ASP GROUP LEAVES FOR APPALACHIA JULY 12th!

After a year of planning, training, and raising money, the time has finally come! Nine youth and four adults will be leaving on Saturday morning, July 12th, for Harrogate, Tennessee to participate in the Appalachia Service Project. Our Harrogate center will be located on the campus of Lincoln Memorial University (where Paul Lancaster's grandfather attended college!). We will be staying in a dorm - hooray for beds!!!! (Last time we slept in sleeping bags on the floor all week long!)

We're not sure yet just what our assignments will be, and we hope we'll be equal to the tasks that need to be done. We have spent time together studying about Appalachian culture, about poverty and the kinds of frustrations and despair it causes, and about effective ways of relating to the people we meet. We will be practicing carpentry skills before going, also. We hope we have prepared well.

Our whole experience of being servants has been well undergirded by the support we have found from our own church family. We thank you for your encouragement, for your presence at our luncheons, for your junk given to our Yardsale, and for your prayers as we leave for Tennessee. We especially thank the U. M. W. for their large financial support, which will go largely toward buying materials for the work groups all summer.
