TENACITY

In religious thought, there is ever a struggle between tenaciously holding on to "the faith once delivered to the saints" and flexibility so that we do not become the religious equivalents of the dinosaurs. Many think that they died out because they could not adapt their life to a rapidly changing climate. This theory is under challenge at the present time but for a long period it has been fairly widely accepted.

St. Paul once warned his followers not to be blown about by every wind of doctrine that came along. At the same time, he had to live with the fact that his cherished belief in the bodily return of the Lord in the lifetime of Paul was not likely to be fulfilled. This became a great problem for faithful believers whose writings in the documents of the New Testament reveal their struggle. Since that time, Christians have wrestled with decisions as to what is vital in our faith and what was addressed primarily to the original audience or readers.

It would appear that in Communist theory as practiced in the People's Republic of China, "revisionism" is the most venal and deadly of all sins. Orthodoxy in the party line is demanded, no matter what it may cost. The greatest internal strains and struggles in the Communist international movement seem to be at this point.

Orthodoxy, whether political or religious, requires that the person involved not simply declare himself "orthodox"; he must know what the term means (in his understanding at least!) and how he proposes to go about putting his belief into practice. For those who would revise the standards, whatever they may be, such revision or updating requires initial knowledge, thorough and detailed, of what is to be changed.

Christians are called to live in a world which is certainly clearly non-Christian. We will not, by osmosis absorb from our environment and ambience Christian ideas and principles. We may even need to look for informed Christians who can be mentors or guides to us. Thank God, they are available! The fellowship of this congregation and its wide range of activity affords an excellent opportunity to find what it is all about. "Come ye, who hunger and thirst!"
