WHAT DO YOU THINK?

Methodist stay away from services of Holy Communion in large numbers! The sight of the table prepared for a service of worship induces headaches, weakness of the body and numerous other symptoms of illness. I have puzzled for years as to why we behave in this way. As a pastor, I accept responsibility for some of the drop of 25% in attendance on Communion Sundays. But being puzzled, I seek ways to deal with the fact.

In line with this search, the last two Sunday morning services of Communion were planned to "open up" the service, utilizing the old tradition of "free tables" in lieu of formalized procedures. It is now time to register your opinion as to the worth or the undesireability of this procedure. Responses coming to me have varied from flat dislike to almost ecstatic expressions of appreciation.

The lower part of the back page of this issue of the Messenger contains a form through which you can register your opinion. It seems reasonable that only the 296 persons present on 2 July and the 241 present on 1 October express themselves, since they participated in this experiment. If the response is divided, this will give an indication of how to proceed; should it turn out to be very heavily one-sided, this will also direct us.

Please do not sign your expression, unless you wish to do so. Place the form in the offering plate or bring or send it to the office and it will be gratefully received. The tally will be considered completed at the close of morning worship, Sunday, 26 November. Thank you for your help in charting our way.
