COMPLETING OUR COMMITMENT

These days are the time when, aware of it or not, we set the course of our life and witness for 1978. It is just about impossible to overstate the importance of the commitments we are making which, in one view, underwrite our budget for 1978 but in a larger sense, determine the lines of our Christian witness and work for the coming year.

It often seems strange to us that money plays so large a part in the work of the church. It is less strange when we reflect on how large a part it plays in the workaday world in which all of us are immersed all the time. God has always been able to use the commonplace for His purposes. When Jesus instituted the Lord's Supper, He used simple bread and wine, the every day sustenance of the people of His world. When 5,000 persons were fed at one time, it was done with five biscuits and two small fish, again the every day stuff of His world. To give sight to a blind man, He made a paste of dust and saliva and put it on the man's eyes.

Not in these mundane substances as such, but in God working through them as they were given to Him, our Lord worked His mighty works. Ever since those far off days, those who have faithfully sought to serve God through Christ have understood the importance of giving, not simply in token or symbolic ways, but giving in terms of real involvement and to the point of sacrifice. It is to this type of giving that God still calls us.

Any one who feels uninvolved in the work of a church might well try the experiment of making really significant gifts to that church. My experience has been that this is one of the quickest and most effective ways to get into the life of the church. Our Lord said, "Where your treasure is, there will your heart be also"; the two clauses can be reversed without distortion of meaning, "Where your heart is, there will your treasure be also". They go together.

Let no one of us fail to get them together to His glory for all to which He calls us as His people in witness, service and love. Our commitment cards are far more than simply paper; they bespeak our love and our lives. My prayer is that we all be guided in God's will so that we surely shall fulfill His will for us.
