Wendy Mason is a young English woman enrolled in Duke Divinity School who is working at Duke Memorial under the supervision of Margaret Anne Biddle. Recently Margaret Anne asked Wendy for some comments on the likenesses and differences of Methodism in England and in the United States. These are her comments:

<u>Are we all "United Methodists"</u>? When I first gave information to Duke University Records, I stated that my denomination was 'Methodist'; imagine my chagrin when my transcript read 'United Methodist'. Were I a 'United Methodist' I would be obsolete because it was in 1933 that the United Methodists, the Wesleyans and the Primitive Methodists and a few smaller groups joined to form the Methodist Conference. Since the Duke computer seems to require a two-word designation, I have now become a 'British Methodist'.

As I sit in the sanctuary on a Sunday morning I sometimes wonder whether the UMC and my tradition really are both Methodist. I'd never heard too much about Wesley before!

'Methodism was born in song' reads the preface to my hymn book and so I would expect to sing 4 or 5 congregational hymns at each of the two Sunday services which most of our churches hold. Choirs seem to be dying out in most of our churches, except for special services, when an ad hoc choir is formed. Save in a few of our aging big city missions Methodist organists are laymen giving their time voluntarily without remuneration. Relatively, the laity seem to have a much greater role to play in Britain, the minister is generally the only paid official in one of our churches, all the other necessary tasks being performed by members in their spare time. Incidentally, a minister is not maintained by one church, but by the Circuit.

Let me describe the church of which I am a member. Berkswich is a rather large church by British standards, having a membership of about 400. Our minister is also the Superintendent of the Circuit and with the aid of a supernumerary woman minister serves our Church plus the second largest one in our Circuit and several of the country churches. The Superintendent is responsible for organizing the quarterly preaching plan. Due to the large number of churches (approximately 13 in the Circuit, served by 4 full time ministers) to hold 2 services a week in the majority of the churches we are heavily dependent upon the voluntary, unpaid services of our local preachers. In short we hear a variety of preachers, good and not so good: our 'hymn sandwich' would amaze you.

Much of the work of the churches is conducted by its members; my mother is a Pastoral Care Leader and is responsible for keeping in touch with members of a 'cell'. This helps to build community.

Sunday School, or rather Junior Church is for those under eighteen. Other groups are the evening 'Youth Fellowship', 'Women's Fellowship', 'Men's Fellowship' and 'The Wives' Group'. Apart from these, various mid-week fellowship groups meet in homes, attracting members of both sexes aged anything from 16 to 90. From time to time one of these groups will instigate a churchwide event, perhaps a concert or bazaar.

In many ways, I feel that our system is more dependent upon lay participation than is the system I have found here. I have been asked whether British Methodism is dying; supplement to our hymn book in 1969, the 1972 publication of our new liturgy and the complete organizational restructuring that has been effected; apart from a slight rise in membership I hope that we are ready to face the '80s.

Having been brought up in Methodism, it is hard to say much in a short article. If you would like to know more, please just ask me - after all, we are all Methodists, aren't
