AND WHAT IS NEXT?

Up to the point where a mountain climber scales Mt. Everest, each peak which he reaches is an invitation to climb another one, even higher. One might suppose that when one has ascended Mt. Everest, there really are no new worlds to conquer. The story of mountain climbers seems otherwise; at that point, new and more difficult routes up mountains already conquered challenge the climber. In this sense, he never runs out of goals.

Each Christian year brings us to Easter Sunday. By any scale of measurement, this is the festival for Christians. The worth of Advent, Christmas, Pentecost, Trinity, and all the other days and seasons is not lessened by the conviction that Easter is the top point of it all. Easter, the festival of the Resurrection, is that toward which the whole year heads and to which the remainder of the Christian year constantly refers.

What does one do following Easter? Inevitably, there is the fact to face that we shall not in anything else match the grandeur and the soul-moving convictions of Easter - and unless we admit this, all else we do is on a false foundation. But does one then, because you can't "beat" Easter, simply sit down and wait for another Easter to come? One of the peculiar things about the Christian life is that if you follow this course, the glow and luster of the next Easter will be so diminished that you will think something dreadful has happened. And, in so thinking, you will be exactly right!

What will have happened concerns not Easter but you! The apostolic injunctions to "keep the faith" mean that we live it. The power of the Resurrection is power for living, not for corner-sitting and doing nothing save once a year. The power of Christ, dead for our sins and raised for our justification, is a power that we either receive and in which we live, or else we reject it in the peril of not having further opportunities so to receive.

Easter is a year-long and life-long celebration. Every Sunday is a new affirmation of the Resurrection. Every day is the day to live this faith. And what is next? More of the same, going in Scriptural language from glory to glory, day to day, always in confidence and trust in the God Who created us and Who in Christ offers redemption and eternal life. "I press forward to the goal ..., " said St. Paul. So shall we all!
