MINISTER'S MESSAGE

The event of the feeding of the 5,000 is a familiar story from Scripture. It is told in each of the four Gospels, and each has its unique perspective. In light of our stewardship focus throughout the month, as we are prayerfully considering our gifts to God and God's church, let us hear how this very familiar story can possibly speak to us in a variety of ways.

Some time ago I heard someone speak about this story from John 6:1-14, and the interpretation has stayed with me. The writer of John's Gospel tells this story a little differently than the other three Gospels in that Andrew comes to Jesus, in the midst of the disciples' frantic search for food for all of these people and says "there is a young boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish." Then he says, "but what are they among so many people?"

We may be wondering the same thing as we consider our own pledge of money or time and talents to the church. But a familiar word to us from this story is that whenever we are willing to offer our best to God, that which we have, whether that be five barley loaves or fifty barley loaves, God will bless our gifts and will use our gifts in miraculous ways.

Along with this word to us, another interpretation of this story that I offer for consideration, is one that again points to the boy's willingness to offer what he had. Here was a crowd who had been out all day, and most of them, like the young boy, had probably carried some food with them from home for the day. Because they were so hungry themselves, they were not willing to share with others. That is, until they noticed this one young boy willing to give what food he had to Jesus. As they watched this boy's generosity and his willingness to offer what he had to help others, could it be that with Jesus' blessing of this gift, miraculously others began to open their bag lunches and share with those around them, until all 5,000 people were fed?

Isn't that the wonderful miracle that happens when every one of us offers our barley loaves and fishes to God and to God's church? Each of us has been asked to consider what we give to our church. Maybe we can think about this story as we make our commitments for 1996, and believe that when we each offer our best to God, then we all become a part of the miraculous workings of God which are happening all around us, and yes, even through us.



WORSHIP AND STEWARDSHIP

As I listened to Laney's ministry minute on stewardship, I was reminded of the cyclical nature of the stewardship campaign for money. Every year, we gather together our projected ministry needs into a budget. Every year, we use our time and talents to collect. Every year those responsible for raising the budget spend a lot of time working out how much, who has pledged, who has not, etc. And it takes place every year during the months of September, October, and November.

The Church's liturgical year also is cyclical. The new year for the Church begins with the first Sunday of Advent, a time of penitence, renewal, expectation, and hope. It is a time in which we prepare ourselves for the coming of Christ, both a memorial of his birth and his coming in the future in which the fullness of God's kingdom is realized. In preparation, we take an account of ourselves, searching our hearts for that which we need to discard as a stumbling block to our ability to receive Christ. We are renewed by such reflection and are able to look forward, with expectation and hope, to the return of Christ.

Often the financial campaign chairperson reminds us that not only our money, but our time and gifts belong to God. How we care for our possessions, ourselves, others, and the earth is a witness to the presence of God in our hearts. In worship, we bring ourselves into God's presence in thanksgiving and praise. It is a means of grace, according to John Wesley, through which the Holy Spirit works to increase our faith and love of God and neighbor.

Stewardship and worship? Money and worship? The two come together in our praising God and giving God thanks for the possessions and resources we have to use. Worshiping faithfully means our actions in corporate worship on Sunday mornings are the same as those during the rest of the week. Our resources are used in praise and thanksgiving to God seven days a week.

This month as the congregation works on collecting the funds for our ministry, think of it as a time of worship in praise and thanksgiving to God. The tithe of ten percent of "the first fruits" is scriptural. God sacrificed the life of God's son, Jesus, for our salvation. Our sacrifice for the ministry of the Church, as an instrument of God's grace is faithful worship.

Early churches had many paintings and stained glass windows that told the story of our faith. These were not just to enhance the beauty of the building, but they were used to tell the story for most of the people who could not read.

CUBAN REFUGEE FAMILIES NEED HELP!

Duke Memorial has been offered the opportunity to give new life to a family of refugees. Sponsors are needed to aid the resettlement of Cuban families who have been approved for entry into the United States, but who are living in limbo in Guantanamo. The local unit of Lutheran Family Services Refugee Resettlement, along with members of the Cuban-American Community, are working to bring approximately six families to the Durham-Chapel Hill area. The Council on Ministries has given support to the Missions Committee of Duke Memorial to continue in this process of sponsoring a family.

I have been attending meetings of the "interested and committed" sponsoring groups. In order for Duke Memorial to go from "interested" to "committed," we need a task force of persons who can assist with the physical and socialization needs of the family (housing, employment, transportation, orientation to the area, friendship, etc.). Spanish-language skills are helpful, but not necessary

A MESSAGE FROM COSROW

Of all the recent messages coming from local and national media, one should be especially strong: **Domestic**Violence must be taken seriously in our courts, in our communities, and in our homes.

What you should know

- Every day four women die in this country as a result of domestic violence.
- Domestic violence is the leading cause of injury to women ages 15 - 45 (more than rapes, muggings, and auto accidents combined).
- About 97% of domestic violence victims are women.
- The average woman will leave an abuser 7 or 8 times before making the final break.
- 75% of women murdered by their abusive partners are killed in an attempt to leave the relationship or after they have left.

What you can do

- If you are in imminent danger, call police immediately. If you need someone to talk with, women's centers and shelters in the area offer a variety of services.
- If you know someone who is being abused, offer your help and empathy; assure her she's not alone and that she does not deserve to be beaten.
- Encourage an abused woman to imagine life without her batterer, help her picture the steps she must go through to cope with life on her own to increase her self-confidence.
