and part of life today as in the past—and will continue in the future.
