## PREPARATION

There is an old story about a young man in college who was terribly disappointed and upset with his first semester grades. This story is set in the time when grades went directly to parents, with or without student permission. In panic, he sent a telegram to his brother, "My grades are poor. Prepare Father." The brother wired back, "Father prepared; prepare yourself."

The great events of life require preparation and planning of all of us. Some events which can have a majestic setting take place in a simple setting but nonetheless by their very nature lend great meaning to what happens. So it is with a "simple" home wedding. So it was with the birth of a Baby long ago, in circumstances that seem "romantic" but were in fact primitive and poverty-stricken. A king in a stable - how can that be?

Advent is a time of preparation. We look backward to an event the anniversary of which soon we celebrate but we also look forward to a great event to come. The birth of Jesus, is the one; the full establishment of the Kingdom of our Lord is the event in the future. Each time we pray, "Thy Kingdom come", we remind ourselves - or ought to do so - that there is a future dimension in Advent.

In our churches and in our homes, as in our personal thinking, we have a variety of customs of preparation. Advent wreaths in homes have come to have wide-spread popularity in recent years. Some of us re-read (or read for the first time) some Old Testament passages relating to the prophecies of Messiah. Christmas preparation is nearly universal even among people who seem to have no discernible religious faith. Christmas shopping, cooking, card sending, home decoration - these and many other ways allow us to make preparation.

The greatest preparation is always the inward one. Advent is a time of joy but it is also a time of repentance, for our sins and for the sins of mankind. It is a time to reflect soberly on why a Messiah is necessary and thus to realize our own helpless condition. It is a time to give thanks gladly that in Jesus Christ, God is indeed with us. When by the work of God's Holy Spirit, we prepare inwardly, the outward manifestation in joy takes place in the course of events. Christians, prepare!
