STEWARDSHIP AND SCHOOLS

School bells have about disappeared as a means of signaling to the community that formal educational activity is being resumed at this season. If nothing else tells us, our friendly merchants through advertisements make us aware that it is school time again. Perhaps it is as well that school bells are no more. Students often detested them. At least a few of the professors I had in college and seminary ignored them, sometimes as to the beginning of sessions and always at the supposed conclusion of a class period!

Discontent with our schools is likely at nearly an all-time high. From all sides comes complaints; even more interesting than the complaints is that often diametrically opposed reasons are given for the trouble. Johnny can read but poorly; Susie can't add two and two. Neither can speak their mother tongue in an effective way as a means of communication. Discipline was never worse. More money, less money; more bussing, no bussing; hard-nosed educators, warm-hearted educators; more men in the teaching system, fewer authority figures; deprived background, advantaged to the point of disaster; on and on go the pairs of "reasons" for our troubles in our schools.

I suspect there is some truth in nearly all these allegations as well as a lot of simple prejudice. It is not my prerogative nor my wish to produce an oracular utterance in this statement. But it is my earnest desire to encourage every parent to realize that schools cannot by their existance, or even their earnest work, correct all the deficiencies of our homes. No more can they amend our ways of child-rearing when the TV is the principal "sitter" or "taker-up" of time of children. It is reasonable to suppose that children whose parents find them too much to handle and children whose parents are so busy providing the supposed "necessities" of life that they find no time for love and the joy of companionship are going to be children whose teachers find life difficult.

We can and we ought to work as vigorously as possible to correct the deficiencies of our schools, all sorts, at all levels. Money and more money is not necessarily an answer to the problem, social "scientists" notwithstanding. The personal element of our lives involved both with the school system and most particularly with the children we send might be the most useful sort of stewardship we would provide in stewardship of our schools.
