#### THAT BLESSED DAY

Easter and Christmas make their impact on the whole western world. Many who take some notice of the day celebrate with little knowledge of the reason for the celebration. So at Christmas, the birthday of the Prince of Peace is often celebrated with gifts that are distinctly not peace-making gifts - children are given toy weapons, hunters receive guns, givers are encouraged to give whisky - all in the name of a time of jolly celebration.

Easter has become the focal point of spring fashions. In the northern hemisphere, in some regions it coincides with spring flowers and the renaissance of botanical life. Easter is less easily misunderstood than Christmas, in terms of the spiritual and religious mean of the day. Even so, how rare it is that Holy Day is truly remembered in the rush of the Holiday.

For many of us, Easter is the greatest festival in the Christian year. Without it, without the heart-warming and soul-redeeming confidence in the resurrection of Jesus, spring would still be spring; we could still make a shift to another sort of clothing; but the meaning of THE day would be gone. So St. Paul reminded the Corinthians who were troubled by the insistence on the resurrection, "...And if Christ be not risen, then is our preaching vain, and your faith is also vain." (I Cor. 15:14). Then follows the series of consequences if the resurrection did not take place - but much more important there follows (v 20) the assurance, "But now is Christ risen from the dead and become the first fruits of them that slept."

No wonder that hymn writers have given us treasures of musical witness to the fact. It is not reason to wonder that when we look at death, ours or that of another, this is what comes to mind. May God grant that with faith, we grasp firmly that Christ is indeed the victor over death and the tomb and that by faith, we become part of His Body. Easter is that "blessed day". Let us join together in praising God for His mercies, the greatest of which is ours through faith in Christ. May He grant to us, each one, His blessing and presence in this season of Easter.
