Church newsletters vary greatly from one church to another. Some represent an effort to avoid extremes of position or statement; others resemble a metropolitan area tabloid with 96 point bold face type to declare a regular meeting. "Cuteness" in language or vocabulary is the hallmark of yet others. Some use half a dozen type faces in each issue. Some even try simple, straight communication of the life and intention of the congregation. That is where your Messenger is!

Recently I was jolted by an invitation given to the young adults of a sister Methodist congregation to "come out and share in an exciting program on euthanasia"! Visions of what would be "exciting" on this subject flashed through my mind. Perhaps there would be a demonstration by a volunteer? Would any satisfied "customer" be on hand to testify to his everlasting satisfaction with the process? Could one who had administered euthanasia to another witness to his satisfaction with what he had done? Statistics and example of nearly intolerable human suffering would not be part of the "exciting" program for they are but sober reflections of our human situation and therefore not "exciting".

Nearly all of us search for new ways to say the same things. Madison Avenue finds one of its reasons for being in this process. It is easy to get involved in an ever-faster race of hyperbole and exaggeration. I certainly do not want to sound like an advocate of dull uniformity or stodgy language especially when something wonderful is to be said.

Can you really improve on "I love you" to express your feelings to another? Is it possible to improve on St. Paul's statement that "while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us", These statements are exciting because they speak to us of new life, better life, new dimensions - excitement in itself, not something declared to be exciting simply to attract attention.

Away with the claimed "excitement" of a meeting to consider ways to end human life. That end comes in due time. Let us face urgently and joyfully, and with excitement, to the source of life, God Himself, known in Jesus Christ - that is something about which to be excited. I hope you are; I know I am. God loves you and I do too.
