HOPE DOES SPRING -- FOR SOME FOLKS!

"Hope springs eternal in the human breast: Man never is, but always to be blest." Alexander Pope, An Essay on Man

When things go well and the world seems beautiful, hope is no problem. The enjoyment of the present seems to preclude any reason for hope as to the future. The reverse side of the proposition is that when things go poorly and all seems dark indeed, hope is needed but where is it then to be found? Only in the dark do men need a candle; and especially in times that are difficult, hope has healing, strengthening power - if we have hope!

For a Christian, God is the object of faith and in Him, His will, His providence, is our reason for hope, for the present and for the future. As we enter into Holy Week, we come not only to the most sacred of seasons in our Christian calendar. We come also to the focus of the whole matter of hope and what ground a Christian has for hope. Without saving faith in Jesus Christ, over all human endeavour and aspiration lies the certain shadow of our mortality. We may strive for a time but evening comes, we lay down - however unwillingly - our efforts and the curtain fails. It is indeed a gloomy prospect, one paralyze all initiative and effort.

But now is Christ raised from the dead! The hymn of St. Paul in I Corinthians 15 deals with the mortality and frailty of all of us. To overcome the pessimism that is built into the human scene, to set aside the seeming end that is death, requires something much more than man. That something is in Jesus Christ. Many of us are uncomfortable with the supernatural and perhaps rightly so. Yet, so great is the need that we have, that only God's intervention can deal with it in triumph.

Hope springs eternal - in the fullest sense of the word - for those whose hope is founded in Christ, His life, death and resurrection. This is God getting into the human scene to do for us what we cannot do for ourselves. This is new life, new direction, a new and everlasting ground for belief that in the future as in the present, God is at work. What more powerful symbol can there be than God raising One from the dead? As we remember the days and cost of the Passion of our Lord, so we would remember also God's victory in Christ. God be praised for the resurrection of Jesus and the hope of our own victory through Him.
